When you buy Armstrong Bulbs you get only full size, carefully cured, quality bulbs which will produce superior blooms for you, satisfying in size and color. You will note that this year our prices have been kept down in spite of world conditions, and we assure you that our bulbs are of the same superior quality handled in past seasons.

About Varieties—Your garden and our catalog are both too small to hold the innumerable varieties of bulbs available. We offer you out of each main group the outstanding standard tested varieties that thrive best in California, and also a few of the outstanding new bulb introductions. We have listed those varieties we would plant in our own garden. Where there are several varieties which are almost identical except for certain minor differences, we list only that variety which has been tested the most thoroughly and is the best value.

How to Get More Bulbs for Your Money

Six bulbs of one variety are sold to you at the 12-rate; 50 bulbs at the 100-rate and 500 bulbs at the 1000-rate. For example: 6 King Alfred Daffodils would be priced at 80c or one-half of the price quoted for 12, but 3 King Alfred, 4 Golden Spur and 4 Spring Glory would be sold at the 3-rate as quoted for those kinds. No bulbs are sold in any quantity less than the smallest quantity quoted for each variety.

We pay transportation on all bulbs to points in California, Arizona and Nevada. Customers in other states should include 15% of the amount of their orders to cover shipping costs. Any excess will be refunded. No order for less than \$1.00 can be accepted for shipment.

Shipping Time. Most of the items listed in this catalog are ready for shipment in September or October, but a few are not ready until later. In each case we will forward each kind on your order at the proper time to plant.

Directions for Planting. Complete planting instructions will accompany each order.

Narcissi—Daffodils. The sunshiny-petaled fragrant Daffodils during February and March are the showiest flowers in the garden and the finest for cutting. You will have no trouble growing them in any sunny spot. Planted 6 inches apart, other later blooming plants may be grown in between without disturbing them, and even though they multiply it is always at least three years before they need to be dug up and replanted. We offer a variety of bloom shapes and colors in kinds which thrive here, all of them with blooms which last well either on the plant or cut. The bulbs we supply are large and firm and can be relied upon to produce two or more blooms per bulb. These are all Double-Nose No. 1, much superior to the Single-Nose bulbs.

Giant Trumpet Daffodils

Golden Spur. The very first large flowered Daffodil to bloom in the spring. A solid colored bright yellow bloom poised gracefully on long stems. 3 for 35c; 12 for \$1.25; 100 for \$8.90.

Aerolite. A newer giant golden Daffodil now becoming very popular. The giant flower is beautifully proportioned and graceful; has a deep yellow trumpet thrust out in bold relief against the broad pointed primrose yellow star formed by the enormous outer petals. Blooming early and remaining late, it is one of the longest lasting of all Daffodils either in the garden or as a cut flower. 3 for 60c; 12 for \$2.00; 100 for \$14.45.

Emperor. Immense long-stemmed flowers of golden yellow, the trumpet slightly deeper than the perianth (outer petals). It blooms late when most of the other varieties are gone and is very dependable. 3 for 35c; 12 for \$1.25; 100 for \$9.10.

King Alfred. The finest of all the large flowered giant trumpet Daffodils. Its great bold, beautifully frilled trumpets stand out crisply and luxuriantly on long stiff stems and its lovely uniformly rich golden yellow color is unsurpassingly brilliant. These daintily formed varieties have a flat cup in the center, which is often vividly tinted and frilled, instead of a trumpet. The varieties listed below all make exquisite cut flowers.

Bath's Flame. The deep yellow cup has a broad edge of orange-red, and the long petals spring from around it like six individual wavy golden flames. 3 for 45c; 12 for \$1.55; 100 for \$11.35.

Mrs. Barclay. The illustration on the front cover (about one-third natural size) gives you the colors found in the large flowers with their broad overlapping petals. A side view would better show the deeply frilled orange-scarlet rimmed cup. 3 for 60c; 12 for \$2.00.; 100 for \$14.45.

