1. SUMMARY OF THE SITUATION:

a. See current Intelligence Summaries.

2. ESSENTIAL ELEMENTS OF INFORMATION:

a. Activities on the part of foreign powers endangering the security of United States Forces or tending to create conditions requiring the declaration of an emergency by the Commander-in-Chief, Far East. Indications:

(1) Hostile propaganda, sabotage, fifth-column operations and subversive acts by agents or adherents of a foreign power or potential enemy combinations so as to endanger the safety of United States Forces in KOREA, CHINA, JAPAN, and in the PHILIPPINE, RYUKYU, BONIN, MARIANAS and VOLCANO ISLANDS and adversely affect the interests and prestige of the United States in the Far East.

(2) Hostile actions, movements of troops, shifting of land, sea or air forces by a foreign power or potential enemy combinations so as to endanger the security of United States Forces in KOREA, CHINA, JAPAN and in the RYUKYU, BONIN, MARIANAS and VOLCANO ISLANDS; or to prevent the discharge of United States responsibilities in the PHILIPPINE ISLANDS.

b. Military developments in SOVIET held areas affecting the general strategic situation in the Far East. Indications:

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- (1) Development, completion or improvement of the carrying capacity of the TRANS-SIBERIAN RAILROAD, the line from KOMSOMOLSK to SOVETSKAYA and the construction of new railroads.
- (2) Construction of new airfields, improvement of existing ones, changes in disposition and order of battle of air units, in SIBERIA, NORTH KOREA, KURILES and KAMCHATKA with particular emphasis upon those in the CHITA, BLAGOVESHCHENSK, KHABAROVSK, KOMSOMOLSK areas and the KURILES and KAMCHATKA.
- (3) Construction, improvement or enlargement of harbors and harbor facilities of SOVIET ports in the Far East with particular emphasis upon SOVETSKAYA, VLADIVOSTOK, DEKASTRI, OTOMARI and ESUTORU (KARAFUTO) and similar construction in the KURILES and KAMCHATKA.
- (4) Fortifications in depth along the MANCHURIAN-SIBERIAN BORDER and in NORTHERN KOREA with particular emphasis upon the sector between VLADIVOSTOK and KHABAROVSK.
- (5) Significant increase of shipping, merchant and naval, in Eastern waters.
- (6) New concentrations, changes in order of battle, movements of bodies of troops, supply installations and new construction of housing, roads or other facilities therefor.

c. Obstructions to operations, passive or active resistance to troops within the Far East Command, or failure to comply with directives of the Commander-in-Chief, Far East or Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers by authorities, groups or individuals in occupied areas. Indications:

- (1) Possession, concealment or manufacture of, or failure to report arms, ammunition and other war materials.
- (2) Acts of sabotage and lawlessness committed against the occupation forces in occupied areas.
- (3) Obstructions to, or failure to apprehend or arrest war criminals as directed.
- (4) Retention, destruction or concealment of military, technical, or scientific information, official records, and/or documents desired by, or of value to, all United States Government agencies.

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- (5) Efforts to secretly continue scientific research on electronic weapons, atomic weapons, biological warfare, or any other similar activity, the purpose of which is to develop potential force for waging war.

d. Attempts by Japanese authorities, groups or individuals to resist the authority and intent of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers. Indications:

- (1) Formation of secret or non-secret societies or groups for activities in resistance or opposition to directives and/or orders to the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, or subversive to his authority.
- (2) Failure of Japanese authorities to enforce adequately Japanese laws, ordinances and regulations which are promulgated to implement the directives of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.
- (3) The use of pronouncements or publications, either public or private, tending to incite resistance, opposition, or non-compliance with directives and/or orders of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.
- (4) Improper use of distribution of military stores, installations or lands released by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers for the benefit of the Japanese civilian population.
- (5) Improper distribution and consumption of commodities.
- (6) Demolition and/or destruction of public or private property. Acts of sabotage and lawlessness against the Occupation.
- (7) The making of plans or attempts to commit violence on the personnel of the Occupation forces, or on Japanese Government officials when such Japanese officials are discharging duties in accordance with orders of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.
- (8) Intimidation of liberal, modern party leaders by threats or other measures designed to vitiate democratic leadership.
- (9) Formation, membership, and activities of social, cultural, secret or non-secret societies, groups

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or political parties whose basic principles are not democratic.

- (10) Introduction or attempts at introduction into Japan of leaders, organizers, foreign or national, agents or means of non-democratic political elements.
- (11) Failure to purge political leaders whose past record is incompatible with a democratic form of government.

e. Development of political, economic and social forces capable of subverting the democratization of Japan. Effect of foreign ideologies tending to create social unrest and ultimate chaos. Indications:

- (1) Operations of foreign agents in fomenting social unrest and political sabotage.
- (2) Subversion of the national press toward anti-American and anti-Occupation publications.
- (3) Introduction into Japan of organizers and agents, foreign and national with a view toward agitating the populace and discrediting the United States.

3. MISSIONS:

a. General Headquarters, Far East Command, will:

- (1) Execute various theater intelligence, interrogation, and surveillance missions through specialist intelligence agencies under direct, or operational control and/or liaison, as required by the "War Department Intelligence Plan," 18 Feb 1946 and the "Far Eastern Intelligence Requirements," General Headquarters, United States Army Forces Pacific, AG 350.09 (4 June 46)GB, dated 4 June 1946.
- (2) Coordinate the exploitation of intelligence targets of interdepartmental and international concern.
- (3) Coordinate, supervise, and/or initiate measures for the suppression of subversive acts, with particular regard to disruptive communistic and lawless movements, activities, and the operation of foreign nationals or agents under this heading.
- (4) Take counter-intelligence measures for the internal security of appropriate Headquarters

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against espionage and subversive personnel, foreign or national.

