SIR,—I have the honour to report regarding W. T. Stewart & Co.'s accounts herewith attached, for the sums of \$1,337.92 and \$900.60, making a total of \$2,238.52, for work done by them on the roofs of the Main Building and Medical Superintendent's residence, Asylum for Insane, Toronto. The total amount, with

the exception of \$81.70, is for the Main Building. In my report to you of June 3rd, I explained the condition the roofs were in, referring to the Main or Centre Building; later on I made a further examination of the Wings and found that, in some places, these portions of the roof were even worse, if possible, than the Central Building; in places large patches of slate were entirely perished and falling to pieces and quite beyond repair, which made stripping and reslating of same absolutely necessary. The galvanized iron, flashings, hips and lining of the gutters at eaves were badly corroded and leaking. They have all been repaired or renewed.

Considering the vast extent of the roofs, the length from end to end being 1,162 ft., the amount of expenditure is not large in proportion to the amount of work done, and nothing has been done that was not absolutely necessary; as I mentioned in my report to you of June 3rd, the least possible amount has been expended on these roofs from year to year, such slight repairs were made from time to time as were necessary and which could only be considered as temporary as we were given to understand that it would only be a short time before the building would be sold and the Institution removed to another location.

The work was carried on under the supervision of Mr. B. O'Byrne, General Clerk of Works, who has checked the measurements and vouched for their correctness. The time of the men employed was kept by the Engineer of the Institution, Mr. Noble. The prices are fair and reasonable, being the usual prices charged for this class of work. I have therefore certified to the accounts and recommend payment of the same.

DEAR SIR,—Various appropriations in connection with the Agricultural College and Experimental Farm have been exhausted and are inadequate to meet the requirements of the year.

Two additional teachers have been added to the Macdonald Institute and, therefore, we require \$1,200 more for salaries and wages.

For maintenance of the laboratories in connection with the Institute, we require \$1,000 additional,—it was impossible at the beginning of the year to determine exactly how much these new laboratories would cost.

In the College, through re-arrangement of the work, a new department has been added and an additional laboratory equipped, so that we require \$500 additional for College laboratory maintenance.

In the maintenance of the College Dining Room it has been found necessary to increase certain supplies, and, therefore, we require \$75 for bread and biscuits and \$600 more for groceries, butter and fruit.

The advertising has exceeded our estimate and we require \$500 for advertising, printing and postage.

Because of the amount of work and the increase in wages of domestic servants, we require \$170 additional for women servants at the College.

The votes for the telephone service and sewage disposal are inadequate and we request \$127.50 for the former and \$5.00 for the latter.

To meet overdrafts in the Farm Department, we require the following: farm seed, \$29.14; tools and implements, 202.02; furnishings, \$192.48. The holding of a Fall Sale of

has demanded more advertising than was contemplated, Approved. accounts now due, we require \$87.50 for advertising and stationery.

ages of teamsters were advanced on April 1st. To JAMES CL we require \$38.00 in the Experimental Department 00 in the Horticultural Department.

the Estimates a grant was made for an assistant in the Experimental Department. Other arrangements dispensed with his assistant and the work was done by extra help. To pay for this we require \$390.00 for additional labor.

The vote for furnishings, repairs and blacksmithing was found inadequate and we require \$50.00 additional.

In the Horticultural Department we require \$800 to complete the salary of the Assistant Gardener, and \$75.00 addi-

tional for extra laborers required to complete the work. The vote for manure has proved inadequate, and we require \$26.00 in addition. To meet overdrafts on implements, furnishings and repairs, and complete orders found necessary for carrying on the work we require \$215.00 additional.

In the Poultry Department we require to meet an overdraft of \$40.00 on purchase of stock. In furnishings and repairs the amount required has exceeded our estimate, and we request \$143.00 additional, and, for the same reason, \$105.00 for feed.

In the Dairy School there is an overdraft of \$154.40 for wages of Instructors and Janitor, through the omission of one assistant. To complete the equipment for the work beginning in the new year, we require \$200 additional for Dairy School Appliances. There is an overdraft of \$11.44 for fuel to be met.

The furniture, furnishings and repairs of the Experimental Dairy have exceeded our estimate, and we ask for \$300, most of which is to meet an overdraft.

ment of a number of extra clerks and stenographers, and the increased expense of postage and other sundry office expenses, the appropriation for Contingencies has become exhausted. There are now unpaid accounts to the amount of \$595.00 which must be provided for. In addition, there will be required \$294.00 to complete this work to the end of the year, making in all \$889.00 required.

Further, owing to the large expenditure in transportation of immigrant farm laborers, the advertising of the work of the Bureau, and the employment of additional clerks at the distributing office, and the payment of the Salvation Army of the amount of \$5,000, the amount appropriated for general colonization work has been found to be inadequate. There are now unpaid accounts amounting to \$847.90. In addition to these there will be required \$530.00 to carry on the work to the end of the year, making \$1,377.90 in all.

Therefore, I would recommend that, under R.S.O. chapter 23, section 20, a Treasury Board warrant be issued for the further sum of \$2,266.90 with which to meet contingencies under Colonization and Forestry (vote No. 4, now transferred to Department of Agriculture by Order-in-Council) the general expenditures under Colonization and Immigration.

SPECIAL WARRANTS ISSUED UNDER ORDER OF HIS
HONOUR THE LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR.

TORONTO, August 11th, 1905.

The undersigned has the honour to state for the information of His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council that the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway runs through the Temagami Forest Reserve for a considerable distance. This Reserve contains a large body of white pine timber variously estimated at from three billion to five billion feet B.M., and is

the largest body of white pine timber in the hands of the Crown in any one locality in the Province. It would be a public calamity if this timber should be destroyed by forest fires. Although every effort has been made during the past summer, and previously, by putting fire rangers along the line of railway to protect the timber, it has been most difficult to do so, as fires have broken out at various points, and the position has been several times very hazardous.

The undersigned, having considered the matter carefully, is of opinion that the danger might be materially lessened, if not altogether averted, if a strip of timber on each side of the right of way was cut down and cleared up, so that there would be no forest or debris near the road which could be ignited by sparks from the locomotives, etc.

The undersigned is of opinion that in clearing up this strip on each side of the road care should be taken to manufacture the pine timber cut down into saw logs, and the spruce timber into cordwood for pulp purposes, the cedar into posts and telegraph poles, and any other variety of timber that has a merchantable value into whatever product is most likely to be saleable.

To do the work carefully and economically the undersigned is of opinion that it would be well to employ a foreman, and engage men under his supervision to do the work, paying reasonable wages.

The expenditure, it is estimated, will require about \$10,000 for the present year. This expenditure was not foreseen at the time the Legislature was in session, and, therefore, no appropriation to meet it was taken. A vote might be taken at the next session of the House, but, in the opinion of the undersigned, it is expedient to proceed with the work immediately. He is, therefore, of the opinion that it is one of the classes of cases contemplated by cap. 23, sec. 9, subsection 2 of the Audit Act.

The undersigned would, therefore, respectfully recommend to His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council that the sum of ten thousand dollars be specially appropriated for this work, and that he be authorized by Council to engage the necessary assistance to prosecute the work with vigor.

not foreseen at the time the Legislature was in Session and therefore no appropriation to meet it was taken. In view of the fact, however, that the necessity is urgent, it is expedient that the work should be proceeded with immediately. The Minister is therefore of the opinion that it is one of the class of cases contemplated by subsection 2 of section 9, Cap. 23, R.S.O. 1897 "An Act to provide for the better Auditing of the Public Accounts of the Province" and recommends that the sum of Ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) be specially appropriated for the work, and that he be authorized to prosecute it with vigor.

The Committee concur in the recommendation of the Minister and advise that special warrant for the said sum of Ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) be issued in favour of the Honourable the Treasurer, to be placed by him to a special account against which cheques may issue from time to time in the usual form as they may be required.

Licutenant-Governor of the Province of Ontario:

May it Please Your Honour:

As is required by law, I submit for the information of Your Honour and the Legislative Assembly, a report for the year ending on the 31st December, 1905, of the management of the Crown lands of the Province.

CLERGY LANDS.

The area of Clergy lands sold during the year was 726 acres, aggregating in value \$560.00. The collection on account of these and former sales amounted to \$2,317.39. (See appendix No. 3, page 16.)

COMMON SCHOOL LANDS.

The collection on account of sales of former years was \$8,188.79. (See appendix No. 3, page 16.)

GRAMMAR SCHOOL LANDS.

The area of these lands sold during the year was 397½ acres for a sum of \$279.75. The collection on account of these and sales in former years was \$973.10. (See appendix No. 3, page 16.)

UNIVERSITY LANDS.

The area of these lands sold during the year was 1,978½ acres for \$990.25. The collection on account of these and sales of former years was \$1,186.06. (See appendix No. 3, page 16.)

CROWN LANDS.

There have been sold for agricultural purposes during the year 72,432 acres for \$47,393.07. The collection on account of these and former sales was \$51,007.02. There were sold for mining purposes 3,144½ acres for \$7,389.42, and collected on account of mining sales \$7,703.82.

There were leased for mining purposes 19,914 acres for \$17,925.90. There was collected on account of mining leases and leases converted into patents \$42,747.18. There were 4,440 acres of Crown lands leased for other than mining purposes. The collection on account of these and former leases was \$3,166.23. The total area of land disposed of during the year was 103,032½ acres. The total collection on account of lands sold and leased during the year was \$117,289.79. (See Appendix No. 3, page 16.)

There has been a continued influx of people to the Temiscaming region. The Department has undertaken to enforce the conditions of settlement with a view of making people become actual *bona fide* settlers. Consequently a good many sales have been cancelled and the lands re-sold to people who must become resident or in turn give place to those who will. By the elimination of speculation in that region it is believed that population will become more dense and the country more prosperous. The mining activity at Cobalt has induced a number of people to visit the district, many of whom, impressed with its agricultural character, have taken up lands. The construction of the Temiscaming and Northern Ontario Railway has been proceeding and has given employment at good wages as well as a market for supplies of all kinds. The surveys carried on during the past year in the Abitibi region have demonstrated the fact that there is an immense area of good agricultural land available, so that when the Grand Trunk Pacific is built and the Temiscaming and Northern Ontario Railway connects with it, an enormous population may be expected to flow in.

The Free Grant District of Rainy River has attracted a number of settlers who preferred the wood lands to the prairie. The effort has been made here also to oblige settlers to become residents and live up to their contracts, and when they have failed to do so they have been made to give place to those who will. In the older districts a considerable number of locations have taken place owing to the work of the Homestead Inspectors and the cancellation of unoccupied lands.

It will be noticed that a number of cancellations have taken place, but in nearly every instance the lands have been relocated. The old Free Grant Districts have been open so long that they have been culled over pretty closely, and it is not expected that there will be any large increase of settlers in these districts.

The construction of the Canadian Pacific and the James Bay Railways through the western parts of the Districts of Muskoka and Parry Sound will open up a considerable area of surveyed lands which has hitherto been somewhat inaccessible.

The newer parts of the Province have made substantial progress, work has been abundant at good wages, and there have been good markets for agricultural products and such timber as the settler had to sell. A disposition to locate lands not suitable for farming purposes, in order to get possession of the timber, having assumed considerable proportions, the Department has entered upon a system of inspection by its own officers in order to make sure that the land shall not be stripped of its timber under pretence of settlement, and then abandoned.

MILITARY GRANTS.

There were 740 certificates issued authorizing veterans to select their lands under 1 Edw. VII. Cap. 6. This brings the number of certificates issued under this legislation up to 12,600. Location certificates confirming veterans in the lands selected, upon prescribed conditions, were issued to 2,402 veterans. These locations were scattered over 130 townships, nearly all in the Temiseaming and Rainy River Districts. To date, 4,442 locations have been made and about 200 applications for locations are in the Department not yet dealt with. By amendment to the Act 1 Edw. VII. Cap. 6, of last session, holders of certificates were permitted to use them as cash in paying for lands, and they were made scrip so that they could be transferred from hand to hand and applied as money. It was expected that many certificates would be wiped out by this process, but not more than fifty have been applied in this way. The time for receiving applications has now expired, and the Department is in a position to judge of the land required to satisfy the claims still outstanding. As already stated, 12,600 certificates have been issued, probably there are in the Department 400 applications for certificates not yet dealt with, making a total number of certificates issued and to be issued, 13,000. Each certificate calling for 160 acres, it would take $13,000 \times 160$, or two million and eighty thousand acres of land, to satisfy the grants. This at 50 cents per acre, the price of Crown lands, would mean one million and forty thousand dollars in money. There have been 4,442 grants made; deducting these from 13,000 we find that 8,558 remain to be provided for, which will require 1,366,280 acres to satisfy. To provide locations for these at the legislative proportion, two to a mile, would require nearly 119 six-mile townships, or to provide for them allowing veterans to take all the land available in each township, would require 59 six-mile townships. The question is serious enough to call for some special action which would enable the applications to be disposed of in a measurable period.

MINING INDUSTRY.

The chief features of the mining industry during the year 1905 were the activity in the Sudbury nickel-copper district, and the rapid development of the silver ore deposits of the Cobalt region. The nickel contents of the Bessemerized matte now produced by the mining works amounted

to 9,428 tons, having a spot value of \$3,344,409, and the copper contents to 4,382 tons; worth \$671,833. This is much the largest production, both of nickel and copper, yet recorded in the history of the Province, and establishes the claim of Ontario to be regarded as the chief source of the world's supply of nickel. The value of this output of nickel and copper, if computed at the prices of the refined metals, in accordance with the practice of other Provinces of the Dominion, would be little short of \$10,000,000. The nickel-copper industry is also a large user of labor, giving direct employment to upwards of 1,000 men.

The remarkable richness of the Cobalt silver ores has attracted to that district a very large measure of public attention. Some 12 or 15 separate properties have been worked, and the values of the ores shipped during the year in silver, cobalt and nickel amounted to about \$1,500,000, the average value of the ore shipped being \$685 per ton. Much the greater part of this was in silver, the cobalt, nickel and arsenic, which, at the outset, were paid for by the ore buyers, now bringing no return whatever. This unsatisfactory state of affairs has led to a movement on the part of some of the mine owners and others to put up a reduction plant or plants in the country, and thus obtain, if possible, some return for those valuable constituents which at present are yielding them nothing. There was great activity in prospecting the Cobalt district for minerals during the open season, and the advent of spring is likely to see a renewal of this activity on probably a larger scale.

Iron ore to the extent of 211,597 tons was raised during the year, mainly from the great Helen mine in Michipicoten; while the blast furnaces at Sault Ste. Marie, Hamilton, Midland and Deseronto turned out 276,704 tons of pig iron, valued at \$3,909,527, a portion of which was converted into 138,387 tons of steel, worth \$3,321,884.

Other mineral substances, such as mica, corundum, feldspar, iron pyrites, petroleum, salt, natural gas, and construction materials, including cement, brick, lime, stone, etc., have been produced in about the usual quantities. In all, the mineral industry made very substantial progress in 1905.

COLLECTIONS.

The total collections from all services was \$2,199,404.76. Of this \$117,289.79 was for lands sold and leased; \$2,064,663.91 was from woods and forests; \$14,622.55 from mining leases, and miscellaneous \$2,828.51. (See appendix No. 4, page 17.)

DISBURSEMENTS.

The gross expenditure of the Department for the past year was \$329,501.01. The principal services were Agents' salaries and disbursements, \$37,564.46; Forest ranging, \$35,421.70; Fire ranging, \$54,295.24; Mining development, \$14,419.97; Forest reserves, \$18,773.20; Surveys, \$107,102.49, and Refunds, \$32,621.16. (See Appendix No. 6, pages 19 to 38.)

WOODS AND FORESTS.

The total revenue from this Branch was \$2,064,663.91. Of this \$520,070.91 was from Bonuses; from Timber dues, \$1,480,910.06; from Ground rent, \$61,194.94; Transfer fees, \$2,488.00. (See Appendix No. 4, page 17.)

The revenue from timber dues is the largest in the history of the Department. An effort has been made to collect closely, which entailed no hardship, as the lumber trade is in a prosperous condition. The outlook for the present season is that the output of logs, etc., will exceed that of last season although the absence of snow has retarded hauling.

CULLER'S EXAMINATIONS.

Culler's examinations were held at North Bay, Keewatin and Sault Ste. Marie during the year. Sixty-six candidates were successful and were granted certificates giving them authority to act as Cullers. (For list of licensed cullers, see Appendix No. 54, page 128.)

PULPWOOD.

The Sault Ste. Marie Company having resumed operations, the quantity of pulpwood taken out is much larger than last year. The figures for the season are 72,678 cords as against 29,833 cords in 1904. The Spanish River Company is now making pulp and the Sturgeon Falls Company has increased its capacity. There are several companies holding concessions which have made no attempt to operate and have not carried out any of the conditions on which their concessions were granted. It may become advisable to deal with these concessions in some way which shall give an opportunity for their development and operation.

FIRE RANGING.

There were 425 Fire Rangers on duty during the past summer exclusive of those on duty in the parks and forest reserves. Of these 334 were employed on territory under timber license, and half of their wages and expenses were paid by the licensees and the other half by the Government. Fifty-nine fire Rangers were employed along the line of construction of the Temiscaming and Northern Ontario Railway, and fourteen on lands of the Crown. The total cost of this service to the Department was \$54,295.24.

The service continues to give satisfactory results upon licensed territory, as very few fires have occurred. The great advantage of the service has been the educational effect it has had upon those having to move about through the forest during the summer. The settlers have come to know that the observance of the law is a great protection to them as when a forest fire gets started it is liable to destroy their buildings, crops and household effects, as well as their timber, which has of recent years become a valuable asset. The surveyors, explorers and guides have all had the law continually brought to their

notice and there now is a wholesome desire to assist in preserving the forest from destruction, whereas years ago there was carelessness and criminal negligence of the simplest precautions to prevent the occurrence and spread of forest fires. The construction of the Temiscaming and Northern Ontario Railway through the Temagami Reserve, where there is from three to five million feet of white pine, made it necessary that close patrol of the territory along the line of construction should be had in order to see that proper precautions were observed by the contractors and their workmen and by the trainmen when train service was in operation for passenger traffic or ballasting, etc. The extension north of the reserve to the Blanche River and beyond, where construction was proceeding, was carefully watched. The danger to the standing pine timber near the silver discoveries made it necessary to exercise very close supervision in that region.

The use of railway velocipedes made a close patrol of the track possible. The quantity of timber damaged was very small indeed, and owing to the knowledge obtained by the presence of Rangers as to the quantities and situation, none of it need become a loss. Should the Grand Trunk Pacific be put under construction during the coming summer a larger staff will be required.

ALGONQUIN AND RONDEAU PARKS.

The recent purchase of the Canada Atlantic Railway, running through Algonquin National Park, by the Grand Trunk Railway Company, has resulted in much more extensive advertising of the territory as desirable for tourists, which will, doubtless, result in an increased number of visitors, and the consequent necessity for closer supervision on the part of the ranging staff.

There has been added to the area of the park, since the last report, the following territory:—The west half of the township of Fitzgerald, comprising lots 1 to 20 in concession 1 to 14, inclusive; the west half of the township of White, say lots 1 to 20 in concessions 1 to 14, inclusive; the west half of the township of Niven, say lots 16 to 38 in concessions 1 to 14, inclusive; and the west half of the township of Clancey, say lots 16 to 37 in concessions 4 to 16, inclusive; the north 80 acres of lot 36, and the north 72 acres of lot 37 in the second concession, and lots 35, 36 and 37 in the third concession.

This brings the total area of the park up to 1,235,000 acres.

During the year new regulations governing the park were passed by the Lieutenant-Governor in Council. The new regulations permit fishing with rod and line in the park under license, for which a fee of \$1.00 for residents of Canada, and \$2.00 for non-residents, is charged, but no fish are allowed to be shipped out of the park.

The new regulations also provide that the Minister may lease suitable points for camping or for the erection of summer cottages, on the approval of the superintendent of the park.

In future parties acting as guides for tourists in the park will require to have a license to do so.

The enlargement of the park will necessitate the employment of more rangers, and, consequently, some extension of the headquarters' building for their accommodation.

There have been no fires in the park, and the protection of the game animals has been so effective as to ensure a great increase in their numbers, so much so that the beaver, formerly nearly extinct in that vicinity, are now found in numbers in localities many miles outside the park boundaries.

During the year some work was done in extending the wagon road through the Rondeau Provincial Park, adding a much needed coat of paint to the pavilion and other buildings, and in cleaning up more ground for picnic purposes near the headquarters.

More interest is being taken in the park by the residents of the surrounding counties, as was shown by the increasing number of picnics held there during the summer.

Several new building lots were leased during the year, and the rental of the leases in arrears paid up.

The dock, at which pleasure boats landed, was partly destroyed by the ice, and needs to be extended to reach water deep enough to enable even small steam yachts to land.

The herd of deer, in the park is increasing rapidly.

The reports of the Superintendents of Algonquin National Park and Rondeau Provincial Park will be found in appendices Nos. 52 and 53 respectively, pages 124 to 127.

CROWN SURVEYS.

The following Crown surveys have been carried out this year:—

Three hundred and two and a half miles of base and meridian lines have been run in the Districts of Nipissing, Algoma and Rainy River, such lines being run to form the bases of future sub-division surveys. Forty-six miles have been run of the inter-provincial boundary between the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec, being from the forty-second mile, from the head of Lake Temiskaming, to near the eighty-eighth mile, about five miles north of Lake Abitibi, on the Oki-Ko-Do-Sek River, by Commissioners appointed, respectively, by the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec, Mr. T. J. Patten, O.L.S., being the Commissioner for Ontario, and Mr. F. C. Laberge, P.L.S., the Commissioner for Quebec. Forty and a half townships have been subdivided into lots and concessions, the following being a list of the names and districts in which they occur: In the District of Nipissing, the townships of Kerrs, Galna, Mortimer, Edwards, Pyne, North half of Aurora, Fox, Lamarche, Brower, Michaud, Guibord, Hislop, Playfair, Barr, Newmarket, St. John, Laura, Servos, Willison, Flavelle, Smyth, Moody and Wesley, twenty-two and a half in all. In the District of Algoma, Townships of Cochrane, D'Arcy, McGee, Borden, Gamey, Chewett, Wark, Kidd, Mahaffy,

Crawford, Carnegie, Reid, Duff, Lucas and Collins, fifteen in all. In the District of Rainy River, Townships of Pettypiece, Smellie and Pellatt, three in all. A large number of these townships have been reported by the surveyors as containing a good percentage of fine agricultural land.

The survey of the islands in Lake Temagami, in the District of Nipissing, has been concluded, and a map published showing all of the islands in this lake, numbering twelve hundred and fifty-eight.

A number of timber berths in the Districts of Rainy River, Algoma, Thunder Bay and Nipissing were also surveyed during the year.

Several other minor surveys have been performed also.

Owing to the fine summer last season most of the surveyors were able to finish their contracts.

The surveyors' reports, so far as received and examined, will be found in appendices 18 to 51, inclusive, pages 52 to 124, inclusive.

MUNICIPAL SURVEYS.

The Department has, during the year, on the petitions of the municipalities of the Town of Fort Frances, Townships of Ops, Township of Vaughan, and Township of Hinchinbrooke, issued instructions for the survey of portions of townships and towns within said municipalities, namely, the east and west road through the Hudson's Bay Reserve adjoining Fort Frances, in the District of Rainy River, and its communication south with Cornwall Street, and also the limits of the Town of Fort Frances. In the Township of Ops, in the County of Victoria, the original allowance for road between the eighth and ninth concessions across lots numbers eleven and twelve. In the Township of Vaughan, in the County of York, the road allowance between the fourth and fifth concessions across lots numbers twenty-one to twenty-five, inclusive. In the Township of Hinchinbrooke, in the County of Frontenac, the road allowance between concessions eight and nine, from lot number twenty southerly to lot number fourteen, both inclusive.

The following municipal surveys have been confirmed during the year, under the provisions of the Revised Statutes of Ontario, 1897, chapter 181, sections 14 and 15, such surveys so confirmed being final and conclusive. The survey of the east and west road through the Hudson's Bay Reserve adjoining Fort Frances, in the District of Rainy River, also the limits of the Town of Fort Frances. That portion of the boundary line between the Townships of Beckwith and Drummond, in the County of Lanark, from the fourth concession line to the eighth concession line just north of Mississippi Lake. The line between the sixth and seventh concessions of Hinchinbrooke, in the County of Frontenac, across lots numbers eight to sixteen, inclusive. The allowance for road between the eighth and ninth concessions of the Township of Ops, in the County of Victoria, across lots numbers eleven and twelve.

The particulars relating to these surveys will be found in appendices Nos. 14 and 15, pages 48 and 49.

MINING AND OTHER SURVEYS.

The Mines Act of 1897, and amendments thereto, require that applicants to purchase or lease mining lands in unsurveyed territory shall file in the Department surveyor's plans (in duplicate) of their proposed mining locations, with field notes and descriptions by metes and bounds, before any sale or lease can be carried out, and under Orders-in-Council dated 23rd of January, 1892; 3rd of December, 1892; 29th of April, 1886; and 22nd of September, 1893, applicants to purchase islands or locations for agricultural purposes in unsurveyed territory are required to file surveyor's plans (in duplicate) of their locations, with field notes and descriptions by metes and bounds; the locations to be of the form and size, wherever practicable, prescribed by the Mines Act, together with the necessary affidavits.

Under the above Act and regulations, in the Districts of Parry Sound, Nipissing, Algoma, Rainy River and Thunder Bay, an area of 7,650 29/60 acres has been sold and patented during the year, for which the sum of \$14,042.27 has been received, and an area of 10,223 acres has been leased at \$1.00 per acre for the first year's rental.

COLONIZATION AND IMMIGRATION.

The flow of immigration to the province has continued to increase, and an exceptionally good class of settlers have come in. As in previous years, the majority of the immigrants have come from the Old Land. The number of immigrants coming to Toronto and to points west during the year was 28,326.

Special rates were given by the railway companies, as usual, to these immigrants. Certificates were also issued to 3,131 home-seekers, who went to the newer parts of the province to look for homes. Many of these will return in the spring for their families.

The total number of immigrants of all classes from over seas to the province during the year was 34,958. Of these 23,316 were English, 4,496 Scotch, 1,765 Irish, 1,130 Russians (including 938 Finns), 761 Scandinavians, and 665 Italians.

The farmers of the province continue to derive great benefit from the Farm Labor Bureau. The number of farm laborers placed by the Bureau has increased during the year. In addition to these a very large number of laborers were engaged by the farmers direct, without resorting to the Bureau for assistance, they coming to the office in person and engaging the men. To these men reduced railway certificates were issued to the number of 2,000. A large number of these men are engaged for the year, and are proving very satisfactory.

BASE AND MERIDIAN LINES.

DISTRICT OF ALGOMA.

TORONTO, Ontario, December, 20th, 1905.

SIR,—We have the honor to submit the following report of the survey of certain base and meridian lines in the District of Algoma, made under instructions from your Department, dated thirty-first May, A.D. nineteen hundred and five.

Shortly after the receipt of the instructions, we purchased supplies for the work and arranged to have a large portion of the same freighted from Biscotasing to Mattagami Post in advance of our party. Some delay arose from the fact that, until the instructions came to hand, the ordering of canoes suitable for the work was necessarily deferred. Our canoes used in nineteen hundred and four had been stored at Quinze Lake and the location of the nineteen hundred and five survey rendered it necessary to sell them and procure new ones.

Having concluded these details, we left Toronto on twenty-sixth of June with a party of fifteen, all told, one of whom, Mr. J. J. Dalton, D. T. S., was a duly authorized Ontario Land Surveyor of considerable experience in field work.

On the journey by Canadian Pacific Railway the party was reinforced by men from North Bay, Heron Bay and White River, making a total of twenty-five men.

Leaving the railway at Biscotasing on twenty-eighth June, we followed, without mishap, the canoe route to Matagami Post, which point was reached on third of July.

On the following day, the journey was continued and we arrived at the point of commencement at the twelfth mile post on the base line run in nineteen hundred and four by Ontario Land Surveyor T. J. Patten, in the afternoon of eighth of July, and got a satisfactory observation of Polaris on the same evening.

The survey was commenced at an iron post one and seven-eighth inches in diameter planted alongside a spruce post six inches square by Ontario Land Surveyor T. J. Patten in latitude forty-nine degrees four minutes eighteen seconds north, which posts are marked on the east side "12 M", with two bearing trees as shown on the projected plan. These posts are twenty-sixty chains and sixty-six links west of the west bank of the Mattagami River.

The instructions included the survey of three base lines and three meridian lines which are located on the projected map as follows:—

First base,—a line running west from the twelfth mile post on Ontario Land Surveyor Patten's base line of nineteen hundred and four for a distance of twelve miles.

First meridian,—A line running south twelve miles from the west end of the first base and thirty-six miles north to the base line run in nineteen hundred by Ontario Land Surveyor Alexander Niven.

Second meridian,—A line similar to the first meridian, but distant twelve miles east therefrom.

Second base,—A line twelve miles north from the first base and extending east from the first meridian six miles.

Third base,—A line twelve miles north of the second base, and extending twenty-four miles east from the first meridian.

Third meridian,—A line twelve miles east from the second meridian and extending twelve miles in each direction from the east end of the third base.

The several sections of these base and meridian lines were run in the directions set forth in the instructions with the following exceptions, namely, the west twelve miles of the third base was run east instead of west and the part of the first meridian between the second and third bases was run north instead of south. These variations, which made no material difference in the ultimate results of the survey, were found to be necessary, owing to the limited season.

All base lines were run on six mile chords of parallels of latitude, and all the lines were well opened out and blazed. At the end of every third and ninth mile, except when such terminated in a lake or river, we planted an iron post one and one quarter inches in diameter, three feet long, forged at the top, pointed at the bottom and painted red, and at the end of every sixth and twelfth mile, except as above, an iron post of the above description and one and seven-eighth inches in diameter, wooden posts of as durable material as could be obtained, were planted alongside the iron posts above described, also at the terminations of all miles not marked by iron posts, except in the case of a lake or river.

Where a mile terminated in a lake or river, the number of the mile, plus or minus, the distance from such termination was marked upon the post or posts planted on the nearest shore intersected by the base or meridian line. All posts planted at the terminations of miles were marked with the mile numbers on the side next to the initial point of numbering as shown on the projected plan without respect to the direction in which the base or meridian line was actually run.

In all cases where wooden and iron posts were planted side by side, the position of the iron post was intended to define the true corner, and the proper marks were made on such iron posts with a cold chisel.

GENERAL FEATURES.

In general, the surface of the country in this region may be termed flat and gently undulating and lying at an elevation of from ten to twenty-five feet above the level of the numerous streams which traverse it. In some instances, notably in the vicinity of the Abitibi River, this elevation increases to from thirty to fifty feet and the country is of a more rolling or hilly character.

Between the two branches of the Muskego River north of the first base line, a clay hill rises to the height of two hundred feet above the surface of the river and covers an area of from two to three square miles. Few lakes were seen, except in the vicinity of the first meridian, where there are numerous expansions of the Poplar Rapids River. Apart from those mentioned, the lakes are small and shallow.

The stretches of flat lands are broken occasionally by poplar covered ridges, rising to a height of five to twenty feet and trending northeasterly and southwesterly, as to the rivers.

SOIL.

Heavy clay soils, varied in places by clay loam and occasionally by sandy loam, constitutes the general soil in this section. A few sandy

stretches chiefly on the south six miles of the first meridian were seen, and these, together with occasional small muskegs form the only unproductive areas in the territory included in the survey. The sub-soil was almost invariably found to be clay, the only exceptions noticed, being small stretches of gravel.

TIMBER.

The predominating timber throughout is spruce, poplar, tamarac (chiefly dead) balsam and white birch. Balm of gilead and banksian pine occur in smaller quantities. Along the streams and rivers occasional scattered cedars of fair size are seen, but the larger specimens are usually faulty. Spruce, in the vicinity of the rivers, is of good quality and attains a maximum diameter of twenty-four inches, but that more remote from the streams, is somewhat stunted.

Poplar, which usually occupies the ridges, reaches a maximum diameter of ten to fifteen inches and is of good quality. The insect scourge, which some years ago destroyed the tamarac seems to have abated as the smaller trees are now apparently free from its ravages. The only brulé seen, was near the third meridian and extending from the third base northward for a distance of twelve miles, by from five to ten miles in breadth. It occurred early in the summer of this year and was probably the result of carelessness on the part of the explorers or Indians. No further burned area was met with.

GEOLOGY.

The country is practically a plain in which the superficial deposits are stratified clays.

Rock exposures encountered are generally located along the rivers. Nearly all the territory embraced by this survey lies within the Laurentian formation, the contact between the Laurentian and Huronian being in the neighborhood of Davis Rapids on the Mattagami River about one mile north of the first base line. To the south of this point, the rocks consist of typical Huronian schists, in which hornblende and mica schists predominate with intrusive masses of diabase and gabbro.

In the Laurentian area, light colored gneissoid rocks with granite and syenite eruptives make up the back bone of the country.

So far as our observation went, no economic minerals were found, but this head of our report will be more exhaustively treated by Mr. H. L. Kerr, who examined this region under the direction of the Bureau of Mines.

WATER.

The two chief waterways in the territory comprised within this survey, are the Abitibi river with its two main tributaries, the Frederick House River and Driftwood Creek and the Matagami River with its three chief tributaries, the white Caribou Head River, the Muskego River and Poplar Rapids River.

The Abitibi was crossed on the third meridian at about one quarter of a mile north of the third base and that meridian crossed a bend in the river in the southern part of the second mile. For the next seven miles, the river follows a general northerly direction, keeping within a mile's distance west of the meridian.

At a point opposite the ninth mile, north of the second base, on this meridian, a fine water power known as the Three Carrying Places Falls and rapids, occurs, yielding a total head of about twenty-five to thirty feet.

Beyond this point, the river flows northwesterly and crosses Ontario Land Surveyor Niven's base of nineteen hundred at about two miles west of our third meridian. The immediate banks of this river are about six to ten feet in height, but a further rise of from forty to fifty feet occurs at a distance of from seventy to two hundred feet back from the water's edge. The river's bend varies from three hundred to four hundred and fifty feet in breadth, with a depth of ten to twelve feet and the current is not more than two miles an hour. The usual white, almost milky appearance characteristic of the Abitibi water and caused by impregnation from the clay soil was present throughout.

Frederick House River which empties into the Abitibi at a point known as the Big Bend about five miles southeast of our third base is a fine stream of about two hundred feet in width, but does not come within the scope of this survey.

Driftwood Creek, formerly supposed to be a tributary of the Frederick House, was found to empty into the Abitibi direct at a point about half a mile north of our third base. It is a stream of an average width of about one hundred feet and depth of eight to ten feet. In travelling up stream from its mouth to the portage leading across to the Mattagami, no fewer than eleven portages with an average length of not less than ten chains were met with. The falls and rapids occasioning these portages are not such as to be of importance as water powers. The Mattagami Portage above referred to, forms the only available canoe route connecting the Abitibi and Mattagami waters. It is not less than seven miles in length, the eastern half being low and wet.

The Mattagami River, which affords the only direct highway into this region, has doubtless been fully dealt with in previous reports. It is a stream similar in most respects to the Abitibi, but with a smaller volume and differing in appearance by reason of its clear water. It is crossed by our second meridian four times in the first four miles south of the first base and once in the fourth mile north of the first base. From this point it flows in a general northerly direction and is crossed by the third base in the second mile west of the second meridian. It bears thence northwesterly and is not again touched by any of the lines in this survey. Four falls capable of being developed into water powers of some importance, occur on it between the first and the second base lines and a fifth about three miles north of the second base. In addition, there are numerous rapids, but none which would be considered hazardous for experienced canoemen. White Caribou Head River which enters the Mattagami about four miles south of the first base, has an average breadth of about fifty feet with banks from six to eight feet in height and an average depth of six to eight feet, with a moderate current. Frequent log jams preclude the use of this stream as a canoe route.

The Muskego River, with a breadth of one hundred to one hundred and fifty feet, enters the Mattagami about half a mile north of the second base. This stream is passable for canoes for a distance of about ten miles from its mouth, whence further travel is prevented by the forks before referred to. Poplar Rapids crosses the first meridian in the ninth mile north of the first base and, flowing in a general northerly direction, runs, for the last twelve miles, nearly parallel to the first meridian, at a distance of about two miles east therefrom, emptying into the Mattagami at a point on Ontario Land Surveyor Niven's base line of nineteen hundred about three and a half miles east from our first meridian. It has an average breadth of about one hundred and twenty-five feet, between banks four to eight feet high. Between

the second and third bases there are three lake expansions, and between these bodies numerous rapids render navigation very tedious.

In addition to the streams above described, the country is well watered by springs and spring creeks, and no difficulty was experienced in obtaining water wherever required.

GAME.

Moose were very plentiful; bear, beaver, martin, mink and fish were scarcer.

Some very fine specimens of sturgeon were taken in the Mattagami River, but as a rule, fish can scarcely be said to be abundant in these waters.

GENERAL REMARKS.

Not less than twenty-five per cent. of the land surveyed is high-lying and dry with clay and clay loam as the predominating soil. The remainder is chiefly flat clay land of good quality, but viewed at a great disadvantage, owing to the abundance of peat moss. The presence of this moss retards natural drainage, and in places preserves the winter's ice until late in the summer. Facilities for artificial drainage are good, but there will not be much, if any, necessity for expensive drainage work when once the turf and moss have been cleared away by fire. A striking example of this was found in the case of the brule' before referred to. The somewhat forbidding aspect of the swampy part of this tract in its original state has been completely changed and instead of a flat, wet moss covered country, we saw good clay soil needing only slight attention to be ready for the plough. There seems no reason why this form of treatment should not be applicable to the greater part of the peat moss areas in this region.

There were three frosts during the summer, the only one of severity being about the first of September, and it did not affect the foliage. From previous experiences in that region, we do not think that this summer was exceptional in that regard, and, that being the case, the climate is as favorable for agriculture as that of older Ontario was before settlement had taken place. With the change in conditions produced by settlement, it seems reasonable to suppose that the climate will undergo a process of moderation to an even greater degree than did that of older Ontario. The latitude is in the neighborhood of that of the international boundary in the west.

Timber, of the varieties above described, is found in sufficient quantities for the ordinary needs of settlers, besides furnishing a considerable amount for manufacturing purposes.

The survey of the National Transcontinental Railway is being vigorously pressed forward through the district, two survey parties having crossed our lines with their exploration work during the season, and there seems every probability that the final location will be in the vicinity of our third base. In conversation with Mr. S. R. Poulin, District Engineer, whom we met while on the survey, we found that his opinion as to the agricultural value of this region coincided with our own and he further stated the soil in and to the west of the valley of the Ground Hog River was even superior to that embraced by our survey. A depot has been established by the National Transcontinental Railway Commission at the mouth of the Muskego River for the distribution of supplies to their various surveying parties in that vicinity.

At nearly all the Indian quarters, potatoes are cultivated and, on the return journey, we bought a supply, the quality and yield of which were a

source of astonishment to our party, but we were informed that it was only an ordinary crop.

From all the facts observed, as above set forth, we feel warranted in predicting that when railways have made this section of New Ontario accessible, and that time is not far distant, fully seventy-five per cent. of it will be converted into productive farms, which will compare favorably with those of southern Ontario.

Accompanying this report are a general plan, field notes and triplicate accounts.

APPENDIX No. 19.

BASE AND MERIDIAN LINES,

DISTRICT OF ALGOMA.

HALIBURTON, Ontario, December 18th, 1905.

SIR,—I have the honor to submit herewith report of the survey of Base and Meridian Lines in the District of Algoma, surveyed under instructions from your Department, dated thirty-first May, nineteen hundred and five.

