The purpose of Wikipedia

«Imagine a world in which **every single person** on the planet is given free access to **the sum of all human knowledge**. That's what we're doing.

(Jimmy Wales, founder of Wikipedia)

How does Wikipedia work?

- Everyone can contribute
- No paid editing
- Everything is decided “by consensus”
- Additional roles are decided by the community itself
- Crowdsourcing is the act of taking a job traditionally performed by a designated agent (usually an employee) and outsourcing it to an undefined, generally large group of people in the form of an open call.

Editors should treat each other with respect and civility

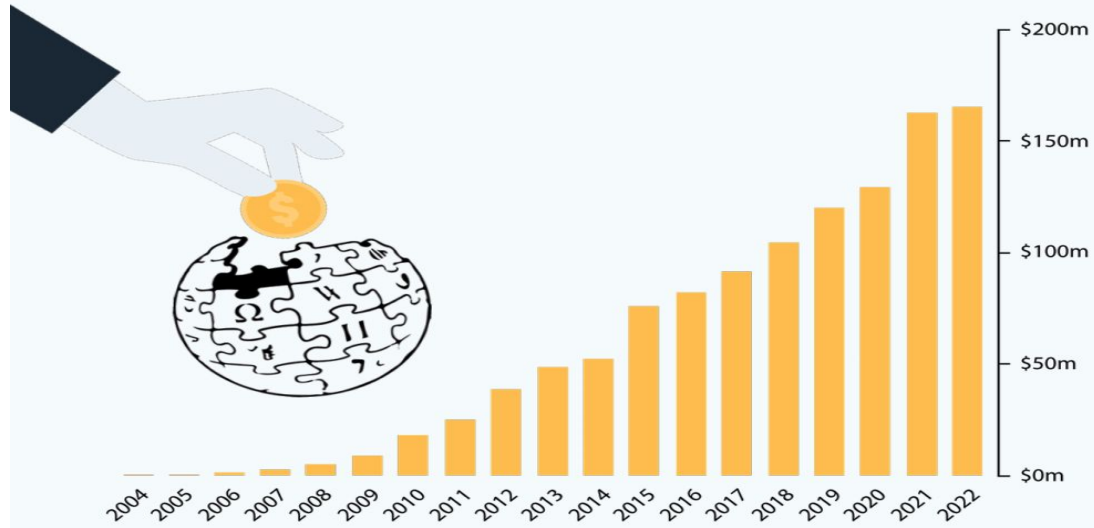