- (5) Supervise the assignment and employment of linguist personnel on a theater basis.
- (6) In conjunction with Eighth Army develop general policies and report on Progress of Demobilization and Disarmament of Japanese Armed Forces, surveillance of Demobilization Bureaus in plans and policy on the basis of field reports by major commands engaged in the supervision of the demobilization machinery.
- (7) Develop general policy and maintain standards regarding intelligence and counter-intelligence training, procedures, publications, inspections, etc., for all intelligence establishments in the theater, in conjunction with major commands and to carry out War Department instructions.
- (8) Coordinate special intelligence operations in critical areas (SIBERIA-MANCHURIA, NORTH KOREA and NORTH CENTRAL CHINA) in conjunction with Central Intelligence Group field agencies and major commands with a view toward developing early intelligence for the situations contemplated under paragraphs 2a and 2b above.
- (9) Coordinate and supervise screening and interrogation of Japanese and foreign repatriates from critical areas in conjunction with major command intelligence agencies, in the demobilization process.
- (10) Coordinate special operations with information developed by the Army Security Agency (ASA) for the joint exploitation of its product.
- (11) Develop terrain studies covering critical areas under paragraph 2a above, in conjunction with the Office of the Engineer, Far East Command.

b. The Theater Commander through Civil Intelligence Agencies will accomplish theater missions to exercise law enforcement, police surveillance, counter-intelligence and counter-espionage missions in conjunction with other law enforcement and police agencies.

c. War Department Intelligence Agencies under direct or operational control of General Headquarters, Far East Command, attachment and/or liaison will accomplish assigned theater and War Department intelligence missions as directed.

d. All Major Commands will:

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- (1) Investigate and report upon such specific intelligence targets as have, or may subsequently be referred to them for investigation or exploitation.
- (2) Render periodic and special intelligence reports to the Commander-in-Chief Far East as directed and submit other reports as required by List of External Recurring Reports, General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers and Far East Command, dated 15 January 1947.

e. The Commanding General, Eighth Army will:

- (1) Establish, operate and maintain such interrogation centers, language detachments and linguist teams as are necessary to develop information required by General Headquarters, Far East Command with particular regard to SOVIET-held territories under paragraphs 2a and 2b above and special directives.
- (2) Support special intelligence operations to anticipate conditions contemplated in paragraphs 2a and 2b above.
- (3) Support Intelligence Detachments, of theater agencies, in the field operating within Army, Corps or Division Areas.
- (4) Coordinate his activities in collection of foreign documents with the Translator and Interpreter Service, General Headquarters, Far East Command.
- (5) Assist Commanding General Far East Air Forces, United States Army in the coordination of air surveillance with ground surveillance of shipping in the TSUSHIMA and KOREA STRAITS area and require ship sighting information obtained in that area by elements under his control to be reported directly to such agency as designated by Commanding General Far East Air Forces, United States Army. Direct communication between elements of air, ground and naval forces operating in the straits area is authorized for the coordination of this surveillance.

f. Commanding General, United States Army Forces in Korea will:

- (1) Report all violations of/or failure to comply with directives of the Commander-in-Chief, Far East by KOREAN authorities or groups in KOREA.

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- (2) Investigate and report on all acts of sabotage, riots, social unrest or other disturbances within his area of responsibility; report all political, economic or social matters which are prejudicial to the Occupation Forces in SOUTH KOREA.
- (3) Report on all indications of/or actual formation of armed or semi-armed groups which are or may be engaged against Occupation Forces.
- (4) Report all counter-intelligence matters which affect investigation in areas beyond his control for exploitation by theater Counter-Intelligence Agencies.
- (5) Take positive intelligence measures to secure information and report on all activities related to SOVIET Forces in NORTH KOREA.
- (6) Take positive intelligence measures to secure information and report on potential enemy order of battle, dispositions, strength and movement in critical areas under paragraphs 2a and 2b above.
- (7) Develop, report on and intensify interrogation of Japanese Nationals and Koreans coming from north of the 38th parallel of latitude.
- (8) Establish, operate and maintain such interrogation centers, language detachments and linguist teams as are necessary to develop information required by General Headquarters, Far East Command.
- (9) Report all subversive activities and espionage of foreign agencies in attempting to discredit U. S. policies, spread propaganda, and increase their own influence for coordination of action by the Theater Counter-Intelligence Officer.
- (10) Support special intelligence operations to anticipate conditions contemplated in paragraphs 2a and 2b above.
- (11) Support Intelligence Detachments of theater agencies, in the field operating within Corps or Division Areas.
- (12) Coordinate his activities in collection of documents with the Translator and Interpreter Service, General Headquarters, Far East Command.
- (13) Assist Commanding General, Far East Air Forces, United States Army in the coordination of air

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surveillance with sea and ground surveillance of shipping in the KOREA STRAITS area and require ship sighting information obtained in that area by elements under his control to be reported directly to such agency as designated by Commanding General, Far East Air Forces, United States Army. Direct communication between elements of air, ground and naval forces operating in the STRAITS area is authorized for the coordination of this surveillance.

