The British Vampire

TH E British Vampire continues its orgy of sucking the lifeblood out of India; and today's news of the floating of a new 35 crores war loan is the latest in Britain's ruthless exploitation of India's wealth and resources for her imperialistic war. This new 'loan' of 35 crores is supposed to be repayable in 1966-68—the implication being that the British hope to win this war and to continue the enslavement of India long enough to refund the loan at that time!

War Loans are nothing new to India. Almost every year since 1939, the British Government has been issuing dozens of such loans, under different names and excuses. The British Government is hard pressed for funds and these "war loans" are issued with a view to extorting money for Britain's war efforts from the Indian people.

One salient feature of these "war loans" is that the British Government has been gradually increasing the size and life of these loans. In 1939-40, most of the loans were for five or ten crores of rupees and they were redeemable in 1945 or 1950, that is within five or ten years. In the following years, the amounts of the loans became larger and the period was also increased to fifteen and twenty years, the latest loan being for 35 crores, repayable nearly 25 years later.

Now, these "war loans" constitute only one feature of Britain's wartime exploitation of India. There are the so-called defence loans, war funds and donations and gifts, amounting to the yearly toll of several thousand crores of rupees. Besides these, there are Indian supplies and foodstuffs, plundered by the British in enormous quantities for their war efforts on all fronts. And all this plunder and loot, all this blood-sucking, goes on in the most ruthless fashion, while the Indian people are starving and dying by the millions.

Today the British Vampire is in its most desperate mood. The British Government knows that it cannot hold on to India very long; and hence this intensification of the economic slaughter of India. There is only one weapon that will be effective against the British Vampire—the weapon of revolt and armed action to crush the forces of British imperialist exploitation. There is only one solution to the problem of starvation and misery in India—the total destruction of the British Vampire. The British Vampire must be killed outright, so that India's four hundred million people may live.

BR. AIRBORNE ATTEMPTS IN ARNHEM FAIL

Major-General Urquhart Frankly Admits Total Failure Of Plans

Lisbon, Oct. 2 (Domei)—Major-General Urquhart, Commander of the First British Airborne Division, which was virtually wiped out by German forces in the Arnhem sector, Holland, today frankly admitted that the British airborne attempt proved an operational failure due to a misjudgment of German defensive strength, according to a London dispatch.

Reviewing the factors which contributed to the virtual annihilation of the British paratroops, the British Commander said, "The main one was that because of flak the R.A.F. could not land us nearer than eight miles of the town (Arnhem)".

The operational intention, Major-General Urquhart said, was to get a complete division down in one lift, but actually "we never got more than 60 per cent. in practice."

"We bumped into opposition rather stronger and earlier than we expected", he revealed, adding, "things did not go according to plan or anywhere near in the early stage".

At the end of the first day, the British Commander stated, one British battalion secured the bridge across the river for anyone coming up from the south and the rest of the troops reached the outskirts of Arnhem.

However, he said, it was not long before the British airborne troops were split up and separated by the Germans. The second airborne lift, which was eagerly awaited, did not arrive until the second day owing to poor weather, and by that time the original operational plan had completely failed.

He declared, "When we decided to form a perimeter on the river and hold a ferry crossing, a brigade recalled from the north of the railway ran into a column of Germans with tanks and suffered a tremendous number of casualties. By the time they got into the perimeter, they were in strength of approximately half a battalion".

The British Commander said, "By the third day we were down in the cellar and it was damned difficult to get out of that". With German tanks and infantry closing their encirclement noose around the British airborne forces, the only recourse left to the remaining British paratroops was to flee, he said.

Nipponese Units Effect Landing At Foochow Coast

Imperial Forces Now Advancing Towards Foochow City

Tokyo, Oct. 3 (Domei)—Imperial Nippon Army and Navy units effected a surprise landing on the coast, north-east of Foochow, Fukien Province, early on the morning of September 27, Dai Honyei announced at 3 o'clock this afternoon.

The text of the announcement follows:

"Our army and navy units acting in close co-operation, early on the morning of September 27 made a surprise landing on the coast north-east of Foochow, and are at present converging on this city."