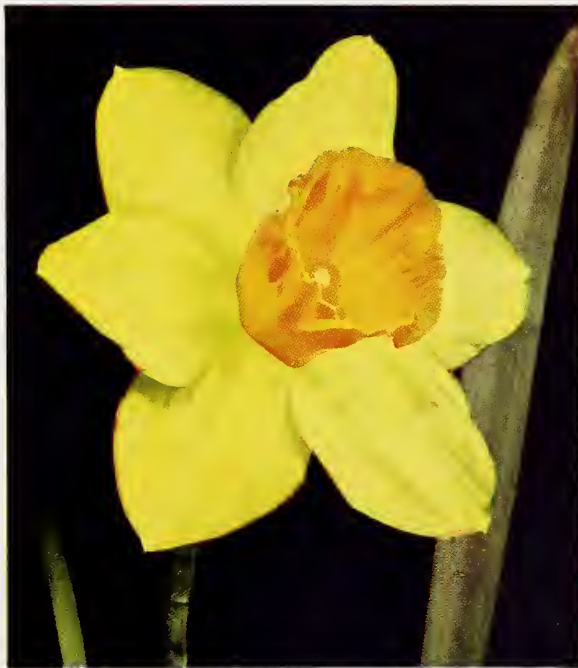

Tunis. The experts even agree that this giant flowered, tall, robust grower is tops. The large, wide flaring ivory trumpets have turned back, neatly cut borders of coppery gold. They look out at you against a beautifully contrasting background of pure white petals. 1 for 50c; 3 for \$1.30; 12 for \$4.45.

February Gold will surprise you. The blooms are golden all right, but the long trumpets are interestingly fringed with orange. Starts to bloom very early—but is still going strong in February, and you get, on each stem, two or three large blooms with gracefully curved-back petals. 3 for 75c; 12 for \$2.60.

Mrs. E. H. Krelage. 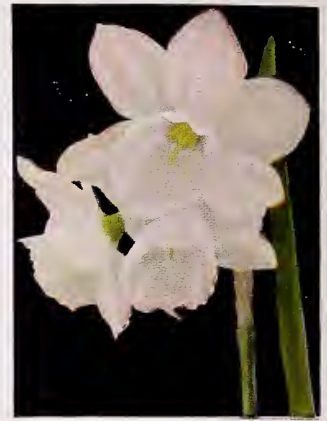
Best Bicolor

Bicolor Daffodils are distinctive in that the outside bloom petals are a solid light yellow color and the center cups are a solid darker yellow color.

Spring Glory. A very early, showy bicolor Daffodil with a large white perianth (a term designating the outer petals of a daffodil bloom) which is broad and spreading and a large handsome trumpet of chrome-yellow with beautifully frilled edges. For planting in the southwest this is the finest of the bicolors. A healthy grower, this is a good one to naturalize. 3 for 35c; 12 for \$1.25; 100 for \$9.10.

White Cyclamen Daffodil

Thalia is perhaps our most graceful Daffodil. The exquisitely formed, snow-white flowers have gracefully curved back petals. There are 2 or 3 blooms on each stem and each bloom is 2 inches across. Particularly fine for flower arrangements. 3 for 60c; 12 for \$2.00; 100 for \$14.45.

Yellow Poppy (Incomparabilis). Well formed flowers with overlapping primrose-yellow perianth and expanded bright yellow cup edged orange.

Seagull (Barrii). The large white petals curve back, making the light yellow cups with their red picotee edges look like they are floating in the air. A heavy yet late bloomer.

Hera (Leedsii). Delicately beautiful, star-shaped white perianth with deeply frilled cups of creamy white edged light primrose.

Mrs. Nette O'Melveny (Leedsii). A dancing Daffodil on a tall graceful stem. Pure white petals and a lemon-yellow cup edged with orange.

Ornatus (Poeticus). Broad showy petals with a typical small, brilliantly colored pheasant's-eye cup.

Elvira (Poetaz). Clusters of medium-sized flowers with creamy white perianths and yellow cups edged orange.

Poetaz Narcissi

These are hybrids between the Poet's Narcissus and the Bunch Flowered Narcissus. Not yet well known but those who have grown them prize them highly for their large clusters of deliciously fragrant well formed flowers and for their vigorous growing habit. Do not confuse this group with the more common Chinese Sacred Lily as the Poetaz have larger blooms.

Laurens Koster. These delightfully fragrant flowers top long, tall stems and are borne in clusters of five to seven blooms. Illustrated above. 3 for 35c; 12 for \$1.15; 100 for \$8.20.

Medusa. A conspicuous orange cup in the center of creamy-white flowers, borne six or eight to a stem. One of the finest of the cluster flowered hybrids. Illustrated above. 3 for 40c; 12 for \$1.40; 100 for \$10.00.

