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
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

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## PREFACE.

The designation "State Papers," by which the documents preserved in the State Paper Office are ordinarily known, and by which they are described on the title pages of the present series of Calendars, must be understood with some qualification. It is a convenient general title, under which the Calendars published, and the papers they represent, may be easily and properly recognized,—a title clearly applicable to them with reference to the place of their deposit, and generally so with reference to their actual character; but it is by no means put forth as a precise diplomatic description of every single document.

The Papers which form the Domestic Series of State Papers during the reign of Charles I. are of a miscellaneous character. Intermingled with sign manuals, proclamations, orders and correspondence of the Council, letters of the Secretaries of State, of the Lord High Admiral, and of other important public functionaries—great and primary evidences of the acts of the King's Government—there occur papers, some entirely private, of Secretary Nicholas, of Archbishop Laud, of Attorney-General Heath, and of other eminent By what means many of these papers were originally brought into the State Paper Office it is not easy to Some of them evidently found their way thither by the accidents to which in disturbed periods the papers of public men are subject. With some slight exceptions, they are now all intermingled, and arranged chronologically in one great series. Together they form a collection of papers, public and private, general and individual, local and personal,

which has not, indeed, the definiteness, or what may even be termed the grandeur, of some of our great series of public Records, but they constitute a collection which cannot be surpassed for facility of consultation, and one which, when taken in connexion with the present Calendars, will be found to develope the facts of our national history in a way and to a degree altogether unexampled.

The portion of this collection which relates to the period of Charles I. is very unequally divided between the several parts of that King's reign. During the early years, as the present volume makes evident, the number of papers is very great. It continues to be so during the administration of the Duke of Buckingham, and until after the peace with Spain. For a few years after 1630 the papers are much less numerous. From 1634 there is again an increase, and as the time of the final public troubles approaches they are greatly augmented. For 1639 and 1640, they are as numerous as in 1625 and 1626. early period in the succeeding year there is a great falling off, and the papers of the last eight years of the reign will not occupy more space than those of the two bustling years which are included in the present volume. The cause of this inequality is obvious. The greater the variety and importance of public business, the larger the number of The early years of the reign, which were years of war and foreign maritime expeditions, produced most extensive collections; the endeavour to defray the expenses of Government by the levy of ship money gave rise to much new business and to many papers. But the State Paper Office, it will be remembered, was the King's repository, and the officers who transmitted papers thither were his servants. When the fatal quarrel arose between the King and the Parliament, and the King retired from London, these officers followed his person to York, to Oxford, and elsewhere. They carried their papers about

with them, or deposited them in places not within the enemy's quarters. Few found their way into the State Paper Office, except those which were captured on the field of battle, or came into possession of the Parliament by some of the other chances of a state of warfare.

The present volume opens with the State ceremonies consequent upon the recognition of the new Sovereign. From that time it takes its course through the events of the two succeeding years, illustrating, day by day, every incident as it occurred. In the case of many of the more important acts of public policy within this period, the State Papers give us their entire history. They show in whose advice such acts originated; they develope their progress and exhibit their results.

The funeral of King James I., the reception of Queen Henrietta Maria, the plague which desolated the metropolis, the coronation, the loan of the Vanguard and other English ships to the French, the Parliaments of 1625 and 1626, the naval expeditions of those years, the loans which supplied the place of subsidies, the impeachment of Buckingham, the dismissal of the Queen's French attendants, the quarrel between England and France, following hard upon that with Spain, the general disarming of the Roman Catholics, the ravages of the Dunkirkers on our eastern and those of the Sallee-men on our western coasts:—these are examples of the kind of subjects which will be found copiously illustrated in the State Papers. The force and vividness with which these papers bring the England of that day before us, is indeed marvellous. The condition of every department of the State, of the households of the King and Queen, of the people, with many of their trades and occupations, and the feeling with which they regarded every incident which affected the honour or prosperity of the country, may be read with a distinctness which it is scarcely possible to transfuse into treatise or history. Nor is it only the general condition of the people, or of the country, which here receives illustration; students of biography, and of those valuable branches of historical inquiry, topography and genealogy, will all find that they have an interest in these State Papers. The Index at the end of the volume lays open information on all these subjects. The multitude of names of places, and of letters of distinguished persons, many of them in a high degree characteristic, will prove to all historical inquirers that there is matter here to which it behoves them to pay attention.

It is impossible to enumerate all the important letters here calendared, but it may stimulate inquiry to mention a few. There is a letter, unfortunately only one, but one of characteristic kindness, and among the latest he ever wrote, of Lord Bacon.\* Papers of Archbishop, then Bishop Laud, occur not unfrequently. Among them is the original, in his own hand, of his "Memorables of our late " dear and dread Sovereign Lord King James, of famous " memory." † The letters of Sir John Eliot and papers relating to him, scattered throughout the volume, are in the highest degree important. They contain much new and valuable matter. One letter of Sir Thomas Wentworth, afterwards Earl of Strafford, need scarcely be pointed out. I Fulke, Lord Brooke, the servant of Queen Elizabeth and friend of Sir Philip Sydney, then tottering towards the grave into which he was shortly afterwards hurried by the knife of an assassin, the Earls of Essex, Totness, Bristol, Warwick, Denbigh, Holland, and Carlisle, Viscounts Grandison and Wimbledon, Lord Willoughby, Bishops Andrewes, Morton, Neile, Bayly, and Williams, are correspondents whose letters will be sure to attract attention. Some of

those of the last-mentioned prelate are almost incredible examples of flattery. One interesting letter occurs from Speed, the chronicler,\* and one from Alexander Gil, the master of St. Paul's school.† There are single letters, also, of Donne the poet; and of Sir Tobie Matthew.§ Sir Francis Nethersole and Sir Benjamin Rudyerd are writers of valuable news-letters included in this collection, the well-known Chamberlain is a similar writer, and so is Thomas Locke. There are several papers relating to Sir Robert Sherley and the English intercourse with Persia; a few papers relating to artists will be found referred to in the Index under Vanderdort, Briot, and Mittens; some to musicians, under Orlando Gibbons, the several Lanieres, and Ferrabosco; there is one letter of Sir Richard Beaumont, || and several papers of Edmund Bolton, and of others of the minor celebrities of the literature of the time. Sir Henry Goodyere appears as a humble petitioner for pecuniary relief, and there is a similar application of an interesting kind from the degraded Sir Francis Mitchell. Sir Allen Apsley, Sir Henry Vane, Sir William St. Leger, Sir Thomas Love, Sir John Suckling, Sir Ferdinando Gorges, Sir Robert Heath, and Sir Lewes Lewkenor, are all contributors, more or less frequently, to the collection, taking their turns, in that respect, with the Duke of Buckingham, Secretaries Conway and Coke, Captain Pennington, Sir John Hippisley, Sir Henry Palmer, Sir James Bagg, Captain Richard Gyffard, Sackville Crow, and a multitude of others.

Among the papers are many which relate to subjects of interest to the investigators of national progress;—the state of the Mint and the Post Office, the course of improvement

in ordnance and hand-arms, the pay, training, and muster of soldiers and sailors, the state of the art of shipbuilding, the places where the greater number of ships were built, the condition of fisheries, of the coal trade, the introduction of the "new draperies," the state of the cloth trade, and many other branches of manufacture, with a great variety of cognate subjects.

One point is necessary to be mentioned with reference to the arrangement of some of the papers which are here calendared. A considerable number of them, it will be perceived, are undated. In many instances these stand in the State Paper Office in places which are, in a certain sense, traditionary. They have come down to the present time in connexion with certain bundles or collections of papers relating to kindred subjects. It would, perhaps, be possible to fix the date of almost every one of these undated papers, but to do so would involve an amount of tedious and difficult inquiry which would exhaust a hundred lives, and when accomplished would, in the great majority of cases, advance no purpose of material moment. Such prolonged inquiry with reference to papers of slight importance would also militate against what may be termed one of the very principles of the publication of the series of Calendars in which the present volume occupies its niche; that principle is expedition. The wish is, to give to the present generation information which is valuable, but has not hitherto been made accessible. In accordance with this object, I have thought it right, in the cases to which I have alluded, to leave these papers in their traditionary places, satisfied that any inquirer to whom they may be of interest will be directed to them by the Index, and that, if at all, they are not very far out of place. The question in these cases always is, whether the apparent importance of such papers justifies the loss of time occupied in the pursuit of their actual date. When I have been able to answer that question in the negative, and have exhausted all ordinary sources of inquiry, I have deemed myself justified in leaving such papers where I found them.

In all these investigations, and indeed generally in connexion with the preparation of this volume, and its passage through the press, I have derived assistance, for which I am deeply grateful, from William Impey, Esq., and William Douglas Hamilton, Esq., two gentlemen upon the staff of the State Paper Office, who have been associated with me in this work. Without their able and zealous co-operation this volume could not have been produced at the present time, nor could I alone have got through the great amount of preliminary arrangement which has been necessary.

At the last moment, when the concluding portion of the Calendar contained in the present volume was in the hands of the printer, the donation of The Conway Papers to the State Paper Office by the Right Honourable John Wilson Croker made a considerable addition to the papers relating to the period which is here dealt with. One portion of this donation is of a peculiar character. It consists of docquets of papers presented to King Charles I. for his signature, from his accession to the end of 1628, the period during which the first Lord Conway was a Secretary of In the previously published volumes of this series of Calendars, under the editorship of Robert Lemon, Esq., and Mrs. Green, it will have been noticed that the docquets of that class run to a considerable number; in the present Calendar as it stood completed at the time of Mr. Croker's donation, there occurred only one docquet for the year 1625, and four for 1626. This obvious hiatus is now filled up by the occurrence of these docquets in the Conway papers. The omission in the present volume of the Calendar has been supplied, as nearly as possible, by printing a calendar of these Conway docquets as an Appendix, and inserting the names which occur in them in their proper places in

the General Index to the volume. The other documents amongst the Conway papers, which relate to the years 1625 and 1626, stand over until the publication of a General Appendix, at the end of the work.

The next volume will comprise, at the least, the years 1627 and 1628, and the whole series of the Calendar of the papers of Charles I. will probably extend to six or seven volumes.

- [March 27.] Proclamation of the Privy Council, the Lord Mayor and others, that Prince Charles, by the death of King James, had become King of Great Britain, France, and Ireland, Defender of the Faith, &c. [Coll. Procs., Car. I., No. 1.]

  2. J. Chambermayd to Elizabeth Queen of Bohemia. Gives particular account of the last illness and death of her Majesty's father, King James. He died at 12 at noon, and before 6 at night his successor was proclaimed.

  3. Wm. Burrell, a Commissioner of the Navy, to Edward Nicholas, Secretary to George Duke of Buckingham, Lord High Admiral. Recommends Robt. Morecock, for Master Carpenter of the Dreadnought, in place of Thos. Baker, deceased.

  4. Nicholas Roberts to Sir Cornelius Huyghenson. Being at sea his ship and two others were taken by five sail of Dunkirk men-of-war. He remains a prisoner at that place. Cruel treatment of himself and his men.
- March 28. Proclamation declaring the accession of King Charles; and commanding all persons to see the King's peace duly kept, and to be obedient to his laws. [Coll. Procs., Car. I., No. 2.]
- March 28. Proclamation that all men being in office at the decease of King St. James's. James shall so continue till his Majesty's further direction. [Ibid., No. 3.]
- [March 28.] 5. Minute of proceedings of the Privy Council on the decease of King James and accession of King Charles. Account of the proclamation of the new Sovereign; swearing in of the Privy Council; and advice tendered by them to his Majesty on points deemed most material and pressing.
- March 28. Westminster. The King to the Lord Privy Seal, the Master of the Court of Wards and Liveries, the Chancellor of the Exchequer, the Chief Justices of the King's Bench and Common Pleas, the Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster, and the Secretaries of the Councils in Wales and the North parts. Letters patent authorising the use of the existing official Seals until further order. [Case A., Charles I., No. 1.]

