

Dahlias, Delphiniums, Aquilegias, and other garden favorites. We are located on the west side of Bedford Road at the Crossway (Orchard Ridge).

About half-way between Mount Kisco and Pleasant-ville on route 117. Thirty miles north of New York or 1 hour motoring distance. In September you will find a gorgeous display, all labeled

where you can examine and select them to better advantage than at a crowded show.

OUR POLICY is to grow the best stock we know how, and of the finest varieties in existance. To fill each order with the best roots and plants it is possible to produce in order to give each customer the satisfaction he has a right to expect.

FOREWORD

THEN you plan, as you probably will soon. your 1931 garden, we know you will want to add some newer, rare varieties which so far have not reached the average gardens. This list which we submit to you, contains what we believe to be the finest varieties grown, and by careful selection. planning and grouping, you will have a garden unusual and of rare charm. The old fashioned weak-stemmed, drooping head Dahlia is not present in our gardens, and we know you do not want them in yours. Careful elimination has resulted in the following list, which a discriminating Dahlia enthusiast will recognize as exceptional. All prices have been materially reduced, especially on plants. thus enabling a greater number to enjoy the newer and finer varieties.

MODERN DAHLIAS

There is no secret about growing wonderful Dahlias. It does not require expert knowledge. Anyone can grow them. All that is necessary, is to select good varieties and order them from a reliable grower. Start now by discarding your inferior stock and replace them with some of the newer and better varieties. By adding a few each season, you will in a short time have a good collection. and will never regret it. You may leave the selection to us if you wish. Tell us what varieties you have and the amount you wish to spend.

DAHLIAS FOR CUT FLOWERS

Modern Dahlias when properly grown and handled will keep longer than most flowers. It is not necessary to burn the stem, scald them or put them in hot water to make them last. It is of no benefit. Cut Dahlias in the morning when the dew is still on them. The earlier the better. Never cut them during the heat of the day. Cut with a fairly long stem, remove the lower leaves and place them deeply in cool. clean water. Leave the flowers in a cool place for a few hours so they may draw water before using them.

ROOTS

The size of the roots varies according to the variety. A large root does not always result in a large plant or flower. The essential thing is a strong, healthy field-grown root, showing a growing eve or sprout. We send no roots with broken necks. Nothing but strong, healthy roots in growing condition are shipped.

GREEN PLANTS

We make a specialty of green plants. They are properly grown, packed well, and safe delivery is guaranteed anywhere within the United States. Plants are ready about May 1st, but recommend from May 15th to June 20th as the best time to plant them out. Although they require a little more care in planting than roots, and will not mature as quickly, yet they will give good satisfaction, and often produce larger flowers than roots. The price of plants being generally less than half the price of roots, affords many an opportunity to try out the newer introductions at a greatly reduced expenditure. We make no charge for packing, and prepay transportation charges when remittance in full accompanies the order. Plant them as soon as they arrive, water thoroughly, and shade them during the hottest hours of the first few days. Then you will have sturdy Dahlia plants established, without waiting two weeks or more as required by roots.

CULTIVATION

Dahlias are easily grown. They require no special treatment or soil to bring them to perfection. An open sunny situation is the best, but they will succeed in partial shade.

Plant between May 1st and June 20th. The latter date is the best when planting for exhibition blooms.

Dig holes about three feet apart and six inches deep. Drive a strong stake in each hole, then lay the root down flat with its crown toward the stake. Cover with two or three inches of soil until after the plant comes up. then fill in the balance.

We will send full cultural directions with each order. With these you should have no trouble in growing exhibition blooms, as they give you information on every stage of growth.

ORDER EARLY

Then you will get the varieties you want. Stock of some of the latest varieties is limited, so to avoid disappointment, we urge that you order early. All orders are filled in rotation, and stock is subject to prior sale. Order early, we will ship at the proper time.

TIME OF SHIPPING

We ship roots in April and May. If this does not agree with your plans, tell us when you want your order shipped. Roots shipped before April 1st are not guaranteed against loss by freezing.

CANADIAN SHIPMENTS

In accordance with the ruling governing the importation of Nursery Stock from the United States into Canada, it will be necessary to obtain a permit from the Secretary of Destructive Insect and Pest Act Board. Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, and file same with the Collector of Customs before shipment can be cleared. Seeds are exempt from this ruling, and may be shipped into Canada without a permit. Dahlias come under the classification of Nursery Stock. This ruling must be complied with in order to make delivery, and we ask you in the event of an order, to secure this permit, advising us of the number of same, that we may mark it on the outside wrapper of shipment, and require the white mailing tags, issued by the board, to affix to parcels, one for each parcel.

SHOULD YOU PREFER PLANTS

While we list plants of only certain varieties, we will grow plants of any variety we list, at one-half the price of tubers, unless the price shall amount to less than \$1.00 which is the minimum price per plant. Should you desire plants we do not list, we will grow them for you if your order reaches us not later than March 1st, but would request that you send it to us as early as possible.

NUMBER 77

We did not intend to place this variety on the market until next year, but have been urged to do so, by so many who viewed it in our gardens the past season, that we have decided to make it available this year. This will allow the real Dahlia enthusiast to try it out a year in advance. When it is named we will notify you.

It is of the formal decorative type, of the most perfect form. The flower is held on the stem as it should be—looking at you and slightly up. Its color is the purest white at all times of the season, so white that when held beside many so-called white, the others appear to be cream instead. The petals have much substance and a beautiful sheen. The center is very full, stems are straight, stiff and slender. The leaves are small, dark green, leathery and apparently insect-resistant.

You will find it is the long sort-for, real white. It has the depth. substance and quality, that make it appeal to those who never before cared for a white flower.

- Class 1. Single Dahlias. Open centered flowers with only one row of ray florets regardless of form or number of florets. For example, Newport Wonder, Fugi San, Eckford Century, Coltness Gem.
- Class 2. Anemone Dahlias. Open centered flowers with only one row of ray florets regardless of form or number of the florets with the tubular disc florets elongated forming a pin cushion effect. For example, Adda Finch.
- Class 3. Collarett Dahlias. Open centered flowers with only one row of ray florets with the addition of one or more rows of petaloids, usually of a different color, forming a collar around the disc. For example, Diadem, San Mateo Star, Ami Nonin, Geant de Lyon.
- Class 4. Duplex Dahlias. Open centered flowers with only TWO rows of ray florets regardless of form or number of florets. For example Golden Sunshine, Mrs. J. Coissard.
- Class 5. Peony Dahlias. Open centered flowers with not more than THREE rows of ray florets regardless of form or number of florets, with the addition of smaller curled or twisted floral rays around the disc. For example, Geisha, Gorgeous, City of Portland.
- Class 6. Incurved Cactus Dahlias. Fully double flowers with the margins of the majority of the floral rays revolute for one-half or more of their length. The floral rays tending to curve toward the center of the flower For example, F. W. Fellows, Beaclaws, Farncot.
- Class 7. Recurved and Straight Cactus Dahlias. Fully double flowers with the margins of the majority of the floral rays revolute for one-half of their length or more, the floral rays being recurved or straight. For example, Ambassador.
- Class 8. Semi-Cactus Dahlias. Fully double flowers with the margin of the majority of the floral rays revolute for less than one-half of their length. For example, Edna Ferber, Francis Lobdell, Sunkiss, Alice Whittier.
- Class 9. Formal Decorative Dahlias. Fully double flowers, floral rays generally broad, either pointed or rounded at tips with outer floral rays tending to recurve and central floral rays tending to be cupped; all floral rays in a somewhat regular arrangement.
