LOCAL OBSERVATIONS.



JANUARY.

This is one of the most pleasant months in the year: its temperature is cool and refreshing, and extremely congenial to all but the victims of gout and rheumatism. The air at mid day is generally clear and wholesome, but the mornings and evenings are sometimes damp and foggy.

The thermometer ranges in the shade, from 52° in the morning to 65° in the afternoon.

A northerly wind prevails during this month, but seldom blows with much strength: when it does, and is accompanied with rain, the cold is very disagreeable.

In the meat market there is a plentiful supply of beef, mutton, veal, lamb, pork, kid, poultry, &c., of the most superior kinds.

Game also is to be had in great abundance—snipe, duck, teal, &c.

The fish market is well supplied at this season with beekty, or cockup, (the salmon of the East,) moonjee, rooe, cutlah, quova, sowk, sellah, molan, cels, soles, and many others of inferior descriptions.

Vegetables of all kinds are now in the highest state of perfection; the markets abound with green peas, cauliflower, cauliflowers, cabbages, turneps, potatoes, asparagus, yams, carrots, spruce, greens, cucumbers, radishes, celery, lettuce, young onions, knob-knob, kutehoo, French beans, scum, brinjals, red and white beet, &c. &c.

Fruit trees, in general, begin to show their buds and blossoms this month, mangoes, peach, pumplenose (shaddock), rose apples, &c.

The fruits in season are Solhet and Chiny oranges, loquats, plantains, pine apples, long and round plums, large guavas, pampnose, opparah and a few others.

N.B.—The following fruits and vegetables are procurable not only in this month but throughout the whole year, viz.—plantains, sugar-canes, coconuts, guavas, pine-apples, papaws, custard-apples, jack, country almonds, tamarinds, ontah, burbutty, mint, sage, parsley, onions, radishes, lettuce, &c.

FEBRUARY.

This month is generally cool and comfortable, particularly if the northerly wind prevails: the weather afterwards becomes disagreeable, till a change of season takes place about the end of the month.

When the weather is variable the wind blows principally from the N. W., veering round occasionally to the N. E., attended with clouds and drizzling rain, this continues till about the 20th, when the southerly wind sets in. The weather now becomes mild and genial, the days, however, sometimes rather hot, and the nights cold, with heavy dews.

The thermometer, in the shade, ranges on a medium, from 58° to 75°.

The measles in children, are very prevalent during the whole of this month.

Rheumatism and gout become less troublesome after the southerly winds have set in. Warm clothing becomes rather unpleasant to new comers, but not so to old Indians. A nose bleed is not so easily healed. Sometimes this month is rather showery, which protracts the cold season until the middle of the following month.

Meat continues good and abundant.

The fish market has the addition of the small hillsah, (the Indian mackerel.)

The additional vegetables are pumpkin and young cucumbers: and the fruits custard-apples, mulberries, and small water-melons.

MARCH.

The thermometer ranges in the shade from 68° in the morning to 82° in the afternoon.

Various operations of husbandry, generally commence this month, so soon as the ground is moistened by rain: this however, sometimes happens at the latter end of February, and then it is occasioned by an unusual quantity of rain.

The meat market continues good.

Fish to be had in abundance, and the market has the addition of the gonfeah, a small but well flavored fish.

Green peas and turnips disappear at the end of this month; salad, cabbages, carrots and celery are on the decline, but asparagus and potatoes continue excellent. green mangoes and urape musk melons are to be had; also ontah, greens, and water-cresses.

Fruit is also plentiful—large water-melons appear about the middle of the month, and continue in perfection till the middle of June.

The north-westers with thunder and lightning, and rain, generally appear towards the end of this month.

The beginning of this month is sometimes pleasant, particularly if the north westers are frequent; but the middle and latter part are disagreeable in the extreme, it is one of the worst months in the year.

APRIL.

The thermometer ranges in the shade from 80° in the morning to 90° in the afternoon, but when exposed to the sun, it rises to 110°.

The wind blows from the south, and is very strong throughout the month; and when the wind is hot, from the absence of rain, it becomes oppressive. This state of the weather is very unfavorable to vegetation.

The north-westers are at times attended with dreadful storms of thunder and lightning, during which rain and hail fall in torrents: these storms sometimes occasion much damage. The north-westers continue at intervals till the beginning, and sometimes till the middle of May.

This is an unfavorable season for meat, which begins to be flabby and poor, the fat spongy and yellow.

The fish market has the addition of the mangoe fish, so called from its annual visit to all the Bengal rivers, at this (the mangoe) season, to spawn. It appears as soon as the mangoe is formed on the tree, and disappears at the close of the season, that is about the middle of July. This fish has, perhaps, the most agreeable taste in the world, and is so much sought after, (by natives as well as Europeans) that, although not very large, and of a middle sized whiting, they are sold at the beginning of the month, at from 2 to 4 rupees per score. Towards the end of May, as they become plentiful, they are sold at one rupee per score; and in June, two to three scores may be had for a rupee. The fish market has also the addition of the carp and magoor.

Potatoes, asparagus, onions, cucumbers and a few cabbage sprouts are the only vegetables to be procured.

Water-melons and musk-melons are in great perfection; but there is not much fruit now to be had in the market. Green mangoes for pickling, and corianda for tarts are in great abundance.

MAY.

The weather, during this month is most oppressive, especially the latter half of the month: the wind continues southerly, and the heat is scarcely bearable. Of all months in the year, the present is the most trying, particularly to those whose avocations compel them to be much out of doors. To be exposed to the sun without a covering, is extremely dangerous at any hour; from 10 to 5 o'clock, it would be ruin to any constitution, except to that of a native, inured to the climate by birth and practice; and even natives sometimes fall a sacrifice to the powerful influence of the sun. The heat in the first half of the month is sometimes relieved by north-westers, accompanied by refreshing showers; vivid lightning and loud thunder at times attend the north-westers.

The thermometer ranges in the shade, on a medium, from 85° in the morning to 98° in the afternoon: if exposed to the full influence of the sunbeams, it will rise to 140° and sometimes higher.

Grapes of the largest size, peaches, pine-apples, limes, rose-apples, lichees, jambrules, wampces, mangoes, jack, water melons, musk-melons, pomegranates, custard-apples and a great variety of inferior fruits, are in season.

The meat market is very inferior to that of last month.

Fish continues good and abundant, the becky excepted, which, from the difficulty of its reaching the market in a firm state, becomes scarce. Mangoe fish is in great perfection this month.

Asparagus, potatoes, and cabbage sprouts, with indifferent turnips, sweet potatoes, cucumbers and onions, are nearly all the vegetables now in the market. Pumpkins and several roots are however procurable.

JUNE.

The periodical rains set in about the middle of this month. Refreshing showers, fall occasionally, which cool the air and encourage vegetation.

The thermometer during the first half of this month, frequently rises to 99°, in the shade, at noon; but, in general, the rains, which commence about the 15th, keep the temperature much below this.

The weather throughout the whole of this month, is oppressive, in proportion to the quantity of rain which falls, if the weather be dry the heat is scarcely bearable; it is generally very close, not a breath of air from any quarter.

Meat, as must be expected, is now very indifferent.

The fish market is much the same as during last month.

Mangoes are in great abundance and perfection. The Maldiva mangoes arrive in Calcutta about the middle or latter end of this month, and they are considered to be the best that can be procured in Bengal. Grapes, peaches, lichees, &c. disappear towards the end of this month. Custard-apples, pine-apples, and guavas are in great perfection.

Asparagus, potatoes and onions, are the principal vegetables that remain,

JULY.

This month is attended with much rain; the winds are light and variable: the weather frequently gloomy, and sometimes stormy, with heavy falls of rain; whilst at intervals it is fair and mild.

The thermometer ranges in the shade from 80° in the morning to 89° in the afternoon.

The showery weather of the present and preceding month, is productive of the most beneficial effects to the grain.

Meat continues lean and poor.

The fish market continues good. The moonjee, rooe, cutlah, quoye, sowle, magoor, chingree, tangrah, and choonan, are procurable in this month, and indeed all the year round. The hilsa (or sahil) fish now makes its appearance. This fish is delicious, either boiled, baked, or fried; but it is generally considered very unwholesome. The natives devour it in such quantities, as to occasion great mortality among them. The fish, on being cured with tamarind, forms a good substitute for herrings. It is then known by the appellation of the tamarind fish.

Mangoes and mangoe fish disappear this month.

Pine-apples, custard apples, and guavas continue in season.

The vegetable market is very indifferent—asparagus is in perfection, but potatoes become poor and watery. Young lettuces, cucumbers and sweet potatoes are now procurable; also the cumrunga and corianda.

AUGUST.

In the present month also there is abundance of rain;—the weather continues much the same as last. This and the preceding month are remarkable for heavy falls of rain, being the wettest in the whole year.

The thermometer ranges in the shade from 80° in the morning to 90° in the afternoon.

Light and variable winds and cloudy weather, with smart and light rain, prevail at the beginning of the month, the middle is sometimes fair, and tolerably cool: the remainder variable, attended, at times, with strong winds and heavy rain.

From the combined heat and moisture in this month and the preceding, vegetation springs up and spreads with astonishing rapidity.

The meat and fish markets are much the same as last month.

The pumplenose (shaddock) appears this month; pine-apples, custard apples, and guavas continue in perfection.

The vegetables procurable are salad, asparagus, cucumber, brinjalls, kidney-beans, radishes, turnips, cabbage sprouts, and indifferent potatoes. Indian corn, cucumbers, and spinage, are to be had now and all the year round, but they are tasteless except at this season, when they become firm, good, and very palatable. The avigato-pear is sometimes procurable at this period.

SEPTEMBER.

The rains subside considerably during this month.

The wind continues light and variable, attended with occasional cloudy weather. The days are sometimes fair, mild, and bright,—and the temperature agreeable.

The thermometer ranges from 78° in the morning to 85° in the afternoon.

The meat market is much the same as in last month.

The fish market experiences but slight improvement, for although there is abundance of fish, yet it is not always firm and good, except the beekty, which becomes firmer and better flavored. The following are also in the market.—the bholan, aussy tangian, kouten, buegirs, gaugtorah, lowell, toontee, pyrah cuondah, and crawish.

Vegetables and potatoes are very indifferent: yams come in season about this time.

In the fruit market, small oranges make their appearance, but they are very acid. Custard-apples, pine-apples, guavas, and pumplenose continue in season.

OCTOBER.

The first half of this month, generally yields a good supply of rain, and introduces the powerful influence of a second spring season upon all vegetating bodies.

The rainy season breaks up generally between the 10th and 20th of this month; sometimes, however, it continues a little longer, but this is seldom the case, the continuing showers are frequently heavy, continuing from six to twenty-four hours, incessantly, after which the weather becomes fair, calm, and settled.

The thermometer ranges, in the shade, from 75° in the morning to 80° in the afternoon.

The winds are in general light and variable during this month, veering from south to north-west thence to north and north-east.

The monsoon changes about the 21st of this month, after which, light breezes set in from the north and north-east.

As soon as the weather sets in fair, the season becomes propitious for preparing the kitchen garden.

The meat market begins to revive, and the fish market to improve; the beekty becomes firm, and the other fish proportionably good, snipes make their appearance.

Vegetables and fruit continue much the same as last month, till the latter end of the present month, when, if the season is favorable, both experience a considerable improvement. Oranges become larger and better flavoured, and custard-apples are in great perfection.

Young potatoes, sometimes, make their appearance this month, but they have very little flavour;—they are small and watery. Pomegranates are procurable, also sour wood-apples.

NOVEMBER.

The weather is clear and settled and the temperature temperate. Sometimes the days are warm, but the mornings and evenings are cool and agreeable.

If the rains cease early in October and the cold weather follows shortly after, November becomes a beautiful and delightful month. Nothing can be more favorable than this season for the renovation of the health of the valetudinarian, after having experienced the debilitating effects of the hot weather.

Light northerly winds prevail this month.

The thermometer ranges from 70° in the morning to 75° in the afternoon.

The seeds committed to the soil during the last and present month start into life, with a vigour unknown to other climes.

The meat market looks wholesome; beef, mutton, veal, pork and poultry, become firm and good.

Game comes in also this month, in considerable quantities; wild ducks, snipe, teal, &c.

Abundance of fish is procurable, also firm and good, such as beekty, banapatab, gaugtorah, mirgal, carp, and mango-fish without roes.

The vegetable market begins afresh this month by the introduction of green peas, new potatoes, lettuces, greens of different kinds, spinage, radishes, and turnips.

In the fruit market may be had oranges, limes, lemons, pumplenose, pine-apples, custard-apples, papiah, plantains, coconuts, country almonds, pomegranates, sour wood-apples, &c.

DECEMBER.

The weather continues fair, cool, and on the whole, extremely fine, throughout the month, with a light northerly wind.

The days and nights are cold and clear, and the mornings and evenings foggy, particularly at the latter end of the month.

The thermometer ranges from 58° in the morning to 65° in the afternoon.

The meat and fish markets are in great perfection, both as to quantity and quality; game of all kinds in abundance.

The vegetable market is excellent, yielding green peas, young potatoes, lettuces, young onions, radishes, small sallad, sweet potatoes, French beans, scum, brinjalls, yam, carrots, turnips, greens, young cabbages and cauliflowers.

The fruit market continues much the same as last month—Brazilian gooseberries (tippareahs) make their appearance this month, together with wood-apples and other fruits.

GARDENER'S CALENDAR.

January.

The season is too far advanced to sow the generality of vegetables with much prospect of success; but turnips, carrots, love-apples, vegetable marrow, all sorts of pumpkins, lettuce, endive, radish, mustard and cress, spinage and Nepal spinage may be sown during all this month; also successive crops of late cabbage and knol-khole every fortnight. Turnips are said to succeed best when placed in rows they should be thinned to a distance of six inches from each other. Carrots rarely succeed well when planted at this season they should be thinned, but not transplanted, except when required for seed. Love apples, when two or three inches high, should be planted out in beds at five inches apart afterwards transplant in rows two feet from each other, with a frame work to run upon. Vegetable marrow should be sown in rich light soil—earth up the stems as they increase, and peg down the leading branches at a joint. Lettuce and endive should be planted in boxes or beds, and transplanted at one foot apart from each other; they may also be sown in beds, and thinned to the proper distance—a few days before use they should be blanched by tying the tops of the outer leaves over the rest. Radish, mustard and cress may be sown every week or ten days the two last throughout the year. Spinage, to be sown in beds and thinned until the plants are one foot apart. Nepal spinage should be planted in rows, with trellis work to run over this vegetable continues to flower and bring forth fresh leaves throughout the year, and requires no care. Cabbage and knol-khole should be planted in boxes or beds, and transplanted into other beds about three or four inches apart in three weeks or a month; they may be transplanted a second or third time, especially the latter, when transplanted for the last time they should be put in well manured trenches at two feet from each other. Horse manure and ground hours are strongly recommended for all the cabbage tribe. With care common cabbage and knol khole may be procured during every month in the year; but those produced from the end of October to the middle of February, are far superior to any others.

Potatoes may be planted during the first week of this month also; and if the season prove cool they may be expected to arrive at considerable perfection. From the middle of July to the early part of September, is the most favourable time for planting potatoes.

In this month the following vegetables and fruits are procurable in the market, in large quantities and at very cheap prices,—carrots, turnips, cabbage, knol-khole, beets, Bombay and country onions, country double French, white and Windsor beans, and peas, pumpkinose, Sylhet and country oranges, pomegranates, guavas, custard-apples, limes, plantains, long plums, tippareah or Brazilian gooseberries, and several other kinds of common fruits and vegetables.

Peach trees should be slightly pruned during this month, and the small fruit thinned, where too thick.

The finest flowers are now in bloom, and at the end of the month the collection of flower seeds should commence. Indeed early magnonette and larkspur seeds may be collected in the beginning of the month. Sow early melon and water-melon seeds, also the last crop of red pumpkins.

February.

The remarks on last month apply generally to this; but there is less chance of success in rearing vegetables, as they seldom acquire much strength before the hot winds set in. Turnips and carrots rarely succeed; but radish, mustard and cress, lettuce, endive, spinage, and some of the cabbage tribe, may all be planted in this month and throughout the year. Throughout this month the collection of flower seeds is carried on rapidly.

All the fruits, vegetables, and flowers, mentioned as procurable in the market in January, may be had in as great perfection and as cheap or cheaper during this month.

In this month peas are plentiful, and the following may be obtained of good quality,—Jerusalem artichokes, asparagus, duffin and French beans, scarlet runners, beets, brocoli, cabbage, carrots, cauliflowers, celery, endive, lettuce, knol-khole, onions, parsnips, spinage, turnips, and yams. Also the following fruits,—custard apples, Brazil gooseberries, guavas, lemons, mulberries, pumpkinose, raspberries, strawberries, peaches, pine-apples, and a few other kinds. Melons and cucumbers should be sown during this month. Gather winter flower seeds. Lay bare, for a fortnight or three weeks, the roots of peach trees, to harden, and preserve them from being destroyed by white ants. Use house-plaster rubbish, as manure when closing the roots.

March.

But few vegetables come to any perfection that are sown in this month; but it is desirable to sow successive crops of cabbage and lettuce which may be planted in beds which are partly protected from the sun, and transplanted into rows as required.

In the market, brinjall, carrots and turnips may be procured in considerable quantities and pretty good. Turnips are generally very stringy towards the end of March, country radish and all kinds of country greens

may be had in large quantities, and all the kinds of fruit procurable in February are obtainable with the addition of green mangoes and jakes, loquots, a few dates and blackberries. Young plants should be weeded in this month, and encircled with a slight embankment, to retain the water which they must be afforded during the greater part of this and the two succeeding months. Melons and cucumbers should be sown during this month also as well as grape and apple seeds, Indian-corn and sugar-cane. Still gather winter flower seeds.

April.

The remarks on March apply equally to this month; but as the hot season advances the chances of success in rearing most kinds of vegetables diminish. Late melons and cucumbers may be sown during this month likewise. Sow melons in rich light soil, giving the plants plenty of room to run. When they have thrown out four leaves stop them by pinching off the leading bud: they will then produce two lateral shoots, which stop in a similar manner; and so continue to treat each new formed shoot, stopping it at the second or third joint. When the plants begin to show fruit, stop the fruiting branches two joints before the fruit. Cover the ground with leaves or straw to keep the roots cool, and to prevent the fruit from becoming spotted.

In this month plantains, pine-apples, pumplenoses, blackberries, ripe mangoes, peaches, lichees and all the other fruits procurable in March are abundant in the market. Carrots, turnips, beans and cabbages are reduced in quantity, and their prices are considerably increased, when good. Brinjal, radish, water pumpkins, and greens in plenty are to be had. Musk-melons, and several other country melons, come into season about the middle of this month.

In the latter part of this month plant all the amaryllis or lily tribe, and in fact all bulbous roots and plants, should be sown or planted. Sow early cucumbers, okra, Indian-corn, sugar-cane, grape, apple, and all country fruit seeds, so that the plants may have the advantage of the rain to grow up vigorously. Gather winter flower seeds and commence grafting and budding. Plentifully water young plants.

May.

Mangoes, pine-apples, pumplenoses, plantains, and all the fruits procurable last month are supplied abundantly. Brinjals, greens, and summer flowers of almost all sorts are to be had plentifully in the market. Musk and water melons, &c. are plentifully supplied to the market about the end of this month.

Grafting and budding, of all kinds, should be performed during this month, which is the most favorable for such operations. And the gathering of the seeds of winter flowers, should be finished at its end. Water young plants. Lichees and peaches get scarce at the end of this month, but wampees, wild lichees and melons, continue plentiful. Sow long cucumbers and white pumpkin seeds, grape seeds, peach stones and fruit seeds generally.

June.

Asparagus seed should be sown in boxes towards the latter end of the month, and transplanted in November, in rows two feet apart, and the plants one foot from each other. The soil should be mixed with a large portion of rotten horse manure: it is scarcely possible to make the ground too rich for asparagus. Fresh asparagus seed should be sown whenever procurable, and especially between the end of June and the beginning of December.

In this month mangoes, oranges, pine-apples, pumplenoses, plantains, pomegranates, cucumbers, melons, limes, wild-lichees, jake, monkey-jake, and a great variety of berries and other fruits are abundantly supplied at low prices in the market. Carrots, turnips, cabbage, and other European vegetables, are very scarce and dear: but country greens and brinjals, are procurable in small quantities. About the end of the month melons disappear.

Young and tender plants should be carefully watered every evening during this month, and chillies, okra, Indian corn, pea-sticks, jute, red and China spinach and the common native greens in general, including pulhal, kurrula, jhingah, burbuttes and chichingah, should be sown. The planting of cuttings of all kinds of fruits and flowers, should be commenced at the end of this month. Sow peach stones and fruit seeds generally. Sow long cucumber seeds at the end of the month.

July.

At the end of this month it is desirable to sow seeds for early parsley, beats, knol-khole, cabbage, cauliflower, brocoli, asparagus, endive, lettuce, carrots, turnips and other winter vegetables.

Celery.—Sow in boxes in this and the five following months. Remove to beds when about three inches high, and into trenches, as required, after being a month in the beds. The trenches should be 2½ feet deep, filled up with a foot of light soil and stable manure, and afterwards gradually, as the plant grows, with light soil, till within about six inches of the top. Water for the first two months with the hand, after which they may be occasionally flooded.

Another way.—Having sown and transplanted as above, remove into trenches four feet apart, and about 18 inches deep, nearly filled with horse manure and rich earth. As the plant grows, bank up into ridges with light soil. By this method the root of the plant, and not the stem, is watered when flooded.

Knol-khole, cabbage, cauliflower and brocoli.—Sow in boxes during this and five following months. Remove to beds when two inches high, and transplant the cabbage and knol-khole twice, and cauliflower and brocoli at least three times, allowing the growth of a couple of new leaves between each planting.

Asparagus.—Sow in beds in July, and remove the plants in November, into raised beds of one or two rows. When the berries become red, cut the plants two inches above the ground and top dress, when they will be ready to cut in ten days. By dressing the beds in succession, asparagus may be produced for the table all the year;—stable manure is the best, and the plant should invariably be watered by the hand, and never flooded except in very hot weather. Plants if taken care of will produce for eight or ten years. They should, however, be wintered (roots cleared of the earth and exposed for some days) and the ground dressed every second year.

Lettuce and endive.—Sow in boxes or pots surrounded with water, till the plants appear, otherwise the small red ant will destroy them. Plant out as required, and tie up a few days before you cut for use.

Carrots.—Sow in a light deep sandy soil.

Turnips.—Sow in a rich soil, well manured.

In the market all Europe vegetables are very scarce and dear this month. Brinjal, greens, and other native vegetables are supplied. Pine-apples and melons are getting out of season. Plantains, pumpkins and cucumbers, are plentiful.

Mangoes continue till towards the end of the month. Pine apples, jakes, monkey-jakes, bonch, and guavas are very abundant. Young plants and grafts should all be planted out during this month, and the trees pruned as soon as they have done bearing, as that is the only time when it can be done with benefit to them. Cuttings of all trees and shrubs should be put in this month, as well as slips of artichokes, which, as soon as they have established themselves, should be cut down close to the ground. Standard flower and dahlia seeds should be sown. Balsam seeds should be sown in the beginning of the month and until the end of October.

All grafting and budding should be finished this month, so that the rains of the two succeeding months may cause them to shoot up with vigor when planted out. Wampoes, blackberries and wild-licees go out of season during the early part of this month. Sow manocoe, jake, blackberry, date, and all kinds of summer fruit seeds during this month—they will thrive well—likewise sow gooseberries. Expose the roots of young plants from the middle of this month to the middle of September, to harden them, or they may fall sacrifices to white ants. Sow the irregular *early* crop of potatoes.

August.

Successive crops of all the vegetables sown in July should be planted at the end of this month, more especially celery and beet, which should be fit to transplant a second time before the monsoon. These two vegetables are less likely to suffer by excessive rain than most others. Artichokes should be sown in beds during this month, three inches between each seed, so as to allow the removal of the plants in November without disturbing the roots. To propagate by suckers—take off the suckers, and prick them out six inches apart; and when they become well rooted, transplant into deep rich soil, setting them two feet apart. If large, suckers may be planted at once where they are intended to remain.

To prevent artichokes running to leaf, and producing small heads, when the plants are from ten to fifteen inches high, cut them off close to the ground, and cover them over with light dry old manure; when they have advanced a few inches repeat the operation. If the young plants are tied up for a few days before being cut off, they will become blanched and may be eaten as salad.

French beans and scarlet runners may be sown during this month, and until February. They should be planted in rows two feet apart, north and south, and to be supported with sticks, or with an arched bamboo trellis, which is very ornamental. Sow also early radish, turnip, cabbage, cauliflower, parsley, celery, onions, tobacco, and early flower and vegetable seeds, generally at the end of this month. Sow the first regular crop of potatoes.

Mangoes are very scarce. Plantains, pine-apples and guavas continue in abundance; and custard-apples, kunirangals, punnallas, avigato-pears, and corrodas, come into season.

Insects are excessively numerous and destructive. The orange tribe should be budded and inarched, and propagated by seeds. Continue grafting mangoes. Transplant cotton. Propagate carnations and pinks by layers. Finish cutting peach and lemon grafts. About the end of this month sow dahlia, balsam, early mignonette, sun flower, coxcomb, polyanthus, hibiscus, holyhock, larkspur, lupin, poppy, sweet-sultan onion, cabbage, salsify, cauliflower, lettuce, and all the other seeds sown last month.

September.

Continue to sow all the vegetables mentioned for August. Transplant early cabbage, cauliflower, broccoli, beet, celery, endive, and lettuce. Two or three crops of peas may be sown during this month, if the weather is favourable, but not with much prospect of success unless sown at the latter end.

Peas should be planted in trenches, in double rows, about two feet apart. They should be watered by hand for the first fortnight and afterwards flooded until they are two or three feet high, by which time the winter dews will be sufficient to separate them. Peas require no manure, but should be planted in good soil. Sun flower seeds for the winter should be planted now; but this flower grows all the year round. Coxcomb, larkspur and mignonette seeds might be sown.

Avigato-pears still continue, and early loquots, and sour oranges begin to make their appearance about the end of this month. A species of hard, tasteless musk melon is procurable in abundance. Sow avigato-pear stones. Young potatoes in season. The American cotton sown early in full fruit. Plant Cape bulbs, either in the ground, or in very deep pots well drained. The turnips and cabbages are much infested by a small dark caterpillar which may be destroyed by sprinkling the plants with powdered lime. The rice begins to flower. Put down cuttings of geraniums, roses, violets, hearts-ease, etc. Flowers in great perfection. As most of the peach trees will have lost their leaves, the roots should be opened and exposed for 14 days, and then strongly manured. Potatoes should be sown during this month. The whole of the grafts should be cut this month, if possible, so that they might still benefit by the showers of rain that fall at this time.

October.

The remarks on last month apply equally to this. Continue to sow all kinds of vegetable seeds in boxes; transplant from the boxes into beds; and immediately after the first heavy fall of rain remove into beds, rows and trenches, more particularly celery, beet, cabbage, knot-khole, cauliflower, and broccoli. Care should be taken in finally transplanting all the cabbage tribe this month, to provide against heavy falls of rain, by making trenches to carry off the water. Crops of peas should be sown every week or ten days from the beginning of this month until the end of December—peas sown after that time seldom pod.

Onions and leeks should be sown during this month also, in light rich earth, carefully covering the seed. When leeks are a few inches high, plant them in drills, eighteen inches apart, and nine inches, from plant to plant. As they increase in size draw up the earth to their stems, in order to blanch them, as leeks are much improved by blanching.

Sow parsnips in rich deep soil. Trench the ground two feet deep, sow the seed in drills one foot apart, and thin the plants so as to leave eight inches from each other.

The main beds for strawberries should be planted. Oranges begin to get palatable this month, and the cutting of the sugar-cane commences. Brinjals and native greens become plentiful, and the last crop of Indian-corn is gathered. The last of the grafts should positively be cut, and suckers transplanted. Plant larkspur, marigold, sweet-sultan, mignonette, pinks, carnation, asters, and all annual plants during this month. Propagate geraniums by slips; and sow all kinds of vegetable and flower seeds every six or eight days, throughout the month.

November.

This is the month for activity in the vegetable gardens, as but few things arrive at much perfection which are not planted before the end of this month. The principal crops of peas should be sown during the first week; and continued every six days during the month; also scarlet runners, French-Broad and Windsor beans. Sow beet, knot-khole, cabbage, broccoli, and cauliflowers, in beds, and remove from beds into rows. Transplant celery and remove into trenches. Plant out artichokes and asparagus.

The middle crop of potatoes should be sown about the middle of this month. They should be planted in light soil, in which no horse dung is mixed. The plants should be set according to the number of eyes, taking care that each piece is of sufficient size to nourish the eye, until it roots—twice the size of a man's thumb nail round the eye, will do well. When planted, not more than one inch, or one and a half inch, of soil should be placed over it; and it should not be watered oftener than once in four days, even during the hottest weather. As it grows up, the soil should be banked up to the stalk. Great care should be taken not to give too much water, and not to put too much soil upon the potato when first planted.

This is the last month in which the generality of vegetables can be sown with advantage. Sow winter fruit seeds of all kinds, except oranges. Oranges, guavas and plantains and all European and Cape vegetables are abundant.

December.

