FIGHT OVER CONSCRIPTION IS BECOMING MORE ACUTE

Telegrams and Letters in Its Favor Received, but Big Labor Federation Opposes It---Great War Bond Issue Bill Passed Unanimously

Washington, April 14.-The most studendous war loan ever proposed in the world's history passed the House without a dissenting vote today. It authorizes the issue of seven billion dollars in government securities for war purposes.

Three hundred and eighty-nine members of the House voted in favor of the bill. Meyer London, Socialist, did not vote.. The Senate takes up the bill Monday and will rush it through quickly. The President

will sign the bill early next week. The vote of the house was unanimous, Speaker Clark directing that his vote be recorded as aye. Arrangements were completed today for the reception of the British and French Cooperation Commission which will reach Washington shortly to discuss American participa-

tion in the war. A deluge of telegrams and letters supporting the administration's conscription plan poured into Washington today. The administration leaders in the House declared that the President could safely appeal to the country to force the enactment of his army measure.

One Texas congressman declared that a mass meeting of 10,000 of his constituents had endorsed the plan and that a flood of individual endorsements had reached him. Opposition to conscription has been strongest in Texas.