- g. The Commanding General Philippines-Ryukyus Command will:
- (1) Report on all information gained through liaison with the PHILIPPINE REPUBLIC.
 - (2) Report on all subversive activities in the PHILIPPINES-RYUKYUS Command that may be aimed at United States Forces.
 - (3) Report all subversive activities and espionage of foreign agencies in attempting to discredit United States policies, spread propaganda and increase their own influence for coordination of action by the Theater Counter-Intelligence Officer.
 - (4) Investigate and report on all acts of sabotage, riots, social unrest or other disturbances within his area of responsibility and which affect United States interests.
 - (5) Report on all "Guerilla" activities in the PHILIPPINE REPUBLIC, directed against United States authorities or the PHILIPPINE REPUBLIC.
 - (6) Report on all information of interest to the United States gained from the interrogation of foreign nationals being repatriated under United States control.
 - (7) Report all counter-intelligence matters which affect investigation in areas beyond his control for exploitation by Theater Counter-Intelligence Agencies.
 - (8) Support special intelligence operations to anticipate conditions contemplated in paragraphs 2a and 2b above.
 - (9) Coordinate his activities in collection of documents with the Translator and Interpreter Service, General Headquarters, Far East Command.
- h. The Commanding General Marianas-Bonins Command will:
- (1) Report on all subversive activities that may be

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aimed at the United States Forces or Military Government in the MARIANAS, BONIN, and VOLCANO ISLANDS.

- (2) Report all subversive activities and espionage of foreign agencies in attempting to discredit U.S. policies, spread propaganda and increase their own influence for coordination of action by the Theater Counter-Intelligence Officer.
- (3) Investigate and report on all acts of sabotage, riots, social unrest or other disturbances which affect his command.
- (4) Report all counter-intelligence matters which affect investigation in areas beyond his control for exploitation by Theater Counter-Intelligence Agencies.
- (5) Support special intelligence operations to anticipate conditions contemplated in paragraphs 2a and 2b above.
- (6) Coordinate his activities in collection of documents with the Translator and Interpreter Service, General Headquarters, Far East Command.

1. Commander, United States Naval Forces, Far East will:

- (1) Report to the Commander-in-Chief, Far East and the Commanding General Eighth Army all violations of, or failure to comply with directives or orders of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers by Japanese Nationals, which come to his attention.
- (2) Report to the Commander-in-Chief, Far East and the Commanding General Eighth Army all instances or indications of actual or potential resistance in Japan to the authority of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.
- (3) Report all subversive activities and espionage of all foreign agencies in attempting to discredit United States policies, spread propaganda and increase their own influence for coordination of action by the Theater Counter-Intelligence Officer.
- (4) Investigate and report all acts of sabotage, riots, social unrest or other disturbances which affect his command.
- (5) In conjunction with the Theater G-2, develop and report on all activities relative to potential

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enemy naval forces, naval order of battle, strength, dispositions and movements.

- (6) Support special intelligence operations to anticipate conditions in paragraphs 2a and 2b above.
- (7) Coordinate his activities in the collection of foreign documents with the Translator and Interpreter Service, General Headquarters, Far East Command.
- (8) Assist Commanding General Far East Air Forces, United States Army in the coordination of air surveillance with sea surveillance of shipping in the TSUSHIMA and KOREA STRAITS area and require ship sighting information obtained in that area by elements under his control to be reported directly to such agency as designated by Commanding General Far East Air Forces, United States Army. Direct communication between elements of air, ground and naval forces operating in the straits area is authorized for the coordination of this surveillance.

j. Commanding General, Far East Air Forces, United States Army will:

- (1) Report to the Commander-in-Chief, Far East and the Commanding General, Eighth Army all violations of, or failure to comply with directives or orders of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, by Japanese nationals in Japan, which come to his attention.
- (2) Report to the Commander-in-Chief, Far East and the Commanding General, Eighth Army all instances or indications of actual or potential resistance in Japan to the authority of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.
- (3) Report all subversive activities within Air Commands. Take suitable counter-intelligence measures in the surveillance of international air travel and coordinate these activities with theater counter-intelligence measures.
- (4) Investigate and report upon counter-intelligence missions which are specifically referred to his command for investigation; promptly report all other matters developed in conjunction with such specifically assigned investigations for exploitation by Theater Counter-Intelligence Agencies.

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- (5) Report on all international air traffic entering or departing from Japan, as directed by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.
- (6) Report on all international air traffic entering or departing from KOREA south of 38 north latitude and the RYUKYUS ISLANDS south of the 30 north latitude, as directed.
- (7) In conjunction with the Theater G-2, develop and report on all information relative to potential enemy air forces, order of battle, dispositions, strength and movement; potential enemy development of atomic energy, biological warfare, civil air routes, radio communications, radio navigation aids, electronics, guided missiles and climate and weather conditions within areas of interest to the Commander-in-Chief, Far East.
- (8) Support special intelligence operations to anticipate conditions contemplated in paragraphs 2a and 2b above.
- (9) Support Intelligence Detachments, of theater agencies operating in the field within Far East Command areas.
- (10) Report all activities connected with the Post-Hostilities Mapping Program.
- (11) Coordinate his activities in collection of documents with the Translator and Interpreter Service, General Headquarters, Far East Command.
- (12) Coordinate air surveillance with sea and ground surveillance of shipping in the TSUSHIMA and KOREA STRAITS, utilizing existing facilities and personnel, and assisted by the Commanding General, Eighth Army, Commanding General, XXIV Corps and Commander United States Naval Forces Far East. Direct communication between elements of air, ground and naval forces operating in the STRAITS area is authorized for this purpose.
- (13) Consolidate TSUSHIMA and KOREA STRAITS ship sighting information from all sources and submit daily report of these sightings to General Headquarters, Far East Command, and major commands in JAPAN and KOREA.

k. The Army Security Agency (ASA), operating under the War Department will exploit certain intelligence elements in conjunction with General Headquarters, Far East Command.