In the beginning of the month sow French beans, scarlet-runners, broad and Windsor beans. Peas sown in this month produce scantily. Plant out late celery from boxes to beds, and remove from beds to trenches. Sow late cabbages and knol-khole; and transplant as above. Vegetable marrow may be sown in the early part of this month in light rich soil. Earth up the stems of the plants as they increase in growth, and peg the leading branches down at a joint, and they will strike root.

Potatoes may be planted until the end of this month; but those sown during the first fortnight are most likely to succeed. When potatoes are planted whole, the produce is finer than when they are divided into two or three pieces; but the same number of potatoes yield a far larger crop by the latter than by the former method. Potatoes should be planted in beds fully exposed to the sun. In rather shady places the crop is small; and when altogether excluded from the direct rays of the sun, they produce nothing.

Europe and native vegetables are plentiful during this month; and also all sorts of brinjals, sweet-potatoes, yams. Fruits are scarce, except plantains, plums, goose-berries, guavas and oranges. Flowers of all kinds are abundant.

A good month for sowing early musk-melon and dwarf-cucumber seeds, as well as peas, radish, and spinach but very few other vegetable seeds. Most of the exotic plants will also now be flowering.

Strawberries come in at the middle of this month, and last through all the next.

Chronological Cycles.

The Solar Cycle, or Cycle of the Sun, is a period of 28 years, in which all the varieties of the Dominical Letters will have happened, and they will return in the same order as they did 28 years before. This Cycle commenced nine years before the Birth of Christ.

The Lunar Cycle, or Cycle of the Moon, commonly called the Golden Number, and sometimes the Metonic Cycle, (from Meton, an Athenian, who invented it about 482 years before the Birth of Christ,) is a revolution of 19 years; in which time, the conjunctions, oppositions, and other aspects of the Moon are within an hour and a half of being the same as they were on the same days of the month 19 years before. The prime, or Golden Number, is the Number of years elapsed in this Cycle. At the Birth, the Golden Number was 2.

The Roman Indiction, is a period of 15 years, used by the Romans for the time of taxing their provinces. Three years of this Cycle had elapsed at the Birth of Christ.

The Julian period contains 7980 years, and arises by multiplying together 28, 19 and 15, being the Cycles of the Sun, Moon and Indiction. This was also contrived as a period for chronological matters, and, is assumed, as a correct and fixed rule in Calculations, by all the astronomers and chronologers throughout the Christian world. Its beginning is supposed to have commenced 710 years before the usual date of the creation of the world, or 4714 before the commencement of the Christian Era.

TO FIND THE LEAP YEAR

Divide the given year by 4, and if there be no remainder, it is Leap Year; but if 1, 2, or 3 remain, they show it is so many years after leap year.

TO FIND THE MOON'S AGE

To the Epact of the year, add the number for the month, and the day of the month the same; if it does not exceed 30, is the Moon's Age; but if it does, subtract 30 from it, and the remainder will be the Moon's Age.

TO FIND THE EPACT

Divide the given year by 19, multiply the remainder by 11, and the product will be the Epact; if it does not exceed 30; but if it does, then divide the product by 30, and the last remainder will be the Epact.

Under the word 'years' find the year; above which is the Dominical letter for that year, then against the months find the same letter, over which are placed the days of the month, for every Sunday in the month. In leap year, for January and February, use the letter above the blank space before the year; for all the rest of the months, use the letter for the year.

To find out when it is Leap Year, divide the year by 4; if there is no remainder, it is Leap Year; and if any remainder, it is 1, 2 or 3 years after Leap Year.

Explanatory Notes for the Year.

I. DOMINICAL LETTERS.—The seven days of the week, reckoned as beginning on the 1st of January, are designated by the first seven letters of the alphabet, A, B, C, D, E, F, G; and the one of these, which denotes Sunday, is the dominical letter. Thus, if the year begin on Sunday, A is the dominical letter; if it begin on Monday, that letter is G; if on Tuesday, it is F; and so on generally. To find the dominical letter, call New Year's Day A., the next day B., and so on till you come to the first Sunday, and the letter, that answers to it, is the dominical letter. If there were 364 days, or exactly 52 weeks in the year, the dominical letter would be always the same; but the year contains 365 days; an excess of 1 day over 52 weeks. The day is taken into the account every year, and the one fourth makes a day in every four years; so that the dominical letter falls backward one letter for each of the three years, in which the date or number of the year cannot be divided, without remainder, by 4; and two letters every fourth year, when the date can be so divided; as in the year 1828, it is divisible by 4, and, therefore, February will contain 29 days. The year began on Tuesday; count forward Tuesdays to Sunday, inclusive, is six, and the sixth letter from A inclusive is F. Therefore, F is the dominical letter for the 1st day of February, which is added, or interpolated, throws the 21st day of the month back one day from what otherwise have been; and, therefore, the Sunday letter for March is E. The years, which have the 29 days in February, and the two bissextiles, for the reason already given, or leap years, because the day leap over a day of the week. In fact, the 28th and 29th of February are accounted one day.

2. **THE GOLDEN NUMBER.** At the end of every nineteen years, the new and full moons happen at very nearly the same times of the year. The ancients discovered this, and reckoned the nineteen years, or "cycle of the moon" as it is called, so that it terminated the year before the Christian era. This cycle was marked by the Greeks with letters of gold. Therefore, to find the golden number or number of the year in this cycle, add 1 to the date; divide by 19: the quotient is the number of cycles of the moon since the birth of Christ, and remainder is the golden number; as the present year is 1828, add 1, is 1829; divide by 19, is 96 cycles, and there remains 5, the golden number.

3. **THE CYCLE OF THE SUN** is the number of years that elapse before the Sundays throughout the year, happen on the same days of the month. If there were 364 days in the year, that would happen every year; if 365, it would happen every seventh year; but because the one-fourth of a day makes an alteration of a day every fourth year, the cycle must extend to 28 years. Nine years of this cycle had elapsed before the birth of Christ. Therefore, to find the cycle of the sun add 9 to the date, divide by 28; the quotient is the number of cycles since the birth of Christ, and the remainder is the cycle of the sun; as, for the year 1828, add 9, is 1837, divide by 28, the quotient is 65 cycles, and the remainder is 17, the cycle of the sun.

4. **THE EPACT** is the moon's age for the first day of January, or the equator between the beginning of the solar and the lunar year. The time from one new moon to another is about 29½ days. Thus there are, in a year, twelve revolutions of the moon, and 11 days over, therefore, the twelfth new moon will take place 11 days earlier each year than it did the year before. In the lunar cycle of 19 years, there are 12 new moons in each, of 12, and 13 in each of 7; because the 13 days of yearly difference in three years, exceed a lunar month by 3½ days. If it were not for the odd minutes and seconds, the age of the moon, on the 1st of January, could always be found, by multiplying the golden number by 11, and dividing by 30; then the remainder would be the epact or age of the moon on the 1st of January. The following method will answer for the day of the moon's age on the 1st of January, till the end of the present century. Take 1 from the golden number, multiply what is left by 11, divide by 30; the remainder is the epact, or moon's age on the 1st of January: as for 1828, the golden number is 5; take away 1, leaves 4; multiply by 11, is 44; divide by 30, remains 14, the epact, or moon's age on the 1st January.

5. **THE NUMBER OF DIRECTION** is the number of days after the 22d of March, including both days, upon which Easter Sunday takes place. For instance, the number of Direction for 1828 is 16. Easter Sunday is April 6, being 16 days inclusive from March 22.

6. **EASTER** is directed to be celebrated on the first Sunday after the full moon that happens next after the 21st of March; which being the fourteenth day of the first Jewish month, corresponds to their first day of the week after the Passover, the anniversary of the resurrection of Christ. The time at which this day must happen, varies with the year; but the limits within which it must fall, are the 22d of March, and the 25th of April, inclusive, making a period of 35 days.

In order to find Easter, the first thing to be done is to find *Easter limit*, that is, the number of days after the first of March, on which the full moon, preceding Easter, shall happen. To do this, add 6 to the epact, and subtract the sum, if less than 30, or the remainder, when 30, is taken away; if more, from 50; the remainder is the day after the first of March, on which the full moon, preceding Easter, happens. Thus, for 1828 the epact is 14, add 6 is 20, subtract this from 50; leaves 30 days after the 1st of March, when the full moon preceding Easter takes place, which is the 31st, or last day of March, when the following Sunday is Easter-day. To find the day itself, add 4 to the number of the dominical letter; subtract the sum from the limit, and the remainder from the next number of 7s, that is greater than itself; this last remainder, added to the limit, will give the number of days from the first of March to Easter-day, including both: if less than 31, it will show on what day of March Easter falls; and if greater, take 31 from it, and the remainder will show upon what day of April. Thus, for 1828, the dominical letter is E, the number of which is 5. Add 4 to 5 is 9; take this from 30 (the limit) leaves 21; take this from 28, (the number of 7s, next greater,) there remains 7; add this to 30, (the limit,) gives 37 days from the first of March to Easter, both included; take 31, (the days in March, from 37, leaves 6;) therefore Easter-day must fall on the 6th of April.

On what day will it fall in 1829?

The Dominical letter for that year will be D.

The Golden number: 1829 ÷ 19 leaves 6; then 6 - 1 = 5 ÷ 11 = 55 - 30 leaves 25, the epact.

Then for Easter limit.

25 + 6 = 31; take away 30 leaves 1; and 50 - 1 = 49 days after the first of March to the Easter full moon. Again.

Dis 4, add, 4 = 8 and 49 - 8 = 41, 42 = 42 = 1, and 49 + 1 = 50 days from March 1st to Easter, including both. Take away 31 for March, leave 19, the day of April on which Easter will happen in 1829.

7. **THE ROMAN INDICTIO.** The cycle of indiction has no connection with the motions of the Sun and Moon, further than its consisting of 15 years. It was established by the Emperor Constantine, in the year 312, to regulate (certain payments) by the subjects of the empire; therefore, to find it for any year, subtract 312 from the date, divide by 15, and the remainder is the indiction; as from 1828, subtract 312, leaves 1516; divide by 15 leaves 1, the Roman Indiction.

8. **SEPTUAGESIMA SUNDAY** is the ninth Sunday before Easter.

9. **SABOTE SUNDAY** is the seventh before Easter.

10. **WHIT SUNDAY** is the seventh after Easter.

11. **TRINITY SUNDAY** is the eighth after Easter.

12. **ADVENT SUNDAY** is the Sunday when Easter is known, any of the 4 Aprils. When Sunday is, before or after the 30th of November, whether before or after: that depend on it can be easily found as, for 1828 Easter is April 6, then from 30 days in April leaves 24; 24 days, there is the 24th of May.

Time Table.

No. 1.—Shows the number of days from any given day in one month to the same day of any other month. It must be observed, that in Leap Year, if the end of the month of February be included in the time, one day must be added. If it be desired to find the number of days from a given day in one month to a different day in another, the difference between the dates must be added to, or subtracted from (as the case may be) the amount. The Calendar and its Successive Reforms.

The divisions of time, such as they are presented in the Calendar, are composed of days, weeks, months and years. The modes of determining these divisions, have been various amongst the nations of antiquity, and there are still variations in these modes in the modern world.

The manner of reckoning the days by the ancient Jews, and which subsists amongst that people at the present time, is to commence the day at a certain hour of the evening, and to finish it on the next evening at the same hour. Thus their sabbath begins on the afternoon of Friday, and is completed on the afternoon of Saturday. The Roman Catholic Church also commences its festivals in the evening; and this custom is retained amongst ourselves in some of our popular observances, such as the eve of St. John, and Christmas eve.

The civil day now commences at 12 o'clock at midnight, and lasts till the same hour of the following night. The civil day is distinguished from the astronomical day, which begins at noon, and is counted up to 24 hours, terminating at the succeeding noon. This mode of reckoning the day is that used in the Nautical Almanac, and it sometimes leads to mistakes with persons not familiar with this manner of computation; a little consideration will obviate the difficulty. Thus, January 10, fifteen hours in astronomical time; January 11, 3 in the morning, civil time. In France and in most of the states of Europe, as with us, the hours are counted up to 12, from midnight till noon, and from noon till midnight. In parts of Italy, and of Germany, the day is held to commence about sun-set, and the hours are counted on till the next sun-set. This mode is very inconvenient to travellers, as the noon of the "Italian hours" at the summer solstice is 16 o'clock, and 19 o'clock at the winter solstice.

The English names of the days of the week are derived from the Saxons; and they partly adopted these names from the more civilized nations of antiquity. The following ingenious origin of the ancient names has been suggested in connexion with astronomical science. The planetary arrangement of Ptolemy was thus 1, Saturn; 2, Jupiter; 3, Mars; 4, the Sun; 5, Venus; 6, Mercury; 7, the Moon. Each of these planets was supposed to preside, successively, over each hour of the 24 of each day, in the order above given. In this way Saturn would preside over the first hour of the first day; Jupiter over the second hour; Mars over the third; the Sun over the fourth, and so on. Thus the Sun presiding over the fourth, eleventh, and eighteenth hours of the first day, would preside over the first hour of the second day, and carrying on the series, the Moon would preside over the first hour of the third day, Mars over the first hour of the fourth

day, Mercury over the first hour of the fifth day, Jupiter over the first hour of the sixth day, and Venus over the first hour of the seventh day. Hence, the names of the days yet used in the learned professions throughout Europe. The present English names are derived from the Saxon:—

Tiw, Woden, Thor, and Friya were deities of the Pagan Saxons. Thor was the god of thunder, as well as the ancient Jove; and Friya was a goddess, the wife of Woden.

Almost all nations have regulated their months, in a great degree, by the evolution of the moon. Some have endeavored to unite this division with the annual course of the sun, by an augmentation of days at the end of each year, or by adding a thirteenth month at the end of every third year. The Jews and the Athenians followed this latter method; the Macedonians, and some nations of Asia, assigned their months 30 and 31 days; the Turks and the Arabs have 29 and 30 days; the months of the Anglo-Saxons were governed by the revolutions of the moon. Their common year consisted of twelve lunar months, three months being appropriated to each of the four seasons; but every third year contained an additional lunar month, which was given to the summer season. The names of their lunar months either had reference to their religious ceremonies, or to the natural appearances of the year.

A considerable variation prevailed, generally, amongst the nations of antiquity and still partially prevails, with regard to the commencement of the year. The Jews dated the beginning of the sacred year in the month of March; the Athenians in the month of June, the Macedonians on the 24th September; the Christians of Egypt and Ethiopia on the 29th or 30th of August, and the Persians and Armenians on the 11th of August. The Jewish civil year begins on the first day of the month *Tisri*, which year corresponds with our 9th of September; the Mahomedans' begins on the first of the month *Moharem*, which year corresponds with our 14th of July. Nearly all the nations of the Christian world now commence the year on the 1st of January; but as recently as 1752, even in England, the year did not legally and generally commence till the 25th of March. In Scotland, at that period, the year began on the first of January. The difference caused great practical inconveniences, and January and February, and part of March, sometimes bore two dates, as we often find in old records, as 1711-12. This practice often leads to chronological mistakes; for instance, we popularly say—"The Revolution of 1688," that great event happening in February of the year 1688, according to the then mode of computation; but if the year were held to begin, as it does now, on the 1st of January, it would be "The Revolution of 1689." In the anniversaries given in the *British Almanac*, the alterations of style, made in 1752, have not been followed, as any correction of date would have embarrassed the reader in historical and biographical references.

The year, properly so called, is the solar year or the period of time in which the sun passes through the twelve signs of the Zodiac. The period comprises 365 days, 5 hours, and 48 minutes, 51 seconds, 6 decimals, and is called the astronomical year.

The CALENDAR is a table of the days of the year, arranged to assist the distribution of time, and to indicate remarkable days connected with devotion or business. If every nation had adopted the same division of time, and a uniform calendar had been general throughout civilized states, history would present much fewer difficulties and contradictions. The progress of astronomical science has necessarily produced great changes in the manner of dividing time; and thus, whilst some nations have been ready to give their calendar every possible advantage of a scientific construction, the prejudices of others have rendered them unwilling to depart from their accustomed mode, however inaccurate. It may be curious and instructive to trace, very briefly, the changes of the calendar, ordinarily called, the changes of style.

The Romans called the first days of each month, *Calends*, from a word which signified called; because the Pontiffs, on those days, called the people together, to apprise them of the days of festival in that month. Hence we derive the name of CALENDAR.

The Roman Calendar, which has, in great part, been adopted by almost all nations, is stated to have been introduced by Romulus, the founder of this city. He divided the year into ten months only: Mars, Aprilis, Maius, Junius, Quintilis, (afterwards called Julius,) Sextilis, (afterwards called Augustus,) September, October, November, December. Mar, Maine, Quintius, and Octobe, contained 31 days, and each of the six other months 30 days; so that the ten months comprised 304 days. The year of Romulus was, therefore, of 51 days' less duration than the lunar year, and of 61 days less than the solar year; and its commencement of course did not correspond with any fixed season. Numa Pompilius corrected this calendar, by adding two months, Januarius, and Februarius, which he placed before Mars, Julius Cæsar, being desirous to render the calendar still more correct, consulted the astronomers of his time, who fixed the solar year at 365 days, 6 hours, comprising, as they thought, the period from one vernal equinox to another. The six hours were set aside, and at the end of four years, forming a day, the fourth year was made to consist of 366 days. The day thus added, was called intercalary, and was added to the month of February, by doubling the 24th of that month, or according to their way of reckoning, the sixth of the Calends of March. Hence the year was called Bissextile. This almost perfect arrangement, which was denominated the Julian style, prevailed generally throughout the Christian world,

till the time of Pope Gregory XIII. The Calendar of Julius Cæsar was defective in this particular; that the solar year, consisting of 365 days, 5 hours, and 49 minutes, and not of 365 days, 6 hours, as was supposed in the time of Julius Cæsar; there was a difference between the apparent year and the real year, of eleven minutes. This difference at the time of Gregory XIII., had amounted to ten entire days, the vernal equinox falling on the 11th, instead of the 21st of March, at which period it fell correctly at the time of the Council of Nice, in the year 325. To obviate this inconvenience, Gregory ordained, in 1582, that the 15th October should be counted instead of the 5th, for the future; and to prevent the recurrence of this error, it was further determined that the year beginning a century, should not be bissextile, with the exception of the beginning of each fourth century. Thus, 1700 and 1800 have not been bissextile, nor will 1900 be so; but the year 2000 will be bissextile. In this manner, three days are retrenched in four hundred years; because the lapse of the eleven minutes makes three days in about that period. The year of the calendar is thus made, as nearly as possible, to correspond with the true solar year; and future errors of chronology are avoided.

The adoption of this change, which is called the Gregorian, or New Style, (the Julian being called the Old Style,) was for some time resisted by states not under the authority of the See of Rome. The change of the style in England, was established by an Act of Parliament passed in 1752. It was then enacted, that the year should commence on the 1st of January, instead of March 25th; and that in the year 1752, the days should be numbered as usual until September 24, when the day following should be accounted the 14th of September, omitting 11 days. The Gregorian principle of dropping one day in every hundredth year, except the fourth hundredth, was also enacted. The alteration was, for a long time, opposed by the prejudices of individuals; and even now, with some persons the Old Style is so pertinaciously adhered to, that rents are made payable on the old quarter days, instead of the new. For this reason, and not in deference to the prejudice, the old festivals are mentioned in the *British Almanac*. The Russians still retain the Old Style, thus creating an inconvenience in their public and commercial intercourse with other nations, which, we trust, that the growing intelligence of the people will eventually be correct.

During the period in which France was a Republic, the authorities introduced an entire change in the calendar, which was in existence more than twelve years; and is important to be noticed, as all the public acts of the French nation were dated according to this altered style. The National Convention, by a decree of the 5th October, 1793, established a new Era, which was called, in the place of the Christian era, the era of the French. The commencement of each year, of the first "Ventimiaire," was fixed at the midnight commencing the day, on which the autumnal equinox fell, as determined at the Observatory at Paris. This era commenced on the 22nd of September, 1792, of being the epoch of the foundation of the Republic; but its establishment was not decreed till the 4th "Frimaire" of the year II. (4th November 1793.) Two days afterwards the public acts were thus dated. This calendar existed till the 10th "Nivose," year XIV. (the 31st December 1805,) when the Gregorian mode of computation was restored.

Calculations of the Almanac.

1.—The times given in this Almanac are the civil or common reckoning of time, from Midnight to Midnight. The column of the Sun's Meridian passage is calculated to the nearest hundredth part of a second of time for every day of the year, with the same accuracy as in the Nautical Almanac. A watch ought to point exactly to the hour indicated for that day, when the Sun-dial marks twelve. There is no need now to refer to a table of Equation of time; should however this Equation be required, it may be had as readily; it is the time beyond 12h. or the time wanting to 12h., given in this column for each day of the year. The Moon will serve as well to set or compare a watch by the same Sun-dial; let the shadow of the gnomon fall on 12h., a watch ought to show at the same moment the time indicated in the column "Moon on Meridian," answering to the day the observation is made, which time is calculated to the nearest tenth of a minute. Should the shadow fall on any other hour, as 3, 4 or 5, add to the time indicated in that same column, about 62 minutes for every hour after 12, but should the dial show 6h., 8h., or 11h., as many minutes (92) must be deducted for every hour before 12.

2.—The column of Sun's Declination at noon for each day in the year, being computed by second differences, is as correct as that given in the Nautical Almanac.

3.—The present mode of denoting the times of Moon's Phases and Moon's Meridian Passage, Afternoon and After Midnight, has been substituted for Morning, Afternoon, Evening and Night.

4.—The two columns of the Sun's rising and setting include the refraction, which causes the Sun and all the heavenly bodies to rise on the eastern horizon about two minutes earlier, and to set on the western about two minutes later than they would rise or set were the Earth not surrounded by an atmosphere. Refraction is not exactly of the same duration throughout the year; the duration is in proportion to the obliquity of the Sun's rising or setting.

5.—At the head of each month, will be seen whether Saturn, Jupiter, Mars or Venus is visible in the Morning or Evening, and on which days of the month these planets will be in conjunction with the Moon, also on which days and whether at night or in the day Bores may be expected or will be of certain occurrence. In general they may be expected sometimes for several days successively at every Full and New Moon; but when the Moon's Parallax is high, *viz.* when the Moon is about her Perigee or nearest distance from the Earth at the time of Full or New Moon, the Bores are of certain occurrence.

6.—When the symbol (\oslash) denoting opposition occurs, such as on the 30th June 1855, we are to understand that the Moon does not pass the Meridian of Calcutta, on that (civil) day. This is the case once or twice in every Lunar month, and arises from the circumstance of the Lunar day being longer than the mean Solar day; in the present instance the excess is $61\frac{1}{10}$ m or the Lunar Day is equal to $25h. 4\frac{1}{10}$ m. The Moon passes the Meridian on the 29th June in the evening at $11h. 50\frac{7}{10}$ m. *viz.* $9\frac{1}{10}$ m before midnight and does not return to the same Meridian until $05\frac{9}{10}$ m. after midnight on the 1st July.

7.—And because the Moon does not pass the Meridian in every civil day, but fails to do so once at least on every civil month, and as one Meridian passage of the Moon produces only two High Water tides, sometimes three wanting; therefore on two days every month, falling sometimes after Midnight sometimes after Noon, there is but one High Water given. The march of the tide-wave over the surface of the ocean is of immense rapidity, the crest of the wave travelling round the globe in every Lunar day.

8.—In a place like Calcutta, so far removed from the Sea, the tides are strongly affected by the monsoons, occasional winds, the freshes, and various local causes, so that it will always remain an imperfectly solved problem to give the times of the High Water with accuracy. It will always however be found that for any period there will be only twice the number of High Water tides, as the Moon passes the Meridian.

9.—It should be recollected that the time of High Water is not that when the ships in the river turn round, but that when the water is actually highest, which always happens about half an hour before the current is changing its direction.

10.—At the head of each Month, the observations of the Highest and Lowest Pressure and Temperature are given. The Least Temperature is at Sunrise, the Greatest Pressure at $9h. 50m.$ A. M. the Greatest Temp. at $2h. 40m.$ P. M. and the Least Pressure at $4h.$ P. M. The observations of the Barometer are recorded in inches and hundredth parts of an inch.

The Temperature registered is that of the air in the shade; but besides this, the power of the Sun's Rays at the time of the greatest temperature is also given.

Easter Day, on which the rest depends, is always the first *Sunday* after the first full moon, which happens after the *one and twentieth* day of *March*. If the full moon happens upon a *Sunday*, *Easter Day* is the *Sunday* after. *Advent Sunday* is always the nearest *Sunday* to the Feast of *St. Andrew*, whether before or after.

Rogation Sunday is Five weeks after *Easter*.
Ascension Day is Forty days ditto.
Whit Sunday is Seven weeks ditto.
Trinity Sunday is Eight weeks ditto.

The Days of the Calendar:

JANUARY.

1. *New Year's Day.—Circumcision.*—This festival was originally called the Octave of Christmas; and the first mention found of it is in the year 487. It was instituted by the Church, to commemorate the ceremony under the Jewish law, to which Christ submitted, on the eighth day of the nativity; and was introduced into the Liturgy of the Church of England in 590.

6. *Epiphany.*—The word Epiphany signifies appearance or apparition. This festival is kept in commemoration of the "Manifestation" of the Saviour of mankind to the Gentiles, and appears to have been first observed, as a separate feast in the year 813. The primitive Christians celebrated the Feast of the Nativity for twelve days, observing the first and last with the greatest solemnity. From the circumstance of this festival being twelve days after Christmas, it is vulgarly called "Twelfth day."

8. *Plough Monday* is the first Monday after the Epiphany, and received this appellation from its having been fixed upon by our forefathers, as the period when they returned to the duties of agriculture, after the festivities of Christmas.

30. *King Charles the First's Martyrdom.*—The death of Charles I., is celebrated as a fast of the Church.

FEBRUARY.

2. *Purification.*—This day is kept in the reformed Church, as a solemn festival, in memory of the Purification of the Virgin Mary, who submitted to the injunction of the law, under which she lived, and presented the infant Jesus in the Temple. The festival was celebrated in the Christian Churches with an abundance of light, and was originally called "Candlemas Day," as well as the Day of Purification. The practice of lighting the Churches has been discontinued in this country since the second year of Edward the VI. In the Romish Church, the original name and all its attendant ceremonies, are still retained.

4. *Septuagesima Sunday.*—Septuagesima Sunday, is a Sunday dependent upon Lent, as that season is upon Easter. It is to be considered as the preparation for the fast of Lent. Its observation was instituted by Pope Gregory the Great. The name of the first Sunday in Lent having been distinguished by the appellation of Quadragesima, and the three weeks preceding, having been appropriated to the gradual introduction of the Lent Fast, the three Sundays of these weeks were called by names significant of their situation; and reckoning by Decades (tenths), the Sunday preceding Quadragesima, received its present title of Quinquagesima, the second Sexagesima, and the third Septuagesima.

14. *St. Valentine*.—The practice of "choosing a Valentine," as it is called on this day, is too well known to need explanation. The origin of this custom has been much controverted: it is indisputably of very ancient date. Valentine was a presbyter of the Church, who suffered martyrdom under Claudius II. at Rome, A. D. 271.

18. *Shrove Sunday*.—After the people had made the confession required at this season, by the discipline of the ancient Church, they were permitted to indulge in festive amusements, although not allowed to partake of any repast beyond the usual substitutes for flesh; and hence arose the custom, yet preserved, of eating pancakes and fritters at Shrovetide. On these days of authorized indulgence, the most wanton recreations were tolerated, provided a due regard was paid to the abstinence commanded by the Church; and from this origin sprang the Popish Carnival. From the loose pastimes of the age in which the Carnival originated, are also to be traced the nearly exploded diversions of cock-fighting, and cock-throwing.

21. *Ash Wednesday*.—The primitive Christians did not commence their Lent, until the Sunday now called the first in Lent, Pope Felix III, in the year 487, first added the four days preceding the old Lent Sunday, to complete the number of fasting days to forty. Gregory the Great introduced the sprinkling of ashes on the first of the four additional days, which give it the name of *Dies Cinerum*, or Ash Wednesday. At the Reformation, this practice was abolished, "as being a mere shadow, or vain show."

25. *Quadragesima, or first Sunday in Lent*.—Ercombert, King of Kent, first appointed the fast of Lent in the year 631; succeeding generations marked the distinctions between the various foods. We find flesh to have been early prohibited during Lent, though Henry VIII, published a proclamation in 1543, allowing the use of *white meats*, which continued in force until, by proclamations of James I., in 1619 and 1625, and by Charles I., in 1637 and 1631, flesh was again wholly forbidden.

MARCH.

17. *St. Patrick*.—St. Patrick, from the eminent services he rendered the Irish, in converting them from idolatry is called the Apostle and Father of the Hibernian Church, and is the Patron or tutelary saint of that island.

18. *Mid-lent Sunday*.—This day received its appellation, because it is the middle Sunday between Quadragesima and Easter Sunday. It is by some called the Mothering Sunday, a term expressive of the ancient usage of visiting the Mother, or Cathedral Churches of the several dioceses, when voluntary offerings were made, which are now called Easter Offerings.

25. *Annunciation or Lady Day*.—The reformed Church celebrates this day as a joyful festival from the connexion between the circumstance commemorated, and the incarnation. "Our Lady" is the ancient and popular name of the Virgin Mary.

APRIL.

