This number receiving relief is the number to which relief money ¥10,511.48 was given only once on 17th of January 1947, since last October when the Daily Life Security Law was enforced. Its excuse is the welfare clerk's illness and death on 6th of May 1947, although he attended the village office till the beginning of April. Minsei-iiin urged the newly elected village chief for the delivery of relief money, but its arrangements have not been made. He says the relief money has not been lost.

There are 12 tanks constructed during the war, and several kinds of oil and alcohol stored in them were carried away at random by the people engaged in the work at the termination of the war. In particular, the former village chief, Yoshimitsu Fujii and a clerk named Shoichi Shibazaki filled their own pockets; the latter had his own house built with materials carried away from the naval office, and has become enormously rich by selling the oil and alcohol at black-market prices. All the villagers know it, but the police overlooks it.

10. Impotency of Police: The policemen are thought by the villagers to overlook big blackmarketeers' cases and big scandals, and arrest poor people whose trifling black-marketing is indispensable for their everyday living. The spiritual bad influence over the public is very great.

11. Peculiar Bad Custom of the Buddhist Temple:

At the summer and New Year Festivals for the dead, called "Bon" and "Mi-Shogatsu" of the Buddhist Temple, the priest makes the families whose member has lately died, compete with one another for making better offerings, and even poor people have to offer black-market commodities at the sacrifice of their necessities, only to please the priest in the result.

12. Recommendations:

- a. Urgent delivery of relief money.
- b. Enforcement of medical relief by a free medical card.
- c. Punishment of evil-doers by the police.
- d. Abolition of the bad custom of the temple under the care of the officials and the police.
