I'm sure that my cover this issue is familiar to anyone who has ever had an interest in the occult, or just weird literature in general. I've found that very few people have any knowledge of the meaning of the whole symbol known as:Baphomet, The Goat of Mendes, The God of the Witches etc., so what follows here is a little background material taken from some of my musty tomes...

This (cover illustration) is the God of the Witches, but it is not Satan. The true Witch does not believe in Satan. Satanism is a cult of its own and has no association with Witchcraft. It is true that there are so-called Black Witches but this title is given them because they practice Black Magic. Witches do not worship the image known as "God of the Witches". They worship that for which it stands or symbolizes. To the Witch, it is a most sacred symbol. It is also called the Goat of Mendes. His horns represent the waxing and waning moon. The center horn symbolizes the Magical Light of Universal Intelligence, the God-power always available to man when man learns how to use it. The head is that of a goat, symbolizing much the same thing as the sacrificial goat in the Bible. Here, however, it also acts as a reminder that man must make certain sacrifices before he can achieve complete Illumination or "At-Onement". The goat is bearded, symbolic of the "Grand-Old-Man" of the Qabalists. It also represents agelessness and timelessness.

The Pentagram on the forehead is a symbol of light and also represents the Qabalistic Tree of Life. It is a sacred symbol and a most talisman. When the Pentagram symbol is reversed so that the two points are up, it becomes a symbol of infernal evocations, it is evil incarnate, but the true Witch would turn away from a sacred Pentagram so profaned. The right hand of the goat points upward indicating the power being used for good, the left hand points down, denoting that man has a free will and the power can be misused. It also signifies the perfect balance between Mercy and Justice. One arm is feminine and one masculine, the body too, has a feminine and masculine aspect, symbolizing both attributes found in man, thus this androgynous figure represents humanity. The Caduceus represents eternal life, the scales on the body symbolize water, the circle surrounding the belly, half of which is visible, symbolizes the atmosphere, the wings represent air and man's strugge to rise above his environment. the feathers symbolize that which is volatile. The cloven hooves symbolize that man has not yet completely evolved out of the beast kingdom.
And last but not least, the goat sits on a half-sphere which represents his universe. Only half is shown because man has not yet learned how to rule his universe.

Hear ye, Hear ye. William E.Hart wishes to publicly thank Robert Weinberg, and all of you other past and present E*O*D members who helped me reach my goal of being able to gather up most of the material from the past few mailings. Thanks to everyone, not only did I reach my goal, but I far surpassed it. I would have considered my self lucky to have been able to scrape up material from the 11th and 12th mailings: Instead I ended up with almost complete 5th, 6th, 8th, 9th, 10th, 11th, 12th mailings, a major portion of mailings 1-4 and 7, and a complete 13th mailing. After being told by a number of people that my hunt for back issues was futile, I'm sure everyone can understand my gleefull surprise at what I did recieve!! Once again, I thank everyone, especially Bob Weinberg who donated most of the material that I never expected to see.

Since my first issue was sent out without including any mailing comments (and because the 13th mailing was 847clong), I've decided that other than a few pictures of some of us Californian Lovecraftians, I'm going to devote this whole issue to mailing comments. I may cheat and stick in a few minor thoughts at the end, but that will depend on how many pages this thing runs (and how much my wife will put up with cost wise on the printing). Like I said before, due to the size of the 13th, there's no telling how long this will take, so without further ado, here they are...

Mailing comments on the 13th.

THE MOSHASSUCK REVIEW - Kenneth Faig - In discussing unused "Mythos" locales, you say (p.5) that in a Lovecraft letter probably to Miss Toldridge, Lovecraft spoke of his plans to utilize the ancient Khmer ruins in Cambodia for the purposes of his fiction; I believe Llewellyn M.Cabos incorporated this into his story BENEATH THE SLEEPING CITY (anth. DARK MESSENGER READER NO. 1 Strange Co. 1975), I quote the opening here: "In the land of the Khmers lies the Sleeping City. Older than mankind, it was when the seas were filled with saurian things and the skies with winged monsters. Beware of the day when the sleepers wake.--The L'striga Knishka of Count Koblas"// Once again I was reminded by your essay just how badly I needed copies of THE SHUTTERED ROOM and DREAMS AND FANCIES, so I ran down to Reg Smith's, borrowed his copies, and xeroxed every single page.//It's material like yours that made me want to become a member of the E*O*D so keep it coming Ken. // The only complaint I can make about your zine is that sometimes because of reproduction problems it becomes very hard to read.

I'll be looking forward to your next installment of THE CONTEMPORARY ILLUSTRATORS OF H.P.L.! Does anyone know where I can get copies of the four H.P.L. covers that were made into posters by Ballantine?