- [March 29.] Grant to Sir Albertus Morton of the office of one of the King's principal Secretaries, during pleasure, with the fee of 100l. yearly, during life. [Coll. Sign. Man., Car. I., Vol. I., No. 2.]
- March 29. 6. Sir Thomas Coventry, Attorney General, to Edward Lord Inner Temple. Conway, Secretary of State. Has drawn up a commission for the Mint; desires that, with the commission, the inclosed warrant for his "doing thereof" may be presented for the King's signature.
- March 29. Sec. Conway to the Clerk of the Signet. To prepare a Privy Seal to pay pensions due to servants of His Majesty as Prince of Wales, at Lady Day last; and another for issuing monthly, for the expenses of the King's Household as Prince of Wales, 1,738l. 18s. 4d., and 844l. 6s. 8d. - March 29. 7. Thos. Earl of Suffolk to Sec. Conway. His late Majesty signed Salisbury House. a warrant for John Carlton to be Dep. Lieut. of co. Cambridge in place of Sir John Cotton, but the appointment was not completed, owing to a mistake. The Sec. is requested to procure another warrant from the present King.
- [March 30.] Warrant to pay to Sir Albertus Morton, as one of the Secretaries of State, 175l. per quarter, or 700l. per annum, for secret services [Coll. Sign. Man., Car. I., Vol. I., No. 3.]
- [March 30.] Warrant to Sir Adam Newton, Receiver of the King's revenues st. James's. as Prince of Wales, to pay pensions to servants in conformity with the above letter of Sec. Conway. [Ibid., No. 5.]
- [March 30.] Warrant to pay to Sir Henry Vane, Cofferer of the King's House-St. James's. hold as Prince of Wales, 1,738l. 16s. 4d., and 844l. 6s. 8d.; in conformity with the same letter of Sec. Conway. [Ibid., No. 6.]

    8. Sir Francis Cottington to Elizabeth Queen of Bohemia. The King, her brother, will no doubt have more than a fatherly care of her. Cottington is not Secretary to his master being King, as he was to him being Prince.

    9. Richd. Wyan to Edward Nicholas, Sec. to the Duke of Buckingham as Lord High Admiral. Sends depositions taken in the Court of Admiralty about the business of Burley. The ship in question is the same that is mentioned in Johnson's examination as the Dolphin. Sir Henry Marten has some information against Ascough and Daniel, the questioning of whom would turn to my Lord's profit.
- March 31. 10. Attorney General Coventry to Sec. Conway. Sends a Privy Inner Temple. Seal to be signed for collecting the customs and other duties of that kind until his Majesty give further order, as the Lords agreed this afternoon.
- March 31. 11. Sir John Coke, Master of Requests, to the same. Sends grants of Rarlickhithe. Richaut's forfeiture made ready for the late King; and requests that he may be directed to renew the same in the name of King Charles, in which case he will pursue that service to the King's profit in the Star Chamber.

- March 31. Proclamation for better furnishing the Navy with skilful mariners. St. James's. [Coll. Procs., Car. I., No. 4.]
- March 31. 12. Petition of Michael Martenson, of Copenhagen, to George Duke of Buckingham; prays for release of the Flying Hart, detained in Bristol on suspicion of piracy.
- [March 31.] 13. Minute of petition of Katherine Duchess Dowager of Lennox to the King, for confirmation of two grants, the one of 2,100*l*. per ann., to her and her two eldest sons for their lives, the other of 1,400*l*. to her eldest son for 21 years; which grants passed under the late King's hand, but were stopped at the Great Seal by his death.

Warrant to the Council of War appointed by Parliament, authorising them to direct the repayment of such moneys as had been lent by the Duke of Buckingham, towards setting forth twelve of the King's ships to sea, the present warrant being in confirmation of a similar warrant of the late King. - March 31. Renewed warrant to pay to Sir Thomas Button 3,615l. 13s. 4d., Westminster. for service at sea during thirty-three years. [Ibid., No. 9.]
- March 31. Renewed warrant to pay 62l. 10s., and deliver timber, for repairs of Shelbrook Lodge, in the forest of Whittlewood, co. - [March?] 17. Petition of William Tomson to the Commissioners for the late King's funeral; prays to be admitted one of the poor mourners.
- [March?] 18. Petition of the four Ordinary Pages of the Chamber to the late Queen Anne, to the same; pray that they may be set down amongst the King's servants, and have each of them a mourning cloak.

99. Capt. John Pennington to Wm. Earl of Pembroke. Gives a particular account of a visit paid to the English fleet off Dieppe by the Admiral of France (the Duke de Montmorency.) The Duke appointed Commissioners to arrange with Pennington about the delivery of his ship. On entering into conference the Commissioners wished him to take on board 300 men; he declined to receive more than 60. They claimed that the Admiral should have the command of the ship and crew; he insisted on commanding his own people. They told him their design was against Mons. de Soubise; he answered that he would perform the contract. left, saying that the King of France would write to the King of England to cause Pennington to fulfil their desire. On the following day, Pennington sent a messenger to the Admiral to let him know that they could not ride any longer where they were, and requested further orders; none arriving, Pennington brought his ship back to the English coast. His people swear that they will be hanged or thrown overboard before they will fight against Soubise. "A kennel of rank pirately rogues" at Dieppe abuse the good nature of the Admiral of France, who knows nothing of the sea, nor ever saw a piece of ordnance shot at sea before in his life.

- 17. Petition of Sir John Gage to the King. Prays for a renewal of a protection against the penalties of recusancy, granted him by King James.
- 18. Certificate by John Eldred, Clerk of Assize for co. Kent, that Sir Wm. Roper of Eltham, co. Kent, and Alice his wife, were convicted of recusancy at the Assizes, 1 Charles. Martin James had been indicted at the last Assizes.
- 19. Petition of Dame Elizabeth Morley, late wife of Wm. Lord Morley, deceased, to the King. Prays that on account of the many crosses lately befallen herself and family, her composition as a recusant convict may not be insisted upon.

- 24. Answer to the question, "Whether the Pope [Urban VIII.] loved the King?" submitted to some person who is spoken of as "your Lordship." The answer refers to verses made by the Pope on the death of the King's grandmother, Queen Mary.

The loss on the farm of the general customs during the year 1625, by reason of the plague and troubles with Spain, had been 5,041*l*., of which his share was 1,023*l*. 19s.; prays the King, in consideration of Sir John's nine years' service as a Commissioner of the Navy, not to suffer him to be so great a loser, especially as to do his Majesty service he exposed himself to infection by remaining in London during the plague.
- 4. Paper entitled "Brief memorials touching the promiscuous conveying of the revenues of the Crown, with an humble proposition of a remedy for the ordering and establishment of his Majesty's present revenues." [Said in the endorsement to be written by Henry Stanley.]
- 5. Note of various articles arranged in two parallel columns, the one headed "prohibited," the other "not prohibited." [Endorsed "proclamation or instructions about prohibited goods," in the handwriting of Sir John Coke.]
- 6. Account of the amount paid for principal and interest on a loan of 100,000*l*. by the citizens of London to his late Majesty. The money was lent in Easter Term, 1611, and was repaid in April 1613, 22,500*l*. being paid for interest.
- 7. Suggestions for increasing the amount received from the impost on tin exported, being then 20s. per ton.

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- 8. Brief notes out of the chroniclers Hall and Holinshed, as to the various ways in which Kings of England have raised money.

They will give security and sufficient proof that it shall be no prejudice to the Duchess of Richmond or her assigns. They desire no more than they had in Queen Elizabeth's time.
- 15. Statement of abuses yet remaining in the dyeing and dressing of cloth, with a suggestion of remedies.
- 16. A Merchant Adventurer to [———]. On the late hearing of the cause concerning the dyeing and dressing of cloth, the person addressed expressed his wish to be satisfied on certain points, the writer therefore communicates his opinion on the question of exporting undressed cloth.

- 46. Paper entitled "Lands wherein others are stated with me upon trust." [It is endorsed "Mr Pepe's note." The lands include "Portbury and the hundred of Portbury," "Castleacre," "Norwich House," "Holkham," and other places in Norfolk. The persons named are "Pepys," "Bullen," "Mr. Attorney Coventry," "Beck," and "Sir Jo. Walter."]
- 47. Names of residents in the town of Rye, arranged according to wards, with note of the armour which several of them were bound to provide.
- 48. Petition of Sir Francis Wortley to the King. King James granted the castle of Scarborough to John Earl of Holderness, who conveyed the same to one Tompson. He is willing to part with it, but upon unreasonable terms. Sir Francis prays that the King would take the castle into his own hands; that the Council would set down what consideration should be given to Tompson, which Sir Francis would pay; and that thereupon the castle with the office of Constable should be granted to him. [Minute.]
- 49. Certificate addressed to Lord Chief Baron Walter in favour of the right of the parson of Staine, co. Lincoln, to take tithes in kind, which right was disputed by Thomas Ayscough.
- 50. Names of Lieutenants of the Tower of London from the reign of Henry VIII. to that of Charles I.
- 51. Names of officers in the City and Liberty of Westminster under the Duke of Buckingham, High Steward, and the Dean.
- 52. Dep. Lieuts and Justices of Cornwall to the Council of War. Testify that the reasons for the fortification of Penzance set forth in the petition of the inhabitants are true, and that the cause deserves commiseration.
- 53. Petition of Roger Polkinghorne, one of the Aldermen of Penzance, in behalf of the inhabitants, to the Council of War. The town lies open and unfortified; it was burnt by the enemy in the time of Elizabeth and has of late been fearfully terrified by the Turks; it is therefore prayed that some competent means may be taken by fortification or otherwise for its defence.
- 54. Statement addressed to the Council of the grounds and reasons of the petition presented to the late Council of War for the fortification of Penzance. They request 8 pieces of ordnance and a grant of 600*l*.
- 55. Appointment by the Duke of Buckingham of Anthony Arundell and Richard Brian, and the survivor, to the office of sealing and measuring coals, culm, corn, and salt, within the Admiralty jurisdiction in the Counties of Glamorgan, Caermarthen, and Pembroke.

The late King granted him a pension of 150*l*. per annum as a testimony of his good behaviour in the late Queen's service. Kis pension is 475*l*. in arrear. Being in debt 1,000*l*., he offers to resign his pension for that sum, to be paid to Charles de Bowsie and Abraham Decks.
- 57. Joseph Bainbridge to Robt. Read. Requests him to entreat Mr. Webb to keep possession of a letter in which it is alleged that Bainbridge had spoken irreverently of the late Lord Warden, deceased. By this scandal persons described as "Norton and our Town Clerk" [of Dover?] had procured the writer to be dismissed from an office held by him in connection with the Cinque Ports. He also solicits favour for his brother-in-law John Thomas.