1. *Palm Sunday*.—Palm Sunday is the Sunday preceding Easter, or the last Sunday in Lent. In the ancient Church, Palm Sunday, with the whole of the week, which it commences was held in strict devotion, and deserved with greater rigour as to fasting and humiliation than any other part of the Lent season. The festival commemorates our Saviour's triumphal entry into Jerusalem, when branches of palm were spread before him.

5. *Maunday Thursday*.—Edward III. in the year 1363, appears to have been the first English monarch, who introduced into this country, the practice of leeding, clothing, and distributing money to indigent persons on Maunday Thursday. The Custom has continued without intermission to the present period; and yearly, on this day, the Lord Almoner, or in his absence, the sub-almoner, attends for that purpose, in Whitehall Chapel.

6. *Good Friday*.—From the earliest records of Christianity, this day has been held as a solemn fast, in remembrance of the Crucifixion. Its appellation of *Good*, appears to be peculiar to the Church of England. Our Saxon forefathers denominated it Long Friday, from the length of the offices and fastings on that day.

8. *Easter Sunday* is a moveable festival, held in commemoration of the Resurrection, and being the most important and most ancient in observance: governs the whole of the other moveable feasts throughout the year.

23. *Saint George*.—Edward III. at the battle of Calais, in the year 1349 joined to England's then supposed principal guardian, St. Edward the Confessor, the name of St. George, both of whom he earnestly invoked to aid his arms. The next year, the Order of the Garter was established, dedicated to St. George; and the Saint himself has, from that period, been considered as protector of England.

25. *St. Mark the Evangelist*.—On this day the reformed Church holds a festival in commemoration of the benefits the Christian religion has received from the exertions of this Evangelist.

MAY.

1. *St. Philip and St. James, Apostles*.—The Church, on this day, commemorates the sufferings of St. Philip; and also of St. James the Less, the first Bishop of Jerusalem.

13. *Rogation Sunday*.—Rogation Sunday received and retains its title from the Monday Tuesday, and Wednesday immediately following it which are called *Rogation Days*, derived from the Latin *Rogare*, to beseech. The earliest Christians appropriated extraordinary prayers and supplications for those three days; a preparation for the devout observance of our Saviour's

Ascension, on the day next succeeding to them, denominated Holy Thursday, or Ascension Day. The whole week, in which these days happen, is styled Rogation Week; and in some parts it is still known by the other names of Crop-Week, Grass-Week, and Gang or Procession-Week. The perambulations of parishes are made in this week.

17. *Ascension-Day or Holy Thursday*, is the day on which the Church celebrates the Ascension of our Saviour, the fortieth day after his resurrection from the dead.

27. *Whit Sunday*.—On this day is celebrated the descent of the Holy Ghost upon the Apostles, in the visible appearance of fiery cloven tongues, and in those miraculous powers, which were then conferred upon them. Whitsuntide is seven weeks after Easter.

JUNE.

2. *Trinity Sunday*.—Trinity Sunday is a festival observed by the Latin and Protestant Churches on the Sunday next following Pentecost, or Whitsuntide, of which, originally, it was merely an Octave.

24. *St. John the Baptist*.—The reformed Church holds a festival on this day, in commemoration of the "Nativity of St. John the Baptist."

29. *St. Peter the Apostle*.—The Feast of St. Peter was instituted in the year 813, perhaps to celebrate the martyrdom of the Apostle, who suffered at Rome about 64.

JULY.

3. *Dog-days begin*.—The Canicular, or Dog-days, commence on the 3rd of July, and end on the 11th of August. Common opinion has been accustomed to regard the rising and setting with the Sun, or Sirius, or the Dog-star, as the cause of excessive heat, and consequent calamities, instead of viewing it as the sign when such effects might be expected. Of this notion, Dr. Hutton says, "the star not only varies in its rising, in every one year as the latitude varies; but is always later and later every year, in all latitudes; so that in time the star may, by the same rule, come to be charged with bringing frost and snow."

25. *St. James*.—This Apostle is called James the Great, to distinguish him from the other Apostle, who is called the Less.

AUGUST.

1. *Lammas Day*.—Lammas is one of the four Cross Quarter-days of the year, as they are now denominated. Whitsuntide was formerly the first of these quarters, Lammas the second, Martinmas the next, and Candlemas the last; and such partition of the year was once equally common with the present divisions of Lady-day, Mid-summer, Michaelmas and Christmas. Some rents are yet payable at these ancient quarterly days in England, and they continue general in Scotland.

24. *St. Bartholomew the Apostle*.—The proper name of this Apostle was Nathaniel, by which, and not by that of Bartholomew, he is mentioned by St. John. The festival of St. Bartholomew was instituted A. D. 1130.

SEPTEMBER.

21. *St. Matthew*.—This Evangelist's festival is of great antiquity.

29. *St. Michael*.—This festival was, in the year 487, established in honour of Michael, the patron Guardian of the Church, under the title of "St. Michael and All Angels."

OCTOBER.

18. *St. Luke the Evangelist*.—The festival held in commemoration of this Evangelist, was first instituted by the Christian Church in the year 1130.

28. *St. Simon and St. Jude Apostles*.—The two Apostles, St. Simon and St. Jude, are jointly commemorated by the Church on this day, as appears to have been the usage from the year 109, when their feast was first instituted.

NOVEMBER.

1. *All Saints*.—All Saints, or All Hallows, in the Protestant Church, is a day of general commemoration of all those saints and martyrs, in honour of whom, individually, no particular day has been expressly assigned.

4. *King William landed*.—"On the 3rd of November," says Burnett, who was in the fleet, "we passed between Dover and Calais and before night, saw the Isle of Wight. The next day, the 4th, being the day, on which the Prince was both born and married, he fancied, if he could land that day, it would look auspicious to the army, and animate the soldiers; but others, who considered the day following was Gunpowder Treason day, though our landing that day might have a good effect on the minds of the English nation. And Divine Providence so ordered it, that after all hopes of our landing at Torbay were given up, and Russell bid me go to my prayers for all was lost, the wind suddenly shifted, and carried us into the desired haven. Here the Prince, Marshal Schomberg, and the foot soldiers, landed on November the 5th." The Almanac is thus at variance with the historian.

5. This day is commonly called *Gunpowder Treason*, and has been kept as an anniversary in commemoration of the great plot of 1605.

9. *Lord Mayor's Day*.—Our Almanacs style this, the “Lord Mayor's Day,” in allusion to its being the period when the chief magistrate elect of the city of London annually enters upon his high and important office. Until the 9th of May 1214, the office of chief magistrate of London was held for life.

11. *St. Martin*.—This anniversary is still one of the four Cross Quarter-Days.

DECEMBER.

1. *Advent Sunday*.—Advent in the Calendar properly signifies the approach of the Feast of the Nativity. It includes four Sundays; the first of which is always the nearest Sunday to Saint Andrew, whether before or after Advent was instituted by the Council of Tours, in the sixth century.

25. *Christmas Day*.—Christmas Day is a festival of the Church, universally observed on the 25th December, in memory of the Nativity of our Saviour; and it has been denominated *Christ Mass* from the appellation, Christ having been added to the name of Jesus, to express that he was the Messiah, or the Anointed.

26. *St. Stephen*.—He was the first martyr to the Christian faith. Lardner and Doddridge think his death was rather the effect of popular fury than the result of a legal sentence.

27. *St. John the Evangelist*.—This festival is kept to commemorate the slaughter of the Jewish children by Herod. This is also called *Childmas Day* (from Child and Mass,) on account of the *Masses* said in the Romish Church for the souls of innocents.

Bengali Festivals and Holidays.

The festivals of the Bengalis, like those of every other people, are partly religious and partly social, though the former exceed the latter in their number and variety. Instead of treating of them separately, we shall take them up in the order of their occurrences, beginning with the month of *Baisakh*, or the end of April and beginning of May, which, as is well known, commences the Bengali year.

It is not a little singular, that the first day of *Baisakh*, or the Bengali new year's day, is not celebrated by public rejoicings. The commemoration of the nativity of a new year, by religious solemnities and social merry-makings, is so natural, that it is observed by almost every nation. By the greater part of the people of Bengal, however, the commencement of a new year is hardly noticed. It is a day remembered only by tradesmen and shop-keepers, who, on that occasion, close their yearly accounts, exchange their old journals and ledgers for new ones, and paint on their door-posts the images of the god *Ganesha*—a custom not unlike that of the ancient Romans. New year's day gifts, so common in Europe, are here utterly unknown. But in place of making presents on new year's day, a custom prevails, which illustrates several points in the character of the people. If the Bengali is too tenacious of his money to part with it, he may be persuaded to deposit it, for a certain period, in the hands of tradesmen. Hence it is customary to deposit a few rupees on new year's day in the safe-keeping of tradesmen, who return them after a short time, and who are eager for the deposits, as it is thought very auspicious to fill their books with monetary accounts at the commencement of the year.

Though the day which ushers in the year is not celebrated, yet the commencing month itself is regarded as peculiarly holy: it is, pre-eminently, the month of good works and religious duties. Whatever may be said of the unreasonableness of the ancient Hindu legislators and sages, in prescribing many unmeaning ceremonies, it must be confessed, that some of their religious injunctions were based on rational grounds, and that some of their institutions were established with a view to general utility and the public good. The month of *Baisakh* is, perhaps, the hottest month on the plains of Bengal. The atmosphere, exposed to the direct rays of a vertical sun, becomes surcharged with fiery exhalations; the chafed soil, as if heated by a universal furnace, burns the bare foot; reservoirs of water are, in general, dried up; and man and beast pant for breath. In this season of drought and extreme heat, it is wisely ordained by the Hindu law-givers, that men, beasts and plants should be religiously provided with ample supplies of water. In this month may be seen, by the doors of the houses of respectable Hindus, a number of pots of water, for slaking the thirst of cows, and vessels containing the same element, put up in high places, for the use of the feathered race; while an inclined wooden frame, through which cold grain, treacle and water are constantly being poured, is set up for the refreshment of the weary traveller. In this month, the wide-spreading *Ashwat* tree, and the humble *Tulsi* plant, may be seen to have their roots refreshed by water-pots hung over them. In this month, the very gods are fed more delicately than usual, inasmuch as an extra allowance of all sorts of fruits and delicacies is given to their images in the cool of the evening. In this month, pots of *Ganga* water are suspended over the heads of *Shiva* and the *Shalgram*, to preserve them from the influences of intense heat. In this month, presents of coconuts, betel-nuts, plantains, the sacred thread, bathing-towels, and last not least, money, are made in abundant profusion to brahmins. In this month, too, are all sorts of religious vows observed, by mothers for the benefit of their children, by husbands for the benefit of their wives, and

by wives for the benefit of their husbands. Two festivals are held in this month, the worship of the river *Bhagirathi*, and the bathing of *Vishnu*, which are too insignificant, to merit description. In addition to these however, is celebrated, in this month, a third festival, which deserves notice on account of its singularity. We allude to the worship of the *dhenki*. What is a *dhenki*? our readers will naturally ask. The *dhenki*, or pedal, is a beam balanced on a pivot, placed horizontally, with a piece of wood attached vertically to one extremity, which serves the purpose of a mallet. The object of this simple machine is to separate rice from its husk, which is put in a hole, into which the head of the engine falls. The force by which the *dhenki* is moved, is neither that of steam nor electricity, but the foot of a woman, which is ever and anon applied to the shorter arm of the lever. This primitive machine, so necessary to the purposes of Bengal life, is set up in almost every household in the Mofussil. Agreeably to the well-known principle of Hindu theology, that what is useful is adorable, the *dhenki* has divine homage rendered to it, on the occasions of giving the first rice to a child, of marriage, and of investiture with the sacred thread. But besides these occasional adorations, the homely pedal is regularly worshipped by females, in some parts of the country, with much pomp, once a year, in the month of *Baisakh*. On that occasion, the head of the rice-cleaning machine is painted with vermilion, anointed with the consecrating oil, and presented with rice and the *durga* grass. The origin of the worship of the pedal is no less singular. A worthy religious preceptor had commanded his disciple to repeat the word *dhenki*, at least one hundred and eight times a day. *Narad*, the musician of the celestials, and the patron deity of the pedal, delighted with the devotion of the disciple, paid him a visit riding on a *dhenki*, and gave him a blessing, in virtue of which the self-denying votary was translated into heaven.

In addition to the great swinging festival, to be noticed in its proper place, there is held in this month a swinging festival, on a smaller scale, in honor of an inferior god named *Dharmaraj*. This festival is, by no means, prevalent throughout the country, but is confined to particular localities. In connection with the swinging festival of *Dharmaraj*, we may remark, that in some places is worshipped, in this month, a fox of wood dignified with the name of *Debansi*, or partaker of the divine nature, and to which is attributed the rare quality of visiting sacred places through subterranean roads.

In the month of *Jaishtha*, that is, the end of May and beginning of June, the descent of *Ganga* is celebrated, *Jagannath* is bathed, the protectress of children adored, and sons-in-law feasted.

We shall not recount here, for the hundredth time, the story of the descent of the sacred river *Ganges* from the sublime top of *Beishantha*; how she rushed from the matted hair of the vagabond *Shiva*; how she followed the foot-steps of the conch-sounding *Bhagirath*; and how, after passing through places rendered memorable in the geography of Hindu pilgrimage, she fell into the wide sea, and liberated the sixty thousand sons of the mighty king of Oude. The anniversary of this event is celebrated with much pomp in Bengal, in the month of *Jaishtha*. On that occasion, the banks of the sacred river are adorned with garlands of flowers, and lined with thousands of people, who perform their ablutions; the favour of the river deity is celebrated by suitable adorations; the family inhabitants of the deep are presented with offerings; lamps of clarified butter are lighted up; the officiating priests are amply rewarded, and brahmins in general entertained. This festival is called *Dasahara*, because it is believed that a proper observance of it takes away the sins of ten births.

The patroness of mothers and the protectress of children is *Shashthi*, who is represented by the image of a woman, riding on a cat, and nursing a child. This amiable goddess is regarded with particular affection by all Hindu mothers. At the birth of a child, homage is rendered to her; and presents to her are neither few nor far between; so long as the child does not give proofs of approaching manhood; at the attainment of which, an end is put to her controlling influence. Every son, every daughter is regarded as the child and servant of *Shashthi*, and when afflicted with sickness, offerings proper to her dignity and taste are cheerfully made. The domestic cat, the animal on which the guardian of children chooses to ride, is, in consequence, in every Hindu family, treated with peculiar tenderness; to strike puss with a broom-stick being looked upon as a species of daring impiety. Many are the vows which Hindu mothers pay to *Shashthi*, for the preservation and welfare of their offspring. No less than six festivals are annually celebrated in honour of this child-protecting goddess, of which the one held in the month of *Jaishtha* is the most remarkable. Not unlike the Dryads of a foreign mythology, *Shashthi* loves to dwell in the trunk of the Indian fig. In the out-skirts of every Hindu village in Bengal, there is found a *Danjan tree*, dedicated to this wood-nymph. There might you see, on a fair and smothering day of *Jaishtha*, all the women of the village assembled. There might you see the smiling faces of mothers, all radiant with joy, their heads bearing the holy offering, and their persons dressed with the finest clothes and adorned with the costliest ornaments. There might you see, too, women unpleas'd with *bonnie bairns*, those pledges of love, their countenances tinged with the deepest melancholy, and their lips uttering fervent petitions to the unpropitious deity. The charitable priest or priestess, as the case may be, repeats the sacred mantras; the musical *tan-pouris* give out their harsh dissonance; barren women eagerly receive presents from those blessed with children; and the fair procession retraces its steps to the village. But the festival is not

over yet; for newly-married men it has peculiar attractions. Sons-in-law are invited by their fathers-in-law, are presented with flowers and clothes, and are hospitably entertained. Festivity gladdens every home, and all rejoices in the amenities of the child-protecting goddess.

A third festival is held in the month of *Jaishtika*; it is the bathing of *Jagannath*. Every resident in Bengal must have seen the armless stump of an ill-shaped image, dignified with the appellation of the "lord of the world." On the occasion of the bathing festival, this ugly divinity, wrapped up with cloth, is carried out of its temple and seated on a recess built for the purpose. Amid the chants of Vedic incantations by brahmins, and the loud shouts of the spectators, the *soi-disant* "lord of the world" is divested of his garments, and bathed with the water of the *Bhagirathi*. The ceremony over, the spectators make presentations of flowers, sweetmeats, and money, to the new-washed deity, all which, we need scarcely say, are appropriated by the priests to their own use. The bathing festival is celebrated with the greatest pomp, at the sacred *Puri* in Orissa; but in Bengal it is held nowhere in a grander style than in a small village near Serampore. Thousands of people repair to the village, to witness the spectacle. It is a scene, however, more of dissolute licentiousness than of superstitious devotion. Old women, no doubt, go thither, purely for purposes of mistaken sanctity; but most of the spectators regard the whole affair as a sort of wanton amusement. Black-guards of every shape leave the metropolis, and frequent this scene of merriment. Most of the public women of the city make it a point of going, every year, to witness the celebration of the grand bathing festival. Young cockcombs, with their mistresses, swell the throng of the devotees. In the boats which leave the several ghâta of Calcutta, to wait the gay religionists to *Makesh*, for that is the name of the village where the festival is celebrated, nothing is to be heard, but the most licentious songs and the filthiest language. The pernicious influence which such a congregation of men and women exerts on Hindu society is inconceivable.

In the month of *A'sarha*, that is, the latter part of June and former of July, the only considerable festival that is held is what is called the *Ratha-Yatra*, or the car festival. About a fortnight after the bathing of *Jagannath*, he is placed on a wooden car, comfortably seated, in which he enjoys the benefit of a summer drive. The car is a huge unwieldy sort of chariot, moving upon wheels, and dragged by means of ropes attached to it. For facilities of locomotion, it is, perhaps, the worst possible machine that could have been invented. Besides the monstrous cars at *Puri* in Orissa, every Hindu village almost in Bengal has its separate car, in which the "Moloch of the East" is paraded about. In the city of Calcutta, there are, we imagine, several hundreds of cars; although, of late years, the number has considerably diminished. Before every large car, as it goes clattering along the ground, is poured forth the rich music of the deep-sounding *mridanga* and the deafening cymbals. Bands of singers, with stentorian voices, celebrate the praises of Krishna, and shows are exhibited. To assist in the movement of the ponderous machine, is reckoned a meritorious act; and hence old men, as well as children, eagerly grasp the dragging rope. We need not remind the reader that the car festival is celebrated with the greatest pomp and in the highest style in the *Puri* of *Jagannath*, in Orissa, to which hundreds of thousands of Hindus resort from all parts of India. Time was, when the deluded votaries of a most diabolical superstition stretched themselves under the wheels of the gigantic cars, and crushed themselves to death, with the hope of obtaining felicity in the coming world; but the beneficent spirit of the British Government has put a stop to these enormities. But in spite of this auspicious circumstance, every village car, by the filthy representations painted on it, exerts a most baleful influence on the morals of the people.

In the month of *Shra'bana*, consisting of part of July and part of August, are held two festivals, the rocking festival, and the worship of the queen of serpents.

Krishna, the most popular of all the gods of the Hindu pantheon, is the object of adoration in the *Jhulana-Yatra*, or the rocking festival. A throne, made sometimes of silver, but oftener of wood, is suspended from the ceiling by ropes, in a room adjoining the residence of the god. On this throne is placed the black deity, decked with gay ornaments. Like a child rocked in its cradle, the playful shepherd of *Gokul* is made to swing in his chair of state. The god, after being rocked to his heart's content, is removed to his shrine, where he is worshipped with a variety of offerings, accompanied with instrumental music. The adoration over, the friends of the proprietor of the house where the festival takes place, are entertained with sweetmeats. The revelry of the night is concluded with a scenic representation of the loves of Krishna, in which ugly boys and grown-up men perform the parts of the charming *Radha* and the fair milk-maids of *Brihadaban*. In this representation, the amours of the wanton lover of *Mathura* are detailed with disgusting circumstantiality; filthy songs are sung, with the melody of the screeching night-owl; and the actors exhibit a thousand indecent gestures and jesticulations of the body. For five, or more generally, for three successive nights, is the god rocked, friends are entertained, and the abominable representations repeated. Need we wonder, after witnessing these and other similar exhibitions, at the general profligacy of Hindu manners, and the destruction of all refined feelings of morality and delicacy? Need we be surprised, in the face of these deteriorating causes, if the combined influence of education and Christian truth has not yet effected so much improvement as is desirable in the moral tone of the Hindu community?

It is not a little singular, that the odious and venomous race of serpents should ever become the objects of human adoration. Whether it be that the mighty dragon who "deceived the mother of mankind" has, by his wicked arts, prevailed upon men to establish the worship of the serpent, as a monument of his great power, and a memorial of their inglorious fall; or, that the shape and the voluminous coils of the hateful reptile; suggested the ideas of eternity and power, as they did to the Egyptians of old; or whether it be that it is reckoned an acknowledged maxim in religion, that what is dreaded should be worshipped,—certain it is, that most nations of antiquity rendered divine homage to serpents. It is well known that all tropical countries are infested with snakes. Towards the end of the summer season, but especially during the rains, serpents issue out of their holes, and do great mischief to men and animals. In Bengal, hundreds of persons die every year of the bite of the snake. Hence, on many occasions throughout the year, the dreaded *Manasa-Devi*, the queen of snakes, is propitiated by presents, vows, and religious rites. In the month of *Shrabana*, the worship of the snake-goddess is celebrated with great *scdht*. An image of the goddess, seated on a water-lily, encircled with serpents, or a branch of the *snake-tree* (a species of *euphorbia*), or a pot of water, with images of serpents made of clay, forms the object of worship. Men, women and children, all offer presents, to avert from themselves the wrath of the terrific deity. The *Máls* or snake-catchers signify themselves on this occasion. Temporary scaffolds of bamba-work are set up in the presence of the goddess. Vessels filled with all sorts of snakes are brought in. The *Máls*, often reeling with intoxication, mount the scaffolds, take out serpents from the vessels, and allow them to bite their arms. The whole race of serpentry is defied. From the slender and harmless *Helé*, to the huge *Boa-constrictor* and the terrific *Cobra-de-capello*, all make their appearance, and exert their might to strike dead the playful *Mál*. Bite after bite succeeds; the arms run over with blood; and the *Máls* go on with their pranks, amid the deafening plaudits of the spectators. Now and then they fall off from the scaffold, and pretend to feel the effects of poison, and cure themselves by their incantations. But all is mere pretence. The serpents displayed on the occasion, and challenged to do their worst, have passed through a preparatory state. Their fangs have been carefully extracted from their jaws. But most of the vulgar spectators easily persuade themselves to believe, that the *Máls* are the chosen servants of Shiva and the favorites of *Manasa*. Although their supernatural pretensions are ridiculous, yet it must be confessed, that the *Máls* have made snakes the subject of their peculiar study. They are thoroughly acquainted with their qualities, their dispositions, and their habits. They will run down a snake into its hole, and bring it out thence by main force. Even the terrible *Cobra* is cowed down by the controlling influence of a *Mál*. When in the act of bringing out snakes from their subterranean holes, the *Máls* are in the habit of muttering charms, in which the names of *Manasa* and *Moháldev* frequently occur; superstition alone can clothe these unmeaning words with supernatural potency. But it is not inconsistent with the soundest philosophy to suppose that there may be some plants whose roots are disagreeable to serpents, and from which they instinctively turn away. All snake-catchers of Bengal are provided with a bundle of the roots of some plant, which they carefully carry along with them, when they set out on their serpent-hunting expeditions. When a serpent, disturbed in its hole, comes out furiously, hissing with rage, with its body coiled, and its head lifted up, the *Mál* has only to present before it the bundle of roots above alluded to, at the sight of which it becomes spiritless as an eel. This we have ourselves witnessed more than once. But to return; the exhibitions of snakes, of which we have been speaking, take place in all parts of Bengal. There is a small village in the district of *Bugli* where thousands of people annually assemble together to enjoy the sight. Skillful *Máls* are always presented, to the gaping multitude, with clothes and money. In giving an account, however short, of the great festival of the queen of snakes, it would be unpardonable, were we to omit noticing a circumstance which occurs a day or two before the public exhibitions. Bengali mothers, anxious for the preservation of their children from the bite of serpents, implore the favour of *Manasa*. On one of the last days of *Shrabana*, women may be seen coming out of a village, with vessels in their hands, containing a composition of rice, milk and sugar. Proceeding out of the village, they take their station generally near a tank and offer their homely present to the goddess on behalf of their children. The presentation being done, they help themselves to the rice, milk and treacle; and after thanking the goddess, of whom, however, no image is set up, they return home with the sure hope of seeing the children preserved during the ensuing season, from the bite of venomous snakes. In towns and large villages, where women cannot go out, this ceremony, termed *Ban-dhajan*, takes place in the house. In spite, however, of the caution and piety of Hindu mothers, their children are sometimes bitten by snakes. In all such cases, the power of *Manasa* is, by no means, questioned; the blame rests either on the children themselves, who are alleged to have been killed for their irreverence to her, or on the mothers, who are supposed not to have properly propitiated the angry goddess. In the month of *Shrabana*, towards the end of August and beginning of September, the only festival worthy of notice, in the celebration of the anniversary of the birth of *Arjuna*. The festival is named *Nandotsava*, literally, the "joy of *Nanda*," the reputed father of the shepherd-king. The way in which the *Yatis* express their joy on the anniversary of the birth of their god, is not of the most refined sort. When the strictly religious ceremonies are over, rejoicing

religionists dig a hole in the yard, before the temple of the deity, and pour into it water, curds, turmeric, earth, and other substances. The followers of Krishna jump into the hole in the yard; besmear their bodies with the poured materials; and thus adorned, dance with infinite zest, their hands lifted up, and their brazen throats uttering the praises of their beloved god. From the yard of the house they go out to the streets, and make a perambulation of the village. After they have danced and sung to exhaustion, they throw themselves into a tank, where they wash their bodies. The devotional merriment of the forenoon being over, they betake themselves to rest. In the cool of the afternoon, the sound of the *myridanga* rouses the slumbering *Vaishnavas*, who form themselves into companies, and sing the praises of *Rádhá* and *Krishna*. As the bands of choristers perambulate the streets, they dance, laugh, weep, and sometimes fall to the ground. With *Vaishnavas*, the anniversary of *Krishna's* birth is a season of high festivity. They wash their houses clean; send presents to one another; put on their best clothes and their brightest ornaments; concoct the finest dishes, and eat the best sweetmeats. Fasting and humiliation, doubtless, accompany the festival; but these precede its celebration. In this festival, the *Goshavámis* reap the greatest benefits, for their deluded and blind votaries make to them ample and substantial presents. The regular and the mendicant *Vaishnavas* are also, on this occasion, munificently rewarded.

In the month of *Ashvina*, consisting of part of September and part of October, are held the *Durgá* and the *Lakshmi pujás*.

