

WISCONSIN BASKETBALL PROSPECTS CARRY REBUILDING TAG

WITH only one starter returning from last year, basketball prospects at the University of Wisconsin for the 1954-55 season primarily must be defined as a period of rebuilding.

Coach Harold E. "Bud" Foster enters his 21st season at Badger boss man of varsity cagers with just one member of last year's starting five and thereby faces a Herculean task in developing a quintet capable enough for the rigorous Western Conference campaigns.

For support of Dick Cable, senior forward from Stevens Point, who led the varsity in scoring with 301 points last year, Coach Foster can call upon five other major lettermen. However, none of them saw too much action last year as reserves and, among themselves, only tallied 168 points.

The lettermen, other than Cable, Include Centers Jack Parker, Madison, and Dan Folz, Milwaukee; Forwards Jim Clinton, Milwaukee, and Curt Mueller, Prairie du Sac; and Guard Dick Miller, Wheeling, W. Va. All are juniors except Clinton who is a senior. Clinton won a letter in 1951 but was out of school two years because of ineligibility and illness. He returned last year but played only briefly.

Two junior "W" winners also are on hand. They are Dick Jorgensen, Neenah, junior guard, and Bob Badura, Kohler, junior guard. Of this duo, Jorgensen saw the most action late in the season and rates the best chance of making the grade.

Of a group of seven sophomores still on the squad, Dick Zeiger, 6-foot, 5-inch forward from Milwaukee, seems the best. Others include Mike Belkin, Cleveland, Ohio; Dick Schneider, Sheldon, Iowa; and Gil Homstad, Black River Falls, forwards; Adrian Wrobleski, Rocky River, Ohio, guards. The seventh newcomer is Billy Lowe of Eau Claire, who is expected to report after completing his football season as a halfback.

The squad is completed with John Kardach, Stevens Point, junior, guard, and Tom Mack, Madison, junior, forward, who were squad members last year but did not win any awards.

Based on their experience, the lettermen probably will get the initial starting call. This would mean Cable (6-1½) teaming with Mueller (6-3) at forward posts while Folz (6-6½) and Parker (6-5) would alternate at center. Miller (6-1), a long distance sharpshooter, seems set at one of the guards with young Jorgensen (6-0) most likely to be his running mate at this stage of the season.

Zeiger (6-5) at one forward, Lowe (6-0) at a guard, are other outstanding candidates for a starting berth. However, big Jim Clinton (6-5) who was a leading scorer in this sophomore year, does not figure strongly in the Badger plans unless he can shake off the effects of his long illness. If he returned to his sophomore form, he'd be a starter and would give the club a tremendous rebounding and scoring asset.

Cable, who has played as a regular since he was a freshman, undoubtedly will be the scoring sparkplug. He has tallied 738 points in three seasons and needs 432 points in his windup year to become the school's best point-maker. The record is 1169 points scored by Don Rehfeldt by the time he finished his career in 1950.

Cable also holds the school record for best field goal percentages of .436 for a season and .432 for a Big Ten schedule.

Last year Wisconsin won 12 and lost 10 in the overall season but won only 6 of 14 Big Ten games to finish in a tie with Northwestern for fifth place.

Wisconsin shares with Purdue the distinction of having won or shared the most Western Conference championships in basketball. Each has won six outright titles and gained a share of seven other crowns. The Badgers tied with Purdue for the 1912 title, then won the 1913 and 1914 crowns outright. Other undisputed championships came in 1916, 1918, 1941, and 1947, while the title ties after 1912 included the years of 1907, 1921, 1923, 1924, 1929, 1935.

Wisconsin is one of five schools ever to win a championship on a perfect record, taking the 1914 title with 12 straight wins. The Badgers won all 12 of their games in 1912 as did Purdue but the two schools did not play each other that season.

WISCONSIN COACHING STAFF

HEAD BASKETBALL COACH—HAROLD E. "BUD" FOSTER

Birthdate—May 30, 1906

THREE Western Conference championships, one National Collegiate Athletic Association title, and three runners-up in Big Ten play during the past 20 years of varsity coaching are the highlights in the career of Harold E. "Bud" Foster, University of Wisconsin head basketball coach.

Born in Newton, Kansas, May 30, 1906, Bud had the distinction of being the heaviest baby ever born in that state; he tipped the scales at 13¾ pounds.

Because Newton did not offer any high school facilities, Bud prepped at Mason City, Iowa, high school, then went to Chicago. He entered Wisconsin in 1926, studying economics and playing basketball. He was all-conference center in the seasons of 1929 and 1930; also earned All-American honors in 1930.

Graduating in June, 1930, Foster played professional basketball with Chicago and Oshkosh (All-Stars) teams, selling seeds for an Oshkosh firm during the off-seasons. In 1933, he was named freshman coach at Wisconsin and stepped into the varsity coaching spot when Dr. Walter E. Meanwell resigned in 1934.

Foster's initial team tied for the conference crown in 1935, then spent the next five years in the conference second division. But, in 1941, he welded together a fine group of players which, after a poor start, won their last 15 games to snare both Big Ten and NCAA championships. His last championship team was in 1946-47 and these cagers also finished third in the Eastern NCAA regional meet in 1947.

ASSISTANT BASKETBALL COACH—FRED "FRITZ" WEGNER

Birthdate—November 24, 1912

LIKE FOSTER, Fred "Fritz" Wegner, assistant coach, is a graduate of Wisconsin and also played on the Oshkosh All-Star pro cage teams. Fred, who is regarded as one of the keenest scouts in collegiate basketball and an ideal assistant coach, played guard on the Wisconsin varsity teams of 1934-35-36; also was first baseman on the baseball teams of those same years. He starred in basketball, baseball and track at Oshkosh high school.

Fred came to Wisconsin as an assistant coach in basketball one year after his graduation, later on adding the baseball duties in 1938 as an assistant to Art Mansfield.

During the past eight summers, Fred has been in charge of the boys' baseball association in Madison, with approximately 1,000 youngsters competing in the various age groups.



Bob Cook, who led Wisconsin to its last Big Ten basketball championship in 1947 and who twice was named most valuable player by his Badger teammates, joined the coaching staff this season as a part-time assistant with the freshman squad. Cook, holder of some school scoring records, played pro ball for several seasons and now is a car salesman in Madison. He was All-Big Ten in 1947 and 1948.