- 58. Chevalier de Boisgaudre to Sec. Coke. Desires to speak with him on a subject of importance on which he could not write.
- 59. Memoranda in the handwriting of Nicholas, entitled "Memorial for Commissioners of my Lord's," that is, the Duke of Buckingham's "revenue."
- 60. "Carmen acrostichum in nomen ornatissimi dignissimique Musarum Mecænatis Eduardi Nicholas, armigeri," by Edward Bullingham.
- 61. Petition of the Knights, Justices of the Peace, and gentlemen of co. Chester to the King. About eight years last past the late King granted a writ of protection to Sir Urian Leigh, who had served his Majesty and the late Queen in war and peace, and was a man of much deserving. Since which time other men of no merit have obtained similar writs, to the great grievance and damage of the County Palatine. Pray that no such protections may be granted in future.
- 62. James Lord Doncaster to his father James Earl of Carlisle. On Lord Doncaster's departure from Turin, Mons. Figoune, the physician, would not let any one meddle with his cheek, by reason there were no good surgeons there. Prays for the Earl's safe arrival in England.
- 63. Thos. Donkin, one of his Majesty's posts for his Highness' pacquet for foreign parts, to——. Craving allowance of extraordinary expenses on a journey to the Hague.
- 64. Eliza Lady Falkland to Sec. Conway. The uncle of her servant, William Hitchcock, is lately dead, and has left him a pretty estate. His engagements are many, and he cannot discharge them under two months. Lest he should be arrested in the meanwhile, she begs Lord Conway to acknowledge him his servant, under his hand. If the Sec. writes to Lord Falkland in Ireland, he is requested to let him know that his lady does her best to do him service in England.
- 65. Catherine Harbar to Endymion Porter. Desires him to procure her son a place as purser's mate.

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- 66. The King to Attorney General Heath. To prepare a warrant for the gift of 10,000*l*. to Thos. Earl of Kellie. [Draft.]
- 67. Certificate of Sir Theodore Mayerne, his Majesty's principal Physician, and W. Harris, M.D. That Lady Dorothy Jenkins, wife of Sir Henry Jenkins, could not be carried down into the country (according to the proclamation) without great prejudice to her health.
- 68. Minute of petitions to be submitted to his Majesty. Amongst them, petitions of Mr. Milles respecting the fraudulent dealing of Lawrence Lownes, Comptroller of Customs in London; of Miles Hughes, respecting his invention of light field pieces; and of Eleanor Lindsay, widow of the Bishop of Ross, complaining of an alleged breach of trust by Sir John Dunbar.
- 69. Petition of John Millington, Purveyor for wine, to the King. The late King granted him 2s. per diem for his life, he prays the King to confirm the said allowance.
- 70. Petition of William Morgan, "minister and prisoner," to Sec. Conway. For three quarters of a year he had sustained the bitter afflictions of Egyptian-like bondage; being in despair of trial or hearing, he prays that his cause may be "eventilated."
- 71. Certificate that Thos. Nevett, of Elham, who was appointed to bear arms, was a carpenter, who had nothing but what he got by his labour.
- 72. Warrant to the Exchequer to direct Henry Lyde, Usher of the Star Chamber, to deliver to the Secretaries of State the customary allowance of paper, wax, and other necessaries. [Draft, with unsigned order underwritten, for the Clerk of the Signet to prepare the requisite bill for the King's signature.]
- 73. Petition of Sir Henry Mervyn to the King. Entreats that after 20 years spent in the service of the King and his father, he be not suffered to perish under the King's displeasure. Bereaved of friends by the King's frown, and defrauded of an estate by a disobedient son, he beseeches the King to preserve him and three daughters from dishonourable wants by bestowing on him 200l.
- 74. Draft letter suggested to be addressed by the Council to the Corporation of Bath, calling upon them to remedy the great disorders committed in the common use of the baths by men and women together; which draws a great concourse of wicked persons, but compels grave and sober people to forbear the place.
- 75. Draft order that forasmuch as his Majesty's letters to the Grand Signior, the King of Persia, the Emperor of Russia, the Great Mogul, and other remote Princes, had been written, limned, and garnished with gold and colours by scriveners abroad, thenceforth they should be so written, limned, and garnished by Edward Norgate, Clerk of the Signet in reversion.

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- 76. Petition of Elizabeth Osbaston to Sec. Conway, praying that she, her husband, and children might be allowed to remain in a house of the value of 4l. per ann., in which they were Lord Conway's tenants.
- 77. Petition of Endymion Porter to the King. The King has power to grant leases of lands of the Duchy of Cornwall, although such leases will be void against his first heir that shall be Duke of Cornwall; prays that the King would grant him a lease for 21 years of the manor of Bradnynch, of the manors which belonged to Henry Courteney, Marquis of Exeter, since annexed to the Duchy, and of the manor of Fordington, and eight other manors; and of the prisage and butlerage of wines, and of the custom called "maletott," due upon goods exported or imported from or into the ports of the Duchy.
- 78. Allowances claimed by Humphrey Roberts, Deputy to Sir Francis Carew, Prothonotary of the Court of Chancery, for ingrossing and ornamenting various public instruments of great importance; amongst them, the King's marriage articles.
- 79. Edmund Lord Sheffield to Lord Treasurer Ley. Solicits him to favour the bearer, a gentleman matched with the writer in blood, in a suit, which is the smallest that ever so well deserving a gentleman did ask, and which the King doth well allow of, if the Lord Treasurer doth the like.
- 80. Petition of Thames fishermen to the King, praying him to confirm the acts done by his father, with a view to their incorporation.
- 81. Request of Sir Anthony Weldon, that the Postmaster of Dartford might be sent for [to the Council] for violently taking a gelding of Sir Anthony's from his servant, and sending it as a post-horse with the ordinary packet.
- 82. Petition of Wm. Wood of St. Catherine's to the King. The petitioner's son, Wm. Wood, a ship surgeon, was captured and carried into Tunis, where he remained in slavery three years; Captain Leatt paid 73l. 12s. for his ransom, and the petitioner found sureties for the amount; on his son's return voyage, he was captured again by an Algerine ship of war; the petitioner prays that 33l. 12s. remaining due to Captain Leatt may be paid out of the first money collected by brief.
- 83. Petition of Edmund Wyndham to the King. The late King on the 25th March in the fifteenth year of his reign, granted to Roger Thorp all goods of traitors from the thirtieth year of Queen Elizabeth, reserving to the king one moiety; the petitioner prays for a grant of the reserved moiety, and for a further grant of the said goods of traitors from the date of Thorp's grant until the 26th June last past.

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- 84. List of the Lord Lieutenants of all the counties in England, prepared within a few months after the accession of King Charles I.
- 85. Petition of Robt. Young, assignee of his Majesty's Printer for the Latin tongue, to the King. Has nearly printed a Latin Bible; prays that he may have a royal warrant for adding thereto the liturgy in Latin.
- 86. Petition of Hugh Paulet, son of George Paulet, sometime Lieutenant of Jersey, to Sec. Conway. Petitioner having been a soldier in several foreign services, especially at Breda, and having come over distressed, appeals to Lord Conway, the rather as the petitioner is a near kinsman of Sir Philip Carteret, for assistance to travel to his friends.
- 87. Petition of Abraham Vanderdort to the King. Sets forth the two grants made to him, each being of 40*l*. per annum, and prays that they may be joined together and augmented into one grant of 100*l*. for his life.
- 88. Sir Wm. Alexander to Sec. Coke. According to his Majesty's pleasure Sir Wm. had written to the Earl of Montrose, President of the Privy Council and of the Council of War in Scotland, that by the advice of Colonel Bruce, he should see the monies for levying troops in that country for Count Mansfeldt properly applied. Sir Wm. has since heard that Sir John Coke has commanded Burlamachi not to pay over any of the money without a letter from the Chancellor [of Scotland], of which order Sir Wm. complains.
- 89. Philip Burlamachi to Sec. Conway. Sends a copy of a letter which "the General" has written to the Prince of Orange. Burlamachi's brother says that on no account should any more men be sent over.
- 90. Sir Isaac Wake to Sec. Conway. Note of chests containing glass sent [from Venice] by Sir Isaac Wake to the Duchess of Buckingham, Lord Conway, and Sir Robert Harley, by the Mayflower, of which the master's name was Gates.
- 91. Memorandum to move his Majesty for order to pay Sir Walter Aston 57l. for sending Davies out of Spain into England to fetch blanks from the late King to his present Majesty.
- 92. Order of Lord President Mandeville for a pass for Lodwick Dyer, and Geo. Sinner his servant, to travel for two years.
- 93. Petition from a Clerk of the Signet to ——; for the King's license to travel abroad for three years.
- 94. Sir John Wolstenholme to Sec. Conway. Certificate that Capt. Conwick's sons applied to him for a pass; being under age, he referred them to the Clerk of the Council.

#### TRINITY HOUSE CERTIFICATES.

Among the papers of this period there occur a considerable number of formal documents ordinarily termed "Trinity House Certificates." These are letters addressed by the authorities of the Corporation of the Trinity House to the Duke of Buckingham, as Lord High Admiral, and after his death to the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty. Their object was to solicit a warrant for "laying aboard" a particular specified ship, a certain number of pieces of ordnance, deemed necessary for the ship's defence. One of these certificates was issued in relation to every ship, the owners of which desired to have the protection of great guns. They are all substantially in one form, and in most cases specify the place where the ship was then lying, its name, by whom built and where, its tonnage, the names of its owners and master, and the number and particular character of the ordnance desired. As these certificates form one collection, comprised in Vols. XVI. and XVII. of the Domestic Papers of Charles I., and, for a certain period, are extremely numerous, it is thought better to insert a brief notice of them at the end of every year, rather than overload the Calendar by entering each certificate separately on the day of its date. Certificates with reference to the following ships occur in the year 1625.

Is anxious about his former letters. If they have been read by any but the King or the Duke he shall suffer, although there be nothing in them but truth. If there be not some speedy course taken for clothing the soldier and satisfying the officer, the one will starve and the other leave the command, for in truth they are in extreme want. Is a suitor that they may have more speedy answers, for their extremities are greater than the Lords can imagine. They want martial law to punish offenders of several kinds, without the reformation of whom his Excellency will never be well served.

John Winter, of Canterbury, as Captains for the merchant ships.

The Captain contested the right, but ultimately gave bond for the value. Cannon submits that the Duke is also entitled to the ship as a drift.

The King replied, "Let them do what they list, you shall not go to the Tower. It is not you they aim at, but it is me upon whom they make inquisition; and for subsidies, that will not hinder it. - March 9. 53. Commissioners of the Navy to Nicholas. The St. James, one of the prizes, being appointed for further service, must have her ordnance shifted, which belongs to ships which are cleared by the Parliament. The Commissioners attribute the falling off to the decay of the trade of clothing, the extent and effects of which in their own county they set forth.

