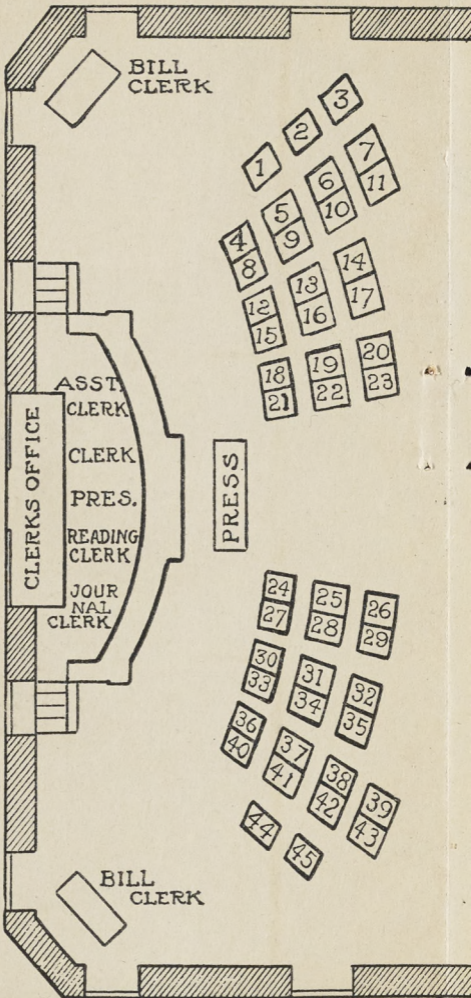

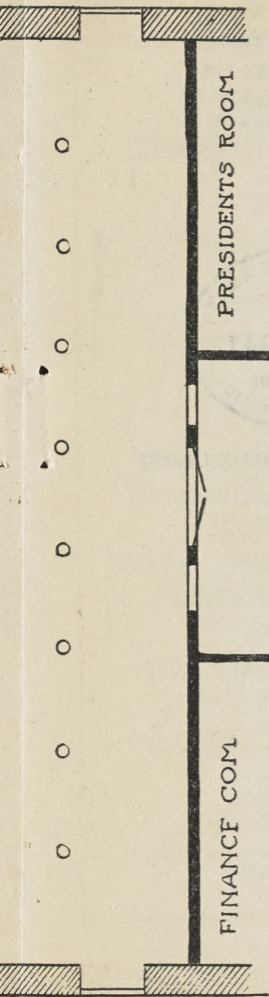
DIAGRAM OF SENATE CHAMBER

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THE LEGISLATIVE POWER OF THE STATE OF SOUTH CAROLINA

Is vested (under the Constitution adopted in Convention December 4, 1895), in the "Senate" and the "House of Representatives," together composing the "General Assembly."

Constitutional Provisions.

ANNUAL SESSIONS—Held (in the State House) in Columbia on the second Tuesday in January. No limitation on length of session, which by custom is usually forty days.

ADJOURNMENTS—During the session "neither House shall, without the consent of the other, adjourn for more than three days, nor to any other place than that in which it shall be at the time sitting." Should either house be without a quorum for 5 days, or should the two Houses disagree as to the time of adjournment, the Governor may adjourn them to such time as he shall think proper.

SALARIES—"Members shall not receive any compensation for more than 40 days of any one session," regular and extra (by statute this is fixed at \$200), and shall receive "five cents for every mile for ordinary route of travel in going to and returning from" Columbia. "No General Assembly may increase the per diem of its own Members."

MEMBERS PROTECTED—"Members shall be protected in their persons and estates during their attendance on, going to and returning from the General Assembly, and ten days previous to the sitting and ten days after the adjournment," except where a Member is "charged with treason, felony or breach of the peace."

RIGHT OF PUNISHMENT—Each House may punish by imprisonment during its sitting any non member guilty of disrespect, disorderly or contemptuous behavior in its presence, or who shall threaten harm to any member for anything said or done in either House, or who shall assault or arrest any person ordered to attend the House, in going or returning, or who shall rescue any person arrested by order of the House.

BILLS AND ACTS—"Bills for raising revenue shall originate in the House of Repre-

sentatives." "Every Act shall relate to but one subject, and that shall be expressed in the title."

"No Bill shall have the force of law until read three times and on three several days in each House, has had the Great Seal of the State affixed, and been signed by the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House." Under the Rules of both Houses, Bills are read the first and the third time by titles only.

TERMS OF OFFICE—"The terms of office of Members chosen at a general election begin on the Monday following such election."

OATH OF OFFICE—All Members and all officers before they enter upon their duties, shall subscribe to the following oath: "I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I am duly qualified, according to the Constitution of this State, to exercise the duties of the office to which I have been elected, and that I will, to the best of my ability, discharge the duties thereof, and preserve, protect and defend the Constitution of this State and of the United States. I do further solemnly swear (or affirm) that I have not since the first day of January, in the year 1881, engaged in a duel as principal or second or otherwise; and that I will not, during the term of office to which I have been elected, engage in a duel as principal or second or otherwise. So help me God."

THE SENATE

Composed of one Member elected from each of the 45 Counties, elected for four years, so classified that one-half are chosen every two years.

Senators must be duly qualified electors in their own Counties and must be at least twenty-five years of age.

THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

Composed of 124 Members, assigned to the several Counties so as to allow "one Representative to every 124th part of the whole number of inhabitants in the State," which ratio under the United States Census of 1910, is one Representative to every 12,221 persons.

Each County constitutes one Election District. Members must be qualified electors in their own Counties and must be at least 21 years old.

C.; moved to Columbia in 1903, thence to Spartanburg in 1911, returning to Columbia in 1915; married Miss Anna Verina Tribble, of Anderson, in 1915; is manager C. C. Pearce & Co. of Columbia, member of Pearce-Edwards Co. of Spartanburg, Pearce, Woods & Co. of Greenville.

C. Dental Asscn.; now president County Corn Growers' Asscn. and Batesburg Board of Trade, Moderator Ridge Baptist Asscn., trustee S. C. Baptist Hospital; member of House 1909-10, Senate 1917-18.
- ***ROBINSON**, Frank Cook (McCormick County)—Banker, at McCormick; born Oct. 2, 1870, near McCormick; graduated Furman Univ., 1902; married Miss Annie P. Talbert, of McCormick, in 1899; is cashier Farmers' Bank; member of House from Abbeville Co., 1913-1916, Senate 1917-18, as first and only representative of McCormick Co.

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RULES OF THE SENATE

Adopted January 14, 1918.

RULE 1.**TIME OF MEETING.**

The Senate, on the first day of a session, shall convene at 12 o'clock m., and on adjournment, shall stand adjourned until 12 o'clock m. of the following day, Sunday excepted, unless otherwise ordered by a majority vote of the members present.

RULE 2.**ATTENDANCE, DUTIES AND OBLIGATIONS OF SENATORS—QUORUM.**

Any member or officer of the Senate who shall absent himself from the service of the Senate, without leave of the Senate first obtained, shall forfeit his pay while so absent; and in case a less number than a quorum of the Senate shall convene, they are hereby authorized to send the Sergeant-at-Arms or any person or persons by them authorized for any or all absent members, as the majority of such members present shall agree, at the expense of such absent members, respectively, unless such excuse for non-attendance shall be made as the Senate, when a quorum is convened, shall deem good and sufficient: and in that case the expense shall be included in the contingent expenses of the Senate. This rule shall apply as well to the first convention of the Senate, at the legal time of meeting, as to each day of the session after the hour to which the Senate stood adjourned has arrived. If at any time during the daily session of the Senate it is ascertained that there is not a quorum present, no business shall be in order except a call of the Senate, an order to send for absentees, or a motion to adjourn until a quorum shall be present.

RULE 3.**READING OF JOURNAL.**

The President having taken the chair, and a quorum being present, the Journal of the preceding day shall be read, unless the reading is dispensed with by a vote of the Senate, to the end that any mistakes that may be made in the entries shall be corrected.

RULE 4.

DECORUM OF SENATORS.

When the President is in the chair, no Senator shall pass him with his head covered, nor shall any Senator pass between the President and a Senator who is speaking.

RULE 5.

WHICH SENATOR ENTITLED TO FLOOR.

