Echoes Fromthe Firing Line

Letter from a French Marquise, who has been a nurse in a military hospital since the beginning of the war.

"Pardon me for my delay in writing, but I have been very busy lately preparing for my departure soon for an ambulance where I shall be busy part of the summer.

"As our hospital at Mentaure has few wounded at present, one of my friends has asked me to assist her in a service of surgery, which is most interesting. As she assures me I can be very useful, I leave with great joy, after a leave of absence from Mentaure, and permission from my husband. His permission is required now by the Department of Health. As soon as I arrive at my new post I shall write you my impressions and experiences.

"Your compatriots are already at Rouen, charming little persons, very pressing dressed and very military in a culte white in wieling their aspect for nurses.

"It is with great emotion that we learned in France of the beautiful attitude of your country. It seems to me that across the sea our hands and hearts are joined. May God bless you all and help us to drive out and conquor our cruel enemies

"I have just passed six very ag greeable weeks at flome. It has been such a long time since I have been able to do so. I followed the advise of our minister, Violette, and instead of planting flowers in my gar den I have planted vegetables every where. I have beds of potatoes with borders of salads, clumps of corn with borders of beets. Cabbage replaces geraniums, and really it is not ugly at all. Anyway, my gar dener loves flowers and has placed a few of them about everywhere. He does not want to destroy the dahlias, begonias and fuchias. Consequently my garden is charming I say it without modesty, as of a precious thing I may never see agair. You may ask, who is to eat all these precious products?'.