Giving them thanks for their discovery of the transporting of gunpowder, and desiring their further aid for apprehending the offenders. [Minute, Conway's Letter Book, p. 246.]
- March 10. Sec. Conway to Buckingham. Concerning the answers to be given to the question of the Parliament, by the Council of War. [Minute, ibid.. p. 247]

- March 10. 64. Petition of Thos. Ivett, Master Gunner of the Garland, to Buckingham:—Having served many years, and being aged, he prays that he may resign his place to his son, Zaccheus Ivett. Underwritten is the certificate of John Reynolds, Master Gunner of England, of the sufficiency of Ivett, the son.
- March 10. 65. Petition of Bernardino Benzi and others, merchants of Venice, to the King, for permission to reload, without payment of customs, goods brought from Venice in the Faith, of London, but not vendible in England.
- March 10. 66. Peter Come Jans to [the Council?]. Relates circumstances of his voyage in the St. James, of Dantzick, from that place into Norway, and thence to Lisbon, where, after long detention, he set sail for Amsterdam, but being driven into Kinsale, he was there stayed by Sir Thos. Love and Lord Wimbledon, and his ship brought round to Portsmouth. Prays for its release and the restoration of his goods, some of which had been unladen by order of Sir Thos. Love. - March 11. 75. Henry Viscount Dunbar to Buckingham. Capture of six vessels by ships of Dunkirk at the mouth of the Humber, also of a ship of Yarmouth bound for Iceland, and of 17 others, one laden with alum worth 1,300l.
- March 11. 76. Capt. Thos. Bardsey to Nicholas. Arrived at Plymouth on the 9th, where he found his ship, with the rest, well fitted, saving with victuals and men. His prize had arrived at Portsmouth. She contains 15 tons of iron, and the rest timber. Begs him to move the Duke that he might reap some benefit by her. Will deal freely with Nicholas, and share his fortunes equally with him. Incloses,
  - 76. I. Memorandum in explanation of a charge of having dealt improperly with a chest of camphor, certain red hides, and three elephant's teeth.

They had taken 13 ships and barks, amongst them a vessel containing alum. The Dunkirkers brag that there are 30 ships more ready to come forth for the English Coast.

The provisions are exhausted, and the poor, weak, and sick men take it ill to be stayed where they die daily. Entreats that the ships may have orders to come about, and that he may come overland to wait on his Grace.
- March 12. 83. Sir Hen. Palmer to Nicholas. The St. George, if well fitted, would be one of the most serviceable ships. The ships stayed in the Downs are in an extremely weak state. Desires a special warrant for pilots. His own ship is very foul; asks that till she be trimmed, he may remove into the Garland.
- March 12. 84. The same to Buckingham. None of the returned ships can remain in the Downs without suffering from hunger, and, if it should blow, from great danger. Had been at sea with five ships and had a chase into Dunkirk Road. The want of power to take up pilots a great hindrance.
- March 12. 85. The same to Nicholas. Sends up Danl. Urry about the The Downs. St. Peter at Dover. If the Duke would grant her to Sir Henry, he would afford Nicholas a share in her. Annexed,
  - 85. I. Warrant of the Duke of Buckingham authorizing Sir Henry Palmer to take the St. Peter into his fleet, and appoint a Captain to her. 1625, Nov. 23. [Copy.]
- March 12. 86. Part of a Diary or Report of Sir Henry Palmer, setting forth his employments and services. This part extends from 1626, Jan. 3 to this day.
- [March 13.]] [Buckingham to the Commissioners of the Navy.] The Peter and the Samuel are to be brought round from Portsmouth, the lading of the former being laid up in the warehouse at that place. The St. George is to be repaired at Portsmouth, and the Reformation in Ireland.   - 87. I. John Reynolds to George Earl of Totness. Had proved at Millhall, co. Kent, six pieces of iron ordnance made by John Browne. He had fulfilled his contract, but by reason of the lightness of these pieces they would deliver their shot uncertainly. 1626, March 8. [Copy certified by the Earl of Totness.]
- March 13. 88. Capt. Richd. Gyffard to Nicholas. Incloses a letter for the Duke, with some proposals for Gyffard's service, which he urges very strongly on the attention of Nicholas. If the Duke will not employ him he will cease to trouble him. *Incloses*,
  - 88. I. Capt. Richard Gyffard to Buckingham. Has attended the Duke for more than 2 years without finding opportunity to receive his Grace's pleasure. The ill success of the late sea employments has much weakened the strength of England, and the world's eye is upon the Duke; others commit the fault, but the Duke is subject to the censure. He could impart the means of establishing an invincible navy for ever. Entreats his attention, as to a thing which much concerns his honour.

  89. William Jones to Matthew De Quester, postmaster for foreign service. The Governor of Calais had arrested Charles le Camp, and vowed to be revenged on all Englishmen for the affront offered at Dover to the French Ambassador. He had also arrested all English ships and merchandize at Calais. They use our men more like dogs than Christians. His Majesty's ketch arrested, her muskets taken, and her sails, not taken off, but in a cruel malice cut from their yards. The French goods at Dover had been released by order of the Duke, and it is hoped those at London will also be cleared.

Difficulties with Sir Wm. Russell as to the allowance of 3l. per diem. Abuses committed by Sir Francis Stewart, in taking so many men out of merchant ships that those left were not sufficient to manage the ships. Much disturbance in trade occasioned by the seizure of English goods in France. In a postscript, dated March 20, the writer details the result of further communications with Sir Wm. Russell.

- March 14. Buckingham to Sir Hen. Palmer. Order had been given for supplying all the serviceable ships in the Narrow Seas with necessaries. The Anne Royal and other unserviceable ships were to be sent round to Chatham and London. When the ships were supplied, they were to be kept plying up and down. There are many Dunkirkers abroad, and it seems strange that none have been met with by any of the King's ships. [Copy. See Vol. xxii. No. 79.]
- March 14. 96. Message from the King to the House of Commons delivered by the Chancellor of the Exchequer [Sir Richard Weston] concerning

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the speech of Mr. Clement Coke, that it was better to die by an enemy than to suffer at home; and also concerning the charges brought by Dr. Turner against the Duke of Buckingham. The King can no ways suffer that the meanest of his servants should be questioned without his leave. He requires justice to be done against these two delinquents, so that he should not be constrained to use his royal authority.

He had delivered the approved list of delegates to Dr. Ryves. - March 14. 101. Sec. Conway, Capt. of the Isle of Wight and Lord Lieut. of Hants, to Sir John Denham. The islanders of the Isle of Wight being exempt from serving on juries for the co. of Southampton, Sir John is prayed, if any of them are returned, to dismiss them from attendance. [Copy.]

- March 15. 110. Case of Charles Earl of Nottingham in support of a bill for reversing a decree in the Court of Wards. [It appears from an endorsement in the handwriting of Bishop Laud that the bill was this day "throwen out atty" committye." See Lords' Journ., III., 532.]
- [March 15.] 111. Information presented to the House of Commons by John Tendring, of the practices and course of life of the priests and papists in the New Prison, and of the abuses of the Warden of the said prison.

Alludes to his past services and commands, his miserable journey, and the activity of his enemies, and makes an earnest appeal to the Duke to secure him a fair hearing.

He directs Wyan to except generally to the whole body of Sir John Eliot's accounts, and particularly as to the abating of 300l. for Hyatt's ship, and that nothing was received from a Frenchman. It would be proved that he had 100l. There are other exceptions, respecting which Wyan will hear from the Duke as soon as may be.]
- March 16. 8. Kenrick Edisbury to the same. Recommends Thos. Wilkinson for Purser of the Antelope, in place of John Hooker, said to be dead.
- March 16. 9. Speech of the Duke of Buckingham at a conference of both Houses of Parliament, in explanation of the speeches delivered by the King and the Lord Keeper on the previous day, with an addition in relation to the charges against the Duke himself. [Imperfect, but containing some matter not in Rushworth, I., 225.]

- March 16. 10. Jo. Bere to Sec. Conway. Two months pay will be due on the 17th inst., besides monies for apparel and repair of arms. Has received from the Mayor 5,450l., which has been all paid out. The charge for entertainment is now 900l. per week. Some houses in the town are infected with plague, and it increases a little daily. The Commissioners have appointed their meetings at Plympton.

  11. Sir Henry Palmer to Buckingham. Having sent the St. Claude to Calais to transport the Duke's servant Mr. Gerbier, she brought back a ship laden at Bordeaux with wines, but which she had notice was bound for Dunkirk. He will hasten about the ships. The Garland is a much better ship for operations against the Dunkirkers than the Entrance. The ships' companies much comforted by the Duke's assurance of provisions coming. Thanks for the warrant for pilots. [In the margin is a memorandum by Nicholas, that on March 18, 1626, Dr. Ryves reported to him that he saw no cause for detaining the ship above mentioned.] Incloses,

- March 17. Sec. Conway to the Turkey Company. For taking aboard Sir Whitehall. Thomas Phillips, Ambassador for Constantinople. [Minute, Conway's Letter Book, p. 247.]
- March 17. 13. The Commissioners at Plymouth to Sir Wm. St. Leger. In From his Majesty's Fort by Plymouth. 13. The Commissioners at Plymouth to Sir Wm. St. Leger. In favour of Capt. Heigham, who had been preferred to Capt. Porter's company, and in disparagement of a Lieutenant who had used means to displant him.
- March 17. 14. Edmund Earl of Mulgrave to Sec. Conway. Recommends his ancient servant, Matthew Dale, for employment in taking priests, seminaries, and others of the popish religion, in which capacity the Earl had employed him while he supplied the place of President at York.
- March 17. 15. Buckingham to Capt. Richd. Harris, of the Hector, and Capt. Edwd. Button, of the Aletheia. Instructions to convey the fishermen of Yarmouth and other coast towns trading for the voyages of Westmony, Island [Iceland], and the North Seas, and to see them safe so far as "the Gattes of Scotland." Having done so he is to repair to Harwich and ply up and down to intercept the King's enemies. [Attested copy.]
- March 17. 16. Commissioners of the Navy to Buckingham. The St. George rides in the Downs, but without a competent number of men, or

- victuals beyond the 20th instant. She is a fit ship to be employed to guard the Northern coast, but wants certain ordnance. The Duke is requested to give warrant for her being brought up the river and made ready for that service.
- March 17. 17. Wm. Burrell, Commissioner of the Navy, to Nicholas. Had received his letters about Mr. Allport, and apprising him that shipwrights are to be appointed by the Duke's warrant. Suggests that the warrant should be conditional on their diligent service. Their wages, with allowance for the work of a servant under them, amount to 15l. or 16l. a year.
- March 17. 18. Petition of Wm. Ryman to Buckingham. His son Capt. George Ryman, who was slain at Cadiz, took "a prisall of value," which after his death was seized by Sir Thos. Love and others, and even Capt. Ryman's clothes were pillaged. Prays that he may receive satisfaction for his son's part of the "prisall," for his goods, and also for his entertainment in the service, so that he may be able to pay his son's debts.
- [March 18.] Buckingham to Sir Henry Palmer. He is presently to release the St. Peter brought by the St. Claude out of Calais road, and to give instructions to the Captains of ships under him, not to intercept any ships belonging to his Majesty's allies, without good proof that, at least, part of the ship or lading belongs to the enemy. - March 18. 19. Receipt of Wm. Watkins, servant to Mr. Mylles, for a certificate and five Privy Seals sent to the Council from Sir George Booth, collector for co. Chester.

  Plymouth. 20. Commissioners at Plymouth to Buckingham. One of his Grace's appointments has not a little perplexed them, that of Mr. Matthews to Capt. Porter's company in lieu of Capt. Heigham. They state reasons which have induced them to suspend further proceedings therein until his pleasure be better known.
- [March 18.] 21. Thos. Trussell, one of the Messengers of the Chamber, to Sec. Conway. By his order he rode into Northumberland and brought up Christopher Hogg. He has kept him since the 21st of January last, providing him with meat, drink, and clothing. Prays that he may be discharged of the poor man, having already disbursed much money on his account.
- March 18. 22. Lord Chief Justice Crewe to the same. Considering the offence of the Northumberland man [Hogg], and that the person of the delinquent is base and contemptible, the Lord Keeper and Treasurer like it well to have him whipped in Bridewell, and then discharged.

