Incident #222 -- Furstenfeldbruck, Germany -- 26 November 1943

The tactics described by this object, if correct, and the implied time in sight (long enough to call others to see it) argue strongly against an astronomical interpretation for the incident.

The object might have been a balloon with a light on it.

No. 222; Winds aloft charts not available on this one. Object sighted $2\frac{1}{2}$ hours after scheduled release time at which time it was plotted by a radar DF station to be at 27,000. A short time later the same station reported the object circling at 40,000; speed estimated at between 200-500 M.P.H. Most likely not a balloon.

1. Reference is made to letter from your headquarters, MCIAXS, dated 9 March 1949, subject "Unidentified Flying Objects," and first indorsement thereto by this headquarters, dated 31 March 1949.

2. The incident summaries 173 through 233 have been checked against routine weather-balloon ascents made by the Air Force, Navy and Weather Bureau. Comments based on this review are inclosed.

3. It is recommended that the "Guide To Investigation Of Unidentified Aerial Objects" be changed as follows: Item 13, "Direction of Flight of Object," should be clarified so that vertical and horizontal motions are distinguished if possible, and so that motion is specified as the direction towards which the object appears to move. "Relative to Radar Settings" should include a statement of the type of radar set used.

Incident: 227

At 2220 hours, local time, 23 Nov 48, Capt [redacted] saw an object in the air directly east of Furstenfeldbruck at an unknown altitude. It looked like a reddish star and was moving in a southerly direction across Munich turning slightly to the South-West and then South-East. Speed could have been between 200 and 500 MPH. Actual speed could not be estimated. Capt [redacted] called Base Operations from his barracks and they notified Racecard DF Station who reported nothing on the scope but stated they would look. Racecard Station then called Base Operations to report an unidentified object 27,000 ft up some 30 miles south of Munich. Later Racecard Station called Capt [redacted] to report that the object was climbing and was then believed to be at 40,000 ft altitude about 40 miles south of Munich and was circling.

There were no F-80's (Jets) flying on this night.

Capt [redacted] (an F-80 pilot) is considered completely reliable and the facts stated above were verified by Capt [redacted] 23rd Fighter Sq (also an F-80 pilot) who was with Capt [redacted] at the time of the sighting.

1. The following report is submitted from information received by this officer from 1st Lt. [REDACTED], S-2 Officer, 36th Fighter Group (Jet), this station.

a. At 2220 hours, local time, on 23 November 1948, Captain [REDACTED], 23rd Fighter Squadron, saw an object in the air directly east of FURSTENFELDBRUCK (M 49/Y 65) at an unknown altitude. The object, observed by Capt. [REDACTED] from the ground, looked like a reddish star and was moving in a southerly direction across MUNICH (M 49/Y 85), turning slightly to the South-West and then South-East. The speed could have been between 200 and 500 MPH, though the actual speed could not be estimated according to Capt. [REDACTED].

b. Capt. [REDACTED] called FURSTENFELDBRUCK (M 49/Y 65) Base Operations from his barracks and informed them of the sighting. Base Operations then notified Racecard DF Station who stated that they had nothing on the scope but would look. Racecard called Base Operations back and stated that they picked up an unidentified object at 27,000 feet altitude, about thirty (30) miles south of MUNICH. Racecard later called Capt. [REDACTED] at his barracks and informed him that the object was climbing and was then believed to be at 40,000 feet altitude, about forty (40) miles south of MUNICH and was orbiting (circling).

2. The weather conditions at this time (2220 local) were: sky, clear; moon shining; no cloud layers; visibility, 3 miles with ground fog; winds aloft, from North 56 knots an hour.

3. There were no F-80's (Jets) flying on this night.

4. Both Lt. [REDACTED] and Capt. [REDACTED] (an F-80 pilot) are completely reliable observers and reporters.