When two or more Senators rise to speak at the same time, the Senator who first addresses the President shall have the floor, and the President shall so announce it.

RULE 6.

SENATORS SHALL ADDRESS PRESIDENT.

Every Senator, when speaking, shall address the President, standing in his place, and when he has finished shall take his seat.

RULE 7.

QUESTIONS OF ORDER—APPEAL FROM PRESIDENT'S DECISION.

If any Senator, in speaking or otherwise, transgress the Rules of the Senate, the presiding officer shall, or any member may, call to order; and when a member shall be called to order by the President or a Senator, he shall sit down, and shall not proceed without leave of the Senate; and every question of order shall be decided by the President, without debate, subject to an appeal to the Senate; and the President may call for the sense of the Senate on any question of order.

RULE 8.

MAY SPEAK TWICE IN ONE DEBATE.

No Senator shall speak more than twice in any one debate, on the same day, without leave of the Senate.

RULE 9.

ENDORSEMENT OF PAPERS.

No Senator shall present any Bill or other paper, except an amendment, without having first endorsed the subject matter thereof and his name.

RULE 10.**REPORTS, HOW MADE.**

Reports must be separately made and on not less than half a sheet of paper, and shall be signed by the Chairman or the majority of the Committee.

RULE 11.**MOTION NOT DEBATABLE UNTIL SECONDED.**

No motion shall be debated until the same shall have been seconded.

RULE 12.**WRITING AND WITHDRAWAL OF MOTIONS.
MOTIONS NOT DEBATABLE.**

When a motion shall have been made and seconded, it shall be reduced to writing, if desired by the President or any member, delivered in at the table and read before the same shall be debated; and any motion may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before a decision, amendment or ordering of the yeas and nays, except a motion to reconsider, which shall not be withdrawn without leave of the Senate. And no motion for the reconsideration of any vote shall be in order after the matter shall have gone out of the possession of the Senate, nor shall any motion to reconsider be in order unless made on the same day on which the vote was taken, or within the next two days of the actual session of the Senate thereafter, and by a Senator voting with the prevailing side.

RULE 13.**MOTIONS NOT DEBATABLE.**

Motions to adjourn and lay on the table shall be decided without debate.

RULE 14.**PRIVILEGED MOTIONS.**

When a question is under debate, no motion shall be entertained but

1. To adjourn.
2. To take up the order of the day.
3. To lay on the table.
4. To postpone to a day certain.
5. To postpone indefinitely.
6. To strike out the enacting clause.
7. To commit.
8. To amend.

Which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they are above arranged, and the first four of which shall be determined without debate. A motion to lay an amendment on the table being agreed to, shall not have the effect of disposing of the main question.

Provided, That the debate on any question and the time when such question shall be voted upon may be fixed by a vote of two-thirds of the Senate; and the debate on the question of fixing such time shall be limited within the discretion of the chair; and such motions shall have precedence of motions numbered 5, 6, 7 and 8.

RULE 15.

YEAS AND NAYS—EVERY SENATOR PRESENT MUST VOTE.

When there is a division of the Senate on any question, and it shall be required by five Senators, the question shall be decided by the yeas and nays; and, on taking the same, no Senator who is absent when the affirmative and negative have both been put and the result announced by the President, shall be allowed to vote without leave of the Senate, and such vote, when allowed, shall not affect the result. In taking the yeas and nays, and upon a call of the Senate, the names of Senators shall be called alphabetically. Under the call of the yeas and nays every Senator present must give his vote one way or the other.

RULE 16.

NOTICE OF PROTEST.

When a Senator intends to protest against any action of the Senate, he shall give notice of his intention so to do immediately after the determination of the matter, and shall be allowed three days and no longer from that time (unless by leave of the Senate) to deliver his protest; but in case of an adjournment *sine die*, such protest, if delivered to the President within three days, shall be entered on the Journal.

RULE 17.

PRESIDENT TO VOTE WHEN SENATE IS EQUALLY DIVIDED.

When the Senate is equally divided on any question, the Clerk shall take the decision of the President, who may assign the reason of his vote.

RULE 18.

A QUESTION MAY BE DIVIDED.

If a question in debate contain several points, any Senator may have the same divided; but on a motion to strike out and insert it shall not be in order to move for a division of the question; but a rejection of a motion to strike out and insert one proposition shall not prevent a motion to strike out and insert a different proposition, nor prevent a subsequent motion simply to strike out; nor shall the rejection of a motion simply to strike out prevent a subsequent motion to strike out and insert.

RULE 19.

HOW COMMITTEES ARE FORMED.

In the appointment of the Standing Committees the Senate shall proceed *viva voce*, severally, to elect the Chairman of each Committee, and then, *viva voce*, the other members necessary to complete the same; and a majority of the whole number of votes given shall be necessary to the choice of a Chairman of a Standing Committee. In all other elections a plurality of votes shall make a choice. All other Committees shall be appointed by the President, unless the Senate differently directs. When any subject or matter shall have been referred to a Committee, any other subject or matter of a similar nature may, on motion, be referred to such Committee.

RULE 20.

STANDING COMMITTEES.

The following Standing Committees—each Committee to consist of not less than five nor more than twelve Senators—shall be appointed at the commencement of each session, with leave to report by Bill or otherwise:

- 1st. A Committee on Agriculture.
- 2d. A Committee on Claims and Grievances.
- 3d. A Committee on Commerce and Manufactures.
- 4th. A Committee on Charitable Institutions.
- 5th. A Committee on County Offices and Officers.
- 6th. A Committee on Education.
- 7th. A Committee on Engrossed Bills.

8th. A Committee on Enrolled Bills of the Senate.

9th. A Committee on Federal Relations.

10th. A Committee on Finance.

11th. A Committee on Immigration.

12th. A Committee on Incorporations.

13th. A Committee on Judiciary.

14th. A Committee on Legislative Library.

15th. A Committee on Medical Affairs.

16th. A Committee on Military.

17th. A Committee on Mines and Mining.

18th. A Committee on Printing.

19th. A Committee on Privileges and Elections.

20th. A Committee on Public Buildings.

21st. A Committee on Public Lands.

22d. A Committee on Railroads and Internal Improvements.

23d. A Committee on Retrenchment.

24th. A Committee on Roads, Bridges and Ferries.

25th. A Committee on Rules of the Senate.

26th. A Committee on the State Penitentiary.

27th. A Committee to Audit and Control the Contingent Expenses of the Senate.

28th. A Committee on Banking and Insurance.

29th. A Committee on Police Regulations.

30th. A Committee on Fish, Game and Forestry.

31st. A Committee on Local Legislation.

RULE 21.

PROCEDURE IN FILLING BLANKS.

In filling up blanks the largest sum and the longest time shall be first put.

RULE 22.

PRIORITY OF BUSINESS NOT DEBATABLE.

All questions relating to the priority of business to be acted upon shall be settled without debate.

RULE 23.

APPEAL FROM DECISION OF PRESIDENT.

Senators shall have the right of appeal from the decisions of the President.

RULE 24.

BILLS REFERRED TO COMMITTEES.

After commitment and report of a Bill to the Senate, or at any time before its passage, it may be recommitted.

RULE 25.

BILL REFERRED TO COMMITTEES,

All Bills or Joint Resolutions when first read shall be referred to the appropriate Committees and printed; but no Bill or Joint Resolution coming before the Senate shall be amended previous to being acted upon as in Committee of the Whole.

RULE 26.

CLAUSES MUST RELATE TO THE GENERAL SUBJECT.

No clause shall be inserted in a Bill unless the same relates to the general subject of the Bill.

RULE 27.

SECOND READING BILLS CONSIDERED IN COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE.

All Bills on a second reading shall first be considered by the Senate in the same manner as if the Senate were in Committee of the Whole, before they shall be taken up and proceeded on by the Senate, agreeably to the Standing Rules, unless otherwise ordered; and when the Senate shall consider a Bill or Resolution as in Committee of the Whole, the President, or President *pro tempore*, may call a member to fill the chair during the time the Senate shall remain in Committee of the Whole, and the Chairman so called shall, during such time, have the power of a President *pro tempore*.

RULE 28.

AMENDMENTS ON SECOND AND THIRD READING.