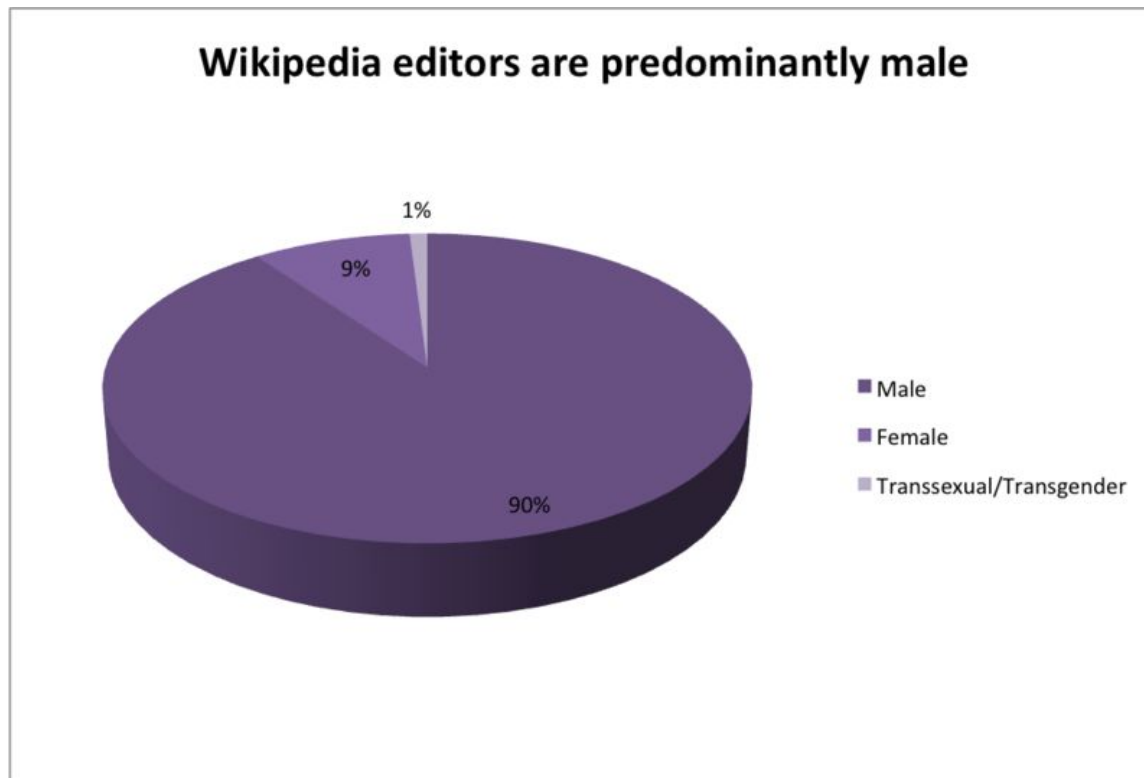

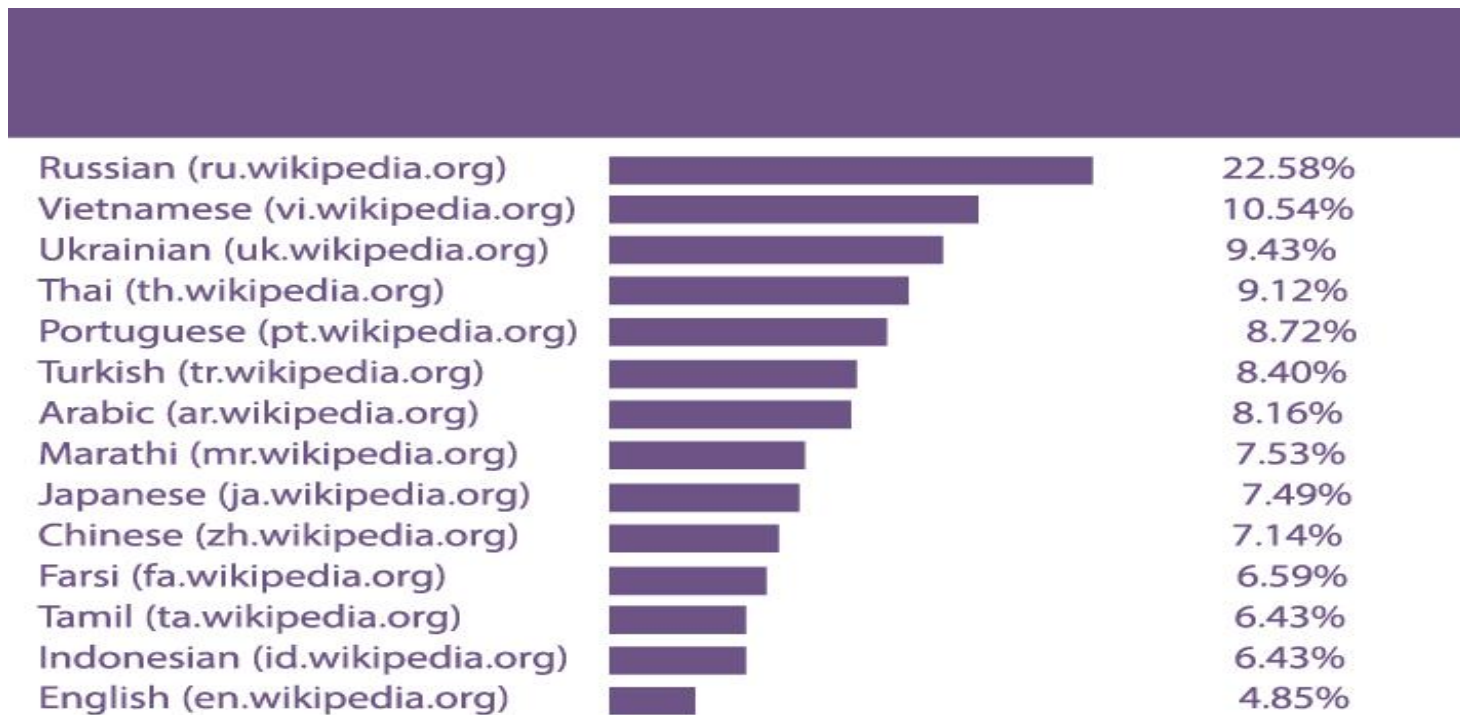

The participation problem

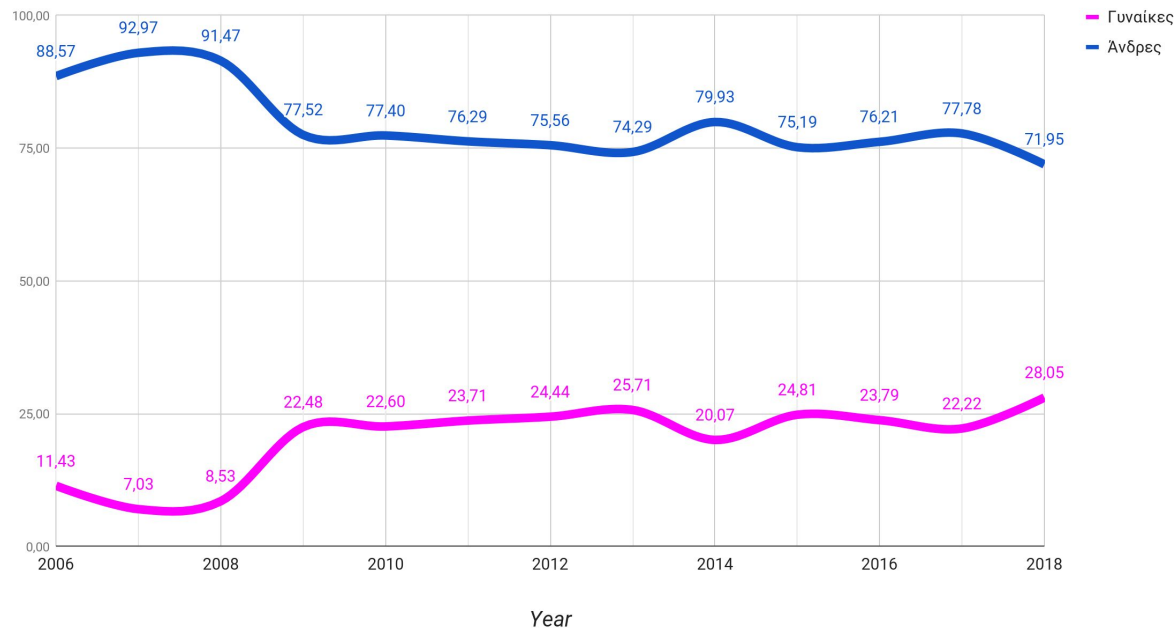
80% of the editors that defined their gender are male.

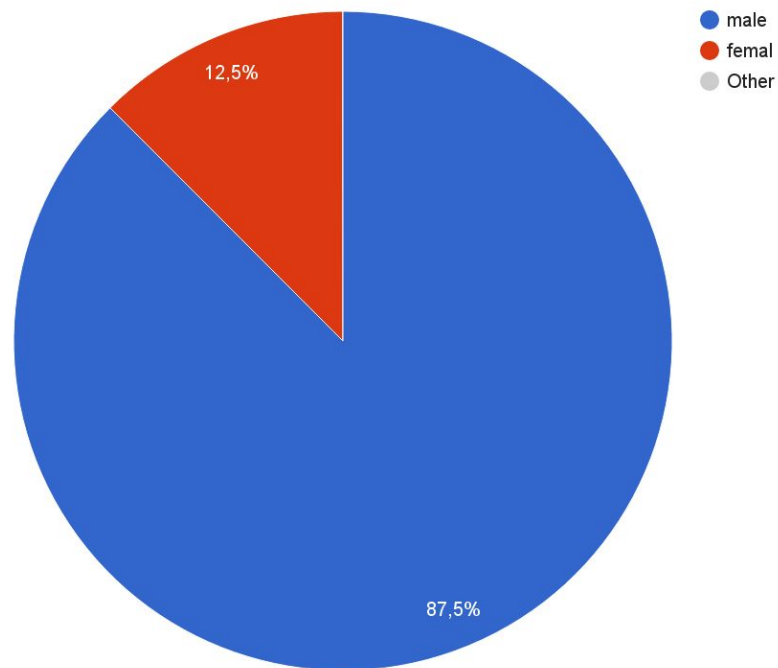

The content problem

Greek Wikipedia has few articles, especially articles concerning women's issues.

A strong feminist movement existed in the country during the late seventies and it raised many serious issues concerning women's **reproductive rights** (abortions, free contraception), **sexuality** and **prostitution**. Despite its struggles against the traditional roles of woman in the Greek family and its serious impact in Greek society, there is still not even one article written in Wikipedia about it.

The Question of Knowledge

- Access to information is power
- The control of information is of strategic importance
- The view of History is not subjective, not gender neutral
- The way articles are written leads to conclusions (even indirectly)
- Social power is reflected on the articles
- “Wikipedia is sexist. Women lack confidence. Women have less spare time. Women have problems with the editing interface. Editing is tedious. Women have fewer opportunities to develop social relationships than on other websites”. (New York Magazine)
- Wikipedia is a field of debate.