A Nippon Base at the China Front, October 2 (Domei)—The Nippon air force in China in a series of highly successful raids against enemy air bases in south-western China, accounted for a total of 76 enemy planes destroyed on the ground in the eight-day period ending September 30. In addition, our raiders dealt serious blows to enemy military installations at the airfields attacked.

Huge Anglo-American Losses On West Front During September

Berlin, October 2 (Domei)—During the course of heavy fighting on the Franco-Belgian-Dutch front in the month of September, German forces destroyed a staggering total of 1,159 Anglo-American tanks and armoured cars and brought down 451 aircraft, the German News Agency disclosed today.

In addition, the Germans were said to have captured 10,650 British, Canadian and American prisoners and destroyed or seized

ANTI-BRITISH REVOLUTION AND UNREST SWEEP INDIA ON GANDHI JAYANTHI DAY

Merciless Loot And Plunder Of India's Wealth

The merciless plunder of India's wealth and resources by the British authorities still continues with ever-increasing greed and rapacity.

Yesterday, the British Government of India announced their decision to float yet another loan of 35 crores (350 million) rupees, redeemable 22 years hence. As usual, the authorities are expected to exert direct and indirect pressure on Indian princes, landlords and businessmen, as well as Municipal Corporations and such other civil bodies, to extort the funds required to cover this loan.

Meanwhile, Sir Alfred Watson, a former editor of the notorious British-owned anti-Indian paper, the Calcutta Statesman, has suggested further plans for the exploitation of India.

Writing in the journal "Great Britain and the East", Watson says India's huge sterling balances should not be used for purchasing British-owned concerns in India so as to build up India's present or future industries, but that loans should be raised in Britain and America for that purpose.

Nation Reaffirms Implicit Confidence In Gandhiji's Able Leadership

A fresh wave of anti-British revolution swept all over India on Monday on the occasion of the Gandhi Jayanti — 76th anniversary of the birthday of Mahatma Gandhi.

Mass meetings, processions and demonstrations were held in all towns and villages, and resolutions were passed reaffirming the people's implicit confidence in the leadership of Mahatma Gandhi and also reiterating their grim determination to achieve India's complete independence.

British police and secret service men maintained the utmost vigilance everywhere and the British censors have suppressed all news of anti-British sabotage and other activities.

According to the latest reports, Indians residing in Britain, the United States and other countries also observed Gandhi Jayanti with great enthusiasm and fervour.

At the luncheon held in London in honour of the day by the Committee of the Indian Congressmen in Britain, speeches were made by various participants including some members of the British Parliament.

Labour Member W. C. Cove, in the course of his speech, said that the British authorities in India are "still wedded to their old method of divide and rule". He attributed the breakdown of the Gandhi-Jinnah talks to the British machinations and intrigue. "Behind Jinnah lay the powerful hand of British Imperialism", declared Mr. Cove. Concluding he asked: "What right have we British to associate India in this war, when we are denying her even the provisions of the Atlantic Charter?"

Another speaker, Prof. Catlin, declared that Gandhiji is the greatest living statesman, greater than Churchill or Roosevelt. Mr. George Bernard Shaw in a congratulatory message said: "I can only wish were Gandhi's 35th birthday, instead of his 75th".

Meanwhile, in an interview with the London News Chronicle correspondent at Sewagram, Mahatma Gandhi has further clarified his opposition to Jinnah's Pakistan scheme, declaring that the freedom of the country from British Imperial domination is the problem today, and not Pakistan and such other matters.

Gandhiji's attitude was also supported by the Council of the National Liberal Federation of India at its meeting held in Allahabad yesterday.

Meanwhile, Mr. Jinnah in an interview to the press, has expressed the hope that he and Gandhiji would meet again.

AMERICA'S COLOSSAL LOSS IN PERSONNEL AND PLANES

Lisbon, September 2 (Domei)—The stupendous personnel losses suffered by the American air force amounting to over 77,000 were announced today by General Henry Arnold, Commander-in-Chief of the United States Air Force, states a Washington dispatch received here.

Arnold revealed that there were 72,000 air force battle casualties, including killed, miss-

ing, wounded and prisoners, while there were 5,300 non-battle casualties made up of the dead, sick and injured.