The final question upon the second reading of every Bill, Resolution, Constitutional Amendment, or motion, originating in the Senate, and requiring three readings previous to being passed, shall be, "Whether it shall be engrossed and read a third time?" and whenever an amendment is offered at a third reading of any Bill, Resolution, amendment or motion, the same shall be debata-

ble as in Committee of the Whole. It shall at all times be in order before the final passage of any such Bill, Resolution, Constitutional Amendment, or motion, to move its commitment; and should such commitment take place, and amendment be reported by the Committee, the said Bill, Resolution, Constitutional Amendment, or motion, shall be again read a second time and considered as in Committee of the Whole, and then the aforesaid question shall again be put. And no amendment shall be received on the third reading of a Bill, unless by previous notice, or by unanimous consent of the Senate.

RULE 29.

PRESENTATION OF PAPERS.

Senators, when presenting petitions, memorials or reports, shall make a brief statement of the subject matter of such paper, and send it to the President, when it shall be read by the Reading Clerk, unless otherwise ordered.

RULE 30.

MESSAGE TO THE HOUSE.

All messages to the House of Representatives shall be sent by either of the Clerks, as directed by the President.

RULE 31.

CLERK CHARGED WITH PRINTING.

The Clerk shall be charged with the duty of having executed, in a proper and accurate manner, the printing ordered by the Senate.

RULE 32.

ALL PAPERS TO BE DELIVERED TO CLERK AT CLOSE OF SESSION.

At the close of every session the members of the Senate shall be required to hand in to the Clerk all petitions not reported on, and all papers in anywise appertaining to the legislative business of the Senate, that the same may be regularly filed in his office.

RULE 33.

EXECUTIVE SESSIONS.

When acting on confidential or executive business, the Senate shall be cleared of all persons except the Secretary, the Principal or Executive Clerk, Assistant Clerk, Read-

ing Clerk, the Sergeant-at-Arms, Doorkeeper and Assistant Doorkeeper, all of whom shall be sworn officers of the body.

When nominations shall be made by the Governor to the Senate, the final question on every nomination shall be: "Will the Senate advise and consent to this nomination?" and the consideration of such nominations may be had on the same day on which they are received by the Senate.

Messages containing nominations to the Senate may be published in the Journal, when received, as other messages, and the fact that a nomination has been made, or that it has been confirmed or rejected, shall not be regarded as a secret. But all information communicated, or remarks made by a Senator when acting upon nominations, concerning the character or qualifications of the person nominated, also all votes upon any nomination, shall be kept secret.

Other messages from the Governor pertaining to confidential matters shall be subject to such secrecy or publication as the Senate, in each instance, may order.

RULE 34.

NO THIRD READING OF BILL ON LAST DAY.

No Bill shall be read a third time on the day fixed for the adjournment of the Senate.

RULE 35.

CALENDAR OF CONTINUED BILLS.

When the General Orders of the Day shall be taken up, any Senator may move to continue a matter, when called on the Calendar, to the next session: and if the Senate agree thereto the matter shall be thereunto continued, and the Clerk of the Senate shall make up a Calendar of all matters so continued, placing the same thereon in the order in which they have been continued: and at the ensuing session the continued matters shall be taken up and considered in the same stage in which they were when so continued: and matters ordered to be placed in the General Orders at the said ensuing session shall be placed there in turn and have priority according to the last order for consideration made upon them, and the Calendar shall be preceded in as hereinbefore provided. A motion to continue shall have precedence of a motion to lay on the table, and shall be decided after such re-

marks as the presiding officer may, in his discretion, permit.

RULE 36.

BILLS TO BE PRINTED.

All Bills reported by a Committee shall, after the first reading, be printed for the use of the Senate; but no other paper or documents shall be printed for the use of the Senate without special order.

RULE 37.

ADMISSION TO FLOOR OF SENATE.

No person shall be admitted to the floor of the Senate while in session, except as follows, viz.: The officers of the Senate, members of the House of Representatives and their Clerk, the Governor and his Private Secretary, State Officers, Justices of the Supreme Court, President and Vice-President of the United States, members of Congress, Governors of States and Territories, State Printer, and such other persons as the President of the Senate may see fit to invite to a seat on the floor of the Senate.

RULE 38.

PLACES ASSIGNED TO REPORTERS.

Reporters of public journals upon application of the proprietors thereof, shall be assigned such places for the execution of their duties as shall not interfere with the convenience of the Senate.

RULE 39.

BILLS TO RECEIVE THIRD READING.

Every Bill shall receive three different readings, on three different days, previous to its being passed, and the President shall give notice of each, whether it be the first, second or third reading. And all Resolutions to which the approval and signature of the Governor may be requisite, or which may grant money out of the contingent or any other funds, shall be treated in all respects, as to introduction and form of proceeding on them in the Senate, as Bills; and all other Resolutions and Reports of Committees shall lie on the table one day for consideration. The first and third readings of each Bill shall be by its title only:

Provided, That on each third reading the Bill shall be read in full on the demand of any Senator.

RULE 40.

PRECEDENCE OF MOTIONS TO REFER.

A motion to refer to a Standing Committee shall take precedence of a motion to refer to a Special Committee.

RULE 41.

SUSPENDING AND AMENDING RULES.

Either of the foregoing Rules may be suspended by unanimous consent of the Senate; and without unanimous consent, one day's previous notice shall be given of a motion to amend, rescind or suspend either of the foregoing Rules; and for the adoption of such a motion a two-third vote of the Senators present shall be necessary.

RULE 42.

JEFFERSON'S MANUAL TO GOVERN OTHER CASES.

In all cases not embraced by the foregoing Rules, the Senate shall be governed by such rules as are laid down in Jefferson's Manual of Parliamentary Practice.

RULE 43.

PRINTED BILLS TO BE ON DESKS.

No Bill or Joint Resolution shall receive a second reading unless printed copies of the same shall have been laid on the desks of the members at least one day previous to such reading.

RULE 44.

TITLE TO BILLS TO AMEND OR REPEAL.

Every Bill or Joint Resolution which shall propose the amendment or repeal of any Section, Chapter or Title of the General Statutes, or of any Act of Assembly or Joint Resolution, shall in its title express the subject matter of such Section, Chapter, Title, Act or Joint Resolution so sought to be amended or repealed. Every Bill or Joint Resolution proposing to amend any Section or Sections of any Chapter of the General Statutes, or of any Act of Assembly or Joint Resolution, shall give the full text of the said Section or Sections, as it or they would read, with such amendment or amendments inserted therein.

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RULES OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

Adopted January 14, 1918.

RULE 1.

DAILY SESSIONS—CALLING HOUSE TO ORDER—QUORUM.

The hour to which the House shall stand adjourned every day shall be 10 o'clock a. m. of the succeeding day (except Saturday, when the House shall stand adjourned to 12 o'clock on the succeeding Monday), unless otherwise ordered by the House.

At the hour to which the House shall stand adjourned on any day the Clerk shall call the roll, and immediately thereafter the Speaker shall take the chair and call the members to order.

If a quorum be present, the Journal of the proceedings of the preceding day shall be read, and corrected, if necessary. If a quorum then or at any other time be not present, the members present, if twenty or more, may send for the absent members; and all questions as to expenses or further proceedings against such absent members shall be determined when a quorum shall be present.

RULE 2.

DECORUM OF MEMBERS.

When the House is called to order, every member shall take his seat, and shall, during the sitting, act with decorum becoming a gentleman. The members may keep on their hats while actually sitting in their respective seats, but at all other times they shall be uncovered (except such as shall be conscientiously restrained from uncovering their heads).

RULE 3.

MEMBERS MAY BE CALLED TO ORDER.

The Speaker shall preserve order and decorum. If any member, in speaking or otherwise, transgress the Rules of the House or Parliamentary Law, as practiced or recognized by the House, the Speaker shall, or any member may, call him to order.

RULE 4.

PROCEDURE WHEN MEMBER CALLED TO ORDER.

If a member shall be called to order while speaking, he shall immediately take his seat until the question of order be decided, unless allowed to proceed upon explanation. If the decision be in favor of the member, he shall proceed; if otherwise, he shall not proceed without leave of the House; and, if the case require it, he shall be liable to such other proceedings as the House may take.