Leaving Haliburton on the fifteenth of June, I proceeded to Sturgeon Falls, where I engaged a number of my men, and reached Metagama Station, on the Canadian Pacific Railway, with my full party, on the twentieth of that month. I immediately started north with canoes, taking all my supplies with me, via the Spanish River, crossing the height of land portage into the waters of the Mattagami River on the twenty-fourth, and getting to Mattagami Hudson Bay Company's Post on the twenty-ninth. Leaving there on the thirtieth, I proceeded down the Mattagami River, arriving at Muddy Creek, near the northwest angle of the township of Tisdale, the initial point of my survey, on third July.

After obtaining the necessary observations, I commenced work by running west on my second base line.

The survey was continued, without interruption, until twelfth September, when, having got short of supplies, I was obliged to cease operations, leaving fifteen miles of my second meridian line undone.

The home journey was commenced on the thirteenth of September, and the Canadian Pacific Railway reached on the twenty-first, and Toronto two days later.

The lines run were as follows:—

Second base line, west twenty-four miles.

Third base line, east twelve miles.

Third base line, west twelve miles.

Fourth base line, west twenty-four miles twenty-nine chains.

First meridian line, south six miles.

First meridian line, north twenty-four miles.

Second meridian line, south fourteen and three-quarter miles.

The base lines are twelve miles apart, and meridian lines twelve miles apart.

The lines were well cut and well blazed. At the end of the sixth, twelfth, eighteenth, twenty-fourth and thirtieth miles on the several lines an iron post three feet long and one and seven-eighth inches in diameter, was planted alongside the wooden post, and at the end of the third, ninth, fifteenth, twenty-first and twenty-seventh miles an iron post three feet long and one and one-quarter inches in diameter was planted alongside of the wooden post.

Iron posts were marked with the number of miles with a cold chisel, and wooden posts with a scribe iron on the side from which the line was run and measured, excepting on miles six to one on first meridian, and miles thirty to sixteen on second meridian line, which were marked on south side.

Where the end of a mile came in water the post was planted on the nearest land and distance noted.

Observations for azimuth were frequently taken, the details of which will be found in the field notes. The magnetic variation of the needle averaged seven degrees west.

GENERAL DESCRIPTION.

The land found in the survey was along the second base line near the Mattagami River.

The tract of country within the limits of the survey was, upon the whole, the wettest part of the "clay belt" that I have seen. A good deal of it is put down as swamp, and a good deal more of it that is put down as clay flat, verges so closely upon swamp that it is difficult to draw the line between the two. Here and there sandy flats and stony ridges occur, and sometimes those are gravelly.

There are not many rock exposures within the limits of the survey, and these are of the Laurentian and Huronian formations. The country is generally level. I would say that about fifty per cent. of the area will be fit for cultivation. The balance is either stony and sandy, or too wet to be of any value.

TIMBER.

The whole country may be said to be covered with spruce from a few inches in diameter to fourteen and sixteen inches, mostly of the red variety, white spruce only occurring along the banks and rivers and creeks where it runs up to twenty and twenty-four inches in diameter. Considerable tamarac is mixed with the spruce, mostly dead or dying, and a large quantity of balsam. Poplar, some of considerable size, is found in ridges, chiefly in the vicinity of rivers and creeks, and balm of gilead also, generally of large size, from twelve to twenty-four inches in diameter. White birch is found on the sandy flats or ridges. There is not much banksian pine within the limits of the survey. I saw no red pine, and only a few white pine on the mountain three hundred feet high, near the intersection of the first meridian and third base lines.

From this hill a view of the country for many miles is obtained, and is, apparently, a vast flat of spruce. Mount Sinclair stands up prominently fifty miles to the southeast. There is not much cedar within the limits of the survey, a little along creeks and rivers, and when found elsewhere is only "scrub."

There is a great deal of lying timber, and windfalls, where nearly all the timber is blown down, were frequently met with.

Quite a tract of country was run over by fire two years ago, apparently starting at Kamiskotia Lake west of the first meridian line, and spreading out to the north and west from this point.

WATER.

The Mattagami River, having an average width of about two hundred and twenty-five feet, with its tributaries drains the area surveyed.

The Kamiskotia River, with its branches falling into it, is over a chain wide, and is navigable for canoes throughout the limits of the survey, although there are many rapids to be overcome.

Kamiskotia Lake, the only one of any size within the limits of the survey, is a round, shallow lake of about two miles in diameter, with a few islands therein, where Indians camp during the trapping season. Numerous creeks were met with, one of considerable volume, along the first meridian line near its north end.

Sandy Falls, on the Mattagami River a few miles south of where my second base line crossed, is a valuable water power, this and Sturgeon Falls, fifteen feet high, in the township of Mahaffy, are the only two falls on this river within the limits of the survey.

No wild animals were met with. The country is too wet for red deer and moose, although both these are plentiful farther south. Spruce, part-ridge are the only game birds found in the bush, and pike and pickerel the only fish in the rivers, although sturgeon come up from the north as far as Sturgeon Falls.

Herewith will be found the field notes and plan of survey and account in triplicate.

APPENDIX No. 20.

MERIDIAN LINE,

DISTRICT OF ALGOMA.

TORONTO, Ontario, December 18th, 1905.

SIR,—I have the honor to submit the following report on the survey of the meridian line east of Chapleau, in the District of Algoma, surveyed under instructions dated May thirty-first, nineteen hundred and five.

I proceeded on the third of July, nineteen hundred and five, to my starting point on the Canadian Pacific Railway, about twenty-one miles east

of Chapleau, where I found the iron and spruce posts planted by Ontario Land Surveyor McAree, on the north limit of the right of way of the Canadian Pacific Railway, which point is seventy-four chains sixty-one links north from the southeast angle of township number twenty-seven, as laid out along the right of way of said railway.

Commencing my survey at this point I ran a line north astronomically, planting the first mile post five chains thirty-nine links distant therefrom, and continued due north to the eighteenth mile point, which is to mark the southwest angle of the township of Chewett.

Wooden posts were planted at the end of each mile, and, in addition thereto, an iron post three feet in length and one and seven-eighth inches in diameter, was planted at the end of the sixth, twelfth and eighteenth miles, and an iron post one and one-quarter inches in diameter was planted at the end of the third, ninth and fifteenth miles; and the mileage was marked on the south side of all posts.

The country adjacent to the line as far as the eighth mile is an old brule covered with second growth birch, poplar, spruce and pine, and a considerable portion of the dry banksian pine and spruce are still standing.

The country north from the eighth mile is timbered with spruce, cedar and dead tamarac from four inches to twelve inches in diameter in the low ground, and with banksian pine, balsam and poplar from four to sixteen inches on the higher ground and ridges.

The general character of the soil is sandy, with stones and gravel in and near the hills, which, in most cases, are hogback in shape, and not continuous, except on each side of the Nemegosenda River, where they form a valley from half a mile to a mile in width. The river runs in a northerly and northwesterly direction, and has an average width of fifty feet, and from six to nine feet deep.

The country rock is granite, and very little exposed owing to the depth of sand and gravel in most places.

No great difficulty lies in the way of building a colonization road from Nemegos Station, on the Canadian Pacific Railway, to Trout or Nemegosenda Lake, following the general course of the river, along which the land is better suited for agricultural purposes than on the higher ground.

Accompanying this report I forward plan and field notes of the survey in the usual form.

APPENDIX No. 21.

TOWNSHIP OF PETTYPIECE,

DISTRICT OF RAINY RIVER.

RAT PORTAGE, Ontario, March 21st, 1905.

SIR.—I have the honor to submit the following report of the survey of the township of Pettypiece, in the District of Rainy River, made under instructions dated October seventh, nineteen hundred and four.

I first marked the old iron post at the northeast corner of Haycock, putting on it "Pettypiece" on the northwest side, "Con. I" on the north side, "I" on the west side. I took an observation here and ran the east boundary due north to the south shore of Silver Lake, where I planted an iron and a wooden post marked "Pettypiece I" on the west side, "Con. III" on the south side. I also put wooden posts at the end of each concession line marked as shown in the field notes. I ran the concession lines between the first and second and between the second and third concessions west. I then ran north to the north boundary between lots two and three, then I ran east to the northeast corner, where I planted an iron and a wooden post marked "Pettypiece" on the southwest side, "Con. VI" on the south side, "I" on the west side; thence south to the lake, where an iron and a wooden post were planted marked "Pettypiece I" on the west side, "Con. V" on the north side. The lines between lots were run south from the concession line between the second and third concessions, except between lots two and three and lots three and four, which were run north throughout. Iron posts were planted, one at the east end of the concession line between the third and fourth concessions on Silver Lake marked "Pettypiece II" on the west side, "Con. III" on the south side, and "Con. IV" on the north side; between lots six and seven on the line between the third and fourth concessions marked "Con. III" on the south side, "Con. IV" on the north side, "VI" on the east side, and "VII" on the west side; between concessions three and four in the boundary between Melick and Pettypiece marked "Pettypiece XII" on the east side, "Con. III" on the south side, "Con. IV" on the north side; between lots six and seven in the north boundary of Pettypiece marked "Pettypiece VI" on the south side, "VI" on the east side, "VII" on the west side, and at the shore of Deacon Lake, in the north boundary of Pettypiece marked "Pettypiece" on the southeast side, "XII" on the west side, "VI" on the south side. All the traversing and distances across lakes were done on the ice except where triangulations are shown on the field notes and tracings.

The posts were planted at the intersection of the lines at southeast corner of lot one between two and three, four and five, six and seven, eight and nine, ten and eleven, and on west boundary of Pettypiece these posts were marked with the numbers of the concessions on the north and south sides, and the numbers of the lots on the east and west sides. The posts between one and two, three and four, five and six, seven and eight, nine and ten, eleven and twelve, are in the concession lines forty chains west from the east boundary of one, three, five, seven, nine and eleven, and are marked with the number of the concession on the north side only, and the number of the lots on the east and west side.

The east boundary, part of the south, and most of the north, run through old brule', now covered thickly with jack pine scrub. The country immediately north and west of Silver Lake has been run over by fire, not sufficiently fierce to kill all the timber, there still being good scattered green norway pine through it. There is also scattered norway pine of good quality through the green timber more westerly, as shown on the timber map. The burnt lands extend about one-half mile westerly from Silver Lake. There is considerable scattered tie timber through that part of the township, shown dotted red on the tie plan, some of the tamarac is large, long and straight, and is valuable for pile timber. The portions not dotted are covered on the rocks with small jack pine and spruce. In the valleys poplar, spruce and jack pine grow on the clay soil, and birch, jack pine and poplar on the sandy loam. Outside of the township north of the northwest corner east

of Deacon is some very good norway pine, how far it extends I cannot say. There are a few trees inside the township.

About fifty to sixty-five per cent. of lots five, six, seven, eight, nine, ten, eleven, twelve, in the 1st, second, third, fourth and fifth concessions, three and four in the first, second and fourth concessions, and eight, nine, ten and eleven in the sixth concession is good tillable land. Lot one is rocky and poor soil all through, the other lots have patches of good soil, probably thirty per cent. of good land.

The soil, where marked clay, clay loam, and sandy loam, is of good quality, and well suited for farming purposes, along the streams where it is swampy, and might be wet in the spring, will be the best of land when drained, the breaking up of some of the old beaver dams would do much towards draining it.

The streams are mostly very sluggish and shallow, with very little current, the beaver dams, of which there are several, having flooded them, the exceptions are the outlet from Crystal Bay to Northeast Bay, which is quite rapid, but not large enough for any great power, and is altogether inside of locations F. M. five and F. M. six, a stream which empties into Silver Lake about forty chains west of the east boundary of the township, and one crossing the north boundary about thirty-five chains east of Deacon Lake.

The whole of the township is dotted with lakes, most of them being good, clear water, Silver Lake and Crystal Bay being beautiful sheets of clear water. Silver Lake, Crystal Bay and Black Sturgeon Lake, and Bear Lake, are well adapted for summer residences, and, with proper facilities, making them easy of access, there is no reason why they should not be utilized for that purpose in the near future. There is said to be a good sand beach on the north shore of Silver Lake about two miles east of the township, which is over a mile in length, and on the east shore of Crystal Bay, though not a sand beach, the water is very shallow, with a good sandy bottom. There are trout, maskinonge, pickerel and other fish in Silver Lake and Crystal Bay.

We saw innumerable moose and caribou tracks, and small game is fairly plentiful, bears, wolves and foxes abound, and the red deer of Minnesota and Old Ontario has found its way into this District. There are also fresh beaver houses on Jay Lake and D. C. Lake.

The whole of the rock, wherever I saw it, is a read granitoid, with no appearance of mineral, except on the shores of Northwest Bay location J. C. forty-four, where what is called the "striped rock" or "painted rock" occurs carrying mineral, apparently iron pyrites and small quantities of graphite, of which I did not get a sample, and a band of dark rock running nearly or about north seventy degrees east, probably curving more to the north in the easterly part of the township. I enclose a sample marked A taken nine chains west from the southeast corner of lot nine in the third concession, also four small pieces brought in by one of the men from the north shore of Lake Landon, marked B.

I had a great deal of trouble with the lakes in the early winter, when they were frozen over near the shore and open in the middle, so that we could neither canoe nor walk across them.

I think there is not enough timber in any one place to pay to put in lumbermens' camps, but the settlers could take out permits, and cut it, and, by following the valleys, and in some places going round rocky obstacles, roads could be made to get it all safely out.

There are no clearings or improvements on any of the lots, and on none of the mining locations, except McA., three hundred and five, a clearing

with buildings on it near the lake shore. A small patch has been chopped on McA. three hundred and six, but not cleared, and is now grown up with scrub.

I moved iron post to southwest corner of McA. three hundred and five, and marked on southeast side "Pettypiece."

APPENDIX No. 22.

MERIDIAN LINE,

DISTRICT OF RAINY RIVER.

LISTOWEL, Ontario, December 15th, 1905.

SIR,—I have the honor to report that in pursuance of your instructions, dated at the City of Toronto, on the twelfth day of June, A.D. nineteen hundred and five, to survey a meridian line north from the Canadian Pacific Railway to the southeast angle of the township of Smellie, being between the townships numbers thirty-seven and thirty-eight, in the Rainy River District, I left the town of Listowel in the month of July, A.D. nineteen hundred and five, proceeding by Grand Trunk Railway to Owen Sound, thence by steamer to Fort William, thence by Canadian Pacific Railway to the village of Dryden, at which place I purchased supplies and engaged the balance of my staff. Leaving that point I proceeded by Canadian Pacific Railway, and, through the kindness of their officials, I was landed with my party and supplies at a point between the sidings of Barnwel and Gilbert, at my starting point, namely, the iron post planted by Ontario Land Surveyor E. Stewart, on the northerly limit of the right of way of the Canadian Pacific Railway, between the townships numbers thirty-seven and thirty-eight. I first of all straightened up the iron and wooden posts and built some rocks around them to make them more permanent before commencing the survey. I took two observations on Polaris in order to get the proper bearing to run the said meridian line, and at the distance of thirty-two chains and fifty links I planted a wooden post six inches square, marking it on the south side thus, "II M." continuing the meridian line due north astronomically, putting in good substantial wooden posts at each mile, until arriving at the south side of a lake at the distance of the fifth mile plus forty six chains and eighty one links. I then produced the meridian line across the lake, triangulating the distance across, and planting a wooden post six inches square and an iron post alongside of it at the distance of thirty chains and thirty-nine links north of the six mile point. The posts were marked "I" on west side and "I" on north side, being the lot and concession, respectively, in the township of Smellie.

The land on either side of the meridian is not fit for cultivation, being rocky and swampy, with the exception of a strip commencing a few chains north of the creek crossing the meridian in the second mile, the strip being in width about half a mile, and appeared to stretch some distance east and west of the line. The soil is clay loam with more or less sand mixed therein. The land is gently rolling, and easily cleared, the timber being small.

There is very little timber of any value, a few trees of jack pine and tamarac for tie timber. The timber had been culled out some years before, and the fire has since destroyed most of the balsam.

APPENDIX No. 23.

TOWNSHIP OF CHEWETT,

DISTRICT OF ALGOMA.

TORONTO, Ontario, December 18th, 1905.

SIR,—I have the honor to submit the following report of the survey of the township of Chewett, performed under instructions from your Department, dated May thirty-first, nineteen hundred and five.

I commenced the survey of this township at the southwest angle, which had been previously established by running a line north astronomically eighteen miles from the southeast angle of township number twenty-seven, as laid out along the right of way of the Canadian Pacific Railway, east of Chapleau, and where an iron post three feet long and one and seven-eighths inches in diameter was planted on the south side of a cedar post eight inches square, and each was marked "XVIII M" on south side, "Chewett" on the northeast side, "Con. I" on the north side, "Gamey" on the southeast side, and "XII," for the number of the lot, on the east side. From this point I ran the south boundary of the township, where I planted an iron post one and seven-eighths inches in diameter, and three feet long, marking it as follows:— On the north side "Con. I," on the west side "I," for the number of the lot, and on the northwest side "Chewett." The east boundary was run north astronomically from this point, and an iron post of similar dimensions to those described above was planted at the northeast angle of the township, marked "Chewett" on the southwest side, "Collins" on the northwest side, "Con. VI" on the south side, "Con. I" on the north side, and "I," for the number of the lot on the west side. An iron post of similar dimensions was also planted at the intersection of the north boundary with the high water mark on the east shore of Trout Lake, and marked "Chewett," "Con. VI," on south sides, "Collins," "Con. I," on north side, and "X," for the number of the lot, on the east side.

Posts of the most durable timber obtainable were planted forty chains on the south boundary except where this point occurred in a lake, and at every eighty chains on the east boundary. From this base the township was subdivided into lots and concessions in the usual way. Posts were planted at the front angles of all lots and marked in accordance with the instructions. In addition to the iron posts already mentioned, iron posts one and one-quarter inches in diameter and three feet long were planted at the following points: At the intersection of the line between lots six and seven with the south and north boundaries of the township, at the intersection of the line between concessions three and four with the east boundary of the township, and with the line between lots six and seven. These were marked according to the angles of the lots they were intended to define, and were planted on the south side of the wooden posts.

PHYSICAL FEATURES.

The township, as a whole, is a gently rolling country, the only hills being in the southwest part, where the Nemegosenda and Loon Rivers empty into Trout Lake. About one-half the land area is composed of level swampy ground, and the other half is of slightly higher altitude, ascending and descending in gradual slopes from and to the swampy areas.

The township is accessible from Chapleau on the Canadian Pacific Railway by means of a good canoe route through a chain of lakes and Loon River into Trout Lake, which lake forms a portion of the west boundary.

TIMBER.

A recent fire has swept over the north part of this township and destroyed the timber except in a few isolated small areas. The south half is well timbered with spruce, dead tamarac and cedar on the lower ground and with banksian pine, poplar and birch on the higher land. A good quantity of the spruce, birch, poplar and banksian pine will measure over twelve inches and up to twenty inches in diameter. The banksian pine will make good tie timber, and the spruce is valuable for pulpwood. A few white and red pine trees are growing on lot nine, concession one, west and north of Portage Lake, and will average eighteen or twenty inches in diameter.

SOIL AND ROCK.

The soil is sandy, but in some areas where the poplar and birch grow is more of a sandy loam though the land is generally stony in these areas. A fair estimate would be that forty per cent. of the land is suitable for agricultural purposes. The balance of the area is not rough but the soil is too poor and stony to be adapted for agriculture.

The country rock is granite and the only exposures noticeable are along the shores of Trout Lake. No minerals of value were found during the survey.

WATER AND WATER POWERS.

The township is well watered with small streams and a few lakes. The watershed is to the north and west. The Nemegosenda and Loon Rivers parallel each other in their course through the southwest portion of the

township and empty into Trout Lake in a similar manner by a rapid descent for a mile or more. Above these rapids the rivers are very winding and the current less than a mile per hour.

On Loon River for the distance of one mile from the mouth there is an estimated fall of one hundred feet with a volume of five thousand one hundred and fifty cubic feet per minute during the month of August, capable of being developed into nine hundred and eighty horsepower, and I would recommend that the following land be reserved for the use of this water privilege:—

The southwest quarter of lot eleven, concession three.

The east one-quarter of lot twelve, concession three.

The north half of lot eleven, concession two.

On Nemegosenda River for a distance of one mile from its mouth there is also a fall of one hundred feet with a volume of fifteen thousand cubic feet per minute during the month of August, capable of being developed into two thousand eight hundred horsepower.

The south half of lots nine and ten in the fourth concession should be reserved for this privilege. Good banks for reservoir purposes exist in both cases.

There is also a smaller power on the Nemegosenda River on north half of lot eight, concession three, where there is a small fall of twenty-five feet. This might be used upon development as an auxiliary power to the last mentioned one, and the southwest quarter of lot eight, concession four, should be reserved in addition to the north half of lot eight, concession three for this development.

GAME AND FISH.

Moose, caribou and red deer inhabit this section of the country, though not numerous. Speckled trout, perch and pike are found in the rivers and also in Perch Lake.

Whitefish, large lake trout, pike and pickerel are plentiful in Trout Lake.

Accompanying this report I forward plan and field notes of the survey which I hope will be found satisfactory.

TOWNSHIP OF CRAWFORD, DISTRICT OF ALGOMA.

PETERBOROUGH, Ontario, November 29th, 1905.

SIR:—I have the honor to submit the following report on the survey of the township of Crawford, in the District of Algoma, performed under

instructions from your Department, dated May thirty-first, A.D., nineteen hundred and five.

As instructed, I commenced the survey at the northeast angle of the township of Prosser, from which point, after having taken the necessary observations, etc., I ran west astronomically six miles, giving the lots along this line a uniform width of forty chains. I then ran each alternate side line and the west boundary north astronomically from the proper points on this line.

From the southeast angle of the township I chained north along Mr. Patten's meridian line which forms the east boundary of Crawford, and as my chaining on this line agreed with that of Mr. Patten's, I adopted his mile posts, from which points I ran the several concession lines west astronomically.

On the iron post at the northeast angle of the township, I marked Crawford on the northwest side, Con. I on the north side, Lot I on the west side. On the iron post one and seven-eighth inches in diameter planted by me at the southwest angle of the township, I marked Crawford on the northeast side, Con. I on the north side, Lot XII on the east side.

On the iron post at the northeast angle of the township, I marked Crawford on the southwest side, Con. VI on the south side, Lot I on the west side. On the iron post one and seven-eighth inches in diameter planted at the northwest angle of the township, I marked Crawford on the southeast side, Con. VI on the south side, Lot XII on the east side. On the iron post planted at the intersection of concession line three and four with the east boundary, I marked Con. IV on the north side, Con. III on the south side, Lot I on the west side.

Iron posts one and one-quarter inches in diameter and three feet long were also planted by me as follows:—One at the intersection of side line six and seven with the south boundary, marked Con. I on the north side, Lot VI on the east side, Lot VII on the west side. One at the intersection of side line six and seven with concession line three and four, marked Con. IV on the north side, Con. III on the south side, Lot VI on the east side, Lot VII on the west side. One at the intersection of side line six and seven with the north boundary, marked Con. VI on the south side, Lot VI on the east side, Lot VII on the west side, and one at the intersection of concession line three and four with the west boundary marked Con. IV on the north side, Con. III on the south side, Lot XII on the east side.

The township of Crawford is generally level or gently undulating, timbered chiefly with spruce from two to ten inches in diameter, dead and decaying tamarac of about the same size. Scattered here and there are clumps of mixed bush consisting of spruce, poplar, white birch and balsam of an average size. In some places there is a dense growth of alder and willow. There is also throughout the township considerable windfall.

As will be noticed by the plans, there is a considerable area in the southerly portion of the township that has been destroyed by fire. This is now grown up with alder and willow and poplar in some places.

About seventy per cent. of this township is well adapted for settlement, the soil being a rich black loam from eight to twelve inches in depth, free from stone, with good clay sub-soil. The remaining thirty per cent. is swampy in character, but the soil is rich and free from stone, and as nearly all these swamps have a considerable elevation and are traversed by numerous creeks with good current, they will be very easily drained. On the whole I would consider fully eighty-five per cent. of the township suitable for settlement.

Although there is only one small lake situated on lots six and seven, concessions one and two, the township is well watered by numerous fine clear creeks with good current. There are no out-croppings of rock in the township and no traces of minerals were discovered, but local magnetic disturbances were unfrequent.

Wild raspberries, strawberries and currants were very abundant and matured early in the season.

Evidences of moose and otter were frequently seen.

There are no settlers or improvements in the township.

I beg to submit also the plans and field notes, all of which I trust will be found satisfactory.

APPENDIX No. 25.

TOWNSHIP OF MAHAFFY,

DISTRICT OF ALGOMA.

PETERBOROUGH, Ontario, November 29th, 1905.

SIR,—The instructions to me from your Department dated 31st May, 1905, to survey the township of Crawford, also gave me authority to survey the township of Mahaffy, which lies immediately west of Crawford.

I commenced the survey at the southeast angle of the township by running the south boundary west astronomically to its intersection with Mr. Niven's meridian line surveyed this season. To all the lots on the south boundary I gave a uniform width of forty chains, with the exception of lots numbers two, three and twelve. Lot twelve owing to the convergence of meridians has a deficiency. Lots two and three, aggregate eighty chains on the south boundary. I thought it best, however, to let the Mattagama River form the boundary line between these lots through concessions one and two, I therefore did not run the side line between lots two and three through concessions one and two. The other side lines I ran north astronomically from the south boundary.

I gave the first five concessions a uniform depth of eighty chains on the east boundary and ran all the concession lines west astronomically.

On the iron posts at the southwest angle of the township I marked Mahaffy on the northwest side, Lot I on the west side. I had already marked Con. I on the north side. On the iron post planted at the northeast angle of the township, I marked Mahaffy on the southwest side, Lot I on the west side. I had already marked Con. VI on the south side. On the iron post planted by me at the southwest angle of the township, I marked Mahaffy on the northeast side, Con. I on the north side, Lot XII on the east side. The iron post at the northwest angle of the township was planted by Mr. Niven, and marked Crawford on the southeast side, Con. VI on the south side, Lot XII on the west side. Iron posts one and one-quarter inches in diameter and three feet long were planted by me as follows:—One at the intersection of concession line three and four with the east boundary marked Con. IV on the north side, Con. III on the south side,

Lot I on the west side. One at the intersection of side lines six and seven with the south boundary, marked Con. I on the north side, Lot VI on the east side, Lot VII on the west side. One at the intersection of side lines six and seven with concession line three and four, marked Con. IV on the north side, Con. III on the south side, Lot VI on the east side, Lot VII on the west side. One at the intersection of side line six and seven with the north boundary, marked Con. VI on the south side, Lot VI on the east side, Lot VII on the west side, and one at the intersection of concession line three and four with the west boundary marked Con. VI on the north side, Con. III on the south side, Lot XII on the east side.

The most noticeable feature in the township of Mahaffy is the Mattagama River, which enters it on lots two and three, concession one, and flows in a northerly and northwesterly direction, leaving the township on lots eight and nine, concession six. It is a fine clear stream with good current and an average and almost uniform width of six or eight chains, the depth being from five to fifteen feet, clay banks from four to six feet, with vegetation as a rule to the water's edge. The only falls occur at what is known as "Sturgeon Portage" on lots two and three, concession two. Here the river has a drop of fifteen feet four inches in a distance of six chains. I made a careful survey and estimate of the power available at this point, which I found to be two thousand two hundred and seventy-two horsepower, particulars of which will be found in the traverse notes. Rapids of slight descent occur below the falls on concessions two and three. The township is also watered by several fine clear creeks.

On each side of the river and for about a half mile inland the land is rolling in character, timbered with large spruce, poplar, birch and balsam, with a dense growth of willow and considerable windfall. The other portions of the township are generally level or gently undulating, timbered with spruce, dead tamarac, poplar, birch, balsam and cedar. This timber as a rule is under twelve inches in diameter. There is also in some places a dense growth of underbrush. A small *brulé* of about seven hundred acres in extent occurs on lots one, two and three, concessions two and three.

About seventy-five per cent. of this township is good rich black loam from eight to twelve inches in depth and free from stone, with clay sub-soil, the remaining area is swampy but can be easily drained. On the whole, I would consider eighty-five per cent. will be found suitable for cultivation.

There is only one small outcropping of rock (Huronian), this is at "Sturgeon Portage" on lot two, concession two.

No traces of minerals were discovered. The magnetic variation was fairly constant at eight degrees thirty minutes west.

Wild fruit, especially raspberries, were very plentiful.

The usual kinds of fish, game, etc., common to this section of Ontario are fairly abundant.

There are no settlers or improvements in the township.

Trusting this report with the accompanying plans, field notes and traverse notes of the survey will be found satisfactory to the Department

TOWNSHIP OF WARK,

DISTRICT OF ALGOMA.

TORONTO, Ontario, November 22nd, 1905

SIR,—I have the honor herewith to submit the following report of the survey of the township of Wark, in the District of Algoma, which survey was made by myself acting under instructions from your department, dated thirty-first of May, nineteen hundred and five.

I had my party and outfit at Biscotasing Station on the Canadian Pacific Railroad intending to transport myself and outfit by freight from there to Metagama Station, a distance of seventeen miles easterly, but the difficulty and no doubt of getting a freight train within reasonable time was so great that I started in canoes direct from Biscotasing. Leaving Biscotasing on the morning of the twenty-third of June under the guidance of Mr. J. E. T. Armstrong, Manager of the Hudson Bay Store at Biscotasing, we followed a southeasterly arm of Biscotasing Lake to a point where it comes very close to the Canadian Pacific Railway tracks about six miles southeasterly from Biscotasing. Here Mr. Armstrong left me, thence over a portage about five chains in length over the railway to a small lake about three quarters of a mile across, from the northeasterly end of this lake a portage of about three quarters of a mile was made into the west branch of the Spanish River, this I followed easterly until it intersected, at the mouth of the lost channel, the regular route from Metagama to Metagami Post, making three short portages over falls and rapids on the Spanish River. The remainder of this route has been so well described in former reports that it is unnecessary for me to enlarge upon it.

On the third of July, I reached a small river entering the Metagami River on the right about four miles north from the portages from the Metagami River to the Percupine River. I succeeded with some difficulty in getting about four miles up the river, I then cut a trail easterly to Ontario Land Surveyor T. B. Speight's meridian of nineteen hundred and three. From this point to the southwest corner of the township of Wark is five and a quarter miles over which I packed my supplies.

I began work on the township of Wark on the twelfth of July, and surveyed according to my instructions. Running the side lines due north astronomically between alternate lots and the concession line due west astronomically one mile apart. I also planted iron posts one and one-quarter inches in diameter and three feet in length, according to my instructions, at the following corners: On the line between concessions three and four on the east boundary of the township marked as follows, "Con. IV" on the north side, "Con. III" on the south side and "I" on the west side. On the line between concessions three and four where the same is intersected by the side line between lots six and seven, marked as follows: "Con. IV" on the north, "Con. III" on the south, "Lot 6" on the east and "Lot 7" on the west. On the line between concessions three and four at its intersection with the west boundary of the township marked as follows: "Con. IV" on the north, "Con. III" on the south, "Lot 12" on the east. On the side line between lots six and seven at its intersection with the north boundary of the township marked as follows: "Con. VI" on the south side, "Lot 6" on the east, "Lot 7" on the west. Wooden posts six inches square and five feet long of the most durable wood obtainable in the vicinity were planted at the front

angles of every lot and marked as follows: Posts on the east boundary of the township were marked "Lot 1" on the west side and on the north and south sides with the number of the adjoining concessions on the north and south sides. Posts on the west boundary of the township were marked "lot 12" on the east side and on the north and south sides with the numbers of the adjoining concessions on the north and south side. Posts on the south boundary of the township were marked "Con. 1" on the north side, and on the east and west sides with the number of the adjoining lot on the east and west sides. Posts on the north boundary of the township were marked "Con. VI" on the south side and on the east and west sides with the number of the adjoining lot on the east and west side. In the interior of the township all posts were marked with the proper lot number on the east and west sides, and those planted at the lines between lots two and three, four and five, six and seven, eight and nine, ten and eleven, were also marked on the north and south sides, with the numbers of the adjoining concession on the north and south sides; while those planted between lots one and two, three and four, five and six, seven and eight, nine and ten, eleven and twelve, were marked with the concession number on the north side only. At each corner of the township is an iron post one and seven-eighth inches in diameter and three feet long pointed at the bottom and forged at the top. That at the northeast corner of the township was planted by Ontario Land Surveyors Cavana and Watson in nineteen hundred and four, and is marked as follows: On the east side "XII", on the south side "Con. VI", on the west side, "Lot 1", on the southeast side "Gowan", on the southwest side "Wark." That at the southeast corner of the township is marked as follows: On the east side "XII", on the north side "Con. I", on the west side "I", on the west side "VI M." On the northeast side "Gowan", on the northwest side "Wark." That at the southwest corner of the township as follows. On the north side "Con. I", on the east side "XII", on the west side "I", on the south side "VI M", on the north east side "Wark", on the southeast "Murphy", on the northwest "Kidd". At the northwest corner of the township is marked as follows: On the north side "Con. I," on the east side, "XII", on the north side "Prosser", on the northeast "Wark", Bearing trees were in all cases marked and their position noted with regard to the several posts.

GENERAL FEATURES OF THE TOWNSHIP.

The whole township is moderately level and completely covered with timber of some sort, clay being the most prevalent soil. Three small clear lakes were encountered. All the township with perhaps the exception of a portion of the northeast corner is capable of being easily drained.

MINERALS.

Rock in site was encountered in only one place, namely,—on the south boundary of lots four and five in concession one, it is Huronian and evidently of a schistose character and has been reported on by T. B. Speight who ran the base line in nineteen hundred and three. This is the only country rock seen in the township.

SOIL.

Practically all the soil is clay or clay loam. A small ridge of quartz sand was encountered which took in a small portion on the south one half of lot eleven, concession two, and the north one half of lot eleven, concession one.

TIMBER.

The centre and northeastern portion of the township consisting of lots one, two, three and four, and the easterly half of lot five, concession six, the northerly one half of lots one and two and practically all of lots three, four and five, in concession five, lots five, eight and nine, and the southerly one half of lots six and seven, in concession four, lots eight, nine and ten, and the northerly one half of lot seven, in concession three, is covered with a light growth of scrub, spruce and tamarac, growing on a heavy growth of moss. This portion of the township is absolutely level, but at least part of it could be drained with some trouble, a clay soil would then be disclosed. The remainder of the township is covered with a heavy growth of spruce and tamarac averaging about seven inches in diameter. Interspersed here and there are low ridges, growing spruce average ten inches in diameter, poplar average twelve inches diameter, white birch average eight inches diameter, balsam and balm of gilead. A few banksian pine were found in lots ten and eleven, concession one and two, these averaging about fourteen inches diameter.

WATER.

Three small lakes were encountered, one about seventeen acres in area in the south half of lot eleven, concession one, one of about eighteen acres in lots ten and eleven, concession one, and one of about six in lots ten and eleven, concession three. All these lakes are of good clear water and are spring fed.

The north branch of the Porcupine River flows through lots two, three, four, five and six, concession one, and lots five and six concession two. Within the township this stream averages about sixteen links wide and about fifteen inches deep with a slow current. It is unnavigable within the township. This stream flows into the main branch of the Porcupine River and thence into Moose Lake on the southeast.

GAME.

At the time of the year I visited the township game was not seen in large quantities though many traces were seen of mink, martin, and some otter. A few tracks of moose and occasional tracks of red deer were seen. One large wolf track was seen. Caribou, at one time plentiful, had been driven northward by the wolves which later I am told, first entered the country about twelve or fifteen years ago. Beaver were at one time plentiful but had practically all been killed by the Indian trappers. Ruffed Grouse and black (or spruce) partridge were seen in small numbers. Rabbits were scarce. There were no waters containing fish.

Accompanying this report is a general plan, a timber plan, and the full notes of the survey of the township.

TOWNSHIP OF KIDD.

DISTRICT OF ALGOMA.

TORONTO, Ontario, November 22nd, 1905.

SIR, I have the honor herewith to submit the following report on the survey of the Township of Kidd, in the District of Algoma, as executed by me during the season of nineteen hundred and five, under instructions from your Department dated thirty-first of May, nineteen hundred and five.

The township is bounded on the north by the township of Carnegie, on the east by the township of Wark, the survey of which formed a part of the instructions referred to, on the south and west by unsurveyed Crown Lands.

I commenced the survey of the township by running the south boundary due west astronomically from a point marked by an iron and a wooden post planted by Ontario Land Surveyor T. B. Speight, in nineteen hundred and three, marked as follows: "XII M" on the south side, "Murphy" on the southeast side, "Wark" on the northeast side, "Con. I" on the southeast side, "XII" on the east side.

I then ran the west boundary of the township due north astronomically from the end of my south boundary intersecting Ontario Land Surveyor A. Niven's base line of nineteen hundred and five, at a point distant ninety-seven links west from an iron post one and seven-eighth inches in diameter and a wooden post both marked "VI M" on the west side.

Iron posts one and seven-eighth inches in diameter and three feet long were planted by me at the southwest and northwest corners of the township and marked as follows: That at the northwest corner of the township was marked "Kidd" on the southwest side, "Con. VI" on the south side, "XII" on the east side. The post at the southwest corner was marked "Kidd" on the northwest side, "Con. I" on the north side, "XII" on the east side. An iron post one and seven-eighth inches in diameter was planted at the northeast corner of the township by Ontario Land Surveyor A. Niven, nineteen hundred and five, and marked as follows: "Kidd" on the southwest side, "Carnegie" on the northwest and "I" on the west. Iron posts one and one-quarter inches in diameter were planted at the middle of the south, west, and north boundaries and one in the centre of the township. In addition to the iron posts above mentioned, wooden posts of the most durable wood obtainable in the vicinity were planted at the front angles of every lot and marked for the various concessions and lots which they are intended to define. I then proceeded in the usual manner to divide the township into lots of forty chains by eighty chains, of three hundred and twenty acres. Bearing trees, where available, were marked and noted. All lines were run north astronomically or west astronomically.

GENERAL FEATURES.

The surface of the Township of Kidd as a whole is gentle rolling and contains numerous creeks which provide excellent means for draining off the surplus water from the more level parts back from the creeks. Only in the northern part of the township is there any land that is at all inclined to be broken and then it is only the high banks of the creeks.

TIMBER.

About two-thirds of the whole township is covered with standing timber consisting of spruce, tamarac, poplar and white birch and an occasional cedar. Much of this timber would make ties or pulpwood.

Brulé of at least two years of age covers the south half of lot five and practically all of lots six, seven, eight, nine and ten, in concession six, the south half of lot three, the north half of lot nine and all of lots four, five, six, seven and eight in concession five, the north half of lot eight and most of lots three and seven and all of lots four, five and six, in concession four, the north half of lots three and four, the east half of lot seven, and all of lots five and six in concession three, the greater parts of lots five and six in concession two, and the north half of lot five, in concession one.

SOIL.

The whole of the township contains excellent clay or clay loam soil which should make excellent agricultural land. The fact that the roots of the trees do not penetrate to any distance into the clay, but spread out on top of the clay through the top layer of black loam in decayed vegetable matter make the surface very easily cleared. This added to the good facilities for drainage which this township possesses through its numerous creeks, should make this one of the finest townships for agriculture I have seen in the surrounding districts.

MINERALS.

No bed rock was seen, therefore, no economic minerals but clay for bricks was seen.

FRUITS.

Red and black currants, raspberries and other ordinary wild fruits were very plentiful.

WATER.

As I stated before in an earlier part of this report the township is well watered and drained by several creeks throughout the township. The location of these creeks can be seen on the accompanying map. Only one lake was encountered in the township, namely, a small lake of about thirty acres area in lot eight, concessions three and four.

