## Poster Dance Helps Red Cross

One had cause to be surprised by the many excellent posters exhibited, but one who knows Carmel and what the Red Cross is doing here knows that the chapter is accomplishing tasks that put to shame many a larger community.

In conjunction with the exhibition, an auction of three paintings, donated by DeNeale Morgan, and eleven kelp dolls, donated by children of the Big Sur district, was conducted.

Talbert Josselyn, Jack Gribner and Ernest Schweninger were the auctioneers, disposing of the paintings for \$27.75 and the dolls for \$29.25.

The door receipts amounted to \$67.40, making a total of \$124.40 receipts of the affair.

## Interesting Events at the Old Mission

The famous old Mission of Carmel will be the scene of a most unusual and interesting event on Sunday afternoon, when Rev. R. M. Mestres, robed in the gorgeous cope that once was worn by Padre Junipero Serra, will celebrate the beautiful service of Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament, for the first time that Carmel Mission has witnessed this rite since California became United States territory.

The service will be the climax of an afternoon of unusual events in the old mission.

Horace Britt, the eminent cellist, is to give a recital. A platform has been placed near the tomb where the body of Father Serra lies, and from this platform the celebrated artist will play.

Michael Williams, author and lecturer, will deliver what is termed a "Story-Lecture," on "Junipero Serra: Founder of California Civilization."

The hour is 3 o'clock; and admittance 25 cents.

## Echoes From the Firing Line

Letter from a French Marquise, who has been a nurse in a military hospital since the beginning of the war.

"Pardon me for my delay in writing, but I have been very busy lately preparing for my departure soon for an ambulance where I shall be busy part of the summer.

"As our hospital at Mentaure has few wounded at present, one of my friends has asked me to assist her in a service of surgery, which is most interesting. As she assures me I can be very useful, I leave with great joy, after a leave of absence from Mentaure, and permission from my husband. His permission is required now by the Department of Health. As soon as I arrive at my new post I shall write you my impressions and experiences.

"Your compatriots are already at Rouen, charming little persons, very pretty dress, and very military in their aspect for nurses.

"It is with great emotion that we learned in France of the beautiful attitude of your country. It seems to me that across the sea our hands and hearts are joined. May God bless you all and help us to drive out and conquer our cruel enemies.

"I have just passed six very agreeable weeks at Rome. It has been such a long time since I have been able to do so. I followed the advice of our minister, Violette, and instead of planting flowers in my garden I have planted vegetables everywhere. I have beds of potatoes with borders of salads, clumps of corn with borders of beets. Cabbage replaces geraniums, and really it is not ugly at all. Anyway, my gardener loves flowers and has placed a few of them about everywhere. He does not want to destroy the dahlias, begonias and fuchsias. Consequently my garden is charming. I say it without modesty, as of a precious thing I may never see again. You may ask, 'who is to eat all these precious products?' I have the opportunity to send to my little hospital at Mentaure great baskets of fruits and vegetables twice a week.

"Here in the country we have not suffered as yet by lack of material things. One can find almost all the necessities; they are more expensive, to be sure. But everyone practices such rigid economies in dress and household expenses that it is not hard to get on. The working people suffer—except those who work in the factories for war materials. They form the inelegant class of "Nouveaux Riches," and while the "New Poor" plant salad and cabbages in their flower gardens, the "New Rich" dress in horrible costly style and eat all the best cuts."

## An Affair Long to be Remembered

One of the important events of the season took place last Sunday afternoon in Manzanita Hall when a group of our best known musicians generously gave their talent for the benefit of Carmel Red Cross chapter.

First on the program was a

recital by violin, piano and piano, by Cesar Cui, and played with much grace and delicacy by Messrs. Puyans and Persinger of the San Francisco Symphony Orchestra, and Mr. Shavitch. This was followed by a Legende of Saint Saens and intermezzo of Lalo, which Mr. Horace Britt rendered with great feeling and a sureness of touch truly delightful. He was most fortunate to have such an excellent accompanist as Vladimir Shavitch, who is himself a soloist of wide reputation.

Tina Lerner, famous Russian pianist, played a gavotte by Sgambat, Ecossaises by Chopin, Berceuse by Paul Juon, and the Polonaise in E Major by Liszt—an interesting selection, magnificently played.

Next came Mr. Persinger with a serenade and mazurka by the Russian composer Weinawski. Of course the concert master of the San Francisco Symphony Orchestra needs no introduction to the public, but that we in Carmel had the privilege of hearing him, is something long to be remembered.

The finale was the allegro from Trio Op. 92 of Saint Saens, excellently rendered by Shavitch, Persinger and Britt.

The hall was crowded to its utmost capacity, even standing room being sold out. Each group of pieces was heartily applauded and acknowledged by encores. Alfred Hertz, actor of the San Francisco Orchestra, and his wife, instead of occupying their complimentary seats, chose to add enthusiasm and inspiration to the artists in the green room.

Warren D. Allen and Howard Hansen, dean of the Pacific Conservatory and head of the theory department there, respectively, who will appear in two piano recitals, and others.

The first of this series will take place about August 3, and Mr. Allen, who is instrumental in securing a course of such merit for Carmel, states that the public will be given an opportunity to hear music of true worth.

Tickets will soon be on sale for the course, but the event next Monday will be without charge, and the public in general is invited to attend.