The Fragrant Jonquils

Below we list two dainty Jonquil Narcissi varieties with typical miniature Daffodil blooms, perfectly formed and extremely fragrant. Some confuse these varieties with the Poetaz Narcissi and the Bunch Flowered Narcissi. However, Jonquils are entirely different and distinctive, blooming much earlier than most Narcissi. Try several clumps around the base of a small deciduous tree, such as a birch. They'll bloom before the tree leaves out in the early spring, and you'll enjoy them immensely. 3 for 35c; 12 for \$1.20; 100 for \$8.65.

Campernelle. A single flowered golden Narcissus really entitled to the name Jonquil. Because of its extreme earliness, ability to grow anywhere, and exquisite scent, there should be a clump of them in every garden. The foliage is grass-like, and the dainty miniature blooms are usually borne three on a stalk.

Golden Sceptre. A new Hybrid Jonquil which is only half the size of the Giant Trumpets but much more gracefully proportioned. The fine substance flowers are deep golden yellow with lighter trumpets. They make long lasting garden and cut flowers.

Best Double Daffodil

Twink. This graceful new semi-full type Daffodil is much superior to the clumsy older doubles. The outer petals are a soft primrose-yellow while the inner petals are alternately primrose-yellow and clear rich orange. Early and free flowering. A "must have" kind, as there is no other variety that will take its place satisfactorily. (Picture at right.) 3 for 50c; 12 for \$1.75; 100 for \$12.55.

Bunch-Flowered Narcissi

No other Narcissi group blooms as freely and naturalizes as readily. The big clusters of blooms are sweetly fragrant.

Soleil d'Or. This is the newer golden kind. The gleaming yellow flowers with their deep brilliant orange cups are very showy and appear very early in the garden before the other Narcissi. The bulbs increase rapidly in the garden. Illustrated above. 3 for 30c; 12 for \$1.05; 100 for \$7.55.

Ornithogalum aureum. The white flowered forms of the South African *Ornithogalum* have long been admired, but one of the finest members of the tribe is this spectacular variety with apricot-orange flowers. The flower stems which appear in late spring are usually over a foot tall. As a cut flower it is an amazing success; the flowers keep for more than a month and each bulb produces several flower stalks. Star of Bethlehem

Ornithogalum arabicum. The old favorite "Star of Bethlehem" has been somewhat neglected in recent years but is now coming back because of the fact that so many planters have seen it at Easter time in older gardens where it was planted many years ago, still thriving vigorously and sending up its large umbels of pure white flowers with jet-black centers. Like all *Ornithogalums*, it is an exceptionally fine cut flower, keeping for weeks and even months after cutting. 3 for 20c; 12 for 60c; 100 for \$4.35.

Ornithogalum thyrsioides Double. The latest novelty in *Ornithogalums* is this double flowered form of the South African Chinchinchee. The strong bulbs send up 24 to 36 inch stems crowned with a pyramidal-shaped, tight flower spike, which opens up large individual pure white flowers. Bletilla hyacinthina. The interesting miniature orchid-like, amethyst colored flowers are borne freely above the large bright green plaited leaves. The bloom stems are 12 to 15 inches high and each stem holds aloft from 3 to 5 exquisite little blooms that when cut make fine small vase arrangements or ideal corsages. Unexact in its requirements it does not need especially prepared moss to grow in like its larger flowered relatives. *Bletillas* thrive in a semi-shady spot in average soil. Once established and given plenty of water the clumps spread quickly and cold weather bothers them not at all. 1 for 50c; 3 for \$1.55; 12 for \$6.10.

Calla Lilies

In cool, shady spots they quickly establish permanent clumps. Baby Callas are splendid foreground plants and the Yellow Calla brings sunshine into a shady spot. All make good cut flowers.

Large White Calla (*Calla aethiopica*). The popular large flowered, pure white variety. The blooms appear on long stems and are surrounded with big handsome, glossy foliage. 3 for 35c; 12 for \$1.25; 100 for \$9.10.

Brodiaea capitata. A favorite wildflower bulb of California. The dense heads of violet-blue top slender 18-inch leafless stems. Several blooms come from each mature bulb during the season. Planted in a sunny, well drained spot, this bulb will thrive in your garden for many years without requiring any attention. 12 for 75c; 25 for \$1.30; 100 for \$4.55.