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1. The Central Intelligence Group (CIG), operating under the War Department will exploit certain intelligence elements in conjunction with General Headquarters, Far East Command.

m. The Special Security Office (SSO), operating under the War Department will carry out special instructions under the supervision of General Headquarters, Far East Command.

n. The MID Map and Photo Section, a War Department Unit under the supervision of General Headquarters, Far East Command, will render such technical assistance as required.

4. MAPS AND PHOTOGRAPHS:

a. Commanding Generals, Eighth Army, United States Army Forces Korea, Philippine-Ryukyus Command and Marianas Bonins Command, will:

- (1) Procure, store and distribute maps and hydrographic charts required for the performance of occupational functions.
- (2) Maintain such reserve map stocks as may be required for emergency issues.
- (3) Prepare and distribute such special maps pertaining to areas within their command as may be required in the performance of occupational functions.
- (4) Maintain reserve stocks for critical areas under the conditions contemplated in paragraphs 2a and 2b above.

b. Commanding General, Far East Air Forces, will:

- (1) Procure, store and distribute to his subordinate commands maps, aeronautical charts and allied publications pertinent to the areas under their command, to JAPAN and areas adjacent thereto and for critical areas contemplated in paragraphs 2a and 2b above.
- (2) Execute all aerial photographic missions and procure and distribute all aerial photographs, required for the performance of operational functions.
- (3) Maintain a negative and print library.

c. Commander, United States Naval Forces, Far East, will:

- (1) Procure and distribute to subordinate commands maps, aeronautical charts and hydrographic charts as may be required.

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- (2) Exercise supervision over the operation of the Japanese Hydrographic Office, to insure that action is taken to install and maintain proper aids to navigation; that information relative thereto is appropriately distributed and that its activities are not directed to the accumulation of data or preparation of charts of military significance pertaining to areas outside of Japan.



Operations Instructions No. 4

SECTION I - JAPAN

1. Establishment of Military Control.

a. Military control of Japan has been established by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers to carry into effect the surrender terms and further the achievement of the ultimate objectives stated below. Japan as used in this annex is defined to include the four main islands of Japan (Hokkaido, Honshu, Kyushu, Shikoku) and about one thousand smaller adjacent islands, including the Tsushima Islands.

b. Basic documents relating to the military occupation of Japan are included as appendices to this Annex 8. They include the Instrument of Surrender (Appendix A), the Proclamation by the Emperor of Japan (Appendix B), the Cairo Declaration (Appendix C), the Potsdam Declaration (Appendix D), the Japanese qualified acceptance of the Potsdam Declaration (Appendix E), the reply by the Secretary of State to the Japanese qualified acceptance (Appendix F), and the final Japanese acceptance (Appendix G).

2. Powers.

a. The authority of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers over Japan is complete for the purpose of carrying out the terms of the surrender. In addition to the powers of a military occupant of enemy territory, the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers has the power to take any steps deemed advisable and proper by him to effectuate the surrender and to carry out the provisions of the Potsdam Declaration and the directives of the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

b. The Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers will exercise control over Japan and the Japanese, to the greatest practicable extent, through the Emperor and various instrumentalities of the Imperial Japanese Government which prove suitable for this purpose. The Japanese Government will generally be permitted to exercise the normal powers of government in

matters of domestic administration, subject to the right of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers to require changes in the governmental machinery and personnel. The Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers will have authority to take direct action in the event of the unwillingness or failure of the Japanese authorities to act effectively.

3. Responsibilities.

The Commanding Generals, Sixth and Eighth Armies, and the Commander, Fifth Fleet are responsible for insuring compliance by the Japanese with orders and instructions of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers and for supervising the functioning of agencies of the Japanese Government within the spheres of their respective responsibilities, in accordance with this and other directives issued by this headquarters.

4. Ultimate Objectives of the Occupation.

a. The ultimate objectives of the United States in regard to Japan, to which the policies in the initial period will conform, are:

- (1) To insure that Japan will not again become a menace to the United States or to the peace and security of the world.
- (2) To bring about the eventual establishment of a peaceful and responsible government which will respect the right of other states and will support the objectives of the United States as reflected in the ideals and principles of the Charter of the United Nations. The United States desires that this Government should conform as closely as may be to principles of democratic self-government but it is not the responsibility of the Allied Powers to impose upon Japan any form of government not supported by the freely expressed will of the people.

b. These objectives will be achieved by the following principal means:

- (1) Japan's sovereignty will be limited to the islands of Honshu, Hokkaido, Kyushu, Shikoku, and about one thousand smaller adjacent islands, including the Tsushima Islands.
- (2) Japan will be completely disarmed and demilitarized. The authority of the militarists and influence of militarism will be totally eliminated from her political, economic and social life. Institutions expres-

sive of the spirit of militarism and aggression will be vigorously suppressed.

- (3) The Japanese people shall be encouraged to develop a desire for individual liberties and respect for fundamental human rights, particularly the freedoms of religion, assembly, speech and the press. They shall also be encouraged to form democratic and representative organizations.
- (4) The Japanese people shall be afforded opportunity to develop for themselves an economy which will permit the peacetime requirements of the population to be met.