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- [March 18.] 24. Capt. John Pennington to Buckingham. The sickness increases so much at Plymouth, that it will be dangerous for the ships to ride there any longer. If money be not instantly sent down the men will dissolve. Sets forth his necessities. He has 2,000 mariners there. [Minute, by Nicholas.]
- March 18. On board the Lion in Catwater.
- 25. The same to Nicholas. Will do Capt. Bardsey or any other friend of Nicholas's all the service he can; but, except it be a special command from the Duke or Nicholas, he would not willingly make him Vice or Rear Admiral, he having had no experience at sea. last voyage was his first command. It is six weeks since Pennington received any packet from the Duke, which has almost broken his heart. He not only honours the Duke, but loves him as a young man doth his mistress. Wishes provisions were hastened away. Has given up the Assurance, of Dover, to Mr. Hugessen on Nicholas's letter, but dare not release the Christian without the Duke's Knows that the going out of a squadron would be to good purpose, but would not willingly go to the west of Spain without 20 or 30 sail. Marvels that Sir Wm. Russell should say that there is no precedent for impressing 200l. Sir Robt. Mansell had 3,000l. impress; but 210l. is now due to Pennington on his pay. Capt. Wollaston was buried yesterday. Urges the sending money that the fleet may get away from that place where the plague is wondrous rife.
- March 18. 26. Capt. Thos. Bardsey to the same. Capt. Campaine is in the harbour of Broadhaven, in Ireland, of which he keeps possession. He has taken two small ships of Galloway, which he declares he shall keep till he has his pardon in his custody. The writer begs Nicholas to think of Tom Bardsey, who much desires that employment. His ship is ready; he wants nothing but victual and his command.
- March 18. 27. The East India Company to Sec. Conway. Having received his letter signifying the King's pleasure that the ship designed for Constantinople should take in Sir Thos.   29. Sir Hen. Palmer to the same. Reports the present position of the ships comprising his fleet. The ships are all so short of victuals that if there be not a speedy supply he knows not what will become of them. He has been so afflicted with their daily complaints that he has relieved one ship out of another, till now all their provisions are spent. The St. George is a fit ship for the North parts. Has not received directions concerning the ship brought from Calais Road. Has been two days ashore, whilst his bedding and necessaries were removing.

- 30. Sir Benjamin Rudyerd to Sir Francis Nethersole. Had sent him the Re[membrancers] of all that had been done in Parliament, whereof he must not expect many particulars, the points being so "dangerous," as we dare not speak here freely amongst ourselves. Blainville had long been forbidden the Court as overmeddling in private business between the King and Queen. A sharp letter, written by the King's command, to our Ambassadors in France. They have concluded a peace disadvantageous to those of our religion. The sending of our ships against Rochelle has been severely handled in Parliament.

As a game of chess, earnestly played, and for a great wager too, so is the present business, the writer being the least pawn; yet, because he stands in the way of danger, if he be not guarded by the moving of the King, he is like to be snapt up and taken. Sends a letter open, which Nicholas is requested to seal and deliver. Would that the writer could express truth to the life, and that the Lord Treasurer and Council were as sensible of these miseries as those that undergo the clamour, in which the writer stands in the first rank. Without "Corranell Argent" instantly come, Sir Allen and his friends must sink and perish. Had not the sale of the prize goods been hindered by private malice, 40 of the King's ships and others had been on the coasts of Spain. Actions must redeem our honour, not wise discourses that carry consideration upon consideration, whilst the business groans under the burden of delay.

- March 20. Sec. Conway to —— Ramsborow, Master of the Sampson. For the Whitehall. taking aboard the trunks, &c. of Sir Thos. Phillips, Ambassador for Constantinople. [Minute, Conway's Letter Book, p. 247.]
- March 20. Charter of confirmation to the tenants of the dissolved monastery Westminster. of St. Mary's, in the city of York, of the privileges granted them by various former charters. [Coll. Sign Man., Car. I., Vol. I., No. 142.]
- [March 20?] 38. Speech delivered, or prepared for delivery, in the House of Commons, on the question of whether the House should investigate the causes of past failures before they proceeded to consider future remedies. The speaker argues against doing so, inasmuch as nothing more appears than error "whereunto all human actions are subject." He defends Buckingham, as one whose "heart stands right with the public good," although he would have been "much more happy in his greatness" if he had been more cautious not to "abound in his own sense," which is a common fault when "a high pitch of favour" meets with "young years." The speaker urges the House to consider what a task it undertakes in thinking to tear the Duke from the sides of the King, who has taken him so deeply into his affection, and holds himself interested not to abandon the Duke, "unless on cause of greater conviction."

The Arminian faction is strong here, and those of the East India Company love us not. Ill offices have been done from England, pretending that the Parliament has more interest in the jewels than the King. Begs Lord Conway to remind the Duke of sending a convoy for him.

- March 21. 42. Dr. Thos. Ryves to [Nicholas]. Has nothing to say why the Michael, of Ross, should belong to the King. Recommends that she should be released.
- March 21. 43. Capt. Richd. Gyffard to Nicholas. Is there any occasion for him to attend the Duke? Entreats Nicholas not to let the Duke be swayed to his further hurt. There is no right course taken in sea-employments; the writer could give the Duke such satisfaction as might haply bring all men to love and honour him.
- March 21. 44. List of officers and men mustered on board the Happy Entrance in the Downs.
- March 21. 45. Petition of Squier Bence and the other owners of the Friendship, of London, to Buckingham:—The Friendship was employed in the late expedition; but her steerage was so defective that the master and company hardly escaped with their lives; they pray that they may be paid for her former employment, out of which they will make her fit for future service. [Underwritten is a reference to the Commissioners of the Navy, this ship being one of the fleet preparing by Capt. Pennington.] Annexed,

The question propounded by the King to the Earl was, whether he chose rather to sit still without being questioned, or whether for the clearing of his innocency, whereof himself and his friends are so confident, he would waive the advantage of the late pardon and put himself in a way of trial. The clothiers had finished the contract for apparel, and now hold the whole dead on their hands. The soldiers cannot be exercised, nor their arms repaired, which breeds in the soldier rather misdemeanour than discipline. Sir Wm. Strode has been entreated to communicate with the Council.
- [March 23?] 52. Speech of Sir Richard Weston, Chancellor of the Exchequer, in the House of Commons, on declaring to the House, by his Majesty's command, the particular circumstances which rendered the necessity for a supply urgent.
- [March 23?] 53. Speech in the House of Commons on the necessity of granting a supply. Some men, seeing things in some disorder at home, think best to begin there; but the speaker holds that the war most concerns the safety of the State, and prays that a Select Committee be named to report what is needful to be done with reference to the war, and how it may be provided for.
  - March 23. 54. Lords Commissioners for the Subsidy to Sec. Conway. The second entire subsidy due by him, according to the grant made 1st Charles, amounts to 20*l*., being after the rate of 4s. out of 100*l*. He is requested to pay the same to Edward Legg, the collector.

  Leghorn. 58. Extract from a letter written by a person on board an English ship. Capture by his ship, near Majorca, of a vessel laden with oils for Valentia. Warlike preparations of the King of Spain against England.

Order of Council, on the complaints of the French Ambassador, against John Griffin and John Gray, pursuivants of the High Commission Court, for infringing the privileges of an Ambassador, and against certain ministers and officers of Faversham for imprisoning a servant of the Ambassador. The pursuivants were continued prisoners in the Gate House during his Majesty's pleasure. The magistrates who were chief actors at Faversham were ordered to be called before the Board to receive punishment. [Copy.]

  - March 24. 64. Capt. John Bonython to Sec. Conway. Reiterates his request that Pendennis may be furnished with a supply for its defence, and that he may be remembered if a fort be erected at Fowey.

The complaints against him are so unjust that they trouble him the less, but it would trouble any man to hear the exclamations there made for their wants, which threaten ruin. For service, they are able to do none till they receive supplies. Defends himself in the cases of misconduct alleged against him, and doubts not the Duke will think him much wronged.
  - March 25. 71. Commissioners of the Navy to the same. Suggest that the Duke should give order to the Captain of the Charles, the guard ship at Tilbury Hope, to ply about the mouth of the Thames, so as to restrain the Dunkirk sloops from entering the river.
  - March 25. 72. Bond of John Isaacke and James Hugessen for 300*l.*, conditioned to be void on their bringing the Greyhound into Dover.
- March 25. 73. Sir Henry Palmer to Buckingham. The complaints against him The Downs, from are as full of malice as untruth. Accounts for the present disposiaboard the Garland. Never heard of the circumstance of a bark chased into the Downs until he received the Duke's letter. There never was any man in his place driven to so hard exigents for want of victual and necessaries. The show of the Duke's distaste is a heavy burthen to him. Inclosed,

  - March 26. 74. Thos. Walker to Sec. Conway. Sends a paper written on hearing that there is a great fleet to go forth.
  - March 26. 75. Arguments on the effects of debasing or enhancing the value of money, delivered at a conference before his Majesty at the Council Table.
  - March 26. 76. Sir Thos. Button to Capt. John Pennington. Illness and not neglect has been the cause of his silence. There is not a friend to whom he would be loather to give just cause of doubt than Jack Pennington; and so he should believe, if he desires to make the writer happy. He is sensible of the difficulties Pennington has to encounter. Hopes the Parliament will take a course to see things better settled, and wishes that, till that may be, he and those he loves were quit of their employments. Pennington's letters to the Lord Chamberlain were safely delivered. The writer's two days attendance on the Parliament well nigh cost him his life. News he dares not write, but fears he will have much ere long. Whilst he is in being he will be the same to Pennington he has ever professed. Wishes him to write sometimes to Sir Robert Mansell, who holds himself neglected by all men in present employment.