Of all Bengali festivals, that celebrated in honour of *Durgá*, is unquestionably, the most popular. Men, women and children; the learned and the ignorant, the rich and the poor, the self-righteous and proud brahman, as well as the humble and despised *Chandál*, all welcome the approach of this festival with the greatest delight. It is a season of universal festivity throughout the land. All people, to whatever part of the country they may have gone, for purposes of gain, return to their homes at this festival. The *Mohattalites* that reside in Calcutta, wind up their business, shut up their shops, and hasten to the country. During this festival, all the wealth, all the pomp of the people, are displayed. Every man puts on the best clothes and the best shoes that his means afford. There is no Hindu family, in the whole country, which does not buy new clothes on this occasion. For months before, all classes of people, tradesmen, merchants, shop-keepers, husbandmen, &c., lay up some money in store against this monster-festival; and very often the hard earnings of a whole twelve month are spent in the course of the three *pujá* days. The Jews were not more joyous at the feast of *Purim*, the people of Christendom not more merry at Christmas, than the Hindus are gay during the *Durgá puja* holidays. All is bustle and merriment. The husbandman lays aside his plough, the merchant his books, the tradesman his tools, and the lauded proprietor his *zemindari* cares, and all partake of the general mirth. From every village proceeds the music of the *tom-tom*, and in every house is heard the voice of festivity. In this season of universal excitement, what signs of joy does one behold! what gleesome looks! what joyous faces! what congratulations of friends! what rivers of delight! what oceans of gladness! It is not our object to give to our readers lessons on the Hindu ritual and mythology, but to exhibit a picture of Bengali manners and cus; toms; therefore the institution of the high festival under consideration, and the strictly religious ceremonies connected with it, will not detain us long. The goddess *Durgá*—the female principle by whose influence the universe was created—the wife of the *bang-eating* god *Shiva*, is said, among other things, to have, in time immemorial, destroyed a giant of the name of *Mahis*, who had maltreated the gods, and oppressed the inhabitants of the three worlds. To commemorate this extraordinary act of beneficence to gods and men, is the object of the *Durgá* festival. The image which is worshipped in this festival is terrific to behold. Possessed of ten arms, which grasp different sorts of weapons, the goddess supports her right leg on a lion, and her left on the shoulder of the giant whom she conquers, and into whose heart a serpent from one of her arms strikes its deadly fangs. Over her head, in a painted arch, are exhibited her numerous attendants in the battle-field, and the carnage of the countless hosts of the giant. On her two sides stand, in graceful posture, her two daughters, the goddess of prosperity and the goddess of wisdom—the *Ceres* and *Minerva* of the Grecian mythology; while close to them are placed *Ganesha*, with his head like that of an elephant, and the fair *Háriti* riding on a peacock. The worship of this image, which is made of straw and clay, lasts three days; on the fourth day it is thrown into the river or a tank. After a world of preparatory rites and ceremonies, on the first day of the *pujá*, the image is animated with the spirit of *Durgá*, to which religious adorations are rendered. Her attendants, in the canopy overhead, and the accompanying gods and goddesses on her right and left, also receive their due share of worship. The chief peculiarity in the worship of the second day is, that the goddess is bathed with great solemnity. On this day widows fast, with a view to obtain benefit for themselves as well as their children. Unlike the first two days, when the goddess is worshipped more than once, on the third day she is worshipped only once. On all the three days great numbers of animals are sacrificed. Kids, sheep, and buffaloes are led to the altar, and sacrificed by a brahman or a blacksmith, amid the deafening music of *tom-toms*, and the plaudits of the spectators. On the third day, which is emphatically a bloody day, the largest number of animals is killed. On all the three days, after the conclusion of the daily ceremonies, brahmins and friends are feasted profusely with

sweetmeats, fruits and curds. On every *pūjā* night also, before the goddess are sung filthy and other songs, and scenic representations are enacted. The nature of these amusements varies as the tastes of the parties who worship the goddess. In one house you see *natch-girls*, dressed in transparent clothes, through which their every member, their every muscle is discoverable, gently pace the floor to the sound of musical instruments, while your refined and delicate feelings are shocked, no less at the songs, which, though sung with silvery voices, are of the filthiest description, than at the indecent gesticulations of their fair forms. In another you perceive two bands of songsters rending the skies with their shrieks, mis-called singing; chanting at the highest pitch of their voice the praises of the giant-killing *Durgā*; exoting at each other the foulest language; and you wonder how a people, laying the least claim to civilization and refinement, can derive gratification from these disgusting and horrible exhibitions. In another house still you witness those execrable representations in which grown-up boys, with sooty faces and screeching voices enact the parts of the lovely milk-maids of *Brindāban*. The moral influence of these licentious exhibitions and grotesque representations is perilous in the extreme. Apart from the hardening effects of idolatry, the *Durgā pūjā*, with its boisterous and obscene merriment, its vigils of three successive nights, its monetary extravagance, its ludicrous sights, its licentious exhibitions, produces an awful deterioration in the moral health of the community. But the operations of the fourth and last day remain to be noticed. On this day, in which no sacrifices are offered, after going through a round of religious adorations, the officiating priest dismisses the goddess and implores her to return the next year. The dismissing ceremony over, the females of the house pour out their lamentations at the near prospect of the departure of so beneficent a deity. The goddess is then presented with gifts, and the dust of her feet is rubbed on the foreheads of the votaries. Nothing now remains to be done, but to consign the image, from which the divine spirit of *Durgā* has already departed, to the care of the waters. Borne on the shoulders of stout bearers, the idol is paraded through the streets with great pomp. The streets resound with music and singing, and the acclamations of the worshippers. As the carcass of the divinity passes along the streets, the spectators join their hands in sign of adoration. The parade over, the idol, with all its trappings and its tinsel ornaments, is cast into the waters, where the people vie with one another in rinsing the goddess of her decorations. On returning from the immersion, the priest sprinkles the votaries with holy water, and offers them his benedictions. They now embrace each other with much enthusiasm, and partake of a draught of a solution of hemp leaves, which produces a gentle intoxication. It is not a little interesting to see a whole people embracing one another with much cordiality, and entertaining each other with suitable refreshments. We are not aware that drunkenness-crowns the operations of the last day of the festival; for the potation of hemp leaves, diluted with much water, produces only a little excitement, too slight to lead to any serious consequences.

On the full moon, which immediately follows the *Durgā pūjā*, is celebrated the festival of *Lakshmi*, the goddess of prosperity. In every Hindu house a basket, which serves as a measure of corn, is set up as the representative of prosperity, and worshipped. This basket or corn-measure is filled with paddy, encircled with a garland of flowers, and covered with a piece of cloth. In some houses, however, an image of the goddess, seated on the lotus, is worshipped. There is nothing remarkable in this festival, further than that in every house one or two persons sit up the whole night; for it is believed that in some part of the night *Lakshmi* passes over every house, and blesses those who are awake. With the expectation of obtaining this blessing, multitudes in every village sit up the whole night, after drinking a little quantity of the water of the cocoa-nut. Those watchers spend the night in playing at cards, chess, &c. and though they find no perceptible accession to their wealth, they yet believe that negligence, in watching would bring down misfortunes upon the house.

In the month of *Kārtik*, consisting of part of October and part of November, the goddesses *Shyāmā* and *Jagaddhātri*, and the god *Kārtikēya* are worshipped; brothers are feasted by their sisters; and the *Rās* festival is celebrated.

The mythological story connected with the *Shyāmā* festival is soon told. In the celebrated war of *Durgā* or *Kālī*—for the latter is only a modification of the former—with *Sumbha* and *Nisumbha*, *Kālī* obtained a victory over *Rakta Bija*, the commander-in-chief of the enemy's forces. So transported was she at this triumph, that she danced. But the dancing of the able goddess was quite a different affair from the dancing of ordinary balls. Her dancing shook the centres to its centre, and gods and men were frightened and ran to her husband, *Shiva*, to persuade his amiable wife to discontinue the terrific dance. Solicitous of the welfare of the gods, *Shiva* instantly hastened to the battle-field, and perceiving no way of alleviating his consort's joy, threw himself among the mountains of the dead. When the goddess saw that she was dancing upon the body of her husband, she put out her tongue and remained motionless. The image generally formed of *Kālī*, represent the above-mentioned scene in the battle-field. The body of *Shiva* lies on the ground, on which the dreaded goddess takes her station. She stands trampling upon her husband; her tongue put out to a great length; her four arms extended, one grasping a sword, another the head of a giant, and the other two signalling to her innumerable hosts; that were adorned with two corpses worn as ear-rings; her neck ornamented

with a necklace of skulls; her waist encircled with a zone of the hands of fallen giants; her sable tresses falling down to her heels in ample profusion. Intoxicated with the blood of enemies, her terrible eyes flash red with rage, her eyebrows are dyed with crimson, and blood in rills flows down her breast. The nature of her worship is in keeping with her dreadful appearance. It takes place exactly in the middle of the night of new moon. The number of the animals sacrificed to her is immense. The yard before her temporary temple becomes often deluged with blood. The horror of the scene baffles description. The natural gloom of mid-night, unbroken by moon-shine; the piteous cries of animals led to the slaughter; the glancing of scymitars ready to fall upon the devoted victims; the streams of blood deluging the yard; the horrid din of deafening tom-toms; the terrific yells of the spectators, when the sacrificial knife lays low the extended animal; the frantic dances of the votaries, besmeared with the clotted blood of slaughtered buffaloes; the appalling exclamations of the officiating priests, bawling aloud, as they often do, "*Jaya Tara! Jaya Tara!*" that is, "*Victory to Tara! victory to Tara!*"—the drunken feats of the intoxicated worshippers, who this night all partake of spirits; and in fine, the sable goddess before whom these scenes are enacted; all this produces an accumulation of horrors too frightful to behold.

Two days after the *Shyama* festival, it is customary with Hindu sisters to feast their brothers. On this occasion, the sisters mark the foreheads of their brothers with a certain paint prepared for the purpose. While in the act of putting on the paint, they implore a blessing in behalf of their brothers, to the following effect:—"While I put the paint on your forehead, may the path towards the regions of *Yama* be planted with thorns." To *Yama*, the Indian Pluto—the king of the infernal regions, at this time, suitable acts of worship are rendered. The brothers are then feasted with all sorts of Bengali delicacies, and presented with clothes. In the beginning of this month, the unmarried girls of every house perform a ceremony which deserves notice, as it illustrates the manners of the people. In this ceremony, homage is rendered to the king of death, from whom the virgin worshippers solicit the agreeable gifts of husbands and sons, and exemption from punishment in the future world. What is the way in which so desirable gifts may be obtained? A small pit is dug near the front of the house, the four corners of this pit are sown with barley or wheat, and planted with branches of the plantain tree; misses putting on clean clothes, their heads sprinkled with *Gangá* water, repair to this pit, and present flowers to the Indian Pluto; a *houris* every morning, for thirty days successively, is put into an earthen pot; on the last day these thirty *houris* are presented to the person who dug the pit; and after going through all this, spinners rejoice in the confidence of obtaining agreeable husbands and seraphic boys.

The goddess *Jagaddhatri*, riding on a lion, and grasping in her four hands a conch, a discus, a water-lily and a club, is only one of the almost countless forms of *Durga*. Her worship, like that of anti-type, lasts one day. The repetition of incantations, the presentation of offering and bloody sacrifices, the recitation of sacred stories, the entertainment of brahmans, together with scenic representations, songs, and dances, make up the several items of her adoration. She is last of all thrown into the river or a pool, the common reservoir of all Hindu gods and goddesses.

At the close of the month of *Kartik* is held the festival of the god *Kartikeya*, the Indian Mars, the son of *Shiva* and *Durga*. It is inconsistent with the design of this article to relate the circumstances connected with the birth of the six-faced hero-god, how the immortal smarted under the iron rule of a supercilious giant; how the fair daughter of the king of *Himalaya* courted the mighty lord of *Kailas*; how the Indian Cupid was reduced to ashes by the wrath of *Shiva*; whom he wounded with one of his maddening arrows;—all which events have been described by the graphic pen of *Kali Das*, in his great epic entitled the *Kumar-Sambhava*. The knightly *Kartikeya*, riding on a peacock, and holding in his two hands a bow and arrows, is a very popular god. His worship, lasting only one short night, and being moreover attended with very little expense, thousands of images are annually adored in all parts of the country. An unmarried bachelor as the god is, and living, as he does, in concubinage with a mistress presented him by the king of heaven, he is a favourite of the *Valutta* strumpets, who perform his annual rites with much pomp. There is nothing remarkable in the celebration of the *Kartikeya* festival, except that it is attended with much indecent and licentious festivity, more animated music than on other occasions, and uncommon pomp and circumstance of processions.

The *Rasa-Yatra* completes the list of festivals in the month of *Kartik*.—We should have mentioned this festival before, inasmuch as it invariably precedes the *Kartikeya* festival. The *Rasa-Yatra* is an annual commemoration of the sports of *Krishna* with the milk-maids of *Brindaban*. It is held for three successive nights. On a high recess, open on all sides, and built for the purpose, the god is brought out of its temple and seated. Around it are placed many images of the god made of clay. On the open space, in front of the recess, is a canopy spread, from which are suspended paper-made images of various animals and reptiles. The god is worshipped with due solemnity, and the spectators amused with love-songs and the extensible *Yatras*. Towards the morning the god is carried to its temple, whence it is taken on the two following nights, and the same ceremonies and scenes are repeated. The silvery brightness of a full-moon night—the time when this celebration takes place; the unclouded serenity of a Bengal autumn; the merry-makings and festivities before the *Rasa-Manja*; and

the gay recollections of the festive sports and wanton gambols of the lover of *Radha*, which this festival calls up in the minds of the votaries, make the *Rasa* a favourite festival of the inhabitants of Lower Bengal. Before the house in which this festival is celebrated with considerable ostentation, temporary sheds are erected and shops are opened, where sweetmeats, *pan leaves*, and *betel-nuts* are sold in large quantities. Altogether, it is a scene of animation and enjoyment. But we need scarcely inform the reader, that these pleasures are not unmixed with outrages on the female character. We would be doing injustice to the Bengalis, however, did we maintain that these outbreaks are invariable attendants of the festival. But we do hold, notwithstanding, that the *Rasa* serves greatly to demoralize the national character.

In the month of *Agrahayana*, consisting of part of November and part of December, only one festival worthy of notice is celebrated. It is the festival of the *first fruits*. Bengal being an agricultural country, and rice being the staple food of its inhabitants, the harvest is a season of joy and thanksgiving. But the Bengalis are also a religious people; the system of Hinduism exercises a vast influence on their manners and customs. Hence, before the general harvest, the first sheaves of paddy are offered to the gods. On this occasion the new rice of the year, together with milk, and the fruits and roots of the season, are presented to the immortals with due solemnity. The great progenitors of the human race, the far-famed *Munis* and *Rishis*, and the immediate forefathers of the celebrating family, are not deprived of their just shares. Even the beasts of the field, and the birds of the air, are attended to, for the new rice is placed in the fields, and on high places for their benefit. The Bengali, who is the humblest of all men, after presenting the first fruits of the season to the gods, the progenitors, the jackals and the crows, last of all partakes of it himself. This festival, which is appropriately termed the festival of the *new rice*, is concluded in some parts of the country with manly sports, pyrotechnic exhibitions, and entertainments given to brahmans and friends. This institution is not unlike the Jewish feast of the first fruits. Excepting for the corruptions of superstition which disgrace this feast, it is to us a most delightful spectacle to see a whole nation, by presenting the first fruits of the year to the higher powers, give a marked expression to the religious sentiments of common humanity, and acknowledge their dependence on the bountiful giver of all things. It is pleasing to contemplate that the Hindu does not feel himself at liberty to use the staple food of the country without first offering it to him who is the Creator and Preserver, not only of men, but also of the beasts and birds that perish; though regarding him, the Hindu, it must be confessed, entertains most dishonouring notions in other respects.

In the month of *Poush*, which comprises part of December and part of January, are held two festivals which merit description. The first which we shall mention, is a social institution and seems to have no connection whatever with the performance of religious rites and ceremonies. It is named *Poushalli*, from the circumstance of its celebration in the month of *Poush*. On a certain day of the month, parties, with baskets in their hands, and loads on their backs, may be seen begging large quantities of rice and ordinary vegetables from every house in the village. The begging over, they repair to a garden on the out-skirts of the village, where they make preparations for a feast. The males of every household which has contributed to the general stock of food, are invited to partake of this sylvan banquet. In order to allay all apprehension arising from the distinctions of caste, three or four brahmans are appointed *cuisiniers*. While the sacred cooks busily carry on their work of concoction, the guests divert themselves with running and swimming matches, and the robust exercises of *Danda-guli* and *Hadu-Gadu*. After all have refreshed themselves with a genial bath in the adjoining tank, they sit down on the grass, and partake on plantain leaves of the elements of a rude repast. After crowning the feast, not indeed with flowing bumpers, but with betel-nuts and tobacco, they ostentively lie down on the grassy couch of nature, indulge in agreeable talk, and return to their homes in the cool of the evening. Sometimes, in considerable villages, several parties are formed, which celebrate separate feasts in different groves. We need scarcely inform the reader, that this festival is unknown to the inhabitants of the metropolis, where the same facilities are not afforded. These sylvan repasts, besides the innocent hilarity connected with them, contribute in a great measure to produce feelings of friendliness and brotherly love between the several members of the Hindu community.

The only other festival of any consequence in the month of *Poush* is the *feast of cakes*. On this occasion, as at Christmas in England, every cottage in every hamlet of Bengal is provided with a plentiful supply of cakes. Perhaps some of our readers will put the question—What sorts of things are Bengali cakes? For the gratification of these readers, but especially for the benefit of certain Calcutta restaurateurs, who may think of entertaining European ladies and gentlemen in the forthcoming Christmas with a dish of Bengali delicacies, we, though no confectioners, give the following recipe:—Let rice be pounded and formed into a sort of paste; take a small quantity of this paste, and by means of your fingers spread it out into the form of a small hollow cup; fill this cup with a mixture of the kernel of the coconut and tencis, or with cream; carefully cover this substance by joining the ends of the paste spread out in the manner described; put this closed cup in a handy of boiling water; take it out of the handy say, after five minutes, and you will have a Bengali cake of the first quality, invaluable for producing stomach-ache. For three days do men, women, & children indulge in these abominable

cakes. During these days the goddess of prosperity, and the queen of serpents, are worshipped. On the first day of the festival all the articles of furniture of the house are bound by pieces of straw, with the view that they may never pass out of their present owner's hands. In some places a large cake, in the form of a cat, is offered with due solemnity, accompanied with the repetition of incantations to *Shasti*, the protectress of children. Long may the feast of cakes, but purified from its heathenish associations, continue on the plains of Bengal, and bring with it every year household joys and comforts! Long may old men and old women, boys and girls, partake of the rice-made cakes, which, though noxious in their effects on delicate stomachs, contribute to the mirth and festivity of thirty millions of people! And long may the month of *Poush* continue to crown the labours of Bengal farmers with golden success!

In the month of *Magh*, which consists of part of December and part of January, only one festival is celebrated, viz., the worship of *Sarashwati*. The fair and eloquent *Sarashwati*, standing upon a water-lily and playing on a lute, is the Minerva of the Hindus, the goddess of learning. It was she who inspired in bye-gone ages the sublime *Vyas*, the mighty *Valmiki*, and the versatile *Kali Das*; and it is the same beneficent goddess that, in these degenerate days, instructs the humble *Sudra* in the elements of learning, and initiates the exalted brahman into the mysteries of *Nyaya* and of the *Vedanta*. In every hamlet in Bengal, on the fifth day of the increase of the moon in this month, is the worship of this patroness of learning celebrated by her votaries. Unlike the other goddesses and gods of the Hindu Pantheon, this beautiful and amiable daughter of *Bramhā* has not particular clique of adorers and supporters. Every person who is acquainted with letters, from the morose tyro that writes the alphabet on palm leaves, to the venerable Principal of a Sanskrit *Choubuti*, is a votary of the celestial *Bagbadini*. At this festival, divine homage is rendered to manuscripts, printed books, pens, inkstands, and all the implements of reading and writing; and flowers, accompanied with the repetition of certain forms of prayers are offered to them by every male. It is quite in keeping with the woman-degrading spirit of Hinduism, that females are excluded from paying adoration to the goddess of learning, since they have neither part nor lot in her gifts: but it is not a little singular that the Hindu should make a female divinity preside over wisdom and intelligence. Mr. Ward, in his "*History, Literature and Religion of the Hindus*," to which we are much indebted in the drawing up of this article, says that shocking indecencies are connected with the celebration of this festival. We are not aware of such being the case, and are induced to suppose that he drew a general conclusion from an isolated fact which came under the eye of his observation, but which had no necessary connexion with the festival which we are now reviewing. We may here remark, once for all, that Mr. Ward's book contains a mass of the most valuable information regarding the Hindus, and that we have been struck with its minute accuracy. But we cannot help at the same time observing, that in a few instances Mr. Ward is a little too severe upon the Hindus: he holds out the dark side of the native character oftener than he does the bright.

In *Phalgun*, the eleventh month of the Hindus, the most considerable festival is celebrated in honour of Krishna, and is termed *Dol* or the *Holi* festival. The *Holi* festival is held in the grandest style in the Western Provinces, where, for a long period preceding the full moon, the "noise of riot and injury, and outrage" used in bygone times to "ascend the loftiest towers of luxurious cities." We say in bye-gone times; for the mild and peaceful administration of the British has considerably abated the fury of those diabolical rites. During the *Holi* festival the Hindus are permitted to indulge in the grossest licentiousness with impunity. Gambling prevails universally; the everlasting sound of tinkling cymbals is heard day and night; the filthiest songs are sung in the open streets; the vilest abuse is cast in the teeth of the passengers; women are insulted; red powder is ever and anon doing its business of blinding the eyes; a solution of this powder, or any other liquid preparation, is constantly being discharged from syringes; and the dance of drunken devotees crowns the scene. All this to a considerable extent prevails even now in this city. But we must admit, that in the Mafassil such atrocities are not committed. There the god Krishna is worshipped, the devotees besmear themselves with red powder, and amuse themselves with singing, music, and fire-works. This festival is a commemoration of the sports of the merry-hearted lover of *Gokul* with the milk-maids of *Brindaban*.

Omitting the mention of *Shiva's night*, it just occurs to us to say, that an elegant divinity is worshipped this month with due solemnity. What may our readers imagine this amiable god to be? Why, it is none other than the lovely *Ghentu*, the patron of that cutaneous eruption, which in common parlance passes under the name of itch. The pomp and circumstance of the adoration of this god are in beautiful keeping with the dignity of his character, and the services he renders to humanity. The scene of worship is the dung-hill, a necessary appendage to every Bengal house in the country. A broken *handy* of earthenware, its bottom blackened by the soot of many a month, and daubed white with lime, and interspersed with a few strokes of turmeric, together with a branch or two of the *Ghentu* plant, and last, not least, a broom-stick of the genuine palmyra or cocoanut stock, serve as the representation of the presiding deity of itch. The mistress of the family, for whose benefit the worship is performed, acts the priestess. The repetition of a few doggerel rhymes being over, the *handy* is broken into a thousand pieces, to no small delight of the little urchins who dance around the place, and conclude the rites of adoration by gathering up the shivered fragments, and by reciting songs to the honour, or rather

to the shame, of the god of itch. It may not be here out of place to remark that the Bengalis pay homage to the patrons of some of the other diseases that break out with peculiar virulence in the country. In addition to the patron deity of itch, they have *Shitala*, the goddess of the small-pox, *Ola Bibi*, the patroness of that frightful scourge of modern times, the cholera. By conciliating the favour of these *nosopoeitic* divinities, the Bengalis fondly hope for an exemption from the influence of those maladies over which they preside.

In *Chaitra*, the closing month of the Bengali year, the great *swinging festival* takes place. It is said to have been instituted by an ancient king, who, by undergoing great austerities, procured an interview with the drunken lord of *Kailas*, in whose honour this festival is celebrated. The Hindus who particularly signalize themselves in performing the rites of this far-famed festival are called *Sannyasis*. A Hindu of any caste whatever may become a *Sannyasi*. These devotees, for the space of a month, or a fortnight, or ten days at the least, go through a round of preparatory punishments. They take only one meal; visit every day *Shiva's Lingam*; repeatedly pronounce his various names; dance round his temple, and abstain from all ceremonial pollution. Not unlike the drunken devotees of Bacchus in classic Greece, who, during the celebration of the orgies, wore the sacred *Prætexta*, the votaries of the Indian Bacchus put on the holy *upabit* during the swinging festival. The preparatory services over, on the first day of the festival the *Sannyasis* throw themselves down from a *bambu* stage upwards of twenty feet high. At the foot of the bambu stage are placed, in an inclined position, knives and spikes of iron put upon heaps of straw. Upon these instruments do the votaries of *Shiva* cast themselves from the high stage. Hardly is any body injured; for owing to the peculiar posture of the iron instruments, they do not penetrate into the bodies of the falling worshippers, but fall along with them to the ground. Then follows the great day of boring. It is needless to describe what every resident in Calcutta, or any other city of India, has often witnessed. The arm of one *Sannyasi* bored by a sugar; a long iron bar put through the slit tongue of a second, which he holds by both his hands; a third dancing in the middle of two rattans, which have pierced his sides; and a fourth, all planted over with needles, all these sights must be familiar—painfully familiar—to every inhabitant of Calcutta. These borings are accompanied with shows and pantomimic exhibitions. Long rows of fantastic figures pass along the streets. The well-digger, with a basket in one hand and a hoe in the other, his body daubed over with clay; the school boy in his short dress, and his tucked up hair, with a bunch of palm leaves under his arm; the bended *bhisil*, with his leathern *mussuck* and his sounding tin; the intoxicated *mather*, his one hand holding a broom-stick, and the other twirling up his *moustache*; the potatoe-seller, with a basket on his head, crying potatoes "most musically up and down;" a rabble of savage Burmese in their peculiar habiliments and superb ear-rings, eternally crying *po-po-po*; the paper-made and moving Church, in which the *Padre Sahib* reads from his holy book and addresses the assembled multitudes; the peacock-shaped boat gliding along to the sound of dulcet symphonies; the glittering square rooms in which Bengali fairies display the charming beauty of their person and the rich music of their voice; all these, and a hundred other shows, erewhile graced the street of Calcutta. We say, *erewhile* graced the streets of Calcutta; for, to the infinite regret of the good Hindus of this city, these shows are not allowed by the Gothic myrmidons of the police to pass through its streets! On the last day of the *Charak puja*, the swinging, strictly so called, takes place. An upright pole of twenty feet or more in length, is put vertically into the ground. On the top of this pole, a transverse beam is made to move round a pivot. To the ends of this transverse beam are attached two ropes, the one for fastening the swinging devotee, and the other for turning round the machine. The back of the devotee is bored by a hook which is fastened to the rope of the transverse beam. On a signal given, the machine is set a-going, and the wretched devotee describes a painful circumference round the *Charak-tree*. The swinging *Sannyasi*, whose aerial sojourn is often half an hour long, amuses himself with throwing to the gaping crowd plantains, sweetmeats and fruits, with which he had plentifully provided himself before his ascension. It is not to be supposed that only one man swings at one time round a *Charak-tree*, although this is very generally the case. In this city itself, sixteen men have been seen to swing round one tree at the same time; and we have been informed, on credible authority, that no less than thirty-two men have been observed to swing simultaneously round one tree in the village of *Santipore*, near Kishnagar! The place where the swinging is performed is always a scene of excitement and bustle. The loud acclamation of the spectators, and their noisy eagerness to obtain the substances thrown by the hero of the moment from his aerial position; the vociferations of those turning the beam, who cheer on one another; the sounds "*De pak! De pak!*" that is, "Turn more violently, turn more violently," which the swinging devotee in bravo often makes; the horrid din of deafening *tom-toms* which pour out "many a bout of linked sweetness;" all these circumstances turn the swinging place into a perfect Babel. Around the *Charak-tree* in the *Mofussil* is invariably held a fair, where knives, razors, sweetmeats, clothes, and trinkets of all sorts are sold in large quantities. Old wives and young maidens, the men of seventy and the boy in his *teens* all dressed in their holiday's best, repair to the *Charak-ground* as to a gay fair. The last man comes down from the tree, the goods are bought and sold, mountebanks close their seats, and the scene is wound up. The *Charak* is ended. All the annual festivals are ended. The Bengali year is ended.

RULES

Observed at the Accountant General's Office and the Treasury for the calculation of anticipated interest and interest generally.

Interest to be paid by the month: each month to be taken as 12th of a year, and to consist of 30 days or parts.

In cases where it may be necessary to calculate interest on the fractional parts of a month of 31 days, the extra days to be struck out.

Application of above Rule to the present 5 per cent. Loan of 1841-42, on which the half-yearly interest falls due on the 31st December, and 30th June of each year.

A person subscribing on the 27th October 1846, will be entitled to anticipated interest from 27th October to 30th December 1846, inclusive, or for 2 months and 3 days, thus:

From 27th October to 26th December 1846, 2 months or $\frac{2}{12}$ th of a year, from 27th December to 30th December, 3 days or $\frac{3}{30}$ of $\frac{1}{12}$.

(December having 31 days, one day is omitted.)

A person subscribing to the Loan on the 29th of December, will be entitled to only one day's anticipated interest. On the 30th he will not be entitled to any.

In the half year ending with the 30th June, there will be no deduction on this account: June having only 30 days.

COINS, WEIGHTS, MEASURES, EXCHANGES, &c.

CALCUTTA IN BENGAL.

COINS.—Accounts are kept here in Rupees, with their subdivisions, Annas and Pie; 12 Pie make 1 Anna; 16 Annas 1 Rupee.

The standard of the Bengal money has ever been silver. Gold is occasionally coined, but the great bulk of the currency is silver.

There are various kinds of Rupees to be met with in Bengal, whose fineness and weight are different, though their denominations are the same. From this, and from the natives frequently punching holes in the Rupees, and filling up the vacancy with base metal, and their wilfully diminishing the weight of the coin after coming from the mint, the currencies of Rupees from the different provinces are of different values. This defect has introduced a custom of employing shroffs or money-changers, whose business is to set a value upon these different currencies, according to every circumstance, either in their favour, or their prejudice. When a sum of Rupees is brought to one of these shroffs, he examines them piece by piece, and arranges them according to their fineness; then by their weight; he then allows for the different legal battas upon Company's Rupees, Siccas and Sonats; and this done, he values in gross by the Rupees current what the whole are worth; so that the Rupee current is the only thing fixed, by which coin is valued.

A Lac of Rupees is 1,00,000; and a Crore, 100 Lacs or 1,00,00,000 Rupees; and in accounts, sums are distinguished into Crores, Lacs, and single Rupees, by marks or divisions, as in the foregoing examples.

Cowries, small, white, glossy shells, are made use of for small payments in the Bazar, and are generally thus reckoned:—

Coinage.

FORT WILLIAM, FINANCIAL DEPARTMENT.

11th November 1840. *Proclamation.*—The Governor General in Council is pleased to notify, that from and after the 11th day of November 1840, in respect to the Mint of Calcutta, and from and after the 1st day of April 1841, in respect to the Mints of Fort Saint George and Bombay, those parts of Act No. XVII. of 1835, which were suspended by Act No. XXXI. of 1837, directing that certain Silver Coins issued from the Mints within the Territories of the East India Company shall bear on the Obverse the Head of the Reigning Sovereign of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, will be again in force; and that the Device of the Silver Coins which shall be coined from and after the said dates respectively in the Mints of India, in conformity with Acts XVII. of 1835 and XXI. of 1838, will be as Act No. XVII. of 1835 requires, viz.

On the Obverse—the Head of Her Majesty Victoria with the words

VICTORIA, QUEEN.

On the Reverse—The denomination of the Coin in English and Persian in the Centre, encircled by a Wreath, and around the margin the words—

EAST INDIA COMPANY,—1840.

The Coin will be milled on the edge, with a serrated or upright milling like the rupee now current bearing the Head of His late Majesty Wm. IV.