GAME.

Traces of moose, bear, mink and martin were found in considerable numbers. Beaver cutting and dams were most plentiful; on most of the creeks a beaver dam occurred on an average of every one hundred yards. Most of these dams were old, but an occasional one had lately been repaired. No waters large enough to contain fish were in the township.

Accompanying this report are a general plan, a timber plan and field notes of the entire survey.

TOWNSHIP OF GAMEY.

DISTRICT OF ALGOMA.

EGANVILLE, Ontario, December 15th 1905.

SIR, I have the honor to submit the following report of the survey of the township of Gamey, in the District of Algoma, made under instructions from your department dated May thirty-first, nineteen hundred and five.

This township is bounded on the west by the township of Borden, which I surveyed this summer, on the north by the township of Chewett surveyed by Ontario Land Surveyor L. V. Rorke, and on the east and south by the unsurveyed lands of the crown.

The township can best be reached by the canoe and portage route from the village of Chapleau, on the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway, through the southerly part of the township of Cochrane into Loon Lake, thence across this lake, passing south of the large island on the south boundary of said township, to a small lagoon on the east shore, separated from Loon Lake, in low water only, by a narrow sand bar. From this lagoon there is a chain of lakes and portages to a creek emptying into the Nemesosenda River at a point about two miles due south of south boundary of the township of Borden. This river enters the township of Gamey near its southwest corner, and is navigable by canoes, only one small rapids intervening between mouth of creek and south boundary of township.

I commenced my survey as instructed at the twelve mile post planted by Ontario Land Surveyor L. V. Rorke, making this the southwest corner of the township, and marking posts in accordance with instructions. From this post I ran a chord of latitude six miles east, planting wooden posts every half mile, with iron posts where instructions called for them, marking them all in manner required. From the easterly end of this six mile chord I ran the east boundary due north astronomically and struck the post planted by L. V. Rorke for the southeast corner of the township of Chewett.

The subdivision was performed in accordance with your instructions by running side lines north astronomically from the mile posts planted on the south boundary, the concession lines were run east from the mile posts planted by L. V. Rorke on the west boundary, care being taken to plant posts properly marked and using most durable wood that could be secured. Iron posts were planted where instructions called for them and marked as follows:

I found an iron post one and seven-eighth inches in diameter marked "XII M" on north side, this being at the southwest corner of the township, I marked it "Con. I" on north side, "Gamey" on northeast side, and "XII" on east side.

I planted an iron post one and one-quarter inches in diameter on the south boundary between lots six and seven, concession one, marked "VII" on west side "Con. I" on the north side and "VI" on the east side, also an iron post one and seven-eighth inches in diameter at southeast corner of township, marked "Con. I" on north side, "Gamey" on northwest side and "I" on west side.

I found an iron post one and one-quarter inches in diameter marked "XV M" on south side, this being the intersection of line between concessions three and four with west boundary of township, I marked it "Con. IV" on north side, "XII" on east side and "Con. III" on south side. I planted an

iron post one and one-quarter inches in diameter at the intersection of line between concessions three and four with line between lots six and seven, marked "Con. III" on south, "VI" on east; "Con. IV" on north and "VII" on west side, also an iron post one and one-quarter inches in diameter, at intersection of line between concessions three and four with east boundary, marked "Con. III" on south, "I" on west and "Con. IV" on north side.

I found an iron post one and seven-eighth inches in diameter at north-west corner of township marked "XVIII M" on south side; "XII" on east, "Chewett" on northeast, "Con. I" on north, "McGee" on northwest, "I" on west, "Borden" on southwest side, to which I added "Gamey" on northeast side. This post is at the corner of the four townships.

I planted an iron post at intersection of line between lots six and seven with south boundary of township of Chewett, marked "Con. VI" on south, "VI" on east, and "VII" on west side, also planted an iron post one and seven-eighth inches in diameter at northeast corner of the township, marked "Con. VI" on south, "Gamey" on southwest, "I" on west, this is also the southeast corner of the township of Chewett established by Ontario Land Surveyor L. V. Rorke.

The magnetic needle varies about four degrees and twenty minutes west of the astronomic north. Bearings of traverse lines shown in field notes are magnetic, unless otherwise mentioned.

The surface is chiefly undulating, with considerable areas of spruce swamp and many small lakes, with occasional hills or ridges which rarely exceed forty feet in height.

The soil is mostly sandy and stony, and, in my opinion, is too light to make good farm land.

The southeasterly corner is mostly brulé of about five years, on which second growth white birch, poplar and jack pine is growing. The remainder of the township is a heavy growth of spruce, white birch, balsam, poplar and jack pine from four inches to twelve inches in diameter, excepting the swamp lands, where the timber is mainly spruce of good quality, from four inches to twelve inches in diameter, with dry tamarac and cedar scattered throughout. There is some scattered white pine from twelve to eighteen inches in diameter, on lots one and two, concessions three and four.

No indications of economic minerals were seen.

The water in the lakes and streams is generally dark in color, but in a few of the lakes it is quite clear. Most of the lakes are shallow, with low, marshy shores. The River Nemegosenda flows through the southwest and northwest corners of the township, entering on the south boundary of lot twelve, concession one, flowing northeasterly to lot eleven, concession two, where it turns and crosses the west boundary of lot twelve, concession two, into the township of Borden. Again entering the township of Gamey near the southwest corner of lot twelve, concession five, it flows in a northeasterly course, crossing the north boundary near the northwest corner of lot eight. This river averages about forty feet in width, and is very crooked. It flows through a willow and alder marsh from ten to fifteen chains wide, which is flooded in high water, the banks being low. There are no rapids or falls in this township, but the river has a good strong current.

Moose and bear are fairly plentiful, but the fishing is rather poor.

Taken as a whole, I consider this township unsuitable for agricultural purposes, the soil being too light and stony, and, on account of the prevalence of swamps and lakes, it would be difficult to build roads.

I consider the township's chief asset to be spruce pulpwood. Accompanying this report are a general plan, timber plan and field notes.

TOWNSHIP OF SMELLIE.

DISTRICT OF RAINY RIVER.

LISTOWEL, Ontario, December 15th, 1905.

SIR.—I have the honor to report that in pursuance of your instructions, dated at the City of Toronto on the twelfth day of June, A.D. nineteen hundred and five, to survey the township of Smellie, in the Rainy River District, I left the town of Listowel on the eighteenth day of July, A.D. nineteen hundred and five, proceeding by Grand Trunk Railway to Owen Sound, thence by steamer to Fort William, thence to the village of Dryden, by Canadian Pacific Railway, at which place I purchased my supplies and engaged the balance of my staff, leaving that point on the twenty-second day of July, A.D. nineteen hundred and five, per Canadian Pacific Railway and, through the kindness of the officials of that road, I was landed with my party and supplies at a point between the sidings of Barnwell and Gilbert, being my starting place, namely, the iron post planted by Ontario Land Surveyor Stewart on the northerly limit of the right of way of the Canadian Pacific Railway, and on the boundary between townships thirty-seven and thirty-eight. I first of all straightened up the post and built some rocks round it, making it more permanent. Before commencing the survey I took two observations on Polaris in order to get the proper bearing to run the meridian line between townships thirty-seven and thirty-eight, and at the distance of thirty-two chains and fifty-four links north of the Canadian Pacific Railway I planted a wooden post six inches square, marking it on the south side thus, "II M." Continuing the meridian line due north astronomically, putting in good substantial posts at each mile until arriving at the south side of a lake at the distance of the fifth mile plus forty-six chains and eighty-one links. I then produced the meridian line across the lake, triangulating the distance across, and planted a spruce post six inches square and the iron post alongside of it on the north shore of the lake, marking both posts thus: north side "I," west side "I," northwest side "Smellie." They being situate thirty chains and thirty-nine links north of the southeast angle of the said township of Smellie from this point, I produced the same meridian line north astronomically for the east boundary of the township of Smellie, from which I ran the north and south boun-

daries and the concession lines west astronomically, laying off the lots and side lines in accordance with the projected plan accompanying my instructions. I took frequent observations on Polaris during the progress of the survey to enable me to give the lines their proper bearing, also to determine the magnetic variation which I found to vary from seven degrees twenty-five minutes to eight degrees twenty minutes east, often varying materially in two chains' distance, and some times less. Two corners of the township were in lakes. I planted iron and wooden posts on the boundary as close to the corner as practicable, marking them with the proper marks. The smaller iron posts I planted in accordance with my instructions at the points when on land, when the points fell in lakes I then planted them at the nearest points on land, the location of which will be found in the accompanying field notes. The posts were marked as follows:—

The southeast corner of the township being in a lake, I put the iron post, one and seven-eighth inches in diameter, on the north shore of the lake and on the east boundary of the township, and situate at the distance of thirty chains thirty-nine links due north from the southeast angle of the township. I also planted a spruce post six inches square alongside of the iron post, and marked both posts as follows:— On the north side "I," west side "I," northwest side "Smellie."

On the east boundary between concessions three and four I planted an iron post one and one-quarter inches in diameter, and a spruce post six inches square alongside of it, both posts being marked as follows:— South side "III," north side "IV," west side "I."

The northeast corner of the township being in a lake, I planted the iron post, one and seven-eighth inches in diameter, on the south shore of the lake and on the east boundary of the township, and situate at the distance of three chains due south from the northeast angle of the township. I also planted a jack pine post six inches square alongside of it, both posts being marked as follows:— South side "VI," west side "I," southwest side "Smellie."

On the north boundary between lots numbers six and seven I planted an iron post one and one-quarter inches in diameter, and a spruce post six inches square, alongside of it, both posts being marked as follows:— South side "VI," east side "VI," west side "VII."

At the northwest angle of the township I planted an iron post one and seven-eighth inches in diameter, and a tamarac post six inches square, alongside of it, both posts being marked as follows:— On the south side "VI," east side "XII," southeast side "Smellie."

On the west boundary, between concessions three and four, I planted an iron post one and one-quarter inches in diameter, and a jack pine post six inches square alongside of it, both posts being marked as follows:— North side "IV," east side "XII," south side "III."

At the southwest angle of the township I planted an iron post one and seven-eighth inches in diameter, and a tamarac post six inches square, alongside of it, both posts being marked as follows:— East side "XII," north side "I," northeast side "Smellie."

On the south boundary, between lots numbers six and seven, I planted an iron post one and one-quarter inches in diameter, and a jack pine post six inches square, alongside of it, both posts being marked as follows:— On the east side "VI," north side "I," west side "VII."

As the point where the side line between lots numbers six and seven intersect the line between concessions three and four is in a lake, I planted an iron post on the west shore of the lake, and in the line between conces-

sions three and four, and also planted a jack pine post six inches square alongside of it, the said posts being situate at the distance of eleven chains and ninety-four links due west from the intersection of the side line between lots numbers six and seven, and the line between concessions three and four, both posts being marked as follows: North side "IV," south side "III," west side "VII."

All iron posts were marked with cold chisel, and wooden posts with sharp instrument with deep cut marks to insure lasting effect.

The soil in the eastern portion of the township is clay, some places considerably mixed with quicksand. The central and westerly portions are sandy soil, in some places having a clay mixture. The greater part of the township is rocky, and, in many places where the fire has cleared the surface, it is bare rock. In the northeast portion of the township it is very hilly. That part of the township comprising lots numbers seven to twelve, inclusive, in concessions one and two, is burnt over, and a thick undergrowth of jack pine, birch, poplar and wild cherry has sprung up, very little soil there, chiefly rock. There are several other portions of *brulé* in the township, but of not so great extent as this. In the easterly and northerly portions of the township there is considerable good timber, consisting of norway pine, jack pine, spruce, tamarac and poplar. The norway pine is generally of such dimensions as would be suitable to saw into lumber, jack pine and tamarac very suitable for railway tie timber, abundance of spruce and poplar for pulpwood. Some remarkably fine poplar.

During the progress of the survey we did not discover any minerals, but in the burnt districts we found many veins of quartz running through the rocks, but so far as we could see they were barren of minerals. No doubt there are deposits of iron in the township from the fact that the magnetic needle varies so materially all through the township. The principal rocks in the township are granite and gneiss.

The township is very much cut up with lakes, there being a large portion of the township water. The lakes are nearly all connected by streams capable of floating tugs or barges that would materially assist in lumbering. The lakes abound with fish such as maskinonge, pickerel, jack fish, trout and white fish. The water is soft and pure, no limestone.

There is a falls on the stream on lot number thirty-seven, concession one, of about twelve feet. In my field notes I mention the number of inches of water and the rate per hour measured in the stream immediately above the falls. The stream is small, but a dam could easily be thrown across. The banks on either side are solid rock, and quite narrow, about forty feet. By raising the water at this point, say six feet, very little land would be flooded, and there would be a reservoir of from four and a half to five square miles which is at present lakes.

TOWNSHIP OF GALNA.

DISTRICT OF NIPISSING.

WINDSOR, Ontario, December 29th, 1905.

SIR,—In accordance with your instructions received from your Department, dated May thirty-first, nineteen hundred and five, I have completed the survey of the township of Galna, in the District of Nipissing.

I commenced the survey of this township on or about August twenty-eighth, immediately after I finished the survey of the township of Kerrs, and the route, etc., taken to reach the site is given fully in my report on that township.

I commenced the survey from the forty-eighth mile post of Ontario Land Surveyor Galbraith's meridian line, and ran due east astronomically, planting posts every forty chains until I reached the water's edge of Lower Lake Abitibi. I ran the line between lots numbers ten and eleven due north astronomically, and measured it just two miles, when I ran the line between concessions two and three due west until it intersected the small lake on the west boundary, and due east astronomically until it intersected the water's edge of lower Lake Abitibi, planting posts at every forty chains, being careful to have them properly marked as directed in my instructions. From the posts planted on this line I ran the side lines between lots two and three, four and five, six and seven, south until they intersected the water's edge of Lower Lake Abitibi, and north across the remainder of the township. I commenced all other concession lines from Ontario Land Surveyor Galbraith's mile posts, and ran them due east astronomically, planting posts wherever these intersected the side lines, and half mile posts as directed. I also made a transit and chain survey of the water's edge of Lower Lake Abitibi across the whole of the township, and planted posts between lots one and two, three and four, five and six, getting my distance by calculation in the field. Posts were planted and marked as follows:—

An iron post, one and seven-eighth inches in diameter, at the southeast corner of the township, which is also the northeast corner of the township of Kerrs, marked "Con. VI, Kerrs," on the south side, "Con. I," Galna, on north side, "VI" on southwest, "VII" on northwest.

An iron post, one and seven-eighth inches in diameter, at the southwest corner, which is the northwest corner of the township of Kerrs, marked "Moody" on northwest, "Knox" on southwest, "Kerrs" on southwest, and "Galna" on the northeast, planted beside a four-inch spruce post marked "XLVIII M and Con. VI" on south side, "Con. I" on north, and "XII" on east.

At the northwest corner I found a one and seven-eighth inch iron post planted beside a six-inch spruce post, both marked "XXXVI M. 43.12" and "I" on west side, "LIV.M.—1.15 and Con. VI on south," "XII" on east, "Moody" on southwest, "Galna" on southeast.

Where the northern boundary intersects the high water mark of Lower Lake Abitibi I found a one and one-quarter inch iron post planted beside a six-inch black ash post marked "XLII M 9 C" on the west side.

Where the line between lots one and A intersects the north boundary I found a one and one-quarter inch iron post planted beside a six-inch spruce post marked "XLII M" on west side.

Where the line between lots six and seven intersects the north boundary of the township I found a one and one-quarter inch iron post planted beside a six-inch spruce post marked "XXXIX M and VII" on west, "VI" on east, and "Con. VI" on south.

Where the line in front of concession four intersects the high water mark of Lower Lake Abitibi, I planted a one and one-quarter inch iron post beside a six-inch spruce post marked "Con. III" on south, "Con. IV" on north, "A" on northwest, "I" on southwest.

Where the side line in front of the fourth concession intersects the side line between lots six and seven I planted a one and one-quarter inch iron post beside a six-inch spruce post marked "Con. III" on south, "Con. IV" on north, "VI" on east, and "VII" on west.

Where the said line in front of the fourth concession intersects the western boundary I found a one and one-quarter inch iron post planted beside a four-inch spruce post marked "LX M." and Con. III" on south side, "Con. IV" on north side, "XII" on east, "I" on west.

All of these iron posts were three feet long, forged at the top, pointed at the bottom, and painted red.

Generally speaking the soil of this township is a fertile clay or clay loam, with here and there a cranberry marsh or swamp. Along the south boundary from about the centre of lot eight to about the centre of lot eleven the soil is a light sand. This strip of light land is quite narrow in this township, averaging about ten or fifteen chains in width. A large portion of the shore line of Lower Lake Abitibi is covered with boulders, and, in some places, the rock crops out, causing the very irregular shape of the shore line, particularly around lot "A" in the fourth and sixth concessions.

Spruce, white poplar, birch, balsam and tamarac, with a few white and banksian pines on the light or sandy land, constitute the forest of the township. There are a few cedars in some of the swamps, but these are of little or no commercial value. The spruce is nearly all good, clear timber, varying from four to fifteen inches in diameter, with scattering trees up to twenty-four inches in diameter. The larger of these will make good lumber and building timber, while the smaller can be utilized as pulpwood. The white poplar is quite abundant, and from six to twenty-four inches in diameter. The tamarac is nearly all dead. The other kinds of timber are not very abundant, and of little commercial value.

The soil being nearly all clay, there were but few outcroppings of rock in the township, hence I did not observe any economic minerals of importance. There was a little iron in the rock on lot A, concession six, but this was the only sign of minerals of any kind observed.

The east and southeast boundary of this township is formed by the shore line of Lower Lake Abitibi. The Dokis River enters the township from the west at about fifteen chains south of the line between concessions five and six. Thence it flows in a very circuitous course east until it crosses the line between concessions three and four. Thence east and northeast until it crosses the north boundary of the township in lot number five as shown on the plan and field notes. This river varies somewhat in width and depth, but will average about six rods wide and four or five feet deep. There are also small creeks and water courses, nearly all of which empty into the Dokis River, and will give splendid drainage to the land when it becomes settled, cleared up and used for agricultural purposes.

Of the larger game moose, bear and beaver are quite plentiful. Rabbits and partridges are numerous, while mink is found throughout the town-

ship. White fish and pike, of a splendid quality, were taken in the Abitibi Lake.

Currants and raspberries of an excellent quality were found fairly well distributed over the whole township, and blueberries were plentiful on the high land along the southern portion.

The climate, during our stay, was well adapted for farming purposes. The rainfall was small, and frost was noted on the night of September thirteenth, with some light frosts afterwards.

TOWNSHIP OF SMYTH.

DISTRICT OF NIPISSING.

RIDGETOWN, Ontario, December 12th, 1905.

SIR,—I have the honor to submit the following report on the township of Smyth, District of Nipissing, under instructions dated May the thirty-first, nineteen hundred and five.

As soon as possible, after receiving the instructions, I proceeded to the above named township on the Montreal River.

I started operations at the northeast corner of the township of James, which also forms the southeast angle of the township of Smyth. Finding the chainage on the north boundary of James correct, posts were planted alongside of the original ones, and lines run north astronomically between lots two and three, four and five, six and seven, and eight and nine. The concession lines were run west astronomically from the west boundary of the township of Truax, and posts planted at their intersections with the side lines. These posts were marked with the number of the lot on the east and west side, and the concession number on the north and south side, but the posts planted between lots one and two, three and four, etc., were marked with the number of the lot on the east and west side, and the concession number on the north side only. The five iron posts supplied me were properly marked and planted as directed. Iron posts were planted and marked as follows:—

The iron post, one and seven-eighth inches in diameter, three feet long, painted red, pointed at the bottom, forged at the top to shed rain, was planted at the southwest corner of lot number nine in the first concession, marked on the east side "Lot 9," on the north side "Con. I," and on the northeast side "Smyth."

One of the iron posts, one and seven-eighth inches in diameter, painted red, pointed at the bottom, forged at the top to shed rain, was planted on the line between concessions three and four on the Montreal River, marked

on the north side "Con. IV," on the south side "Con. III," and on the east side "lot No. 14," and another of the same dimensions was planted on the same concession line at the intersection of the line between lots six and seven, marked on the north side "Con. IV," on the south side "Con. III," on the east side "lot VI," and on the west side "lot VII," and another of the same dimensions was planted at east boundary marked on the north side "Con. IV," on the south side "Con. III," and on the west side "lot I," and another of the same dimensions was planted on the north boundary between lots six and seven, marked on the east side "Lot VI," on the west side "Lot VII," and on the south side "Con. VI."

Ninety per cent. of the township is rough and rocky, and not well adapted to agriculture, the remaining portion is principally light, sandy soil.

Jack pine, spruce, poplar, balsam, tamarac and cedar were the trees met with, but, owing to their unusually small size, are of little value for milling purposes.

No minerals were found during the progress of the survey, but in many places the attraction of the magnetic needle was great.

The only waters met with, outside of the Elk Lake and the Montreal River, was a small lake in lot three on the second and third concessions.

Frequent observations for azimuth were taken, and the average variation of the compass was found to be eight degrees forty-five minutes west.

A number of moose and red deer were seen during the survey, and fish were very plentiful in Elk Lake.

Accompanying this report are plans, field notes and accounts in triplicate.

TOWNSHIP OF KERRS.

DISTRICT OF NIPISSING.

WINDSOR, Ontario, December 29th, 1905.

SIR,—In accordance with instructions received from your Department, dated May thirty-first, nineteen hundred and five, I have completed the survey of the township of Kerrs, in the District of Nipissing.

I left Windsor on the morning of July fourth, nineteen hundred and five, and arrived at New Liskeard on the evening of July fifth, where I was detained for a few days, owing to my canoes not arriving on time. After getting supplies and men at Klock's Depot, my canoes arrived, and I left Klock's on Monday morning, July tenth, by way of Quinze Lake, Barrier

Lake, Long Lake, Island Lake, Upper Lake, Lake Abitibi and connecting rivers. I arrived in the township of Kerrs on the afternoon of Tuesday, July eighteenth, and, after building a cache for my goods, I at once started to survey and lay out the township as directed.

In surveying this township I commenced all side lines from Ontario Land Surveyor Robertson's mile posts on the south boundary, which posts I found agreed almost exactly with my own measurements, and ran the lines due north from these. The line between concessions one and two I started from my own mile post on the east boundary. All other concession lines were started from Ontario Land Surveyor Speight's and Galbraith's posts, and ran due east.

I made a transit and chain traverse of the shore line of Lake Abitibi from where the same is intersected by the east boundary of the township to the line between the townships of Kerrs and Galna, and I did the same with the Abitibi River clear across the township, filling in the opposite side by Stadia measurements, as shown by the plans and field notes accompanying this, my report. Posts were planted and marked as follows:—

At the southeast angle of the township of Kerrs I found a one and seven-eighth inch iron post set in a cairn of stones, marked "Con. I" on north, "Kerrs" on northwest, "I" on west, "Warden" on southwest, "Milligan on southeast, set beside a six-inch balsam post marked "XII" on east side, "VI" on south side, "VI M" on west side, "Kerr's" on northwest, "Con. I" on north side.

At the southwest corner of the township of Kerrs I found a one and seven-eighth inch iron post marked "XLII M" on south side, "Warden" on southwest, "Kerr's" on northeast, set beside a six-inch spruce post marked "XLII M" on south side, "XII" on east side, "Con. I" on north.

At the northeast corner of the township of Kerrs, which is also the southeast corner of the township of Galna, I planted a one and seven-eighth inch iron post marked "Con. VI," Kerrs, on south side, "Con. I," Galna," on north side, "VI" on southwest, "VII" on northwest.

At the northwest corner of the township of Kerrs, which is also the southwest corner of the township of Galna, I found a one and seven-eighth inch iron post marked "Moody" on northwest, "Knox" on southwest, "Kerr's" on southeast, and "Galna" on northeast, planted beside a four-inch spruce post marked "XLVIII M and Con. VI" on south side, "Con. I" on north, and "XII" on east.

Where the eastern boundary intersects the high water mark of Lower Lake Abitibi I planted a one and seven-eighth inch post beside a five-inch tamarac post, both set in a cairn of stones and marked "Con. V" on south side, "I" on west side.

Where the line in front of the fourth concession intersects the eastern boundary I planted a one and one-quarter inch iron post beside a six-inch pine post marked "Con. III" on south side, "Con. IV" on north side, "I" on west.

Where said line in front of the sixth concession intersects the side line between lots six and seven, I planted a one and one-quarter inch iron post beside a six-inch spruce post marked "Con. III" on south, "Con. IV" on north, "VI" on east, and "VII" on west.

Where said line in front of the fourth concession intersects the western boundary I found a one and one-quarter inch iron post marked "XLV M" on south side, set beside a six-inch spruce post marked "XLV M" and "Con. III" on south side, "Con. IV" on north, "XII" on east side.

Where the side line between lots six and seven intersects the north boundary of the township I planted a one and one-quarter inch iron post beside a six-inch cedar post marked "VI" on east side, "VII" on west side, "Con. VI" on south side.

All of these iron posts were three feet long, forged at the top, pointed at the bottom, and painted red.

Generally speaking the soil of this township is a fertile clay or clay loam, with here and there a small cranberry marsh or swamp. There is quite a high rolling sand or gravel belt, about three-quarters of a mile wide, along the east side of the township, and a rolling, rocky strip near the southwest corner. Along the north boundary from about the centre of lot number eight to about the centre of lot number eleven the soil is a light sand, and the timber is nearly all dead, fire having gone through this district some years ago. Nearly all the timber on the east side of the township, over a strip three-quarters of a mile wide, from the south boundary to Lake Abitibi, has been burned very recently.

Spruce, white poplar, birch, balsam and tamarac, with a few white bankian pines on the light or sandy land, constitute the forest of the township. There are a few cedars at intervals along the Abitibi River, but these are of little or no commercial value. The spruce is nearly all good, clear timber, varying from four to fifteen inches in diameter, with scattering trees up to twenty-four inches in diameter. The larger of these will make good lumber and building timber, while the smaller can be utilized as pulpwood. The white poplar is quite abundant, and from six to twenty-four inches in diameter. The tamarac is nearly all dead. The other kinds of timber are not very abundant, and of little commercial value.

The soil being nearly all clay, there were but few outcroppings of rock in the township, hence I did not observe any economic minerals. On the rolling land in the southeast part of the township the compass needle varied a few degrees in some places, indicating the presence of iron, but this was the only sign of minerals of any kind observed.

The east boundary of this township intersects the water's edge of Lower Lake Abitibi at about four and one-quarter ($4\frac{1}{4}$) miles north of the southeast corner of the township. From this point north, the water's edge of the lake forms the east boundary of the township. Abitibi river enters the township from the east in the fifth concession and flows southeasterly until it crosses into the fourth concession. Thence it flows in a general westerly course until it crosses the west boundary without ever leaving the fourth concession. There are also numerous small creeks and water courses, nearly all of which enter into the Abitibi river, and will give splendid drainage to the lands when it becomes settled, cleared up and used for agricultural purposes. There is a water power location on lot number ten, concession four, as shown on the plan and traverse notes of Abitibi river. The fall is about thirty feet in three hundred feet, and the volume of water being so large, this will become a very valuable water power site as soon as there are railway facilities for shipping lumber, paper pulp, etc.

Of the larger game, moose, bear and beaver are quite plentiful. Rabbits and partridge are numerous, while mink is found throughout the township. Whitefish and pike, of a splendid quality, were taken in the Abitibi lake and river.

Currants and raspberries of an excellent quality were found fairly well distributed over the whole township, and blue berries were plentiful on the high land along the northern portion.

The climate during our stay was well adapted for farming purposes. The rainfall was small and frost was noted on the night of July thirty-first, the only frost we had while in the township.

TOWNSHIP OF EDWARDS.

DISTRICT OF NIPISSING.

PETERBOROUGH, Ontario, December 8th, 1905.

SIR,—I have the honor to submit the following report on the survey of the township of Edwards, performed under instructions dated May thirty-first, nineteen hundred and five.

I proceeded to the work over the route via Quinze Lake, through the Province of Quebec, across Lake Abitibi and down the Abitibi River, crossing the east boundary of the township of Teefy on the thirteenth day of July, and landed a quarter of a mile from that boundary, where there is a trail leading north to the township of Edwards.

There we cached our canoes and proceeded over the trail to a small lake cut by the south boundary of the township.

I at once commenced the survey at the iron post by Ontario Land Surveyor William Galbraith, as instructed, and sub-divided the township in the usual way, according to the instructions.

I found other iron posts on Mr. Galbraith's meridian line, forming the east boundary of the township, viz., one one and one-quarter inches in diameter alongside a spruce post, at the end of the ninth mile marked "IX M" on the south side, and which marks the line between concessions three and four. Another one and seven-eighth inches in diameter alongside a spruce post at the end of the twelfth mile marked "XII M" on the south side, which marks the northeast angle of the township, and is marked "Con. VI" on the south side, "Con. I" on the north side, "I" on the west side, "Edwards" on the southwest side, "Mortimer" on the northeast side.

The iron post one and seven-eighth inches in diameter alongside a spruce post, at the southeast angle of the township is marked "Con. VI" on the south side, "Con. I" on the north side, "I" on the west side, "Edwards" on the northwest side, "Teefy" on the southwest side.

Another iron post one and seven-eighth inches in diameter alongside a spruce post, at the southwest angle of the township is marked "Con. VI" on the south side, "Con. I" on the north side, "12" on the east side, "Teefy" on the southeast side, "Edwards" on the northeast side, and another one and seven-eighth inches in diameter alongside a spruce post at the northwest angle of the township, is marked "Con. VI" on the south

side, "1" on the west side, "12" on the east side, "Edwards" on the south-east side and "Aurora" on the southwest side.

Another iron post one and one-quarter inches in diameter alongside a balsam post is planted on the line between concessions three and four at its intersection with the side line between lots six and seven, and another of the same diameter alongside a spruce post at its intersection with the west boundary.

Another iron post one and one-quarter inches in diameter alongside a balsam post is planted on the south boundary, at its intersection with the side line between lots six and seven and another of the same diameter alongside a spruce post, on the north boundary, at its intersection with the same side line.

A single row of posts of the most durable material available was planted along each concession line. Those between lots one and two, three and four, five and six, seven and eight, nine and ten, eleven and twelve, were marked with the proper numbers of the lots on the east and west sides and the number of the concession on the north side only. Those between lots two and three, four and five, six and seven, eight and nine, ten and eleven, were marked with the numbers of the lots on the east and west sides and the numbers of the concessions on the north and south sides thereof. Posts were also planted along the south boundary giving to each lot a uniform width of forty chains commencing at the iron post already mentioned, at the southeast angle of the township, and along the north boundary at its intersection with the several side lines. The posts planted by Mr. Galbraith on his meridian line were adopted for the concession lines and the lines are all well opened out and blazed.

The south half of the township is, in general, gently rolling land. The north half is flat land, although much broken in the northeast part. A large part of the north half is swamp, one-quarter of which is open swamp or muskeg. A considerable area of sandy land extends north-westerly along the lakes from the southeast corner of the township, which, I think, will not prove good for farming purposes. Most of the south half, and a considerable area of the north half of the township is clay and would make fairly good agricultural land.

The south half and north centre is well timbered with spruce, balsam, birch, poplar and red pine and there is a splendid block of white pine of first quality on lot seven in the fourth concession. This is, except for some scattered trees, the only white pine seen in the township. The balance of the township is covered with small spruce, and a large area of the north-east quarter is *brulé*, the second growth timber being chiefly poplar and birch. The open swamp referred to is sparsely covered with scrub spruce and tamarac, practically of no value.

Exposures of rock of the Huronian formation occur on lots eight and nine, concession two, lot eight, concessions three and four, and on the north boundary on lots three and five. No indications of valuable minerals were observed.

The township is fairly well watered with creeks, two of which are quite large.

There is a chain of beautiful lakes, mostly of clear water and with generally undulating shores, extending from the southeast corner of the township to lots seven and eight, in the sixth concession, and from thence northerly through the township of Mortimer, leaving that township for the unsurveyed land on lot number nine. There are good trails or portages from lake to lake throughout, which have evidently been traversed by the

Indians for many years. Pike and pickerel abound in all the lakes mentioned, except perhaps the two southerly ones.

Moose are numerous, partridge very plentiful, and fresh signs of the presence of beaver were frequently seen.

Accompanying this report are a general plan of the township, timber map and field notes made out in the usual way.

TOWNSHIP OF MORTIMER.

DISTRICT OF NIPISSING.

PETERBOROUGH, Ontario, December 8th, 1905.

SIR,—I have the honor to submit the following report on the survey of the township of Mortimer, performed under instructions dated the thirty-first day of May, nineteen hundred and five.

This township lies north of, and adjoins, the township of Edwards, surveyed by me under the same instructions or instructions of same date.

The township has been sub-divided into lots of three hundred and twenty acres or thereabouts. The concession lines being run east and west astronomically and the side lines north and south astronomically.

The posts planted by Ontario Land Surveyor W. Galbraith on the meridian line forming the east boundary of the township were adopted as the starting points of the concession lines. Those on his base line forming the south boundary of the township as the starting points of the side lines.

The iron post one and seven-eighth inches in diameter alongside a spruce post, planted by Mr. Galbraith at the end of the twenty-fourth mile on his base line and which marks the southeast angle of the township is marked "XXIV M" on the west side, "1" on the west side, "Con. VI" on the south side, "Con. I" on the north side, "Edwards" on the southwest side, "Mortimer" on the northwest side.

The iron post one and seven-eighth inches in diameter alongside a spruce post, at the end of the eighteenth mile on the same base line and which marks the southwest angle of the township is marked "XVIII M" on the west side, "12" on the east side, "Con. I" on the north side, "Lot I" on the west side, "Pyne" on the northwest side, "Mortimer" on the northeast side.

Another iron post one and one-quarter inches in diameter alongside a spruce post, at the end of the twenty-first mile on the same base line, is marked "XXI M" on the east side, "Con. I" on the north side, "6" on the east side, "7" on the west side.

The iron post one and seven-eighth inches in diameter alongside a spruce post, on Mr. Galbraith's meridian line at the end of his eighteenth mile, and which marks the northeast angle of the township is marked "XVIII M" on the south side, "I" on west side, "Con. VI" on south side, "Mortimer" on southwest side.

The iron post one and one-quarter inches in diameter alongside a spruce post, on the same meridian line at the end of the fifteenth mile is marked "XV M" on south side, "I" on west side, "Con. II" on the south side, "Con. IV" on the north side.

An iron post one and one-quarter inches in diameter is planted alongside a spruce post, on a line between concessions three and four, at its intersection with the side line between lots six and seven, and another alongside a spruce post at its intersection with the west boundary, and another of the same diameter alongside a spruce post on the north boundary at its intersection with the side line between lots six and seven, all properly marked.

Another iron post one and seven-eighth inches in diameter alongside a spruce post is planted at the northwest angle of the township on the meridian line run by Ontario Land Surveyor James S. Dobie this year and marked "12" on the east side, "Con. VI" on south side, "Mortimer" on southeast side.

A single row of wooden posts of the most durable material at hand were planted alongside the concession lines. Those planted between lots one and two, three and four, five and six, six and seven, eight and nine, eleven and twelve, are marked with the proper numbers of the lots on the east and west sides and the number of the concession on the north side only. Those between lots two and three, four and five, six and seven, eight and nine, ten and eleven, are marked with the numbers of the lots on the east and west sides and the numbers of the concessions on the north and south sides thereof.

Posts were also planted along the south boundary uniformly at the distance of forty chains west from Mr. Galbraith's mile posts, and others on the north boundary at its intersection with the several side lines, all properly marked. Bearing trees are marked to all the posts and the lines are well opened out and blazed.

The township, as a whole, is generally level or gently undulating, with a good deal of swamp land. The soil is chiefly clay, and black muck in the swamps, underlying a covering of moss. The clay in some places being mixed with sand.

The larger part of the township will, I think, prove good agricultural land, but a great part of it requires drainage to render it good for cultivation. Numerous creeks throughout the township provide a good outlet for drainage, some of which are quite large.

There is considerable open swamp and muskeg in the north, centre and northwest quarter of the township. Some hilly land in lots one, two and three, in the fourth and fifth concessions, stony land in lot nine in the fifth and sixth concessions, and a large part of lots six, seven, eight and nine in concessions one and two is sand.

One half of the township is well timbered with spruce, poplar, balsam and birch of good quality, and from medium to large size.

One-quarter is covered with spruce, chiefly of from small to medium size.

The other one-quarter is swamp and muskeg, about one-half of which is covered with small spruce. The other half is, I think, useless and is thinly covered with small scrub spruce and tamarac.

These timber areas are shown on the timber map accompanying this report.

Prominent outcroppings of rock occur on lots five, six, seven and eight in the first concession, and lot eight in the second concession, but no economic minerals were observed. The tops of these hills of rock give splendid views of the township.

There are five lakes in the township, forming a continuation of the chain of lakes in the township of Edwards and there are good trails or portages from lake to lake throughout.

There is another small lake on lot six in the first and second concessions, and five smaller ones which perhaps would be classed as ponds. These lakes are well supplied with fish, principally pike and pickerel. Most of them are very shallow for a considerable distance from the shores and the water is generally clear.

Raspberries, currants, cranberries and huckleberries are in abundance.

Moose and partridge are numerous, and the presence of beaver is much in evidence.

The variation of the needle is fairly constant at nine degrees thirty minutes west.

Accompanying this report are a plan of the township, timber map and field notes made out in the usual form.

APPENDIX No. 35.

TOWNSHIP OF PYNE.

DISTRICT OF NIPISSING.

REGINA, Saskatchewan, November 15th, 1905.

SIR,—In accordance with your instructions dated May thirty-first, nineteen hundred and five, I have surveyed the township of Pyne and beg to submit the following report.

I commenced the survey of this township immediately on completing the survey of the north half of Aurora. I started at the southeast corner of the township of Pyne at an iron post planted by William Galbraith, Ontario Land Surveyor, marking the twelfth mile of the base line run by him in nineteen hundred and four, and from there I ran due north. This corner was indicated by an iron post one and seven-eighths inches in diameter, marked "XII M" on the west side. I marked this post as follows: On the north

"Con. I", on the west "I", on the northwest "Pyne", and on the north-east "Mortimer."

The side lines were all started from the several mile posts planted by William Galbraith, Ontario Land Surveyor, in the year nineteen hundred and four, and were run due north astronomically. The concession lines were run due west astronomically from the east boundary, their starting points have been determined by chaining. Durable posts of the best available timber were carefully marked and securely planted at the corners of the various lots, care being taken to see that posts at the starting points of "blind line" were not marked on the south side. Bearing trees were marked whenever possible, and the bearings and distances from the various posts, noted in the field notes. Iron posts were marked and planted as follows:

One. At the southeast corner of the township as mentioned previously in this report.

Two. At the northeast corner of the township one and seven-eighth inches in diameter marked on the north "Con. I", on the south "Con. VI", On the west "I", on the southwest "Pyne", on the northwest "Fox."

Three. At the southwest corner of the township one and seven-eighth inches in diameter marked on the north "Con. I," on the south "Con. VI," on the east "XII," on the northeast "Pyne," and on the southeast "Aurora."

Four. At the northwest corner of the township one and seven-eighth inches in diameter marked on the north "Con. I", on the south "Con. VI" on the east "XII", on the southeast "Pyne", on the northeast "Fox."

Five. On the east boundary at the line between concessions three and four, one and three-quarter inches in diameter marked on the north "Con. IV", on the south "Con. III", on the west "I."

Six. On the south boundary at the line between lots six and seven, one and three-quarter inches in diameter marked on the north "Con. I", on the east "VI", on the west "VII."