  77. Sir Heu. Palmer to Buckingham. The Delight and St. Claude had chased a Dunkirker, but she went away two feet for their one. They brought in with them two Lubeckers laden with salt, from Portugal. Firing heard to the northward, and ships sent out to inform themselves what it was. Entreats they may speedily be provided for, or of necessity he must send in the ships. Has sent up his Captain to let his Grace understand their true state. Wishes those who complain of him knew but the care of his life for one month.
- March 26. 78. The same to Nicholas. Entreats Nicholas to bring his Captain The Downs. to the speech of the Duke. Unless there be very speedy order taken the service must cease, and the ships be sent up, for starve they must not. Easily guesses from whom those unjust calumniations proceed, whereby the Duke's credulity is abused. Recommends Richd. Hulse for a Purser's place in one of the ships now to be built.
- March 26. 79. Sir Edwd. Dering to Nicholas. Details the evidence of the right of his family to wreck of the sea, as the same was formerly enjoyed by the Maison Dieu, of Dover. [Extract.]
- March 26. 80. Petition of Richd. Dove to Buckingham:—Prays for the next boatswain's place that falls void; with underwritten recommendation of ten brethren of the Trinity House.
- March 26. Buckingham to Sir Hen. Palmer. The Duke has himself spoken to the Surveyor of Marine Victuals, and been assured that the majority of the ships in Sir Henry's fleet were victualled till April 19, and the rest until May 24. The alleged wants therefore are only counterfeited by the Pursers. Sir Henry is to make strict inquiry, and execute exemplary punishment on the faulty. Sir Henry is to send out some good ships to ply in those parts where the Dunkirkers frequent, and never to come into any road or harbour until forced by weather. [See Vol. xxiii., No. 67.]
- March 26. 81. Sir Ralph Assheton, Collector of loan money on Privy Seals Fromhislodging for co. Lancaster, to the Council. Received 200 Privy Seals, on in Holborn. which he has collected 1,236*l*. 13s. 4d., which he has paid into the Exchequer and sends an account. *Incloses*,

The expedition of last year through some disorder and miscarriage, as commonly happens in the entrance of great attempts, did not effect that service upon the King of Spain which might have been expected; this year that King's preparations are in an unusual proportion, and not being forced to divide his shipping for the convoy of his treasure, he cannot easily be diverted from assailing us, as well from Portugal as Flanders; wherefore the Duke is directed to make ready with all speed a fleet of 20 King's ships and 100 merchant ships of from 300 tons and upwards. - 36. Gabriel Browne to [a priest in Spain]. Comments on information that the Infanta had reached Barcelona, on her way to Genoa, to marry the son of the Emperor. Miserable case of the English Catholics, whose persecution is attributed to Buckingham's desire to plague "the Spanish humour." The Duke's unpopularity with the House of Commons, who the other day seemed to carry him on their shoulders in triumph. The whole island is so sharpened against him that even ridiculous toys inflame them with offence. The multitude were bitterly disgusted because, being sickly, he suffered himself to be carried in a covered chair upon his servants' shoulders from Whitehall to Denmark House; and the Commons House took it ill, because at a Committee he was a little more gaillard, trim and wantonly great, "after the French fubb and garb," than stands with the natural gravity of the noble English. Lord Bristol's accusation against the Duke, and the publication in English of the work of a kind of mad Scottish poet and physician, called George Eglesham, accusing the Duke of having poisoned the late King and various other persons. The writer deems the public discord the work of a Spanish faction. The King is a most sweet and gentle Prince, saving as he is misled by "that great man." The citizens, having regilded their Cross, certain zealous persons were stirred up by the sermons of a Calvinistical sot in Aldermanbury, to deface our Saviour's picture. - August 2. 18. The same to Nicholas. Entreats him to hasten provisions; they can hardly get any supplies there to save men's lives.

- 22. Justices of Norfolk to the Council. Had urged the proposal of a free gift to his Majesty on the county assembled at the Assizes. Time had been desired to make answer. At the next meeting they would urge what had been commanded in their Lordships' last letters.

  - 23. Capt. John Bonython to Sec. Conway. News brought by Wm. Lucas of preparations at Santander; 70 sail of galleons and 80 sail of pataches, making all haste. The want of means of defence at Penryn and Truro. At Pendennis there are but 50 men, who can hardly discharge the ordinary work of sentinels. Beseeches Lord Conway to consider the representations he has frequently made of the present estate they are in at the fort. If a supply be sent they shall want cannoniers.

- 24. Mayor of Falmouth and Capt. John Bonython to the Council. In answer to the Council's letter for fortifying Falmouth. They describe the situation of the town. Its safety depended on the castles of Pendennis and St. Mawes, the condition of which they strongly represent.

- 25. Henry Earl of Huntingdon to Robert Lord Willoughby, Lord Great Chamberlain. Recommends to his notice Mr. Smith, a serjeant in Lord Willoughby's regiment, who had been employed in exercising the Trained Bands in Leicestershire.

- 26. Dep. Lieuts of Norfolk to the Council. Certify their proceedings with reference to the military condition of the county. Do not need the serjeants, having old soldiers pensioned by the county who are able to instruct the Trained Bands. Moving the country at this time to contribute towards the ship to be set forth at Lynn would be an impediment to the question of supply. Lynn has 1,000l. a-year in lands, and might well perform the service without assistance.

On Tuesday, the Queen's French attendants were suddenly commanded to depart the Court; the Queen takes the act very passionately, but having prevailed for the return of her nurse is reasonably pacified. Persons who are to be appointed of her Household. Lords Carlisle and Holland sworn of the King's Bedchamber; Lord Pembroke made Lord Steward and Lord Montgomery Lord Chamberlain.
- August 4. 31. Sir John Hippisley to the Council. Result of a search in the Dover Castle. Storehouses of Michael Bourley. Imputes various frauds to Bourley, respecting 40,000 Spanish ryals remitted to Lewis Van Damme, of London, and other prize goods. [Indorsed is Sir John Coke's minute of an answer from the Council. All the parties to be proceeded against.]
- August 4. 32: The same to Nicholas. Sends his brother's letter, and begs some order may be taken for the man. Prays favour for Capt. Burden. Wants to know what Mr. Wyan says to the Admiral's book. Had heard the goods from Portsmouth passed by Dover to London; meant to have got the King 2,000l. out of them. Incloses,
  - 32. I. Capt. Richard Hippisley to his brother Sir John at Bushey Park. His outfit had cost 240l. Misconduct of Randoll, the Duke's Marshal, with reference to a ship brought by the writer into Mount's Bay. Randoll seized the ship, sold the iron in her, and "when he put the broad arrow on her" released six of the prisoners. Truro. 1626, July 12.
- August 4. 33. Certificate by the Justices of Kingston-upon-Thames, that Alexander Colville had taken the oath of allegiance.
- August 4. 34. Mons. de Caille, Treasurer to the Queen, to Justice Long. A house having been taken, in his name and for his use, of Sir Wm. Torrie, has been visited by the King's officers, who have seized some "church stuff," and brought his servant before the Justice, by whom she had been committed; requests the liberty of his servant, and the restitution of his goods.
- [August 4?] 35. Petition of Richd. Holland and Amy his wife to the Council. Pray for release out of custody. The suggestions preferred against them by one Butler, are false and malicious.
  - August 5. 36. The Commissioners of the Navy to Buckingham. Importance of appointing a Muster-master to go with the fleet, and recommendation of William Pease for the appointment.

The advice of "one old Thomas, an engineer," has been directed to be taken. If he be not to be had, Sir Win. Bowyer "the old soldier and Captain of Berwick" may stand them in good stead.

Answer of the Boors of Germany to the demand of the Emperor, who had seduced them into war.

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he is to take off the locks, and make them in such sort that the former double keys may be quite shut out, but without interfering with the King's, Queen's, and Lord Chamberlain's treble keys. [Copy.]

Minutes, by Nicholas, of motions to be made by the Duke of Buckingham at a meeting of the Council of War:—That 2,000l. of money received for prize goods at Dover be allowed for repair of the three castles in the Downs, the forts at Dover, and Sandgate Castle; for increase of pay for the sea-captains that went to Cadiz, the ordinary allowance being but 2s. 6d. per diem; those who went to Algiers were allowed 10s per diem for King's ships, and 6s. 8d. for merchants; also, for allowance to the surgeons in the fleet now fitting out, according to their petition [see 1625, August 11, No. 81. - August 13. 99. Capt. Geo. Alleyne to Buckingham. That morning they landed the French Bishop and all the ladies in Calais. The English in Calais were all detained. Traffic between Calais and Spain. If victualled they might do good service. If he had not bought victuals with his own money, he could not have gone over to Calais with "these French."
- August 13. 100. Sir Henry Goodere to the King. Prays to be admitted a Gentleman Usher of the Queen's Privy Chamber. Desires only meat, drink, and lodging, with some dignity, in that place where he had spent most of his time and estate.

Petition of Citizens of Bristol to the Council:—Their two-third parts of the charge of setting forth two ships to sea will amount to 1,600*l*., which is more than they can bear, considering the recent loss of fifty ships taken and cast away, and the stoppage of trade with Spain. - August 18. 2. Simon Snowe, and four others, to Thos. Pengelly. Many persons are ready to depose that the Dutch skipper was restrained [by Capt. Crosse]. Since the skipper's departure his goods have been divided, and Mr. Drake and his sons have bought the men's shares at low rates.
- August 18. 3. Sir Allen Apsley to Nicholas. Recommends Wm. Brisenden The Tower. for further employment as Purser.

  - August 23. 20. Mayor and another of Southampton to Sec. Conway. A solSouthampton dier imprisoned for wounding one of his fellows, and two others for
    desertion. Desire to know whether they should be tried by martial
    law or by common law.
  - August 23. 21. Exceptions against Sir John Townsend's proceedings for recovery of the manor of Pebworth, co. Gloucester, as concealed lands.
- [August 23?] 22. Minutes by Nicholas of business to be propounded to the Council by the Duke of Buckingham:—That the Commissioners for sale of prize goods should deliver to Sir Allen Apsley the rice and sugar, for the sick men of the fleet; that no waterman should take an apprentice under 17 years of age; that the garrison of Deal Castle, or of any of his Majesty's castles, ought not to be assessed to parish rates.
- August 24. 23. Justices of Norfolk to the Council. Some of the people will East Dereham give more, and some less, to the voluntary gift, but most nothing, alleging reasons too long to trouble therewith their Lordships. All that had been offered did not amount to half a subsidy.

  - August 24. 25. Capt. John Pennington to Buckingham. Requests an order rortsmouth. Lord Denbigh's squadron was victualled and manned, and four ships of his squadron would be ready in 24 hours, if his sails and other provisions were sent from London. As soon as he can get a ship or two ready he will send them to the Wight, where there is a Dunkirk man-of-war doing spoil. Lieuts. to provision Pendennis against a sudden attack, Mr. Coryton spoke much against it, whereupon Bonython directed the companies assigned to attend there to bring in a proportion of victual. Desires to receive a discharge from Lord Conway or the Council.

- August 26. 36. Buckingham to Capt. John Pennington. Lord Willoughby would be at Portsmouth very shortly, and would give order for transferring the men from the Garland. There was great need that ships should be got to sea to oppose the Dunkirkers, and intercept four ships gone from Calais for Spain. [Draft.]
- August 26. 37. Sir Laurence Hyde to Buckingham. To obtain for him the office of Queen's Attorney, which he held under Queen Anna.   - August 28. 43. List of parks appointed by the King to be disparked and improved.
  - August 28. 44. Commissioners of the Navy to Nicholas. Recommend John Browne to be Boatswain of the St. George.

- August 28. 45. Henry Hastings to the Council. He had been commanded to appear before their Lordships, but he stayed until he heard further, being fully assured that he had not given them any occasion to send for him. The warrant was directed to Hants, but he lived in Dorset, in the place of a Dep. Lieut.
- August 28. 46. The Council of War to the Council. They represent the whitehall inconveniences and discredit likely to ensue from the want of pay of the regiments in the Low Countries, and of the recruits sent into Ireland.
- August 28. 47. Opinion of Wm. Clarke concerning the right of the Lord Admiral to a ship taken by Sir Wm. Hull and Walter Ellis in Baltimore Road, and also respecting his right to an English ship which being pursued by an enemy was abandoned by her crew. [Copy.]
- August 29. 48. Dep. Lieuts. co. Southampton to Sec. Conway. Henry Cole, Herriard. a defaulter at the Musters, had showed the required arms.
- August 29. 49. Sir John Tracy to Sec. Conway. As directed he had examined John Ayres of Winchcombe, who denied that he had planted any tobacco, which appears to be true by the inclosed certificate. Incloses,

- August 29. 54. Peter Cannon to Nicholas. Apprising him that he has sent his accounts for the last year by Captain Hill. Is much opposed by Peter Dibbs.

- August 29. 56. Petition of Dr. Richard Hunt, Chaplain to the King:—Having surrendered his prebend in Canterbury Cathedral, on an intended exchange with Dr. Holt which was not completed, Dr. Hunt prays a confirmation of his title to his prebend. - August 29. 59. Certificate of Sir Thos. Button in favour of Edward Jones, son of Capt. Jones, who was slain in the Crane, in Queen Elizabeth's time.

