PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE REGULATIONS

Timber Cut in Railway Belt in British Columbia Must Be Manufactured Within the Dominion.

Ottawa, Sept. 14.-By an order-in Sifton, dated January 19th, 1899, the reicenses and permits to cut timber in the railway belt in the province of British Columbia were amended so as to pe owners of timber berths in the viously provided that timber must b licensee to be operated in connection with ion in the regulations as they exist at present to prevent the exportation of logs cut on Dominion lands in the railway belt of the province of British Columbia. The minister therefore recommends that the regulations be again amended so as to provide that all timber cut on berths in the railway belt in British Columbia shall be manufactured within the limit of the Dominion.

Regarding Bicycles.

An order has been issued by the customs department providing that in future tourists bicycles hereafter brought into Canada by members of the League of American Wheelmen will be subject to customs. The privilege granted to members of the league of bringing in their bicycles without deposit has been withdrawn. They will have to deposit the amount of duty the same as other tourists, subject, however, to a refund within six months if the bicycles are exported. 



William McKinley was in the ranks, "I always look back with pleasure on those fourteen months I served in the ranks," said President McKinley recently. "They taught me a great deal. I was but a school boy when I went into the army, and that year was a formative period in my life, during which I learned much of men and affairs. I have always been glad that I entered the service as a private."

Mr. McKinley's address in defence of his clients was convicted, and he was pardoned by the governor—after hearing Mr. McKinley's appeal for him. But what endeared Mr. McKinley to the hearts of the Demonstration miners and made them his stalwart supporters was his subsequent generous action. When they called to pay him for his services he refused to accept the money, telling them their families need-

migrated from Pennsylvania to Ohio, and settled with other families in a district which has given many men of prominence to the public life of the state of Ohio and of the United States. Senator Allison of Iowa, Senator Manderson of Nebraska Thomas C. Platt, Senator Quay and the late President Garfield, all came from within a few miles of President McKinley's birthplace. His address to the jury in that case is still spoken of in Statk county as the most scathing denunciation of heartless corporations and greedy capitalists, and at the same time the most eloquent appeal for laboring men ever heard in the courts. This is the man who has been selected as the target for an assassin's bullet.


