The civilized nations of Europe cannot furnish in peace above 10,000 soldiers for every million of inhabitants: in war, when they double this proportion, they make great efforts, which cannot last. France, with 32,000,000 of inhabitants could not support an army of 600,000 for three years, and provide for the wants of agriculture and commerce. Turkey, on the contrary, with 15,000,000 of people, could support such an army without suffering. She is calculated for war. To try a winter campaign is to expose the Russians to multiplied disasters. The extraordinary levies in Russia cannot complete till spring, with experienced soldiers the skeletons of their regiments. A campaign in winter is above all murderous for an invading army. An enemy who acts on the defensive, and fights for his home, will obtain resources that the invaders cannot find.

Counting the votes given at the recent election for a Member of the Legislature, it appeared that H. Lavergne, Esq. had obtained a majority of 65 votes over his competitor.

The capture of Varna will hardly change the nature of the Black Sea, which is scarcely navigable even in winter. To pretend, therefore, that the fleet cannot only supply the army with provisions, but can follow and support its movements along the coast, is to be ignorant of the climate and the seasons, and is to fall into absurdity. The capture of Varna, if followed by that of Sistria, would at most only insure winter quarters.

VIENNA, Oct. 15.—The President of Greece has addressed a circular to the Panhellenion, and to the extraordinary Commissioners in the department, stating that the Ambassadors of the three Allied Powers had signified to him that they were authorized by their Courts to open communication with the Government of Greece, and in concert with the President, to prepare the means of regularizing the affairs of Greece on the principles of the treaty of London.—He therefore invites the President to collect statistical information, and lay before them all the remarks which may be calculated to decide the several cases which, according to the treaty, will have to be determined under the mediation of the Allied Powers by the negotiations between the Greek and Turkish Agents. The President therefore calls on those to whom his circular is addressed, to send all the information in their power respecting the following points:—

The President requires that the answer shall be as near the truth as possible, that they may bear the strictest investigation.
