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THE NEW STEAMER

The management of the Old Colony Railroad and Steamboat Company, about 1200 guests embarked last Tuesday at Fall River for the new and magnificent steamer Pilgrim, which will be placed on the route between Fall River and New York. The morning train from Boston, Plymouth, Brockton, and other points, arrived at Fall River at 10.30 o'clock, and a short interval was spent in a car on the trolley, and the stately steamer Pilgrim, as she lay at the pier, profoundly decked with flags. The fine lines and graceful appearance of the steamer would light the heart of any "old salt," while the inexhaustible beauties and equipments of marine architecture which she carries on board would give to the voyagers a sense of safety and security which would be impossible to give to any other vessel.

The utmost safety to travelers has been attained in the build of the Pilgrim, she being a vessel which resists the heaving of the sea, and is so constructed that it would be impossible to sink her if her bottom was pierced, while the engine and boiler are enclosed in iron bulkheads, and the lighting is electric, for which the furnishings are the most elegant and modern, and largely to the varied attractions of the saloons. The rich upholstery of the artistic furniture and the velvet tread and beauty of the luxurious carpets in the saloons heighten the splendor of these vast interior areas, which render the vessel a model of perfection in comfort and pleasure to the traveler. The company has also shown a great regard for its passengers when it has equipped its steamer with a second class accommodations, the main deck forward being fitted up with large staterooms, with bath, lavatory, conveniences, etc. All the staterooms are spacious and elegant, and the "dormitory bunks" are neatly decorated with colored, rescued ceilings, pictures and panels, and the furniture and other accessories belong to the most modern type. The staterooms, spring beds, hair mattresses, leather pillows and the whisper of linen invite the traveler to repose while the stately ship is gliding through the waters to the distant port. We are compelled to be general rather than specific in the notes of our "voyage" to the "old salt sea," and to turn to incidents of the excursion, the pleasures of which will long linger in the memories of the voyagers. At 11 o'clock there was cast off the great engine in its rhythmic pulsations, sensationally keeping time with the strains of "The Stars and Stripes" by the band of the Old Colony Railroad. The band, which was led by the new "Pilgrim March" composed by T. H. Boulton for the occasion, followed the steamer, and gave a magnificent performance in the open air. The music was heard in the distance, while the fresh breeze had ruffled the surface of the sea to an extent which induced a change in the route, and the steamer turned to the right, and returned to smoother waters, but the excursionists might enjoy the discussion of the long tables were covered with the most choice viands, and the numerous courteous attendants were prompt to serve every guest with what ever their appetites craved, and the menu in its preparation, showed that the cuisine of the Pilgrim is another attractive and perfect feature of the floating palace.

At 2 o'clock the crew of the steamer was turned about the Boston City, and after traversing the circumference of the bay, a line of white sailing vessels, among whom were included a number of representatives of the press, suburban, reached their final destination, and seated in the dining room, and away over the railroad to their homes. J. R. Kendrick, Esq., General Manager of the Company, and Capt. J. J. Kendrick, accompanied the party, and efforts to ensure the pleasure and safety of the party were eminently successful. In conclusion we would express the sentiments of every participant in the excursion, that the Old Colony Railroad and Steamboat Company are fully entitled to the thanks of every traveler over their route to New York for their comfort, safety and convenient service. Long may they breed the deep in storm and calm.
