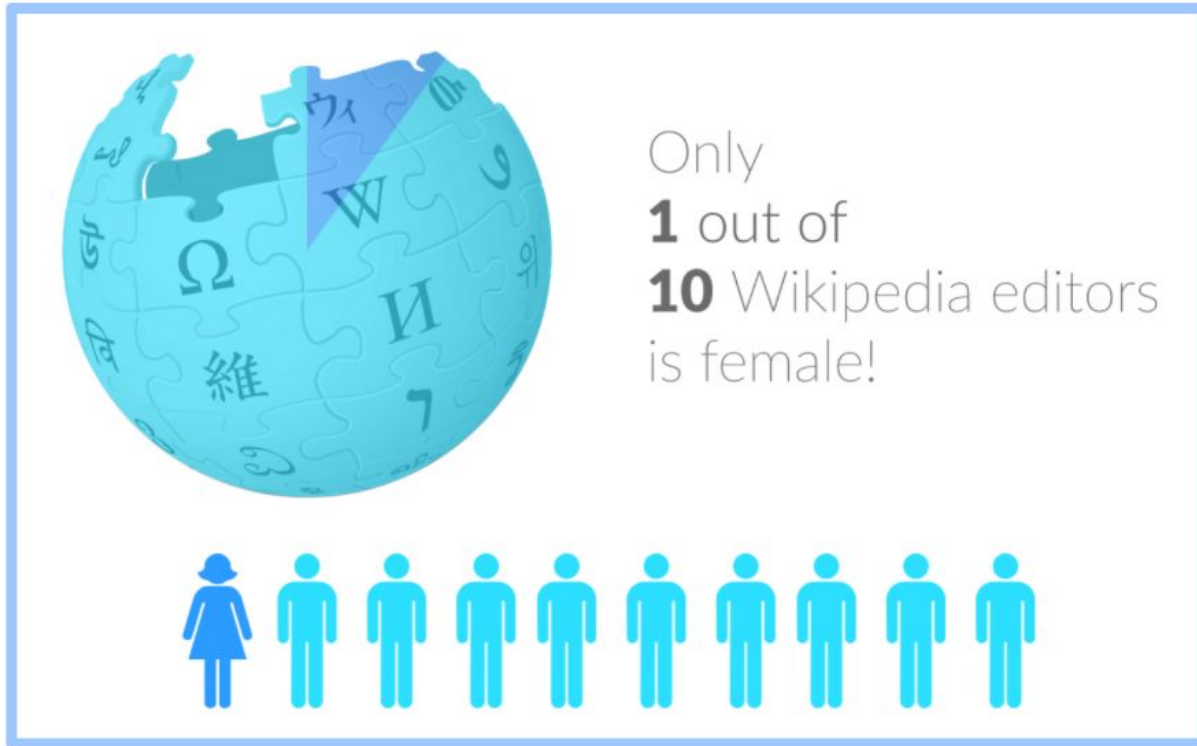

# Wikis

- A website where anyone can edit any page at any time
- Meant to be "quick"
- Remembers all versions (nothing ever destroyed)
- Hyperlinks between pages

# Wikipedia policies

- **Neutral Point of View** - written so all sides can agree
- **Notability** - significant independent sources -> importance
- **Verifiability** - Using reliable sources to reference information
- **No original research** - point to existing scholarship
- **Assume good faith** - start with congenial spirit
- **Conflicts of interest** - disclose and abide by terms of service

## Early life and education

Elizabeth Helen Blackburn was born in [Hobart, Tasmania](#) on 26 November 1948. Her family moved to the city of [Launceston](#) when she was four, where she attended the Broadland House Church of England Girls' Grammar School (later amalgamated with [Launceston Church Grammar School](#)) until the age of sixteen. Upon her family's relocation to [Melbourne](#), she attended [University High School](#), and ultimately gained very high marks in the end-of-year final statewide matriculation exams.<sup>[4]</sup> She went on to earn a [Bachelor of Science](#) in 1970 and [Master of Science](#) in 1972, both from the [University of Melbourne](#) in the field of biochemistry, and her [PhD](#) in 1975 from the [University of Cambridge](#) in molecular biology<sup>[5]</sup> on the bacteriophage [Phi X 174](#) while a student of [Darwin College, Cambridge](#). She undertook postdoctoral work in molecular and cellular biology between 1975 and 1977 at [Yale University](#).<sup>[6]</sup>

Studies suggest that chronic psychological stress may accelerate aging. Researcher violence was found to shorten telomere length in formerly abused women versus non-abused women, indicating poorer overall health and greater morbidity in abused women.<sup>[16]</sup>

## Bioethics

Blackburn was appointed a member of the [President's Council on Bioethics](#), an embryonic cell research, in opposition to the Bush Administration. Her Council terms were terminated by [White House](#) directive on 27 February 2004.<sup>[17]</sup> This was followed by an outbreak of outrage over her removal by many scientists, who maintained that she was removed due to political opposition to her advice.<sup>[18]</sup>

"There is a growing sense that scientific research—which, after all, is defined by the quest for truth—is being manipulated for political ends," wrote Blackburn. "Evidence that such manipulation is being achieved through the stacking of the membership of advisory bodies and through the delay and misrepresentation of [19][20]

Blackburn serves on the Science Advisory Board of the [Regenerative Medicine Foundation](#) formerly known as the [Genetics Policy Institute](#).<sup>[21]</sup>
