

### Report of the Executive Committee

OF THE

### American Academy

OF

## Political and Social Science

For the Year 1893.

TO THE MEMBERS OF THE ACADEMY:

The work of the past twelve months has been successful in spite of the generally unfavorable conditions of the latter half of the year—conditions which have reacted strongly on all educational and scientific effort.

The usual scientific sessions were held. They were as follows:

The annual meeting of the Council was held in the Girard Building, Philadelphia, on February 4, 1893. The report of the Executive Committee was read and approved, as was also that of the treasurer having been duly audited; after which officers were elected for the ensuing year.

The Executive Committee has held six meetings during the year, at which the routine business of the Society has been regularly transacted, and the administration of its affairs examined and directed.

The six regular numbers of the Annals have been issued during the year, averaging 158 pages each, making a total of 952 pages. Three Supplements have been sent with the Annals during the year. They were:

Constitution of the Republic of Colombia. Translated by Bernard Moses, Ph. D. January, 1893. Pp. 70.

Constitutional and Organic Laws of France. Translated by C. F. A. Currier. March, 1893. Pp. 78.

Inland Waterways, Their Relation to Transportation. By Emory R. Johnson, Ph. D. September, 1893. Pp. 164.

Together, Annals and Supplements form a total of 1264 pages, which have been sent to each member of the Academy.

Sixty-nine papers have been submitted during the year; fifty-eight from the United States and eleven from foreign countries. Thirty-two papers have been reprinted in separate editions.

The number of papers printed in separate editions to the close of the year 1893 was one hundred and seven. These papers, taken together, constitute a noteworthy addition to the literature of the political and social sciences. Many of these papers have produced a marked effect in the direction of

arousing and educating public sentiment regarding important political and economic questions; while others have been of material aid to men engaged in the work of investigation and in teaching in our schools and colleges.

A special edition of five hundred copies of Meitzen's STATISTICS, bound in cloth, was issued, of which one hundred and ninety-two have been sold, leaving three hundred and eight still in stock. Also a special edition of the papers published in the Annals for March on the Banking Question was printed and widely distributed.

Members will have noticed during the last year that a very considerable extension has been made in the department of the Annals devoted to Book Reviews and Notes. This has been rendered possible by the willingness of many prominent scholars in the field of economics and politics to assist in this useful, though often onerous work.

The attention of our members is called to the fact that it is desirable to encourage research in economic and political questions by the offering of prizes for the investigation of specific questions and problems. The Academy will be glad to undertake the management of funds given it for this purpose.

Your committee begs to call special attention to the unusual opportunity which the members of the Academy now have to do a great service to the cause of economic and political progress. It is in times like these—times of great industrial depression, of social unrest, of political uncertainty—that public attention may be directed most easily to the serious consideration of our economic and social problems.

Whether our civilization is to move forward regularly and steadily with that uniform rate of progress which insures the preservation of all that is good in present conditions at the same time that it secures an uninterrupted acquisition of all that is possibly good in the future; or whether it is to advance by spasmodic efforts, inviting possibly such fundamental upheavals as those which characterized the French Revolution, with the widespread ruin and havoc which ever follow in the wake of such movements, will depend primarily upon the possibility of educating public opinion along economic and political lines.

Every citizen of the United States should feel that a special duty rests upon him to interest his friends and neighbors—men and women alike—in the serious and continuous study of our great public questions. The first step in this work is for the citizen himself to become interested and to ally himself with those who are of like mind as to the necessity of such education.

There has never been a time in the history of our country when larger results could be accomplished along these lines with a smaller effort than to-day. The problems of Municipal Government, of Representation, of Poverty and Crime, of Wages and Profits, of Transportation, of Laws, of Public Administration in every department, are all attracting attention in every part of the civilized world as never before. The steady and permanent progress of science in this field, as in every other department of modern life, is of fundamental necessity to the welfare of modern society; the diffusion of the results of science throughout the community, the causing of them to enter the very life currents of our body, social and politic, the making of them into a part of the unconscious life of society, are equally necessary to our welfare. In both tasks the Academy may become of the most powerful assistance if our members will unite in the effort to make it so.