RULE 5.

CHAIR TO DECIDE QUESTION OF ORDER.

If one member on the floor call another to order for words spoken, the exceptionable words shall be taken down in writing by the member objecting, then read, admitted, denied or explained, by the member who spoke, and handed to the Chair, upon which the question of order shall be decided, and proceedings had as provided in the Fourth Rule.

RULE 6.

MEMBER NAMED FOR DISORDER TO WITHDRAW.

If, in any manner, repeated cries of order shall not produce order, the Speaker may call by his name any member obstinately persisting in irregularity: whereupon, if the Speaker deem it necessary, he shall state the offense committed. The member may be heard in his exculpation and shall withdraw, and the House shall consider of the punishment to be inflicted, or further proceeding to be had.

RULE 7.

GALLERY OR LOBBY MAY BE CLEARED—CONTEMPT PROCEEDINGS.

In case of any disturbance or disorderly conduct in the gallery or lobby, the Speaker or Chairman of the Committee of the Whole shall have power to order the place to be cleared, or any member may move for such order; and any person guilty of a contempt of the House may be ordered into custody by the House, and dealt with as may by it be deemed proper.

RULE 8.

MEMBER MAY APPEAL FROM DECISION.

All questions of order shall be determined by the Speaker in the first instance, without debate, or with such debate as the Speaker, at his discretion, may permit; but any member may appeal to the House from the decision of the Speaker, on which appeal no member shall speak more than once without leave of the House.

RULE 9.

SPEAKER MAY INFORM BUT NOT DEBATE

The Speaker may give information or explain any matter before the House; he may speak on points of order in preference to other members, and as often as he may deem necessary; but he shall not enter into any debate or endeavor to influence any question before the House.

RULE 10.

DECORUM WHEN SPEAKING.

Every member, when about to speak, shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to "Mr. Speaker," and, in speaking, shall avoid disrespect to the House or to the Senate, and all personalities; and he shall confine himself to the question under consideration.

RULE 11.

WHEN MEMBERS ADDRESS THE SPEAKER.

The Speaker, when addressed by a member who rises in order, shall name the member, using no title but that of "Mr." The member who shall rise first in order shall be first heard; and if several rise about the same time, the Speaker shall decide who was first up.

RULE 12.

MEMBERS MAY SPEAK NOT MORE THAN TWICE ON SAME QUESTION.

No member shall speak more than twice to the same question without leave of the House, except merely to explain his meaning, even if the debate on the question should be continued for many days.

RULE 13.

PENALTY FOR ABSENCE WITHOUT LEAVE.

If any member shall absent himself without leave, he may be sent for and made to pay expenses, and kept in custody, at the discretion of the House.

RULE 14.

CALL OF THE HOUSE.

Upon a call of the House being ordered, the Clerk shall call the roll of members and note the absentees; the names of the absentees shall then be called over at such intervals and as often as the House may direct; proclamation may be made and messengers sent to require the attendance of members; and, if the House shall not dispense with further proceedings, the doors may be closed; absentees (for whom no sufficient excuse is made) may be taken into custody as they appear, or they may be sent for and taken into custody wherever to be found, and each detained in custody, and made to pay fees, at the discretion of the House.

RULE 15.

FEEES OF HOUSE MESSENGER.

The fees of the regular messenger, or of any special messenger, to be appointed by the House, shall be two dollars for any arrest; for each day's custody and for the discharge, one dollar; for traveling expenses, going and returning, ten cents a mile.

RULE 16.

SPEAKER TO APPOINT COMMITTEES,

All Committees shall be appointed by the Speaker, unless otherwise specially directed by the House, in which case they shall be elected by a *viva voce* vote.

RULE 17.

STANDING COMMITTEES.

As soon as practicable after the first meeting of the House succeeding a general election the following Standing Committees shall be appointed, to serve until the next general election, or until a special order to the contrary be made by the House:

A Committee on Privileges and Elections, one of whom at least shall be from each Congressional District.

- A Committee on Ways and Means.
- A Committee on the Judiciary.
- A Committee on Agriculture.
- A Committee on Local Legislation.
- A Committee on Claims.
- A Committee on Roads, Bridges and Ferries.
- A Committee on Railroads.
- A Committee on Education.
- A Committee on State House and Grounds.
- A Committee on Fish, Game and Forestry.
- A Committee on Accounts.
- A Committee on the Military.
- A Committee on the Penitentiary.
- A Committee on Commerce and Manufacturers.
- A Committee on Offices and Officers.
- A Committee on the State Hospital for the Insane.
- A Committee on Banking and Insurance.
- A Committee on Police Regulations.
- A Medical Committee.
- A Committee on Public Printing.
- A Committee on Engrossed Bills.
- A Committee on Legislative Library.
- A Committee on Enrolled Acts.
- A Committee on Rules, to consist of five members.

RULE 18.

SERVICE ON COMMITTEES,

Any member appointed to serve on a Committee may be excused by the House, and he shall be entitled to claim his excuse if he be at the time of his appointment a member of three other Committees; but members of the Committee on the Judiciary and the Committee on Ways and Means shall not be placed on any other Standing Committee, except the Committee on Rules.

RULE 19.

WHEN COMMITTEE MAY BE CHANGED.

After a Committee has been appointed no addition to it or change shall be made, on motion, except to fill a vacancy or excuse a member.

RULE 20.

ELIGIBILITY OF MEMBERS OF COMMITTEES.

No member shall be appointed on a Committee before he shall have been sworn and have taken his seat. Any member who shall be sworn after the general announcement of the Committees shall, within a few days afterward, be placed by the Speaker on one or more Standing Committees, even although the number of the Committee should thereby be extended beyond the regular number.

RULE 21.

ATTENDANCE AT COMMITTEE MEETINGS.

A majority of a Committee shall, when assembled, constitute a quorum for business. If the members fail, to the probable delay or neglect of business, to form a quorum, upon the summons of the Chairman, or if individual members frequently fail to attend the meetings of the Committee, the Chairman shall report the delinquency to the House, which shall, in its discretion, take order for the censure of the delinquents, or other suitable proceeding.

RULE 22.

SITTINGS OF COMMITTEES,

No Committee, without special leave, shall sit during the sitting of the House, except that the Committee on Engrossed Bills, the Committee on Enrolled Acts, and any Committee of Free Conference, may sit at any time, and may report at any time when a message might be received. All Committees shall have leave to report by Bill or otherwise.

RULE 23.

DIVISION VOTE OF HOUSE.

If, upon a question taken by acclamation, the Speaker doubts, or a division be called for, the House shall divide by those in the affirmative first rising from their seats, then those in the negative. If the Speaker still doubts, or a count be required, the Speaker shall name one member from each side to tell the numbers in the affirmative and those in the negative, and from their report shall state the decision.

RULE 24.

WHEN AYES AND NOES SHALL BE ORDERED.

Upon any question, at the request of any ten members, who may signify their request by rising, the ayes and noes shall be ordered; whereupon, at the decision, the Clerk shall call the roll and take the names of all who vote aye, and all who vote no, which he shall enter on the Journal.

RULE 25.

PROCEEDINGS GOVERNING AYES AND NOES.

When a question is to be taken by ayes and noes, after the House is ready for the question, and the same has been stated, and the first response has been made to the Clerk's call, the debate shall cease, the Doorkeeper shall close the door and keep it closed until the decision shall have been announced by the Speaker. After the door has been thus closed, no member, when called by the Clerk, shall say more than "aye" or "no." Every member who may be in the House when called shall (unless the House shall have before excused him, or shall afterwards excuse him from voting on the question), give his vote under the penalty of such proceeding as the House may, after decision, in its discretion, adopt to punish his contempt. No member shall, under any circumstances, be permitted to vote after the decision shall have been announced by the Chair. After the decision of the question, a member absent may be permitted to record the vote he would have given if present, but such vote shall not affect the previous question.

RULE 26.

WHEN MEMBER SHALL NOT VOTE.

No member shall vote on any question of a private nature in the event of which he is personally or pecuniarily interested.

RULE 27.