5. Relations with the Japanese Government.

a. The Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers will issue all necessary instructions to the Japanese Emperor or to the Imperial Japanese Government and every opportunity will be given the government and the Japanese people to carry out such instructions without compulsion. If necessary, however, the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers will issue appropriate orders to the Commanding Generals, Sixth and Eighth Armies, and Commander, Fifth Fleet indicating the action to be taken by them to secure obedience by the agencies of the Imperial Government or the Japanese people, within areas of their responsibilities. The occupation forces will act principally as an agency for observing compliance with the instructions of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers to the Imperial Japanese Government and as an agency upon which the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers may call, if necessary, to secure compliance with such instructions. Direct military government will under no circumstances be inaugurated except on directions from this headquarters.

b. The Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers will normally issue orders and instructions to the Japanese through the Imperial Japanese Government at Tokyo (via the Central Liaison Office, Tokyo). Orders to subordinate governmental agencies necessary to carry out the orders and instructions of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers will be issued by the Imperial Japanese Government through its own administrative channels. The issuance of orders to, or the direct operation or supervision of, any Japanese governmental agencies by subordinate commanders will not be undertaken except as specifically authorized by this headquarters, except in the event of emergencies. Removal and appointment of officials will likewise be done by the responsible Japanese agency.

c. Copies of orders and instructions issued to the Imperial Japanese Government by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers will be furnished to Commanders of occupation forces concerned. If special action is to be taken by commanders with respect to any order or instructions to the Imperial Japanese Government, they will be so notified by this headquarters.

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5 Cont'd.

d. In order to discharge their responsibility for checking compliance with orders or instructions issued to the Imperial Japanese Government, commanders are authorized to:

- (1) Establish contact with local government officials (through local Japanese Liaison Offices, where designated) for the purpose of obtaining information and reports and making inspections.
- (2) Utilize such Military Government or other personnel as may be necessary to observe activities in question.

e. Where failure by the Japanese authorities to carry out orders and instructions effectively is observed, commanders will submit immediately a comprehensive report to this headquarters in order that corrective action may be taken, together with any recommendations deemed appropriate. In the absence of authorization by this headquarters, direct action will only be taken in emergency situations.

f. The Civil Intelligence Section, this Headquarters, will conduct such special investigations relating to compliance with orders by the Japanese authorities as may be directed by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers from time to time.

6. Action To Be Taken by the Occupation Forces.

a. The civilian population will be treated by the occupying forces in such a way as to develop respect for and confidence in the United States and other members of the United Nations and their representatives and to encourage cooperation in the accomplishment of the desired objectives. The civilian population will be completely free from all unwarranted interference with their individual liberty and property rights. Historical, cultural, and religious objects and installations (including the several Imperial Palaces) will be carefully protected and preserved.

b. The occupation forces will observe the obligations imposed upon them by international law and the rules of land warfare.

c. Subject to the requirements of military security, the occupation forces will permit freedom of speech, press, religion and assembly.

7. Reports.

The Commanding Generals, Sixth and Eighth Armies, will make weekly Military Occupation Activities Reports to this Headquarters. Such reports will cover the status of civilian administration, political parties, and political activities, degree of compliance by Japanese authorities and people with instructions of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers and the Imperial Government, location and extent of serious communicable diseases,

relations between the occupation forces and the Japanese population, and any other significant matters. Matters of an urgent character concerning civilians will be made the subject of immediate special reports. Additional general or special reports may be required by this headquarters from time to time.

8. Personnel

Military Government personnel and units as available will be assigned by this headquarters to Commanding Generals, Sixth and Eighth Armies, for employment as such Commanding Generals may direct. For occupational employment, Military Government personnel may be divided into five categories:

- a. Military Government Staff Officers.
- b. Personnel assigned to Hq and Hq detachments.
- c. Personnel assigned to Hq and Hq companies.
- d. Military Government operating specialists in various technical fields.
- e. Civilian advisors.

SECTION II -- KOREA

1. Establishment of Military Government in Korea.

a. The Commander-in-Chief, United States Army Forces, Pacific has established military control over the United States-occupied portion of Korea (South of 38° North Latitude) and has assumed all powers of government over such territory. The establishment of this control and the assumption of this authority were announced in Proclamation No. 1, General Headquarters, United States Army Forces, Pacific, dated 7 September 1945.

b. The Cairo Declaration and the Potsdam Declaration, which state the policy of the Allies relating to the limitation of Japan's sovereignty, are included as appendices C and D to this Annex B.

2. Responsibilities.

The Commanding General, XXIV Corps, is responsible for the execution in Korea of the policies laid down by the Commander-in-Chief, United States Army Forces, Pacific, for military government in Korea.

3. Delegation of Authority.

The military government power and authority of the Commander-in-Chief, United States Army Forces, Pacific, is delegated to the Commanding General, XXIV Corps, who may redelegate such power and authority as he deems necessary. The Commanding General, XXIV Corps, is authorized to issue such proclamations, laws, orders and regulations as may be necessary in implementing the policies set forth in the orders and instructions issued by this headquarters.