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- [Dec.?] 136. Petition of Thos. Thorold, Charles Snelling, Wm. Barkeley, and eight others, English merchants, to the Council:—The Henry and the Gift of God, laden by the petitioners, arrived at Newhaven about the 7th inst., and were there arrested by Mons. de Villieurs, the Governor, in reprisal for a ship of that town taken by the fleet lately set forthand brought into the Thames; pray for relief.
- [Dec.?] 137. Petition of about 300 shipwrights, artificers, and labourers at Chatham, to the same:—Having been kept in the King's work 12 months without pay or allowance for meat and drink, many have "pawned all they can make," others have been turned out of doors, and their wives and children are crying for food; pray that they may be paid.
- [Dec.?] 138. Similar petition to the illustrious Prince, George Duke of Buckingham.
- [Dec.] 139. Petition of Thos. Annonnier, of the Isle of Rhé, to Buckingham:—Prays for permission to remove his ship, the St. Andrew, from Southampton, where it is detained by the general embargo, to Plymouth. Fr.

- 1. Treatise entitled, "How a state may best provide itself for a war." The author draws his inferences from the example of the United Provinces, and points to three things as necessary: frugality, traffic, and the excise. He sets forth the advantages of the last of these over the mode of supply by subsidies.

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have now exhibited another; they pray the Duke in his wonted goodness and gracious pity towards poor women and miserable captives, to intercede with the King in their behalf.

Petition of John Wells, Store-keeper for the Navy, to Buckingham:—For seven and a half years he has faithfully laboured in his Majesty's service, and has never received any part of his entertainment; prays that such stores as are unserviceable at Deptford and Chatham may be sold, towards payment of his arrears, amounting to 1,300*l*.
- 48. Note intended for some Privy Councillor, soliciting his support of a petition of a great number of poor mariners, for the enforcement of the law which prohibits the shipping of merchandise in strangers' bottoms. [It appears from an indorsement that the petition was referred to Sec. Coke.]
- 49. Petition of Thos. Pearce and others, owners of the Angel, of London, to Buckingham:—For release of their ship, prepared for "a salmon fishing in Ireland," but stayed by a general order of restraint.

- 51. The same to ———. Warrant for payment of Thomas Heyline, who had served chaplain in the Assurance at the Elbe, after the rate of 4d. a month out of every man's pay that served in that ship, being the sum allowed by the Council to chaplains of King's ships. [Address not filled up.]
- 52. Form of letter from the Council to the Dep. Lieuts. His Majesty being about to set out a fleet, for which 2,350 men are required beyond what can be obtained in London, the persons addressed are required to muster the mariners of their county, and thereout to choose a certain number, who are to be at a place appointed at a given day; 12d. is to be paid to them on impressment, and a halfpenny a mile conduct money. State of the suit of Henry Michell and Barnard Michell as it depends before the Council Board:—In August last Henry and Barnard Michell petitioned to retain in their hands 260*l.* received out of the Orange Tree stayed at Weymouth; the Lords referred the question to Sir Henry Marten, whose report was accompanied by a new petition which is here abridged.

- 76. Petition of Philip Burlamachi to the same:—On the 1st of August [1626] the Lords ordered the Commissioners of Weymouth to deliver to Burlamachi, or to Robert Cudner for his use, all the remaining goods of the Orange Tree; they were accordingly brought to London, and Burlamachi disbursed their value; prays that he may sell the same.

Petition of Peter Richaut, of London, Merchant Stranger, to the same:—The St. Peter having been driven by foul weather into Weymouth, had been there seized by the Court of Admiralty; the claim was contested, and 200*l*. deposited in the hands of Sir Henry Marten for charges; the ship and goods having now been ordered to be given up to the petitioner, he prays that he may be allowed his charges out of the 200*l*.
- 80. Petition of the masters and owners of the St. Lucas, the White Unicorn, and the Esperance, of Hamburgh, to the King:—In Sept. last they left Hamburgh for Spain with passes from the Commanders of the King's ships in the Elbe; they were afterwards seized by a Scottish ship and taken into Leith; it is pretended that six bales of linen, six barrels of aurum pigmentum, and 250 cheeses, are prohibited goods, which is denied; pray for their release.
- 81. Petition of Capt. Martin Tison, of Flushing, to the Council:—Has been employed for three years under a commission from the late Prince of Orange to surprise "their enemies;" having been driven by weather into Portsmouth, with a ship of Lisbon taken by him at sea, the Vice Admiral of that place has made stay of his prize; prays for her immediate discharge.
- 82. Petition of Robert Watson, John Bee, and others, owners of the Barbara, to Buckingham:—Petitioners are ruined by the Admiral of France unjustly taking their ship to serve as a man-of-war against the Protestants; pray for letters of reprisal.
- 83. Estimate of the charge for casting 30 tons of brass ordnance from the King's metal brought from divers forts and castles, being broken and unserviceable pieces.
- 84. Answers to objections to certain newly invented light ordnance lately tried in the Artillery Garden, and suggested for use on the upper decks of the King's ships.
- 85. Certificate of Edward Hoarne as to arms and ammunition received into Sandown Castle on the 10th November 1625, and what remains of the same.

- 23. Anonymous petition to the King:—The petitioner prays that he may be authorized to appoint persons to search and try whether cloth and stuffs are truly dyed.
- 24. Considerations on the balance of commerce and the mode of maintaining the same, with a proposal for equalising the values of gold and silver, by making contracts and payments by weight, and not by number.
- 25. Commissioners of Trade to ———. The King having appointed them, with four of the Council, to examine into a charge against the Farmers of the Customs of taking excessive duties on perpetuances and serges, and commanded Walter Morrell to attend them for their better information, they certify those who have benefited by his labours that it is reasonable they should reward his services.
- 26. The Farmers of his Majesty's Customs and Subsidies to all Mayors and other Officers. To give assistance to Humanitus Mayo, one of the Messengers of the Chamber and Deputy Searcher for London and all other ports. [Unsigned.]
- 27. Minute, by Sec. Coke, of a proposal for erection of a corporation for exercising the trade of eel-fishing, then altogether in the hands of the Hollanders, who sell yearly in England eels of the value of 20,000*l.*, and employ in the said trade 300 persons here and in the waters of Denmark.

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- 28. Anonymous petition to the Council:—The petitioner prays attention to a statement of the abuses sought to be reformed by the proposed incorporation of the Thames fishermen. *Annexed*,
  - 28. I. Statement of various abuses before mentioned.
- 29. Proposition of More for the better ordering of tradesmen, artificers, journeymen, and apprentices, by issuing a commission to sue forth pardons for such as will compound for the offence of not enrolling their indentures of apprenticeship, and erecting an office for enrolling the same for the future.
- 30. Special advertisement of the advantages which accrue to England from the trade with France, and the peculiar disadvantages to our trade likely to arise from a war with that country.
- 31. Note of goods, the production of France, prohibited to be brought into England.
- 32. Petition of the Muscovia Company trading in Greenland to the King:—In 1618 the petitioners, fishing in their harbours in Greenland, were surprised by the Hollanders and their whole voyage overthrown, to their loss of 50,000*l*.; the late King, in 1619, declared his pleasure that the Hollanders should within three months pay 22,000*l*., the remainder being respited for three years; this sum not having been paid the petitioners solicit redress.
- 33. Deduction of the right of the King of England to Greenland; a brief narrative of the discovery of that country, and of the acts done by the late King to vindicate the English right thereto against the claim of the Dutch.
- 34. Prices of packets sent by express messengers, and also rates of postage of single letters for his Majesty's service, to and from the principal cities of Europe; certified by Matthew de Quester. The charge for the packets runs from 7l., being the charge to the Hague, to 10l., the charge to Brussels or Paris, and 60l., the charge to Vienna. For a single packet or letter to any of the above-mentioned places the charge was 30s., except to or from any part of Germany, for which it was 6s.
- 35. Statement, by Matthew de Quester, of the charge of postage of single letters from Venice, formerly 16d., then 9d., and packets 2s. 8d., and from Leghorn and Florence, 3s. per ounce, and 1s. for a single letter.
- 36. Note, by the same, of the several grants to himself and his sons, constituting them Postmasters General for all parts beyond seas.
- 37. Names of woolowners and persons in Hertfordshire, Berkshire, and Cambridgeshire to be sent for "about contribution."
- 38. Proposal for preventing the exportation of wool and money, by establishing a register of all wool grown, and of what becomes thereof, and also of all payments of money.

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- 39. Petition of George Read to the Council:—Having been stayed from proceeding with a building in Baldwin's Gardens, on the supposition that it was upon a new foundation, he sends a certificate to the contrary, and prays that he may be allowed to finish his building. *Annexed*,
  - 39. I. Certificate of William Atkinson and sixteen others to the effect above stated.
- 40. Names of the Lord Lieut., Deputy Lieuts., and various Knights of co. Berks; a list prepared after 18th August 1626, with a view to the issuing of some Commission.
- 41. Extracts from the episcopal and archidiaconal registers of Norwich of institutions and inductions into the churches of Castle Rising, Ridon or Roydon, North Wotton and South Wotton, in co. Norfolk.
- 42. Similar extracts from the registers of Archbishops Grindal, Whitgift, Bancroft, and Abbot.
- 43. Extract from a book bearing date A.D. 1368, remaining in the register of the Archdeacon of Norwich, respecting the value of the four livings above mentioned.
- 44. Minute of petition to the King, to move the Dean and Chapter of Canterbury that if none of the prebends are fit for St. Dionys Back Church, in Fenchurch Street, they will nominate John Jones, Bachelor of Divinity.
- 45. Petition of inhabitants of the Forest of Dean, co. Gloucester, to the same:—Set forth great abuses practised in the Forest which have recently led to a sudden commotion of the meaner sort; pray for a commission to gentlemen of the county to examine the offenders; they petitioned to the same effect about Midsummer last, and this is the fourth time since.
- 46. Lamplugh to Sec. Conway, Lord Lieut. of Hants. Having a grant made by the late King for collection of 1d. per ton on every ship that passes Dungeness light, he begs Lord Conway to order the Captain of Cowes Castle to collect the same from ships belonging to the Isle of Wight, as was done by Capt. Keeling in the late Lord Southampton's time.
- 47. Certificate of names, descriptions, and residences of all foreign strangers residing within the county of Middlesex. In Grub Street occurs Lucius Frerra, an Italian preacher; in Whitecross Street, Daniel Alman, a painter; in St. John Street, Matthias Lee, a Dutchman, a poet; in the Duchy Liberty in the Strand, Monsieur Duche, a picture drawer; in the district of Drury Lane, Queen Street, and Prince's Street, Hubert Laseur, a picture drawer. The whole number is 291.
- 48. Extracts from the Pipe Rolls relating to the forest of Morff, co. Salop.