The Weight, Standard, Pineness and Value of the Company's Rupees, as defined in the Act, are here repeated.

Weight.—180 grains Troy, or one Tola.

Standard Quality.—Eleven-twelfths Silver, one twelfth alloy.

Value.—The same as the Co.'s Rs. of 1835, the Madras, Bombay, Furrukabad, and Sonat Rupee, and equal to $\frac{1}{4}$ of the late Sicca Rupee.

The other Silver Coins authorized to be issued from the Government Mints by Act No. XVI. of 1835 and Act No. XXII. of 1838, viz. double, half, and quarter rupees, and two anna pieces, will bear in all respects a due proportion to this Rupee.

The Governor General in Council hereby directs that all Magistrates, Collectors, and other Public Officers, will promulgate this Proclamation throughout their respective Districts; and that a translation of it be affixed in a conspicuous place, at every Public Treasury.

Money Changers, Shroffs, Podars and others, should be required to take notice of the Provision in Act No. XVII. of 1835, against clipping, filing, punching, or otherwise defacing the legal Coin. The Silver Coins issued from the Mints of Government, under Act XVII. of 1835, if not cut, clipped, marked, or otherwise willfully impaired, are legal tender for their full value, until by gradual wear, they have lost two per cent. of their original weight.

EXCHANGES.

For the conversion of the rupee into the equivalent currency of other nations, it is necessary to take into consideration the fluctuating relative value of the precious metals *inter se*, from the circumstance of gold being in some, and silver in others, the legal medium of circulation.

It is also necessary to take account of the mint charge for coining at each place, which adds a fictitious value to the local coin. The *par of exchange* for these reasons,

a somewhat ambiguous term, requiring to be distinguished under two more definite denominations. 1st, the *intrinsic par*, which represents that case in which the pure metal contained in the parallel denominations of coins is equal. 2nd, the *commercial par*, or that case in which the current value of the coin at each place (after deducting the seignorage leviable for coinage) is equal: or in other words, 'two sums of money of different countries are *commercially* at par, while they can purchase an equal quantity of the same kind of pure metal.*

Thus if silver be taken from India to England, it must be sold to a bullion merchant at the market price, the proprietor receiving payment in gold (or notes convertible into it.) The London mint is closed against the importer of silver; which metal has not therefore a minimum value in the English market fixed by the mint price: although it has so in Calcutta, where it may always be converted into coin at a charge of 2 per cent. On the other hand, if a remittance in gold be made from this country to England, its out-turn there is known and fixed: each new Calcutta *gold mohur* being convertible into 1-66 or $1\frac{2}{3}$ sovereign nearly; but the price of the *gold mohur* fluctuates as considerably in India as that of silver does in England, the natural tendency of commerce being to bring to an equilibrium the operations of exchange in the two metals.

The exchange between England and India, has therefore a twofold expression; for silver, the price of the sicca rupee in shillings and pence:—for gold, the price of the sovereign in rupees. To calculate the out-turn of a bullion remittance in either metal, recourse may be had to the following

Table of English and Indian Exchanges.

The data for the calculation of these tables are :

1st. One *mun.* (or 100lbs. troy) of silver ($\frac{1}{12}$ ths alloy) is coined into 3200 Company's rupees, of which 64 and 60 respectively are taken as mint duty, being at the rate of two per cent.

2nd. 100 lbs. troy of English standard silver ($\frac{13}{20}$ ths alloy) is coined into 6600 shillings, of which 400 are taken as seignorage or mint duty, being 4s per lb. or nearly 6 per cent.; but the mint is not open to the holders of silver bullion, which is only purchased through the bank when required for coinage.

3rd. The sovereign ($\frac{1}{12}$ ths alloy,) weighs 123 25 grains troy, and no duty is charged on its coinage. 100 lbs. of pure gold yield 5,098 3 sovereigns,—3,069 3 new *gold mohurs*,=3041 4 old *gold mohurs*,=3490 9 Madras and Bombay *mohurs*.

The par of exchange with other countries may be estimated from the intrinsic and mint produce of their coins, thus,—assuming the Spanish dollar to weigh 416 grains troy, and to be 5 dwts. worse in assay, we have for

The Spanish dollar forms also the currency of the Straits of Malacca and of Manilla; and it is extensively known in the colonies of England, Ceylon, the Cape, Australia, &c.

For the British colonial possessions, however, an order of Council was promulgated on the 23rd March, 1825, extending to them the circulation of British silver and copper money, and directing all public accounts to be kept therein. Where the dollar was, either by law, fact, or practice still a legal tender, it was to be accounted equivalent to 4s. 4d. and *vice versa*. For the Cape of Good Hope, where the circulation consisted of paper rix-dollars;—and Ceylon, where it consisted of silver and paper rix-dollars, as well as a variety of other coins;—it was provided that a tender and payment of 1s. 6d. in British silver money should be equivalent to the rix-dollar. The Company's rupee is allowed circulation at 1s. 11d. and the 5-franc-piece at 4s. These regulations are still in force in Ceylon, Australia, Van Dieman's Land, the Cape, Mauritius, and St. Helena.

Minted gold in France is worth $15\frac{1}{2}$ its weight of minted silver, or the *kilogramme* is coined into 155 *Napoleons* or 20 franc-pieces: the seignorage on gold is only $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent.

1 kilogramme of pure gold yields 81,457 gold mohurs, or (deducting 2 per cent. mint duty) 79,328 ditto, therefore

NOTE.—In a coin we consider the weight and standard: By standard is meant the proportion of pure gold or silver which it contains; the rest is alloy. Thus, if we suppose a coin to contain a thousand parts of metal, of which 917 are pure gold or silver, the 83 remaining parts being alloy, the 917 represent the standard or relative purity of the coin.

Suppose we wish to know what is the value, in English money, of the Russian Imperial of 10 rubles: the weight is 13,073 gram., the standard at 917; deducting the alloy, that is, 108 gram., there remain in pure gold, 11,988 grammes.

The English Sovereign weighs 7,9808 gram., the standard is at 917, the alloy consequently 0,662 gram., and the weight of pure gold contained in it 7,3184 gram.

Now, by the rule of three, the question will thus be resolved:

$$7,318 \text{ gram.} : 11,988 \text{ gram.,} :: 20 \text{ shillings} : =£1 \text{ } 12s \text{ } 0d.$$

By this method, we can ascertain the relative value of all coins: but sometimes the value thus ascertained will not exactly agree with the sum allowed in exchange. This difference arises from political causes and commercial vicissitudes. Thus, for instance, the value at par of the sovereign in French money, is 25 fr. 26 c., yet it rose to 25 fr. 50 c. on one occasion (1840) after the change of a French Ministry. This fall and rise, in the relative value of money, principally takes place whenever there is a paper currency.

As the Chinese have no gold or silver coins, but make payments in those metals by weight, this table applies equally to money and to weights of all kinds, excepting that, in money reckonings, nothing higher than the leang or tael is employed. The only coined money the Chinese have is the le or cash. It is made of a very base alloy of copper, is round, about the size of an English farthing, and has a square hole in the middle, by which a hundred or more are usually strung together; on one side are Chinese characters, denoting the reign under which the cash was cast; and on the other side, in those of the present dynasty, are either Chinese or Mantchou characters, designating the place of coinage. Under preceding dynasties, two, five, and ten cash pieces have been in use, as well as other coins of various descriptions; but the single cash is the only coin now current throughout the Empire. It is cast also in Japan, Corea, and Cochin-China; and is clandestinely imported from the last named place, to a large amount.

Weights.

In China, almost every thing is sold by weight, not excepting even liquids and live stock. The only weights are those already given above, the principal of which are the pecul, catty, and tael divided thus:—

16 taels make a catty.

100 catties — a pecul.

At Macao, the pecul is distinguished by the Portuguese into three kinds, viz.

The pecul balanca of 100 catties = 133½ lbs. avoirdupois;

The pecul seda of 111-15 do. = 148 1-5th lbs; and

The pecul chap'a of 150 do. = 200 lbs.

90 Catties seda = a Canton pecul or pecul balanca.

By the first, are sold cotton and valuable articles; by the second, alum, pepper, and coarse goods, and by the third, rice.

In transactions between one Chinese and another, goods are weighed by the Chinese dotchin or balance, which is about 3 per cent. less than the English weights; the latter are always used in transactions with foreigners.

Note. At the money standard of 120 oz. 16 dwts. English troy weight for 100 taels, the pecul, which contains 1600 taels, should weigh avoirdupois lbs. 132 535. The actual standard of the pecul being 133½ lbs., a slight discrepancy thus appears between the *money* tael and the *commercial* tael, at the standards assigned to each. But no such difference is recognized by the Chinese. This is noticed to account for what will otherwise appear erroneous in some of the following tables:—

The Chih, covid, or foot is of several varying lengths; according to Milburne, that of the mathematical academy is about 13½ English inches; that of the tribunal of Public works 12.7 inches; and that employed by tailors and tradesmen, 13¼ inches. None however, of these three, is the same as the ordinary covid of Canton, used both in the measurement of vessels, and by tradesmen, which is about 14½ inches. The le or mile, is likewise a very uncertain measure of length, varying in almost every part of the country. It also, like the European geographical mile, forms an integral part of a degree, whether of latitude or longitude. But the scientific division of the degree, derived from the European Missionaries, is into 60 fun, or minutes, the fun being divided into 60 meau or seconds.

* This being according to the measure of the mathematical academy, differs from the preceding statement.

This is the present established land measure, which varies considerably from that formerly in use. This table is employed almost exclusively in the measurement of grain; all other articles and even liquids being sold by weight. In dealings with foreigners, however, and probably, also, in large dealings among themselves, the Chinese sell rice and other grain by the catty and pecul weight, instead of the shing, tow, &c. In the sale of paddy, two-thirds are allowed for the trouble and diminution in weight, which accompany the taking off the husk, or, which is the same thing, paddy is sold at one-third the price of the same weight of rice.

The Chinese term for expressing 100 is pih; 1000, tsên; 10,000 wan; 1,000,000, pih wan, 'a hundred myriads'; 100,000,000, yih, &c.,—progressing decimally through the terms chaou, king, hae, 'o jang kon, këen, ching and tsae. To express 12, 13, &c. the words are figures 10 and 2, 10 and 3 are put together; thus shih-urh, 12; shihsan, 13, &c. Also urh-shih-yih, 'two tens and one,' denotes 21, &c.

* In the Fokien provincial dialect, characters have two pronunciations, the reading and the spoken or colloquial. The pronunciations here printed in italics are the colloquial.

In China almost every trade has a distinct system of secret numbers, that is, instead of using the proper characters for designating prices, they adopt other characters, by which they arbitrarily express their meaning, so as to be understood only by persons of the same trade.

The Chinese method of computing is by a kind of abacus, which they call a *Suan-pwan*, 'counting board.'

An Inch is the smallest lineal measure to which a name is given, but sub-divisions are used for many purposes. Among mechanics the inch is commonly divided into *eighths*. The four last denominations are used for dry goods only. For liquids several denominations have been heretofore adopted, viz. for Beer, the Firkin of 9 Gallons, the Kilderkin of 18, the Barrel of 36, the Hog-head of 54, and the Butt of 108 gallons. These will probably continue to be used in practice. For Wine and Spirits, there are, the Anker, Runlet, Tierce, Hog-head, Puncheon, Pipe, Butt and Tun; but these may be considered rather as the names of the casks in which such commodities are imported, than as expressing any definite number of gallons. It is the practice to gauge all such vessels, and to charge them according to their actual content.

Flour is sold, nominally, by measure, but actually by weight, reckoned at 7lb. Avoirdupois to a Gallon.

The Imperial Measures, described in the second and third Divisions, were established by Act 5 Geo. iv. c. 74. Before that time there were four different measures of capacity used in England. 1. For wine, spirits, cider, oils, milk, &c.; this was one-sixth less than the Imperial Measure.—2. For malt liquor, this was one-fifty-ninth part greater than the Imperial Measure.—3. For corn, and all other dry goods not heaped, this was one-thirty-third-part less than the Imperial Measure.—4. For coals, which did not differ sensibly from the Imperial Measure.

The Imperial Gallon contains exactly 10lbs. Avoirdupois of pure water; consequently the pint will hold 1½lb., and the bushel 80lbs.

These are the denominations of Troy Weight when used for weighing gold, silver, and precious stones, (except diamonds). But Troy weight is also used by apothecaries in compounding medicines, and by them the ounce is divided into 8 drams, and the dram into 3 scruples, so that the latter is equal to 20 grains.

For scientific purposes the grain only is used; and sets of weights are constructed in decimal progression, from 10,000 grains downwards to 1-100ths of a grain.

By comparing the number of grains in the Avoirdupois and Troy pound and ounce respectively, it appears that the Troy pound is less than the Avoirdupois in the proportions 14 to 17 nearly; but the Troy ounce is greater than the Avoirdupois, in the proportion of 79 to 72 nearly.

The *carat*, used for weighing diamonds, is 3 1 6th grains. The term, however, when used to express the fineness of gold, has a relative meaning only. Every mass of alloyed gold is supposed to be divided into 24 equal parts: thus the standard for coin is 22 carats *fin*; that is, it consists of 22 parts of pure gold, and 2 parts of alloy. What is called the *new standard*, used for watch cases, &c., is 18 carats *fin*.

BRITISH-INDIAN WEIGHTS AND MEASURES.

The unit of the British Indian ponderary system* is called the tola †. It weighs 180 grains English Troy Weight. From it upwards, are derived the heavy weights, viz. *Chitak*, *Seer*, and *Mun* (or *Maund*);—and by its subdivision the small or jeweller's weights, called *mashas*, *ruttees* and *dhauns*.

* The advantages of this system are—
 1. That the maund formed from the modified weight would be precisely equal to 100 English troy pounds: and
 2. That thirty-five seers would also be precisely equal to seventy-two pounds avoirdupois;—thus establishing a simple connection, void of fractions, between the two English metrical scales and that of India.

The *Mun* (or that weight to which it closely accords in value, and to which it is legally equivalent in the new scale) has been hitherto better known among Europeans by the name of *Bazar Maund*, but upon its general adoption, under Regulation VII. of 1833, for all transactions of the British Government, it should be denominated the BRITISH MAUND, (in Hindec, *Ungrézee Mun*.) to distinguish it at once from all other weights in use throughout the country.*

The *Pusseree* is, as its name denotes, a five-seer weight, and therefore should not form an integral point of the scale; but as its use is very general, it has been introduced for the convenience of reference.

The *Seer* being the commonest weight in use in the retail business of the Bazars in India, and being liable, according to the pernicious system hitherto prevalent, to vary in weight for every article sold as well as for every market, is generally referred to the common unit in native mercantile dealings, as, "the seer of so many *tolas*," (or *sicca*, *bhurrees*, *takas*, &c.) The standard or *bazar seer* being always 80 *tolas*.

The *Chitak* is the lowest denomination of the gross weights, and is commonly divided into halves and quarters, (called in Bengalee *kacha*;) thus marking the line between the two series, which are otherwise connected by the relation of the seer, &c. to the tola.

The *Tola* is chiefly used in the weighing of the precious metals and coin; all bullion at the mints is received in this denomination, and the tables of bullion produce (as seen in the foregoing pages) are calculated per 100 *tolas*. It is also usual at the mints to make the subdivisions of the tola into *annas* (sixteenths) and *pie*, in lieu of *mashas* and *ruttees*.

Mashas, *ruttees* and *dhans*, are used chiefly by native goldsmiths and jewelers. They are also employed in the native valuation by assay of the precious metals: thus 10 *mashas* fine, signifies 10-12ths pure, and corresponds to "10-oz. touch" of the English assay report or silver. There is a closer accordance with the English gold assay scale, inasmuch as the 96 *ruttees* in a tola exactly represent the 96 carat grains in the gold assay pound, and the *dhan*, the quarter grain.

* In the same way the Madras, Bombay and Furukhabad rupee (when the *sicca* rupee is abolished, and an English device adopted,) may be called "the BRITISH RUPEE," and in the native languages *Ungrézee Rupyas*.

The accordance of the *mun* weight with the 100 lbs. troy of England, affords a ready means of ascertaining its relative value in the Standards of other countries employed in weighing the precious metals, since tables of the latter are generally expressed in lbs. troy. Since 35 seers are exactly equal to 72 pounds avoirdupois, the following simple and accurate rules for their mutual conversions will be found equally convenient with the table.

RULE I.—To convert Indian weight into avoirdupois weight.

1. Multiply the weight in seers by 72, and divide by 35: the result will be the weight in lbs. av.

2. Or multiply the weight in mun by 36, and divide by 49: the result will be the weight in cwt. av.

RULE II.—To convert avoirdupois weight into Indian weight.

1. Multiply the weight in lbs. av. by 35, and divide by 72: the result will be the weight in seers.

2. Or multiply the weight in cwt. by 49, and divide by 36: the result will be the weight in muns, or maunds.*

The word *mun*, of Arabic or Hebrew origin,* is used throughout Persia and Northern India; but, as might be expected, it represents very different values in different places: thus the *mun* of Tabriz is only 6½ lbs. avoird. while that of Pallode, in Ahmednuggur, is 163½ lbs.

It is probable that the seer or *sér*, a Hindu weight (*setak*), was more uniform than the maund, since it was founded upon the tola (*tolaka*), which, with its subdivision, the *wassa*, must in very ancient times have been extensively known throughout commercial Asia: there can be little doubt that the *tale* and *mace* of the Chinese are identical in origin.

It may be generally assumed that the maund system follows the common scale, viz.

16 chitaks = 1 seer

40 seers = 1 maund.

20 maunds = 1 candy or maunee.

The use of a five-seer weight also universally prevails under the name of *pusséree*, *dhuree*, or *vis*. The *dhuree*, from its name, however, seems to be properly a measure, and accordingly, while in Malwa it is equal to 5 seers, in other places it is found of 4, 4½, 5½, 10, 11 and 12 seers. The terms *adhola*, *adhelee*, (half,) *pao*, *powah*, (quarter,) *adhpaow*, (half-quarter,) frequently occur: they explain themselves.

NOTICE.

The publishers believing that it would be a convenience to the Mercantile Community of Bengal and Agra, to have correct returns of the varying systems of weights and measures prevailing in the interior districts, have obtained through the kindness of the authorities the following detailed returns. Much additional matter and several corrections are given in the present edition.

The subdivisions of the ponderary systems, throughout the whole of British India, generally agree in name, though they differ in value. Thus in every case

The equivalents given above are for 'the poor man's measure.' Theet Maik, Twa, Toung, Ta and Daing are the Measures in most frequent use. The Royal cubic Thantoung, which is the Government standard, upon being carefully compared was found to measure exactly 19 $\frac{1}{16}$ English inches. According to this, the finger-breadth (Theet) which is that of the fore-finger taken at the middle point is $\frac{3}{16}$ of an inch; the fathom (Lan.) 76 $\frac{1}{16}$ inches; the D bamboo (Ta) 133 $\frac{1}{16}$; and the Daing 2 miles, 19 $\frac{1}{2}$ yards 2 feet 8 inches.

In the Tenasserim Provinces, however, the English foot measure is coming into use, and will soon supersede those above given.

CONVERSION OF BRITISH EUROPEAN WEIGHTS INTO BRITISH INDIAN WEIGHTS, AND
VICE VERSA.

By Regulation VII. of 1833, a new British Indian system of weights has been ordered; but the change not being enforced by any penal enactment, the new weight has been adopted by a very few European houses, while it is the only one in use at the several Government offices of Calcutta,—the Custom House, the Mint, the Treasury, the Bank, and the Police.

The difference however between the new and the old system is extremely small, viz. the unit or tolah was the old Moorshedabad rupee, and weighed 179,666 Troy grains. By the said Regulation the tolah is of 180 grains Troy, and therefore exceeds the old one by *one-third* of a grain, which difference makes the new bazar or Indian maund heavier than the old one by about one chitak and a quarter, or 222 ounces Troy.

The following tables have been calculated on the old elements of Indian weights, as being still of a more general use. If it was necessary to convert old bazar maunds into new ones, the operation would consist simply in the following rule:

A (The old Weight): Y (The new Weight) :: 179 666 : 180,000.

EAST INDIA COMPANY'S NEW CHARTER

FOR THE
GOVERNMENT OF INDIA.

ANNO DECIMO SEXTO & DECIMO SEPTIMO VICTORIÆ REGINÆ.

CAP. XCV.

An Act to provide for the Government of *India*.

[20th August, 1858]

WHEREAS by an act passed in the session of parliament holden in the third and fourth years of King *William* the fourth, intituled *an act for effecting an arrangement with the East India Company, and for the better government of His Majesty's Indian Territories till the thirtieth day of April one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four*, the territories therein mentioned were continued under the government of the *East India* Company until the thirtieth day of *April* one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, with the powers and subject to the superintendence, direction, and control therein mentioned; and the property and rights in the said act mentioned were continued in the possession of the said company in trust for the crown for the service of the said government: and whereas it is expedient to provide for the government of the territories now in the possession and under the government of the said company after the expiration of the term limited by the said act: Be it enacted by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lord's spiritual and temporal, and commons, in this present parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

I. Until parliament shall otherwise provide, all the territories now in the possession and under the government of the *East India* Company shall continue under such government in trust for her majesty, her heirs and successors, with and under the powers and restrictions, and subject to the superintendence, direction and control now by law applicable to such government, and subject also to the provisions of this act; and all the provisions now in force of the said act of the third and fourth year of King *William* the fourth, and all other enactments whatsoever now in force with relation to the said company and government and territories respectively, shall, save so far as the same are altered by or are repugnant to this act, continue in force after the said thirtieth day of *April* one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, as if the said term had not expired; and no appointments, arrangements, or acts made or done under the provisions and enactments hereby continued, shall, by reason only of the expiration of the said term, cease or be affected.

Until parliament shall otherwise provide the British territory in India to be continued under the government of the company, subject to the provisions of this act.

II. From and after the *Wednesday* in the month of *April* one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, there shall be eighteen directors and no more of the said company, to be from time to time appointed and elected as herein-after mentioned; and such directors, or any ten or more of them, shall be and shall be called a court of directors, and such directors and court of directors respectively shall have the same powers and privileges as the directors and court of directors of the said company now have, save so far as such powers and privileges are altered by this act; and in every case where the presence, signature, consent, or concurrence of thirteen directors of the said company or of any greater number of such directors, is now requisite, the presence, signature, consent, or concurrence (as the case may be) of ten directors under this act, shall be sufficient; and in all despatches and written documents proceeding from the said court of directors the signatures of the chairman and deputy chairman and of the senior member of the said court, or of any two of them, countersigned by the secretary or deputy secretary for the time being of the said company, shall be sufficient in lieu of the signature of the majority of the said directors.

After the second *Wednesday* in *April* 1854, there shall be eighteen directors of the company.

Her Majesty to appoint three of the first directors for two, four, and six years.

Directors appointed by her Majesty to be persons who are in India

of the crown in India, or in the service of the said company there.

The present directors and the directors out by rotation, to appoint from their own body fifteen of the first directors under this act, five for two years, five for four years, and five for six years.

Upon the happening of casual vacancies, number of directors appointed by the crown to be increased to six, those not so appointed to be reduced to twelve.

Vacancies among directors how to be filled up.

the number of directors not appointed by her Majesty shall be filled up by general court of the said company, in the manner in

otherwise than by the expiration of his term of office, shall be appointed or elected for the remainder of the term of office of such last-mentioned director; and every person who shall, or but for re-appointment or re-election would, cease to be a director by the expiration of his term of office, shall be capable of being forthwith re-appointed or of being re-elected, the election holden on the day of the expiration of such term.

Term of office of directors to expire, and biennial elections to be holden on the second Wednesday in April.

the said day in April in the sixth following year; and it shall be lawful for her Majesty from time to time, upon or after the expiration of the term of office of any director or directors appointed by her Majesty by warrant under the royal sign manual, to appoint or re-appoint

III. It shall be lawful for her Majesty, by warrant under the royal sign manual, at any time before the said second *Wednesday* in *April* one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, to appoint three persons to be, from the said second *Wednesday* in *April* one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, directors of the said company, under this act, and one of such persons shall be appointed to be a director for the term of two years, one other for the term of four years, and one other for the term of six years; and every director to be so appointed, and every other director to be appointed by her Majesty under the provisions herein contained, shall be a person who shall have been for ten years at the least in the service of the crown in India, or in the service of the said company there.

IV. On the second *Wednesday* in the month of *March* one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four the present directors of the said company, or such of them as may then remain in office, and the persons, or survivors of the persons, heretofore directors of the said company, who in the month of *April* one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three ceased to be such directors by the expiration of the term for which they were elected, or the major part of the said directors and persons, shall, from among the said directors and persons heretofore directors as aforesaid, appoint fifteen persons to be, with the three persons to be appointed by her Majesty, the first directors of the said company under this act from the said second *Wednesday* in *April* one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four; and of such fifteen persons five shall be appointed for the term of two years, five others for the term of four years, and the remaining five for the term of six years; and for the purposes of such appointment as aforesaid, as well the said persons heretofore directors, as the said present directors remaining in office, shall meet and act together as a court of directors of the said company on the said second *Wednesday* in *March*, and the names of the directors who shall be appointed at such court, together with the respective terms for which they are appointed, shall be certified to the board of commissioners for the affairs of India, under the seal of the said company.

V. To the intent that the number of the directors of the said company to be appointed by her Majesty under this act be increased to six, and the number of other directors reduced to twelve, it shall be lawful for her Majesty, upon the first, second, and third vacancy respectively among the directors under this act not appointed by her Majesty which may happen otherwise than by the expiration of the term of years for which a director may have been appointed or elected, to appoint by warrant as aforesaid a person to be a director of the said company to fill each of such vacancies.

VI. Every vacancy happening from time to time in the office of any director who shall have been appointed by her Majesty under any provision herein contained shall be filled up by her Majesty by warrant under the royal sign manual; and, subject to the provisions herein contained for increasing the number of directors to be appointed by her Majesty, every vacancy among the directors by her Majesty shall be filled up by general court of the said company, in the manner in which directors are now elected.

VII. Every director appointed by her Majesty or elected by the said general court to fill a vacancy occasioned by the expiration of the term of office of a director, shall be appointed or elected for the term of six years; and every director appointed by her Majesty or elected by the said general court to supply the place of any director whose office shall have become void otherwise than by the expiration of his term of office, shall be appointed or elected for the remainder of the term of office of such last-mentioned director; and every person who shall, or but for re-appointment or re-election would, cease to be a director by the expiration of his term of office, shall be capable of being forthwith re-appointed or of being re-elected, the election holden on the day of the expiration of such term.

VIII. The terms of two years, four years, and six years respectively, for which the directors first appointed under this act shall be appointed, shall be taken to expire at the end of the day on the second *Wednesday* in the month of *April* in the second, fourth, and sixth years respectively after the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, and the term of office of every person appointed or elected to supply a vacancy upon the expiration of any term shall be taken to expire at the end of the day on the second *Wednesday* in *April* in the sixth following year; and it shall be lawful for her Majesty from time to time, upon or after the expiration of the term of office of any director or directors appointed by her Majesty by warrant under the royal sign manual, to appoint or re-appoint

a person or persons to fill such vacancy or vacancies; and biennial elections shall be holden on the second *Wednesday* of the month of *April* in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, and in every alternate year for filling up such vacancies among the directors by the expiration of any term of office as the general courts of the said company may be authorized to fill up, and all the provisions applicable to the general annual and other elections of directors by the said general court shall be applicable to the biennial and other elections of directors by such general court under this act, so far as circumstances will admit.

IX. Of the fifteen directors first appointed under this act by the present directors and persons heretofore directors of the said company, six shall be persons who shall have resided for ten years at the least in *India*; and all such vacancies happening from time to time in the offices of any of the six directors so qualified as the general court may be authorized to fill up shall be filled up by persons qualified in like manner: and in case by the vacancies among the directors not appointed by her majesty, which her majesty is authorized to fill up, or any of such vacancies, the number of directors so qualified as aforesaid (exclusive of those appointed by her majesty) be reduced below six, every person thereafter elected by the general court to be a director upon any vacancy, except any of the directors first appointed under this act who may be elected at the expiration of their term of office, shall be a person qualified in like manner until the number of directors so qualified, exclusive of those appointed by the crown, be restored to six, and every casual vacancy thenceforth happening among such six directors so qualified shall be filled up by the election of a person qualified in like manner; and when at the time of any biennial election thereafter of directors by the general court the number of the directors for the time being who shall have resided for such time in *India*, exclusive of any such directors whose term of office may expire with the day of the election, and of the directors appointed by the crown, is less than six, the directors to be then elected, or so many of such directors as may be necessary for making up the number of directors who shall have resided for such time in *India* to six, shall be a person or persons, who shall have resided for such time in *India*.

Six of the directors not appointed by the crown to be persons who shall have served ten years in *India*.

X. Notwithstanding the provision of the charter of the tenth year of King *William* the third, any person shall be deemed, so far as respects the possession of stock of the said company, to be qualified to be chosen or appointed and to continue a director of the said company, under this act, who shall have in his own name, and in his own right, and to his own use, one thousand pounds or more in the capital stock of the said company; and all enactments and all provisions of any charter or byelaw having reference to the qualification of a director shall be construed as if the said sum of one thousand pounds were substituted thereon, and in the said charter of King *William* the third, for the sum of two thousand pounds; and in the case of any such director appointed by her majesty, it shall be sufficient if, before he shall act as such director, he shall have such qualification in the said capital stock as is required under this act, although he may not have the same at the time of his appointment; and every person who shall be hereafter elected or appointed a director of the said company shall, before he shall act as such director, make the following declaration:—

Qualification of a director as respects the possession of East India stock, 1,000*l.* to be a qualification.