4. Objectives of Military Government.

Military government will be conducted by the United States occupation forces in that portion of Korea occupied by them. Korea will, however, be treated as a liberated country. The ultimate objective of the United States with respect to Korea is to foster conditions which will bring about the establishment of a free and independent nation capable of taking her place as a responsible and peaceful member of the family of nations. The achievement of this objective will require the progressive elimination of all vestiges of Japanese control over Korean economy and political life and eventual substitution of independent Korean governmental, economic and social institutions. It will be made clear to the Korean population that the military administration in Korea is intended principally:

a. To insure compliance with the terms of surrender of the Japanese armed forces in Korea;

b. To effect complete political and administrative separation of Korea from Japan and to free Korea from Japanese social, economic and financial control;

KOREA 4 Cont'd.

c. To facilitate the development of a sound Korean economy devoted to peaceful pursuits; and

d. To foster establishment of local self-government and the restoration of a free and independent nation which will conform to the principles expressed in the Charter of the United Nations.

5. Policies.

Except as otherwise directed by this headquarters, the Commanding General, XXIV Corps, will utilize the directive of the United States Joint Chiefs of Staff (SWNCC 176/8, 13 Oct 45), which has been furnished separately, for guidance in conducting military government operations in Korea. Further directives and guidance on military government in Korea will be issued by this headquarters as required.

6. Utilization of Korean Administration.

Direct administration by the use of military personnel will be undertaken to maintain law and order in the absence of suitable native administration. Direct administration will, however, be limited to the minimum necessary to carry out the objectives of the occupation. Every effort will be made to use Korean authorities for the execution of military government policies and for the conduct of government administration. Local, regional and national agencies of government will be fully utilized after the elimination of undesirable personnel. The Commanding General, XXIV Corps, will recommend to this headquarters when local, regional, or national elections may be held in Korea on a democratic basis.

7. Elimination of Japanese and Pro-Japanese Koreans.

Only in exceptional circumstances, as determined by the Commanding General, XXIV Corps, will any Japanese be allowed to hold any position of responsibility or influence in public or important private enterprises in Korea. Similar restrictions on the holding of positions will apply to any Korean who has been an exponent of militant Japanese nationalism and aggression, who has been a member of any Japanese ultra-nationalistic, terroristic or secret patriotic societies, their branches, agencies or affiliates, who has been influential in the activities of the Political Association of Great Japan, the Imperial Rule Assistance Association, the Imperial Rule Assistance Political Society, their branches, and affiliates, or who manifests hostility to the objectives of the military occupation. These personnel will be eliminated from such positions as rapidly as feasible. Where no qualified Korean or other suitable personnel are available, such Japanese or pro-Japanese Koreans as are deemed essential by reason of their technical qualifications may be temporarily continued in positions of responsibility, security factors permitting. Every effort, however, will be made to recruit and train Korean replacements for them at the earliest possible moment. Should use

be made of Japanese or undesirable Koreans the Korean population will be informed that such use is temporary.

8. Reports.

The Commanding General, XXIV Corps, will make weekly Military Occupation Activities Reports to this headquarters. Such reports will cover the status of civilian administration, political parties and political activities, progress in elimination of Japanese and pro-Japanese Koreans, civilian supply situation, issuance of new proclamations and laws by the military government, and other significant matters. Additional reports may be required by this headquarters from time to time.

9. Personnel

Military Government personnel and units as available will be assigned by this headquarters to XXIV Corps for employment as the Commanding General, XXIV Corps, may direct. For occupational employment, Military Government personnel may be divided into five categories:

- a. Military Government Staff Officers.
- b. Personnel assigned to Hq and Hq Detachments.
- c. Personnel assigned to Hq and Hq Companies.
- d. Military Government operating specialists in various technical fields.
- e. Civilian advisors.

10. Supplies.

The Commanding General, United States Army Forces, Western Pacific, will be responsible for the procurement, loading and movement to Korea of supplies, transportation and equipment, including medical and sanitary supplies, and other items required for military occupation and emergency relief of the civilian population. The Commanding General, XXIV Corps, will be responsible for the distribution of such supplies within Korea, utilizing Korean agencies and facilities to the greatest extent possible.

11. Liaison.

The Commanding General, XXIV Corps, is authorized to maintain liaison with the Russian Commander in Northern Korea on a military level to reestablish and maintain normal economic and political relationships throughout the whole of Korea.

TERMS OF SURRENDER

1. General.

a. This Annex contains information as to the terms of surrender relating to military matters which require immediate post-surrender action by Occupation Forces.

b. The terms included in this Annex will not be considered the final form of the formal surrender documents, but it may be anticipated that the formal surrender terms will be substantially as set forth herein.

c. Detailed orders and instructions to the Japanese authorities, regarding matters upon which the Japanese authorities will be required to take action immediately after they have signed the Instrument of Surrender, will be issued by or in behalf of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers in supplement to the general terms of the initial surrender.

2. The Terms of Surrender will provide:

a. For the unconditional surrender of the Japanese Imperial General Headquarters and of all Japanese and Japanese-Controlled Armed Forces wherever situated.

b. That all Japanese Armed Forces wherever situated and the Japanese people will cease hostilities, preserve and save from damage all ships, aircraft, military and civil property and comply with all requirements which may be imposed by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers or by agencies of the Japanese Government at his direction.

c. That all civil, military and naval officials will obey and

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enforce all proclamations, orders and directives deemed by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers to be proper to effectuate the surrender and issued by him or under his authority and that all such officials will remain at their posts and continue to perform their non-combatant duties unless specifically relieved by him or under his authority.

d. That the Japanese Imperial Government and the Japanese Imperial General Headquarters will at once liberate all Allied Prisoners of War and Civilian Internees now under Japanese control and provide for their protection, care, maintenance and immediate transportation to places as directed.