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- 49. Minute of the desire of Mr. Comptroller [Sir John Suckling] that the business of the patent lately obtained by the Dean of Norwich respecting his deanery may be referred to the Lord President, Lord Conway, and the Bishops of London and St. Davids, the grant having been privately obtained.
  - 50. List of victuallers at Rye from whom bonds had been taken.
- 51. Petition of inhabitants of St. Martin's-in-the-Fields to the King: Since the beginning of King James's reign the inhabitants of their parish have trebled, and that number is much increased by the attendants upon the Court; the church has been enlarged but cannot contain one half of those who would come to it; there is a hall in Durham House now used as a passage which might be converted into a church, which the petitioners are ready to do, as well as to pay the minister; they pray that as the late King bestowed on them a burying-place, his Majesty would aid them in procuring a church in the way suggested.
- 52. Petition of Thos. Jarvis to the same:—Licence had been given to him to treat with the country concerning the inclosing of King's Sedgmoor, co. Somerset, prays that, when necessary, he may have access to the King or to Sec. Coke on the subject of his undertaking.
- 53. Proposal by Sir Richard Strode, for draining and inclosing Sedgmoor, co. Somerset, upon a plan applicable to other commons in England, and likely to produce 20,000*l* per annum.
- 54. Minute of petition of Sir Richard Fleetwood, that to put an end to all doubts as to the title to Wigan parsonage, the King would make another grant thereof in the name of a person to whom Sir Richard had sold the same.
- 55. Petition of the Bailiffs, Aldermen, and Burgesses of Great Yarmouth to the Council:—Have proceeded with the fortification of their town, but are forced to a stand for want of the money which was to have been brought in by the County of Norfolk and City of Norwich, whose assessment is behind 200*l*.; being already out of purse 200*l*. more, the petitioners pray the Council to give order for payment of the amount due from the County and from Norwich.
- 56. Petition of George Annis, to the same, for order for payment of his wages for watching the beacon at Yaxley, co. Suffolk.
- 57. Copy of a statute imposing fines on absent members, proposed to be enacted for Wadham College, Oxford, by Bishop Laud, Visitor, and Wm. Smyth, Warden of the same College; with an underwritten opinion of Arthur Duck and Edmund Pope, that the same statute was in accordance with the power of the Bishop and Warden.
- 58. [Sec. Conway] to the Council. Describes a mode in which the Isle of Wight may be divided into three separate defensible portions. Solicits that some men, if it be but 200, may be distributed into the several castles, and that Sandham Castle may be repaired. In the

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- time of Henry VIII. the castles in that island had competent garrisons; now they are reduced to 4 persons in each, a Captain at 8d. a day, and 3 gunners at 6d. a day.
- 59. Minute of motion to be made in the Council by Sec. Conway, that the loan money from the Isle of Wight, which will amount to about 800*l*., may be applied to the repair of Sandham Castle, and the other fortifications in that island.
- 60. Christopher Earl of Anglesey to his nephew Endymion Porter. This morning the Earl left with his brother L'isle a letter which he entreats Porter, out of the love he owes to the Earl's brother William, to procure the King to allow of, being for the good of L'isle's wife, the ward, and the rest of their children. It is founded on the advice of Sir Harry Holdcraft.
- 61. Wm. Belou to Sec. Conway. He has been worse used than a natural fool, witness Tom Duri; than a counterfeit, witness Archie Armstrong, who has shown Belou that the King has given such special direction for his payment that he is better off than he was in the late King's time, whilst the writer cannot receive a penny. He has been worse used than a Turk or a dog, for, having moved a humble petition to the King at Hampton Court, his Majesty went away silently without speaking one word. The writer is sure his Majesty will speak to his dogs. Sends copies of two petitions already delivered, and entreats that he may have a pass to go abroad. Incloses,
  - 61. I. Petition of the same to the King:—Relating his long course of service under Queen Anne of Denmark, and her brother the Duke of Holstein; desires that he may be taken into the service of King Charles, or that an order of the late King may stand in full force, and that he may have 1,000l. paid to him on account.
  - 61. II. Another petition from the same to the same:—Praying that his Majesty will take back his pension, giving the petitioner what he thinks fit, or will license him to dispose of it.
- 62. Petition of Benjamin Blaxton to the Council:—Complains of the malicious conduct of Robert Harwell, through whom the petitioner had been imprisoned ten several times, and was then confined in the Fleet; prays that his cause may be heard at the Board.
- 63. Petition of Thos. Blount, prisoner in the New Prison, to Sec. Conway:—Being affected with divers diseases, prays liberty to walk abroad sometimes in the open air. Annexed,
  - 63. 1. Certificate of "Gulielmus Harriseus" and other doctors, in support of the above petition.
- 64. Minute of a petition that the question of the validity of a grant of the exclusive printing of briefs and other papers printed on one side of the paper, made by the late King to the Sieur de Boislorée, but contested by the Stationers' Company, might be left to determination by law.

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- 65. Minute of request of the Sieur de Boisloreé for a passport, and free conveyance for himself and family into France.
- 66. Buckingham to Sec. Conway. Thanks for a letter; the bearer will make an answer to it.
- 67. Request to Lord ——— by a poor kinsman, to move the Duke of Buckingham not to oppose the proceedings of the writer in the Court of Wards, concerning the estate of an idiot.
- 68. Memorandum of Mary Countess of Buckingham, that by direction of her son the Duke of Buckingham, she commanded George Fielding to give her niece Compton 50l. which he not having at Huntingdon, borrowed of Sir Thos. Compton.
- 69. Memorandum that one year and a half is due on Mrs. Cary's pension of 500*l*. per ann., and that it is the King's pleasure that the same should be presently paid.
- 70. Petition of Michael Crake, the King's Footman, to the King:—Thos. Coulton, of Grimsby, co. Lincoln, entered into bond for 30% on 8th Sept., 9th James I., conditioned to answer for 1,000 deal boards forfeited for nonpayment of customs, the bond being forfeited, petitioner prays the King to bestow the forfeiture upon him.
- 71. Petition of William Crosse to Buckingham and the Council of War:—Was preacher to Sir Edward Horwood's regiment in the expedition to Cadiz; on the next payment to the officers of that regiment, hopes he may receive some fitting means to relieve the wants of his present necessity.
- 72. Petition of Jeffery Cuckowe to the Council:—Having lived heretofore in Germany, he lately returned to England on a report of the death of some of his kindred; prays for a pass back to Germany to his wife and children.
- 73. Lettice Countess of Leicester, widow of Robert Dudley Earl of Leicester, to her "honourable dear son" Henry Earl of Holland. Recommends her special good friend Mr. Chamberlayne, who desired to become known to the Earl, and was in such place as that he might sometimes do the Earl a service. Subscribes herself the Earl's "grandmother," dearly loving him.
- 74. "Godly Verses" by James Orrell. Five short poems of which the following are the first lines, "Sweet Saviour of the world, and Judge of all:" "When I consider what I am by nature:" "The years of man are ten seven times o'ertold:" "A sinner's habit is a mournful sprite:" "What is the only end of man's creation?" With an epilogue from which it appears that the writer, who describes himself as being in poverty, addressed these compositions to a lady whom he styles "Madame" and "Your Grace."
- 75. Case respecting the debt due from the Crown and the City of London to the representatives of Sir Horatio Pallavicino; and also respecting an arrangement, stated to have been founded on deceitful

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pretences, whereby lands of the value of 500*l* per annum were granted to Sir Oliver Cromwell, who married Dame Anne, widow and executrix of Sir Horatio; with opinion of some legal person thereon. [Copy. See Vol. xxxviii. No. 21.]

- 76. Note of Capt. Preston's expenses for two post horses from Exeter to Dover, and thence back to Plymouth: 10*l.* 1s. 9*d.*
- 77. Petition of Thos. Reeve, clerk, to the Council:—For marrying Lord Maltravers to Lady Elizabeth Stewart, petitioner was, by the King's express command, committed close prisoner, but has since, out of his Majesty's clemency, been ordered to be set at liberty; he is, notwithstanding, constrained to remain prisoner for his charges, which he is unable to pay; prays that he may be freed from such payment. [Underwritten are the following words in the King's handwriting: "Thire Ilorges will give noe order upon this Peticon.]
- 78. Petition of John Reynolds, prisoner in the Fleet, to the same:—Was forced from France by order of the late King, and on his arrival in England was committed to prison for being the author of a book termed "Votiva Angliæ," in which he deplored the loss of the Palatinate, and desired its restitution, which "every true-hearted Englishman ought to wish and pray for;" has been imprisoned full two years, during which time he has incurred a debt of 300l. for his maintenance; also owes sixty and odd pounds for which he is surety, and is threatened to be arrested for the same as soon as he is at liberty; prays for protection against arrest for one year.
- 79. ——— to [Sec. Conway]. The writer's son Worsley having missed seeing his Lordship, the writer informs him that Sir John Savile is a man liable to be violently transported with passion. Examples are cited of his abusing his fellow Justices on the bench, offering blows, and, on one occasion, causing a man to be shot when taking a possession. His Lordship is requested to let the Lord Keeper understand these things.
- 80. John Sictor, a Bohemian exile, to Dr. Thos. Ryves. Sir Henry Marten, Judge of the Court of Arches, having money frequently committed to him for pious uses, had on a former occasion bestowed 30s. on the writer on the recommendation of Dr. Westfield; prays Dr. Ryves's intercession to procure him a further gift. He brought letters from the Queen of Bohemia to the Corporation of London, but on account of the badness of the times, and the heavy payments arising out of the war, he has not been able to obtain any relief.
- 81. William Sheldon to Sec. Conway. In behalf of his younger brother, Baldwin Sheldon, of Grafton. Case Shurley, one of the late King's footmen, "begged" Robert Throgmorton and Baldwin Sheldon, and had grants of their lands, paying to the King 120l. 10s. per ann. for a certain term; that rent has been paid, but nevertheless Edwd. Smythe has sued Baldwin Sheldon for the penalty of 20l. a month for 6 months. Sir Thos. Coventry, the late

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- Attorney General, caused him to surcease that suit; but now William Avery has begun a like suit, against which the petitioner prays relief.
- 82. Informations filed by Attorney General Heath against Sir Simon Steward for misconduct in his offices of Compounder or Assessor of the composition anciently paid by the Isle of Ely to the Officers of the Green Cloth, and also of Dep. Lieut. [Copy.]
- 83. Petition of John Tendring to Sec. Conway:—Prays for some reward for services done to his Prince and country in the discovery of priests under his Lordship's warrant. [See Vols. xxii., No. 112, and xxvi., No. 89.]
- 84. Petition of the priests and laity of Scotland to Pope Urban VIII.:—They again represent to his Holiness that they find the hearts of the people of that kingdom well affected towards the Catholic faith; beseech him to grant them a Bishop, namely, Mr. John Trumbull [Tromble] to be their Primate and Bishop of St. Andrews.
- 85. Faculties granted by Pope Urban VIII. to the priests of the kingdom of Scotland, for the propagation of the faith in that country and the neighbouring dominions of the King of Great Britain. Lat.
  - 86. Translation of the same into English.
- 87. List by Lord Keeper Coventry of "the last Committee for Foreign Services;" with suggestions for the appoinment of a fresh committee to treat with the States.
- 88. The King to ———. By agreement with the United Provinces, the 6,000 men sent for their assistance were to be maintained complete. Several officers having been recalled to be employed in the Cadiz expedition, their entertainment during their absence had been retained from them; the King's pleasure is, that out of money in the hands of Philip Burlamachi, or of Julian Calandrini, the commissary of the said troops, the person addressed is to cause these officers to be satisfied. [Draft.]
- 89. John Harrison to the King. Defends his late mission to Barbary against objections urged by Sir Henry Marten. Prays that his expenses on that occasion may be paid. Accuses Barrett of intending to sell into slavery the Turks he proposes to exchange. [See Vol. xxxvi., No. 76.] Entreats the King to give the Ambassadors from Morocco a fair and honourable despatch.