The total plane losses amounted to approximately 42,000. Arnold said that these losses include 14,600 aircraft lost on combat missions and 9,900 lost overseas from non-combat causes. Arnold further disclosed that 7,500 planes in addition were lost in continental United States.

Prize winners of the contest will be given an opportunity of singing for the Broadcasting Station. The theme song for the contest will be "Kantai Kimmu" (Getsu Getsu Ka Sui Moku Kin Kin) and one other song to be chosen by the competitors themselves.

Winners of the first, second and third prizes will be awarded silver cups in addition to monetary prizes of \$30, \$20 and \$10 respectively.

Local vocalists other than professionals are eligible for participation in the contest. Competitors are requested to send in their applications giving the following particulars: Name, address, nationality, sex, age, vocation and name of song chosen, to the Song Competition Section of the Hoso-bu of the Syonan Chuo Hoso Kyoku at the Cathay Building before Oct. 7.

Manpower Shortage In Canadian Industries

Stockholm, October 2 (Domei)—The Canadian Ministry of Labour today announced that 100,000 farmers and rural labourers will be called up for war work immediately after the completion of the Autumn harvest due to the crucial shortage of manpower in Canadian war industries, according to an Ottawa dispatch.

Of this total, 60,000 will be assigned to timber industries, while the remainder will be employed in metallurgical industries, mining, ammunition industries and highway construction, the Ministry revealed.

"The Volcano" In Tamil

We are in receipt of copies of volumes I and II of "The Volcano or The First War of Indian Independence" in Tamil from Sri. Jayamani Subrahmanyam of Kuala Lumpur.

The two volumes are a translation of the epoch-making publication of Mr. V. D. Savarkar in English wherein the eminent politician, social worker and publicist has been at great pains to prove to the hilt that the so-called Indian Mutiny of 1857 was not a mutiny on some minor pretext or other but an actual war against the British to attain the freedom of India.

Although Mr. Savarkar's publication had been proscribed in India by the British tyrants, the timely rendering of the book into Tamil here serves a very useful purpose in that the book would be available to the Tamil public who form the bulk of the Indian population in East Asia.

The task of translating the book has fallen to the capable hands of Sri Jayamani Subrahmanyam who has made an excellent job of it and has thus contributed a great part in the national work for the benefit of Indians in East Asia.

We... eats Back Anti-Axis In Nancy Sector

Lisbon, October 2 (Domei)—As furious fighting continued unabated in the Nijmegen sector in Holland where the Germans are hurling one counter-attack after another, steel-helmeted Wehrmacht legions battling in the Nancy area in south-eastern France yesterday smashed back Anglo-American troops in a powerful counter-thrust, forcing their foes to give ground, according to frontline dispatches received here. Anglo-American dispatches frankly admitted that the Germans "gained a certain amount of success" in the Nancy sector.

On the other hand, a ding-dong battle is reported to be still in progress north-east of Nijmegen, with the Germans launching a series of stiff counter-drives supported by tanks, guns, and flamethrowers.

The United States First Army has started a new offensive against the Siegfried Line in the Aachen area, with hundreds of planes joining in the attack, according to frontline dispatches. The United Press correspondent described the offensive as the largest since the landing in Normandy. Fierce fighting continued yesterday in the left or northern wing of the anti-Axis armies which German military experts describe as having the most important bearing on the entire Western front developments.

The German High Command said that at the Antwerp-Turnhout canal and north of Turnhout, German troops engaged in fierce defensive fighting with Canadians who continued to attack from their penetrated areas. It added that German groups broke into British positions between the Lower Rhine and Wall rivers and flung the stubbornly fighting enemy back towards the west. Formations of the American Seventh Army attempted to gain access to the western

Germans Stop Yankee Advance In North Italy

Zurich, October 2 (Domei)—Anglo-American dispatches from the northern Italian front today indicated that Field Marshal Albert Kesselring's battle tried crack divisions are continuing to hurl heavy counter-attacks against the American Fifth Army front strung out along the hilly terrain flanking the Bologna-Remini railway.

For the fourth consecutive day, Wehrmacht legions, relying on artillery support, yesterday were said to have struck powerful blows at American troops holding Monte Battaglio in the central sector overlooking the Po Valley below Bologna.

The German counter-thrusts were reported to be continuing relentlessly despite mountain storms which have flooded roads, creeks and rivers.