e. That the authority of the Emperor and the Japanese Government to rule the State is subject to the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers who will take such steps as he deems proper to effectuate the terms of Surrender.

f. That the Japanese Imperial Headquarters will issue a General Order to all Japanese Armed Forces and Japanese-Controlled Forces directing their unconditional surrender and providing substantially as follows:

- (1) That pursuant to the surrender to the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers all Japanese Armed Forces and Japanese-Controlled Forces will cease hostilities at once, lay down their arms, remain in their present locations and surrender unconditionally.
- (2) That the Imperial General Headquarters, its Senior Commanders, and all ground, sea, air and auxiliary forces in the main Islands of Japan, minor Islands adjacent thereto, Korea South of 38 degrees North Latitude, and the Philippines will surrender to the Commander-in-Chief, United States Army Forces Pacific.
- (3) That Japanese Commanders will disarm completely all Japanese and Japanese-Controlled Forces and deliver intact and in safe and good condition all weapons and equipment at such time and at such places as may be prescribed by the Occupation Forces Commanders.
- (4) That pending further instructions, the Japanese Police Force in the main Islands of Japan will be exempt from this disarmament provision. The Police Force will remain at its posts and will be held responsible for the

preservation of Law and Order. The strength and arms of such a Police Force will be prescribed.

- (5) That the Japanese Imperial General Headquarters will furnish to the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, within a specified time after receipt of this order, complete information with respect to Japan and all areas under Japanese control, as follows:
- (a) List of all land, air and anti-aircraft units showing locations and strengths in Officers and Men.
 - (b) List of all aircraft, Military, Naval and Civil, giving complete information as to the number, type, location and condition of such aircraft.
 - (c) List of all Japanese and Japanese-Controlled Naval Vessels, surface and submarine and Auxiliary Naval Craft in or out of commission and under construction giving their position, condition and movement.
 - (d) List of all Japanese and Japanese-Controlled Merchant Ships of over 100 gross tons, in or out of commission and under construction, including Merchant Ships formerly belonging to any of the United Nations which are now in Japanese hands, giving their position, condition and movement.
 - (e) Complete and detailed information, accompanied by maps, showing locations and layouts of all mines, mine fields, and other obstacles to movement by land, sea or air, and safety lanes in connection therewith.
 - (f) Location and description of all military installations and establishments, including airfields, seaplane bases, anti-aircraft defenses, ports and naval bases, storage depots, permanent and temporary land and coast fortifications, fortresses and other fortified areas.
 - (g) Location of all camps and other places of detention of United Nations Prisoners of War and Civilian Internees.

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- (6) That Japanese Armed Forces and Civil Aviation Authorities will insure that all Japanese Military, Naval and Civil Aircraft remain on the ground, on the water, or aboard ship, until further notification of the disposition to be made of them.
- (7) That Japanese or Japanese-Controlled Naval or Merchant Vessels of all types will be maintained without damage and will undertake no movement pending instructions from the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers. Vessels at sea will immediately render harmless and throw overboard explosives of all types. Vessels not at sea will immediately remove explosives of all types to safe storage ashore.
- (8) That responsible Japanese or Japanese-Controlled Military and Civil Authorities will insure that:
- (a) All Japanese mines, mine fields and other obstacles to movement by land, sea and air, wherever located, are removed according to instructions of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.
 - (b) All aids to navigation are reestablished at once.
 - (c) All safety lanes are kept open and clearly marked pending accomplishment of paragraph (a) above.
- (9) That responsible Japanese and Japanese-Controlled Military and Civil Authorities will hold intact and in good condition pending further instructions from the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers the following:
- (a) All arms, ammunition, explosives, military equipment, stores and supplies, and other implements of war of all kinds and all other war material, except as specifically prescribed in paragraph 2f(7) above.
 - (b) All land, water and air transportation and communication facilities and equipment.
 - (c) All military installations and establishments, including airfields, seaplane bases, anti-aircraft defenses, ports and naval bases, storage depots,

permanent and temporary land and coast fortifications, fortresses and other fortified areas, together with plans and drawings of all such fortifications, installations and establishments.

- (d) All factories, plants, shops, research institutions, laboratories, testing stations, technical data, patents, plans drawings and inventions designed or intended to produce or to facilitate the production or use of all implements of war and other material and property used by or intended for use by any military or quasi-military organization in connection with its operations.
- (10) That the Japanese Imperial General Headquarters will furnish to the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, within a specified time after receipt of this order, complete lists of all the items specified in paragraphs (a), (b), and (d) of paragraph 2f(9) above, indicating the numbers, types and locations of each.
- (11) That the manufacture and distribution of all arms, ammunition and implements of war will cease forthwith.
- (12) With respect to United Nations Prisoners of War and Civilian Internees in the hands of Japanese or Japanese-Controlled Authorities:
- (a) That the safety and well-being of all United Nations Prisoners of War and Civilian Internees will be scrupulously preserved, to include the administrative supply service essential to provide adequate food, shelter, clothing, and medical care until such responsibility is undertaken by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.
- (b) That each camp or other place of detention of United Nations Prisoners of War and Civilian Internees together with its equipment, stores, records, arms, and ammunition will be delivered immediately to the command of the senior officer or designated representative of the Prisoners of War and Civilian Internees.