Seven. On the west boundary at the line between concessions three, and four marked on the north "Con. IV", on the south "Con. III", on the east "XII."

Eight. On the north boundary at the line between lots six and seven, one and three-quarter inches in diameter marked on the south "Con. VI", on the east "VI", on the west "VII", on the north "Con. I" (for Fox.)

Nine. At the intersection of the line between concessions three and four with the line between lots six and seven, one and three-quarter inches in diameter marked on the north "Con. IV", on the south "Con. III", on the east "VI", on the west "VII."

The township as a whole is flat and largely composed of clay land. The eastern portion, however, resembles muskeg, as it is covered with a heavy growth of moss, and the timber very small. It is, however, capable of being easily drained as the streams all flow in well marked valleys, or depressions, with heavy timber in the valley, and for a short distance back from the edge on either side. These muskeg areas are all high ground. In most cases the edge of the muskeg being less than ten chains from the top of a valley from forty or fifty feet deep. On these areas the timber is entirely composed of small tamarac and spruce, not exceeding about four inches in diameter. In some cases the trees are very numerous and in others very scattered. The western portion is clay land, but is dryer and more cut up by gullies and valleys of small streams running towards the Abitibi River. As the river is

approached the land becomes rougher and the timber larger. For an average distance of three miles east of the river there is a growth of heavy timber. Spruce, poplar and white birch predominating. The spruce and poplar grow quite large and will make merchantable timber. There is also a large amount of balsam and dead tamarac.

The Abitibi River crosses the west boundary three times, and forms a convenient means of access to the township. It is a fine stream of from six to ten chains in width and flowing with a fairly strong current. The township is well watered with small streams flowing towards the Abitibi River.

In a wet season a large proportion of the township could be classed as swamp and muskeg, but I am of the opinion that nearly all of this swamp area only requires clearing and burning to make excellent land. A heavy growth of moss retains the moisture, but the soil is right under the moss and is apparently of excellent quality.

Game of all kinds is very scarce and no fish were to be had.

There are no indications of economic minerals, and practically no rock exposures were seen.

The magnetic variation ranges from seven to eleven degrees west, often changing a couple of degrees in a short distance. The average variation is put at nine degrees thirty minutes west.

Enclosed you will find field notes, plan, timber plan and accounts in triplicate.

TOWNSHIP OF NORTH HALF OF AURORA,

DISTRICT OF NIPISSING.

REGINA, Saskatchewan, December 29th, 1905.

SIR,—In accordance with your instructions dated May thirty-first nineteen hundred and five, I have surveyed the north half of the township of Aurora, and beg to submit the following report.

The south half of this township was surveyed by Alexander Baird, Ontario Land Surveyor, during the season of nineteen hundred and four. The line between concessions three and four was run by him and posts planted for the fronts of all the lots in concession four. I started the side lines for the lots in concession four, in each case from the post planted by Mr. Baird, and ran north. The east boundary was run by continuing the line run by Mr. Baird, which I found to intersect the base line run by William Galbraith in nineteen hundred and four, at a distance of ninety-two

links west from the iron post planted by him, to mark the eighteenth mile, on his base line. This post marks the southeast corner of the township of Pyne. Mr. Galbraith's base line forms the north boundary of the township of Aurora.

I did not obtain an observation on the east boundary of the township of Aurora, but the angle at which it intersected Ontario Land Surveyor Galbraith's base line was found to be eighty-nine degrees forty minutes, this being the northeast angle of the township of Aurora. I have, therefore, put the bearing of the east boundary at north no degrees twenty minutes east in my field notes and on the plan.

The township was surveyed in the usual way, the regular lots being approximately forty chains by eighty chains in depth.

Most of the lines were run without observation to start with, but in all cases the bearings have been obtained by measuring the angles of intersection with lines of known azimuth. It will be observed from the plan that many of the lines are not due north or west astronomically but in all cases the true bearings of the lines have been ascertained and entered in the field notes, so that the work on the ground will be found to agree with the plan and field notes. In all cases the lines were run with a transit, and every care taken to have the lines run straight from posts to posts. In two cases where deflections were found to have occurred between posts these were measured and recorded in the notes. These cases are between lots eight and nine, concession four, and between lots four and five, concession four. The lines are all well cut out, and blazed, and substantial posts of the most durable timber available were placed at the corners of the lots, care being taken that no marks were placed on the south side of a post forming the starting point of a "blind line." Bearing trees were marked wherever possible and recorded in the notes. Iron posts were planted as follows:

One. At the northeast corner of the township, marked "Con. VI" on the south, "I" on the west, "XII" on the east, "Edwards" on the southeast, and "Aurora" on the southwest.

Two. On the north boundary between lots six and seven, marked "Con. VI" on the south, "VI" on the east and "VII" on the west.

Three. At the northwest corner of the township, marked on the south "Con. VI", on the north "Con. I", on the east "XII", on the west "I", on the northeast "Pyne," on the northwest "St. John," on the southwest "Newmarket", and on the southeast "Aurora."

The township is almost entirely clay land of very good quality. West of the Abitibi River the land is fairly level, and of splendid quality. East of the river the land is very good but for about two miles back from the river it is much broken by deep ravines. There is quite a large area of muskeg in the northeast corner of the township. On this muskeg area the timber is of no value, being composed of scrubby spruce and tamarac, not more than four inches in diameter. The timber increases in size as the river is approached, and some very fine spruce grows along the river. The prevailing timber is spruce, poplar, balsam and white birch.

There is one small muddy lake west of the Abitibi River on lots eleven and twelve, concessions five and six. The Abitibi River runs through the north half of the township in a general northwesterly direction. The river was carefully traversed, a transit with stadia wires being used for this purpose. The Abitibi River is a large stream, with a fairly swift current. A stretch of rapids about thirty chains long occurs in lots eight and nine, concession five. The total fall is about four feet, and the rapids are easily

run in a small canoe. I would consider this of very great value as a water power.

The only rock exposures noticed occur at the rapids above mentioned, and in lots eleven and twelve, concession six, along the river. These outcrops are of Huronian formation.

One island of an area of half an acre occurs in the Abitibi River in lot ten, concession six. This island is "Number A", and is marked by having "No. A" marked with a scribing iron, on a large spruce tree, on the west side of the island, very near the northern extremity of the island. In computing the areas, this island being fractional, was not deducted from the water area.

There is very little game of any kind, and fish were not to be had. A net was set for about ten days in a favorable spot in the Abitibi River, with no results.

The magnetic variation is fairly constant at nine degrees thirty minutes west, although some small fluctuations occur.

Enclosed you will find plan, timber plan on tracing linen, field notes and accounts in triplicate.

TOWNSHIP OF FOX.

DISTRICT OF NIPISSING.

REGINA, Saskatchewan, November 25th, 1905.

SIR.—In accordance with your instructions dated May thirty-first nineteen hundred and five, I have surveyed the township of Fox, and beg to submit the following report.

This township was surveyed immediately after the completion of the survey of the township of Pyne. The township is bounded on the south by the township of Pyne, on the west by the township of Brower, on the north by the base line run by T. B. Speight, Ontario Land Surveyor, in nineteen hundred and four, and on the east by the unsurveyed lands of the crown. The east boundary was surveyed by producing the east boundary of Pyne township due north astronomically to intersect the base line run by Ontario Land Surveyor Speight, in nineteen hundred and four, as mentioned above. The concession lines were run due west from their respective starting points to intersect the west boundary. The side lines of the township of Pyne were continued due south throughout the township of Fox.

The lines were well cut out and blazed, and substantial posts of the best available timber were carefully planted and marked. Care was taken to see that no post marking the starting point of a "blind line" was marked on the south side. Bearing trees were marked wherever possible, and the bearings and distances recorded in the field notes.

Iron posts were planted and marked as follows:

One. One and seven-eighth inches diameter at the southeast corner of the township marked on the north side "Con. I", on the south side "Con. VI", on the west side "I", on the southwest "Pyne", and on the north-west "Fox."

Two. One and seven-eighth inches in diameter at the southwest corner of the township marked on the south "Con. VI", on the north "Con. I", on the east "XII", on the southeast "Pyne", on the northeast "Fox."

Three. One and seven-eighth inches in diameter at the northwest corner of the township marked on the south "Con. VI", on the west "XII", on the west "I", on the southeast "Fox", and on the southwest "Brower."

Four. One and seven-eighth inches in diameter at a point on the east boundary ten links south of the intersection of the east boundary with the north boundary, which intersection occurs in a river, marked on the south "Con. VI", on the west "I", on the southwest "Fox."

Five. One and three-quarter inches in diameter on the east boundary at the line between concessions three and four, marked on the north "Con. IV", on the south "Con. III", and on the west "I."

Six. One and three-quarter inches in diameter on the south boundary at the line between lots six and seven, marked on the south "Con. VI", on the north "Con. I", on the east "VI" and on the west "VII."

Seven. On the west boundary at the line between concessions three and four, marked on the north "Con. IV", on the south "Con. III", and on the east "XII."

Eight. On the north boundary at the line between lots six and seven, marked on the south "Con. VI", on the east "VI", and on the west "VII."

Nine. At the intersection of the line between concessions three and four, with the line between lots six and seven, marked on the south "Con. III," on the north "Con. IV," on the east "VI," and on the west "VII."

The township as a whole is flat and largely clay land. A comparatively small area of muskeg with clay sub-soil occurs in the southeast quarter and along the east boundary. The remainder of the township is clay land covered with a heavy moss, and well timbered with spruce and balsam, with numerous stretches of higher land covered with poplar, white birch and spruce of good size. The township is well watered, numerous small streams running towards the Abitibi River, which runs in a northerly direction through the eastern portion of the township of Brower, which adjoins the township of Fox on the west. This moss-covered area is swampy and wet in a rainy season on account of the moss retaining the moisture, but the underlying soil is clay of splendid quality, and when cleared and burned should make excellent agricultural land. The best timber is towards the west boundary, and gradually decreases in size as the east boundary is approached.

There are no water powers.

There is very little rock. The only indications of economic minerals was an abnormal magnetic variation, between lots four and five, concession three, where on a rocky knoll a few chains south of concession four the variation changed from south twenty degrees west to north sixty degrees east in a few chains.

The magnetic variation changes from six and half degrees west to eleven degrees west, in many cases differences of a couple of degrees being noticed within a few chains. The average magnetic variation is placed at nine degrees thirty minutes west.

There is very little game of any kind. No large game was seen and partridge are comparatively rare.

TOWNSHIP OF BROWER.

DISTRICT OF NIPISSING.

LEAMINGTON, Ontario, December 14th, 1905.

SIR,—I have the honor to submit the following report, together with accompanying field notes and plan of the survey of the township of Brower, in the District of Nipissing, performed this season under instructions from your department, dated June fifth, nineteen hundred and five.

Leaving here on the eleventh day of July and being joined by members of my party at points on the way, we travelled by railway, by way of Toronto and North Bay to Haileybury on Lake Temiscaming, thence by steamer to the head of the lake, and from there along the portage road to Klock's farm on Quinze Lake, where canoes and supplies were in store, as I had arranged for. From this place we journeyed by the usual Hudson Bay Company's canoe route through the several lakes and streams to Abitibi Post, on Lake Abitibi, and through this lake and down the river of that name, to where Ontario Land Surveyor Galbraith's meridian line (run last season) crosses it furthest north. From this point I readily found the spruce and iron posts standing together marking the eighteenth mile on this meridian line, (marked on the south side XVIII M.) which posts were to form the south-east angle of the township of Brower, and from which point my survey of this township was to start. From these posts I ran a line due west astronomically as instructed, a distance of five miles, seventy-four chains and seventy-four links, for the south boundary of the township, planting posts thereon at regular intervals of forty chains apart to mark the front angles of the lots in the first concession, lot one being allowed a width of only thirty-four chains and seventy-four links as directed. From each alternate post the lot lines were run due north astronomically.

The meridian line run last year by Ontario Land Surveyor Galbraith north of the eighteenth mile post (planted thereon) forms the east boundary of the township, and the posts found planted at intervals of one mile apart on this line, north of said post, were adopted as the starting point of the several concession lines, which were run due west astronomically for the front of the concessions and posts planted on each line as directed.

A portion of the base line run last year by Ontario Land Surveyor Speight from the one hundred and sixty-second mile post, planted on the district boundary line, forms the north boundary of this township, and from the posts planted on the south boundary to mark the southwest angle of lot twelve in the first concession, a line was run due north astronomically to its intersection with this base line, for the west boundary of the township.

At each of the corners of the township an iron post one and seven-eighth inches in diameter is planted alongside a wooden post, each post being marked with the names of the townships cornering thereon, the name being marked on the side facing the township.

Where the boundary lines are intersected with the centre lines, also where the centre lines intersect each other, small iron posts were planted alongside the wooden posts.

All the posts were properly marked and well planted and the lines were well opened out and blazed. Posts were planted and marked as follows:—

An iron post one and seven-eighth inches in diameter planted alongside a spruce post on Ontario Land Surveyor Galbraith's meridian line, each marked on the south side "XVIII M," which posts marked the starting point for the survey of the township of Brower and now planted to mark the southeast angle of said township of Brower were each marked "I" on the west side, "Con. I" on the north side, "Brower" on the northwest side, and "St. John" on the southwest side.

At the southwest angle of this township an iron post one and seven-eighth inches in diameter was planted alongside of a spruce post each marked "Brower" on the northeast side, "Lamarche" on northwest side, "XII" on east side, "I" on west side, and "Con. I" on north side.

At the northeast angle of this township an iron and spruce post marked each on southeast side "Fox," on southwest side "Brower," on west side "I," on east side "Con. VI," also these posts are marked "XXIV M" plus 88 links on south side and "XII M—6.02" on west side.

At the northwest angle of the township an iron post one and seven-eighth inches in diameter was planted alongside of a spruce post each marked "Lamarche" on southwest side, "Brower" on southeast side, "Con. VI" on south side, "XII" on east side and "I" on west side.

At intersection of line of lots six and seven with south boundary of the township a small iron post was planted alongside a spruce post each marked on west side "VII," on east side "VI," on north side "Con. I."

At intersection of this line of lots with line in front of fourth concession a small iron post was planted alongside of a spruce post each marked "Con. III" on south side, "Con. IV" on north side, "VI" on east side and "VII" on west side.

Also at intersection of this line of lots with north boundary a small iron post was planted alongside of a spruce post each marked "Con. VI" on south side, "VI" on east side and "VII" on west side.

At the intersection of the line in front of the fourth concession with the east boundary of the township a small iron post was planted alongside of a spruce post each marked on south side "Con. III," on north side "Con. IV," and on west side "I." Also on south side "XXI M," and at intersection

of the line in front of the fourth concession with the west boundary of the township a small iron post is planted alongside a spruce post each marked on east side "XII," on north side "Con. IV" and on south side "Con. III."

The township in general is very level, with an elevation of from twenty to fifty feet above the surrounding country extending back from the Abitibi River, on both sides, for a distance of from one-half to three-quarters of a mile. In close proximity to the larger creeks the land also rises slightly in elevation, otherwise the township may be described as low and flat, with a large percentage of swamp and muskeg land, readily drained, by the numerous small streams found throughout the township, which have generally a good fall for drainage purposes.

The Abitibi River entering on lot number one in the first concession, flowing northwesterly, and leaving it on lot number five in the sixth concession, averages about six chains wide, is deep, rather sluggish, and without any falls or rapids within the township. With this river, two large creeks, in the west part of the township, and numerous small streams the township is well watered.

The soil is a rich clay and clay loam overlaid in the swamps and muskegs with a depth of from one to three feet of muck and moss.

The land of the township when cleared and drained will make excellent agricultural land, as is apparent, from the dense growth of wild grasses and the variety of wild currants, raspberries, gooseberries and cranberries found well matured in the open places.

The timber is principally spruce, dead tamarac, balsam, poplar, balm of Gilead, birch and cedar. Spruce largely predominates throughout the township. In the swamps and low-lying lands it is very dense, tall and straight, suitable for pulpwood. On the higher lands where it is intermixed with the other timbers, it is large and valuable. The balsam, poplar, balm of Gilead, birch found on the higher lands adjoining the river and streams, is of small diameter, tall and straight, and will be found valuable for building purposes.

Along the line between lots four and five in the sixth concession is a small outcrop of Huronian rock with some scattering boulders. The land gone over with this exception, being entirely free from stones and rock.

No indications of any economic minerals were found.

Frequent observations for azimuth were taken while the work was in progress and the variation of the magnetic needle found to be nine degrees west and very regular.

Numerous signs of moose, bear and beaver being plentiful, are noticeable, but none were seen during the survey, a few fish were caught in the river, and partridge were frequently obtained.

The survey of the Abitibi River through the township was made with a Foster Micrometer and compass.

A small clearing has been made on the east side of the Abitibi River, on the north half of lot number five in the sixth concession, and a log shanty built on the premises, but no settlers were found in the township.

TOWNSHIP OF LAMARCHE.

DISTRICT OF NIPISSING.

LEAMINGTON, Ontario, December 28th, 1905.

SIR,—Under instructions from your Department, dated June fifth, nineteen hundred and five, I have performed the survey of the township of Lamarche, in the District of Nipissing, and have the honor to submit the following report in connection with the same.

Immediately upon the completion of the survey of the township of Brower, which I performed under these same instructions and reported upon recently to you, I started the survey of this township, which adjoins the township of Brower on the west.

From the posts planted to mark the southwest angle of the township of Brower the survey of this township was commenced by running a line therefrom for the south boundary of the township due west astronomically to its intersection with the district boundary line run by Ontario Land Surveyor Niven in eighteen nine-eight, and from each alternate post planted on the south boundary at regular intervals of forty chains apart, the lot lines were run due north astronomically.

The posts planted on the west boundary of the township of Brower which is identical with the east boundary of this township, were adopted as the starting points of the several concession lines on each of which posts properly marked were planted as directed.

The marking of the southeast side of the posts planted at the southwest angle of the township was overlooked, so the name "Hanna" does not appear on these posts, with this exception all the posts were properly marked as directed and my instructions followed. Posts were planted and marked as follows:—

At the southeast angle of the township an iron post one and seven-eighth inches in diameter was planted alongside of a spruce post each marked "Lamarche" on northwest side, "Brower" on northeast side "Con. I" on north side, "XII" on east side and "I" on west side.

At the southwest angle an iron post one and seven-eighth inches in diameter is planted alongside of a spruce post each marked "Lamarche" on northeast side, "Con. I" on north side and "XII" on east side.

At the northeast angle of the township an iron post one and seven-eighth inches in diameter is planted alongside of a spruce post each marked "Lamarche" on southwest side, "Brower" on southeast side, "Con. VI" on south side, "XII" on east side and "I" on west side.

At the northwest angle an iron post stands alongside of a tamarac post marked each on southeast side "Lamarche," "XII and N" on east side, "Con. VI and CLXII M" on south side and "A" on west side.

At intersection of south boundary with line between lots six and seven a small iron post was planted alongside of a spruce post each marked "Con. I" on north side, "VI" on east side and "VII" on west side.

At intersection of this line of lots with the line in front of the fourth concession a small iron post was planted alongside of a spruce post marked "Con. IV" on north side, "Con. III" on south side, "VI" on east side, and "VII" on west side.

Also at intersection of this line of lots with the north boundary of the township a small iron post was planted alongside of a spruce post each marked "Con. VI" on south side, "VI" on east side and "VII" on west side.

At the intersection of the east boundary with the line in front of the fourth concession a small iron post is planted alongside of a spruce post each marked "Con. IV" on north side, "Con. III" on south side and "I" on west side.

Also at intersection of the line in front of the fourth concession with the west boundary of the township a small iron post is planted alongside of a spruce post each marked "Con. IV" on north side, "Con. III" on south side, and "XII" on east side.

The township in general is swampy. The land level, free from stones and boulders and readily drained through the large creeks and numerous small streams which traverse the township. The soil is a good clay subsoil covered with a depth of from one to three feet of muck and moss.

The timber of the township is principally spruce and dead tamarac of dense growth, averaging from eight to ten inches in diameter, very tall and straight. Where the small ridges occur in the land and along the edges of streams, balsam, poplar, birch, balm of Gilead, cedar, alders and willows are intermixed with the first mentioned timber.

The Frederick House River flows northwesterly through lots eleven and twelve in the first concession. With this river, the large creeks, numerous small streams and four small lakes, the township is well watered.

The entire land of the township when cleared and drained will prove good for agricultural purposes, and should be very productive as is apparent from the growth of grasses and wild berries in the open places.

No outcropping of rock was found in the township nor any indication of mineral.

Of the large game moose and bear were met with during the progress of the work and signs of them were frequently met with. Marten were seen and the recent work of beaver met with. Partridge are plentiful and were often obtained.

Observations for azimuth were taken frequently and the mean variation of the magnetic needle found to be nine degrees west.

With this report I submit field notes and plan of the township, all of which I trust may meet with your approval.

TOWNSHIP OF NEWMARKET,
DISTRICT OF NIPISSING.

ALVINSTON, Ontario, December 20th, 1905.

SIR,—I have the honor to submit the following report on the survey of the Township of Newmarket, in the District of Nipissing, made under instructions dated May thirty-first, A.D. nineteen hundred and five.

I left Tomstown on June twelfth after getting men and supplies and after canoeing and portaging two weeks started the survey on June twenty-eighth, in the regular way. Owing to low water we had considerable difficulty getting in by way of White River, White Clay, and Black Rivers.

The lines have been well opened out and blazed and care has been taken in the planting and marking of posts.

To render the survey permanent in case of fire iron posts were planted as follows: At south boundary at line between lots six and seven an iron post marked on north "Con. I.," on east "Lot VI.," on west "Lot VII."

At the east boundary where it is intersected by the line between concessions three and four an iron post marked on north "Con. IV.," on south "Con. III.," and on west "Lot I."

At lot line six and seven where it is intersected by the line between concessions three and four, an iron post marked on north "Con. IV.," on south "Con. III.," on east "Lot VI.," and on the west side "Lot VII."

At the north boundary where it is intersected by the line between lots six and seven an iron post marked on the south "Con. VI.," on the east "Lot VI.," and on the west "Lot VII."

At the west boundary where it is intersected by the line between concessions three and four an iron post marked on the north "Con. IV.," on the south "Con. III.," and on the east "Lot XII."

At the southeast angle of the township I found an iron post which I marked on the north "Con. I.," on the west "Lot I."

At the southwest angle of the township I found an iron post which I marked on the northeast side "Newmarket," on the east "Lot XII.," and on the north "Con. I."

At the northwest angle of the township I found an iron post which I marked on the south "Con. VI.," on the west "Lot XII.," on the southeast "Newmarket."

At the northeast angle of the township I found an iron post which I marked on the south "Con. VI.," on the west "Lot I."

The posts I planted are one and one-quarter inches in diameter and those I found are one and seven-eighths inches in diameter.

GENERAL FEATURES.

The township is generally level and fairly dry with portions at the northeast and southwest corners somewhat higher than the central portion. The land being cut with small gullies, will be easily drained. The heavy moss now covering the soil retards the flow of water from the land. This year the swamps were quite dry owing to the lack of rain in the spring. The surface of the country is gently undulating and there are no hills of any account. The total area is covered with green bush. About eighty-five per cent. will, when cleared, be agricultural land.

SOIL.

The soil is in general a clay loam or a clay with a slight admixture of sand which will make it easily workable. It is covered with a few inches of rich mould and a heavy moss but apparently extends throughout the township. In the muskeg after digging about eighteen or twenty inches one finds the same clay soil as found in other parts. I would consider this a very good township for agricultural purposes.

TIMBER.

About eighty-five per cent. of the township is covered by a growth of spruce, dead tamarac, poplar, birch and balsam, with a few cedar. The timber grows in belts and is not mixed generally and in sizes from four to fourteen inches. An insect pest has some years ago killed all the tamarac, but it is still sound and of good size. The timber is suitable for building timber and for railway ties.

MINERALS.

There are only two outcroppings of rock and they are small and of a Huronian nature. No economic minerals were seen.

WATERS.

Three small lakes occur in this township. The water is very clear in each. The small creeks generally form in the gullies.

FISH AND GAME.

Large game in this township is scarce; partridge and ducks are quite plentiful. Pike and pickerel may be caught with the troll and not in the lakes.

The magnetic variation in the eastern two-thirds of this township remains fairly constant at about nine and one-third degrees west, but through the western one-third this variation increases without apparent reason. The change is gradual and the needle acts normally.

I submit herewith a general plan, a timber map and field notes of the survey.

TOWNSHIP OF ST. JOHN,

DISTRICT OF NIPISSING.

ALVINSTON, Ontario, December 20th, 1905.

SIR.—I have the honor to submit the following report on the survey of the Township of St. John, in the District of Nipissing, made under instructions dated the thirty-first day of May, A.D. nineteen hundred and five.

After finishing the survey of Newmarket I proceeded to St. John and commenced the survey in the regular way from the east boundary. After running west into this township, I found considerable muskeg and decided to depart from the instructions and laid off lots from the east boundary forty chains in width so as to make full lots over the better portion of the lands. Lot twelve is thus made the gore lot instead of lot one.

The lines have been well opened out and blazed and care has been taken in the planting and marking of posts. Iron posts have been planted and marked as follows:

At the line between lots six and seven where it is intersected by the line between concessions three and four I planted an iron post, marking it on the north "Con. IV.," on the south "Con. III.," on the east "Lot VI.," and on the west "Lot VII."

At the north boundary where it is intersected by the line between lots six and seven I planted an iron post, marking it on the south "Con. VI.," on the east "Lot VI.," and on the west "Lot VII."

At the west boundary where it is intersected by the line between concessions three and four I planted an iron post, marking it on the north "Con. IV.," on the south "Con. III.," and on the east "Lot XII."

At the northwest angle of St. John I planted an iron post, marking it on the southeast "St. John," on the south "Con. VI.," on the east "Lot XII."

At the southwest angle I marked the post I found on the northeast "St. John," on the north "Con. I.," on the east "Lot XII."

At the southeast angle I marked the post I found on the northwest "St. John," on the north "Con. I.," and on the west "Lot I."

At the northeast angle I found the post marked on the southwest "St. John," on the south "Con. VI.," on the west "Lot XII."

GENERAL FEATURES.

The township consists of a strip of high land along the Abitibi River west of which the land becomes low and flat with a general fall to the northwest. This year the flat lands are quite dry. The greater portion of the land will require drainage and I estimate about sixty per-cent of the land will become agricultural land.

SOIL.

The soil in this township is a clay loam with an admixture of sand which will make it easily workable. It is covered with rich mould. The muskegs have about two feet of dry muck and are underlaid with the same clay soil. A heavy moss covers this township which retards the flow of water. The land has considerable fall and there are parts which, when cleared, will require but little drainage. There is a good outlet into the creek at the northwest corner of the township.

TIMBER.

The eastern portion of this township has a good growth of spruce, poplar, birch, tamarac, balsam and a few cedar. Along the Abitibi River the timber grows to a fair size, often twenty inches in diameter. The southern and western belt consists of spruce and tamarac in sizes from four to ten inches. The tamarac has all been killed by insect pests except that in the muskegs, which is small and scrubby. The central and northern belt consists mostly of small scrubby spruce and tamarac, the land in this portion being muskeg.

MINERALS.

There is no outcrop of rock in this township and no economic minerals were observed.

WATERS.

A chain of narrow lakes occurs in this township. Unlike the Abitibi River, the water is very clear. There is no outlet to the lakes, though creeks rise to the north and west in the muskeg. A number of petrified objects were taken from the lakes.

The Abitibi River flows along the east boundary and has a width of about five chains. The water is not clear and has a slow current. There are no water powers.

FISH AND GAME.

Moose and deer are very scarce and evidence of bear are the only signs of big game. There are a few beaver. Partridge and duck are fairly plentiful and pike and pickerel may be caught with the troll in the lakes to the south.

The magnetic variation is fairly constant at about nine degrees west. The variation changes slightly in the muskegs.

I submit herewith a general plan, a timber map and the field notes of the survey.

TOWNSHIP OF GUIBORD.

DISTRICT OF NIPISSING.

GLENCOE, ONTARIO, December 9th, 1905.

SIR,—I beg to report as follows upon the survey of the Township of Guibord in the District of Nipissing, performed in accordance with instructions dated thirty-first of May, nineteen hundred and five.

The Township of Guibord lies immediately to the east of the Township of Hislop, from which latter we moved in and commenced the survey of the westerly boundary, which, with the other boundaries, had previously been

run. I carried the work easterly, running out the lines and posting the lots in the usual way as set forth and shown by the accompanying field notes and plan.

At the several corners of the township are posts as follows:—

At the southeast corner is a spruce post and beside it an iron post. The spruce post is marked "Con. I." on the north side, "Lot I." on the west side, and "Lot XII." on the east side. The iron post is marked "Guibord" on the northwest side and "Michaud" on the northeast side.

At the southwest corner are two spruce posts and beside them an iron post. One spruce post is marked "XXIV. M." on the south side, and the other is marked "Con. VI." on the south side, "Con. I." on the north, "Lot I." on the west, and "Lot XII." on the east side. The iron post is marked "XXIV. M." on the south side, "Cook" on the southeast, "Playfair" on the southwest, "Guibord" on the northeast, and "Hislop," on the northwest side. At the northwest corner are a tamarac and iron post both being marked "12 M 4.25 chs." on the east side, and in addition the iron post is marked "Munro" on the northeast and "Guibord" on the southeast.

At the northeast corner are a pitch pine and an iron post marked "VI. M." on the east, "Munro on the northwest, "Guibord" on the southwest, "Michaud" on the southeast, and "McCool" on the northeast side.

The soil of this township varies from clay on the west side to light sand on the east side, the proportions of the several kinds being about as follows: Clay, twenty-five per cent., sandy and rocky, twenty per cent., loamy forty per cent., and muskeg fifteen per cent. About seventy-five per cent., however, of the whole is swampy and not adapted to immediate settlement. The greater part is covered with the usual coating of moss and muck.

About one-fifth of the township has been burnt over in irregular patches adjoining the boundaries, as shown by the timber map, during the present year. The remainder is covered with green timber, of which the greater part is spruce, there being a considerable amount of this good quality, adapted chiefly for pulpwood purposes. There is also some balsam, birch, poplar and dry tamarac in places.

The township is well watered. The Pike River runs through the southwest part and a beautiful spring creek of considerable size, with several good tributaries, runs from the northeast corner southwesterly to join the Pike on lot eleven in the third concession. These streams have fine clear water and good currents, and the channels are deep, and I am of opinion that the greater part of the low land can readily be drained to them when this is required to be done.

No minerals of importance were noticed.

Accompanying this report are the usual field notes, general plan of the township, and timber map. All of which are respectfully submitted.

TOWNSHIP OF MICHAUD.

DISTRICT OF NIPISSING.

GLENCOE, Ontario, December 21st, 1905.

SIR,—I beg to report that in accordance with instructions dated the thirty-first day of May, nineteen hundred and five, I have completed the survey of the Township of Michaud, in the District of Nipissing.

The work performed by me was the running of the side lines between lots two and three, six and seven, ten and eleven, through the several concessions of the township, posting the south boundary of the township, which was run by me in nineteen hundred and four as the north boundary of the Township of Barnet, checking the chainage of several lots, etc.

I moved with a light camp into the township from Guibord, which it adjoins on the east.

I ran the two westerly lines of my work south from the fifth and third mile posts on my second base line of nineteen hundred and three, which line forms the north boundary of the township. The easterly line, being that between lots two and three, was run northerly from the south boundary of the township.

I planted posts properly marked at the intersection of my side lines with the lines between the several concessions run in nineteen hundred and three by Ontario Land Surveyor Geo. A. McCubbin, and where the intersection did not take place at the posts as set by him, his posts were removed, and the markings on his bearing trees were defaced where these were not again used as bearing trees by me. The distances between the positions of the posts set by him and those set by me were measured and noted, and the field notes have been corrected to correspond with the changed positions.

The northeasterly part of the township is mostly rolling sandy land of light quality. The southwesterly part is mostly a spruce swamp with sandy bottom. A considerable part of the township, being the higher part, was again run over by fire during nineteen hundred and five, and very little timber now remains upon it. There is, however, considerable green spruce in the southwest part, suitable for pulpwood purposes. There is also some birch, poplar and jack pine in places.

In the township are a number of small lakes, the largest of which is Lake Perry, covering about three hundred acres, in the fifth and sixth concessions. It is a pretty body of clear water and the source of a fine spring creek which flows from it with a good current on the southwest to join the Pike River itself, it has its source in the small lakes near the centre of the township and runs southeasterly and southwesterly, leaving the township at the south on lot eight. It also is a nice stream of clear water with a good current. In my opinion this township is not adapted for immediate settlement.

I have completed the map of the township, adding thereto the measurements of the lines run by me, and also the changed measurements and areas

of the lots affected, in red figures. The measurements checked as well as a number of the posts examined, etc., are set forth in the book of field notes.

TOWNSHIP OF MICHAUD.

DISTRICT OF NIPISSING.

ST. THOMAS, Ontario, December 31st, 1903.

SIR,—I have the honor to report that in accordance with instructions received from your Department dated June twenty-ninth, nineteen hundred and three, I have surveyed the Township of Michaud, in the District of Nipissing, into lots of three hundred and twenty acres each.

Leaving St. Thomas on July twenty-first, I reached North Temiscaming on the twenty-fourth. From this place I followed the Hudson Bay Company canoe route to Lake Abitibi and Ghost River. Ascending the branch of this river nearest my work, I reached the end of the canoe route on August tenth, after which I blazed trails and portaged supplies some six or seven miles west and south to the north boundary of Michaud.

On August twenty-fifth I commenced my survey at the second mile post on Ontario Land Surveyor Robertson's second base line, running my side line between lots four and five due south from this post. From this side line I subdivided the township into concessions of eighty chains depth and lots of forty chains width. The south boundary of the township not being surveyed there are no posts planted for the front of lots in the first concession. The posts on the concession lines are marked on the north side with the numbers of the concessions which they front, and on the east and west sides with the numbers of the adjoining lots. On the east and west boundaries and on the side lines between lots four and five and lots eight and nine the posts are also marked on the south side with the numbers of the concessions in rear. The posts on the north boundary are marked on the south side "Con. VI." and on the east and west sides with the numbers of the adjoining lots. In addition to the wooden posts I placed iron posts one and one-quarter inches in diameter on the front of the fourth concession at the side line between lots eight and nine and at the west boundary of the township. I ran the west boundary of Michaud due south from the sixth mile post on Ontario Land Surveyor Robertson's second base line.

I took astronomical observations frequently during the progress of the work and have recorded these in the field notes. The declination of the needle was observed throughout the township, ranging from two and one-half degrees west to twelve degrees west, the average being about nine degrees.

The southwesterly half of the township is part of a spruce swamp which extends some miles to the west and south of Michaud. The surface of the northeasterly half is undulating and with the exception of some tracts of *brulé*, is covered with jack pine, with smaller quantities of spruce, poplar and birch. The soil throughout is sandy.

There were no indications of economic minerals.

The waters of the township divide between Ghost River on the east and Black River on the west, and consequently the streams are not large. Their waters are, however, and those of the small lakes in which they originate, very clear.

Bear, moose and partridge were seen and trout were found in Lake Perry, and the creek which forms its outlet.

Accompanying this report are field notes, plan and timber plan.

TOWNSHIP OF HISLOP.

DISTRICT OF NIPISSING.

GLENCOE, Ontario, November 25th, 1905.

SIR,—I beg to submit the following report upon the survey of the township of Hislop, in the District of Nipissing, in accordance with instructions dated the thirty-first day of May, A.D. nineteen hundred and five.

We left Glencoe on the twelfth of June, and proceeded to the work by rail to New Liskeard, where we procured our supplies, thence by steamer to Tomstown, thence by canoes up the Blanche River, over the "Height of Land," and down the White Clay and Black Rivers. On reaching Ontario Land Surveyor Speight's meridian line of nineteen hundred and two, I followed it, with part of my men, to the southeast angle of the township, and started running the south boundary to the river, while the remainder of my party continued the trip down the river to join us at the crossing of our line. Before reaching me, however, on the twenty-ninth of June, they were overtaken by a bush fire, which rolled suddenly down the hills on both sides upon them, while in a shallow rapid where progress was difficult with loaded canoes. Here they were delayed, and, while the men escaped by getting into deeper water where they were obliged to remain for several hours, we lost a considerable amount of supplies, camp outfit and clothing of different

members of the party, destroyed by the fire. The fire continued burning in the surrounding country for some time, and materially hindered the progress of our work, till checked by a welcome rain, and eventually extinguished, but not before it had covered the greater part of Hislop and several adjoining townships, as we found out later.

After danger from the fire was over the work of survey continued without serious interruption till completed.

The corners of the township are marked by wooden and iron posts, the wooden ones being about six inches square, and standing about three and a half feet out of the ground. The iron posts are one and seven-eighth inches in diameter, and stand beside the wooden posts, and about eighteen inches out of the ground.

At the southeast corner are two wooden posts, both of spruce. One is marked on the south side "XXIV M," the other is marked "Lot I" on the west, "Lot XII" on the east, "Con. I" on the north, and "Con. VI" on the south. The iron post is marked "XXIV M" on the south side, "Hislop" on the northwest, "Guibord" on the northeast, "Cook" on the southeast, and "Playfair" on the southwest.

At the southwest corner the wooden post is of spruce, and is marked "Con. I" on the north side, and "Lot XIII" on the east side. The iron post is marked "Con. I" on the north, "Lot XIII" on the east, "Hislop" on the northeast, and "Playfair" on the southeast.

At the northwest corner the wooden post is of spruce, and is badly charred by the recent fire. It is, however, re-faced on the southeast and southwest sides, and re-marked "Hislop" on the southeast and "Bowman" on the southwest. The iron post is marked "Hislop" on the southeast, "Bowman" on the southwest, "Con. VI" on the south, "Lot XIII" on the east, and "Lot I" on the west.

At the northeast corner are spruce and iron posts marked "Beatty" on the northwest side, "Hislop" on the southeast side, "Con. I" on the north, and "Lot I" on the west.

Iron posts, one and one-quarter inches in diameter, properly marked, were also set beside the usual wooden posts at the following places: At the intersection of the line between lots seven and eight with the north and south boundaries, and also with the line between concessions three and four, also at the intersection of the line between concessions three and four with the east and west boundaries.

The township is for the most part good agricultural land, being chiefly clay and clay loam. There are, however, some small areas of sandy land and some of stony land, and a few rocky exposures.

The township is well watered by Black River, which passes through it from southeast to northwest, by Pike River through the easterly part, and by numerous other smaller streams through the several parts.

Black River averages about two chains in width, and the land generally rises rapidly from the water's edge to an elevation of thirty or forty feet or more at a short distance back. On the river in this township are three falls, one about seventeen feet high, near the line between lots four and five in the first concession, one about the same height on south half of lot six in the second concession, and another about ten feet on lot eight in the third concession. These will furnish power to a limited extent, and in each case the shores are readily suitable for sites for development purposes.

In addition to these falls, there are a couple of rapids within the township, but the stretches of river between are comparatively sluggish. The Pike River, which joins the Black on lot nine in the fourth concession, is

a rapid stream, not navigable for canoes, averaging about one chain in width and carrying a considerable amount of water. The land rises rapidly also from the shores of the Pike.

The general surface of the township is comparatively level, with sufficient inclination in most parts for good drainage.

From the nature of the soil the land washes away rapidly under favorable conditions, as evidenced by the numerous ravines and gullies heading towards the main waterways.

The fire already referred to destroyed nearly all the standing timber with which the township was covered, and much of which was of good size and quality. A few patches of green spruce, balsam and some birch remain. Most of the burnt timber will be practically useless in the course of a year or so.

