## CULTURE

Sow in January or in the early spring as soon as the ground can be prepared, in a deep, rich soil, and for succession until the middle of April. Open a drill 4 to 5 inches deep and cover the seed from 2 to 3 inches. As the vines grow up, draw the soil up against them for support. A row of brush or wire netting should be placed between them for the vines to trail on. Pick flowers closely and do not allow to go to seed. Sheep manure and Nitrate of Soda are the best fertilizers for Sweet Peas; apply lightly alongside of plant, but not too close.



One-half pound to 50 feet of row; 90 pounds per acre. Plant in warm, loamy soil from March to August 15th, 2 inches deep; 3 inches apart in the rows 2 feet apart. Cover firmly. Cultivate often, keeping a mulch of loose soil at all times. Deep cultivation after flowering will cause many blooms to fall.



The poles should be set  $1\frac{1}{2}$  feet deep, slanting slightly to the north. Plant 5 or 6 beans, 1 inch deep, around each pole and cover firmly. When well started, thin to 4 plants to each hill and tie to the pole.

When plants are 2 to 3 inches high transplant or thin out to 8 to 12 inches apart in the row. When nearly full grown, gather outer leaves together in conical form and tie tips together in order to blanch the heart of the plant.



When plants are 3 inches high thin to 8 inches. Cultivate frequently.


ground when all danger of frost is past, in hills 4 feet apart, dropping 6 to 8 seeds to the hill. Cover with ½ to 1 inch of fine soil. When rough leaves appear thin to four plants to the hill. Give frequent but shallow cultivation.

## CABBAGE

One ounce will produce 1,500 plants. Sow seed in January and February in beds in drills 6 inches apart, dropping the seed 5 to 6 to the inch. Cover seed about 1/4 inch in heavy soils, 1/2 inch

in light sandy soils; firm the soil after covering and water the bed thoroughly. Keep beds moist, but not soaking wet. When plants have made fourth or fifth pair of leaves transplant to open ground. Set plants 15 to 18 inches in rows which are 2 to 2½ feet apart.



## GARDEN PEAS

One pound to 50 feet of row; 11/2 bushels per acre. The very early sorts may be sown as soon as the ground is fit, from January to about March 15th, and then the second earliest and late varieties, making sowings every 10 days to insure a succession of peas. A good fall crop may be raised by planting extra early varieties around August 1st. Peas should root deeply. It is well to make 4-inch furrows, cover seed 1 inch, and as the plants grow, cover gradually until level. Let the furrows be broad at the base. The rows should be spaced 2 feet apart for dwarf varieties, 3 feet apart for the medium high, and 4 feet apart for the tall late varieties. Tall varieties need staking. The wrinkled varieties marked (\*) are more sensitive to cold and should not be planted before March 1st.



### WHEAT

### RYE

Rye is one of the most important of the winter cover crops. It may be sown any time between August and November at the rate of five pecks per acre, when used alone, or one bushel per acre when planted in combination. There are three principal varieties:

ABRUZZI—Best of the varieties for seed purposes, grazing or cover crop. Is earlier and makes heavier yield of grain and forage, according to tests at experiment stations. Seed is very dark and easily recognized.

### SUDAN GRASS

Sudan Grass is grown for hay and summer pasture. It is so named because it was obtained from the Sudan Government in Khartum, when a systematic search was made for a form of Johnson grass without rootstalks. It may be sown any time from April to late August and will make heavy yields of hay, seed or pasture. On ordinary land it will yield two to six tons of hay in one season, from two to three cuttings. Known also as "poor land alfalfa" because it will grow in sweet or sour soil and after cutting or grazing springs its new shoots from the crown or root. It withstands drouth; lives through the winter; produces heavy yields of seed and hay and does not require lime.

Plant scarified seed only, 3 to 5 pounds to the acre, in 3-foot rows and cultivate. If broadcast you will need 25 pounds. Cover ¼ of an inch. 1 lb., 35c, postpaid.

### LESPEDEZA OR JAPAN CLOVER

Lespedeza (Lespedeza Striata), known also as Japan clover, is one of the most valuable forage plants in the South. Being a legume, it is valuable for soil improvement. Another use is as a constituent in permanent pastures with Bermuda and Carpet grass.

### **ALFALFA**

Alfalfa (Medicago Sativa) is a deep-rooted, hardy perennial forage plant, belonging to the family which includes beans, peas and clover. It is equal to red clover in feeding value, but yields a greater tonnage per season. In the South we may expect 5 to 7 tons of hay per acre. Since it is a perennial it will last a number of years. Alfalfa requires a deep, fertile, well-drained, non-acid soil, reasonably free from weeds. The bed should be well prepared and the seed inoculated to obtain the best results. Sow 20-25 pounds of seed per acre, either in early fall or early spring. The name alfalfa is of Arabic origin and is translated to mean "the best fodder." It is. (Write Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C., for Farmers' Bulletin 1283.)

### MILLET

Millet makes a large-yielding and nutritious hay crop, quick-growing and easily cured. It, however, requires to be seeded thickly—not less than one bushel (50 lbs.,) per acre, and the crop should always be cut while in bloom, before seed hardens in the head. If the seed is allowed to form, the stalks get hard and it does not make nearly as good hay, and at the same time is more exhaustive to the land. Can be sown any time from the middle of April to the end of August. Do not sow too early.

### COW PEAS - SOY BEANS

The Cow Pea is the most extensively grown leguminous crop in the South. The seed is commonly used for food, but the Cow Pea is grown mainly for forage and soil improvement. It succeeds on any type of well-drained soil, but does best on sandy loams. It should not be sown before corn-planting time, and it is really best to wait until at least two weeks later. Makes best balanced ration when grown in combination with other crops, such as sorghum, Sudan grass, Johnson grass, and millet. As a summer annual it is brought into competition with velvet beans and soy beans. Its advantage is that it succeeds better under varying conditions. It is excellent as a soil improver, because it extracts nitrogen from the air and stores it in its roots. The quantity of seed to be sown per acre varies according to the size of the seed.