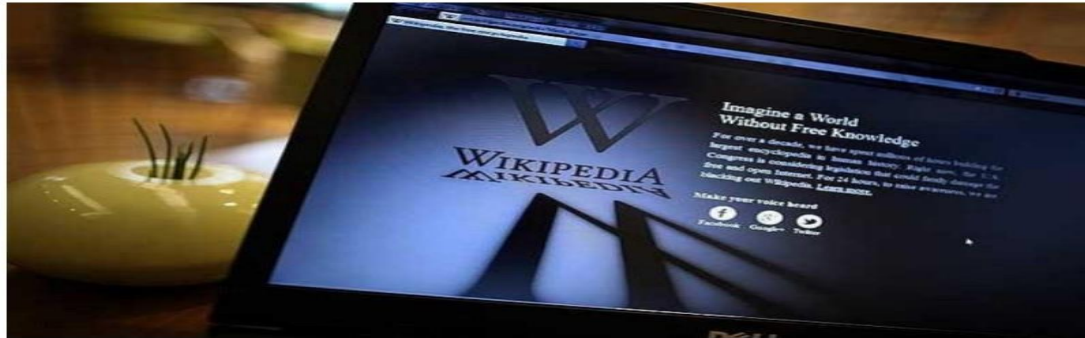
From gender gap to gender bias

Today marks a momentous anniversary for those of us who believe that the democratisation of knowledge is key to reaching a truly equal society: it's exactly 15 years since Jimmy Wales launched Wikipedia.

Wikipedia and sexism

...Even when the articles are there, they are often skewed to reflect gender imbalances. A study conducted by MIT last year showed that in pages about women, gender is overly-emphasised, using an unnecessarily high number of words such as 'female', 'woman' or 'lady'. What's more, there's often an obvious focus on their 'personal lives' and families – not always the case in articles about men.

[...] Student Emily Temple-Wood discovered one of the most well-known instances of sexism on Wikipedia, identifying more than 4,000 female scientists - including fellows of the Royal Society - who did not have a page on the site, while obscure male scientists had dozens of paragraphs written about them.

