Some useful methods exist to reduce bias models and model errors in climate models. While I believe Leith's method is good, it is often difficult to implement. Another approach is to use a "two-stage" model, where the first stage is a general circulation model (GCM) and the second stage is a regional model (RM). The GCM provides initial conditions for the RM, which then performs a detailed simulation of the regional climate. This approach can help to reduce bias by allowing the RM to capture local features of the climate that are not well represented by the GCM.