TO THE POLICYHOLDERS OF THE SOCIETY:

The value of an absolutely safe investment has been strongly emphasized by the late issue of Government Bonds, and the policyholders of the Equitable Society may well find cause for congratulation in the fact. The large subscription for these bonds at the time of their issue may have been partly due to patriotism. Now that the war is over, however, these bonds still sell at a premium above par. Why? Because of their security. Because the investor knows that his investment is absolutely safe and sure. Because principal and interest will surely be paid, and paid promptly and in full.

The Equitable's policies are to the assured what Government Bonds are to the investor, and as the absolute security of Government Bonds causes them to sell above par, so the *unequaled* financial strength of the Equitable Society consequently makes its contracts worth more than those of any other company.

Another lesson from the Bond issue. How many persons who *might* have subscribed for Government Bonds, at par, are regretting—now that the Bonds are at a premium—that they did not.

How many persons there are who regret—now that it is too late—that they did not assure their lives—or that they did allow their policies to lapse—while they were still assurable.

You can sell a Government Bond, and you can always replace it by buying another. But if you give up your life assurance policy, you may never be able to secure another. You can always buy Government Bonds—at some price. A time comes in every man's life when he cannot buy life assurance—at any price.

At the commencement of the war, in spite of all temptation to secure temporary advantage through seeking to gain public applause by hastily adopting unscientific measures, the officers of the Society declined to accept hazardous risks without extra premium. In this connection it seems in place to give a few ex-

tracts from a letter written at that time to a general agent who strongly urged that the Society issue *free permits* to all who wished to enter the army.

"The regular premium rates charged in the life assurance business are based on scientific principles and the tabulated experience of many peoples during long periods of years, but they are founded on the average rate of mortality among those who are engaged in ordinary employments and not upou the exceptional exposure to death incurred by those

actually engaged in active service in war.

"In order to secure average results, we must not lose sight of these scientific methods and the teachings of practical experience. The assurance of lives is the most serious business which civilization has yet developed, and has therefore to be most carefully safeguarded. If scientific methods and practical experience are disregarded, every safeguard is immediately swept away, and the assurance is reduced to a condition of uncertainty, and possibly to worthlessness. The ordinary premium tables are based upon the risks of peace only, and any company, no matter how strong financially, which agrees to cover all the risks of universal war at ordinary rates is undertaking a dangerous experiment. The laws of average mortality are to all intents and purposes immutable, and to be absolutely within the safeguards of science and experience, a life company must not guarantee the same amount of assurance to hazardous lives at ordinary rates without regard to extra risk, but must charge an extra premium where the risk is appreciably greater than normal.

"It is our belief that we have taken the most liberal position consistent with the due protection of the whole body of our policyholders; and we are sure that they will recognize that such is our object, and that even under the pressure of a hasty and not well considered rivalry those in charge of their interests have the firmness and decision to refuse to give away

their money without their consent.

"The Equitable Society will ever lead in the upholding of the right, but will decline to follow others in questionable or improper steps, however alluring for the moment, and we are convinced that the assuring public will approve our course, and argue from it that the Equitable is the best company in whose keeping to confide sacred interests, which may need watching for many years to come."

The war is now over, and while the hostilities have been of short duration, and the actual casualties on the field have been few, yet the constantly occurring deaths from disease, among the members of the United States army, render superflous any words in justification of the Society's course at the commencement of the war, as outlined above.

While policyholders of the Society may congratulate themselves that their interests have been thus carefully guarded, they should also realize that while the Equitable Society has stood like a rock against all such measures as the above, which had for their object temporary popularity at the expense of future profit and security, yet all the really necessary and practical reforms in life assurance during the past quarter of a century have originated with the Society.