NECRONOMICON - Robert C. Culp - I'll be making comments on Prof. St. Armand's essay H.P.LOVECRAFT: NEW ENGLAND DECADENT as soon as I get a xerox copy of it. // While cautiosly reading through the NECRONOM-ICON, I came across the rather puzzling sentence; "Would that the ditch who bore him had died birthing and he had been strangled in the afterbirth." The questions this brings to mind are: 1. Was this supposed to have been ditch, bitch, or witch? 2. If ditch, does this refer to mammoth proportions, or morality? 3. I see nothing wrong with varying opinions, but at least let's keep our facts straight.

ROGER'S REVENGE - Roger Bryant - I'm surprised you were able to last as long as you did in five apas! I (at the time of this typing) work building drivers license and I.D. cameras. By the end of the day, my eyes are shot from aligning lenses and assembling miniature parts. Once I read for a couple of hours after work, it feels like my eyes are on fire!! Add to this the facts that: I'm not exactly a a fast reader. Since I've had a problem trying to get copies of THE SHUTTERED ROOM, DREAMS AND FANCIES, and THE INHABITANT OF THE LAKE, I borrowed all three from Reg Smith and took them to a store called KINKO'S (near a local college) and I was able to use their IBM copier for $4\hat{c}$ a copy. Considering I can get two pages on each copy, a book like THE SHUT-TERED ROOM only costs me about \$6.30, and then to make the books complete, I went to a print shop and used their color Xerox 6500 and made perfect color copies of the dust jackets at 75¢ each. By the time you read this I'll probably have an IBM copy of MARGI-NALIA also (anythings better than the \$100.00 a local store is asking for it!).





Vernon Shea is completely off base calling Conover's gift of a skull to Lovecraft "simple bad taste". I don't think Lovecraft in calling it a "fitting gift", was refering to the morbid irony of this, because H.P.L. had no idea he would die so soon! True, he knew he was ill, but how many of us know for sure when our time has come? I have a feeling that with Grandpa's pleasure in the darker treasures of the earth, he was probably delighted with this graveyard relic! Other than this difference of opinion, I felt this was a very fine biography of " Khono-Vhah ". // Would somebody please fill me in on the story behind the KADATH controversy? Every time someone mentions Carter, they also talk about the rip-off with KADATH. THE ARKHAM ANCHORITE 8 - jOE Moudry - It seems that you and I have the same feelings about DREAMER ON THE NIGHTSIDE. My only complaints about the book were the size (small for someone who met with H.P.L. over 500 times and must have known him better than anyone else), and also the spacing of the type (If the type wasn't so widely spaced, it would have really been a small book). // After reading THE WINDS OF ZARR I'm going to be looking forward to any other Tierney material that I can find! // I hope that there are still a few copies of THE HISTORY OF AMATEUR JOURNALISM left when I send my money, thanks for the note on this! // Enjoyed your essay on VICTORIANISM VS PURITANISM. // Thanks for the index-- Now all I have to do is become wealthy enough to buy my first issue! // As much as I agree that a title like THE AYLESBURY TRANSCRIPT has more of a Lovecraftian ring to it than THE CRY OF THE CRICKET, I'd still feel better keeping the original. By the way, I believe that there are probably a few of the Acolytes in the order that don't know why Roger chose that title. Personally, I like the humor in it!// While on the subject of changes... It's been suggested that the membership and publication requirements be raised; Even though I'm just a lowly waiting-lister, I'd like to express my thoughts on this... I'm not against raising the publication requirement, but I am against raising the (cont..)

THE ARKHAM ANCHORITE 8 (cont..) - membership count. Let's see if I can make sense out of that statement ... I feel that it would be a mistake to raise the membership just because of the length of the waiting-list. There's nothing to keep an interested waiting-lister from contributing each mailing, unless he's just on the waiting-list to pick up mailings without having to contribute anything but \$1.00! If and when it gets to the point that a large number of waiting-listers are contributing each mailing, then, and only then, would I suggest raising the count. Now, if we raise the number of required publications to 60 or 65, then we can be assured that all members, waitinglisters and other interested parties can recieve a copy! there will usually be a couple of unsold sets each mailing just in case the Post Awful (see below) eats a set, and no one will ever again have to go through what Stu did! Also having the extra back-up sets there would help people like myself ... For right now, to avoid members missing copies of the mailings, Joe is going to delay sending waiting-lister's copies of the mailings out, until he's sure that no member hasn't recieved theirs. For someone like myself who needs his copy of the mailing to be making comments on, this will mean not recieveing the mailing until about two to three weeks after everyone else. The only way that this can be avoided is if jOE will change the rules so the contributing waiting-listers will have their mailings sent out at the same time as members, and also if the rules are changed so that contributers have priority over non-contributers, no matter what their seniority on the list. This change should stir a few people into contributing just so they can make sure they get a copy of the mailing! Two last thoughts as far as changes... I think people who contribute should get their copy of the mailing for \$1.00, and those who don't should have to pay \$3.00 to \$5.00. 