**SPEAKER TO VOTE LAST—EQUAL VOTE
REJECTS THE QUESTION.**

The Speaker shall vote in all cases (except when he may be personally or pecuniarily interested or shall be excused), his name being called last in the ayes and noes.

If with his vote the House be equally divided, the question shall be decided in the negative.

RULE 28.

WHEN DEBATE IS IN ORDER.

No motion shall be debated until it shall have been seconded and stated by the Speaker. When moved and seconded, any motion shall, if desired by the Speaker or any other member, be reduced to writing, and delivered in at the table and read, before it shall be debated.

RULE 29.

MOVER MAY WITHDRAW QUESTION.

The mover may withdraw any question or proposition before an amendment or decision, except a demand for the ayes and noes, after the same has been ordered.

RULE 30.

NO NOTICE REQUIRED TO INTRODUCE BILL.

No notice shall be required of a member of his intention to introduce a Bill.

RULE 31.

HOW PAPERS MUST BE ENDORSED.

Every Bill, before presentation, shall have its title endorsed; every report, its title at length; every petition, memorial or other paper, its prayer or substance; and, in every instance, the name of the member presenting any paper shall be indorsed, and the papers shall be presented by the member to the Speaker at the desk. And every Bill or Joint Resolution which shall propose the amendment or repeal of any Section, Chapter or Title of the General Statutes, or of any Act of Assembly or Joint Resolution, shall, in its title, express the subject matter of such Section, Chapter, Title, Act or Joint Resolution, so sought to be amended or repealed. If this be not complied with, the paper shall not be received by the Speaker. Every Bill or Joint Resolution proposing to amend any Section or Sections of any Chapter of the General Statutes, or of any Act of Assembly or Joint Resolution, shall give the full text of the said Section or Sections as it or they would read with such amend-

ment or amendments inserted therein. And if this latter clause of this Rule be not complied with, the Bill or Joint Resolution shall be amended so as to conform to this Rule before it be considered by the House.

RULE 32.

HOUSE MAY DECLINE TO RECEIVE ANY QUESTION.

When any motion or proposition shall be made, before any debate or order on the subject, the Speaker, at his pleasure, may, or, upon the demand of any member, shall put the question:

"Will the House now receive this?" which question shall be decided without debate; and if it be decided in the negative, the matter shall be as if not presented and shall not again be presented that day. If no such question be put, the matter, if in order, shall be received without question. In like manner, upon any petition, or other paper, the question of receiving may be made: but otherwise, it shall be received and disposed of.

RULE 33.

DILATORY MOTION NOT ENTERTAINED.

No dilatory motion shall be entertained by the Speaker.

RULE 34.

SUSPENSION OF QUESTION OR SPEECH

A question before the House shall be suspended by—1, a message; 2, a Report of the Committee on Engrossed Bills, but Bills reported by said Committee shall only be read as provided in subsequent Rules; 3, a Report of the Committee on Enrolled Acts; 4, a Report of a Committee of Free Conference; 5, a question of order; 6, a question of privilege; 7, a question of taking a recess; 8, any other incidental question, such as of reading papers, dividing a question, withdrawing a motion, excusing a member from voting, or the like: of which the seven first named may suspend even a speech: Provided, That the seventh, if once negatived, be not received during the same speech without the assent of the member speaking.

RULE 35.

DEBATE MAY BE INTERRUPTED.

When a question is under debate, no motion beside those mentioned in the next preceding Rule shall be received, except: 1. To adjourn. 2. To continue. 3. To lay on the table. 4. For the previous question. 5. To postpone indefinitely, or to a day beyond the session. 6. To adjourn the debate to a certain day within the session. 7. To commit or recommit. 8. To amend. Which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they are here arranged, and of these the first and second may be permitted to interrupt a speech; subject to provisions contained in subsequent Rules.*

RULE 36.

PRECEDENCE OF MOTIONS.

A motion to strike out the enacting words of a Bill, or resolving words of a Resolution, shall have precedence of a motion to amend, and, if carried, shall be considered as equivalent to rejection.

RULE 37.

HOW BLANKS SHALL BE FILLED.

In filling a blank with any number or date, the largest number and shortest date proposed shall be first put.

RULE 38.

ORDER OF REFERENCE TO COMMITTEES.

When a motion to refer shall be made, and different Committees be named, the question shall be taken in the following order, viz: The Committee of the Whole, Standing Committee, a Select Committee.

RULE 39.

QUESTION FIRST MOVED TO BE PUT FIRST.

Subject to the exceptions contained in the five Rules next preceding, the question first moved shall be put first.

*See Rules 41, 42.

RULE 40.

DIVISION OF A QUESTION.

Any member may, without debate, call for the division of a question, and the House may divide it if it shall appear to comprehend the question so distinct that, one being taken away, the rest may stand entire for decision. A motion to strike out and insert shall be deemed indivisible; but a motion to strike out being lost shall not be deemed equivalent to agreement, nor shall it preclude either amendment or a motion to strike out and insert.

RULE 41.

NON DEBATABLE MOTIONS.

Motions to adjourn;
 " to take a recess;
 " to continue;
 " to lay on the table;
 " to take up from the table;
 " to take up any matters in the orders of the day not regularly reached;
 " to proceed to the orders of the day;
 " to discharge, lay aside for the day, depart from, or suspend the orders;
 " to postpone indefinitely, or to a day beyond the session;
 " to adjourn a debate;
 shall be decided without debate, after such short conversations as the Speaker may permit.

No motion to lay on the table;
 " " to postpone or adjourn a debate;
 " " to proceed to the general orders of the day; or to commit,
 having been negatived, shall be again allowed at the same stage of the Bill or proposition within one hour of the time when the question was before negatived.

RULE 42.

MOTION TO ADJOURN AND TO RECESS.

Motions for adjournment shall always be in order, except whilst the House is actually engaged in deciding a question by ayes and noes, or in voting *viva voce*, or in balloting; but a motion to adjourn, or to

take a recess, having been negatived, no new motion to adjourn, or take a recess, shall be in order until fifteen minutes shall have elapsed from the decision of the former motion.

RULE 43.

INDEFINITE POSTPONEMENT.

Indefinite postponement shall dispose of the question for the session.

RULE 44.

MOTION TO RECONSIDER.

When a question shall have been once decided in the affirmative or negative, any member who voted with the prevailing side may, on the same day or the next day of the sitting of the House, move for a reconsideration thereof; and if the House shall refuse to reconsider, or upon reconsideration shall affirm its first decision, no further motion shall be in order except by unanimous consent: Provided, That the Bill, Resolution, Message, Report, Amendment, Motion, or the paper upon which the vote was taken shall not have gone out of the possession of the House announcing the former decision. A motion to reconsider may be laid on the table without affecting the question with reference to which the same is made; and if such motion be laid on the table, it shall be deemed a final disposition of the motion.

RULE 45.

PROCEDURE ON FIRST READING.

The first reading of a Bill shall be for information—no amendment shall then be in order. If opposition be then made to the Bill, the question shall be: "Shall this Bill be rejected?" If no opposition be made, or if the question to reject be lost, the Bill shall be referred to some Committee, unless the House unanimously agree, without debate, to dispense with reference.

RULE 46.

FIRST READING BY TITLE ONLY.

Bills shall be read by their title only as a first reading unless the reading of the entire Bill is called for by ten members.

RULE 47.

SECOND READING OF BILL.

The second reading of a Bill shall be Section by Section, and line by line, and word by word—recurrence not being allowed, unless by leave of the House, upon motion, without debate. After the Bill shall have been read, and all amendments and privileged motions (if any) disposed of, the question shall be: "Shall this Bill be ordered to a third reading?" Upon a decision in the affirmative, the order shall be made accordingly. A decision in the negative shall be a rejection.

RULE 48.

THIRD READING OF BILL.

At the third reading of a Bill, the Bill shall be read by its title only, without question, unless the reading of the entire Bill be called for by ten or more members. If the Bill originated in the House, the question then shall be: "Shall this Bill pass and be ordered to be sent to the Senate?" A decision in the negative shall be a rejection. Upon a decision in the affirmative, the order shall be made without question. In the case of a Bill which originated in the Senate (if no amendment has been made by the House), the question shall be: "Shall this Bill pass, the title thereof be changed to an Act, and be ordered enrolled?" If the Bill has been amended in the House, the question shall be: "Shall this Bill pass and be ordered to be returned to the Senate with amendments?" A decision in the negative shall be a rejection. Upon a decision in the affirmative, the order shall be made without question.

