nothing further of note this day.

Throughout the day light westerly  
wind heading off to S.W. employed  
stowing anchors and straightening  
things up generally, nothing further  
of note this day.

Thursday March 29<sup>th</sup>

Light southerly wind thick foggy  
and rainy. Steering S.W. by W and W.S.W.  
employed washing Boats and scraping  
Cass and Quarts. nothing further of note  
this day.

Friday March 30<sup>th</sup>

The wind shifted to W.W. and breezed  
up fresh, steering S.W. employed  
in general ship's duty.

Saturday March 31<sup>st</sup>

Throughout the day light variable winds and  
calms. employed dealing slops. also got out  
Broad and Flaw a steamer in sight  
going to the N.E. nothing further of  
note this day.

Strong breeze last part double reefed Fore Sail and bonnet out square sail came in rainy. this A.M. sent frame to Crows nest aloft. and put Craft in the Boats nothing further of note this day.

Rowing strong breeze from S.W. steering N.W. and N.W. by N. Short nasty sea runner. double reef main sail single reef Fore Sail and Jib out. nothing further of note this day.

Begins with fresh breezes from the Eastward Seven A.M. Came out of the Ice into clear water steered North ten A.M. saw Cape Neversen bearing N. N. E. This P.M. breezed on strong double reef fore sail and main sail. very little ice to be seen. stood in under the land to make good weather of it. nothing further of note this day. Frank Peck returned to duty.

Sunday May 13<sup>th</sup>

Throughout the day blowing a gale from N.E. layed close under the haul and made good weather of it. double reef fore sail and main sail. and stay sail out nothing further of note this day.

Monday May 14<sup>th</sup>

Throughout the day heavy weather laying under the lee of Cape Navarin. natives came off got a few skins. this P.M. stood out to sea finding bad weather run back under the Cape again. saw one Bark to the windward under short sail. day closes with N.E. wind

Tuesday May 15<sup>th</sup>

Throughout the day fresh gale from N.E. on: A.M. stood out to sea. wind breezed up and had it rugged. could make but little working to the windward so run in under Cape Navarin for a lead. saw one Bark working to windward under short sail nothing further of note this day.

Wednesday May 16<sup>th</sup>

Throughout the day blowing a heavy gale from N.E. to N. laying under short sail. under the lee of Cape Navarin James Beaumont returned to duty

the S.E. made the Ice could not see but  
short distance so stove in under the  
land again nothing further of note this day.

Saturday May 19<sup>th</sup>

Begins with thick snowey weather wind N.E.  
this A.M. Cleared up some. worked to the  
N.E. all day between strips of Ice. two P.M.  
shortened sail and layed too. thus ends the day.

Sunday May 20<sup>th</sup>

Throughout the day thick hazy weather wind N.E.  
working to the windward under easy sail. This  
A.M. saw a Whale lowered the Boats but to no  
purpose. did not see him after the Boats went  
down. This P.M. tried up to the Ice nothing further  
of note this day.

Begins with thick snowey weather wind N.E. This A.M.  
saw two Whales lowered one boat but did not see them  
again. This P.M. a little clearer let go from the Ice  
made sail and worked to the North and East  
as far as we could go and layed too under short sail  
nothing further of note this day.

Begins with thick snowy weather wind N.E. to N.W.E. Saw Steamer W. Bayles Captain went on board for a while also saw John & Knitrop & Triton and Andrew Hicks. This P.M. Cleared up and had fine weather working to the North and east as much as possible. Traveled some Ice nothing further of note this day.

Wednesday May 23<sup>rd</sup>

Throughout the day fine weather with fine breeze from N.E. to E.N.E. working to the windward three sails in sight employed breaking out and shifting water getting trade handy. nothing further of note this day.

Lat 63. 33 Long 148. 16 W.

Thursday May 24<sup>th</sup>

Begins with hazy weather and light rain squalls made the Ice and shortened sail four A.M. made Sule and worked to the Eastward. twelve M. started to the North through large strips of Ice. four P.M. saw the land bearing N.W.E. day close clear working in to the land one sail in sight this A.M. nothing further of note this day.

Friday May 25<sup>th</sup>

Throughout the day fine weather light variable winds lying under Cape Phering trading with the natives got a number of deer skins. Broke out forward of main hatch for trade Flour. sent the chanes and got the Anchors off the bow. nothing further of note this day.

Saturday May 27<sup>th</sup>

Throughout the day fine weather wind light from N.E. in the morning and fresh breeze this P.M. five thirty A.M. saw Whales lowered the Boats L.P. & D.P. both struck at the same time took the Whales along side. and anchored twenty seven fathoms of water. Cut them in Cleared away the heads and got under way. and set the watch nothing further of note this day. Thirty five miles West of Cape Dering.

Sunday May 28<sup>th</sup>

Blowing a gale from N.E. this A.M. Stove on to the Ice and tid up. Scraped outside of Bone and stove it away. and started the works to Hoiling. Haul Hauling Cabin Boy Dick and off duty. Ice broke off and got under way. nothing further of note this day.