Director before acting to make a declaration

'I A. B. do declare, that the sum of one thousand pounds now standing in my name of the stock of the East India Company belongs to me in my own right and not in trust for any other person or persons whatsoever.'

XI. No person appointed by her majesty to be a director under this act shall, by reason of such appointment, be incapable of being elected, or sitting or voting in parliament; and no such director so appointed shall be subject to be removed by the general court of the said company; but it shall be lawful for her majesty, if she shall think fit, to remove any such director for inability or misbehaviour.

Directors appointed by her majesty may sit in parliament.

XII. From and after the second *Wednesday* of the said month of *April* one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, all such of the present directors of the said company as shall not have been appointed to be directors under this act shall cease to be directors of such company; and no vacancy which shall happen in the mean time in the office of any of the said present directors shall be filled up; and notwithstanding any such vacancies, such of the said present directors as for the time being may remain in office, or the majority of them, shall, until the commencement of the term of office of the first directors under this act, have and exercise all the powers by law vested in the directors of the said company; and in every case where the presence, signatures, consent, or concurrence of thirteen directors of the said company or of any greater number of such directors is now requisite, the presence, signature, consent, or concurrence (as the case may be) of the majority of such of the said directors as for the time being may remain in office shall be sufficient.

The authority of the present directors to cease on the second *Wednesday* of *April* 1854.

Directors before acting to take the oath herein named.

XIII. Every person who shall hereafter be appointed or elected a director of the said company shall, before he shall act in that office, take the following oath, instead of the oath now appointed to be taken by a director; that is to say—

‘I A. B. do swear, that I will be faithful to her majesty Queen Victoria, and will to the best of my ability perform the duty assigned to me as a director of the East India Company in the administration of the government of India in trust for the crown.

So help me God.

Quorum of general courts of the company.

XIV. If at any general court of the said company, after the transaction of such business as by any act of parliament or any byelaw of the said company may be required to be transacted at such court, the number of proprietors assembled and qualified to vote, exclusively of any directors then present, shall not amount to twenty, it shall be lawful for the chairman of the said court, and he is hereby required, upon the fact of the number of proprietors so assembled not amounting to twenty being brought to his notice, to declare the court adjourned without putting the question.

The provisions of 3 & 4 W. 4. c. 53 for creating a presidency of Assam, which has been suspended by 5 & 6 W. 4. c. 72, to remain so until the same be revoked.

XV. The provisions of the said act of the third and fourth years of King *William* the fourth, relating to the division of the presidency of *Fort William* in *Bengal* into two presidencies, and to the measures consequent thereupon, which have been suspended under the authority of the act of the session holden in the fifth and sixth years of King *William* the fourth, chapter fifty-two, shall remain suspended until the court of directors, under the direction and control of the board of commissioners for the affairs of *India* shall otherwise direct; and during the continuance of such suspension the provisions of such last-mentioned act, authorizing the appointment of a lieutenant governor for the North-western Provinces, then under the government of the presidency of *Fort William* in *Bengal*, and the appointments and arrangements made thereunder, shall remain in full force.

A separate governor may be appointed for the presidency of *Bengal*.

XVI. It shall be lawful for the said court of directors, under such direction and control as aforesaid, if and when they think fit, at any time after the passing of this act, to declare that the governor general of *India* shall not be governor of the presidency of *Fort William* in *Bengal*, but that a separate governor shall be appointed for such presidency, and in such case a separate governor shall be from time to time appointed for such presidency accordingly, in manner provided by the said act of the third and fourth years of King *William* the fourth, in the case of vacancies happening in the offices of the governors of the presidencies of *Fort Saint George* and *Bombay*; and from and after the appointment of such governor, the power by the said act vested in the governor general of *India* of appointing a deputy governor of the said presidency of *Fort William* in *Bengal* shall cease; and unless and until a separate governor of such presidency shall be constituted as aforesaid, it shall be lawful

In the mean time a lieutenant governor may be appointed.

for the court of directors, under such direction and control as aforesaid if and when they think fit, at any time after the passing of this act, to authorize and direct the governor general of *India* in council to appoint from time to time any servant of the said company who shall have been ten years in their service in *India* to the office of lieutenant governor of such part of the territories under the presidency of *Fort William* in *Bengal* as for the time being may not be under the lieutenant governor of the said north-western provinces, and to declare and limit the extent of the authority of the lieutenant governor to be so appointed.

Power to directors, to create one new presidency or to authorize governor general to appoint a new lieutenant governorship.

XVII. It shall be lawful for the court of directors of the said company, under such direction and control, if and when they think fit, to constitute one new presidency within the territories subject for the time being to the government of the said company, and to declare and appoint what part of such territories shall be subject to the government of such new presidency; and unless and until such new presidency be constituted as aforesaid, it shall be lawful for the said court of directors, under such direction and control as aforesaid, if and when they think fit, to authorize (in addition to such appointments as are hereinbefore authorized to be continued and made for the territories now and heretofore under the said presidency of *Fort William*) the appointment by the said governor general in council of a lieutenant governor for any part of the territories for the time being subject to the government of the said company, and to declare for what part of the said territories such lieutenant governor shall be appointed, and the extent of his authority, and from time to time to revoke or alter any such declaration.

Power to alter from time to time the limits of presidencies and lieutenant governorships.

XVIII. It shall be lawful for the said court of directors, under such direction and control as aforesaid, from time to time to declare and appoint what part or parts of the territories for the time being subject to the government of the said company shall be or continue subject to each of the presidencies and lieutenant governorships for the time being subsisting in such terri-

teries, and to make such distribution and arrangement or new distribution and arrangement of such territories into or among such presidencies and lieutenant governorships as to the said court of directors, under such direction and control as aforesaid, may seem expedient.

XIX. The provisions of the said act of the third and fourth years of King *William* the fourth, as amended by this act, and all other provisions now in force for the administration of the executive government of the presidencies of *Fort Saint George* and *Bombay* respectively, authorizing the revocation and suspension of the appointment of councils and the reduction of the number of councillors in such presidencies respectively, and as to the powers, duties, functions, and immunities of the governors of such presidencies respectively, and of such governors in their respective councils, and concerning or applicable to the appointment and provisional appointment of governors and members of council of the said presidencies respectively on vacancies, and otherwise providing for vacancies in the office of any such governor, and concerning the removal and dismissal of such governors and members of council, and the revocation of appointments and provisional appointments of governors and members of council of such presidencies, and concerning the salaries and emoluments of such governors and members of council, shall extend and be applicable in like manner to and in the case of any new presidency to be established as aforesaid under this act, and also to and in the case of the presidency of *Agra*, in case the same be constituted under the provisions of the said act of the third and fourth years of King *William* the fourth; and the said provisions concerning appointments of governors and members of council on vacancies, as amended by this act, shall extend and be applicable to and for the first appointment of a governor and members of council of such new presidency and the presidency of *Agra* aforesaid.

The enactments as to existing presidencies to extend to new presidencies.

XX. Every appointment by the court of directors of any ordinary member of the council of *India*, or of any member of the council of any presidency in *India*, shall be subject to the approbation of her majesty to be signified under her royal sign manual, countersigned by the president of the board of commissioners for the affairs of *India*.

All appointments of members of council to be subject to the approbation of her majesty.

XXI. So much of the said act of the third and fourth years of King *William* the fourth as provides that the fourth ordinary member of the council of *India* shall not be entitled to sit or vote in the said council, except at meetings thereof for making laws and regulations, shall be repealed.

Provision of 3 & 4 W. 4. c. 51 excluding the fourth ordinary member of council from certain meetings repealed.

XXII. For the better exercise of the powers of making laws and regulations, now vested in the governor general of *India* in council, the several persons herein-after mentioned shall, in addition to and together with such governor general and the members of the said council, under the said act of the third and fourth years of King *William* the fourth, be members of the said council of *India* for and in relation to the exercise of all such powers of making laws and regulations as aforesaid, and shall be distinguished as legislative councillors thereof; (that is to say,)

Legislative councillors added to the council of India for making laws and regulations.

One member for each presidency and lieutenant governorship for the time being established in the said territories, to be appointed from time to time by the governor of such presidency and the lieutenant governor of such lieutenant governorship respectively, from among the persons having been or being at the time of their appointment in the civil service of such company with a such presidency or lieutenant governorship, and who shall have been ten years in the service of the said company:

The chief justice of the supreme court of judicature at *Fort William* in *Bengal*, or the chief justice or chief judge of any court of judicature hereafter to be constituted in the said territories to or in which the powers of such supreme court may be transferred or vested:

One of the other judges of such supreme court, or one of the judges appointed by her majesty of any such future court as aforesaid, to be named by the said governor general:

And it shall be lawful for the court of directors, if they think it expedient under the direction and control of the board of commissioners for the affairs of *India*, to authorize and direct the governor general of *India* to appoint from time to time, in addition to such legislative councillors as aforesaid, two persons, to be selected by the said governor general, having been ten years in the service of the company, to be legislative councillors of the said council under this act: Provided always, that the legislative councillors added to the council of *India* by or under this act shall not be entitled to sit or vote in the said council, except at meetings thereof for making laws and regulations.

Legislative councillors to vote only at meetings for making laws and regulations.

XXIII. It shall be lawful for such governor general to appoint any member of the said council to be vice president thereof at meetings of the

said council for making laws and regulations, who shall preside therein at such meetings in the absence of such governor general, and in the absence of such vice president the senior ordinary member of the council of *India* there present shall preside therein; and the powers of making laws or regulations vested in the said governor general in council shall be exercised only at meetings of the said council, at which such governor general or vice president or some ordinary member of council, and six or more members of the said council, shall be assembled, the chief justice or chief judge, or such other judge of the supreme court or such other court as aforesaid, or the fourth ordinary member of the said council of *India*, being one; and in every case of difference of opinion at meetings of the said council for making laws and regulations, where there shall be an equality of voices, the governor general, or in his absence the vice president, and in the absence of the governor general and vice president such senior ordinary member of council there present and presiding, shall have two votes or the casting vote.

XXVII. All fines and penalties incurred by the sentence or order of any court of justice within the territories under the government of the *East India* Company, and all forfeitures for crimes of any real or personal estate within the said territories, and all real and personal estate within the said territories escheating or lapsing for want of an heir or successor, and all property within the said territories devolving as *Bona vacantia* for want of a rightful owner, shall (as part of the revenues of *India*) belong to the *East India* Company in trust for her majesty for the service of the government of *India*: provided also, that the governor general in council, and any other person or persons who may be authorized by any act passed in that behalf by the governor general in council, shall have power (in cases where the same may appear suitable and proper) to make any grant or disposition of any property so accruing by forfeiture, escheat, or otherwise to or in favour of any relative or connexion of the person from whom the same shall have accrued, or to or in favour of any other person or persons.

XXVIII. And whereas by the said act of the third and fourth years of King *William* the fourth it was provided, that commissioners to be appointed thereunder, and to be styled the *Indian* law commissioners, should inquire into the jurisdiction, powers, and rules of the existing courts of justice and police establishments in the said territories, and into the nature

of the distinction of castes, difference of religion, and the manners and customs prevailing among different races and in different parts of the said territories: whereas the *Indian* law commissioners from time to time appointed under the said act have in a series of reports, recommended extensive alterations in the judicial establishments, judicial procedure, and laws established and in force in *India*, and have set forth in detail the provisions which they have proposed to be established by law for giving effect to certain of their recommendation, and such reports have been transmitted from time to time to the said court of directors; but on the greater part of such reports and recommendations no final decision has been had:

It shall be lawful for her majesty, at any time after the passing of this act, by commission under the royal sign manual, to appoint such and so many persons in *England* as to her majesty may seem fit to examine and consider the recommendations of the said *Indian* law commissioners, and the enactments proposed by them for the reform of the judicial establishments, judicial procedure, and laws of *India*, and such other matters in relation to the reform of the said judicial establishments, judicial procedure, and laws, as may by or with the sanction of the commissioner for the affairs of *India*, be referred to them for their consideration, and to authorize and direct the persons so appointed, or such number as may be limited by their commission in this behalf, to report their opinion to her majesty on the matter aforesaid, and especially to report from time to time what laws or regulations should be made or enacted in relation to the matters aforesaid, but so that every such report be made within three years after the passing of this act; and for the purposes of such examination it shall be lawful for her majesty to authorize the persons so appointed, or the number limited by the commission in this behalf, to call before them and examine in *England* such persons in the service of the crown and the said company respectively, and to require the production of such official documents in the possession of the board of commissioners for the affairs of *India*, or of the said company, as they may think fit.

Her majesty may appoint commissioners in *England* to consider and report on the reforms proposed by the *Indian* law commissioners.

XXIX. No appointment of any advocate general of the said company shall be valid without the approbation of the board of commissioners for the affairs of *India*.

Advocate general be approved by board of control.

XXX. Any person who shall be hereafter appointed by her majesty to be the commander-in-chief of her forces in *India* shall by virtue of such appointment be also the commander-in-chief of the company's forces in *India*, and any person who shall be hereafter appointed by her majesty to be the commander-in-chief of her forces in any presidency in *India* shall by virtue of such appointment be also the commander-in-chief of the company's forces in such presidency.

Commander in chief of her majesty's forces to be commander in chief of the company's forces.

XXXI. So much of the act of the twenty-eighth year of King *George* the third, chapter eight, as limits the number of the *European* forces of the said company to twelve thousand two hundred men, and so much of the act of the thirty-ninth year of King *George* the third, chapter one hundred and nine, as limits the number of non-commissioned officers and private men which the said company are authorized to enlist and have in pay at any one time, or to train or discipline at any one time, in *Great Britain* and the Islands of *Guernsey* and *Jersey*, by virtue of that act, to two thousand men, shall, from the passing of this act, be repealed; and it shall be lawful for the board of commissioners for the affairs of *India*, at any time after the passing of this act, and from time to time, to give or approve such directions as they may think fit for raising and maintaining out of the revenues arising from the said territories such number of *European* forces as they may judge necessary, so that the number of *European* forces of the said company at any one time do not amount in the whole to more than twenty thousand men, including the commissioned and non-commissioned officers; and it shall be lawful for the said company to enlist and have in pay and train and discipline under the said last-mentioned act any number of non-commissioned officers and private men not exceeding at any one time four thousand.

Limit of *European* troops of the company and of their troops in training; at home extended.

XXXII. Nothing in any enactment now in force, or any charter, relating to the said company, shall be taken to prevent the establishment, by the court of directors (under the direction and control of the said board of commissioners), at any time after the passing of this act, and from time to time, of any regulations which they may deem expedient in relation to the absence on sick leave or furlough of all or any officers and persons in the service of the said company in *India*, or receiving salaries from the said company there under which they respectively may be authorized to repair to and reside in *Europe* or elsewhere out of the limits of the said company's charter, without forfeiture of pay or salary, during the times and under the circumstances during and under which they may now be permitted (while absent from their duty) to reside in places out of *India* within the limits of the said company's charter, or during such times and under such circumstances as by such regulations may be permitted.

Sick leave or furlough regulations may be extended as to residence out of the limits of the company's charter.

XXXIII. And whereas by the said act of the third and fourth years of King *William* the fourth it is enacted, that the president of the board of commissioners for the affairs of *India*, but no other commissioner, as such, and the secretaries and other officers, shall be paid by the said company such fixed salaries as his majesty shall, by any warrant or warrants under his sign manual, countersigned by the chancellor of the exchequer for the time being, direct: be it enacted, that such fixed salary of the said president of the board of commissioners shall in no

case be less than the salary which shall be paid to one of her majesty's principal secretaries of state; and that only one of the said secretaries to the said board shall be capable of being elected or sitting and voting in parliament.

XXXIV. Instead of the yearly sums allowed under the byelaws of the said company to the chairman, deputy chairman, and other directors, for their attendance upon the business of the said company, here shall be allowed to the chairman, deputy chairman, and directors, under this act, the yearly sums following; (that is to say,) to the chairman one thousand pounds a year, to the deputy chairman one thousand pounds a year, and to every other director five hundred pounds a year.

XXXV. There shall be paid to the several officers hereinafter named the several annual salaries set against the names of such officers respectively, subject to such reduction as the court of directors, with the sanction of the said board, may from time to time think fit; (that is to say.)

To the commander-in-chief of the forces in *India*, one hundred thousand company's rupees, in lieu of all other pay and allowances:

To each lieutenant governor, one hundred thousand company's rupees:

To each ordinary member of the council of *India*, eighty thousand company's rupees:

To each legislative councillor of the council of *India* (not holding any other office,) fifty thousand company's rupees.

The several salaries aforesaid to be subject to the provisions and regulations of the said act of the third and fourth years of King *William* the fourth, concerning the salaries thereby appointed: provided always, that the salary of any such officer appointed before the passing of this act shall not under this enactment be reduced.

XXXVI. The provisions hereinafter mentioned, respecting the appointment of persons to the civil service of the said company, and the admission of students into the college of the said company at *Haileybury*, (that is to say,) section forty-six of the act of the fifty-third year of King *George* the third, chapter one hundred and fifty-five, and sections one hundred and three, one hundred and four, one hundred and five, one hundred and six, and one hundred and seven of the said act of the third and fourth years of King *William* the fourth, shall be repealed, and all powers, rights, or privileges of the court of directors of the said company to nominate or appoint persons to be admitted as students or candidates for such admission, or as assistant surgeons in the forces of the said company, shall cease as regards all vacancies which shall occur on or after the thirtieth day of *April* one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four.

XXXVII. Subject to such regulations as may be made by the board of commissioners for the affairs of *India*, any person being a natural born subject of her majesty who may be desirous of being admitted into the said college at *Haileybury*, or of being appointed an assistant surgeon in the said company's forces, shall be admitted to be examined as a candidate for such admission or appointment respectively.

XXXVIII. It shall be lawful for the said board of commissioners at any time after the passing of this act, and from time to time, to frame and make regulations not inconsistent with the provisions of this act concerning such examinations, admissions, and appointments, and concerning the examination of persons to be admitted as students into the military seminary of the said company at *Addiscombe*, and for such other purposes as hereinafter mentioned; and the said board may from time to time alter or vary such regulations as to the said board may seem expedient: provided always, that all regulations to be made by the said board under this act shall be laid before parliament within fourteen days after the making thereof, if parliament be sitting, and if parliament be not sitting, then within fourteen days after the next meeting thereof.

XXXIX. It shall be lawful for the said board, by such regulations as aforesaid, to determine the age and qualifications in all respects of persons to be admitted students into the said college and seminary respectively and of persons who may be examined as candidates for such admission, and to make provisions for admitting such qualified candidates to examination, and prescribing the branches of knowledge in which such candidates shall be examined, and generally for regulating and conducting such examinations, and for admitting into such college and seminary respectively qualified persons from among candidates who shall have been examined as aforesaid.

XL. It shall be also lawful for the said board, by such regulations as aforesaid, to determine the age and qualifications of persons to be appointed to the civil service of the said company in *India*, or to their

XIII. It shall be lawful for the said board of commissioners from time to time to appoint such persons as they may see fit, to be respectively examiners for conducting the examinations, under the regulations to be made under this act, of persons desirous of being admitted as students into the said college at *Haileybury*, and seminary at *Addiscombe*, and of candidates for appointment to the civil and military service respectively of the said company, and of persons desirous of being appointed assistant surgeons in the said company's forces.

XIV. This act shall, save as herein otherwise expressly provided, commence and take effect on the thirtieth day of *April* one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four.

NOMINATION OF STUDENTS.

Regulations and Preparatory Instructions.

No Candidate can be admitted into the College whose age is less than *seventeen* or above *twenty-one* years. And no person who has been dismissed from the Army or Navy, or expelled from any place of education, will be nominated to the College.

The parents or guardian of every candidate for the college will be required to address the following letter to the nominating Director

Sir,—I beg to assure you, on my honour, that my ———, to whom you have been so good as to give a nomination to the college, has not been dismissed from the Army or the Navy, and that he never has been expelled from any place of education.

I have the honour to be, &c.

Candidates for the college must produce the undermentioned documents, previously to their being nominated as students.

An extract from the parish register of their birth or baptism, properly signed by the minister, churchwarden, or elders; and, in addition thereto,

A certificate, agreeably to the following form, signed by the parent, guardian, or near relation.

I do hereby certify, that the foregoing extract from the register of baptisms of the parish of ———, in the county of ———, contains the date of the birth of my ———, who is the bearer of this, and presented for a nomination as a student at the East-India College, by ———, Esq; and I do further declare, that I received the said presentation for my ———, gratuitously, and that no money or other valuable consideration has been or is to be paid, either directly or indirectly for the same, and that I will not pay or cause to be paid, either by myself, by my ———, or by the hands of any other person, any pecuniary or valuable consideration whatsoever to any person or persons who have interested themselves in procuring the said presentation for my ———, from the director above mentioned

Witness my hand, this ——— day of ———, in the year of our Lord

In the event of no parish register existing or to be found, a declaration of such circumstance is to be made before a magistrate to the following effect, *viz.*

I, ———, presented as a student for the East-India College, by ———, do declare, that I have caused search to be made for a parish register whereby to ascertain my age, but am unable to produce the same, there being none to be found; and, further, I declare, that from the information of my parents (an other relations), which information I verily believe to be true, that I was born in the parish of ———, in the county of ———, on ———, in the year ———, and that I am not at this time under the age of seventeen, or above twenty-one years.

*Witness my hand, this ——— day of ———,
in the year of our Lord ———.*

The parent, guardian, or near relation, must then add his certificate as to the truth of the declaration, which must be similar to that ordered to be annexed to the extract from the parish register.

The above-mentioned certificate (and declaration, in cases where a declaration shall be required) are to be annexed to the petition to be written by the candidate, and they are to sign a declaration thereon, that they have read these printed instructions. The same declaration is to be signed by the parent, guardian, or near relation of the candidates respectively.

Candidates will be interrogated in an open Comanttee as to their character, connexions, and qualifications, conformably to the General Court's resolution of the 6th July 1809. The nature of this interrogation may be known on application to the Clerk of the College department. And the following Rules and Regulations are to be observed with respect to the examination of candidates :

Each candidate shall produce testimonials of good moral conduct, under the hand of the principal or superior authority of the college or public institution in which he may have been educated, or under the hand of the private instructor to whose care he may have been confined; and the said testimonials shall have reference to his conduct during the *two years immediately preceding his presentation for admission.*

Each candidate shall be examined in the Four Gospels of the Greek Testament, and shall not be deemed duly qualified for admission to Halleybury College, unless he be found to possess a competent knowledge thereof; nor unless he be able to render into English some portion of the works of one of the following Greek authors:—Homer, Herodotus, Xenophon, Thucydides, Sophocles, and Euripides; nor unless he can render into English some portion of the works of one of the following Latin authors:—Livy, Terence, Cicero, Tacitus, Virgil, and Horace; and this part of the examination will include questions in ancient history, geography, and philosophy.

Each candidate shall also be examined in English history and geography, and in the elements of mathematical science, including the common rules of arithmetic, vulgar and decimal

fractions, and the first four books of Euclid. He shall also be examined in the first part of Paley's Evidences of Christianity.

It is, however, to be understood, that superior attainments in one of the departments of literature or science, comprised in the foregoing plan of examination, shall, at the discretion of the examiners, be considered to compensate for comparative deficiency in other qualifications.

The examinations are held at the East-India House, half-yearly, in the months of *January* and *July*.

A student publicly expelled the college will not be admitted into the Company's civil or military service in India, or into the Company's Military Seminary.

No person can be appointed a member of the Company's Civil Service whose age is less than eighteen or more than twenty-three years, nor until he shall have resided four terms at least in the college, and shall have obtained a certificate signed by the Principal of his having confirmed himself to the statutes, and regulations of the College.

On a student's appointment to be a Member of the Civil Service he will be required to attend at the Secretary's Office, East-India House, to make the necessary arrangements for entering into covenant, and for giving a bond for £1,000 jointly with two sureties for the due fulfilment of the same, and a legal instrument is to be entered into by some one person (to be approved by the Court of Directors) binding himself to pay the sum of £3,000, as liquidated damages, to the Company, for breach of a covenant to be entered into that the student's nomination hath not been in any way bought, or sold, or exchanged for any thing convertible into a pecuniary benefit.

The rank of students leaving the college is determined by the certificate of the Principal, which is granted with reference to the industry, proficiency, and general good behaviour of the students.

Such rank to take effect only in the event of the students proceeding to India within six months after they are so ranked, whether they proceed *via* Egypt or the Cape of Good Hope.

TERMS OF ADMISSION FOR STUDENTS.

One hundred guineas per annum, for each student; a moiety whereof to be paid at the commencement of each term, there being two in the year, besides the expense of books and stationery.

Students to provide themselves with a table-spoon, table-knife and silver fork; also, with not less than two pair of sheets, two pillow-cases, and two breakfast cloths.

Ten guineas to be paid on leaving College by each student, for the use of the library.

1st commences 19th January and ends 30th June } in each Year.
2nd ditto 10th Sept. and ends 15th December }

N. B.—The Students are to provide themselves with proper Academical Habits.

(By a Resolution of the Court of Directors of the 16th January 1828, all Cadets at the Military Seminary, and all subsequent nominations thereto, are deemed for general Service until brought forward for public examination.)

TERMS OF ADMISSION.

Conditions and Qualifications for a Candidate.

1. No candidate can be admitted under the age of fourteen, or above the age of eighteen years.
2. No person can be admitted who has been dismissed, or obliged to retire, from the Army or Navy, the Royal Military College at Sandhurst, the Royal Military Academy at Woolwich, or from any other public institution.
3. Every candidate must produce a certificate of his birth taken from the parish register, and signed by the minister, and countersigned by the church wardens, or, if born in Scotland, by the session's clerk and two elders, accompanied by a declaration from his father, mother, or nearest of kin, the forms of which may be had at the Cadet office in the Military Department. In the event of there being no register of his birth or baptism, the candidate will be furnished with the form of a declaration to be taken by him previously to his being appointed.
4. No candidate will be admitted without a certificate that he has had the small-pox, or has been vaccinated; nor without a certificate, in the prescribed form, to be given by two practising surgeons, that he has no mental or bodily defect whatever to disqualify him for military service.
5. Every candidate must produce a certificate of good conduct from the master under whom he has last studied.
6. Every candidate must deliver the names and addresses of two persons residing in London, or its vicinity, who engage to receive him if he shall be dismissed from the seminary, or removed from sickness or any other cause.

TEST OF ADMISSION—7. Every candidate is required to write a good legible hand; and to write English correctly from dictation. He is also required to construe and parse Caesar's Commentaries correctly. He must likewise possess a correct knowledge of all the rules of arithmetic usually taught in schools, especially the rule of three, compound proportion, practice, interest, vulgar and decimal fractions, and the extraction of the square root. If a candidate is deficient in any part of the preceding test, his reception into the institution will be deferred for such length of time as the head master shall report to be necessary.

8. The qualifications mentioned in the last article are all that are absolutely requisite for the admission of a cadet into the Military Seminary. Parents and guardians are however informed, that it will be of great advantage to a cadet in his future studies at this establishment if, before being admitted, he make himself well acquainted with the following portions of the fourth edition of Cape's "Course of Mathematics," in the order in which they are given below, viz.

1. Algebra, Part. I.—2. Geometry, Chaps. I, II, III, and VII.—3. The use of Logarithms.—4. Trigonometry, Chaps. I, II, and III.—5. Statics, Chaps. I, III, and IV.—6. Dynamics, Chaps. I, II, III, IV, and V.—7. Hydrostatics and Hydrodynamics.

It is also very desirable that a cadet on joining the Seminary be able to draw with facility in pencil, and shade with Indian ink.

9. Every cadet upon his admission is considered a *Probationary* pupil for the first six months; at the end of which period the public examiner will be required to report to the

military committee, on the probability of the cadet being able to pass for the artillery or infantry in the required period of four Terms. Should this appear improbable, either from want of talent or diligence, the cadet will then be returned to his friends.

PAYMENTS, &c.—10. The parents or guardians of the gentlemen cadet are required to pay £50 per term (of which there are two in a year) towards defraying the expense of his board, lodging, and education; also an entrance subscription of £2. 2s. to the public library; which payments include every charge except for uniform clothes, books, and pocket-money, as hereafter specified.

11. The Payment of the fixed charges for each term is to be made in advance; and the payment for clothes, pocket-money, and books for the preceding term, is to be made previous to the cadet's return to the Seminary.

12. A cadet entering in a term, at whatever part of it, must pay the regulated sum for the whole terms in which he enters, which will count as one of the four terms of his residence; and no return of any portion of the advance will be made in the event of a cadet's quitting the Seminary.

13. Such articles of uniform dress* as may be considered by the military committee to be necessary shall be provided at the cost of the cadet. The amount of pocket-money issued to him at the rates† fixed by the rules of the Seminary is also to be defrayed by his parents or guardians.

14. The following class-books will be provided at the public expense, the mutilation or destruction of which to be chargeable to the cadets, viz.

15. The cadets will, on their first joining Addiscombe, be supplied with the following books, the cost of which will be charged to their parents or guardians, viz.

Any books not included in the above enumeration, or which may be hereafter required at the seminary, to be paid for by the cadets.