RULE 49.

HOUSE BILL AMENDED BY SENATE.

A Bill which originated in the House having been returned from the Senate, with amendments, the Speaker shall call the attention of the House to such amendment. The question then shall be: "Will the House agree to the Senate amendment?" A decision in the negative shall be a rejection. Upon a decision in the affirmative, the title of the Bill shall be changed to an Act, and ordered to be enrolled.

RULE 50.

AMENDMENTS ON THIRD READING.

At the third reading of a Bill, no order or amendment shall be permitted without unanimous consent, except that the Chairman of the Committee on Ways and Means may (if he shall have given notice at the second reading of his intention to offer amendments at the third) be permitted to offer amendments to any Bill to raise supplies or to make appropriations, such as may be pertinent to the Bill; and provided that the House may, in its discretion, commit or recommit any Bill at its third reading; and in such case there shall go with the Bill to the Committee any amendments which any member, at the second reading, may have given written notice of his intention to offer at the third reading; and after the report of the Committee any amendment which it shall recommend may be adopted.

RULE 51.

NO THIRD READING ON FINAL DAY.

No Bill shall be read a third time on the day fixed for the adjournment of the General Assembly.

RULE 52.

BILLS TO BE PRINTED.

All Bills reported by a Committee shall of course, be printed, together with the report of the Committee, unless the House shall specially dispense with printing. The Standing Committees may order to be printed, for their use, such papers as shall be referred to them.

RULE 53.

PRINTED BILLS TO BE ON DESKS ONE DAY PREVIOUS TO SECOND READING.

No Bill or Joint Resolution shall receive a second reading unless printed copies of the same shall have been laid on the desks of members at least one day previous to such reading.

RULE 54.**MOTIONS TO COMMIT AND RECOMMIT.**

Any Bill, Report, Petition, or other paper which may come before the House, may be committed or recommitted before a final decision thereon.

RULE 55.**SPEAKER MAY ORDER ENGROSSMENT.**

The Speaker may, whenever he may think it necessary, order any Bill, after its second reading, or any Resolution, Report, or other paper which has been under consideration, to be fairly engrossed.

RULE 56.**AMENDMENTS MUST BE PERTINENT.**

No motion or proposition on a subject materially different from that under consideration shall be admitted under color of amendment; and no clause shall be admitted or introduced into a Bill which does not relate to the general objects of the Bill.

RULE 57.**SPECIAL AND GENERAL ORDERS.**

Orders of the day shall be Special or General; Special, when a particular day, at a particular hour, may be specially appointed for a particular matter; General, when a matter is ordered for consideration or action on a day subsequent, without special reference given to it. Any member may insist upon a Special Order of the Day, or other Special Orders, until it be discharged. A General Order of the Day shall always require the special assent of the House before it be proceeded in or executed.

A Special Order, set for a certain day and hour or for a certain day and hour and from day to day until disposed of, not being considered by the House at the hour named, shall be transferred by the Clerk of the House to the Special Orders of the following day immediately after Third Reading Bills and from day to day until disposed of, in the chronological order of original appointment.

RULE 58.

CONSIDERATION OF MATTERS, IMMEDIATE AND DEFERRED—PRIORITY OF FREE CONFERENCE REPORT.

Every Bill which shall be ordered for a second reading, every Report of a Committee, and every original Resolution received from any member shall be ordered for consideration on the next day of sitting after the order, and shall be placed in its turn in the General Orders of the Day, and each paper in the General Orders shall have priority according to the date of the last order for consideration made upon it; except that the House may make a Special Order for the consideration of any subject on any day subsequent, or may agree to take up any matter in the Orders of the Day before it be reached in order; or may consider any Report or Resolution on the day it may be submitted, provided ten members do not signify objections to doing so by rising when called on for that purpose, if a proposition so to consider be made to the House; and except that a Bill reported by a Committee shall be read a first time, when the Report may be received and ordered for consideration along with the Bill; and that a Report made by the Committee on Privileges and Elections, on any question relating to elections, may be considered whenever the House may direct; and that a Report of the Committee of the Whole, or of the Committee on Engrossed Bills, or of the Committee on Enrolled Acts, or of a Committee of Free Conference, may be considered whenever the House shall direct.

Except that upon the question of the consideration of a report of a Committee of Free Conference, at the request of any ten members, who may signify their request by rising, the report of the Committee of Free Conference shall be printed in the Journal, and lie over for consideration on the next day of sitting after the presentation of report.

RULE 59.

MOTION TO CONTINUE.

When the General Orders of the Day have been taken up, any member may move to continue a matter, when called on the Calendar, to the next session; and if the

House agree thereto, the matter shall be thereupon continued; and the Clerk of the House shall make up a Calendar of all the matter so continued, placing the same thereon in the order in which they have been continued, and at the ensuing session the continued matters shall be taken up and considered in the same stage in which they were when so continued; and matters ordered to be placed in the General Orders at the said ensuing session shall be placed there in turn, and have priority according to the last order for consideration made upon them, and the Calendar shall be proceeded in as hereinbefore provided. A motion to continue shall have precedence of a motion to lay on the table, and shall be decided after such short conversation as the Speaker may, in his discretion permit.

RULE 60.

QUESTION OF PRIORITY NOT DEBATABLE.

All questions as to a priority of business, or as to the time when any matter shall be considered or ordered for consideration, and as to a departure from the regular order of business, shall be decided without debate.

RULE 61.

ORDER OF BUSINESS DAILY.

When the House shall not direct a different course, which, at any time, in any particular not forbidden by these Rules, it may do, the following order of business shall be enforced every day by the Speaker, unless departed from by leave of the House:

1. After the reading of the Journal, the Speaker shall present to the House communications on the Speaker's table intended to give information to be referred: messages and papers from the Senate requiring immediate action, or not likely to lead to debate, including, of course, Reports from the House concurred in by the Senate and returned; Bills read three times in the Senate, and to be read a first time in the House; but the House may, at any other time, when no question is pending before the House, direct Bills read three times in the Senate and to be read a first time in the House to be read a first time; Reports from the Senate to be referred or laid on the table until Reports of the

House on the same subject are to be considered: Bills to be committed to the Engrossing Committee.

2. The Speaker shall call, in alphabetical order of Counties, for petitions, memorials, presentments of grand juries, returns of commissioners, and such like papers, to be presented by members and disposed of, and Resolutions, Bills or motions to be presented by individual members; the call each day to be resumed where interrupted the previous day. When the House, however, shall determine to dispense with the call of Counties, as provided in the last preceding clause, the Speaker shall call for petitions, memorials, presentments of grand juries, returns of commissioners, and such like papers, to be presented by members and disposed of, and Resolutions, Bills or motions to be presented by individual members.

3. The Speaker may, on any day, and shall on Tuesdays and Fridays, call for Reports of Committees: first, the Standing, then the Special Committees.

4. The Speaker shall present any message or papers from the Senate on subjects likely to produce division in the House, which, without hinderance of business may be delayed until this time, and Bills requiring a third reading; but the House may at any other time, when no question is pending before the House, direct Bills requiring a third reading to be read a third time.

5. The House not ordering to the contrary, the orders of the day shall be taken up at a point where they were last interrupted, and be continued until the House adjourns, or directs these orders to be suspended or departed from for the purpose of taking up some other matter.

6. The orders of the day having been disposed of, or laid aside, and no special direction for other business having been given by the House, the Speaker shall call for motions to take up matters on the table.

7. That upon each legislative day the House shall, for a period of thirty minutes, if so much time be necessary, consider uncontested second and third reading Bills before considering special orders or other general orders. Upon this call a single objection shall prevent the consideration of the Bill. Such objection shall be made

in the manner prescribed by Rule 10. It shall be entered upon the Calendar with the name of the member or members objecting and the Bill thereafter shall be deemed a contested Bill until the member or members objecting shall formally from the floor withdraw objection.

RULE 62.

TAKING UP MATTERS FROM THE TABLE.