The survey of the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway line runs through the township following the general course of the Black River on the south side, and I noted where my lines crosses it when noticeable, but, as I am not sure as to the line to be adopted, I have not shown it fully upon my map. The construction of this railway will render the township readily accessible.

No mineral of importance was noticed.

Accompanying this report are my book of field notes, general plan and timber map, and a few photographs, which latter will give some idea of the country and timber soon after being burnt over.

TOWNSHIP OF PLAYFAIR.

DISTRICT OF NIPISSING.

NEW LISKEARD, Ontario, December 9th, 1905.

SIR,—In accordance with your instructions to me, dated May thirty-first, nineteen hundred and five, to survey the township of Playfair, on the Black River, west of Upper Lake Abitibi, in the District of Nipissing, I beg to report thereon as follows.

The township of Playfair is bounded on the east by the township of Cook, on the north by the township of Hislop, on the west by the township of McCann, on the south by the unsurveyed lands of the Crown. It is reached from the town of New Liskeard by way of the Blanche River as far as the height of land, thence by the White Clay and Black Rivers. This township is situated on the located line of the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway, now under construction.

The survey was commenced the 6th July, at the eighteenth mile post, on Ontario Land Surveyor Speight's meridian line, nineteen hundred and two. From this point the south boundary of the township was run west astronomically to its intersection with the southerly production of the east boundary of the township of McCann. The width of lot number one on this line was made fifty-six chains and fifty links, and of the others forty chains, except lot number thirteen, the width of which was found to be thirty-nine chains and forty-three links. The remaining concession lines were also run west astronomically from the successive mile posts planted by Ontario Land Surveyor Speight on his meridian. The side lines between lots three and four, five and six, seven and eight, nine and ten, and eleven and twelve, were run north astronomically from the south boundary of the township until they intersected the north boundary. On the iron post one and seven-eighth inches in diameter, at the southeast angle of the township, was marked "Playfair" on the northwest side, "1" on the west side. At the southwest angle of the township an iron post one and seven-eighth inches in diameter, having "Playfair" marked on the northeast side, "XIII" on the east side, "Con. 1" on the north side, was planted alongside the wooden post similarly marked. The ironposts at the northeast and northwest angles of the township had already been properly marked by Ontario Land Surveyor Robertson. Iron posts, one and one-quarter inches in diameter, were planted on the side line between lots seven and eight, where the same intersected the south boundary, the line between concessions three and four and the north boundary, and where the line between concessions three and four intersected the west boundary. Posts of the most durable wood that could be found were planted at the intersection of the concession lines and the side lines throughout the township, and marked on the north and south sides for the concessions, and on the east and west sides for the lots. The wooden posts planted at the centre of the mile blocks were marked on the east and west sides for the numbers of the lots, and on the north side only for the number of the concession. All the lines were run with the transit, well opened and carefully blazed.

Before proceeding to the township a table was prepared, giving the Azimuth of Polaris for every ten minutes of Sidereal time throughout a convenient interval. The formula used in making the calculation was:—

$$\tan A = \frac{\tan P \sec L \sin t}{1 - \tan P \tan L \cos t}$$
, where P is the Polar distance of the star, t its hour angle, and A its Azimuth, and L the latitude of the observer. A watch regulated to carry Sidereal time was used and corrected at convenient intervals by observing the time of transit of suitably chosen stars, usually of the first magnitude.

The telescope used being amply powerful to show stars of the first and second magnitude within two or three hours of sunset, observations were taken frequently and in daylight. Besides avoiding the errors peculiar to all artificial illumination and likely to be specially developed in the case of field work in inconvenient positions, and with light from reading lamps held by hand inconstant in direction and unsteady, daylight observations have the advantage that they are conveniently made with the instrument at one of the stations for the ordinary production of the line, and during its progress without materially, if at all, interfering therewith. With modern instruments there is no longer any necessity for night observations with all the discomforts attending the use of lanterns. After the day's work in the field the night is best devoted to rest.

Appended hereto is a copy of the table above mentioned.

The township of Playfair is situated at the southern edge of the great northern clay belt. About ten per cent. of the surface is rock, and totally unfit for agriculture, about fifteen per cent. is muskeg, which might be rendered productive by drainage. About twenty-five per cent. might be classed as poor agricultural land, being too sandy to be fertile. The remaining fifty per cent. may be classed as good agricultural land.

The township is timbered throughout, except along a few of the small creeks. That portion lying north and east of Black River, and the greater part of concession six between lot number nine and the Black River, was burned in July, nineteen hundred and five. Spruce is the predominating timber, and is found on almost every lot in quantities sufficient for the settler for fuel and building. There are a few small areas of fairly good banksian pine, tamarac, cedar, birch and balsam, as well as some small white-wood and poplar. There is no red or white pine in the township.

Outcroppings of rock, in some cases amounting to quite high hills, occurred very frequently on the south boundary, and in that portion of the township south of the line between concessions three and four, and on the west boundary. In other parts of the township outcroppings were occasionally met with. The rock is a diorite, and veins of white quartz in it were very common. No economic minerals were met with.

The township throughout is well watered by the Black River, the Wild Goose River, and numerous small creeks in the south and southwesterly part of the township. Three small lakes were met with. There is an excellent spring in lot thirteen, in concessions one and two. The water is of excellent quality, the supply is sufficient, and likely to be permanent.

There are two water powers on the Black River, one on lots numbers three and four, concessions three, having a capacity of approximately one hundred and seventy-five horsepower. The other water power, situated in lot number three, concession five, has a capacity of approximately two hundred and seventy-five horse power.

On July seventh and July fifteenth there were summer frosts, but they were not severe enough to injure vegetation. Berries were found in abundance, particularly in any open spot in the woods. Raspberries, gooseberries and wild currants were very common, while blueberry bushes and cranberries were also plentiful. A berry known to the Indians as the flagatoma is common in the swamps.

In the water there is a notable scarcity of fish of any kind. Other game seems to be plentiful. Evidences of moose, caribou, deer, bear and otter were everywhere met with. Old beaver dams were found in a great many places. These animals seem to have almost totally disappeared. There are plenty of partridges and other small game.

The traverse of the Black River and the lakes met with was made with transit. The measurements were made by means of Stadia.

TOWNSHIP OF BARR

DISTRICT OF NIPISSING.

NEW LISKEARD, Ontario, December 1st, 1905.

SIR,—In accordance with your instructions to me dated May first, nineteen hundred and five, to survey the township of Barr, on the Montreal River, District of Nipissing, I beg to report thereon as follows:—

The township of Barr is bounded on the east by the township of Firstbrook, on the north by the townships of Lundy and Auld, on the southwest by the Montreal River, on the south by the unsurveyed lands of the Crown. It is reached from Latchford Station, on the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway, by way of Bay Lake and the Montreal River. These waters are navigable except for a short distance just south of the township, where a rapid causes the only interruption to navigation for a distance of about forty miles. With a slight expenditure, this rapid could be rendered navigable for small boats.

The survey was commenced on the twenty-second of August, at the southwesterly angle of the township of Firstbrook. From this point, the south boundary of the township of Barr was run west astronomically to its intersection with the easterly shore of the Montreal River. The remaining concession lines were run west astronomically from points on the west boundary of Firstbrook, determined by chaining off distances of exactly eighty chains, commencing at the said southwesterly angle. The widths of the lots on the south boundary were made forty chains, except lot number three. The side lines between lots two and three, four and five, six and seven, etc., were run north astronomically from points thus determined on the proper concession lines, until they intersected the south boundary of the township of Lundy. The side line between lots ten and eleven was run south astronomically from a point properly located on the said south boundary of Lundy.

On the iron post one and seven-eighth inches in diameter, at the north-east angle of the township, was marked "Barr" on the southwest side. It had already been properly marked for the lot and concession. On the iron post, one and seven-eighth inches in diameter, at the southeast angle of the township, was marked "I" on the west side for the number of the lot, "Barr" on the northwest side. The mark "Westbrook" on the northeast side was changed to "Firstbrook." This post had been already properly marked for the number of the concession. Where the south boundary of the township intersected the east shore of the Montreal River, an iron post one and seven-eighth inches in diameter having "Barr" and "Con. I" marked on the north side, "III" on the east side for the number of the lot, was planted alongside a wooden post similarly marked. Where the south boundary of the township of Auld intersected the east shore of the Montreal River, an iron post one and seven-eighth inches in diameter, having "Barr" marked on the southeast side, "Con. VI" on the south side, and "XII" on the east side for the number of the lot, was planted alongside a wooden post similarly marked. Where the line between concessions

three and four intersected the east boundary of the township, an iron post one and one-quarter inches in diameter was planted alongside a wooden post and properly marked, and where the same intersected the east shore of the Montreal River, an iron post one and one-quarter inches in diameter, properly marked, was planted alongside a wooden post. On the line between lot six and seven, iron posts one and one-quarter inches in diameter, properly marked, were planted alongside wooden posts, where the said line intersected the northerly shore of the Montreal River, and where it intersected the north boundary of the township. Posts of the most durable wood that could be found were planted at the intersection of the concession lines and the side lines throughout the township, and marked on the north and south sides for the concession, and on the east and west sides for the lots. The wooden posts planted at the centres of the mile blocks on the concession lines were marked on the east and west sides for the numbers of the lots, and on the north side only for the numbers of the concession. All the lines were run with the transit, well opened and carefully blazed.

Before proceeding to the township, a table was prepared, giving the azimuth of polaris for every ten minutes, sidereal time, throughout a convenient interval. The calculation was made by means of a well known formula of Practical Astronomy. A watch regulated to carry Sidereal time was used and corrected at convenient intervals by observing the time of transit of suitably chosen stars, usually the first magnitude.

Appended hereto is a copy of the table above mentioned.

About ninety per cent. of the township is rock and unfit for agriculture. Of the remainder, about five per cent. is swampy, and so situated as to be impossible of drainage. The remainder might be classified as good agricultural clay land.

The township is well timbered throughout. Lots one to five inclusive, in concessions four to six inclusive, are timbered principally with birch, spruce, balsam, banksian pine and some cedar, and occasionally a red or white pine. That portion of the township shown by the timber plan accompanying this report, to be timbered with red and white pine, is valuable, and ought to be reserved. The remaining part of the township contains considerable red and white pine of value, which occurs in small quantities here and there. It is doubtful if the quantity of red and white pine in the last mentioned portion is sufficient to warrant reserving any of the lots for the timber value.

Outcroppings of rock, in some cases, in the northerly part, amounting to very rugged hills, occurred constantly throughout the township. Those south of the line between concessions three and four, are reddish slate. The outcroppings along the north boundary are, for the most part, apparently a diabase. Between these two areas, the rock principally is a slaty conglomerate. No economic minerals were met with.

The township is well watered by the Montreal River and numerous small creeks. There are four small lakes in the township.

There are no water powers in the township.

Wild fruits of all kinds were scarce. Game was plentiful in the township. Moose, red deer and bear were common. The fresh works of beaver were met with in several places. Partridge and other small game such as mink, were common. In the water of the Montreal River, fish of several kinds were very plentiful, and of large size.

The traverse of the Montreal River, and the lakes met with, was made with the transit, measurements were made by means of Stadia.

TOWNSHIP OF WILLISON

DISTRICT OF NIPISSING.

TORONTO JUNCTION, Ontario, December 1st, 1905.

SIR.—In pursuance of instructions from the Department of Lands and Mines, I proceeded to the survey of the townships of Willison and Flavelle. I went by the way of North Bay and on to Latchford by railway, thence by canoes with my whole party and full supplies for the season up the Montreal River to the township of Willison and beg to report on the subdivision thereof as follows:—

I first ran the south boundary of Willison west from Niven's post at the southwest angle of the township, to the Montreal River, then the other concession lines were run west from Niven's posts on the east boundary, and the side lines north from my own posts on the concession lines. All lines were made continuous throughout the township. The west boundary was run south to the river from the northwest angle, so as to eliminate any jog that might otherwise occur with the west boundary of the adjoining township to the north.

Iron posts were planted at all corners where these had not been previously placed, together with the usual wooden posts. Iron posts were also placed at the extremities and centre line of the front of the fourth concession line, and also at the extremities of the side line between lots six and seven, all as shown in the field notes of the survey. Posts were marked thereof as follows:—

A one and seven-eighth inch iron post was found standing at the southeast angle and was marked on the northeast side "Davidson." I cut on its northwest side with a cold chisel "Willison," on the west side "I," and on the north side "Con. I."

On the south boundary near the east bank of the Montreal River I planted a one and seven-eighth inch iron post on which I cut with a cold chisel on its northeast side "Willison," and on the north side "Con. I."

At the northeast angle of the township a one and seven-eighth inch iron post was found standing with the names of the two adjoining townships to the east cut thereon. I cut with a cold chisel on the southwest side "Willison," and on the west side "I," on the northwest side "Flavelle."

At the northwest angle of the township I planted a one and seven-eighth inch iron post, on its southeast side was cut with a cold chisel "Willison," and on its northeast side was cut "Flavelle," on the south side "Con. VI," and on the north side "Con. I," and on the east side "12."

On the west boundary at a point near the Montreal River, I planted a one and seven-eighth inch iron post and cut on its east side with a cold chisel "Willison and I," and on the north side "Con. V."

On the north boundary at the intersection of side line lots six and seven, I planted a one and one-quarter inch iron post and cut on its east side "VI," on its west side "VII," and on its south side "Con. VI."

In the centre of the township at the intersection of concession line three and four, and side line lots six and seven, I planted a one and one-quarter inch iron post, and cut with a cold chisel on its east side "VI," on its west side "VII," on its north side "Con. IV," and on its south side "Con. III."

On the east boundary at the intersection of concession line three and four, I planted a one and one-quarter inch iron post and marked it with a cold chisel on its west side "I," on its north side "Con. IV," and on its south side "Con. III."

All of these posts were supplied by the Department of Lands and Mines and were painted red.

The Montreal River was traversed by transit and Stadia, along the southwest boundary of the township, and all islands in the rivers surveyed as shown on the plan and field notes. Some of these islands are mere sand bars and liable to be flooded.

All lakes and ponds met with were traversed and the water areas deducted from the areas of the lots marked on the plan.

The lines of the survey were run with solar instruments and were well cut and opened out, as well as would have been necessary with transit lines. From the nature of the solar instrument all solar lines are astronomical, and observations for bearing are taken many times during all clear days, and when the sun shines, any observations taken for latitude or for azimuth on polaris with the transit are recorded in the field notes.

The Montreal River affords a fine outlet from the railway into this and other townships along that river. Its width varies from two chains to considerably more all of the way up. Several portages require to be made in going up stream. However, with full loads and full party the passage was made to the falls at the southwest corner of the township in two and a half days. The passage was made in one day in returning and all rapids were run. The canoes will carry two thousand pounds each, and took up my whole party and supplies for the season in one trip.

The soil is sandy and light, the surface is flat, with a great deal of swamp. It is not much broken by rocks, except along the northern parts. Very few creeks or streams were met with, nor were any lakes found.

One settler, an Indian, with his family have settled on the bank of the river above the falls. Several buildings are up, some fencing has been done. All were away at the time of the survey and I did not learn the Indian's name. Except this one family, no squatters or occupants have gone into the township.

The timber is all small, it must have been burned over not long ago, but no recent fire seems to have occurred. The trees are not large enough for lumbering purposes. The timber is composed of jack pine, spruce, cedar and tamarac, the tamarac is all dead. No hardwoods are seen. The spruce trees are too small to be profitable for pulpwood.

The flat sandy land by clearing and draining might be made into farms. The falls on the river at the southwest angle of the township come more within the township of Smyth and should be more particularly described by the surveyor of that township. This falls could be converted into a good water power. The dam would require to be built across the river at a little north of the production west of the base line of Willison, and a reserve might be made of that part of lot four cut off by a line running south from the intersection of the east bank of the river and the southern limit of the clearance shown in the field notes on page fifty-eight.

The various rapids on the river above are not suitable for power.

Moose are the only species of game that are plentiful to be found in the township.

TOWNSHIP OF FLAVELLE.

DISTRICT OF NIPISSING.

TORONTO JUNCTION, Ontario, December 1st, 1905.

SIR,—In pursuance of instructions from the Department of Lands and Mines, I proceeded to the survey of the townships of Willison and Flavelle. I went by way of North Bay and on to Latchford by railway, thence by canoes with my whole party and supplies for the season up the Montreal River to the township of Willison. After subdividing Willison I made the survey of Flavelle, and beg to report concerning the latter township as follows:—

I ran the south boundary west from Niven's post at its southeast angle, planting posts at forty chains apart for the lots, making the base net six miles in length, then the other concession lines were run west from Niven's posts on the east boundary, and the side lines north from my own base to their intersection with the base line of the township of Holmes, which had been previously run. All lines were run continuously throughout the township, the west boundary being a production north of the west boundary of the township of Willison.

Iron posts were planted at all corners of the township where these had not been previously placed, together with the usual wooden posts. Iron posts were also placed at the extremities and centre line of the front of the fourth concession line, and also at the north extremity of the side line between lots six and seven, as shown in the field notes and plan of the survey. Posts were marked as follows:—

An iron post one and seven-eighth inches in diameter was found standing at the northeast corner of the township with the names of the adjoining

townships marked thereon with a cold chisel. I cut thereon with a cold chisel on the southwest side "Flavelle," and on the west side "I."

At the northwest angle of the township a one and one-quarter inch iron post was planted, and had cut thereon with a cold chisel on the southeast side "Flavelle," on the south side "Con. VI," and on the east side "12."

At the southwest angle of the township a one and seven-eighth inch iron post was planted and had cut thereon with a cold chisel on the northeast side "Flavelle," and on the southeast side "Willison," on the north side "Con. I," on the south side "Con. VI," and on the east side "12."

At the southeast corner of the township a one and seven-eighth inch iron post was found standing with the names of the adjoining townships cut thereon. I cut with a cold chisel on the northwest side "Flavelle," and on the southwest side "Willison," and on the west side "I."

On the north boundary of the township at the intersection of side line lots six and seven, I planted a one and one-quarter inch iron post cut with a cold chisel on the east side "VI," on the west side "VII," and on the south side "Con. VI."

On the west boundary of the township at the intersection of concession line three and four, a one and one-quarter inch iron post was planted, and had cut thereon with a cold chisel on the north side "Con. IV," on the south side "Con. III," and on the east side "XII."

At the centre of the township, in the intersection of concession lines three and four, and side line lots six and seven, was planted a one and one-quarter inch iron post, and had marked thereon with a cold chisel on the north side "Con. IV," on the south side "Con. III," on the east side "VI," and on the west side "VII."

On the east boundary of the township at the intersection of the line concessions three and four, a one and one-quarter inch iron post was planted, and had cut thereon with a cold chisel on the south side "Con. III," on the north side "Con. IV," on the west side "I."

All of these posts were supplied by the Department of Lands and Mines, and were painted red.

All lakes and ponds seen were traversed, and the water areas deducted from the areas of the lots marked on the plan.

The lines of the survey were run with solar instruments, and were well cut out and opened, as well as would have been necessary with transit lines. All were thoroughly blazed. From the nature of a solar instrument, all solar lines are astronomical, and observations for bearing are taken many times a day when the sun can be seen. At other times the lines are directed in a similar way to lines run with a theodolite.

The soil of this township is light and sandy. The surface is much more broken by rocks and mountains than is Willison, to the south of it. I may class this township as wholly rock or swamp, and not suitable for settlement.

No streams of importance were met with. Not many lakes were seen though several of considerable areas were found in the northwestern quarter.

No squatters have located within the township.

Moose are very plentiful in this whole neighborhood. Very little other game exists.

The timber is all small, not large enough for lumbering or pulpwood. It is composed of jack pine, spruce, cedar, tamarac, birch, poplar, with small maples on the hills and rocky parts. The tamarac trees are all dead. No very recent fires have taken place, though from the smallness of the timber fires must have very generally burned over the country not long ago.

The Montreal River passes within two miles of the southwestern corner of the township, and affords easy access to the township.

An occasional white pine was seen, of size and quality good enough for timber.

TOWNSHIP OF LAURA.

DISTRICT OF NIPISSING.

SUDBURY, Ontario, December 20th, 1905.

SIR,—In accordance with instructions from your Department, dated the thirty-first of May, nineteen hundred and five, I beg to report on the survey of the township of Laura, in the District of Nipissing.

As this township adjoins the township of Servos on the west, and was surveyed immediately after Servos, I need say nothing as to my method of reaching there.

I followed the instructions as in the township of Servos, taking astronomical observations at frequent intervals.

Posts were planted and marked as follows:—

At the southeast angle of the township only a portion of Provincial Land Surveyor Bell's post was found, which was replaced by a six-inch square spruce post marked "Con. I" on the north side, "XII" on the east side, and "I" on the west side.

An iron post one and seven-eighth inches in diameter, three feet long, painted red, forged at the top to shed the rain, and pointed at the bottom, was planted alongside the wooden post above mentioned and marked "Servos" on the northeast side, "Laura" on the northwest side, and "Cox" on the south side, with a cold chisel. A large stone mound was placed around the two posts. No bearing tree could be had at a reasonable distance, as the timber at this place is small.

At the northeast angle of the township Provincial Land Surveyor Bell's post was found alongside of a squared iron post, hollow, open at the end, and marked "Secord and LIII" on the northwest side, "Burwash and XLV" on the northeast side, "XLIV" on the southeast side, and "LII" on the southwest side.

Planted an iron post one and seven-eighth inches in diameter, three feet long, painted red, forged at the top to shed the rain, and pointed at the bottom this post was marked "Servos" on the southeast side, "Burwash" on the northeast side, "Laura" on the southwest side, and "Secord" on the northwest side, with a cold chisel.

A balsam post was planted alongside the other posts and marked "Con. VI" on the south side, "XII" on the east side, and "I" on the west side.

At the southwest angle of the township an iron post one and seven-eighth inches in diameter, three feet long, painted red, forged at the top to shed the rain, and pointed at the bottom, was planted alongside Ontario Land Surveyor D. Beatty's iron and cedar post, and marked "Laura" on the northeast side, "Waldie" on the southeast side.

The cedar post seven inches square was marked "Con. I" on the north side, and "XIII" on the east side. A stone mound was placed around the group of posts.

At the northwest angle of the township an iron post one and seven-eighth inches in diameter, three feet long, painted red, forged at the top to shed the rain, and pointed at the bottom, was planted alongside Provincial Land Surveyor Bell's cedar post, and an iron post marked "Secord and LIII" on the northeast side, "Tilden and LXI" on the northwest side, "LX" on the southwest side, and "LII" on the southeast side, and was marked "Laura" on the southeast side, "Secord" on the northeast side, "Tilden" on the northwest side, with a cold chisel.

A cedar post marked "Con. VI" on the south side, "XIII" on the east side.

A one and one-quarter inch iron post was planted alongside of a six-inch white pine post at the southeast angle of lot one, concession four, marked "Con. IV" on the north side, "Con. III" on the south side, and "I" on the west side. The wooden post was marked similarly. The iron post was three feet long, painted red, forged at the top to shed the rain, and pointed at the bottom.

A one and one-quarter inch iron post three feet long, painted red, forged at the top to shed the rain, and pointed at the bottom, was planted at the southwest angle of lot six in the first concession, alongside a six-inch tamarac post, and both marked as follows, "Con. I" on the north side, "VI" on the east side, "VII" on the west side.

A one and one-quarter inch iron post three feet long, painted red, forged at the top to shed the rain, and pointed at the bottom, was planted alongside a seven-inch cedar post at the intersection of the line between lots six and seven with the line between concessions three and four, and both posts were marked as follows, "Con. IV" on the north side, "Con. III" on the south side, "VI" on the east side, and "VII" on the west side. A cairn of stones was placed around the two posts.

A one and one-quarter inch iron post, three feet long, painted red, forged at the top to shed the rain, and pointed at the bottom, was planted at the intersection of the line between lots six and seven with the north boundary of the township, alongside a six-inch cedar post, and both marked as follows, "Con. VI" on the south side, "VI" on the east side, and "VII" on the west side. A stone mound was placed around the two posts.

A one and one-quarter inch iron post, three feet in length, painted red, forged at the top to shed the rain, and pointed at the bottom, was planted alongside a six-inch red pine post in a stone mound at the intersection of the line between concessions three and four with the west boundary of the township, and both were marked as follows, "Con. III" on the south side, "Con. IV" on the north side, and "XIII" on the east side.

The general character of the township is quite similar to that of Servos. The southern part of the township is fairly level, while the northern portion is more rocky and broken.

The Wahnapiatae River flows in a southwesterly direction through the township, and has an average width of about two hundred feet. The north boundary crosses the only rapid in the township. This rapid is very small, and offers poor inducements for the development of power. There are several excellent water powers on the river in the next township to the south (Secord.)

The rock was Laurentian gneiss, as in the township of Servos.

The amount of arable land is about forty per cent. of the total area, and is of good quality, being clay and clay loam. No squatters were found, and no land cleared.

The timber was mostly small poplar and birch. There were several areas of large timber in the township. Some very good oak was noticed on the westerly side of Wahnapiatae River.

Accompanying this report are plans, field notes and accounts.

TOWNSHIP OF SERVOS.

DISTRICT OF NIPISSING.

Sudbury, Ontario, December 20th, 1905.

SIR,—I have the honor to submit the following report on the survey of the township of Servos, in the District of Nipissing, surveyed by me under instructions from your Department, dated May thirty-first, nineteen hundred and five.

This township is bounded on the north by the township of Burwash, on the east by the township of Hoskin, on the south by the township of Cox, and on the west by the township of Laura, surveyed by me under the above mentioned instructions. The township of Servos was formerly known as timber berth forty-four.

Having organized my party, I left Sudbury on July third, and went to Wahnapiatae village. We then proceeded in canoes down the Wahnapiatae River and Elbow Lake to the wagon road used during the construction of the Toronto-Sudbury branch of the Canadian Pacific Railway. By wagon we arrived at Sheppard Lake, where we used the canoes again, and proceeded to the southeasterly angle of the township.

At the southeast angle of the township I found the posts as indicated in DeMorest and Silvester's field notes. I marked the iron post with the name "Servos" on the northwest side.

I retraced, opened up, and rechaind the south boundary of township, planting posts at every forty chains. At the end of the first mile I took

an astronomical observation, and started the line between lots two and three. The survey was then proceeded with in the usual way, making the depths of the concessions eighty chains on the east boundary. Frequent observations were taken during the progress of this work.

I did not rechain the north boundary of this township, but calculated the widths of the lots from the field notes of the township of Burwash.

I found, opened up, reblazed and rechained the line run by Provincial Land Surveyor Bell, as directed in my instructions, and which I adopted as the west boundary of the township. This line was found to be in good condition, one post only not being found.

Owing to the fact that the greater portion of the township was sparsely wooded, stone mounds were placed around the posts where it was possible.

Posts were planted and marked as follows:—

At the southeast angle of the township Provincial Land Surveyor Bell's post (old and much decayed) marked "VI" on the north side.

A seven-inch jack pine post, planted by DeMorest and Silvester, marked "Hoskin" on the northeast side, "Cox" on the south side, was marked "Servos" on the northwest side. This post was also marked "Con. I" on the north side, "XII" on the east side, and "I" on the west side.

An iron post one and seven-eighth inches in diameter, painted red, and forged at the top so as to shed the rain, pointed at the bottom and three feet long, marked "Hoskin" on the northeast side, and "Cox" on the south side, was marked "Servos" on the northwest side with a cold chisel.

All the posts were in a large stone mound.

NOTE.—These posts were marked "Cox" on the south side in error.

At the northeast angle of the township Provincial Land Surveyor Bell's post marked "VI M" on the west side, "Con. VI" on the south side, "XII" on the east side.

Cedar post seven inches square marked "Hoskin" on the southeast side, "XII" on the east side, "Con. VI" south side, was marked "I" on the west side.

An iron post one and seven-eighth inches in diameter, three feet long, painted red, forged at the top to shed the rain, and pointed at the bottom, marked "Hoskin" on the southeast side, "Burwash" on the northwest side, and "Hendry" on the northeast side, was marked "Servos" on the southwest side with a cold chisel.

The bearing tree was a balsam six inches south seventy-five degrees west twenty-one links.

At the southwest angle of the township only a portion of Provincial Land Surveyor Bell's post was found, which was replaced by a six-inch square spruce post marked "Con. I" on the north side, on the east side "XII."

An iron post one and seven-eighth inches in diameter, three feet long, painted red, forged at the top to shed the rain, and pointed at the bottom, was planted alongside the wooden post above mentioned and marked "Servos" on the northeast side, "Laura" on the northwest side, and "Cox" on the south side with a cold chisel. A large stone mound was placed around the two posts. No bearing tree could be had at reasonable distance, as the timber at this place is small.

At the northwest angle of the township Provincial Land Surveyor Bell's post was found alongside of a squared iron post, hollow, with open end marked "Secord and LIII" on the northwest side, "Burwash and XLV" on the northeast side, "XLIV" on the southeast side, "LII" on the southwest side.

Planted an iron post one and seven-eighth inches in diameter, three feet long, painted red, forged at the top to shed the rain, and pointed at the bottom, this post was marked "Servos" on the southeast side, "Laura" on the southwest side, "Burwash" on the northeast side, and "Secord" on the northwest side.

A balsam post six inches square was planted alongside the other posts and marked "Con. VI" on the south side, "XII" on the east side, and "I" on the west side.

A one and one-quarter inch iron post, three feet long, painted red, and forged at the top to shed the rain, and pointed at the bottom, was planted alongside the wooden post at the southeasterly angle of lot one, concession four, and marked "Con. VI" on the north side, "Con. III" on the south side, and "I" on the west side with a cold chisel.

A one and one-quarter inch iron post, three feet long, painted red, forged at the top to shed the rain, and pointed at the bottom, was planted alongside a cedar post on the north shore of Lovering Lake on the line between lots six and seven, and marked "Con. IV" on the north side, "VI" on the east side, and "VII" on the west side. The wooden post was marked similarly, and a stone mound was placed around them.

The intersection of the line between concessions three and four and the line between lots six and seven falling in Lovering Lake, the iron post was placed as above mentioned.

A one and one-quarter inch iron post, three feet long, painted red, forged at the top to shed the rain, and pointed at the bottom, was planted alongside the wooden post at the intersection of the line between lots six and seven with the north boundary of the township, and marked "VI" on the east side, "VII" on the west side, and "Con. VI" on the south side. The wooden post was marked similarly. A large stone mound was placed around the posts.

A one and one-quarter inch iron post, three feet long, painted red, forged at the top to shed the rain, and pointed at the bottom, was planted on the south boundary at the southwest angle of lot six, and marked "Con. I" on the north side, "VII" on the west side, and "VI" on the east side alongside a wooden post similarly marked.

A one and one-quarter inch iron post, three feet long, painted red, forged at the top to shed the rain, and pointed at the bottom, was planted alongside a wooden post at the intersection of the line between concessions three and four with the west boundary of the township, and marked "Con. IV" on the north side, "Con. III" on the south side, and "XII" on the west side. The wooden post was marked similarly.

The shores of the lakes and creeks in this township are almost invariably rocky and broken, while inland the country is fairly level, being broken with low, rocky ridges. There are several small lakes in the township, the largest being Kakakiwaganda (Raven's Home). The township is, as a whole, well watered.

The soil is mostly clay and clay loam. Some sandy soil occurs in the southeasterly part of the township. About thirty-five per cent. of the land is good for agricultural purposes.

There is practically no timber of value in the township, with the exception of a few isolated pines near Trout Lake, and some cedar in lot twelve, concession five. The southern and western portions of the township are sparsely timbered with small poplar and birch, from two to six inches in diameter. I am pleased to report that an excellent crop of young white

and red pine is growing almost everywhere, and is, apparently, in a good healthy condition.

The Toronto-Sudbury branch of the Canadian Pacific Railway was being constructed during the progress of our work. There were several construction camps along the railway line. No settlers were found in the township.

Laurentian gneiss was the only rock noticed, and no indications of mineral were seen. The rock shows the usual signs of glaciation. The magnetic variation was fairly steady at about six and one-half degrees west.

Red deer and bear were numerous, and moose signs were seen occasionally. Pike, pickerel and bass were abundant.

Accompanying this report are general plan, traverse plan, railway plan, timber plan and field notes.

ALGONQUIN NATIONAL PARK.

ALGONQUIN PARK P. O., February 13, 1906.

HONORABLE F. COCHRANE,
Minister of Lands and Mines, Toronto, Ont.

HONORABLE SIR,—I beg to hand you report on the Algonquin National Park of Ontario for the year 1905, and trust same will meet with your approval. My staff consists of Superintendent, Chief Ranger, and eleven rangers. We have, as you are aware, an area of over two thousand square miles of forest, stream and lake, being beyond a doubt the finest game and fish preserve in America.

Game of all kinds is very abundant. Every lake, pond and stream has beaver in great numbers over this vast area, and otter, mink, fisher and marten are also very numerous, and become so tame owing to protection that the hundreds of visitors to the park are able to see them, a privilege they very much appreciate.

The deer can be seen in great numbers everywhere, and have become so tame that they do not mind the approach of man, but will allow a canoe to paddle close up to them. Two ladies from Ottawa last July sat for an hour and watched fifteen deer feeding in the lily pads within a short distance of headquarters. A party out canoeing counted in one week 164 deer. I mention these facts to show how numerous and tame the deer have become. Moose are also on the increase in the park, and a great many were seen last year by visitors and some very good pictures of them secured. Some caribou were also seen in the park last summer. Fishing is good in all our lakes and streams. No finer speckled trout can be found in America than these lakes and streams afford, and the salmon trout are in abundance everywhere. The bass introduced some years ago have proved a great success, and the lakes in which they were placed, and all connecting streams, now afford splendid bass fishing.

I am glad to report that we have had fewer cases of poaching than during any previous year. There are many reports of cases of trapping, which when carefully followed up prove to be false, and I feel considering the smallness of my staff and the vast area they have to cover, they must have been most successful in maintaining the law and preserving the wealth of game in the park. At least one man to the township is necessary to patrol the park, properly cut out portages, built shelter houses, and attended to the other duties that fall to the lot of a ranger.

I had the south boundary well cut out last summer, and hope this year to continue the work till it is all so well defined that there can be no mistaking it. We have made several bark canoes during the past year, and I purpose making several more this year to put on inland lakes. This will lessen the amount of portaging a great deal and very much facilitate the work. We have made a complete set of new snowshoes this year for the entire staff. A good deal of cleaning up and improving has been done at headquarters.

Visitors to the park have been far greater than any previous year, and one and all expressed themselves as being delighted with everything, especially the abundance of game and fur bearing animals to be seen. This year I expect a very marked increase in the number of visitors to the park, which of course means increased work for the staff, and I hope you will give me a few more men.

We should have a large addition to the house here, and I hope you will give us a sufficient grant to make our headquarters a credit to the Province. Our people have here a preserve to be proud of, and one that will really be a great asset to the Province, a fact to which they are only just awakening.

We have had several reports of parties having seen capercaillie in different sections and the rangers have reported seeing some clutches of young. There is therefore good ground to hope that this splendid game bird is going to succeed here, and make a most valuable addition to our game.

I am glad to be able to report that although we have had hundreds of visitors from all over Canada, the United States and England, we have never had the slightest trouble with bush fires from this source, a fact that I feel speaks volumes for the class of visitors who annually avail themselves of this great health resort.

APPENDIX No. 53.

RONDEAU PROVINCIAL PARK.

MORPETH P. O., February 15th. 1906.

To the Honorable, the Minister of Lands and Mines, Toronto.

SIR,—I have the honor to submit this my report as caretaker and ranger of the Rondeau Provincial Park for the year 1905.

In my report for 1904 I gave a full account of the damage done to the park dock on the Rondeau Bay front up to that time. Since then the remaining 300 feet has been further damaged by the ice jams and natural decay,

to such an extent that it will require an entire new dock. If considered too late to begin to build one this season, there should at least be a light temporary extension of about 200 feet to the old part, so that small craft could land for the accommodation of excursionists, who come to the park in sail and gasoline yachts. The water is not more than $2\frac{1}{2}$ feet deep at the end of the present dock. The dock, boating and bathing are among the chief attractions at the park, and when building a new dock, the Government should also build a large public boat-house and public bath-house. These are both necessary, as there is not a proper place here at present for either the shelter of boats or for bathers to change their clothing in.

The beautiful drive road about $1\frac{1}{4}$ miles in length from the entrance to the park, and completed by the Government as far as the pavilion, has been greatly appreciated by the driving public. It is also becoming quite a thoroughfare for automobiles. Much would be added to its usefulness and to the attraction of the park if the road were continued through to the end of the bush, a distance of about $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles. The ranger would then be in a better position to protect the game animals and birds from poachers, who come in from the other end. If continued, the road would run through about the centre and best timbered portion of the park.

What is called the Lake Shore road, running through a beautiful belt of pines, was cleaned up, and the under brush cut away from each side this season. This is an ideal drive of about 7 miles, following the bend of Lake Erie shore through pines of all sizes, from the seedling to the large timber $3\frac{1}{2}$ feet at the stump. If the middle road were completed through to the lake shore there would only be a short distance, probably half a mile, to build, which would connect the ends of the two roads and form a complete drive around the park.

Another improvement which has been highly commended this season by the visiting public is the filling up and sodding of a few sand holes around the dancing pavilion; and the painting of the ranger's house, pavilion and other out buildings has added much to the appearance of the park, also the purchase of eight new tables with seats for the use of picnic parties and the erection of several new swings.

Several more building lots on the Rondeau front survey have been leased, and the cottages will be built thereon this coming season. About ten of the forty lots surveyed are not leased yet, but I have reason to believe they will be nearly all taken by the end of 1906.

What the park has most needed for several years is a public house for summer boarders, where also transient visitors may be accommodated with lunch, hot meals, or a night's lodging. There is a small restaurant where one may get a lunch at an outside counter. The little building is about 8x12 feet and one storey high. The accommodation given in this place this season was as good as could be expected under the circumstances, but it fell far short of the service expected by the public at a place of this kind. Therefore I urge the necessity of a proper house, with good stables in connection.

If the Government could place a saw-mill on the park and cut all the timber down that is fit for lumber, and all the standing trees that have come to maturity, but are on the decline, or if they would carry out a process of thinning and leave all the timber that is in a healthy condition standing, the bush would not only be left in a better state of preservation, but we would have all the rough lumber and timber that will be required in making the above improvements, and could sell more than enough to pay for them.

The park is becoming more popular each year, and now that an electric railway line is likely to come soon, the necessity for a public house is greatly increased.

There is a large swale running out of the bush, through the ranger's garden, emptying into the Eau, which drains over 1,000 acres of the low lands in the bush. In the spring the water sometimes raises to a depth of 2 or 2½ feet, and after does not dry away until June or July. These waters form a mosquito hatchery on a large scale. A good sized ditch across, above the picnic grounds from the swale to the Eau—about 30 rods—would do away with a great number of the mosquitoes, and also prevent the flooding of the ranger's cellars and garden in the future.

The herd of 15 red deer in the enclosure are looking better than they ever did before, at this season of the year, and there are between forty and fifty deer running wild in the open bush in the park. Their number is rapidly increasing.

The English, Mongolian and Golden and Silver pheasants in the bird enclosure are doing well, and prove a great attraction to visitors. The latest addition to the game in the enclosure is two pairs of wild geese. They were given to W. D. Wigle, Game Inspector, by H. H. Julien, Oxley P. O., for the Park.