16. Previous to the cadet's admission, his parents or guardians shall furnish him with the following articles, viz.

Two strong plated forks with crests or initials, two combs and a brush, twelve shirts (including three night-shirts) twelve pair of stockings, six towels, six night-caps, eight pocket-handkerchiefs, one pair of white trousers, a flannel jacket (to be worn when playing at football or cricket), a tooth brush, a Bible and Prayer-book, a case of mathematical instruments of an approved pattern, to be seen at Messrs. Troughton and Simms', 138, Fleet Street; and at Messrs. Reeves & Sons', 113 Cheapside. *N B.*—Each article of dress must be marked with the owner's name in full.

PROHIBITION.—17. The cadet must not join the seminary with a greater sum in his possession than one guinea, and a further supply from any of his relations during his term may subject him to dismission from the seminary.

VACATIONS.—18. Midsummer commences about the middle of June, ends 31st July.

Christmas commences about the middle of December, ends 31st January.

19. Before the close of every vacation, the cadet must apply at the Cadet Office, for an order for his re-admission, and all sums then due to the Company must be paid up. This order will express that he is only to be re-admitted upon his returning with the books and instruments which he took home with him, that his linen is put into proper repair, and that he is in a fit state of health to renew his studies.

Notice to Parents and Guardians.

The friends of every cadet are hereby informed, that provision being made for furnishing him with every requisite, he cannot really want a supply of money to be placed at his disposal while at the seminary; and if they do notwithstanding think proper to furnish him with money, they put it in his power to commit irregularities, which must always retard his studies, and may eventually lead to his removal from the institution.

The parents and friends are further particularly desired not to attend to any application from the cadet for money, under the pretence of his having incurred any debts at Croydon, or elsewhere, or for the purpose of subscribing to the public charities, or any other pretence whatever.

* *Viz.* Jackets, waistcoats, stocks foraging caps, trousers, half boots, gloves together with a proportionate share of the expense of any other periodical supplies, and the repairs of the same. The average cost is £7, 12s. 6d. per term.

† *Viz.* 2s. 6d. a week, with 1s. additional to censors, and 2s. 6d. additional to corporals.

It having become known that cadets have been in the habit of writing to their friends for money, under the pretence that there were so many stoppages from their weekly allowance that they had scarcely any money left, the Committee have ascertained that these stoppages have arisen, not only from wilful and wanton destruction of public property, but in a considerable degree from the postage of letters, and the carriage of parcels addressed to the cadets. It has in consequence been ordered, that no letter or parcel shall be admitted into the seminary unless the postage or a carriage of such letter or parcel shall have been previously fully paid for by the person sending the same. It has also been ordered that every parcel shall be opened in the presence of one of the orderly officers and the cadet to whom it is sent; that should it contain wine, or any thing prohibited in the regulations, the parcel, upon the first offence, will be returned to the person sending the same; and that upon the second offence, the cadet will be ordered home, and will not be re-admitted until a written apology has been sent to the Committee by the person who has committed a breach of this regulation.

Extract from the Standing Regulations of the Seminary.

“No professor, master, or other person in the institution, shall receive from the cadet, or the parents or friends of any cadet, any pecuniary present or consideration, on any pretence whatever.”

MEMORANDA.

The gentlemen cadets educated at the Military Seminary are eligible for the corps of engineers, artillery, and infantry. Admission to the two first of these branches, viz. the engineers and artillery, is only to be obtained by these cadets, none others being eligible. Those who are most distinguished are selected for the engineers, according to the vacancies in that branch—Those immediately following in order of succession are promoted to the corps of horse and foot artillery.

Those cadets for whom there is no room in the engineers, but who are reported to have attained to a high degree of qualification, receive honorary certificates, and their names are announced to the governments in India, and published in general orders to the army, as meriting particular notice. They have the privilege of choosing the presidency in India to which they shall be stationed. The cadets not appointed to the engineers or artillery are, when reported qualified, posted to the infantry, and rank together according to the rank which they obtained at the seminary.

The gentlemen cadets may pass through the seminary as rapidly as their attainments and qualifications will enable them to pass after a year's residence, provided that they are of the age of sixteen years on or before the day of their final examination. Their stay at the institution is limited to four terms; and all the time passed by them at the institution after they attain the age of sixteen counts as so much time passed in India in calculating their period of service for retiring pensions on full pay.

PERSONS WHO MAY BE NOMINATED DIRECT CADETS.

A candidate must have attained the age of sixteen years. He is not eligible to be appointed a cadet after having attained the age of twenty-two years, unless he shall have been, for the space of one year at least, a commissioned officer in Her Majesty's Service, or in the Militia or Fencible Corps when embodied, and hath been called into actual service, or shall have been in the Company of Cadets of the Royal Regiment of Artillery. Such persons are eligible for the appointment of cadet in the Company's service, provided their age does not exceed twenty-five years. [A commission in the Guernsey Militia, or in any other corps similarly circumstanced is not a qualification. (Resolution of Court, 3rd April, 1844.)]

A candidate who has been so employed must produce his commission, together with a certificate from the War Office or Commanding Officer of his Regiment, of his having actually joined and done duty with the regiment for the full term of one year and upwards; and that he was neither dismissed nor resigned his regiment in consequence of any misconduct.

No person who has been dismissed or obliged to retire from the Army or Navy, the Royal Military College at Sandhurst, the Royal Military Academy at Woolwich, or from any other Public Institution, on account of immoral or ungentlemanly conduct, can be appointed a cadet.

The following are the points upon which Candidates are to be examined before they are passed as cadets:—

1. Each candidate will be required to write English correctly from dictation.
2. He should possess a competent knowledge of the ordinary Rules of Arithmetic, including the Rule of Three, Compound Proportion, Simple and Compound Interest, Vulgar and Decimal Fractions, and the extraction of the Square Root. He should also have read the first three Books of Euclid.
3. In languages he should be able to translate into English, passages from Caesar's Commentaries, or from the first four Books of Virgil's *Æneid*, and he will be further expected to parse, and show his knowledge of Grammar and Syntax.

The candidate will be required to translate from French into English, an extract from one of the following works, viz., Telemachus, Voltaire's Charles the XII., and Peter the Great. But the candidate will have the option of being examined in the Hindustani, in lieu of the French language, and in that case he will be required to translate from Hindustani into English, an extract from one of the following works, viz.: Bagh-o-Buhar, Tota Kahanee.

4. In History he should be prepared to pass an examination in Keightley's Histories, Greece and Rome, in Cloig's History of England, and in the History of British India, contained in Vols. 1 and 2 of the Edinburgh Cabinet Library.

5. In Geography, he should possess a competent knowledge of the modern divisions of the world; the principal nations in Europe and Asia; the names of the capital of each nation in Europe, and of the chief cities of Hindostan; and the names and situations of the principal rivers and mountains in the world.

6. In Fortification, he should have read some elementary work on the subject (Stralith's Introductory Essay to the Study of Fortification, or Manganjay's Field Fortification), and have received some instruction in drawing.

The examination of the candidates will take place before the Board of Examiners to be convened for that purpose at the Military Seminary at Addiscombe, near Croydon.

If the candidate has been confirmed as a member of the Church of England, he will be required to make a declaration to that effect. If not so confirmed, or if not a member of the Church of England, he will be required to produce a certificate from a minister, stating that he has been well instructed in the principles of the religion in which he has been brought up.

The candidate will also be required to produce testimonials of good moral conduct, under the hand of the Principal or Superior authority of the College or Public Institution in which he may have been educated or under the hand of the private instructors to whose care he may have been confided,—and the said testimonials shall have reference to his conduct during the two years immediately preceding his presentation for admission.

Resolution of Court of Directors, 9th August 1809, to prevent the purchase of Appointments.

That any person who shall, in future, be nominated to a situation, either civil or military, in the service of the Company, and who shall have obtained such nomination in consequence of purchase, or agreement to purchase, or of any corrupt pretence whatever, either direct or indirect, by himself or by any other person, with or without his privity, shall be rejected from the service of the Company, and ordered back to England, if he shall have proceeded to India before a discovery of such corrupt practice be made: and if such situation shall have been so corruptly procured by himself, or with his privity, he shall be rendered incapable of holding that, or any other situation whatever, in the said service. Provided always, that if a fair disclosure of any corrupt transaction or practice, of the nature before described, wherein any Director has been concerned, shall be voluntarily made by the party or parties engaged in the same with such Director, the appointment thereby procured shall be confirmed by the Court.

All direct cadets, appointed or sworn in between the 10th March and 10th June, or between 10th Sept. and 10th Dec. (or the days which may be fixed on for the public examination of the Seminary Cadets) do rank after the Seminary Cadets who may pass their said examinations, provided the latter sail for their respective destinations within three months after passing said examination.

N. B.—All cadets who may be appointed between the dates of public examination at Addiscombe and the 10th of March or 10th of September, will be allowed to rank from the date of their sailing, provided this takes place within three months after their being passed and sworn.

The forms of certificate required to be produced are to be obtained on application to Mr. T. R. CLARKE, Cadet Office, India-House.

Unless the whole of the said certificates are delivered in by the cadet, he will not be passed. If no parish register can be found, it is provided as follows, viz.:

“That if no register can be found, a declaration, pursuant to the Act passed in the 5th and 6th year of his late Majesty William the Fourth, of that circumstance shall be made by the party himself, with his information and belief, that his age is not under sixteen years, and doth not exceed twenty-two years.” (Act of the 33 Geo. III.). Forms of the Declaration may be had at Cadet Office.

When the Cadet is ready to embark, he must apply to Mr. T. R. CLARKE, Clerk for passing Cadets, &c., for a certificate of his having passed, which certificate will direct him to the Secretary's Office, where he will obtain the certificate of his appointment. He will then hold himself in readiness to embark, either previous to the ship's departure from Gravesend, or at the last port from whence the ship shall be ordered to take her departure from England.

ASSISTANT SURGEONS.

Regulations for their Admission into Company's Service.

AGE.—The assistant surgeon must not be under twenty-two years, in proof of which he must produce an extract from the register of the parish in which he was born, or his own declaration pursuant to the Act of the 5th and 6th William IV., cap. 62, and other certificates, agreeably to forms to be obtained in the office for cadets and assistant surgeons.

QUALIFICATION IN SURGERY.—The assistant surgeon, upon receiving a nomination, will be furnished with a letter to the Court of Examiners of the Royal College of Surgeons, to be examined in Surgery, and their certificate will be deemed a satisfactory testimonial of his qualification; but should the assistant surgeon be previously in possession of a diploma from the Royal College of Surgeons of London, or of the Colleges of Surgeons of Dublin or Edinburgh, or of the College and University of Glasgow, or of the Faculty of Physicians and Surgeons of Glasgow, either of them will be deemed satisfactory as to his knowledge of Surgery, without any further examination. He is also required to produce a certificate from the Copper of a Public Hospital in London, of having acquired and being capable of practising, with proper dexterity, the art of cupping.

QUALIFICATION IN PHYSIC.—The assistant surgeon will also be required to pass an examination by the Company's examining physician in the practice of physic, in which examination will be included as much anatomy and physiology as is necessary for understanding the causes and treatment of internal diseases, as well as the art of prescribing and compounding medicines, and Dr. Scott will then require him to produce satisfactory proof of his having attended at least two courses of lectures on the practice of physic, and above all, that he should produce a certificate of having attended diligently the practice and clinical instruction of the physicians at some general Hospital in London for six months; or at some general Hospital in the country (within the United Kingdom) for six months, provided such provincial Hospital contain at least, on an average, one hundred in-Patients, and have attached to it a regular establishment of physicians as well as surgeons. It is also expected that the assistant surgeon shall produce a certificate of having diligently attended, for at least three months, the practical instruction given at one of the Asylums for the treatment of the Insane, and at one of the Institutions or wards of a Hospital especially dedicated to the treatment of Ophthalmic disease. He will also be required to attend a course of lectures on the principles and practice of Military Surgery, if such a course shall be given at the place at which he has been educated. No attendance on the practice of a physician at any Dispensary will be admitted.

All cadets and assistant surgeons are required to subscribe to the Military and Medical Funds at their respective presidencies.

All cadets and assistant surgeons who shall fail to apply for their orders within three months from the date of their being passed and sworn, or shall not actually proceed under such orders, will be considered as having forfeited their appointments, unless special circumstances shall justify the Court's departure from this regulation.

CHAPLAINS.

Regulations for their Admission into Company's Service.

Candidates for appointments as Assistant Chaplains must have been two years in Orders, and must not exceed forty years of age; and at the time of appointment are required to produce their letters of Orders, Deacon and Priest, as well as testimonial, signed by three beneficed clergymen, and a medical certificate; the appointments are made subject to the approval of the Archbishop of Canterbury or the Bishop of London.

Chaplains are required to enter into covenant, and to give a bond for £500 jointly with two sureties for the due fulfilment of the same.

Chaplains are required to subscribe to the Military Fund, and must proceed to their destination within six months from the date of the Court's Resolution by which they were nominated; and in failure thereof with out leave obtained from the Court, their appointments will lapse.

AFFGHANISTAN.

DOOR MAHOMMED KHAN, one of the Brothers of FORTUN KHAN, the celebrated Vizier of MAHMOOD, and chief of the *Barikzaye Khan*, the most powerful in Afghanistan, had for some years ruled this country nominally in the *Restoration* of SHAH SHAHAN OOLAH MOHAMMAD in 1838. On the death of this Prince, DOOR MAHOMMED again assumed the reins of Government, which he still holds.

On the late and cruel murder of FORTUN KHAN by MAHMOOD at the instigation of PRINCE KANAKIS, his brothers revolted from their allegiance under the guidance of AZEM KHAN, the Governor of Cashmere, and drove MAHMOOD and his son from Cabul. AZEM KHAN in the first instance offered the vacant throne to SHAH SHAHAN, (considered the legitimate King by the British Government,) but offended by some personal slight, withdrew his support, and placed in his room, SYOON, a Brother of SUSSA, who was bound to take the throne without the power of royalty. On AZEM KHAN's death, his Brothers, dissatisfied with their position, conspired against his son, HUSSAY DOLLAN KHAN, and seizing his person, by threats of blowing him from a gun, induced his mother to deliver up the riches of AZEM KHAN's immense wealth. SYOON's son was killed in these disputes and he himself alarmed by these scenes of violence, fled to Lahore. DOOR MAHOMMED, the most talented of the Brothers, then took possession of the throne and became *de facto* King of CABUL. He had four Brothers, carried off about half a million sterling of AZEM KHAN's money, and seated himself in CANNARAW, as an independent Chieftain. He and one of his Brothers are dead. CANNARAW is at present lately ruled by CAHUR DIL KHAN, assisted by his two surviving Brothers, RUSSEH DIL and MEER DIL.

CASHMERE AND JAMOO.

Maharajah GOOLAB SINGH, placed on the Gaddie by the treaty of Umrtair in 1846.

KINGDOM OF OUDE.

The family of the princes of Oude are descended from MEER MAHOMMED AMER, of a noble family in Persia, who came to India in the reign of BEHADOOR SHAH, and was received into the Imperial service, under the name of SAADUT KHAN. He was appointed to the Government of Oude in 1719 on the accession of MEHARAJ SHAH to the throne of Delhi. He had no son, and was, therefore, succeeded by his nephew and son-in-law, MOHAMMAD ALLY KHAN, who took the title of SUFDER JUNG. He was succeeded by SULA OOL DOWLA, who was again succeeded by ASORH UD DOWLA. On the death of ASORH UD DOWLA without any male issue, his spurious son, VIZIER ALLY, assumed the reins of government, but his illegitimacy being discovered, he was after a reign of four months deposed, and SAADUT ALLY KHAN, the brother of ASORH UD DOWLA, ascended the *musnad* on the 2^d of January 1793. He died in 1814 and was succeeded by his son SHAHMOHAMMED ALLY KHAN, who relinquished the title of Dewah in 1819, and assumed that of King; he died in 1827 and was succeeded by his son SHAH ZUMAR, who assumed the titles of "His Majesty ASOR NUSSEH, KOOTAH OOD DEEN SOULIMAN JAH, SOULTAN, ANOOL NOUWERWAN ZEMAN NUSSEH OOD DEEN, HYDER SHAHJAHAN BADERA, GRAZEE, KHOOLD OOLA MOORUKA-HAN SHIRVAN, NUT-A-HOOL." This prince died in 1837 and was succeeded by his uncle, NUSSEH OOD DOWLA, who assumed the title of "His Majesty ASOR PUTTY NUSSEH OOD DEEN SULTANA ZEMAN HONORARY ALLY SHAH BADERA-A-DJAH," who died in February 1847. His son succeeded him under the title of "ASOR MAHOMMED NUSSEH OOD DEEN SEKENDER JAH SAHJAHAN AULI KYOOR ZEMAN SULTAN ASLAN MAHOMMED WAJED ALI SHAH BADERA OUDH."

KINGDOM OF AYA OR BURMAH.

The family name of the (said to be) deposed King of Burmah, or that given to him by his Grandfather, is Maung Khung, but it is not considered respectful to mention this name having obtained as an appanage, and held until he assumed the throne, the rich district of Tharawadi, which contains the principal teak forests in the country, he was always styled Tharawadi, Meng-tha, or Prince of Tharawadi. He was born on Wednesday the 6th of September 1786, and he is therefore now (1st January 1844) in his 59th year. His father was the heir apparent to the throne, when Colonel Syme visited Amarapura, and whom that officer calls King Thein, more properly, Au-ye-tha-han, or Au-ye-Meng, Lord or Prince of the Eastern House. His grandfather was Colonel Syme's Minderage, more properly, Meng-der-ya-ga, the Great King of Burmah, one of the titles borne by the Kings of Burmah; but his subjects now refer to him as Pho-der-ya-ga, the great Royal Grandfather, or Badoun Thein, the Lord of Badoun, the town which he had held before he came to the throne. He died on the 6th June 1819 and was succeeded by the present King's elder Brother, now known as Tan-gin-meng-tha, Prince of Tassau, with the family name of Maung-Tan, the name who engaged in war with the British Government, and who was dethroned by the present monarch in the month of April 1827.

In 1827 the deposed King deserted his Brother's Capital of Aya, which has now become a ruin, and fled to a village in the northward, with the ostensible object of building a new city there, but in reality a purpose of escaping from the British resident, for on the withdrawal of that officer, the King returned, and established himself in his Grandfather's city of Amarapura, which is now again the Capital of the country. By his principal Queen he has a grown-up son and daughter, the former now styled Maung-dweng-yaung Mengtha, Prince of Taung-dweng-yaung, and the latter, highly skilled in Burmese science, particularly astrology. By his numerous inferior Queens he has several other children, the principal of whom is a bold, spirited character, formerly named Tait-yaung-tha, but since his father's accession to the throne styled, from the name of the mountains of which he enjoys, Pya-Hung-tha or Prince of Prome. Besides him, and the King's Uncle, the Philipine Prince of Mookhara, the Lawatoo grand council of the kingdom now consists of four Walegyes, two of whom are, Maung Hoo-ya, who was Governor of Mookhara during Major O'Hara's mission in 1811-12 and Maung Dook-ya, who held the same office when Colonel Bason was deputed to the Court of Aya in 1836.

Shortly after the present King seized the throne, he put to death the late Monarch's only son, the *Takya Maw*, his principal Queen, his Mother *Meng-tha-rye*, and the great Prince, and most of the ministers and Chief officers of the late Government. The life of the late Monarch however, has been spared and he is not ill-treated excepting in being kept as a state prisoner. The country is stated to be in a very unsettled state, and there is now no Burmese officer of superior rank and authority to the southward of the Capital. Every town and almost village has its own petty government independent of all interference excepting from the Court itself. Commercial speculations also are hazardous, particularly as the present King has endeavored to destroy his principal sea-port town of Rangoon, where British subjects are now not sure of protection and freedom from official exactions and molestation; and it is very important that it should be generally known, that the Government of India declined to interfere when a complaint was submitted to it by a British Commander of ill usage at Rangoon. Although the relations of the British Government with the present King continue in an unsatisfactory state and no British Officer resides in Burmah, there is no ground for supposing that he entertains the smallest idea of making a war with us. On the contrary, strong hopes may now be entertained as to the most violent of the war party, the King's Son *Tait-tong-biya*, and the *Myawade Wroogyee*, have been recently carried off by cholera; that the convenience and advantage of re-establishing amicable relations with the British Government will be acknowledged by the King of Burmah.

The following may be considered as a fair translation of the state and title of the King of Burmah:—
 "His most glorious and excellent Majesty the Lord of the Universe, King of Elephants, Master of many White Elephants, and Proprietor of Mines of Gold, Silver, Rubies, Amber and the Noble Serpentine, Sovereign of the Empires of Thunaparranta and Tampadipa and other great Empires and Countries, and of all the Umbrella wearing Chief, the Supporter of Religion, the Sun-descended Monarch, Arbitrator of Life, and great King of Righteousness, who bears the honorary name (in Pali) of the Illustrious in the three worlds, the King of Kings, possessor of boundless dominion and supreme wisdom, and great King of Righteousness."

His dominions consist of Burmah Proper, the old kingdom of Young-nu and the Shan States and Districts of Kale, Thangthut, Khanti, Mognung, Bamo, Monhyon, Momaht, Main Loun, Tanok-bain, Thainai, Kaingmah, Main Main, Main Leang-gyih, Kyain Young-yih, Kyalatoun, Kyain Khyaing, Thibo, Thoun-ay, Monoh, Kyain-tounn, Kyain-kham, Nyaung-yur, Lgya, Mauk-me, Moby, Main Pin, Main Pau, Main Pan, Main Kaing, Naung-mun, Thigt Tabet, Youk-zonk, Main Tsat, Ente, &c., all of which States and districts however are differently named, more or less, by the Shan themselves.

KINGDOM OF SIAM.

The King's usual titles are, "The God Buddha who dwells over every head, the Lord of life and master of the Palace". His dominions consist of Siam Proper, of the Shan States of Ch'hiung Mai, Lamphun, Lak'hou, Menging Nan, Meuang Fang, Lan-ch'hang, Luang Phusang, Ch'hiung Sen, Ch'hiung Itai, and others, of part of the old kingdom of Cambodia, and of the Malayan States of Queda and Patani.

The present King is the same person whom Mr. Crawford saw as Prince Krom Chint all Bangkok in the year 1822. He was the eldest son by an inferior wife of the late King, whom he succeeded on the 21st July 1824, with the general consent of the Country, and he is now about 50 years of age. His successor, it is supposed, will be his brother *Chao Fa*, "Lord of Heaven," the eldest son of the late King by his principal Queen. The other members of the Royal family of Siam are said to amount to nearly three thousand.

KINGDOM OF NEPAUL.

The Ex-Maharaja *RAJ RAJENDRA VIKRAM SAH*, King of Nepal, succeeded his father at the early age of two years; he is the son of *GIRIVAN JUDDHA VIKRAM SAH*, the son of *PRITWEE PAL SAH*, the successor of *RUN BAHADUR* the son of *SING PETAUSA*, the son of *PURTHI NARRAIN*, the Goorkh conqueror of Nepal, who subdued it in 1768.

The death of the Ex-Rajah's father is one of those, which Princes whose caprice to the law have met with. *GIRIVAN JUDDHA VIKRAM SAH* having caused a pagoda, like that of Jaggernaut, to be erected, ordered similar obedience to be paid to it. This excited dissatisfaction amongst his people; and one of his brothers took advantage of this opportunity of revenging the death of another brother, who had been put to death by the eradication of his eyes, by order of the Rajah. He accordingly went to the Court, and pretending to remonstrate with him on the injustice of his late order, struck him with his sabre. He was, however, immediately killed by the *Causy Bhimson*, who was present, and his infant prince was placed on the *Masnad*. On the night of the same day, three hundred persons, on whom any suspicion fell, were, it is supposed, put to death by the *Causy's* order. Nepal is tributary to China from the year 1792. In May 1847, Maharaja *RAJ RAJENDRA VIKRAM SAH* was deposed, and his son elevated to the *Guddee* under the title of "Maharaja *DHARAJ SORJINDRA VIKRAM SAH BAHADUR SORJINDRA JUNG*."

NIZAM OF HYDRABAD.

His Highness *Nawab ASOPH JAH WAZIRPURA UL MOONALIK NIZAMUL MOOLK NIZAMOOD*, *DOWLAT NAWAB* *MIRZA FORKANDER ALI KHAN BAHADUR FORAN JUNG*, Nizam of Hyderabad succeeded the *Muzaffar* on the 24th of May 1829; is the son and successor of *SECUNDER JAH* the eldest of the eight sons of *Nizam ALI KHAN*, the younger brother of *SALABUT JUNG*; the uncle and successor of *Muzaffar JUNG*, the nephew and successor of *NAMIK JUNG*, the second son of *NIZAM-UL-MOOLK*, who obtained the *Soubdary* of the Deccan in 1717, in the reign of *Rufficul Dirjet*.

Before the formation of a treaty of perpetual alliance with the English, on the 12th October 1800, the *Soubdary* of the Deccan had suffered continual disturbances. When *Asoph Jah Nizam-ul-moolk* returned from Delhi, in 1740, he fought in 1741, his son *NAMIK JUNG*, who had rebelled against him. *Nizam-ul-moolk* died in 1748, from which time, to the year 1793, a period of 45 years, three princes had attacked the *Hyabad*, and were successively assassinated. *Muzaffar Jung* was grandson to *Nizam-ul-moolk* by his younger daughter's side, *Nizam-ul-moolk* removed his capital from *Aurangabad* to *Hydrabad*.

RAJAH OF GWALIOR.

His Highness *Maharajah MORTIMER MOOLK OMERPOOR DUNN ATISAN Maharaja DUNN JYAJEE RAO Seindrah* *Srinath Bahadur MANSONA JUNG*, the adopted son of *JANGH RAO Seindia*, succeeded to the Government on the 14th January 1843, on the death of his predecessor, *JANGH RAO* who was obliged by *Rajah Sah*, the widow of *Dowlat RAO Seindia* the daughter of *Maharajah Seindia*, his son of *Rajwade Seindia*.

The family of *Seindia* are *Seindra*, of the tribe of *Kumhar*, or cultivators. *Rajwade* was employed by *Pelkwa Begrow*, as the bearer of his slippers, from which situation he rose to *ambassador* and *sub-Major*

having succeeded his father, Bhanumat Row, in the office of Peshwa, in May 1728, came into Malwa in 1731. Bhanumat was a Marhatta chieftain of high rank, so that the sovereign authority of the Scindia family cannot have existed much more than one hundred years.

RAJAH OF BHURTPORE.

His Highness Maharajah BIRJINDER SEWAK JESWANT SINGH, Bahadour, Bhanoo, Bahadour Jans, Rajah of Bhurtpore, succeeded his father in August, 1824; was displaced by one of his cousins, DURJUN SAI, in March, 1826, but reinstated by the British Government, on the 19th of January, 1826; the son of BOLDU SINGH, the second brother of HANAUHAR SINGH, the eldest of the four sons of RUNIKER SINGH, the son of KAIY SINGH, the brother of RUTTON SINGH, the brother of JOWAHAR SINGH, the son of GOONAR HULL, the founder of the principality, killed in 1763.

The settlement of the Jants, (of which tribe the Rajah of Bhurtpore is,) in the Doab of the Ganges and Jumna, is dated in 1708, when they migrated from the banks of the Indus. During Aurungzeb's last march towards the Deccan, CHUNAMON, the Jant, pillaged the baggage of the Army, and with part of the spoil erected the fortress of Bhurtpore. The present prince, like many of his predecessors, is not legitimately descended, being the son of a female slave of the name of Sabeh Romar. When a Rajah has no son, he purchases families, and the boy begotten on any of them, is adopted by the Rajah and the Pant Rance.

RAJAH OF KOTAH.

His Highness MAHA RAO RAM SING, Bahadour, succeeded Maharaja BISEEN SINGH, Rajah of Kotah. The son of KILMOOR RAO, the son of Maha Rao OMID SINGH.

RAJAH OF INDOOR.

His Highness Maharaja TUKOJE Holkar. He is a youth of about seventeen years of age and succeeded the late Rajah Holkar, in October 1843. His installation took place on the 7th June 1844.

The Holkar family are of the Dhoengur or shepherd tribe. The derivation of the name Holkar, or, more properly, Halkur, is from Hull a village, and Kur, an inhabitant, MOULHAN RAO I, was the first prince of the Holkar family; and the time when he obtained any local authority was in 1728; the district of Indore was assigned to him in 1733. He had only one son, Kandi Row, who died in 1754, many years previous to his father's death, and left an only son Vallee Row. He also died after a reign of nine months after the death of MOULHAN Row. The original family being thus extinct, ANILYA Bai elected TUKAJEE HOLKAR to the principality. He had four sons, Cast Row and MOULHAN Row by his wife, and Jeswant Row and Mojeo by his mistress.

RAJAH OF JOYNAGAR OR JYEPPOOR.

His Highness RAJ RAJINDER, Sree Maharaja DHERAJ SEWAK RAM SING, Bahadour, son of Maharaja SEWAK SINGH, Rajah of Joyndgar, or Jyepoor, who is the son of JAGAT SINGH, the son of PRATAP SINGH, the son of MADHO SINGH, the son of RAM SINGH, the son of SEWAK JI SINGH, who lived in the time of MEHARAJ SHAH. The young prince is of tender age and RAWUL BAIRI SAHA is the regent during his minority, appointed by the British government.