The Equitable was the first company to simplify and liberalize the policy contract.

It was the first company to introduce a policy giving the assured the choice of various methods of settlement after a stipulated term of years, thus adapting the contract to the changing circumstances of the holder.

It was the first company to introduce into its policies, old and new, a clause rendering the contract indisputable after three years.

It was the first company to reduce this term to a period of two years.

It was the first company to still further reduce this term to a period of one year.

It was the first company to pay its policies immediately upon the death of the assured, thus protecting widows and orphaus against the vexatious delays which had been universal under the previous method of conducting the business in this and in other countries.

statue, modelled by Augustus St. Gaudens, the young American sculp-tor who has recently so successfully executed a statue of Abraham Lincoln for the city of Chicago. It is the figure of a tall, stalwart man, past middle life, and clad in the Puritan garb of two hundred and fifty years ago-a broad-brimmed, steeple - crowned hat; a long, close-fit-ting doublet; bagged breeches, fastened at the knees; and over all, the enormous cloak of that period. The thrown-back folds of this cloak

reveals, in the statue's left hand, a large Bible with brass nails and iron clasps, and in its right hand a ponderous oak staff, planted firmly on the ground as the statue seems to be moving forward. This is the figure and costume of the man who is intended to be represented, according to the tradition now enrout, expendingly is descendants. rent among his descendants; but of his face and features there is neither portrait, nor oral or written record, in existence. In their absence the artist has formed a composite face, from the features of some of the old Puritan's living posterity. The result is a striking physiognomy—no doubt a true conception a striking physiognomy—no doubt a true conception of that grand race of men who "feared God, and kept their powder dry." The face is massive, the nose straight and prominent, the chin broad and determined, the mouth large and compressed, and so much as can be seen of the forehead is bold and for the control of the contr truding. 

Ezra Cornell, the late Hiram Sibley, of Rochester, and Jephtha H. Wade, of Cleveland, O., were the practical founders of the company.


### TRUE ARISTOCRACY.

In the meantime we shall probably be obliged to do business at about the same rate of profits as shown during the past year.

Our stretchers are the most complete and powerful of their kind, being capable of exerting a strain of FOUR TONS. A full roll of 40 rods, and often very much more is stretched at one pull. Then comes our greatest difficulty—to furnish an end post that will hold this immense strain. We furnish printed instructions for putting up, but will give here our method of securing ends.

Use a large post, with cross pieces not less than

method of sectring ends.

Use a large post with cross pieces not less than three feet long, spiked on, or better, framed in near the bottom and floored over. When planted deep this prevents its pulling up or turning around. A stiff brace is then run from three-fifths the height of this post to the ground line of the second post: a No. 9 wire is then drawn from same height of the second to the ground line of the end post, as shown below.

Better set these end posts RIGHT, than have the fence get slack and fail to give satisfaction for lack of proper setting.





SIR

It is with the greatest regret I have to confirm the sad news conveyed in my telegram No. 229 of the 15th instant regarding the death of Mr. Harrison, Senior Assistant Engineer, which occurred at Fort Smith on October 12th as the result of being mauled by a lioness.

It appears that Mr. Harrison was out shooting on October 8th in the Kedong Valley, and wounded a lioness, which sprang upon him and badly mauled both his arms.

He was conveyed to Fort Smith and attended by Dr. Waters, who on the 11th October, amputated his right arm: gangrene however set in and he died on the following day.

By the untimely death of Mr. Harrison, the Railway loses one of the best officers in the service and one who for upwards of a year had worked most zealously.

He had for some months been in charge of the second survey party, locating the permanent line down the Kedong Escarpment, a particularly arduous and difficult task; and one which he had carried out most successfully.

I trust that when conveying the sad news to his relations, you will express the great regret universally felt by all who knew Mr. Harrison in Africa, at his early death.