Brodiaea ixioides splendens. Also a California native and just as hardy though very different from *B. capitata*. They look well planted in adjoining clumps. Day Lilies

In our climate the foliage of Day Lilies is almost evergreen. The clumps become large rapidly and produce hundreds of blooms each season. The stout 30-inch stems have many individual buds on them which open one at a time over a long summer season. The individual blooms are 4 inches across. Day Lilies require little attention year after year other than watering.

Hemerocallis flava. A lemon-yellow, very fragrant single sort.

Hemerocallis aurantiaca. Brilliant single orange-yellow.

Hemerocallis Kwanso. The gigantic tawny orange, very double blooms have maroon markings.

Guernsey Lily

Nerine sarniensis. Our scarlet strain of the famous Guernsey Lily produces in late summer, big heads of bloom on strong 18-inch stems. In each head there are from 10 to 20 bright crimson flowers, measuring 1½ inches across. Fine for outdoor growing in Southern California. Red-Hot Poker

Tritomas. "Red-Hot Pokers" are spectacular either in the garden or in distinctive flower arrangements. The brilliantly colored bloom spikes, often 9 inches long, are borne on 3 to 4-foot stems which rise from grass-like foliage. They last weeks in the garden and very well as cut flowers. Strong divisions: 45c each; 3 for \$1.20.

Royal Standard (to the left in the above illustration) is an unusual combination of scarlet and gold. A free blooming, hard-to-get new kind.

Mt. Etna (to the right in the above illustration) produces blooms which are a solid glowing orange.

Glory of the Sun

Glory of the Sun

Leucocoryne ixioides odorata. This new bulbous flowering plant called "Glory of the Sun" was introduced but recently from the wilds of Chile and the bulbs are still scarce. The blooms are borne in clusters in the spring on a 15-inch stem, and the color is a delightful heavenly blue, with a white throat and striking golden stamens. The flowers are delicately sweet-scented, and have the ability to keep in water as a cut flower for ten days.

The bulbs should be planted in full sun or slight shade, preferably in early fall, and should then be kept moist throughout the fall and winter. During the summer the bulbs should be thoroughly dried out. The jumbo size bulbs offered below should produce at least three spikes to the bulb, while the two-year should produce two spikes to the bulb the first season. See illustration at right.

The charming little flower spikes of the Grape Hyacinth burst into bloom early in the spring, and if planted in the foreground of a Narcissus bed or among them, offer a delightful contrast to the yellow and white of the Daffodil blooms. Planted in small clumps under the edges of shrubs or trees or scattered here and there irregularly among other bulbs or perennials, they will remain for many years, the colonies growing larger all the time. The beautiful blue flowers are saturated with a persistent exquisite fragrance universally appealing. Plant 3 to 4 inches apart in part shade. 12 for 60c; 25 for \$1.05; 100 for \$3.55.

We are always anxious to recommend bulbs which over a period of years are able to demonstrate how well they like our climate. The petite winter-flowering Ixia is certainly in this classification. Each winter we enjoy the brilliantly colorful beds in our neighborhood which are permanently planted to Ixias. Some unchanged for 10 years. It is one of the few flowers in which the metallic shades of green and bronze appear. They are low growing and ideal for mass planting or borders. Plant them in your sunniest place.

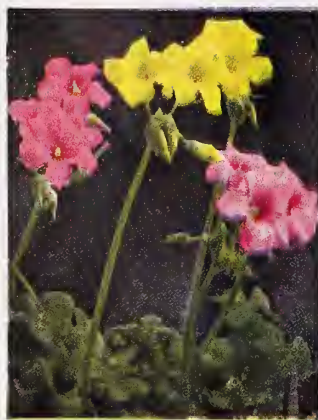

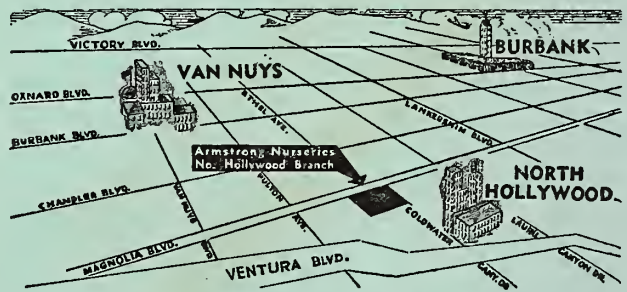