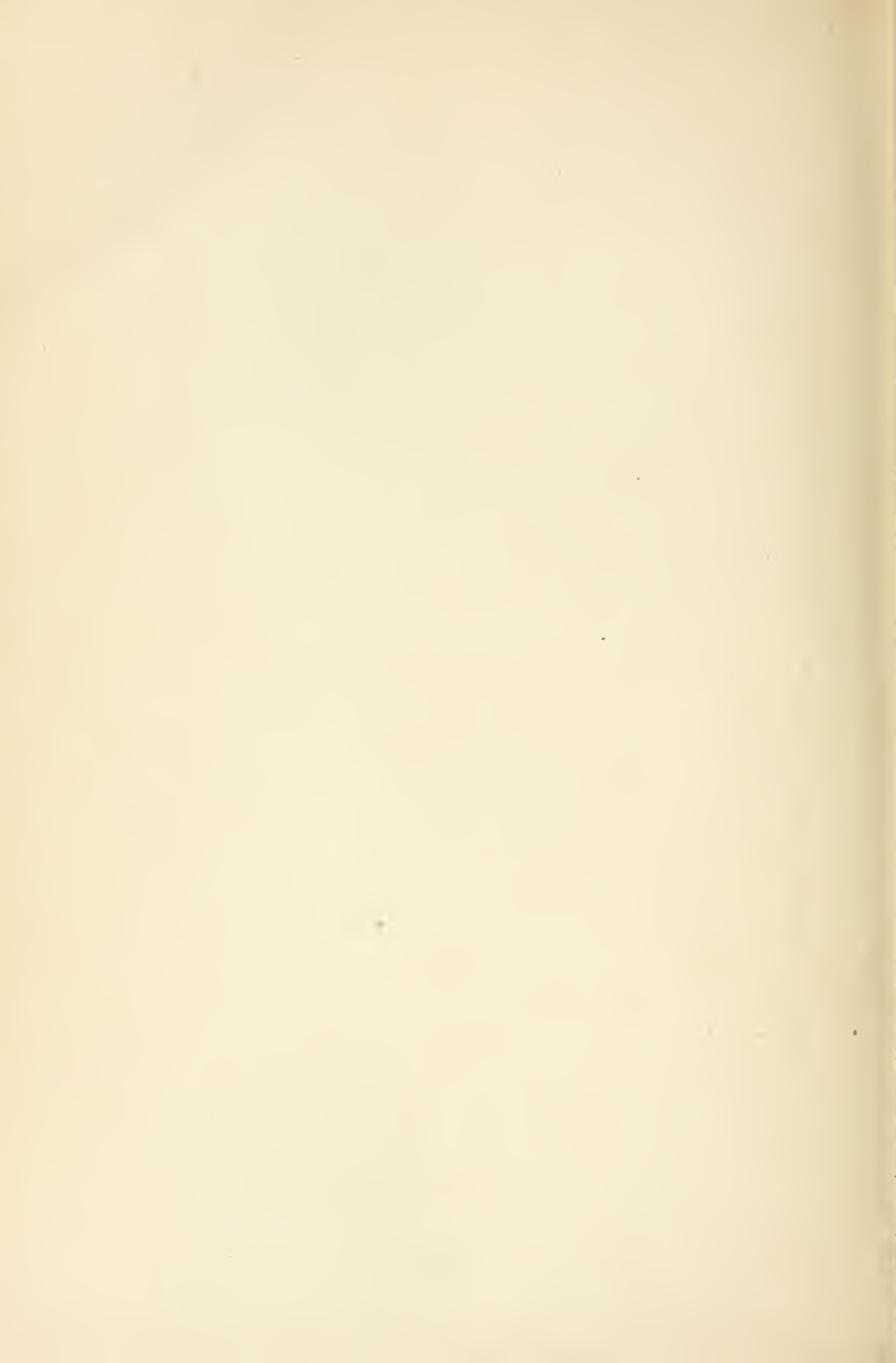

VEGETABLE GROWERS' ASSOCIATION

FORMATION OF THE ASSOCIATION.

The Ontario Vegetable Growers' Association, although only nine months old, promises to develop into one of the most important associations of the kind in the Province. On December first, 1905, it had a membership of 224, with branch associations at Toronto, Hamilton, St. Catharines, Chatham and Sarnia, with individual members scattered all through Ontario. In years to come it is probable that members of the organization will look back with interest to find the conditions under which the Association was organized, and it is desirable, therefore, that these shall be set down clearly in this, the first annual report of the Association.

Although previous to January, 1905, several attempts had been made in various parts of Ontario to organize a Provincial Vegetable Growers' Association, these attempts never passed much beyond the local stage. The first step in the movement that led to the formation of the Ontario Association resulted from an editorial that appeared in the January, 1905, issue of *The Canadian Horticulturist*, which read in part as follows: "What are the people interested in vegetable growing in Canada doing? Have they a Dominion organization, or a Provincial Association of any kind? * * * Vegetable growers should be as well organized, and should hold as many meetings and conventions as the fruit growers and florists. Speak up, vegetable growers, and let us know what you are doing."

This editorial led Mr. Joseph Rush of Humber Bay, a member of the Market Gardeners' Protective Association of Ontario, whose members were market gardeners living in the vicinity of Toronto, to arrange for a meeting that was held in the St. Lawrence Market, Toronto, early in January of the same year. The meeting was but slimly attended. Those present included Messrs. F. F. Reeves, R. Lankin, Geo. Syme, jr., John McKay, Jos. Rush, all of Toronto, and Mr. H. B. Cowan, editor of *The Canadian Horticulturist*. At this meeting it was decided to arrange for a larger meeting to be held in the Parliament Buildings, Toronto, early in February, to which growers from outside points were to be invited.

At the meeting held in February representative growers were present from Toronto and Hamilton. The advisability of forming a strong Provincial Association was considered and was unanimously approved. One of the principal speakers was Mr. C. C. James, Deputy Minister of Agriculture. The following committee was appointed to draft a constitution and to arrange for organization: Messrs. W. Carter, Dovercourt; Geo. Syme, jr., Carlton West; John McKay, Doncaster; R. Lankin, Toronto, representing the Market Gardeners' Protective Association of Ontario; W. C. Emory, of Aldershot, R. H. Lewis, A. E. Bates and E. J. Mahoney, of Hamilton, representing the Gardeners and Fruit Growers' Association of Hamilton, and H. B. Cowan, of Toronto.

At the first meeting of this committee, held March 1st, 1905, all the members were present. There were present, also, Messrs. W. C. McCalla and W. H. Bunting, of St. Catharines, J. M. Honsberger of Jordan Station, and F. F. Reeves, of Humber Bay, who were permitted to take part in the discussion. It was decided to call the new organization The Ontario Vegetable Growers' Association.

After considerable discussion Messrs. Emory, Syme, McCalla and Cowan were appointed a special committee to draft a constitution. This committee was empowered to call a meeting of the vegetable growers generally and to submit their report at this meeting.

The actual formation of the Ontario Vegetable Growers' Association took place at a meeting held in the Parliament Buildings, Toronto, March 25th, 1905. Those present included Messrs. W. A. Emory, Aldershot; E. J. Mahoney, Hamilton; Jos. Rush and F. F. Reeves, Humber Bay; W. Carter, Dovercourt; Geo. Syme, jr., Carlton West; John McKay, Doncaster; R. Lankin, Toronto; J. E. Terrill, Picton; A. McMeans, Brantford; W. C. McCalla, St. Catharines; John Atkin, Sarnia; H. D. Anderson, Dresden; J. W. Hyatt, West Lake, and H. B. Cowan, Toronto.

At this meeting the special committee appointed to draft the constitution presented its report, which was carefully considered, and which resulted in the adoption of the constitution published in another page of this report. The election of provisional officers resulted in all present being appointed to act in that capacity until the annual meetings of the branch associations to be held the following December. The election of officers resulted as follows:—President, W. A. Emory, Aldershot; First Vice-President, Jos. Rush, Humber Bay; Secretary-Treasurer, H. B. Cowan, Toronto. Thus was completed the organization of the Ontario Vegetable Growers' Association.

YEAR'S WORK OF THE ASSOCIATION.

The following statement was forwarded during the last week in November by the Secretary-Treasurer of the Ontario Vegetable Growers' Association to the secretaries of the branch associations, for consideration by their members at the annual meetings of the branch associations.

DEAR SIR,—On behalf of the Directors of the Ontario Vegetable Growers' Association I beg to report that the formation of the Ontario Vegetable Growers' Association was completed at an open meeting of vegetable growers, held in Toronto, March 25. At this meeting the constitution of the Association was finally adopted, a printed copy of which is enclosed.

Since this meeting an attempt has been made to form branch associations, which has resulted in branches being formed at Toronto, Hamilton, St. Catharines, Leamington, Chatham and Sarnia. A number of individual growers have become members of the Ontario Association by payment of \$1. It is expected many branch associations will be formed during the coming year.

The most important matter that has occupied the attention of your executive has been the preparation of a case, on behalf of the vegetable growers of the Province, to be submitted to the Tariff Commission, asking for an increase in the duty on vegetables. After endeavoring to gain the views of the vegetable growers all over the Province, and the co-operation of the Market Gardeners' Association of the Province of Quebec, a case was prepared and submitted to the Tariff Commission during its session in Toronto. The deputation received a cordial reception at the hands of the Commission, and the presentation of its case was listened to attentively, giving reason to hope that some measure of relief will be granted.

Your deputation asked for the following changes in the tariff:—

Cabbages: 3 cents per head.

Cucumbers: 25 per cent. *ad valorem*, no invoice to be accepted if marked at less than 25 cents per dozen.

Celery: 15 cents per dozen.

Onions, dry: 40 cents per bushel of 50 pounds.

Potatoes: 25 cents per bushel.

Tomatoes: 25 per cent. *ad valorem*, no invoice to be accepted at less than 1 cent per pound.

All other vegetables not mentioned 25 per cent. *ad valorem*.

At the invitation of the Ontario Department of Agriculture, which made your Association a special grant of \$200 for the purpose, a vegetable exhibition was held during November in Toronto, in conjunction with the Ontario Horticultural Exhibition, at which \$236 was given out in prizes, the prize winners living at different points throughout the Province. The exhibition was a decided success, and gives promise of great development in the future.

The first annual convention of the Association was held at the same time, and, while rather slimly attended, the meetings were interesting and instructive.

At a meeting of the directors of the Association, held the morning of the first day of the convention, the secretary was instructed to request the branch associations to consider the following matters and to instruct their representatives on the board of the Provincial Association as to the action they would like to have taken concerning same:—

1. The advisability of amending the constitution so as to provide for the appointment of an executive committee, this committee to be given power to deal with matters not sufficiently important to warrant entailing the expense of calling a meeting of the full board of directors.

2. The advisability of the Ontario Association using a portion of its funds to secure reliable information, at regular intervals throughout the growing season, concerning vegetable crop conditions, and of forwarding this information direct to all members of the Association. Kindly state points at which the Association would like to have its correspondents situated.

3. The advisability of petitioning the Minister of Customs to appoint an official to appraise the value of vegetables imported into Ontario, this official to have power to prevent the importation of vegetables invoiced at less than their real value.

4. The advisability of petitioning the Ontario Government to conduct experiments at the Ontario Agricultural College and elsewhere to devise remedies for insects and blights which trouble the vegetable growers, and to conduct other work of this nature. Kindly prepare a statement showing work of this nature which your branch association would favor having conducted.

The directors passed a resolution authorizing the secretary to make a rebato of 25 cents per member to the branch associations for each of their members who may be receiving the official organ of the Association through some other channel than through the Association. Secretaries of branch associations will be required to remit 50 cents per member to the Secretary-Treasurer of the Provincial Association, and will receive rebates of 25 cents each for such members as are already subscribers for *The Canadian Horticulturist*.

Your directors feel that the Ontario Vegetable Growers' Association will prove a great power in the movement to improve the position of the vegetable growers in the Province, and trust that the annual meetings of the branch associations will be well attended and successful.

The influence of all members is requested in the work of increasing the membership and influence of the Association throughout the Province. The financial statement of the Provincial Association is attached.

MEMBERSHIP STATEMENT.

On the 30th of November, 1905, the membership of the Ontario Vegetable Association was composed as follows:—Toronto, 109; Hamilton, 47; Sarnia, 26; Chatham, 25; St. Catharines, 10; individual members, 7, total, 224.

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS.

PREAMBLE.

The object of the Association shall be the advancement of the science and art of vegetable growing, in all its branches, by holding meetings for the discussion of all questions relative thereto, and by collecting, arranging and disseminating useful information, and by such other means as may from time to time seem desirable.

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS.

1. The Association shall be called the Ontario Vegetable Growers' Association.
2. The officers of the Association shall be President, Vice-President, a Secretary, Treasurer and Board of Directors, to be appointed as hereinafter provided.
3. Any person may become a member by the payment of \$1 per annum, payable in advance, and a payment of \$10 shall constitute a member for life.
4. The Association year shall be the calendar year.
5. The annual meeting shall be held at any time and place, as shall be designated by the Directors of the Provincial Association.

OFFICERS.

6. A President, Vice-President, Secretary-Treasurer and Directors only shall be the officers.

7. The election of directors shall take place at the annual meetings of the local associations (hereinafter provided for) each year, the newly elected directors to assume their duties and responsibilities at the close of the said meeting.

8. The directors shall, at the first meeting of the Provincial Board, and whenever afterwards necessary, appoint from among themselves a President, Vice-President and Secretary-Treasurer.

9. At each annual meeting of the local associations the retiring directors shall present a full report of their proceedings, and the proceedings of the Association, and a detailed statement of the receipts and expenditures for the previous year, and of the assets and liabilities, a list of members, and such general information on matters of special interest to this Association as the officers have been able to obtain, shall be sent to the Minister of Agriculture within forty days after the holding of such annual meeting.

QUORUM.

10. Not less than 7 members shall be a quorum to transact business for the Association.

11. Any member of the directorate not present at the meeting, if he send his views in writing, shall be considered as present.

12. (1) At least two weeks' notice shall be given of each general or annual meeting, naming the time and place of meeting. Notices must be sent by circular, mailed to each director, by the Secretary.

(2) A directors' meeting shall be called by mailing notices at least one week before the date of meeting, to each officer as above provided.

(3) An officers' meeting may be held on shorter notice, provided each officer is otherwise notified and consents thereto.

DUTY OF OFFICERS.

13. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all meetings of the Association, decide all questions of order, and make any suggestions he may deem necessary in the interests of the Association, and shall be *ex-officio* member of all committees appointed.

14. It shall be the duty of the Vice-President to aid and assist the President. In the absence of the President the powers and duties of the President shall devolve upon the Vice-President.

15. It shall be the duty of the Secretary-Treasurer to attend all meetings of the Association and keep correct minutes of the same; conduct all correspondence, and issue all press and other reports; prepare the report of the Executive Committee for the annual meeting; forward the list of representatives to the secretaries of the fair associations; also prepare for publication the annual report. As Treasurer he shall receive and account for all moneys belonging to the Association and pay all bills and accounts that have been approved of by the executive. He shall have the power of managing director, acting under the control and with the approval of the executive.

16. By virtue of his office he shall be a member of each committee appointed.

17. Before entering upon the duties of his office he shall enter into bond, with security when required, which shall be approved of by the Executive Committee.

18. This constitution and by-laws may be amended, as provided for by section 34 of the Ontario Agriculture and Arts Act.

PROVISIONS FOR THE AFFILIATION OF LOCAL ASSOCIATIONS.

PREAMBLE.

The objects of the local Ontario Vegetable Growers' Associations shall be those set forth in the preamble of the Ontario Vegetable Growers' Association.

1. That local associations shall be formed in any part of Ontario.
2. That these associations shall be called The..... Branch of the Vegetable Growers' Association of Ontario.
3. Any local association may become affiliated with the Ontario Association when it has a membership of ten, and the members of such associations shall enjoy all the privileges of the Association, but local associations shall not be entitled to appoint a director, as set forth in clauses 7 and 8 of the Provincial Board, until they have a membership of 25, but such local associations may appoint one director provided they defray his expenses while attending such meetings.
4. Any person may become a regular member of the Ontario Vegetable Growers' Association on payment of one dollar to the Secretary-Treasurer of the Provincial Association, but such independent members shall not have the right to be represented on the Provincial Board.
5. That the annual meetings of local associations shall be held during the first week of December.
6. That each local affiliated association, at its annual meeting, shall have the right to appoint a director to act on the Executive of the Provincial Association, who shall hold office for one year.
7. That the membership fee of each local affiliated association shall be one dollar per year.
8. That each local association, on becoming affiliated with the Provincial Association, shall pay to the Secretary-Treasurer of the Provincial Association fifty cents per member, which will constitute the members of said local association members of the Provincial Association, shall entitle them to free copies of the official organ of the Association, to free copies of the report of the annual convention, and such other printed material as may be issued by the Provincial Association, and shall entitle each association to have the expenses of its director paid by the Provincial Association, when attending any meeting of the executive of said Association.
9. The director representing the local association shall have one vote on the Provincial Executive for every 25 members of his association. Sub-associations shall have the privilege of appointing as many delegates to meetings of the Provincial Association Executive as they have votes, but the expenses of one delegate only shall be defrayed by the Provincial Executive.

FIRST ANNUAL CONVENTION.

The First Annual Convention of the Ontario Vegetable Growers' Association was held in Albert Hall, Toronto, November 15th and 16th, at the time of the Ontario Horticultural Exhibition.

The opening meeting on Wednesday afternoon, November 15th, taking all things into consideration, was a success. There was a fair attendance

of enthusiastic vegetable growers. In the absence of the President, the Vice-President, Mr. J. W. Rush, of Humber Bay, presided. The first speaker on the programme did not put in an appearance, and Mr. A. N. Brown, of Wyoming, Delaware, U.S., was asked to make a few remarks. The chairman, in introducing Mr. Brown, stated that he came from a trucking state, and ought to be able to give some good pointers.

TRUCK FARMING IN DELAWARE.

BY A. N. BROWN, WYOMING, DELAWARE, U.S.

I am happy to meet with you. While we have a trucking State, and there are large quantities of vegetables and truck grown there for the city markets, I am not a trucker. I suspect I am a little too lazy. I would sooner grow tree fruits than vegetables, but I have grown a great many tomatoes in times past, and potatoes and sweet corn for the local and city markets.

I have a brother who has the reputation of being the best trucker on the Delaware and Maryland Peninsula. I have not time to go into details, but you will understand that the trucking business starts in Florida where they are now commencing and getting ready to ship their tomatoes, and it goes right up the Atlantic coast until it reaches the St. Lawrence river. We fill in just a little niche, and if we do not set our early cabbage and grow them so that we have them on a ten days' limit, we cannot get the Philadelphia and New York markets for our cabbage; it jumps by us. It is the same with early potatoes. We can hold the sweet potatoes. Most of the sweet potatoes in our State are grown in sweet potato houses, and are shipped out during the winter. It is a very profitable business. They are grown and put in kilns, as we call them, and we send them out during the winter in cars specially fitted up for that purpose.

I want to leave this thought with you. Our people are perfectly satisfied that they can put character into a vegetable by feeding that vegetable, just as much so as you can put character into your milk and cream and butter by feeding the dairy cow a properly balanced ration and all that she will properly stand. The cow is simply a machine, the soil is simply a machine, and the cabbage head is a machine into which we can put a certain amount of material and turn out from it so many dollars. If you feed this vegetable matter with high grade nitrogenous manure you can make it pay. We can grow cow peas and crimson clover down there. My brother takes a crop of kail off in the spring and then puts in a crop of early cabbage and takes off that crop, and puts that same ground into tomatoes, and then takes off the tomatoes and sows crimson clover and mixes turnip seed with it, and takes off a crop of turnips; thus having five crops off one piece of ground in one single year. He has the cover crop ready to take off in the spring, and repeat the rotation.

That is the condition of the soil and the climate with us. I do not suppose you can do it here. He manages to have some clover crop on his ground every fall, and that gets turned over early in the spring. He applies 1,000 to 1,800 pounds of commercial fertilizer of the highest grade to the acre, and he is increasing the quantity constantly. That not only gives nitrogen, but the roots of this clover crop unlock the concealed stores of phosphoric acid and potash and then it rots down and gives a good, mechanical condition of soil with plenty of humus, so that it conserves the moisture. The humus will not only put the soil in condition to conserve moist-

ure, but puts it in condition to aerate it. We know there is phosphoric acid and potash in nearly all our soils, but it is hidden. It is locked up, and we simply want to grow some of these legumes with their tremendous root system to bring up these hidden stores and turn them into use. Phosphoric acid and potash cannot be unlocked unless you have moisture to do it. It requires moisture first and air second. If I take a big block of earth and it is full of phosphoric acid and potash, that will be eliminated and made valuable for plant food just in the degree that the air strikes it. If I cut that block in half I have increased the air surface, and if I cut it in four I still increase the air surface. Now, we apply phosphoric acid and potash; but we must learn to grow a lot of this stuff in the ground, and above all things we must conserve the moisture. There is nothing that wants it more than a vegetable crop, and you cannot conserve that moisture into ground by any system of cultivation if you have not got plenty of humus there. In our country we have that advantage that we can grow four or five crops off a single acre, and still grow sufficient humus to accomplish all that we want. We do this intensive farming, and we are producing twice to the acre to-day to what we did fifteen or twenty years ago, just because we know more about soils, and because we know more about fertilizers. My brother uses nitrate of soda, but it never goes into the ground. It goes on top when the crop is growing; that is the time to put it on.

I spoke to him the other day about worms taking the late cabbage. "Why," he said, "I haven't been troubled in ten years with worms on my late cabbage." I said, "How is that? I thought you were affected with the worms?" "No," he said. "*I grow them so fast the worms have no chance at them.* Why I never even think about a worm. I simply feed the cabbages nitrate of soda and cultivate them." Now, there is a lot of common sense in that; there is a great big point in it. Grow your cabbage so fast that the worms cannot have any effect on it. His cabbage and his celery are sweet, breaking and tender, and so is his spinach and cauliflower and anything he grows, because he is growing it quickly, and because he is putting into it out of the soil these elements, of which the special vegetable he is growing is composed. He is simply giving it the highest character and quality.

Now, he grows vegetables and I grow fruit, and I contend for the same thing in fruit that he is contending for in vegetables. He says he grows quality in his vegetables, and two weeks ago he told me that the local market was paying ten cents. more for small boxes of his sweet potatoes than they were for sweet potatoes of other dealers. He packs them right, and that is just as important with vegetables as it is with fruit; you must put it up in the most attractive manner possible. People pay a lot for beauty now-a-days. See how it pays to put up these small packages of fruit. They pay you for the package just as they do in cereal foods. I can go to the grocery store and buy oatmeal that comes in bulk at four cents. a pound. Put the same thing in a pasteboard box and it costs me twice as much. That same rule applies to vegetables.

There is an exchange on the Delaware and Maryland Peninsula that send out 350,000 barrels of potatoes. These potatoes are sold all over the Union. Their telegraph bills last year amounted to \$3,500. just for telegraphing to find the condition of the markets. And since this organization started, just four years ago, they have increased their value 100 per cent. and increased their quantity 600 per cent.

It is not a question of the quantity of the stuff we grow, it is the quality. There is somebody standing in the market ready to buy the best

all the time. If any of you have a good horse for sale you do not have to hunt for a purchaser. The purchaser comes to you and you fix the price. But if you have a scrubby horse for sale, you must go and hunt a purchaser and he fixes the price. The same rule is applied to vegetables. It makes you feel more like a man when you have something good, and when you know you are putting it up right and putting it before the public as it should be. Then you love your business and when a man loves his business, he makes a success of it. Everything we love has no drudgery or hardship about it. It is no trouble to court your wife because you love her. I am glad to have met with you and I am sorry to leave you so soon, but I have to catch my train.

The CHAIRMAN: The turnips Mr. Brown refers to are the quick-growing white turnip. They are not cultivated and the clover is sown broadcast.

A MEMBER: The clover takes about three times as long to germinate as the turnip does.

The CHAIRMAN: They have a different climate to ours.

A MEMBER: I have never been successful in wintering over clover yet.

The CHAIRMAN: If you can get the clover to grow in the fall, it is there and the roots are doing the work.

A MEMBER: I have sown it after potatoes, and I had the ground well covered in the fall, and in spring there was not a sign of life; though of course, it gave me a top and there was quite a bit of vegetable matter to plow under in the spring, and it made quite a bit of root.

A MEMBER: I have tried rye but have not had satisfactory results from rye.

A MEMBER: That is my experience with rye and I will never try it again.

A MEMBER: The best thing that I have tried is spinach. I sow it late in the fall and it comes out beautiful. It was a wet season, and I could not get on the land very well, and by the time it was ready for the market spinach was cheap, and I did not bother marketing, so I turned the crop under and let it lie about three weeks. Then I put some cabbage on that piece of land, and I had the best cabbage that I ever saw; nearly every plant headed up and there were some you could lay on the head of a barrel. The next year I took off that same land the largest crop of onions I ever saw, some of them weighing three pounds apiece, and I did not put any manure on that land.

The CHAIRMAN: That land had been very rich before?

A MEMBER: No, it was the poorest piece of land I had on the place.

A MEMBER: I consider we have the same ingredients in spinach as in clover for putting humus into the soil.

A MEMBER: Did any of you ever sow peas to plow under?

A MEMBER: I have tried cow peas and I have tried vetches, and I have had fine results from plowing under peas. Peas, I think, are next to clover.

The CHAIRMAN: Would you require a strong kind of pea for that? William Rennie was the most practicable man, as a farm superintendent, that they had in Guelph. The farm was in a pretty low state when Mr. Rennie took hold of it, and he recommended that we might sow a strong marrowfat pea early in the spring to plow under in place of clover.

A MEMBER: We must have one crop every year off our ground. We cannot get the Delaware system here.

A MEMBER: I have this season on the same ground, early potatoes, cauliflower and cabbage.

MR. RUSH: That was a very good thing Mr. Brown gave us about his brother growing cabbage quick. The parasites never strike anything except the delicate plants.

A MEMBER: How about snails and slugs You will find more of them in the biggest cabbage.

A MEMBER: They will hold more. (Laughter.)

A MEMBER: It is well to know the soil. There are certain soils that the slug won't work in. If you have a piece of soil that is not suitable for early cabbage do not try to grow them in that soil; it is best to grow a crop that is suitable on your land. You should first study your land and know what it will grow, and then you will be successful. There is a possibility of adding certain fertilizers and manures to bring the land up to the right point, but you have got to study the matter out thoroughly.

MR. JOHN ATKINS, Sarnia: "We have good soil for early cabbages, but we can scarcely grow onions any more. This year I put the cabbage in very early, and the ground froze hard after they were put in, so hard that it would hold a wagon up, and I was afraid the plants were all gone, but they came through all right, and we have had less maggots in them than we have had for four or five years, we had a good crop of early cabbage. We are greatly troubled with maggot in the soil."

A MEMBER: Are you troubled with the club root?

A. No.

A MEMBER: I think that if you let a piece of ground rest for a year and do not plant any cabbage, or cauliflower, or radish in that soil, it will assist you in getting rid of the club root. I know it will bring club root if you plant the same root year after year. I never had it on my place, my neighbor has it because he has been growing his cabbage plants on the same ground year after year, and a few years more of that kind of work and he won't be able to grow cabbages at all.

THE CHAIRMAN: "I grew cabbages on a piece of ground for twenty-six years in succession; it was heavily manured every year. It is composed of about fourteen or fifteen inches of deep, black, clay loam, with a subsoil of stiff blue clay. I never suffered with maggot till about four years ago, and then the club root got in, and we abandoned that piece of ground for cabbage growing. The next year I am going to put cabbage there again; because I have not another piece of ground that suits early cabbage as well as that piece. I have taken a club root out of that patch that was like a snake's head, three of them hanging together."

MR. McMEANS, Brantford: I was reading the other day about the onion maggot, and I understand that sulphate of iron can be bought for about four cents a pound. When your ground is ready to sow, sprinkle a light coat on the ground, and I do not think you will be bothered with maggot in your onions. Put it on just before you sow your seed. It is worth four cents a pound as a manure."

A MEMBER: What do you call a light crop?

Answer. One hundred pounds to the acre.

MR. GEORGE SYME, JR.: What has been your experience with salt on the onion crop?

Answer. It serves to keep the moisture in the ground; I cannot say that it will do any good towards keeping the maggot away.

MR. SYME: My father always claimed he could kill the maggot in onions by the use of salt.

MR. McMEANS: It is not in the soil, it is a fly that lays its egg just above the ground.

A MEMBER: When your onions come up nicely, take a sprinkle of salt and go all over the bed, and then let them go for a week or two and go over

them again. Do this about three times, and you will not be bothered with maggots.

Mr. McMEANS: Nitrate of soda would be as good as salt, and it would act as a manure as well.

Mr. RUSH: If you apply the nitrate of soda heavy enough to kill the maggot, it will kill the crop. I will give you Prof. Panton's sure remedy for maggot on the cabbage. He takes a piece of brown paper and saturates it with coal oil in which he puts a spoonful of carbolic acid. A quart will do 5,000 pieces of paper. When you plant the cabbage, lay a piece of the paper on the ground around the stem of the plant; cut a small ring out in the centre of the paper, and have a slit in it from the outside edge to the ring, so that you can slip it across the stem. The fly drops its egg just under the first leaf of the plant, and in three days it hatches out and the maggot goes straight down the stem to the root. The smell of the paper keeps the fly away and prevents the maggot getting at the root.

A MEMBER: I have seen the maggots on cabbage, the first week in April.

Mr. McMEANS: If you spray your cabbage with kerosene emulsion, would not that do as well?

The CHAIRMAN: No, I do not think so.

A MEMBER: How long did the smell of the coal oil and carbolic acid stay on the paper?

The CHAIRMAN: Ordinary tar-paper would do as well, but that would stop the growth of the cabbage.

A MEMBER: The ground would absorb the coal oil.

Mr. McMEANS: I have seen strips of tin placed round the cabbage.

A MEMBER: It is too much trouble to put the paper round. It is just like wrapping paper around the tomato plants. If you have got to go and soak a thousand or ten thousand pieces of paper, and put it round the cabbage, where are you going to come out?

Mr. McMEANS: Are any of you bothered with the cabbage fly on the plants?

A MEMBER: No, I think there is so much smoke around the cities that it has driven them away.

The CHAIRMAN: That will hardly do.

Mr. McMEANS: What is the reason we have got rid of the squash bug?

Mr. DELWORTH: A week ago to-day I saw hundreds of these little squash bugs on some squash that I left out in the field.

Mr. ATKINS: I do not grow a great deal of celery, but there is a lot of it grown around Sarnia, and we have no blight there at all, and no spots on the leaves.

A MEMBER: How long have you been growing celery up there?

Mr. ATKINS: For about twenty years.

Mr. McMEANS: They have had the blight in London, and Mr. McInnes attributes it to the fly. I grow about fifteen or twenty thousand. My neighbor had the blight and I had not. We use boards for bleaching. Our soil is black muck with a sand bottom.

A MEMBER: The gardener who kills a skunk is making a great mistake. Some of you may live close to cities where you do not have these little animals. The skunk is one of the best insect eaters we have. They are great feeders on grasshoppers and crickets. They are great insect eaters. Three years ago I was greatly bothered with black crickets on my tomatoes, and if you looked at the tomatoes you found little pitfalls scratched in the tomato by the skunk, and at night he went along and cleaned them out. I do not allow any skunks to be trapped around my place.

Mr. McMEANS: Some people say that moles are the gardeners' best friend; I do not think so, and I kill them.

GROWING VEGETABLES FOR CANNERS.

BY F. C. HARRISON, BACTERIOLOGIST, O. A. C., GUELPH.

I do not know that I can give you a great deal of information on this point. I see by the programme that your meeting here is on growing vegetables for canning purposes; I might give you a few thoughts as to what we have done with regard to that. The canner comes in contact with the vegetable grower a great deal, the troubles we have been trying to tackle are essentially canners' problems, and we have tried to solve what has given rise to the swelling in the cans.

Some years ago the vegetable growers had to grow the peas and pick them from the vines, and then they were brought to the factory and shelled there by the machinery. Now they have a machine that picks them from the vines, and all the farmer has to do is cut the vines, load them on his wagon, and take them direct to the factory, and the peas are taken out of the pods on the vine. So much dust gets on the peas that no matter how careful they may be in washing them, the dust is there, and there is life in the dust, and that life is so resistant to steam heat that it takes a temperature of 240 degrees or twenty-eight above boiling point for twenty or thirty minutes before you can kill it.

I visited a factory the summer before last, and the canner, in a burst of confidence, took me out in a back field, and I saw a place as large as this room piled up with cans eight feet high, every one of them spoiled.

Another canner was bothered with the keeping of his tomato pulp. They saved it until winter, and then turned it into catsup. In one place they had eighty or ninety barrels full that had turned sour.

Another matter that I have had to investigate is diseases on certain vegetables, and on this work we published two bulletins last year, one on a scientific study of a new disease caused by a new organism, and also a popular bulletin, which had reference to certain diseases of vegetables; cauliflower, cabbage and celery. With the cauliflower and celery, it was what might be termed a soft rot, the characteristics being the breaking down of the tissues into a soft pulpy mass, caused by these minute organisms, known as bacteria. It is impossible to use the Bordeaux mixture for these organisms, because they live on the inside of the cells, and the spray only acts on the surface, and it is just like trying to cure an internal disease by throwing a bucket of medicine over a man's head. The only way to compete with this disease is largely on the lines of prevention. If your cauliflower are diseased do not put them back into the soil, and when you are cultivating or working with your plants, if you break off the leaves or bruise them, you are bound to get this disease. The disease on the celery was due to the fact that it was not kept as dry as it might be.

The CHAIRMAN: Under what conditions was that celery stored?

Prof. HARRISON: It was placed in the sand in the cellar, and I think the temperature was too high. Vegetables should be kept cool. Keep as near the freezing point as possible. I understand that the early celery this year was troubled with a soft rot.

If you complain that the College is not doing enough for you, the remedy is in your own hands: all you have to do is to send in your complaint and your disease, and we will investigate them for you. We do not know about these things unless we are informed, and if you send a request to the College, and say that you are troubled with such and such a thing, and that you want someone to attend to it, we will send a man down to investigate. It gives me an opportunity to work on something new and something

interesting. The College is your servant, and it is your fault if you do not make use of it.

The CHAIRMAN: There were four rows of celery planted out at the College when I was up there, and the soil was not celery soil, and it would not develop a disease similar to our swamp soil. Were there any spotted leaves came on that celery?

Prof. HARRISON: Not so much spots. The disease appeared as a softening of the stems, towards the base of what we might term the petiole of the leaf. It seemed to start from an insect bite, softened a little, and got brown.

The CHAIRMAN: It is the same thing. We were greatly troubled in this section, in fact nearly all over Ontario. I saw it at Barrie. I did not see any of the disease north of Barrie this fall, but where celery is grown continuously on the same ground it appears.

Prof. HARRISON: I believe the best celery is grown on the Kalamazoo swamp ground.

The CHAIRMAN: No. We grow better celery than they do; we can show you some of it down stairs.

Prof. HARRISON: When you have a very wet season and a great deal of moisture in the air, it is favorable for this kind of rot.

The CHAIRMAN: I do not understand the nature of that disease in the cauliflower.

Prof. HARRISON: It is a bacterial disease and it is in the stem. It may start from the root, or from the top, or from the leaves.

The CHAIRMAN: Don't you think that it is caused by the heat?

Prof. HARRISON: It is excessive moisture. If you get a dry heat you will not get the disease.

The CHAIRMAN: Do you think there is any need of cultivating after a shower?

Prof. HARRISON: Do not cultivate after a shower, so long as your soil is moist. There is no need of cultivation. I would not think of cultivating when the soil is wet.

GROWING VEGETABLES AT GUELPH.

By H. S. PEART, O. A. C., GUELPH.

Our soil at Guelph is not strictly a vegetable soil, and we feel just as much as you do the need of a station in a strictly vegetable section, and it remains with you to assist us in getting it. The fruit growers are clamoring for something, and we think the vegetable growers should have something as well. We cannot grow and mature tomatoes at Guelph. They will not ripen; the season is too short. This year we completed planting all our tomatoes on the fourteenth day of June. This year we tried eight or ten new varieties. We can tell you whether or not they are early varieties, but we cannot tell you whether they are any better than something else, because we cannot give them a fair test. We cannot tell you how many of them will ripen.

It is not possible to do anything with melons. Living, as we do, so close to the city of Guelph, and having a band of students as we have, there is not much use going into melon culture.

In cabbage and cauliflower we have not done a great deal. We are not growing any in an experimental way. We would be pleased to receive suggestions from you as to how you would like to have experiments conducted. We are not in a position at the present time to know your needs.

Mr. COWAN: Do you think the vegetable growers might be able to get a station the same as the fruit growers?

Mr. PEART: I think there are places where they could grow vegetables and fruit together. I was born in the Burlington district, and our soil at Guelph is nothing like as good as it is at Burlington.

A MEMBER: I worked on a train that ran between Sarnia and Toronto for ten years. From Guelph to Georgetown, and from Guelph to Berlin, you will find it colder than anywhere else. And as soon as you start from Acton going down the line you will get warmer weather.

Mr. PEART: We cannot ripen grapes in Guelph, and they have as fine a table of grapes on exhibition here from the Experimental Farm at Ottawa as there is in the building.

Prof. HARRISON: I only remember one crop of grapes in Guelph in fifteen years.

A MEMBER: Do you do anything at Guelph in the cultivation of vegetables under glass?

Mr. PEART: Just a little in lettuce and cucumbers.

A MEMBER: I noticed the glass there was very heavily shaded, and I noticed the vines were making very rapid growth, but they were mighty tender, and the soil was nearly all humus, and there was abundant drainage provided, level benches and a heap of soil and one plant in each heap.

Mr. PEART: They use fresh soil every year and it is composed of sod of one year.

A MEMBER: Would it not be better to whitewash your glass in spots so as to allow the rays of the sun to come through

Mr. McMEANS: I grow cucumbers under glass, and I left half the glass uncovered in spots, and in the other building I whitewashed it and made it lighter and thinner, and I find that in that house the vines were thinner, and where the sun got through in spots it made the vines hardier.

The CHAIRMAN: Do you think it is necessary to shade cucumbers?

Mr. DELWORTH: It is with the long varieties, but the "White Spine" will do without it.

A MEMBER: My experience is that whitewash put on in spots is better than a complete coat of whitewash.

The CHAIRMAN: My experience is that it is only occasionally that you want to shade cucumbers, they will stand a terrible amount of heat.

Mr. PEART: Toads and frogs are night feeders and we should encourage them. The best way to get rid of moles is to encourage the hawks and owls. The hawk will take a chicken occasionally, but not if he can get sufficient other food, with the exception of one little hawk. These big hawks that fly around are the best friends you have got.

A MEMBER: When our celery boards are up we are troubled with a lot of field mice, and I find that the rats will eat the mice.

A MEMBER: I think we should pass a resolution asking the Ontario Government to start an experimental station where they can grow vegetables.

THE CABBAGE FLY.

The CHAIRMAN: We would like Mr. W. T. Macoun, of the Experimental Farm, Ottawa, to tell us what would prevent the fly from destroying the cabbage.

W. T. MACOUN, Horticulturist: We have two methods at Ottawa to prevent it. We have not found anything satisfactory for onions. The arrangement your chairman mentioned we have found to be most satisfactory for cabbage. The insect, while something like the house fly, deposits its eggs between the stem and the surface and the eggs drop down on the soil. The paper disk should be so made that there is no place for the insect to drop her egg on the soil, and you must apply it immediately after you plant, because these insects are flying through the air all the time, and we have found that if you leave it for half an hour the eggs will be deposited, and then there is no use putting on the paper; but if you put them on immediately, and put them flat on the ground, it is a sure preventive. We use a little disk of tar paper and we have a machine for stamping them out.

A MEMBER: They say tar paper is injurious to the plant.