A motion to take up any matter which lies on the table may be made either when the Speaker calls for motions, or when he calls for motions to take up matters on the table, if the matter be such as should not properly be in the orders of the day.

But if the matter be such as has been in the orders of the day, or would regularly be placed there if not laid on the table, a motion to take it up shall be made only when motions to take up matters on the table have been called for, except as follows:

At any time when no question is before the House, a motion to take up any matter on the table may be made by unanimous consent.

A motion to take up from the table any matter may be made whensoever a subject with which it is proper to be considered is presented for consideration.

A motion may, at any time, when the House is not engaged upon another question, be made to take up a Bill, or other paper, for the purpose of placing it in the orders of the day, or of referring it, or of making an order relating to the printing of it.

At any time when the House is engaged in the orders of the day a motion may be made to take up any matter which, having been in the orders of the day, was laid on the table, when called for consideration in the course of the orders.

A motion to take up any matter on the table, or to take up any matter not reached in the orders of the day, having been negatived, shall not be renewed within one hour, if objection be made.

RULE 63.

CLERK TO PREPARE DAILY CALENDAR.

The Clerk of the House shall cause to be printed and laid on the tables of the

members, every morning, the orders of the preceding day, arranged according to priority, and numbered from the commencement of the session, every matter being introduced and numbered anew after every new order upon it, and the substance of the order being summarily stated, as: "Bill, etc., ordered for a second reading"; "Report of Committee, etc., on Bill, etc., ordered for consideration"; "Report on Bill, etc., taken from the table and ordered for consideration."

RULE 64.

RESUMPTION OF INTERRUPTED DEBATE.

A debate interrupted by a simple adjournment shall afterwards be resumed at the point of interruption, as if debate had been formally adjourned. If the matter under debate be in the orders, general or special, it shall be first taken up when next the orders are taken up, unless a special order to the contrary be made by the House: if it be a matter not in the orders, it shall be taken up at the next meeting before any other question is presented, except incidental questions, and such matters on his table as the Speaker may think necessary to present, and such questions as the House may give special leave to be first presented. In like manner, and with like exceptions, a matter interrupted by a call for the orders of the day shall, after the orders have been disposed of, or laid aside, and such matters as may be taken up from the table have been disposed of, or after adjournment, be resumed at the point of interruption, before any other question.

RULE 65.

WHEN MESSAGES MAY BE RECEIVED.

Messages may be received at any time whilst the door is open, except whilst a question is being put, or a ballot, or a *viva voce* vote is taking. A message shall be presented to the House by the Speaker when received, or afterwards, according to its nature, and the business in which the House is engaged: or its consideration may, on motion, be ordered by the House.

RULE 66.

DUTIES OF CLERK AND READING CLERK.

The Clerk, or Reading Clerk, as the Speaker may direct, shall prepare in writ-

ing, present to the Speaker for his signature, and send all messages to the Senate ordered by the House, unless a different form of sending any message be ordered by the Speaker of the House. The Reading Clerk shall read all papers to be read at the desk, except the Journal, which shall be read by the Clerk of the House, which the Speaker may direct him to read, the Speaker being specially responsible that all amendments ordered by the House be correctly made, and that the attention of the House be called to all amendments made by the Senate since the matter was before the House. The Clerk shall also be charged with the duty of having executed, in a prompt and accurate manner, all the printing required by the Rules or orders of the House.

RULE 67.

REPORTS TO BE MADE ON PETITIONS, MEMORIALS AND SENATE REPORTS.

The prayer of no petition nor memorial shall be granted, nor shall any report from the Senate be concurred in, until there has been a report from a Committee of the House, on the said petition or memorial, or on the said report of the Senate, or on the matter of the said report, unless the report of its committee shall be dispensed with by the House unanimously, without debate.

RULE 68.

BILLS RELATING TO ELECTIONS AND COUNTY OFFICERS.

No Bill, Resolution or provision concerning managers of elections, or places of election, or Magistrates, or County Board of Commissioners, or Township Commissioners, Supervisors or other County or Township officers, such as is proper to be embraced in a general report of the Committee on Privileges and Elections, the Committee on Offices and Officers, or other Committee, shall be received or considered by the House until the general report into which it might be introduced shall be under consideration or shall have been disposed of.

RULE 69.

CONTINGENT ACCOUNTS OF COUNTY OFFICERS.

No contingent account of any County officer shall be received by the House which

does not come to the House through the Comptroller General.

RULE 70.

CLERK MAY REQUIRE RECEIPT FOR PAPERS.

No member shall take any books or papers from the possession of the House or Clerk without first acquainting the Clerk, and, if required, giving him a receipt to return the same in a reasonable time or on his demand.

RULE 71.

CHAIRMAN COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE.

In forming a Committee of the Whole, the Speaker shall leave the Chair and appoint a Chairman to preside over the Committee.

RULE 72.

RULES FOR COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE.

The Rules of the House, so far as they may be applicable, shall be observed in a Committee of the Whole, the Chairman being substituted for the Speaker, except the Rule limiting the time of speaking on a debatable question: but no member of the Committee shall speak on the same question oftener than twice until every other member choosing to speak has spoken.

RULE 73.

AMENDMENTS BY COMMITTEES.

No Committee of the Whole, or other Committee, shall deface or interline a Bill or other paper referred to it, but shall report any amendments recommended on a separate paper, noting the page and line.

RULE 74.

SPEAKER PRO TEMPORE.

On the Wednesday following the organization of the House, a Speaker *Pro Tempore* shall be elected, who shall preside in the absence of the Speaker. The Speaker in the absence of the Speaker *Pro Tempore*, or the Speaker *Pro Tempore*, may name a member to fill his place during occasional absences from the chair, but such substitute shall not extend beyond an adjournment.

In the absence of the Speaker and Speaker *Pro Tempore*, the House shall elect a Speaker *Pro Tempore* to serve until the

return of the Speaker or Speaker *Pro Tempore*.

RULE 75.

PAY CERTIFICATES.

It shall be the duty of the Clerk to issue pay certificates to members for per diem and mileage, and to officers and employees, when the two Houses shall have ordered the same by Concurrent Resolution, and for incidental expenses, upon the order of the House or of the Speaker, the signature of the Speaker being attested by the Clerk.

RULE 76.

TITLE OF MEMBERS.

No other title or addition except "Mr." shall be used by the Speaker or Clerk in calling the name of any member in the House.

RULE 77.

ADMISSION TO HALL—HATS.

No person not a member or officer of the House shall be admitted within the bar without the special leave of the House. Besides the members and officers of the House, the following persons, and no others, shall be admitted within the Hall: namely: The members and officers of the Senate; members of Congress; the Governor and suite; Lieutenant-Governor; Judges; former Governors; the Comptroller-General; Attorney-General and Solicitors; Treasurer of the State; Secretary of State; Superintendent of Education; Adjutant and Inspector-General; State Printer; Trustees, President and Professors of University of South Carolina; and the Visitors, Superintendent and Professors of the Military Academy; former members of the House; also such persons as may be invited by the Speaker, or by order of the House. All persons in the gallery or lobby shall be uncovered, and all persons not members of the House shall be uncovered whilst in the Hall.

The Doorkeepers and Messengers are charged with the enforcement of this Rule.

RULE 78.

TIME ALLOWED TO EXPLAIN VOTE.

No member having asked and obtained leave of the House to explain his vote on any question before the House shall be allowed more than ten minutes for such explanation.

RULE 79.

CHANGING OR SUSPENDING RULES.

None of the foregoing Rules shall be rescinded, suspended, or altered without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present after one day's previous notice of motion to rescind, suspend, or alter, has been given (except Rule I), and such alteration, suspension, etc., shall only be made by written Resolution.

RULE 80.

PRECEDENT AND PARLIAMENTARY LAW.

In all particulars not determined by these Rules, or by the laws or Constitution of this State, or of the United States, the practice of this House shall conform to its previous usage, or be guided by parliamentary law as it may be collected from the best authorities.

RULE 81.

ALLOTMENT OF SEATS.