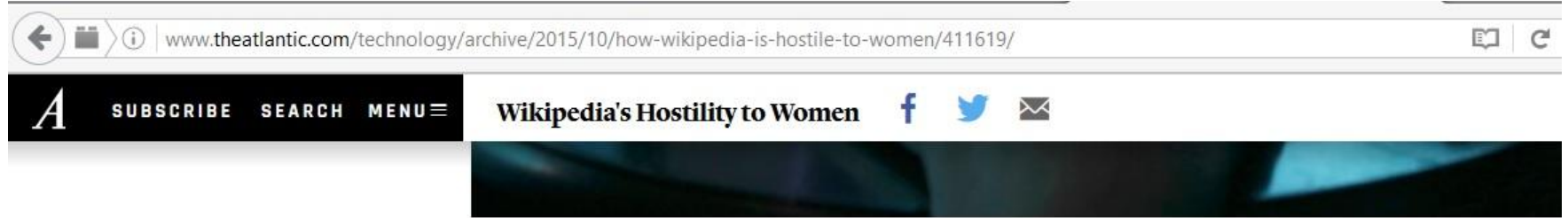

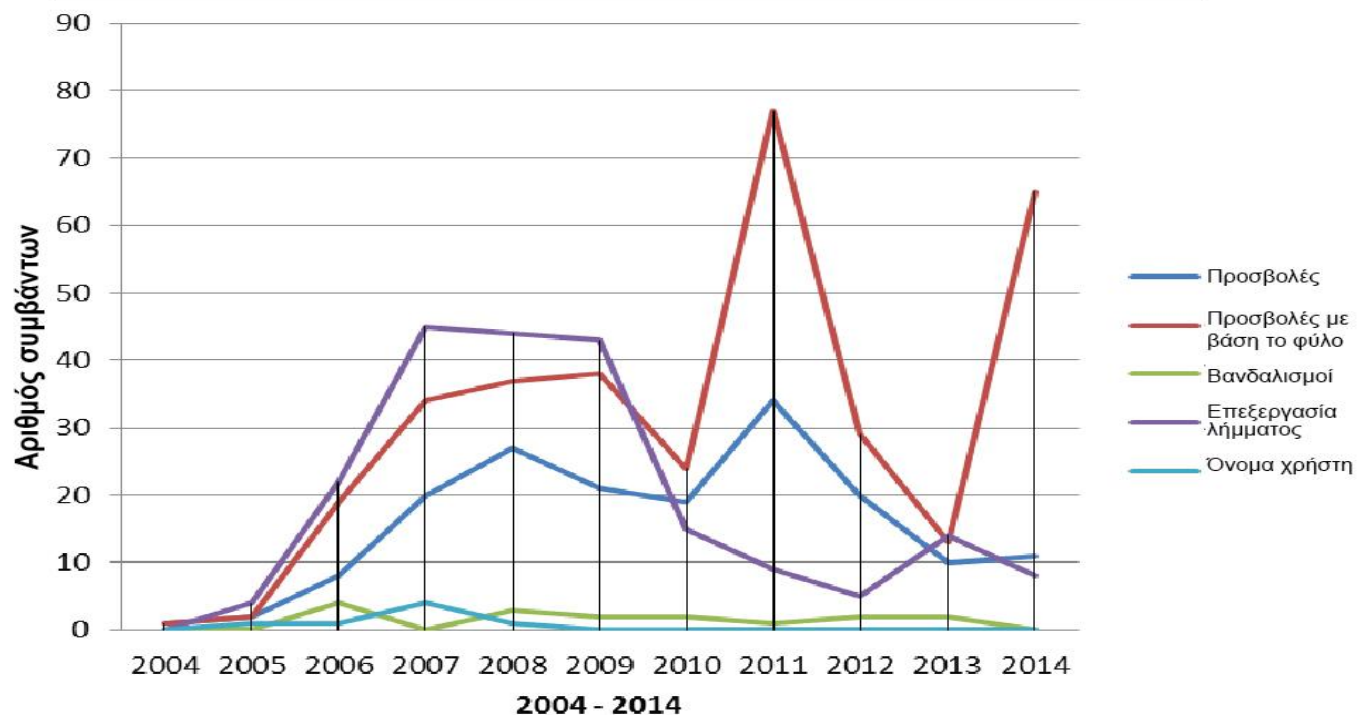

Am I Sexist?

In a *New York Times* op-ed, writer Amanda Filipacchi [shared her discovery](#) that sexism on Wikipedia is intrusively shaping how women are represented, and in this case, how women are sometimes categorized as a special subset within a broader occupation.

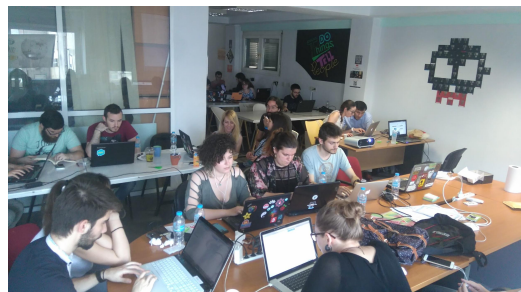
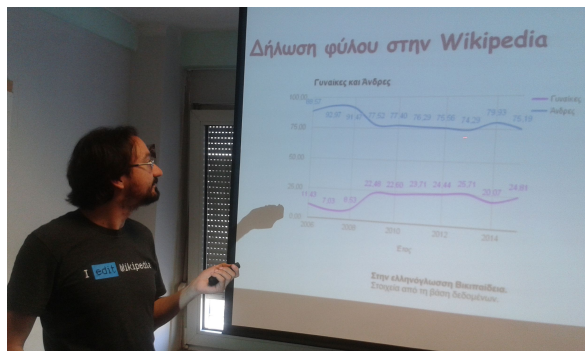

Ο σκοπός μας

Greek Wikipedia has few articles, especially articles concerning women's issues. For example: a strong feminist movement existed in the country during the late seventies and it raised many serious issues concerning women's reproductive rights (abortions, free contraception), sexuality and prostitution. Despite its struggles against the traditional roles of woman in the Greek family and its serious impact in Greek society, there is still not even one article written in Wikipedia about it.

Moreover, the synthesis of the Greek Wikipedia community is largely male oriented.

In the foreign literature, the limited participation of women in Wikipedia is often attributed to causes such as: "Wikipedia is sexist. Women lack confidence. Women have less spare time. Women have problems with the editing interface. Editing is tedious. Women have fewer opportunities to develop social relationships than on other websites". The same common beliefs also prevail in Greece.

Following the outreach method we used last year with success (talks, meetings with feminist groups and female targeted groups, edit-a-thons) in a larger scale we want to raise awareness of these problems and increase female participation in Wikipedia projects, Wikimedia community and at the same with creating more articles of female interest.