Mr. MACOUN: I think any paper would do. They deposit their eggs on the ground. We have been experimenting for years on an enclosure made of cheesecloth which goes over the sides and ends, and we have been experimenting to find out how many kinds of vegetables we can grow there. Radishes seem to keep one week longer than they do outside, and they grow to a larger size and are considerably more crisp. The fly cannot get in and get at them.

A MEMBER: Did you ever try ashes to prevent maggots. We grow radishes for our own use and we put wood ashes on the ground and we have no trouble with the maggots.

Mr. MACOUN: If it would be good for radishes I think it would be all right for onions.

A MEMBER: We have tried ashes and they do not seem to be any good.

Mr. MACOUN: Mr. Blair, of Nova Scotia, our experimentalist, tried an experiment with hellebore and water and he found that prevented it. He applied it right along the rows with the watering-pot.

Mr. RUSH: I tried an experiment this year with four or five rows of radishes. On marking the drills I found I put some salt along. The ground was rich, old hot bed soil. The seed I planted in one row was dipped in coal oil: where I put the salt they were eaten up with the maggot.

A MEMBER: I have tried sowing radish in a drill with onions, and the maggot will tackle the radish first. By pulling the radish out we got rid of them.

Mr. COWAN: What did the cheesecloth cost you?

Mr. MACOUN: The kind we used was five cents a yard. It will last two seasons; the cheaper kind will not last more than one season. For hot-beds or cold frames I think the cheaper kind would do. We grow the white-tipped scarlet early radish.

A MEMBER: Are you bothered with the spot on the beans?

Mr. MACOUN: Not very much; they could be controlled by the use of the Bordeaux mixture. The only trouble is that you are liable to discolor the pods.

Q. Would it answer to spray before the pods are formed?

A. Yes, the idea is to spray before the flowers are open and then just after they drop off. It is the spore flying through the air and lighting on certain parts of the plant. It is not an insect, it is called the Bean Anth-

FERTILIZERS FOR THE VEGETABLE GROWER.

BY PROF. R. HARCOURT. GUELPH.

Until comparatively recently the fundamental principles underlying the use of fertilizers were not understood. Some of the questions which had to be solved first were: What is the food of plants? and, What is the source of that food? Further, in order that fertilizers be intelligently and economically used, it is essential that some definite knowledge be gained regarding the food requirements of different plants and the power that they possess of appropriating these food substances. It is necessary also, that something be known regarding the quantity of food materials that are available to the plant and the particular part each food constituent plays in plant development. These, together with an intimate understanding of the composition and availability of the constituents of a fertilizer, and many other points must be at least partially understood before fertilizers can be intelligently applied.

We do know something about what the food of plants consists of and that the atmosphere and soil are the source of these. We also know something about the composition of the atmosphere; but our knowledge of the chemistry of the soil and the exact function of the various food constituents is still very deficient. However, when we look back at some of the earlier theories held regarding the nutrition of plants, we see that vast strides have been made. For instance, as late as the end of the seventeenth century an eminent authority "attributes plant growth to the influence of a balsam which the air contains." Van Helmot, one of the best known of the early alchemists, believed that he had proved by conclusive experiments that all the products of vegetation could be produced from water. Later, Jethro Tull's theory created considerable interest. It was valuable in that it emphasized the importance of tillage operations. According to Tull's theory, the food of plants consisted of the particles of the soil. These particles, however, must be rendered very minute before they became available to the plant. This pulverization of the soil goes on in nature independently of the farmer, but only very slowly, and the farmer, therefore, has to hasten it by means of tillage operations. With the knowledge we now possess regarding the effect of tillage, we can well understand the success which would follow practice based on this theory. It was not until near the end of the eighteenth century that the true source of the carbon of plants was discovered, and just about a hundred years ago chemists began to get a trace of the fact that mineral or ash constituents played an important part in the development of plant life. We owe much to the work of de Saussure, Priestly, Leibig, Boussingault, and to Laws and Gilbert, and those later associated with them at the Rothamsted Experiment Station, and others of lesser note, for our present knowledge of the chemistry of plants, soils and fertilizers.

Yet, notwithstanding the wonderful impetus given to agricultural chemical research by these early investigators and to the immense strides made in the last two or three decades, much still remains to be done. The problems involved in soil fertilization and plant growth are far more complex than they appear. At first sight nothing would seem easier than to make a chemical analysis of the soil and find out in what respects it differs from another soil of known value; then the deficiencies or the excess, as compared with the good soil, could be corrected by suitable manuring. The matter is not, however, quite so simple, for if on one hand the soil can be

considered as a great reservoir of plant food which can be recovered in crops, on the other hand it is equally correct to regard the soil as a manufacturing establishment in which raw materials in the shape of manures are transformed into the finished article, the crop. It is true that the soil is a storehouse of food for the plants, but it is not a dead mass of matter, receiving on the one hand manure, which it yields again to the crop by purely mechanical or chemical processes; it is rather a busy and complex laboratory where multitudes of minute organisms are always at work. By the action of some of these organisms, vegetable residues and manures are reduced, we might almost say digested, to a condition in which they will serve as food for plants; others strike up a joint existence with the higher plants, and aid directly in their nutrition; others, again, are noxious or destructive to the food stored in the soil. Nature is not wasteful with her supplies, and it is only as we pry into her secrets and understand how her food stores are held; the best conditions under which the living organisms will do their work; and the particular needs of the crop, together with the suitable mechanical condition necessary for the retention of moisture and proper root development, can we hope to intelligently and economically use artificial fertilizers. The problems are not simple. The food, the water, the living organisms in the soil, are all variable, affected by cultivation and climate. themselves are variable; they all act and react upon one another and upon the crops. Hence it may easily be seen that problems may arise that are beyond the reach of our knowledge.

However, given that the soil is in fair condition and that the cultivation will be thorough, there are certain fundamental facts concerning the needs of the soil and crops and the nature of the fertilizers that are not difficult to understand and attention to which will greatly increase the likelihood of success.

First, with reference to soils, it may be stated that all soils will not contain or retain plant food to the same extent. As a rule, clay soils hold that which they receive better than sands, and thus do not suffer so much from the leaching action of the water; on the other hand, the sands may be more liable to lose plant food in the drainage water, but they also give up that which they have to the plant quicker than the heavy soils. In both classes of soils and all the intermediate types, an abundance of humus is essential. It apparently either binds together or opens up the soil just as is needed, and it also acts as a sponge in retaining water, which is so necessary for dissolving plant food. Furthermore, in its decay it supplies nitrogen in an available form and carbon dioxide and other acid bodies that, in turn, aid in breaking up insoluble compounds containing the essential ash constituents, thus bringing them into a form that growing plants may make use of them.

Regarding the plants themselves, they differ in the range of root, period of growth, purpose for which they are grown, and in their power of attacking insoluble constituents of the soil with which they may come in contact. As a general rule, the greater the depth and range of root a plant has, the less need there is of supplying the ash constituents for that crop as it can gather its food over a very wide area. The length of the growing period, also, has a very marked influence on the nature of the fertilizer which a plant will require. A crop, such as barley, requires its food in a form more readily available than oats, for its period of growth is shorter and it gathers its food almost entirely from the surface soil. Again, such crops as the legumes have comparatively little difficulty in gathering all the nitrogen they need, because, through the aid of certain minute organisms present in

most soils, the immense supply of nitrogen in the atmosphere is available to them; but on the other hand, they have difficulty in getting the amount of potash they require. Root crops, such as mangels, turnips, carrots and beets, cannot make ready use of the insoluble mineral constituents of the soil. Hence, in order to insure full crops, they must be supplied with available food in which phosphates should predominate for turnips and nitrogen for mangels and carrots. The proper fertilization of sugar beets presents another problem; for, with this crop, we not only want to produce a large yield, but we must also force maturity in order to get the quality of beet required for the production of sugar. The soil for this crop should be so fertilized that there is an abundance of all the food constituents present during the early stages of the growth of the plant; but, as the season advances, the supply of nitrogen should fall away in order that the tendency of phosphoric acid to force maturity may assert itself.

Another group of plants is distinguished as a class not so much because of their peculiar habits of growth as because of the objects of their growth. This class includes lettuce, beets, asparagus, celery, radishes, in fact all plants that are marketed in an immature form. One of the most important points in raising these is to secure rapidity of growth, and thus to insure high quality, which is measured largely by their succulence. In order that this may be accomplished, they must be supplied with an abundance of available plant food, and since nitrogen is the one element which more than any other encourages and stimulates leaf and stem growth, its use is especially beneficial to all of these crops. They must not lack for this element in any period of their growth, though, of course, a sufficiency of the ash constituents must be supplied in order that the nitrogen may be properly utilized. Because of their high commercial value, the quantity of plant food applied may be greatly in excess of that for any other group of plants.

Another distinct class of crops, though differing materially in their individual characteristics, as well as in their time and period of growth, are the fruits. These differ from most other crops, in that longer seasons of preparation is required, in which the growth may be so directed as to prepare the plant or tree for the proper development of a different kind of product, namely, fruit as distinct from grain or seed in the cereals, or succulence in the vegetable crops. The fruit differs in its characteristics from the ordinary farm crops, in that its growth and development require a little different treatment, since it is necessary that there shall be a constant transfer of nitrogen from the tree to the fruit throughout the entire growing season. The growth of each succeeding year of tree and fruit is dependent, not altogether upon the food acquired during the year, but as well upon that acquired in the previous year, and which has been stored up in bud and branches. A knowledge of the habits of growth, the period of growth and the object of the growth of this class, therefore, is useful as a guide to the economical supply of the essential elements of growth. These crops must be supplied with food that will encourage a slow and continuous rather than a quick growth and development. As a general rule these crops require plenty of the ash constituents, particularly potash, and, except in the case of crops such as strawberries, where a soluble form of nitrogen may be used during ripening to bring on plump full berries, the nitrogen may be supplied from some organic source that will decompose slowly in the soil.

From the foregoing, it is evident that it is impossible to give general information concerning the use of fertilizers that will apply equally well under all circumstances. Nevertheless, on soil in good condition, it is safe

to apply good dressing of readily available nitrogen to all crops that produce large leaf and stem growth and are harvested in the immature state. For the legumes, which can gather their own nitrogen, and potatoes, which use up large amounts of potash, potassic manures can safely be recommended, and for roots, and particularly for turnips, phosphoric acid is the dominant fertilizer. It is not meant that only these particular constituents should be applied, for the other fertilizer constituents are, up to a certain point, just as important. If the soil is in a high state of cultivation, or has been manured with natural products, as farmyard manure, they may be used singly to force a maximum growth of the crops.

For worn out soils, possibly the best practice would be to apply with what farmyard manures may be available, a liberal supply of the mineral constituents in the cheaper forms, such as ground bone, tankage from pork packing establishments, ground phosphates, and basic phosphates for phosphoric acid, and the crude potash salts, not forgetting wood ashes, for potash. The phosphoric acid and potash form fixed compounds in the soil, and are, therefore, not likely to be leached out, provided the land is continuously cropped. Nitrogen should be applied chiefly as nitrate of soda, because in this form it is immediately useful, and thus may be applied in fractional amounts, and at such times as to best meet the needs of the plant at the different stages of growth, with a reasonable certainty of a maximum use by the plants. For the fruit crops, nitrogen should be applied chiefly through the legumes. In fact, throughout the whole of the farm or garden operations, legumes should be grown as "catch" crops or "cover" crops on every possible occasion, not only as a means of increasing the nitrogen and humus, but to prevent the leaching away of soluble plant food that is in the soil. Nitrogen should only be applied as a supplement to this, and then for those crops most in need of it. Nitrate nitrogen not taken up by plants, is readily leached out of the soil, and as nitrification always proceeds during warm weather, nitrates are being formed whether the crop is making use of it or not, hence the economy of "catch" crops.

Much might be said about the fertilizers themselves concerning the need of knowing the nature of the material used in their manufacture in order that some idea may be formed regarding the possible availability of their constituents, the amount of the various fertilizing constituents present, the relative value of the different forms in which the manurial substance may be held, but this paper is already too long.

In conclusion, it cannot be too strongly urged that, while fertilizers intelligently used may be a source of profit to the fruit grower, and especially to the vegetable grower, carelessly used, they may be a source of great loss. They can never take the place of cultivation; in fact, it is only in conjunction with the most thorough cultivation that they will prove profitable.

DISCUSSION.

Mr. RUSH: Would you recommend the same chemical fertilizer for cabbages as for potatoes?

Mr. SHUTT: Not necessarily just the same, although I do not think there would be any harm done. Cabbage seems to respond more particularly to potash, and I think it would be advisable to have more phosphoric acid in the fertilizer for potatoes. I think it is erroneous for fertilizer manufacturers to sell "Potato Fertilizer," and "Cabbage Fertilizer," and

“Onion Fertilizer.” You will find that all fertilizers depend for their value upon the three constituents, nitrogen, phosphoric acid, and potash, and the value will depend upon the proportion that is available; because plants cannot take up anything from the soil unless it is in the form of solution, and unless the food is already soluble in water, or becomes readily so, it is not valuable. So that you want to look at the proportion that is in the preparation and the proportion that is available. The men who make up these chemical fertilizers do not know anything about the special requirements of the different vegetables. Each vegetable grower must do a certain amount of experimental work for himself before he can find out what will be the most economical fertilizer for him to use; because soils differ, not only in their chemical composition, but they also differ physically, which is a very important matter. The proportion of humus, or vegetable matter, which a soil contains has a lot to do with it. It will be difficult to supply all the plant food required from the agency of chemical fertilizers, and we should only look at that as an adjunct. I have heard some say that chemical fertilizers are only like a whip to a horse, or a medicine. That is not exactly so. It is only when the soil is supplied with decaying vegetable matter that you can afford to add to that store of plant food, chemical fertilizers; but if you depend entirely on these expensive forms of plant food you will be paying much more for it than it is worth. One man told me he had not any use for chemical fertilizers because he bought a ton of nitrate of soda and put it on in the fall, and did not get any benefit from it. (Laughter.) We cannot take enough food on Monday morning to last until Saturday night; and these special fertilizers should be given to the crops just when they can make use of them. If we do not let the air into the soil we will not unlock the plant food that is locked up in the soil.

To give you an example: You take the natural rock phosphate: it is worth two cents a pound. Agriculturally it is not worth anything, simply because the plants cannot use it; they cannot digest it. It is only the food that we digest that is of any value to us. Once that has been treated with phosphoric acid and made soluble in water, it is worth eight cents agriculturally; and that is just what you do after good cultivation.

MR. F. F. REEVES: Is it better to apply these chemical fertilizers on top, or to turn them under?

MR. SHUTT: I think the best way is to spread it on top, and incorporate it with the soil by the use of the harrow. Some put it in the furrow, but it does not do for the fertilizer to come in contact with the roots.

A MEMBER: What plant do you think is best to plow under?

MR. SHUTT: One or other of the legumes; I think the clovers are the most useful. That is the result we have had in our orchard.

A MEMBER: We would like to know what is best for a garden crop. Crimson clover won't stand the winter.

MR. SHUTT: It won't stand the winter with us, but it may have served a certain purpose. The hairy vetch will come through, but I do not know whether you can sow it early enough to get much growth. With us the hairy vetch has made quite an amount of growth, and the ground is all covered, and it is easy to turn it under if you run a disc harrow over it. We sowed some early in August.

A MEMBER: Last year I sowed crimson clover, common red clover, and hairy vetch on the 10th of September. The crimson clover came up at once, and made a nice top two inches high. The red clover was very small, and the hairy vetch was very poor and killed out in the winter; but the red clover that had the poorest start in the fall, could not be plowed under in the early part of June, it was such a heavy crop.

The CHAIRMAN: What part of the country was that in?

Answer. Down at Queenston, Niagara.

Mr. DELWORTH: I put in a patch of crimson clover in July, and it looked very good in the fall, but in spring there was not a sign of life. Do you not think the growth that plant made in the fall gathered nitrogen and filled the soil with roots and vegetable matter, although it was dead?

Mr. SHUTT: We have worked over nearly all the legumes and estimated the amount of nitrogen in the crops, and though you can get the largest yield from the crimson clover, you get less nitrogen from the crimson clover than you get from the mammoth red or common red.

Mr. DELWORTH: I can get splendid results from Spanish buckwheat, and it can be sown very late in the season, and you can sow it so thick that it will kill out everything else; it will smother twitch.

A MEMBER: Has anybody had anything to do with sowing peas in the fall?

Mr. SHUTT: I should think it would pay you to buy the humus rather than grow it.

A MEMBER: Does not stable manure supply enough humus?

Mr. DELWORTH: It depends on the price you have to pay for the stable manure. If manure is plowed under green, does not that act just the same as clover?

Mr. SHUTT: Yes, it should be more profitable to use it than to grow clover.

A MEMBER: I think that if we plowed our clover under green, we would get all that is required.

A MEMBER: A majority of gardeners put a hundred tons of manure to the acre. We put on that amount almost every year, and I think that supplies all the humus that is necessary to grow any kind of crop. We could not grow clover because we want to take two or three crops off the land.

A MEMBER: After using that quantity of manure, would it pay to use a chemical fertilizer?

Mr. SHUTT: You might use phosphoric acid and potash; unless you are growing leafy crops, you would have an excess of nitrogen.

A MEMBER: How would ground bone come in?

Mr. SHUTT: It has got phosphoric acid, but it is not as valuable as superphosphate, because it takes time for the bone to decay in the soil, and until it is decayed the phosphoric acid cannot be taken up by the roots. In applying it to fruit trees it is different; but where you want to take your crop off in a few weeks, it is not as valuable.

Mr. ATKINS: I have a piece of ground on which I am going to plant strawberries next spring. I gave it a big coat of fertilizer this spring. There is a factory near us where we can get ground bone, and I am going to put that on.

Mr. SHUTT: I think you might put that ground bone on this fall; the value of it will depend upon the fineness of it.

Mr. ATKINS: Our soil grows a very large plant. Would it be valuable for the fruit?

Prof. SHUTT: I think under the circumstances you might use it in that way.

A MEMBER: We have a certain piece of ground in which we plant our tomatoes. We put them in about the middle of May, and do you not think

it would be a good plan to give the ground a rest by planting spinach, and sell a certain amount of it, and plow the remainder under? Do you not think it would be a change from the ordinary manure to turn under a green crop like that?

Mr. SHUTT: I think it would be altogether too expensive. It would make the humus, and it is a matter for you to decide whether you can sell the spinach for anything and buy the humus.

A MEMBER: The seed of spinach for an acre would cost a dollar, and then you have the labor of putting it in and plowing it under.

Mr. SHUTT: I would not advise plowing it under for that purpose; you can get more humus from other crops.

The CHAIRMAN: The large marrow-fat peas would be ready to plow under just as soon.

A MEMBER: Why not turn the crimson clover under in the fall?

Mr. SHUTT: If you have a hard winter such as we have in Ottawa, it is all right, but if you have an open winter and constant rains there is a certain amount of loss.

A MEMBER: Is there any benefit in putting on salt and lime?

Mr. SHUTT: I do not know why you want to put on salt particularly. I would put on some sort of potash. Lime, of course, is another matter altogether. I think we will come back to the rational use of lime; especially on heavy clay soils, we can furnish the soil with lime to advantage. It helps the germ life of the soil. I think a continued use of superphosphate would tend to an acid condition of the soil, and that is more or less injurious to the crops, and that is why I would like to use basic slag.

Mr. IRISH: Part of my soil is black loam, and we have been growing celery on it for a number of years, and now we are bothered with the blight, and I think there is something the ground wants that it does not get. I think the blight we have, starts from the root in the first place. In taking up some celery a few days ago, I noticed it had started a second growth. The soil is well drained.

Mr. SHUTT: I should think wood ash, lime, or basic slag would be good, but if I used basic slag I would put on some potash as well. You might try that soil to see if it is acid, and send a sample to the Agricultural College to get tested.

Mr. McMEANS: Would you recommend using land plaster to hold the nitrogen in the composite heap?

Mr. SHUTT: I would not use it there; I would use it in the stable with the cattle.

Mr. McMEANS: We buy our manure and draw it home. Will it pay us to scatter the land plaster on it? We draw it all summer and do not use it until spring.

Prof. SHUTT: If it does not heat, there is not very much loss; if you keep it packed and moist you can keep it from losing.

The CHAIRMAN: In reference to this spinach crop, we sow it very early and sow a big piece, and we are sure of a market for some of it, all the better if there is a demand for the whole of it. In cutting it, we do not cut a whole row because we get better plants in one place than another, and later on in the season the spinach that is not sold is three or four feet high, and we have to do something with it and we turn it under.

GROWING VEGETABLES UNDER GLASS.

BY J. L. HILBORN, LEAMINGTON.

I may not be able to stick to the text very closely. "The Growth of Early Vegetables for Market" was what I was asked to speak on, but I see on the programme it says under glass. No doubt, many of you have had more experience than I have had in that regard. However, I will just touch on some of the lines in which I have had experience, and then we can have a discussion, for I think that after all the discussions are the best part of the meetings, and a great deal better than lengthy addresses. This fall I have been working on the eight-hour system; I think most of the vegetable men work in that way;—eight hours before dinner and eight hours after. (Laughter.)

Our soil is well adapted for growing a few varieties of vegetables. Most of you, I suppose, grow for the local market. Ours are entirely for shipping. We do not try to sell anything in town. Everything goes by express and the express company gets every year \$1,300 to \$1,400 from us. We grow cucumbers, melons, and tomatoes chiefly. I will start with early cucumbers.

It would be useless to attempt the kind of business we are doing without some form of greenhouse to start with. We start all our plants in some kind of a greenhouse. There are some 40 greenhouses within two miles of my place. New ones are being built every year, and these houses are used for starting plants to be moved outside. Tomatoes are grown in some of them. We start to grow our plants about the first or second week in March.

The CHAIRMAN: What variety do you grow?

Mr. HILBORN: We have been growing two varieties, the White Spine chiefly and the Arlington. I would prefer something of the same nature with a deeper, brighter green. The Extra Early White Spine is an early variety, and of fairly good size.

The seeds are started in flats, and when the third leaf is on we transplant them into other flats. We use a flat two feet long and one foot wide and about three or four inches deep. Formerly we used a much deeper flat, but we have found that using less soil is better. The way we discovered this was peculiar. My little boy had made some boxes two inches deep and picked out some of the cull plants and set them in these boxes and every one of his plants beat ours. He used just about an inch and a half of soil, and he got more stalky plants. After he had been doing this for three or four years we began doing it, and we found that we got a much better rooted and more stalky plant, and we cut all our trays down. That goes to show that we may learn from people whom we think know much less than we do.

What I say about cucumbers will apply to all the plants that we grow. We use the same plan for transplanting. We transplant the cucumbers in rows, using a stock, something like the head of a wooden rake, in which I have fingers. I make the holes with this.

Q. What distance apart is the best to have the plants?

Mr. HILBORN: The first time put them two by three. With the cucumbers when they begin to crowd, we put them into larger beds and boxes. I would rather transplant them twice if I had time. The oftener you transplant them the better root you get. You can get a thick, stalky, clump of roots and a more stalky plant and one that will resist checking very much better by transplanting two or three times.

The man behind the hose has a wonderful lot to do with the plants. I like to let my plants dry out pretty well before I water them, and then give them a good wetting and allow them to dry again before watering them. Watering too often makes a soft plant that will not stand transplanting.

Q. What object do you aim at in hardening the plants and then forcing them on again?

Mr. HILBORN: We do not let them dry out enough to check them; I like them to dry out pretty well. If you water too often it is impossible to get a hard, tough plant.

Q. Do you water the leaf or the ground?

Mr. HILBORN: I put it right on with the hose, all over the leaf and all. I like to water when it will not reduce the temperature of the house too much. In the morning, just as the sun is coming up, is the best time, but, when we get busy, we water in the evening as well. We use five and six-inch pots and boxes, largely five inches by five inches and five inches deep. We use a good many that are six inches square. In either case we put two plants in the box. We try to get the plants of good size. They run perhaps one and a half feet long before we transplant them.

Q. You have them in blossom before you put them out?

Mr. HILBORN: Yes. It is necessary, of course, not to give them any check in moving them. We are planting a number under cotton. We have a fence about seven feet high to the north and west. To the east there is a bit of grove and to the north. I think it will repay any vegetable man to put up a wind break. It is just like moving 100 miles south.

We have boards two and a half feet high on one side and eight inches on the other, and use rafters one by four and connect with an angle iron. You can set them up very quickly; ours are 210 feet long and covered with cotton. We put the cucumbers in as soon as the danger of frost is over, about the first or fifth of May, and these cucumbers come in about 10 days later than those planted in the greenhouse. We keep the cotton over them for a while and then start hardening them off.

We have to spray them to prevent blight. We use the Bordeaux mixture the same as we use for melons. We have about 2,500 yards of cotton, and most of it is used for cucumbers. After we have the plants out under the cotton if frost threatens (if it is a windy night you will not get frost, but on a still clear night it is very easy to tell if it is going to freeze) if you have water connection just put on your hose and sprinkle your cotton about dark, while it is freezing, and the water will freeze on the cotton, and then you will have a covering tighter than any glass house. It is practically air tight and it will stay so until the frost is over. I have found that to work splendidly and we have very little loss from frost.

The CHAIRMAN: How is this ground prepared before you put these plants out?

Mr. HILBORN: We open the furrows and put the rows in these 12 feet spaces. We open out the furrows with a plow, and then put on the harrow and harrow it, then we plant in the hollow and we mulch well with rotten manure. Cucumbers want a great deal of water. We use an inch hose and let the water run through it as fast as it will. We mulch after we plant.

Q. How do you draw the manure down?

Mr. HILBORN: We have a roadway between every two beds and the mulch is carried in trays. It is not a very good job to carry it in. Most of it is thrown directly from the wagon. It is easy to water, and the mulch of the manure prevents the ground from drying out and retains the water

so that the plant gets the most of it. We just water the strip and cover with manure, and by running the cultivator once every 10 days or two weeks between the rows we prevent the ground from drying out.

Mr. DELWORTH: How do you run the cultivator when you have these scantlings?

Mr. HILBORN: We lift these off; it only takes a short time. We can take them off our beds and have them cultivated in about two hours.

Q. Do you spray your cucumbers?

A. Yes, with the Bordeaux mixture.

Q. Does that prevent blight on them?

A. Yes.

Q. What strength do you use?

A. Four of copperas and six of lime to five gallons of water.

Q. What time of the year are you past danger from frost?

A. It varies considerably; we usually start moving our tomatoes out into the field about the third or fourth of May, and we have never had a plant frozen after moving them outside.

Q. What about cucumbers? Do they grow outside from transplanting?

A. Yes, we start these about the first or tenth of April and transplant them the same as the others. We try to keep them as much out of the wind as possible. Above all things, get your cucumbers where there is not much wind, if you can.

Q. Do you train up those that you grow under glass?

A. You can grow twice as much in the house by training.

Q. What is the best method of pruning?

A. I do not profess to be an expert. We prune very little. If we find the laterals are getting too numerous we prune some of them. We allow them to run and branch as they like until they reach the glass and then we nip them. We use poles to run them, sloping a little and then we run twine along to hold them.

Q. In the house I am building I intend to try poultry netting.

A. I have only one fault to find with that, and that is to get the cucumbers to come down through it.

VOICE: I use three-inch mesh.

Q. I want a coarser mesh.

Mr. DELWORTH: What provision do you make for pollenising the blossom?

A. We use a camel's hair brush on the first that come, but we endeavor to encourage the bees to come in. If we can get an old bumble bee to come in he will do more than a honey bee.

A MEMBER: I keep a hive of bees in the house.

Mr. HILBORN: I intend to do that next year.

Q. Do you use raised benches or solid benches?

A. These are raised benches. In some houses we have solid beds and I like them best.

Q. How close together do you plant in the house?

Mr. HILBORN: We put the plants about three feet apart in the row, one plant to a place. Those that we grow for the greenhouses we only plant

one plant in a box. Our beds are about six feet apart and we run two rows in them. The houses are built for growing tomatoes. Now, as to tomatoes: We start the first tomato plants about March 1, and we like to prick them out often. As soon as they have four leaves on we prick them out again. You can get a better rooted plant by firming the soil; we transplant three times, and often four. We keep them in flats.

Mr. MCMEANS: You never transplant them into cold frames?

Mr. HILBORN: No, after they get a pretty good size, if they run up too much, we turn them down. We use shallow flats; the majority of our flats are four, and four and a half inches deep, and we only fill them half full the first planting, and after that we use more. At the last planting we cut the earth out, and take out a chunk of earth with the plant; and we have veneer, cut four inches wide, the length of the tray. One of these strips of veneer is placed in the centre of the tray, and two across, and that leaves a space four inches square, and we plant one in each space, and when we pull the partitions out it leaves the soil ready to lift out with the root. We have that square of earth with the roots all about it, and the plant gets practically no checking. We wet them just before going to field. If they grow stalky it is well to bury them down and bend them over. "Spark's Earliana" are grown for the majority of the crop.

A MEMBER: A great many of them split?

Mr. HILBORN: We do not find that with us.

A MEMBER: I grow "Atlantic Prize." They are not very large but I get early crops and a smooth fruit. They are a little thin-skinned, and will not stand shipping as well as others.

Mr. RUSH: Do you find that a round tomato is better for shipping than a flat one?

Mr. HILBORN: Yes, I believe it is better and firmer.

A MEMBER: Have you grown "Chalk's Early Jewel"?

Mr. HILBORN: Yes, I tried it a few years ago. It is very fine looking, but with us it is too weeks late. The "Plentiful" is grown in our district to some extent.

Mr. ROBINSON: They had a great rot in the centre this year. Last year we had no trouble in growing them, but it seems to be the general cry this past season that they were affected with this green rot.

Q. Did you ever have any experience with the "Imperial"?

Mr. HILBORN: Yes, it is a nice sample and it takes well in the market, but it does not pay us as well as the others.

Mr. ROBINSON: I paid a visit to growers in my district this year, and I was surprised to see the amount of rot in the "Earliana" and "Plentiful." Some ground was very rich, and I do not think you want the ground rich for tomatoes.

Q. Do you have any leaf blight among your tomatoes?

A. Yes, more or less, but we do not mind it very much, because we think we get the fruit a little earlier.

Mr. ROBINSON: We grew a few "Imperial," and they started with the leaf blight. The crop was very promising, but the leaves seemed to turn black and had the same kind of smell potatoes have when they get the blight.

Mr. HILBORN: I think spraying will help that. Some five years ago we were troubled with blight on our tomatoes, and we sprayed with the Bordeaux mixture as we loaded them on the waggon. We gave them two or

three applications after they went to the field, and were able to control it very well. The last three years we have had very little blight. I think it is largely owing to weather conditions. I used to grow melons very extensively, both the water melon and the musk melon.

Q. What is the particular kind that you grow?

A. The Improved Hackensack.

Q. Do you treat them similarly to cucumbers?

A. We do not have them so large when we transplant them.

Q. Do you plant the melons in furrows?

A. We mark out the field in rows, and we put the two rows eight feet apart and the next two rows six feet apart.

Q. Haven't you found there is a better demand for the small yellow flesh?

A. Yes, and if I was growing the melon for the Toronto market I would grow small melons. There is more money in it. We have to spray a good deal, and if we put our rows six feet apart there is no room for our spraying outfit. We put two plants to the hill. We sow some rye when we take off our early melons and early tomatoes.

Q. How high do you let your rye get before you plow it down?

A. We plow it early in the spring. I have used very little commercial fertilizer, except nitrate of soda, when I am putting out my tomatoes. As soon as we get them in the field, I give them a little treat of nitrate of soda, about a teaspoonful to the plant. It seems to start them growing. We had a striking result from that this year when some large plants were moved out early. The plants that we treated yielded fully one-third more than the others.

Q. Have you had any trouble with melon aphid?

Mr. HILBORN: The history of the melon growing countries, as far as I know, is that they have sandy land, and they are affected with melon aphid. It is a very hard pest to control unless you go about it in the right way. It will cover a five acre field in a week. The female deposits the eggs on limbs and branches of trees in the fall, and those hatch in the spring into females, and they start here and there in the field, and the first progeny are living young, and they give birth to living young in immense numbers. There is just one way to handle them successfully, and that is to watch them closely when they begin to run. They start in a few places, perhaps four or five plants to the acre, and this is liable to be near a tree, and if you destroy these plants you will have very little trouble.

We take a bushel basket of straw and scatter the straw under the plant and set fire to it. We used to try pulling the plants out, and dipping them in coal oil, but in that way we lost an odd insect and concluded that fire is the only sure remedy. This year, in about six acres of melons, we destroyed one-eighth of an acre of plants before we got it checked. A neighbor across the road did not hunt out the hills, and he had to spray heavily and to use a great deal of tobacco stems and the result of his neglect cost him a good many dollars. There is not as much danger from this pest on heavier soil.

EXPERIMENTS IN POTATO GROWING.

BY PROF. C. A. ZAVITZ, O. A. C., GUELPH.

I will take up questions dealing with one experiment after another, and will give you an opportunity of asking questions as I go along, and I am sure from what I heard of your meeting yesterday afternoon, and from what I know of it this morning, there will be a good lengthy discussion.

My work is more especially along the line of field agriculture; but as it is difficult to know just where to place the potato, whether in the line of agriculture or as a vegetable crop I am safe in appearing before a vegetable grower's association and presenting some results that we have had in potato growing.

The potato crop is an exceedingly important one. On looking over the report of the Bureau of Industries for Ontario, we find that during the last twenty-three years there has been an average of 157,241 acres devoted to potatoes. This area of land has given an average of over 18,000,000 bushels per annum, or a market value of over \$7,000,000.

The average yield over Ontario for the last twenty-three years has been over 115 bushels. That seems low. There are many much higher records than these. But let us look to the United States for a moment, and we find that the average there is 73 bushels, and our average yield is 115 bushels; so that our average yield is considerably over that of the United States. In fact, the average for Ontario is 57 per cent. higher than the average for the United States.

The two highest yields in that period was in 1884, when the average was 163 bushels, and in 1895, when it was 159 bushels. The highest average yield in the United States in 1895, was 101 bushels and in 1902, 96 bushels.

The lowest yield in Ontario in twenty-three years was 76 bushels, in the United States 56 bushels, so that you see our yields are higher on the average than the United States. Notwithstanding that, we think there is great room for an increase in our yields, and in order to glean definite information in regard to the best varieties and best methods we have, during the last fifteen or seventeen years, been carrying on experimental work at the Agricultural College, where we have been comparing one variety with another, and one method of cultivation with another, and I have the summaries of some of these results to present to you.

In the first place we will take up the question of variety. We have had somewhere about 275 varieties of potatoes, 230 of these have been experimented with very carefully for each of five years, and so far as yield per acre is concerned, we have obtained the highest yield from the Empire State Variety. The Empire State Variety gave us the greatest yield per acre for the first five years, and it gave us the greatest yield per acre of all the varieties for the second five years, and also for the third five years. The Empire State stands at the head of the list for average results per year per acre: Empire State, 224 bushels; Chambers Seeding, 208 bushels; Pearl Savoy, 214 bushels; American Wonder, 217 bushels; Rural New Yorker No. 102, 217 bushels; Morning Star, 214 bushels. These are some of the highest yielding varieties we have had. You might say these are not very high yields, but 224 bushels an acre means considerably more than 115. We find by taking the Province as a whole, that the eastern and northern part of Ontario will yield considerably more than the southern and western part of Ontario; and I find by looking over the records of Wellington county, as given during the last eleven years that they are the same as the average of the whole Province, so that we might take the results here as being fairly representative.

In order to find out the quality of the potatoes as well as the yield we had a "steamer" made by which we could steam fifteen varieties of potatoes at a time, and we have examined all of 200 varieties in each of two years, and examined them very carefully for mealiness and flavor, and general appearance of the potato. We allowed 100 points for quality; 40 points for mealiness; 40 for flavor, and 20 for general appearance, and we examined all our potatoes in that way, and I was surprised at the difference there was in the varieties of potatoes, especially in the flavor. I used to think that one variety of potato had just about the same flavor as another variety. Some potatoes leave a nice taste in your mouth, and others leave a taste that is a little like the ground, and you do not care for any more. We all notice the difference in the mealiness. Some are nice, clean, white, and others have red streaks through them. In examining potatoes in this way, we find that the Dempsey Seeding, Empire State, Pearl Savoy, and the Rural Blush were the best in quality; and when we take the yield per acre and quality both into consideration, the potatoes which scored the highest of all was the Empire State. Out of all these varieties we take into consideration the earliness in order to find out the best early potato to grow, and we take notice in the first place of the way the tops die down. We found that in an average of the last three years the earliest to mature, as nearly as we could tell from general appearance, was the potato known as Green Bay, which matures in 88 days. The next to that is the Early Pink Eye, 89 days; Stray Beauty, 91 days; Early Ohio, Salter's Earliest and Early Fortune, 92 days; Early Dawn and Early Andes, 93 days. These are the earliest potatoes, according to careful observation, of all the potatoes we have grown.

In order to glean fuller information with regard to the different varieties, during the last five years, we have taken the earliest we had previous to that time, and planted them; putting in six rows of each, and then nine weeks from the day of planting we dug two rows of each; and then twelve weeks from the time of planting we dug two more rows of each; and fifteen weeks from the time of planting we dug the remaining two rows of each. We have kept that up for four years, and we find that the variety that has given us the largest yield per acre at the end of nine weeks after planting is the Early Andes, 174 bushels. It seems to me that is a very important point if we wish to grow a very early potato that will give us the greatest yield. The Early Fortune gave us 170 bushels; Six Weeks, 169 bushels; Early Dominion, 167 bushels; Early Pink Eye, 165 bushels; Early Dawn, 162 bushels. There you have the earliest potatoes that will give the greatest yield per acre at nine weeks from planting.

Now you might think that nearly all of the varieties would give much the same, but you take Burpee's Extra Early, under exactly similar conditions, and the yield is 113 bushels as compared with 174 bushels from the Early Andes.

During the last three years there has been a good deal of rot, and we have examined all the different varieties carefully for the percentage of rot; and we have counted all the sound potatoes and all the rotten potatoes at the time of digging the crop, and then we have taken the whole crop and put them in a cellar; and then in the early part of November we again go over these potatoes, and count out all the rotten ones, and taking the number of rotten ones at the time of digging and the number of rotten ones when we go over them in the early part of November, we are able to determine the percentage of rotten potatoes. We have not taken the last two years into account, but we find it has varied all the way from three per cent. to fifty-eight per cent. of rotten potatoes. As a rule those potatoes which rotted last year or the year before last, also rotted this year, and I find the results

come out this year similar to the first two years. The freest potato from rot for the first two years was Holborn's Abundance, 3.4 per cent.

Mr. MACOUN, Ottawa: We have been growing that potato for seventeen years, and it has proved the most productive and the freest from blight.

Prof. ZAVITZ: It is a very light potato. The next are old country varieties: Robertson's Champion, 3.7 per cent.; Surrey, 3.7 per cent.; Up to Date, 3.8 per cent.; Stray Beauty, 5.1 per cent. Empire State, I am sorry to say, has rather more rot than some of the other varieties, but it is better than the average. There is not quite so much rot in the Empire State as the average variety, but we wish it was as free from rot as the Holborn's Abundance, because it is a better quality of potato.

The Empire State has an average of about 29 per cent. of rot, the Rural New Yorker has over 35 per cent. of rot, the Beauty of Hebron averages 56 per cent. of rot. It seems to me this is one of the points we should look to very carefully, so as to get a variety that will resist the attacks of the blight as much as possible.

I have been asked the question with regard to the earliness or lateness of varieties, and their disposition to blight. At one time I thought that early varieties would be free from blight, and last year I made an examination of some of the early medium, and late varieties, and I found there was the greatest rot in the medium ripening varieties, and the least rot in the latest ripening varieties. Taking the earliest potatoes we have grown, the average is about 26 per cent., and taking the latest varieties, the average rot is only 11 per cent., and in the medium varieties, the average rot is 34 per cent., so that you see we get the greatest amount of rot in the medium varieties, and the least from the very latest varieties.