As soon as practicable, after the House has been organized, the seats of the members shall be allotted as follows: The Clerk shall prepare a number of ballots, equal to the number of Counties, upon each of which shall be written or printed the name of a County. These shall be put into a hat or closed box, and, under the direction of the Speaker, shall be drawn out one by one by the youngest Page present. As each ballot is drawn, the delegation from the County whose name appears upon the ballot shall select their seats. Provided, That no delegation shall be allowed to select more than one seat on the main aisle. This Rule shall take effect immediately.

RULE 82.

SMOKING ON FLOOR NOT ALLOWED.

Smoking shall not be allowed on the floor while the House is in session.

RULE 83.

A general Bill to provide for the levy of taxes for school purposes (the Constitutional Tax) shall be introduced covering all the counties in the State; but the levy of taxes for county purposes shall be accomplished by the introduction of a separate bill for each county.

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JOINT RULES OF SENATE AND HOUSE

RULE 1.

READING OF BILL.

Every Bill shall receive three readings on three several days in the House in which it originates before it is sent to the other House.

RULE 2.

MESSAGES BETWEEN THE TWO HOUSES.

All messages between the two Houses must be in writing and numbered in regular sequence for each session, except that messages announcing the organization of either House, or its readiness to adjourn pursuant to Joint Resolution, may be communicated orally by the Clerk in person.

RULE 3.

PRESIDENT PRESIDES IN JOINT ASSEMBLY.

When the two Houses meet for any purpose, the President of the Senate shall preside and discharge the duties of the Joint Assembly.

RULE 4.

COMMITTEE OF FREE CONFERENCE.

Questions of disagreement between the two Houses shall be referred to Committees of Conference, as follows:

If the disagreement be upon a Resolution, Bill, or Report adopted by one House and sent to the other House for consideration, and it be proposed to amend such Resolution, Bill or Report, the House in possession of the paper will send a message to the other House containing the amendment proposed. If that House disagree to such amendment, it will return a message accordingly. If the House proposing the amendment still desires to urge it, it will send a message to the other House, insisting upon its amendment, and asking that a Committee of Free Conference may be appointed, at the same time naming its own Committee of Free Conference. This will be granted as of course. The Committee of

Free Conference shall meet in Joint Session and shall formulate and submit their report in writing to both Houses. If the Joint Committee of Free Conference fail to agree upon any plan of settlement, or if their Report be not concurred in by both Houses, the Resolution, Bill, or Report shall be lost. See House Journal, 1874, page 264.

RULE 5.

NOTICE OF REJECTION TO BE SENT.

When a Bill or Resolution or any other matter which shall have passed in one House is rejected in the other, notice thereof shall be given to that House in which the same shall have passed.

RULE 6.

PAPERS TO BE INCLUDED WITH BILL.

Each House shall transmit to the other all papers upon which any Bill or Resolution or Report sent to it for consideration shall have passed.

RULE 7.

RATIFICATION OF ACTS.

All Bills that have been read three times in each House and have been duly engrossed and become Acts, shall be returned into the possession of the Clerk of that House in which the Bills originated. A day for the ratification thereof in the Senate Chamber shall be fixed by a message between the two Houses. At the time appointed, the Speaker of the House, attended by the Clerk of the House and Sergeant-at-Arms, in the official costume, with the members of the House, shall repair to the Senate Chamber, the Clerk of the House taking with him the House Acts which are to be ratified. The Senate, with its officers, shall duly receive the House and its officers, the Clerk of the Senate having in his possession the Senate Acts which are to be ratified. Whereupon the President of the Senate and Speaker of the House shall interchangeably sign and present to each other the Acts from their respective Houses by their respective titles; and when they are all signed and ratified, they shall be left with the Clerk of the Senate, and the Speaker, with the House and its officers, shall retire to the Hall of

the House. The Clerk of the Senate shall forthwith deliver the said Acts to the Governor for his action, making a note on each Act of the day and hour of its delivery.

RULE 8.

CLAIMS.

The Report of the Comptroller-General to the General Assembly on Claims, filed in his office, required by Section 5 of an Act entitled "An Act to prescribe and regulate the introduction of measures relating to private interests and the conduct of the same in the progress thereof," approved December 26, A. D. 1885, shall be referred to the Committee on Claims of the two Houses, who shall examine the same and hear any parties desiring to be heard in reference to any claim therein mentioned, and report back to their respective Houses the result of such examination for the final action of the General Assembly.

RULE 9.

MEASURES OF PRIVATE INTEREST.

That no measures relating to private interest shall be introduced into the General Assembly, except in strict conformity to the provisions of an Act entitled "An Act to prescribe and regulate the introduction in the General Assembly of measures relating to private interest, and the conduct of the same in progress thereof," approved December 26, 1885, and the conduct of such measures in their progress through the General Assembly shall be regulated by the terms and requirements of the said Act.

RULE 10.

VOTING IN JOINT ASSEMBLY.

In a Joint Assembly, when a vote is being taken, no member may change his vote after it has been announced and recorded, but a member who did not vote when his name was called, may do so before the result has been duly announced.

Two rifle ranges accommodate 2,400 men at one time. Practice in bayonet and trench warfare. After training the men are transferred to different parts of world aboard battleships and cruisers. Specialists in the Radio and Signal School, Paymasters School, Clerk School, Cooks and Bakers School and the Band School are turned out.

Over 80 per cent. of enlisted men of Marine Corps were trained at Parris Island, and greater portion of the 31,000 Marines in France received their training there.

During past year the entire island, approximately 21 square miles, became property of United States by proclamation of the President, and extensive additions and improvements were made at cost of over \$2,000,000. Barracks can now accommodate 17,000 men.

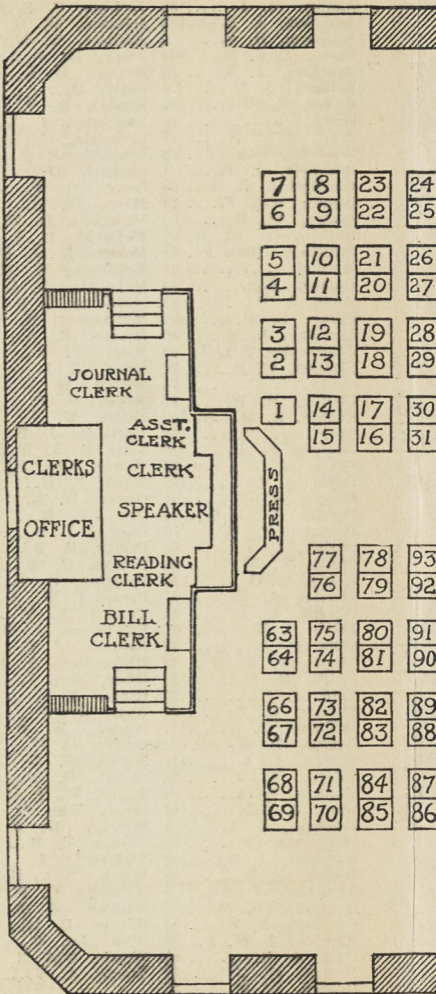

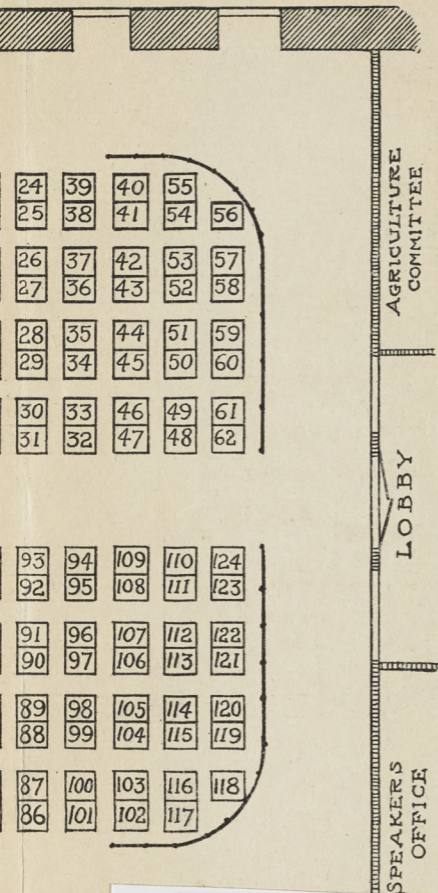
DIAGRAM OF HALL