- (d) That the Japanese Imperial General Headquarters will furnish to the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, within a specified time after receipt of this order, complete lists of all United Nations Prisoners of War and Civilian Internees, indicating their location.
- (13) That all Japanese and Japanese-Controlled Military and Civil Authorities will aid and assist the occupation of Japan and Japanese-Controlled areas by the Occupation Forces.
- (14) That the Japanese Imperial General Headquarters and appropriate Japanese officials will be prepared, on instructions from Occupation Forces Commanders, to collect and deliver all arms in the possession of the Japanese Civilian population.
- (15) That this General Order and all subsequent instructions issued by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers or other Allied Military authorities will be scrupulously and promptly obeyed by Japanese and Japanese-Controlled Military and Civil Officials and private persons. Any delay or failure to comply with the provisions of this or subsequent orders, and any action which the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers determines to be detrimental to the Allied Powers, will incur drastic and summary punishment at the hands of Allied Military Authorities and Japanese Government.

Occupation Instructions Number 3, General Headquarters Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, dated 12 February 1946 is amended as follows:

1. Add paragraph 3a (5) as follows:

(5) Subsequent to the establishment of the British Commonwealth Occupation Force in HIROSHIMA Prefecture, progressively establish ground and air forces in the areas of SHIKOKU Island and OKAYAMA, TOTTORI, SHIMANE (to include the OKI-RETTO) and YAMAGUCHI Prefectures, as directed by the Commanding Generals EIGHTH United States Army and Pacific Air Command United States Army.

2. Paragraph 3b (1) is revoked and the following substituted therefor:

(1) Arrange with the General Officer Commanding British Commonwealth Occupation Force for the progressive movement of the British Commonwealth Occupation Force, less air force units and the Royal Naval Port Party, to assigned areas in JAPAN. Dates of arrival of forces will be as approved by this headquarters.

3. Add paragraph 3b (5) as follows:

(5) Subsequent to the establishment of the British Commonwealth Occupation Force in HIROSHIMA Prefecture, progressively extend the zone of occupation of the ground forces of the British Commonwealth Occupation Force to include the areas of SHIKOKU Island and OKAYAMA, TOTTORI, SHIMANE (to include the OKI-RETTO) and YAMAGUCHI Prefectures. See paragraph 3b (3).

4. Paragraph 3d (4) is revoked and the following substituted therefor:

(4) Assign to the air forces of the British Commonwealth Occupation Force the primary mission of security

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and surveillance in the area occupied by the ground forces of the British Commonwealth Occupation Force. Assign other missions as required in support of Occupation Forces in JAPAN.

5. Paragraphs 4b (3) and 4b (4) are revoked the following substituted therefor:

- (3) Resupply of the British Commonwealth Occupation Force, except for bulk petroleum products for ground and air forces, will be from British Commonwealth sources.
- (4) Bulk petroleum products for ground and air forces of the British Commonwealth Occupation Force will be supplied by the United States on a dollar reimbursement basis. The Commanding General EIGHTH United States Army will arrange for delivery of authorized bulk petroleum products to the water line at which point(s) the General Officer Commanding British Commonwealth Occupation Force will receive and distribute them.

6. Change that part of paragraph 2b that reads:

Operations Instructions No. 7, this headquarters, dated 28 November 1945 is amended as follows:

1. The first sentence of paragraph 4b is deleted and the following substituted therefor:

"Responsibilities of commanders for logistic support (less the supply of petroleum products) are as follows:"

2. The following is added to Paragraph 4:

"g. Petroleum Products.

Responsibilities of commanders for petroleum supply in the occupied areas of Japan and Korea are as follows:

(1) The Commander-in-Chief, United States Army Forces, Pacific, will:

(a) Place all requisitions on the Zone of the Interior and other sources for Class III and IIIA supplies (except bulk fuel oil, bulk diesel, and marine lubricants) for all forces including Naval Forces under the control of Commander-in-Chief, United States Pacific Fleet.

(b) Be responsible for movement to port of all bulk supplies (except fuel oil and diesel)

(2) The Commander-in-Chief, United States Pacific Fleet, will, by agreement:

(a) Place all requisitions on the Zone of the Interior and other sources for bulk fuel oil, bulk diesel, and marine lubricants for all forces including those under the control of Commander-in-Chief, United States Army Forces, Pacific.

(b) Be responsible for movement to port and further water movement of bulk fuel oil and bulk diesel.

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- (3) The Commanding General, Eighth Army, will:
- (a) Place requisitions on Commander-in-Chief, United States Army Forces, Pacific, for all Class III and IIIA supplies except bulk fuel oil, bulk diesel, and marine lubricants.
 - (b) Place requisitions on Commander-in-Chief, United States Pacific Fleet for bulk fuel oil, bulk diesel, and marine lubricants for all forces except Naval Forces normally supplied by service squadrons or divisions.
 - (c) Be responsible for the reception and distribution in Japan of those supplies in (3) (a) and (b) above.
 - (d) Be responsible for movement to ports in Korea of those supplies in (3) (a) above.
- (4) The Commanding General, XXIV Corps, will:
- (a) Place requisitions on Commanding General, Eighth Army, for all class III and IIIA supplies (including bulk fuel oil, bulk diesel, and marine lubricants) for all forces (including civilians) in Korea except bulk fuel oil, bulk diesel, and marine lubricants for Naval Forces normally supplied by service squadrons or divisions.
 - (b) Be responsible for the reception and distribution of those supplies in (4) (a) above.
- (5) The Commanding General, Pacific Air Command, United States Army, will place requisitions on the Commanding General, Eighth Army, and the Commanding General, XXIV Corps for Class IIIA supplies for air forces under his control in Japan and Korea respectively."