A MEMBER: What experiments have you made with the Early Ohio?

Prof. ZAVITZ: We have not had any experiments with them, they are almost as early as these I mention, it takes fourth place. I remember the first five years we had Early Ohio, we had the greatest yield at the end of nine weeks from Stray Beauty, the second highest yield from Early Dawn, and the third highest from the Early Ohio. It went about 17 bushels less per acre than the Stray Beauty, and I think I noticed the Early Ohio had a good deal of rot. It is about three-fourths of the way down the list in the per cent. of rot.

A MEMBER: Have you tried Snow Ball and Ureka Extra Early?

Prof. ZAVITZ: We have tried the Snow Ball. It proved early, not quite as early as others. Green Bay has taken first place in earliness.

A MEMBER: Is there any connection between quality and susceptibility to rot?

Prof. ZAVITZ: I do not think so. We have some of the best quality, and they are very free from rot. I would like to ask what has been your experience as to the advisability of changing seed or keeping on the same seed for a good many years?

A MEMBER: Change.

A MEMBER: Mine is just the opposite.

A MEMBER: I have had Early Ohio sixteen or seventeen years, and they are as good to day as when I got them.

A MEMBER: I have had about the same experience.

A MEMBER: Thirty years ago, a gardener in St. Catharines got some seed from my father, and he has used the same seed for thirty years, and he has the finest potatoes on the market to-day. He selects the finest and largest each year.

Prof. ZAVITZ: We have had seven varieties in a test for sixteen years without any change of the seed, and the results are very interesting indeed.

Just after we included this year's results, I divided them off into parts of four years, consisting of 1890 to 1893, and from 1894 to 1897, from 1898 to 1901, from 1902 to 1905, and in taking the average of these I find that in the first four years we got 120 bushels per acre, for the second four years 206 bushels per acre, for the third four years 218 bushels per acre, and for the last four years 249 bushels per acre. So you see we have had these seven varieties for sixteen years, no change of seed, and for the last four years we have got more than double the yield per acre than in the first four years we had them. We have taken a good deal of pains in the selection of our potatoes. We have selected the largest specimens, which were smooth and of good shape.

Mr. MACOUN: Our results have been about the same as those of Prof. Zavitz as to varieties, but it is not exactly the same in all the varieties. We have found Carman No. 1 to be about the best potato we have had, and our yields at Ottawa are a little over 2 per cent. better than those of Guelph. Our soil is particularly favorable, and in our small plots we have had as much as 700 bushels per acre.

Our highest yields are about 500 bushels per acre, and this year about 475 bushels. This Carman No. 1 has averaged something over 750 bushels per acre for years. Last year I sent to Thorburn & Co., New York, for some fresh seed and we planted them alongside of our Carman No. 1, and the new seed yielded 101 bushels per acre more than our own seed. We have been planting the very best seed every year. We planted a crop of that seed this year, and the increase was over 90 bushels per acre.

Prof. ZAVITZ: You do not know how these seeds were selected that you got from Thorburn & Co.?

Prof. MACOUN: No, but I think it is wise to sometimes try a change of seeds, because others may have been working on a better system than you have been.

Mr. DELWORTH: Of course Prof. Zavitz has been careful in making his selection of seed, and the ordinary gardener does not do that.

Prof. ZAVITZ: I think it is possible to have potatoes without change. You can keep the same potatoes on the land for sixteen years without any change of seed, and not only hold your own but actually double the yield per acre.

Mr. MACOUN: Some of our varieties have doubled the yield in the same way.

Prof. ZAVITZ: I am glad the results have come out like that, because it is encouraging that if we can save our own seed and select the best from that; it saves considerable money in buying seed.

A MEMBER: Did you experiment with the Delaware?

Prof. ZAVITZ: We have, but I forget how they came out.

The CHAIRMAN: The Delaware is the only potato that is being sold on the Toronto market. Ontario potatoes are worth about 15 to 20 cents a bag less. I bought fifty bags of potatoes, and I think there were some six or seven of them that were sent out, and they were all returned, and we put out 225 of Delaware the other day, and we did not have a complaint. These were grown in New Brunswick.

Mr. MCCALLUM: I have grown Delaware for the last two years, and they did not do as well as the others.

Mr. MACOUN: During the past summer I was several weeks in the old country, and I had the good fortune to visit the farm of Sutton & Son, Reading, England, where they have a man who looks after the potatoes all the time. He had 1,700 plots in his charge this summer, and one thing that

with those of the south of England, where the season is warmer, were growing thrifty, and the others were beginning to ripen. This specialist told me there was at least three weeks difference in the maturity of the potato, and the Scotch seed would yield far more than the English seed.

Prof. ZAVITZ: We find much the same thing with different grains. We got oats from Scotland, and they are later than other varieties in reaching maturity. In regard to planting potatoes of different sizes, we carried on an experiment with different sized potatoes and different sized pieces. In one experiment, that is part of a more elaborate experiment, we put in the same number of small potatoes on equal areas of land. In one case we used large potatoes, about one pound each, and put them in rows about twenty-eight inches apart, and about twelve inches apart in the row; then we put in the same number of medium sized potatoes on similar land, and then we put in the same number of small potatoes about an inch and a half in diameter, which are the smallest sized marketable potatoes. We conducted that experiment for six years. Which do you think gave us the largest yield per acre?

A MEMBER: Small potatoes.

A MEMBER: Large potatoes.

A MEMBER: Medium sized potatoes. (Great laughter.)

Prof. ZAVITZ: I thought perhaps I would get the different answers, but I did not think I would get them quite so quickly. We made twenty-one distinct tests, and without any exception whatever, we obtained the greatest yield from the largest potatoes, a medium yield, from the medium potatoes, and the smallest yield from the smallest sized potatoes. I never saw anything any more convincing. If we take the average of all these tests, we got from the large potatoes an average of 357 bushels per acre, from the medium size 288 bushels, and from the small 217 bushels.

A MEMBER: How about the sample?

Prof. ZAVITZ: When you look at the economical result that is another question altogether. In the first place the large potatoes take too much seed, and in the second place there were too many small potatoes. The question, What is the most economical? starts another line of experiment. We took medium sized potatoes and cut them up into different sized pieces. In the first place, we made every piece to weigh exactly $1/16$ of an ounce, and for the next, every piece weighed $\frac{1}{4}$ of an ounce, and for the next, every piece weighed $\frac{1}{2}$ of an ounce, and for the next, every piece weighed 1 ounce, and for the next every piece weighed 2 ounces. We doubled it every time. These pieces we cut to one eye: the same variety and same sized potatoes to start with. We wanted to find out the influence of the size of the piece. We conducted that experiment for five years; two every year, having an average of ten distinct experiments, and the results are interesting. From the small piece $1/16$ of an ounce, we got an average of 48 bushels per acre; from $\frac{1}{8}$, 90 bushels; from $\frac{1}{4}$, an average 111 bushels; from $\frac{1}{2}$, 129; from one ounce piece 148; and from 2 ounce piece 174. There was an increase right along. If you looked at these potatoes when they were growing, you found that where we put in the little pieces we had the little potatoes, simply owing to the size of the piece.

Another question that came up was the influence of the eyes. One eye, two eyes, three eyes, four eyes and five eyes in a piece. Which would give the largest increase?

A MEMBER: One eye.

A MEMBER: Two eyes.

A MEMBER: Early Ohio will not grow more than four or five potatoes to one eye.

Prof. ZAVITZ: We used two varieties every year, and we have conducted the experiments for five years, and we found that from one eye, where we used an average sized potatoe, cut up into one ounce pieces, we got an average of 140 bushels; from two eyes 151; from three eyes 154; from four eyes 161; and from five eyes 185 bushels.

Prof. ZAVITZ: From one eye, 117 marketable potatoes over $1\frac{1}{2}$ in diameter; two eyes, 123; three eyes, 127; four eyes, 134, and five eyes, 139.

The CHAIRMAN: Were these pieces about the same size?

Prof. ZAVITZ: Yes, the pieces were exactly one ounce each.

A MEMBER: Did you count the number of stalks that grew?

Prof. ZAVITZ: Where we put in the pieces of one eye we counted the number of stalks and got an average of three from one eye, and where we got over to where there were five eyes you would naturally think there would be 15 stalks, but we only got an average of $4\frac{1}{2}$ stalks. From five eyes there was an average of three stems from one eye.

A MEMBER: Do you suppose there would be a possibility of some of these eyes remaining when you thought you took them out?

Prof. ZAVITZ: No, I do not think so. That suggested another line of experiment. If we would take potatoes of different sizes, and cut out pieces of the same size, would there be any advantage in taking these pieces from large potatoes as compared with small?

This is not a very elaborate experiment. I simply took two different sized potatoes; a potato weighing four ounces, and one weighing eight ounces, and we conducted that experiment for three years, taking out ounce pieces in every case with the same number of eyes, and we found the average results for three years from the pieces taken from the $\frac{1}{4}$ pound potatoes, that we got 137 bushels and the similar sized pieces taken from the pound potatoes we got 146 bushels per acre or about nine bushels per acre more; showing that the size of potatoes from which you take your seed seems to have an influence in determining the yield. Pieces taken from the large potatoes seem to have a tendency to give a greater yield than pieces taken from the smaller potatoes.

The CHAIRMAN: Would that be a greater yield of large potatoes.

Prof. ZAVITZ: It is the total yield. We have conducted experiments for the last eleven years, where we have selected from large potatoes, and then medium sized potatoes from medium sized potatoes, and small potatoes, and we have kept that on for eleven years, and we have not only increased the yield per acre, but we find that we get large potatoes; although we get a decided increase in the yield, there is also a large percentage of marketable potatoes. The greater yield you get the tendency is for you to have a larger percentage of smaller potatoes. In this case where we selected large potatoes from large potatoes, and small potatoes from small potatoes, not only was the crop from the small potatoes much less but it consisted of a larger percentage of smaller potatoes. We will now pass on to another experiment, where we put potatoes in rows 28 inches apart, and put the pieces one foot apart in the row, using the same amount of seed, and planting the potatoes 33 inches apart both ways.

A MEMBER: You will grow more potatoes where you plant them closer together.

Prof. ZAVITZ: That is right. Where we put them 28 inches apart we got 195 bushels per acre, in comparison with 156 bushels per acre, where we put the same amount of seed 33 inches apart both ways. We used the same amount of seed per acre in the two systems, and we had an advantage of about 40 bushels per acre in cutting them small and planting them closer together.

The CHAIRMAN: Has the Green Bay Potato a vigorous growth at the top?

Prof. ZAVITZ: Medium vigorous.

Mr. MACOUN: We carried on experiments for a number of years with rows 30 inches apart, and the sets 8, 10, 12, 14 inches apart. We tried several varieties, and in the small growing potatoes 12 inches was sufficient and with the larger 14 inches was the most economical distance.

Prof. ZAVITZ: The next experiment was where we used whole potatoes. Each potato weighed two ounces, and we used the same sized potatoes, but instead of planting them whole, we cut them in two and put in the two halves, and then we used the same sized potato again, cutting them in four and planted the four pieces. We planted them 28 inches apart in rows, and two feet apart in the row in order to find out whether it was better to have one or two pieces in the hill, and I think, without any exception, where we put one piece only in the hill we got the greatest yield, and with two pieces the next greatest, and with four pieces the lowest. Where we planted two-ounce whole potatoes we had 212 bushels per acre. Where we cut them in two we had 204 bushels per acre, and where we put in four pieces, we had 183 bushels, making a difference of 29 bushels per acre. If any of you have ever planted a whole potato with all its eyes and examine it, you will find that three or four or five or six eyes of that potato have started to grow, and the other have not started at all. When some of the stronger eyes begin to grow, it seems the whole nourishment goes to help these eyes. If you want the other eyes to grow you must cut them off. If you cut the potato up to one eye to the piece you will find that every eye will grow. We find that if we plant the whole potato, a few stems will grow and they will be vigorous. If we cut it in two there will be far more stems, and if we cut it in four pieces we have a great lot of fine stems.

Mr. HILBORN: Do you not find you get the potatoes earlier by planting the whole potato?

Prof. ZAVITZ: I believe you do.

Mr. HILBORN: I plant potatoes for our own use, and I always plant one row with whole potatoes, and they are ready for use a week earlier than the others.

Mr. MACOUN: I believe these results are due to the question of moisture. In the northwest they get the best results from planting the whole potato.

Prof. ZAVITZ: Another experiment we tried was planting potatoes the same day they were cut and planting them four or five days after they were cut, I feel very firmly, with regard to this, that it is decidedly important that we cut the potatoes and plant them the same day. We get an average of 18 bushels per acre more by planting the same day than we do by keeping them four or five days. We have a tremendous lot of evidence along that line. We carried on this experiment for four or five years and we used two varieties of potatoes each year, and we took the same sized potatoes and divided them in lots, and before they were planted, in one case we would put them in the root cellar in the light, and in another case on the barn floor, and in another case we put them in the greenhouse, and left them there three weeks. This was, of course, after the severe frosts were past. The best average results were where we put the potatoes on the barn floor where they were away from the direct rays of the sun-light, left them there for three weeks, and then planted them with the sprouts on. We got 221 bushels per acre. The next largest yield was where we put them in the dark in the cellar, and they grew longer and more tender sprouts and we planted them with the sprouts left on, and we got 210 bushels. The third best was where.

we put them in the root cellar in the dark and we got 206 bushels per acre, and the next was where we had them in the root cellar in the dark and left the sprouts on. We got 189 bushels per acre.

A MEMBER: What about planting them after taking them direct from the pit?

Prof. ZAVITZ: We have done that, but not in comparison with the other methods. The potatoes we put in the green house with the sprouts on, we secured 189 bushels per acre. The potatoes from the root cellar with the sprouts off produced 177 bushels. This shows the importance of getting our potatoes in before they sprout.

Another experiment we tried was cutting the potatoes and planting them without any substance being put on them in comparison with sprinkling them with lime and land plaster. Where we did not sprinkle the cut potatoes, we got an average of 196 bushels per acre, and where we used lime and land plaster we got 214 bushels per acre. So you see that there is an average increase of about 18 bushels per acre, in favor of land plaster on cut potatoes. We have used road dust and brick dust, but not with as good results as land plaster.

Another experiment we tried was taking the eye from different parts of the potato. From the seed end, middle and stem end of the potato. Taking the eye from the seed end, taking quite a good size piece with one eye in the piece, we got from the seed end 162 bushels; from the stem end 167; and from the middle of the potato 174 bushels. We got the best results, by about 12 bushels per acre, from the eyes taken from the middle of the potato; the piece being the same size in each case, and only one eye being allowed to remain in each case.

Another experiment, was planting potatoes on an average clay soil 1 inch, 3 inches, 5 inches, and 7 inches. This experiment extended over seven years, and we got the best results from planting 5 inches deep 206 bushels; 3 inches, 202 bushels; 7 inches, 189 bushels; 1 inch deep, 192 bushels.

There is not much difference between level and hill cultivation. We tried that seven years, and we got the best results from level cultivation for the first three years, and the last four years we got the best results from the hills. In taking the average of all the results there is not a very large difference.

A MEMBER: Did you try that on light soil?

Prof. ZAVITZ: No, we have not any light soil.

Mr. MACOUN: We had an experiment extending for seven years, planting the potatoes 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, and 8 inches deep, and of course there was a slight amount of soil put over them by cultivation, and we found that without exception that those planted 1 inch deep gave the best results. It was a great surprise to me. There was no great difference between those planted 1 inch deep and those planted 4 or 5 inches.

Prof. ZAVITZ: The results of experiments conducted with potatoes at the Ontario Agricultural College seemed to indicate the importance of selecting the best variety or varieties to fulfil the object in view.

Sometimes we have heard it stated that it does not matter very much what variety we are growing, but I tell you that it does matter. I believe if we are going to look to our own interests we will select those varieties that will give the best results. The most satisfactory returns will be gained by:

Selecting the potatoes for seed purposes, from year to year on your own farm.

Selecting large, smooth, seed potatoes to be cut into pieces from one to two ounces, for economical results, in weight and each piece having 2, 3 or 4 eyes.

Planting in rows about 28 inches apart with single pieces 12 to 15 inches apart in rows.

Sprinkling cut seed potatoes with land plaster and planting on same day as cut.

Planting potatoes which have not sprouted or had sprouts removed.

Planting four or five inches deep, if the land is suitable.

Making a judicious use of farmyard manure, with a limited use of commercial fertilizer in some cases.

Sprinkling with bug death for the beetle, corrosive sublimate for the scab, Bordeaux mixture for the blight.

The CHAIRMAN: In applying the Paris green we have done so in different ways. In water, and in different mixtures, but we have had the best results when it was mixed with air slacked lime a week or two old. If you mix the Paris green with that, very little will go over an acre.

Prof. ZAVITZ: We have not used the lime but we have used Paris green and plaster. Where we used Paris green in solution we got 192 bushels, and by using the Bug Finish we only got 151 bushels per acre. Bug Death, dry, 208 bushels per acre, Bug Death, in solution, 213 bushels per acre. Untreated potatoes where we simply let the beetle go ahead, averaged 106 bushels per acre.

Mr. MACOUN: When the Bug Death was introduced some years ago it was claimed that it was a fungicide as well as an insecticide. We have been conducting experiments for three years, and the results of our experiments show it is not a fungicide to any great extent, but it is a very good insecticide, but more expensive than Paris green. With regard to the Bordeaux mixture, our results have been very successful.

INJURIOUS INSECTS AND FUNGOUS DISEASES OF THE GARDEN CROPS AND HOW TO COMBAT THEM.

You have been talking about the potatoe blight. I have a sample of the disease in this case. You will find it is covered with a whitish bloom and dark spots. The whitish bloom are little spots or spores that are carried by the wind or water to the various parts of the plant. This disease appears from the 1st to the 15th of August, and I think it would be well when it appears, if spraying is not successful, to cut off the tops of the plant at once or to dig your potatoes. It works from the leaf down to the tuber.

Last year we conducted a few experiments on this potato blight, but I do not think with any better results than Prof. Zavits. We do not know yet whether the spores winter over, as we have not yet found the hibernating stage of the fungus. One scientist has offered a large sum of money to be given to any student who will find that stage. This whitish bloom is what we call the summer stage. We think there must be another stage called the resting stage of the fungus.

This past year we have had a very serious pest known as the Diamond-back Moth. It has a diamond shaped back from which it gets its name. It is often called the shot-hole worm.

Mr. DELWORTH: I had a patch of cabbage attacked by this moth this year, and I did not know what it was.

Prof. JARVIS: It will likely be bad for a few years, and then you may not see it again for several years. The Diamond-Backed Moths are small green, exceedingly active caterpillars, about one-quarter to three-eighths of an inch long, which attack the leaves of cabbages, turnips, etc., eating numerous small holes through the younger leaves, and irregular blotches from the under surfaces of the older leaves. When disturbed they run backwards, wriggling their bodies violently from side to side, and by means of a silken thread fall to the ground where they lie still.

Another insect that attacks the cabbage are the cabbage worms. They were very numerous at Guelph this year. The eggs are deposited on the under surface of the leaves, and when they hatch they feed on the loose leaves. Spraying with Paris green is the best remedy that we know. Use it whenever you see fit. There is no danger of poisoning if you use a thin solution of four ounces of Paris green to a barrel of water. If a man were to eat two or three dozen of these cabbages at one meal it would not poison him. Use a teaspoonful to a can of water. This quantity is enough to kill the worm.

We are troubled with a long green worm with yellow stripes, the Zebra Caterpillar. It is a rather large, handsome caterpillar when matured, about two inches in length, velvety black, beautifully ornamented with golden yellow stripes on each side of the body, which are connected by narrow lines of the same color; the head and feet are reddish brown.

I have not had any experience with the slug on the cabbage, but I have spoken to gardeners about it. They say they use nothing but lime, and that they get good results by placing lime at the base of the plant. The slug breeds in rich soil or humus, and the garden is a very common place for it. You can easily kill it by using lime.

The little Cabbage Aphis (*Aphis Brassicae* L.) is a green plant louse. Perhaps, cleaning up in the fall thoroughly is one of the best remedies for the cabbage louse. Burn the leaves or stems that are left over. You will see them in them.

Clusters of grey plant lice are situated all round the bases of the stems and beneath the leaves of Swede turnips and all kinds of cabbages, from which they suck the sap, causing them to become withered and stunted, and in serious outbreaks, destroying whole crops. As a rule, these plant lice are not noticed until the end of the season; but in dry autumns, or on high land, they increase with incredible rapidity, and become one of the most destructive enemies of the turnip grower. The eggs are laid late in autumn upon the leaves and stems of the plants.

The Melon Aphis is a more serious pest than the cabbage aphis. This whitish fly has become one of the most serious pests in the greenhouses of Ontario, and I am working with that insect trying to find out a remedy. We have grown tobacco in the greenhouse and it is more common on the tobacco than anything else.

The Cucumber Beetle and Squash Bug are very injurious. We sprayed them this summer with Paris green and lime combined and Bug Death, and we got first-class results from either one. It is a good way to apply the Bug Death early in the morning.

I wish to call your attention to the exhibit I have below and if any of you have any weeds or insects or fungous diseases that we have not discussed this afternoon, I would be very pleased to talk them over with you.

A MEMBER: Have you conducted any experiments with the cut worm or the slug?

Mr. JARVIS: They are night feeders, and the same treatment is used for both. A few years ago I tried the refuse from arsenic factories, placing it around the roots in the College gardens with very good effects. I do not know whether lime would have the same effect or not.

Mr. MACOUN: We have had a good deal of experience at Ottawa with the cut worm, and the most satisfactory remedy we have found has been bran and Paris green—one pound of Paris green to forty or fifty pounds of bran, slightly moistening the bran. We use a bag with a tube in the mouth of it and shake it out among the plants just on the surface of the ground, and the cut worms walk along at night and eat this bran, and they are killed before they injure the plants.

THE GROWING AND MARKETING OF CAULIFLOWER.

BY A. McMEANS, BRANTFORD.

I was asked to select a subject to speak on at this Convention, and I selected the cauliflower, because I have been growing it for the last ten years. You have heard Alfred Herbert's definition of a cauliflower, "A cabbage with a college education."

Men's ideas change. The grower who a few years ago was disposed to sneer at books and "book farmers" now turns for information to the printed page. How easy it is to tell in a few short sentences that which we have been years in finding out. Knowledge comes slowly and laboriously from the fields, and yet the closest observation of the character of a plant, its habits, likes and dislikes, and the habits of its enemies seldom goes unrewarded. Much has been written on the cauliflower, and yet it is a stranger to many a garden and is almost unknown in some markets.

To grow cauliflowers successfully it is necessary to have good loam or sandy loam, with loam predominating. It should be made as rich as we know how to make it. Where it is obtainable, I know of nothing better than successive applications of wellrotted stable manure. Plow as early as the first of May. By plowing early we preserve the moisture. When the first sign of weeds appears give a harrowing or cultivation. For your seed bed choose your piece of ground early and plow as early in the spring as possible, harrowing when any signs of weeds appear. About May 15 give a thorough cultivation, harrow well and put on your plank or roller.

I prefer the plank, as it gives a nice, mellow, smooth seed bed. Do not be afraid to pay a high price for seed, and if possible secure seed that has been grown north. I consider Danish seed better than German.

If late years one of the chief faults has been that the germinating power of cauliflower seed has been very low. Whether the fault is due to the seedsmen or in the breeding up of the higher type I know not, but this I do know, that, generally speaking, it takes one ounce of seed to produce 1,000 to 1,500 plants, and in sowing the seed I sow one ounce to about 400 feet of drill.

Before the plants break the ground there should be a good supply of tobacco dust on hand. This is one of the best preventives I know of for that little bug that is so destructive to cabbage and cauliflower plants. Put it on while the dew is on the plants. It takes about five or six weeks for the plants to grow to the right size for transplanting.

It is not good policy to set the plants too small. They should have a good, strong, stocky growth and will be more hardy and live better in an unfavorable time if their growth has been moderately slow in the seed bed. It is never best to crowd cauliflower in the field. Give them plenty of room and you will get better development. For the Erfurt I plant the rows three feet apart and two feet apart in the row.

A few days before transplanting manure and plow your ground again, harrow well and put on your planker so that your surface is smoothed off nicely, select a cloudy day or after a rain to put your plants out, or if the weather be hot and dry take the afternoon, say from three o'clock, and evening for doing your work. If the soil is too dry, draw water and wet each place a little before setting the plant. Generally there is no need to draw water, as if the ground has been worked properly it will be moist enough to set out the young plants.

The cultivation should always be level and should be run fairly deep the first and second times, and after that quite shallow. Cultivate as long as possible without breaking the leaves. Cauliflowers, if left to grow without covering, are not worth anything, but if covered at the proper time will generally come out nice and white.

Commence to tie them up when the heads the size of a coffee cup, taking two rows at a time. I use a strong three-ply twine. The tying should be done while the cauliflowers are dry and during the warm part of the day, while the leaves are limber. Most people prefer to tie their flowers up tight. I like to leave them as open as possible just so the sun will not spot them, so that when cutting them you can look down and see how they are doing.

The cutting involves considerable care and judgment, and must not be neglected, for money is often lost by not attending to the cutting at the right time. There are two methods in common use; one is to cut, trim and pack in boxes or baskets in the field as you go along. The other is to cut below the bottom leaf and cart to the barn to trim and pack. By cutting below the bottom leaf it stops the growth of the stalk, while if you leave any leaves on that stalk it lives and draws nourishment from the soil. I use the latter.

I take six rows and do the third and fourth rows first; that is, cut and tie up as I go along. Then I come back on the first and second, and any heads that I cut I drop in the row I did first. The fifth and sixth rows are treated in the same way. I leave the twine on till I trim them in the barn.

In packing cauliflower for market I use barrels and those large American berry crates that hold sixty boxes of berries. Use plenty of paper so that the heads do not rub. You can buy waste paper very cheaply from the newsdealer or newspaper offices. The large size crates cost me fifteen cents each, the small size ten cents each, second hand empty salt barrels fifteen cents and empty sugar barrels twenty cents. The cost of the packing I add to the invoice. Don't be afraid to pack them too tight. If you pack too loosely you will find that owing to the jar of transportation they will rub worse than if they are packed tight. Sometimes I have to sit on the lids of the crates to get them fastened. The large crates hold on an average about two dozen heads.

Cut closely and try and have some local place to sell them. If you cannot do that, then sell them to the pickle manufacturers. Remember that one poor head in a dozen spoils the appearance of the whole lot.

Excessive humidity in the atmosphere frequently develops a disease of the stalk known as stem rot, for which we have no known remedy; but if the weather is cold during August, with occasionally a cool rain to keep them coming along, we may expect to see the care and labor that we have

expended on these plants well rewarded. In the open field cauliflower will stand a temperature of 24° or 20° Fahrenheit, providing it is not long continued. Full-grown heads are much more liable to be damaged by frost than the small ones.

It often happens that some plants will be left in the field when winter begins to set in. In order to save them and to get the most out of them, cut them off at the top of the ground and stick the stump into moist, not wet, sand in a cool cellar, first removing all the leaves except the inner course. By doing this you will be surprised to find how many you can store away in a small space.

A MEMBER: Do you not think you would have had better cauliflower if you had left some of the outside leaves on?

MR. McMEANS: No, I do not think so. The more leaves you leave on the more you draw the strength from the stump. I remove every leaf except a few on the inner course, because a cauliflower without a leaf does not look nice on the market.

Q. With regard to transplanting, do you try plowing in the morning and setting out the plants in the afternoon?

MR. McMEANS: It is very seldom I do that. With my cabbage this year and last year I pulled the plants early in the morning, put them in the root-house, and then went to work and manured and plowed them, and I planted the cauliflower that night and I had a good crop.

MR. T. DELWORTH: Watering is quite a labor.

MR. McMEANS: Yes; and if you plow twice, and keep the land harrowed and cultivated, you will keep the moisture in the ground.

MR. DELWORTH: If you plow your ground and put in the plants at once I think it is a good plan. I have adopted that plan, and in the last ten years I have not used one can of water in setting out cabbages or cauliflowers.

MR. McMEANS: I have done the same thing. My father brought me up on the idea that the more work you do in doing anything the better the result.

Q. Do you ever pull your plants two or three days before planting them, and leave them in a damp place, and let the little rootlets break out before you plant them?

MR. McMEANS: I have done that with celery, but I could not see much came from it. You start the little fibres and then you break them off, and you have to start them again under harder circumstances.

MR. J. RUSH: I found wonderful results in the hot weather in July. We plant our cauliflower from the fifth to the fifteenth of July, when it is generally hot weather, and I have found that by pulling the plants from the seed-bed and tying them up in bundles and putting them in the cellar on the floor and keeping them there for two or three days, they usually put on a nice bunch of fibres all ready to take over to the soil.

MR. McMEANS: I have no trouble when I put out a patch of cauliflower. I do not think I miss one in a hundred. I am not troubled with the cut worm.

Q. What time do you generally plant?

A. About June 20. The early cauliflowers bring me more money than the later ones; they may require a little more attention, but I can see but very little difference and if you can get an extra cent on a cauliflower you are making that much more profit. My average net price for the last four years has been \$1 a dozen.

Q. Is your soil light or heavy?

A. Black loam with sandy bottom; it was originally a cedar swamp.

Q. You cannot grow early cauliflower there?

A. I have put out early cauliflower the same time I put out early cabbage, and they were not bothered with the worm any more than the cabbage were. But your cauliflower will not develop as nice a head as they will later on. If you have a place with a nice cool bottom and of a stiff nature you can produce just as good cauliflower two or three weeks earlier.

Mr. RUSH: What has been your experience in regard to seed?

A MEMBER: Sometimes we blame the seedsman for having sold us inferior seed untrue to name. I think it is the time of sowing that makes the difference. I have sown May 1, and May 15, and June 1, out of the same bag of seed and had different results.

Mr. McMEANS: That would be due more to the climatic conditions. We do not get the same weather the first of May as we do the first of June.

Mr. RUSH: They all germinate the same, but we do not produce the heads.

Mr. McMEANS: I get my best results from sowing May 1 or May 15. I like to sow the first week in May. Seed sown the first of June will not mature in time.

A MEMBER: Can you pick a Snow-ball from an Erfurt?

Mr. McMEANS: I think the Snow-ball is flatter. If you buy D. M. Ferry's Snowball you will get the flat top cauliflower. If you buy cauliflower seed this year, and you find it is good I would advise you to go back and buy some for next season.

EXPERIMENTERS IN VEGETABLE GROWING AT THE CENTRAL EXPERIMENTAL FARM.

BY W. T. MACOUN, DOMINION HORTICULTURIST, OTTAWA.

It is a great pleasure to me to have the opportunity of attending the meetings of this Association. It has always appeared to me that in the past the vegetable growers have been neglected. Fruit growers and fruit have been well looked after for the last few years. Vegetables have always been a regular article of diet and fruit is a luxury, and yet we find that the vegetable growers have been neglected all over the world. I was very glad to learn that a Vegetable Growers' Association had been formed, because I believe it will lead to very good results, and I think from the discussions we have had yesterday and to-day that very much good will follow.

We often think that the little tricks of the trade we know should be kept to ourselves, but I do not think that is a wise policy. We should impart all the information we can to others who are engaged in the same line of business, because the better the stuff is grown the better for all concerned.

We began experimenting in vegetables in Ottawa in 1887, and we have conducted experiments ever since. Our principal experiments have been with different varieties of vegetables, we have also tried different methods of culture and different spraying mixtures.

I intended to speak to-day on "Potato Culture," but finding Mr. Zavitz was going to speak on that I have decided to say a few words with regard to the varieties of vegetables we have found most satisfactory for a number of years, and I hope there will be a lively discussion, and that a list will be drawn up of the different varieties of vegetables recommended by this Vegetable Growers' Association, so that you can include it in your report

We recommend varieties that we have found to be best in quality, taking into consideration their earliness and productiveness. For the last few years I have published from time to time a list of what I have thought the best vegetables for farmers, and we revise this list from time to time as we find new and better kinds. You have in your hands a list published by Prof. H. L. Hutt, and it will be interesting to compare his list with our own.

Asparagus. We have found that Conover's Colossal is the best all-round variety. In some sections of country rust has appeared and caused great injury to the asparagus crop, but it is found two varieties are not so much affected with the rust: Palmetto or Argenteuil. I believe if you are growing Conover's Colossal, and if you have not the rust that you have the best all-round variety. You should plant the plants with the large buds in the crown instead of planting a lot of small buds; the large buds develop strong shoots.

Beans. We have found for early beans, Keeney's Rustless Golden Wax or Wardwell's Kidney Wax are best. The next is Early Refuge. For pole beans, Asparagus, Lazy Wife and Old Homestead are the three best varieties.

Beets. Egyptian Turnip, Meteor, and Eclipse are three of the best varieties.

Kale. Dwarf Green Curled Scotch is the best.

Broccoli. White Cape.

Brussel's Sprouts. Improved Dwarf is the most satisfactory.

Cabbage. Early Jersey Wakefield (early), Succession (medium), Late Flat Dutch and Drumhead Savoy (late).

A MEMBER: Where did you get the seed for your Medium Brussels Sprouts.

Mr. MACOUN: I believe we got them from Henderson's. We introduced a cabbage from France, the Paris Market. It is an exceedingly early cabbage, but has not a very solid head. It comes in very early, however, just a week earlier than Early Jersey Wakefield, and we think the Paris Market is better than Jersey Spring.

A MEMBER: We usually get the Express ahead of the Wakefield.

Mr. MACOUN: We get the seeds from Vilmorin and Andrews.

Cauliflower. Extra Early, Dwarf Erfurt and Early Snowball.

Carrots. Chantenay is one of the best, but if a good extra sort is required, the Early Scarlet Horn can be planted with advantage. It is a small variety.

Celery. Golden Self-Blanching (Paris Golden Yellow), Improved White Plums, White Walnut (early); Perfection Heartwell, White Triumph, London Red (late) are the best.

A MEMBER: Have you tried Livingston's Snow White for an early celery?

Mr. MACOUN: No.

A MEMBER: I have tried it a number of years and I have found it the best.

Mr. MACOUN: We grow White Walnut, we get the seed from Rennie.

Corn. Early Fordhook, Early Cory (early), Crosby's Early, Golden Bantam, Henderson's Metropolitan (second early); Percy's Hybrid, Stabler's Early, Early Evergreen and Black Mexican (medium); Stowell's Evergreen, Country Gentleman (late). In planting the Country Gentleman should not be omitted, as it lengthens the season very considerably, and is of fine quality. Personally, I like the Black Mexican; it is a delicious corn, but, of course, too dark for the market.

Cucumbers. Peerless White Spine or White Spine, Cool and Crisp and Giant Pets are three of the most satisfactory varieties for slicing. Boston Pickling is a good pickling sort.

Egg Plant. New York Improved, and Long Purple succeed best.

Lettuce. Black Seeded Simpson, the Morse and New York (curled), Improved Salamander, Unrivalled, Tennis Ball, Golden Queen (cabbage), Trianon and Paris Lettuce make a good list.

Melons, Musk. Long Island Beauty, Hackensack, and Montreal Market, of the Nutmeg type, and Surprise, Christiana and Emerald Gem of the yellow-fleshed types, are all good.

Melons, Water. Cole's Early, Imperial, Ice Cream, Phinny's Early are early water melons of excellent quality.

A MEMBER: Have you grown Paul Rose?

Mr. MACOUN: Yes. For a red-fleshed melon it is good, but we have found the Emerald Gem to be better.

Onions. Yellow Globe Danvers and Large Red Wethersfield are two of the best onions in cultivation.

Parsley. Double Curled is as good as any.

Parsnips. Hollow Crown and Dobbie's Selected are both good sorts.

Peppers. Cayenne, Cardinal, Chili and Golden Dawn are four of the best.

Peas. We have found the following varieties early and extra early: Gregory's Surprise, Gradus, American Wonder, Premium Gem (early), McLean's Advancer, Nott's New Perfection, Heroine (medium). None of these are tall growing varieties. Strategem, June (dwarf), Telephone (late). Excelsior is a promising second early sort.

Potatoes, Extra Early. Early Ohio, Early Andes (pink), Bovee, Burpee's Extra Early (pink and white). Early: Everett, Rochester Rose (pink), Early Puritan (white). *Main crop:* Carman No. 1 (white), late Puritan (white), American Wonder (white), Dreer's Standard (white).

Radishes. *Early:* Scarlet White-tipped Turnip, Rosy Gem, French Breakfast, Red Rocket (red), Icicle (white), (late), White Strasburg, Long White Vienna. *Winter:* Long Black Spanish, Chinese Rose-colore.

Rhubarb. Linnaeus, Victoria.

Salsify. Long White, Sandwich Island.

Spinach. Victoria, thickleaved.

Squash. Early: White Bush Scalloped, Summer Crook Neck. Late: Hubbard.

Tomatoes. Early: Spark's Earliana. *Main crop:* Brinton's Best, Trophy, Matchless (scarlet). Burpee's Climax, Autocrat (Purple pink). There are many varieties of tomatoes that are almost equal in excellence and productiveness.

Turnips. Early: Extra Early Milan, Red Top Strap Leaf.

Swedes. Champion Purple Top. Skirving's Improved.

Mr. HILBORN: A good deal depends on the seed that you get for your melons. If I can get the particular strain of seed I am using from the originator, I like it better because he will make a specialty of that particular seed. With regard to the Paul Rose melon, we used to get that from different seedmen and they were not up to the mark, but since we have been getting it from the originator it is the finest melon we have had.

Mr. McMEANS: We have had very satisfactory results from keeping our celery with the Bordeaux mixture from the time we planted till autumn. We have little trouble with the blight.

A MEMBER: What degree of frost will celery stand in the open?

Answer. I could not tell you that; I should think about eight degrees.

Prof. SHUTT: We have had ten degrees, but I do not think it will keep as well.

Q. How many times a year do you spray celery?

A. Just as often as necessary, once the Bordeaux mixture gets set on the plants, a light rain won't take it off.

Prof. SHUTT: We have found that the Bordeaux mixture should be sprayed on and not watered, if you wet the soil it will sour. For several years past we have been forcing rhubarb. We leave some plants in the summer that we do not crop very much, and in the fall we take them up with all the earth we can get and lay them out and let them freeze solid, so that they have a little winter of their own; and after they are frozen solid, we move them under cover, and put them in the cellar, and all we do is to keep them banked up with the earth; better have them in a shady place, and they will come on and you will have a fine crop of rhubarb throughout the winter.

A MEMBER: We generally force ours in the vegetable green-house.

Prof. SHUTT: If it is forced in the cellar you have a big blade and no leaf.

A MEMBER: Quite a few people in our neighborhood are building rhubarb houses and growing it exclusively in these rhubarb houses.

Prof. SHUTT: We like the Victoria Rhubarb best.

Moved by Mr. F. Reeves, seconded by Mr. Atkinson, that a very hearty vote of thanks be tendered the speakers who have taken part in this convention. Carried unanimously.

The CHAIRMAN: Our session has now drawn to a close. I suppose we are going to try and make this an annual affair. This organization is in its infancy; we have only started and we have had trouble in getting the members to come along. Gardeners always seem suspicious about joining anything of this kind. They do not like to part with the dollar; but we are going to canvass them from one end of the Province to the other, and I hope that next year a room like this will not be sufficient for our convention. I was delighted to see so many drop in this afternoon: it does the speakers good to have a full house. I hope every member of the Association will try to get in from one to five members before this time next year. We have a membership now of between two and three hundred, and we want two thousand by this time next year.

The convention then adjourned.