Monday May 29<sup>th</sup>

Strong N.E. wind until one P.M. then moderate remainder of the day. finished Hoiling six thirty A.M. Cleared up and made sail and stove to the Eastward. off Cape Dering saw a Whale lowered the Boats but to no purpose. off Cape Aggen natives came off and done some trading for skins nothing further of note this day.

## 1894 Schooner Rosario on a Whaling Voyage in the Bering Sea

Tuesday May 29<sup>th</sup>

The wind hauled to S.E. first thick and snowey this A.M. Cleared up, worked up to Flower Bay some natives came off. Saw Steamer Alexander also one sealing Bark with Roats down. at ten P.M. saw a Whale lowered the Roats but to no purpose. nothing further of note this day.

Wednesday May 30<sup>th</sup>

Throughout the day fine weather with light breeze from N.E. Stood in to Indian Point and anchored broke out a lot of flour and stowed down what oil we had. a number of natives on board. Steamers Peluga and Alexander anchored here and went out this P.M. one Bark in sight off Chors. W. H. Manning returned to duty. nothing further of note this day.

Thursday 31<sup>st</sup>

Throughout the day fine weather. first part light air from north. set up head stays and bent head sails over. Eleven A.M. took the anchor and worked to the north. took starboard Roat in to repair nothing further of note this day.

Friday June 1<sup>st</sup>

Begins with fine weather and light S.W. and West wind turning to the North for St Lawrence Bay. Finished repairing Boat and put her out. Wind washed off ice and aft. Stood in to South head of St Lawrence Bay done a little trading with the natives then turned to the North.

Saturday June 2<sup>nd</sup>

Throughout the day fine weather with fresh breeze from N.W. Stood in to the Diomedes and anchored, saw seven Steamers and one Bark. Some ice on the shores and some passing to the North.

Sunday June 3<sup>rd</sup>

Throughout the day fine weather light S.S.W. wind and calm twelve in ice came in took the anchor and towed the Schooner out clear with the Boats light air sprung up made sail stood to the Eastward six P.M. anchored again as usual. Saw a number of Steamers and one Bark. This A.M. oiled the masts down. Nothing further of note this day.

Monday June 4<sup>th</sup>

The wind breezed up from N.W. Ice came down. took the anchor and stood across to East Cape and anchored under the lee of ground ice, thick and snowy most of the day. Six Steamers tied up to the ice here. Nothing further of note this day.

Thick fog. another by wind. stood in under the land at East Cape but could not anchor. Then stood to the Eastward for Diomedes. some scattering Ice. eight P.M. Calm and anchored nothing further of note this day.

Rains with thick fog and calm eight A.M. Light breeze from N.E. took the anchor and steered to the south for Diomedes. This P.M. done some trading for Beets. Also broke up main Hatch to find Cask of Tobacco twelve P.M. Anchored south of East Cape strong breeze.

Monday June 11<sup>th</sup>

Throughout the day blowing a gale from N.W. eleven A.M. Ice came down on us. took the anchor made sail and worked in shore of it and anchored again. W<sup>m</sup> Bayles and John & Winthrop went to the Southward nothing further of note this day.

Tuesday June 12<sup>th</sup>

The wind moderated nine A.M. took the anchor and ran to the Southward. Northwardly wind saw the Brig Hidalgo. Seven thirty P.M. anchored off South Head of St. Lawrence Bay plenty of Ice in the Bay, nothing further of note this day.

Wednesday June 13<sup>th</sup>

Thick and foggy wind N.E. two A.M. took the anchor eight A.M. steered off S. by W. and made sail seven P.M. came to Ice eleven fathoms of water had to work to the Eastward day close thick and foggy.

Begins with thick foggy weather fresh breeze from S.E. middle part cleared up Ice came in took the anchor and came down to Marcus Bay and anchored. John & Knitrope came in and anchored. got some on deck and put it to soak. seven P.M. foggy. not firing further of note this day.

Saturday June 16<sup>th</sup>

Throughout the day fine weather. light breeze from S.W. employed washing Bone. finished at two thirty P.M. got out Bread and Beef Mr Rogers Third Officer sick and off duty not firing further of note this day.

Sunday June 17<sup>th</sup>

Throughout the day fine weather. first part calm this P.M. light breeze from S.W. took the anchor and started for St Lawrence Island four ships in sight. dried our Bone and bundled it weight 8504 lbs. came to ice at eight P.M. did out calm and started off from ice

The wind hauled to S.W. started off from a head to N.E. at 7 o'clock Lawrence Bay. Some scattering ice employed scraping chains. at close of the day shorted sail and luffed to the wind.

Saturday June 24<sup>th</sup>

Came in thick and foggy at five thirty A.M. Wind from S to S.W. at nine A.M. hauled over the wind on the Eastern tack for Port Clarence. Saw two ships this P.M. Cleared up stood to S.E. remainder of the day.

Sunday June 25<sup>th</sup>

Southerly wind clearing to the S.E. six A.M. Came to ice and wind died out. dropped small anchor. Seven thirty light air took the anchor and worked out of the ice let up and saw four ships to an anchor. This P.M. Thick fog until four thirty then let up wind died out anchored again

Thick and foggy all the first part this P.M. let up saw three Quils took the anchor and moved twice through the day. wind southerly. Scraped down the top masts.