Italian frontline reports said the Germans were using substantial artillery concentrations along the entire Adriatic sector.

foothills of the Vosges mountains. However, after fluctuating fighting, the positions remained in German hands, the German communique said.

United Press reports said the Americans were within ten miles of Belfort. Fighting in the completely destroyed port town of Calais on the Channel coast is nearing its end, the German communique added.

Heavy German naval batteries at Cape Gris Nez, north of Boulogne, succumbed to the numerically superior enemy.

In the Balkans, the Soviets increased pressure in the Danube bend and on both sides of Iron Gate, the German High Command announced. Moscow dispatches said the Red Army had advanced within 40 miles of the Belgrade-Athens railway line, threatening to cut off perhaps 200,000 German troops in the south Balkans.

A second batch of 30 male youths between the ages of 16 and 23 who have graduated from elementary schools or who possess higher academic qualifications are required to undergo six months' training at the Dressers' Training Institute here.

Applications should be addressed to the Chu-Oh Byoin not later than the 26th October and an examination as to physical fitness and character will be conducted at the Chu-Oh Byoin on 28th October at 10 a.m.

During the period of training they will be paid \$30 per month in addition to free tuition and working clothes. No board or lodging will be provided.

On passing the final examination they become qualified to serve as Third Grade Dressers and will be paid an initial salary of \$50 per month.

M. I. A. Khalik Treats Indian Destitutes

Mr. M. I. A. Khalik, local Ceylonese Jeweller, was the host to the inmates of the Indian Destitute Camp, nearly 200 in number, on Sunday, September 24, when he supplied them with the evening meal in memory of his father, news of whose death was recently received.

Penang Balak Sena Complete Training

Penang, October 3 (Domei)—An impressive ceremony marking the completion of a month's training course by the first group of 40 members of the Balak Sena (Indian Youth Corps) was held at the Azad Hind School grounds in the presence of the officials concerned and a large number of prominent Indians.

After handing out proficiency certificates, Dr. N. K. Menon, chairman of the Penang branch of the I.I.L., in an address declared that the present system of training for Indian youths is ensuring "a solid foundation for our future free, new and young India."

19 Planes Shot Down, Damaged Over Borneo

A Nippon Base in the South-west Pacific, Oct. 1 (Domei)—Nippon garrison units at Balikpapan on the eastern coast of Borneo shot down or heavily damaged 19 enemy B-24's out of an enemy formation of 60 planes which came over the sector yesterday. Seven enemy planes were downed and 12 others were heavily damaged. Only slight damage was sustained by our ground installations.

Depositing Excess Funds Stabilizes Living Cost

Although the decision to make a partial refund of deposits with enemy banks by non-enemy depositors has been taken out of consideration to their poor living conditions, it is desired by the Authorities that they should re-deposit their refunds with the Banks or the Post Offices with a view to absorbing the floating money, says the Malai Banking Association in a statement issued to the Press.

The public would be quite aware of the fact that the Authorities have been trying to absorb the floating money from the market, in the form of deposits with the Banks or the Post Offices, for the purpose of keeping down the high cost of living with a view to stabilising the living conditions of the people.

It is hoped that the depositors with the enemy banks would clearly understand the true meaning of the Military Administration and readily co-operate with the Authorities by re-depositing the refunded money.

Tokyo Workers Donate For "Revenge Plane"

Tokyo, Oct. 3 (Domei)—To avenge the gallant deaths of our garrison forces at Omiyajima and Tinian 80 employees of the Nichimangumi, which is engaged in the transportation of vital wartime goods, yesterday donated Yen 100,000 to the War Ministry for the construction of a "revenge plane."

No "Quick Victory" For U.S., Forrestal Asserts

Lisbon, October 2 (Domei)—The supply problem in the war against Nippon is three times that of the war in Europe, James Forrestal, United States Navy Secretary said in a speech in San Francisco on Saturday, according to a dispatch received here.

Forrestal claimed that although the United States has the power to carry the war to Nippon, "transport of that power is our problem". He added that from the results in the Pacific there was no indication of a "quick victory" for the United States, asserting "there is still a good part of the Nippon Navy left", and millions of fighting effectiveness in the Nippon Army.