RAJAH OF JOUDHPOOR OR MARWAR.

His Highness Maharaja TUKET SING, Bahadour, succeeded Maharaja MAUN SINGH, Rajah of Joudhpoor or Marwar. He is of the tribe of Bhattore Rajpoots.

The earliest Rajah of this country on record was Maharaja Jeswant Singh, who having died near Cabul, in 1581, Aurungzeb, one of whose best generals the Maharaja was, gave orders forcibly to convert his children. The family were thus compelled to take refuge in the hills and woods, and on the death of Aurungzeb, regained their former possession. AIT SINGH, the grand-son of Jeswant Singh, having rebelled.

RAJAH OF BUGHALKUND.

His Highness Maharaja BISWANATH SINGH, Bahadour, Rajah of Bughalkund, which is perhaps the most ancient Hindu dynasty now existing in India.

RAJAH OF BHOONDER.

His Highness Maha Rao Rajah RAM SINGH Bahadour, Rajah of Bhoonder, is of the Hara tribe. *During the retreat of Colonel Monson, in 1804, the Bhoonder Rajah greatly assisted him in his distress; and his conduct has been uniformly friendly to the English; yet, at the peace of 1805, he was abandoned by the Government to the vengeance of the Marhattas. Hamilton, page 173.

RAJAH OF OUDEYPORE.

His Highness MAHARAJAH SURESH SING, Rajah of Oudeypore. The family of the princes of Oudeypore, belong to the Sesodya tribe of Rajpoots, which is considered the most noble of all the tribes. The family is also regarded highly by the Mohammedans, in consequence of a tradition, that he is descended, in the female line, from the celebrated Noubirvan, who was King of Persia at the birth of Mahomed, and thus to have in that line a common origin with the descendants of Hossein, the son of Ali.

RAJAH OF BIKANERE.

His Highness Maharaj Raj Baiter, Sree, Maha Rao Bikaner SING, Bahadour, Rajah of Bikanere, the son of SURESH SINGH. The country of Bikanere is governed by the Bhattore Rajpoots, and the cultivators are mostly Jau.

All Ladies to take place according to the rank assigned to their respective husbands, with the exception of Wives of Peers, and ladies having precedence in England independently of their husbands, and who are not in rank below the daughters of Barons, such ladies to take place according to their several ranks with reference to such precedence in England immediately after the wives of members of council at the presidencies in India.

SALUTES.

FORT WILLIAM, DECEMBER 7 1822.

I. As it is advisable to condense into one General Order the many partial ones which have been issued, on occasions required, respecting Ordnance Salutes, the following Rules are promulgated for observance henceforth:—

II. Morning and Evening Guns are authorized to be fired at all Stations of the Army or Camps, coming under the following descriptions:

The Head Quarters of the Army, and of all General Officer's or Divisional Commands, including the Head Quarters of the Artillery Regiment.

All Fortresses or Cantonments with a permanent Garrison Staff.

The Head Quarters of all Districts or Brigadier's Commands or Field Forces.

All Camps or Posts at which a Force is stationed of, or equal to, two Corps (Cavalry or Infantry,) with a Company or more of Artillery or a Field Battery.

III. Salutes to these entitled thereto, are authorized according to the Regulations at all places coming within the above description.

IV. Officers inferior to Brigadier General, who Command Divisions of the Army, Districts, Field Forces, on or beyond the British Frontier; or Garrisons with a Permanent Staff, to receive the Salute and Honors of the next Superior Army Rank from their own Garrisons, Fortresses, &c.

V. Ships Saluting the Fort, to have the Compliment returned by an equal number of Guns.

VI. No persons to be Saluted, but when he comes into, or leaves the Presidency on Public Service.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

Standing Orders.

The following Extracts from the Standing Orders, adopted by the Legislative Council on the 19th of August 1854, are published for general information :

● PETITIONS.

XXII. Petitions to the Legislative Council must relate to matters connected with the business of the Council. Every petition shall be superscribed "To the Honorable the Legislative Council of India," and shall be dated and signed by the petitioner or petitioners. It shall be in respectful and temperate language, and shall conclude with a distinct prayer.

- Signature.** XXIII. Every petition will be received as the petition of the person or persons only by whom it is actually signed.
- How to be transmitted** XXIV. All petitions shall be transmitted to the Clerk of the Council.
- Abstract.** XXV. The Clerk shall make an abstract of every petition so received.
- How to be dealt with?** XXVI. If in the judgment of the Clerk the petition be framed in conformity with Order No. XXII., he shall bring the petition under the consideration of the Council by reading the abstract thereof, and the prayer or the substance of the prayer of the petition, whereupon such petition shall be deemed to have been received by the Council.
- If not in conformity with Order No. XXII.** XXVII. If in the judgment of the Clerk the petition be not framed in conformity with Order No. XXII., or if he have reason to doubt the authenticity of any signature thereto, he shall certify the same on the back of the petition, and shall report the fact to the Council, in which case the petition shall not be received by the Council except upon the motion of a member.
- How to be disposed of** XXVIII. Any petition received by the Council may, upon the motion of a Member, be disposed of in one or more of the following ways:—
1. It may be ordered to be printed.
 2. It may be referred to the Select Committee sitting on any Bill to which it relates.
 3. It may be referred for report to a Select Committee to be appointed specially for that purpose.
 4. If no motion be made upon such a petition, the petition shall be laid upon the table, and afterwards deposited by the Clerk amongst the Records of the Council.
- When and how Petitioners may be heard.** XXIX. If a Bill be pending, peculiarly affecting private interests, and any person whose interests are so affected apply by petition to be heard by himself or his Counsel upon the subject of the Bill, an Order may be made, upon the motion of a Member, allowing the petitioner to be so heard either before the Select Committee on the Bill or before a Committee of the whole Council, provided the petition be received by the Clerk of the Council before the Report of the Select Committee on the Bill shall have been presented. In no other case or manner shall any stranger be heard by himself or by his Counsel.
- Reply to Petitions.** XXX. Ordinarily no reply will be sent to a petitioner. But the Clerk of the Council may be ordered to make such special communication to a petitioner as the Council may direct.

PROJECTS OF LAWS.

- Proposed by local Governments.** XXXI. If a Draft or project of a Law be proposed by the Governor or Governor in Council of a Presidency, or by the Lieutenant-Governor of a Lieutenant-Governorship, the fact shall be reported to the Council by the Clerk, and the Draft or project shall, together with any annexures thereto, be printed and recorded. If within four weeks from the day of such report being made, no Member shall make any motion upon the subject, it shall be the duty of the Member nominated by the Governor of such Presidency, or by the Lieutenant-Governor of such Lieutenant-Governorship, to bring the same before the Council, either by bringing in and taking charge of a Bill for the purpose of carrying the proposal into effect, or by making such other motion upon the subject of the proposal as he may think fit.
- Final Resolution to be communicated.** XXXII. Any final resolution of the said Council upon such proposal shall be communicated by the Clerk of the Council to the Government of the Presidency, or to the Lieutenant-Governor of the Lieutenant Governorship, by whom the proposal was made.
- Proposed by private persons.** XXXIII. Drafts or projects of Laws proposed by private persons must be accompanied by a petition praying that the same may be taken into consideration by the Legislative Council, and shall be dealt with in the manner prescribed by these Orders under the head "Petitions."

BILLS.

- First reading.** LVI. Any Member may, at an ordinary Meeting of the Council, move the first reading of a Bill.

- LVII.** Notice of such intended motion shall be given by the mover, either at a previous Meeting of the Council, or by sending the notice in writing to the Clerk of the Council two clear days before the day fixed for making the intended motion.
- LVIII.** The motion, of which notice has been so given, shall be inserted by the Clerk in the Orders of the Day for the day appointed.
- LIX.** Upon moving the first reading of a Bill, the mover shall state the object and intention of the measure, and the reasons upon which it is founded, and shall deliver to the Clerk of the Council the Bill which he proposes to be read, with a brief abstract of each Section or Clause in the margin thereof, and also a statement, signed by himself and annexed thereto, of such object and reasons, and any extracts of correspondence or documents which may be necessary for a right understanding of the Bill.
- LX.** Upon such motion no discussion shall be permitted, and the Bill shall be read a first time without question, unless the Bill relate to the public finances, to the constitution of the Army or Navy, or to the relations of the British Government with Foreign States, or shall affect the religious rites or usages of the Natives of India.
- LXI.** If the Bill relate to any of the matters mentioned in the last preceding Order, notice of such intended motion must be given at an ordinary Meeting of the Council, at least one week before the motion shall be made; and the question shall not be proposed by the President unless the motion be seconded.
- LXII.** On the first reading of a Bill the Clerk of the Council shall read only the title of it. The Bill with its annexures shall be printed, and a copy shall be sent by the Clerk of the Council to each Member.
- LXIII.** After a Bill shall have been read a first time, notice may be given of a day on which the second reading of the Bill will be moved.
- LXIV.** When a motion for the second reading of a Bill shall have been made the President shall propose the question—"That this Bill be now read a second time," upon which a debate may be taken only upon the general merits and principles of the Bill.
- LXV.** If the motion for the second reading of a Bill be carried, the title only of the Bill shall be read. Thereafter upon motion made, the Bill shall be referred to a Select Committee of the Council, of which the mover shall be the Chairman.
- LXVI.** After the Bill shall have been read a second time and referred to a Select Committee, it shall be published in the *Calcutta Gazette* for general information, unless the special instruction provided for by Order No. LXX. shall have been given to the Committee immediately after its appointment.
- LXVII.** All written communications on the subject of Bills published for general information shall be addressed to the Clerk of the Council, who shall cause the same, and also all such petitions as shall be ordered by the Council, to be referred to the Select Committee on the Bill, to be printed, and a copy thereof to be forthwith laid before such Select Committee and to be sent to each Member of the Council.
- LXVIII.** The Select Committee shall take into consideration the Bill, and all such written communications, and also all such petitions as shall be referred to them, and shall prepare a Report thereon, and shall in such Report propose any amendments of the Bill which they may think expedient. A copy of the Bill signed by the Select Committee shall be annexed to the Report, written or printed in such a manner as to distinguish the amendments, if any, proposed by the Select Committee, from the Bill as published.
- LXIX.** As soon as the Report of the Select Committee is ready, it shall be presented to the Council. Provided that such Report shall not be presented before the expiration of the following periods respectively, *viz.* :—
1. If the Bill relate to any part of the territories subordinate to the Presidency of Bengal, eight weeks from the date of the first publication.
 2. In all other cases, twelve weeks from the date of the first publication.
- LXX.** Any Member, however, may move a special instruction to the Select Committee immediately after its appointment, directing it to submit forthwith a preliminary Report, suggesting any alterations which it may deem expedient to make in the Bill previous to the publication thereof in the *Calcutta Gazette*.

If such preliminary Report of the Committee shall be adopted by the Council, the Bill shall be amended accordingly, and published for general information.

LXXI. When the Report of the Select Committee shall be presented to the Council, it shall be laid upon the table; after which notice may be given of a day on which it will be moved, that the Council do resolve itself into a Committee of the whole Council on the Bill.

Report of the Select Committee presented.

LXXII. The Report of the Select Committee shall be printed, and a copy thereof, and also a copy of the Bill annexed to such Report, if any amendments of the Bill be proposed by the Report, shall be sent by the Clerk to each Member of the Council.

Report to be printed.

LXXIII. If the motion for going into Committee of the whole Council on the Bill be carried, the President shall leave the Chair and the Chairman of the Committee shall take a place at the table of the Council. The Committee will then proceed with the Bill, and may make any amendments in any part of the Bill, or in the title thereof, which they may think fit.

Committee of the whole Council.

LXXIV. In settling a Bill in Committee of the whole Council, the title, preamble, and each Section or Clause of the Bill, as reported by the Select Committee, shall be considered separately, commencing with the first Section of the Bill and ending with the preamble, if any, and the title of the Bill.

Proceedings of Committee of the whole Council.

LXXV. The Chairman shall call the number of each Section and Clause and shall read the marginal abstract thereof. If no motion be made thereon, he shall put the question "That this Section (or Clause) stand part of the Bill." If any motion be made to amend the Section or Clause, the Chairman shall state the line in which the amendment is proposed to be made; and upon such motion, or any other motion that may have been made, he shall proceed in the mode prescribed in these Orders—under the head "Motions."

Settlement of Clauses.

How question is to be put on an amended Clause.

LXXVI. If any amendment of the Section or Clause be carried, the question shall be put by the Chairman—"That this Section (or Clause) as amended stand part of the Bill."

Preamble and Title.

LXXVII. A similar course shall be adopted with regard to the preamble, if any, and to the title of the Bill.

LXXVIII. Except as herein otherwise provided, no amendment of an earlier part of a Bill shall be proposed after the Committee has resolved upon a later part of the Bill; unless an amendment made in a later part of the Bill shall have been carried, which renders necessary an alteration in the language of an earlier part of the Bill.

LXXIX. The Committee may allow the consideration of any Section or Clause to be postponed and taken out of its order before the vote has been taken on the question "that the Clause stand part of the Bill."

LXXXI. A Committee of the whole Council may adjourn its sitting, or a debate, to a time to be named, and on such adjournment the Council shall resume its sitting, unless it shall have been adjourned.

LXXXII. When a Committee of the whole Council shall have settled a Bill, the Chairman shall put the question—"That this Bill be reported to the Council with amendments" (or "without amendments," as the case may be.) If that motion be carried, the Chairman shall certify at the foot of the Bill settled in Committee of the whole Council, in the following form:—

XCVI. If the Governor General give his assent, the Act shall be promulgated in the *Government Gazette*.

SUSPENSION OF STANDING ORDERS.

CXXV. The Council may suspend all or any of the Standing Orders, and any Committee of the whole Council may suspend any Standing Order, so far as it relates to business then before such Committee. Provided that no motion for such suspension shall be proposed from the Chair unless it shall be seconded. Such suspension ought to be rarely had recourse to, and never without cogent reasons given, to the satisfaction of the Council.

CXXVI. Any Member voting against such suspension may record his dissent and the reasons thereof, and any Member voting for such suspension may record his assent and the reasons thereof. Provided that such recorded dissent or assent be given in at the next ordinary Meeting of the Council.

SPECIAL STANDING ORDER.

Any Draft Act, which, prior to the 20th of May 1854, was read in Council and published for general information by order of the Governor General of India in Council, may, upon motion, be referred to a Select Committee, or may be taken into consideration by a Committee of the whole Council; and such Committees shall proceed respectively in the manner prescribed in the general Standing Orders, after which the Council may proceed in the manner prescribed in the general Standing Orders in respect to Bills settled in Committee.

RULES AND ORDERS

To regulate the Proceedings of the Court for the Relief of Insolvent Debtors.

The Rules and Orders, with the Table of Fees, which have hitherto subsisted in the Court for the Relief of Insolvent Debtors, are revoked and annulled, save as to matters already done, and save as to the Rule of Court made to take effect from the 28th day of December 1847, relating to the Accountant General; and, instead of them, the following Rules and Orders and Table of Fees are established by the Supreme Court at Fort William in Bengal.

1. All summonses, precepts, rules, orders and other mandatory process shall run, and be in the name of our Sovereign Lady the Queen, and shall be sealed with the Seal of this Court, and shall have and bear the attestation of the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Judicature, or in the vacancy of the office of the Chief Justice, the Puisne Judge acting as Chief Justice, naming him, and shall be prepared, made out, and signed by the Chief Clerk of the Court; and all petitions, affidavits, and other proceedings shall be filed by the said Chief Clerk of Record, and the offices of the said Chief Clerk shall be open daily, between the hours of ten in the forenoon and four in the afternoon.

2. That in every case the Attorney shall personally, and not by his clerk, accept the retainer of a Prisoner, and the Prisoner shall sign the retainer; and at the same time the Attorney shall sign his acceptance thereof; provided that, in case of the illness of such Attorney, or of his absence from Calcutta, such retainer may be received and accepted for him by some other Attorney of the Court, the cause thereof being stated in such acceptance.

3. That the Attorney of every Prisoner, or other Person, applying for Relief under the Act of Parliament, shall cause his Bill to be taxed by the Taxing Officer, and delivered with the allocatur thereon to such Prisoner, or other Person applying for Relief, one week at least before the hearing of his or her Petition; and the Attorney, in all cases, on taxation of his bill of costs, shall produce and leave with the Taxing Officer an Affidavit, proving the payment of all sums of money charged in the same as paid out of pocket, and the truth of each and every other charge for any proceeding, or attendance, or letters charged therein; and that the same were actually necessary to the Prisoner's discharge.

4. That no Attorney shall directly or indirectly employ the Gaoler, or deputy Gaoler, Prisoner, or other Person, residing or confined within any of the Gaols, as clerk or agent to solicit retainers, touching the Relief or Discharge of any Prisoner on pain of being removed from the rolls of the Supreme Court; and no Attorney shall practise as an Attorney whilst he shall himself be a Prisoner for debt or other cause.

5. That, when every Petition, there shall be delivered to the Chief Clerk of the Insolvent Court, to be by him immediately delivered to the Official Assignee, on Retain Paper signed by the Prisoner, containing an account of the Estate and Effects of the Insolvent, in his possession, or under his control, capable of being delivered up, or of which immediate possession can

be given or taken; and, on receipt of such Paper, the Official assignee shall send a Broker or Appraiser, who shall immediately inventory and appraise such Articles as shall be claimed by or on behalf of the Insolvent as excepted under the Act, and such appraisement shall be countersigned by and lodged with the Official Assignee.

6. That to every Schedule there shall be annexed (and filed therewith) another Estate Paper, containing an account of all Moneys, Estates, Effects, and Securities, which, within 12 Calendar months next preceding the time of his going to Prison, if a Prisoner, or of the presentation of the Petition, if not a Prisoner, shall have been paid, spent, alienated, or in any wise lent, disposed of, incumbered, or pledged (and to whom respectively) or recovered, by or from the Insolvent, or on his account, and also containing an Account of his Income or Receipts during such twelve months, and whence derived or obtained, which Estate Paper shall be signed and witnessed in the same manner as the Schedule. That at the time of filing every Schedule, with the annexed Estate Paper hereinbefore last mentioned, there shall be delivered by the Insolvent to the Official Assignee a duplicate thereof respectively, signed and attested in the same manner, and by the same persons as the original filed in Court.

7. That any application to the Court for leave to file any Schedule shall be supported by the Affidavit of the petitioner, setting forth the facts and stating the cause of not having filed such Schedule as required by the Act, or within such time as the Court may have allowed, and also stating what time is required for filing the same, and the application is not made for delay.

8. That, in case of second or subsequent Insolvencies, where it shall be necessary to mention creditors, debts and liabilities under a former Insolvency, it shall not be necessary to do so, otherwise than by stating the total amount of debts and liabilities, and total number of creditors under the former Insolvencies, and referring for particulars to the Schedules filed thereunder.

9. And whereas it is desirable to provide assistance for such Insolvents, being prisoners (and who shall have been and continued imprisoned for six calendar months) as may be unable themselves to prepare the necessary papers, and who may be unable to procure professional assistance, it is ordered that the Keeper of the Gaol of Calcutta shall be entitled to receive from every such prisoner in his custody, desirous of seeking the benefit of the Insolvent Act, the sum of 16 Rupees, provided he shall furnish to such prisoner the necessary blank forms like those in the Appendix to the Act, and shall assist in properly filling up the same, and shall be present when the Petition, Schedule, and the Estate Papers of such prisoner, and when the duplicate original of such Schedule and the Estate Paper annexed thereto, shall be signed, and shall attest the same as a witness, and shall forthwith deliver or transmit, sealed up in a secure manner, to the Office of the Chief Clerk, such Petition, Schedule and Estate Papers, and to the Official Assignee such duplicate Schedule and annexed Estate Paper.

10. That, unless the Court shall in any case otherwise order, the notices for hearing the matters of the petition of the Insolvent shall be served 28 days before the day for hearing. That all notices to be served by the Messenger shall be served, when the distance does not exceed 5 miles from Government House, Calcutta, by the Messenger of the Court personally, and beyond such distance, by him through the General Post Office, and such Messenger shall be in attendance to prove such services, whenever the Court shall be sitting, and shall produce the duplicate list of notices, that the Chief Clerk may minute, in the margin thereof, opposite each name, the services, and file the same. Provided always that, in the case of Military Insolvents, whose regiments shall be stationed more than 50 miles from Calcutta, and who shall appear to be indebted to persons residing at such stations, in sums not exceeding the amount of One Hundred Rupees, respectively, instead of the service of notices in the usual manner, notices to such creditors may be forwarded to the Pay Master, Quarter Master, Adjutant of the Regiment, or Brigade Major, or Station Staff, of the Division to which the Insolvent may belong, or have belonged for the purpose of being served upon such creditors, and the service of such notices upon such creditors shall be duly certified to the Chief Clerk, who shall file the certificate.

And it is ordered, that the amount of the dividends, or other sums which shall appear to be due to such creditors, in default of any claim being made for payment thereof, pursuant to the provisions of the Statute, may be remitted by the Assignee to such Pay Master, Quarter Master, Adjutant of the Regiment, or Brigade Major, or Station Staff, of the Division to which the Insolvent may belong, or have belonged, for the purpose of being paid to such creditor, respectively, so served as aforesaid.

11. That copies of such notices for the hearing, and of all other notices, to be served by the Messenger, duly addressed and numbered according to the name, address, description and number in the Schedule, together with a duplicate list of each such name, address, description and number; and together with the original order to which such notices shall relate, shall be delivered to the Messenger five clear days at least (exclusive of Sundays,) before the last day for the service thereof. That delivery of notices by the Messenger to the party, or to his Solicitor, partner, clerk, door-keeper, wife, son or daughter at the usual place of abode or business of such party, or to the Gaoler in whose custody a party shall be, shall be deemed equivalent to personal service.

12. That the publication of notices in the *Gazette* required by the Act, and of the Vesting order, day for the hearing, day for hearing any other application in the Insolvency, and of the appointment of creditors' Assignees, shall be by the Chief Clerk, who shall cause the same to be inserted in such numbers of the *Gazette*, as shall be first and second, successively, printed next after the Court shall have directed such notices to be given, or next after the making of such Vesting Order, or the appointment of such days for hearing, or of such Assignees. That, in lieu of attaching to the proceedings in each Insolvency, a copy of the *Gazette*, and other papers, if any, in which advertisements shall have been directed, the Chief Clerk shall make and file a memorandum of the appearance of the advertisement therein, and of the date thereof; and it shall not be necessary to file such *Gazettes* or papers.

13. That the Petition and Schedule (with the Annexures) of any Insolvent, and the books and papers filed therewith, shall be produced by the proper officer for inspection and examination during office hours, upon payment of the ordinary and established fees for search, and notice to produce such books and papers, or any specified one or more thereof at the hearing of any petition, or application, must be given to the officer having the custody thereof, on or before the day preceding the day for hearing.

14. That, unless the Court shall otherwise specially order, every sum of money directed to be paid into the Insolvent Court shall be paid into the Bank of Bengal in the name of the Official Assignee, in the matter and to the credit of the particular estate, in which the same shall be paid in.

15. That, unless the Court shall otherwise specially order, the assets of Insolvent Estates shall be paid into the Bank of Bengal in the name of the Official Assignee, and, when practicable, to the credit of the particular estate to which they belong; and that sums set apart on account of dividends shall be distinguished by the heading "Dividends Account," and that no investment, other than in Government Paper, shall be made of any assets, without the sanction of the Court.

16. That the Assignee or Assignees of every Insolvent Estate shall publish quarterly, in the *Calcutta Gazette*, viz., in the *Gazette* first published after the 31st day of January, the 30th day of April, 31st day of July, and the 31st day of October in every year, a statement of each estate not then wound up, and fully distributed, that is to say, of the whole receipts, of the whole disbursements (distinguishing dividends from other payments), of the balance remaining, of the mode in, and securities on which such balance is actually invested, and of the probable out-turn of dependencies; and at the foot thereof shall specify the amount of the remuneration received by him or them during the quarter.

17. That whenever any person shall claim to be a creditor for an amount larger than that admitted by the Schedule, or whenever any difference shall arise between the Assignee or any one creditor and another, as to the correctness of the amount of any debt admitted by the Schedule; or whenever any person, who is omitted from the list of creditors in the Schedule, or whose debt shall be entered as disputed in the Schedule, shall prefer any claim to rank as a creditor, the Official Assignee, having ascertained upon what day the Court will sit for the purpose, shall (by advertisement) give one week's notice at the least, of the day so appointed, and on such day the persons aforesaid, and any other person, may bring forward their proofs in support of any claim, and the Court shall deal with the same in manner directed by the 41st Section of the Act as to claims.

18. That no dividend shall be reserved for any disputed claim or debt, that shall not have been substantiated before or at the date of such sitting at which the dividend shall be declared, or which the Court shall not specially direct to be reserved.

19. That every such claimant shall, at such sitting of the Court as aforesaid, upon oath, declare, whether he has, or has not, any security for his claim or alleged debt; and, if any, shall produce the same to be marked.

20. That the Official Assignee shall require the production of every security held by each creditor, when such creditor or his duly authorized agent shall apply for receipt of his dividend.

21. That the Assignee or Assignees of each Insolvent Estate shall, on the expiration of six calendar months from the declaration of the dividend, file in Court an account upon oath of every dividend then in his or their hands unclaimed, specifying the name of each creditor to whom each such unclaimed dividend is due, as well as the amount of the debt due to each such creditor, and shall publish the same in such number of the *Gazette* as shall be first and second successively printed next after such six months, and, if any such dividend shall have remained unclaimed for the space of twelve calendar months next following such declaration, every such unclaimed dividend shall be paid into the hands of the Government Agent of the East India Company to the credit of the matter of the Insolvent Estate in which it shall have been declared, accompanied with a memorandum or account specifying each creditor's name, to whom each such unclaimed dividend belongs; provided always that, out of the amount of such unclaimed Dividends Accounts so filed and published as aforesaid, the Assignee or Assignees shall deduct the cost and charges of preparing and advertizing such account; and that out of the amount so to be paid in and credited, he or they shall further deduct the cost and charges of preparing such memorandum or subsequent account.

22. That the Official Assignee shall give security to the extent of Co.'s Rs. 1,00,000, and shall, together with such sureties as the Chief Justice shall approve, execute a bond to the Chief Clerk for the time being, in the penal sum of Co.'s Rs. 1,00,000; the Official Assignee to be made liable to the whole amount; and the sureties to be liable, if only two, each severally to the amount and proportion of Co.'s Rs. 25,000, and, if four, then each two jointly and severally for Co.'s Rs. 25,000: that the Official Assignee shall, on pain of his dismissal, give immediate notice in writing to the Chief Clerk for the time being, of the death or insolvency of any one of his sureties, and shall, if required, cause a new bond to be executed to the like amount by another surety, to be approved of as above.

23. That all officers of the Court shall follow the instructions of the Court according to the exigencies of each particular case, subject to such directions as shall from time to time be prescribed by the Court; that when on the death, removal, sickness, or unavoidable absence of the Official Assignee, any other shall be appointed to act in his stead, the Official Assignee so appointed shall leave at the Bank of Bengal and at the Treasury a certificate of his appointment under the seal of the Court, and shall at the same time sign his name in the proper books of the Bank of Bengal and the Treasury, and thereupon all drafts drawn and signed by such Official Assignee shall be payable and paid, as if they had been signed by the Official Assignee, in whose stead he shall have been appointed.

24. That in all suits in equity, wherein an Assignee or Assignees of an Insolvent Estate is or shall be defendant, the suggestion mentioned in the 20th Section of the Act shall not be entered but upon motion, after two clear days' notice to the continuing Assignee, if any, and to the person whose name is to be entered by such suggestion, and such person shall have five weeks' time from such entry to answer the Bill, if the same shall not have been answered by the Assignee, in whose stead he shall have been appointed.

25. That the Official Assignee shall be at liberty to apply to the Supreme Court, or to the Insolvent Court, to permit him to proceed in Equity, or at Law, or in the Ecclesiastical, or Admiralty Jurisdiction, or to defend any suit or action, or take or defend any proceedings, without the payment of any fees of office to the Officers of the Supreme Court or Insolvent Court, in respect of any demand, claim, or right against, or belonging to any Insolvent Estate, wherein no assets have been received, and wherein there are no assets expected or recoverable, except such as shall be the subject of such suit or action. Provided always that such fees shall be a primary charge on, and payable out of the assets recovered therein.

26. That no officer of the Insolvent Court, nor any Attorney practising therein, shall, upon any pretence, or for any reason whatsoever, demand or receive any other fee than that established by the subsisting table of fees, or allowed by special order, and whenever any thing shall be required to be done by any officer or Attorney for which no fee shall have been before provided or established, such officer or Attorney shall bring the same to the notice of the Supreme Court by petition, in such manner that a written Rule or Order may be made respecting the same.

27. That all the officers of the Insolvent Court, and all Attornies practising therein, shall deliver their Bills for Taxation to the Taxing Officer of the Supreme Court, in the manner and form and at the time specified in the Rules for the Taxing Officer of the Supreme Court, passed and established by the said Court on the 15th day of June 1837, save and except as otherwise provided for by the Rule No. 3, hereinbefore contained.

28. That the charges to be made by the Attornies in their Bills of Costs shall be according to the Table of Charges annexed to these Rules; and every Attorney shall be responsible to the officers of the Court for the Relief of Insolvent Debtors, and to the Sheriff, for the fees established by these Rules, in the same manner as they are responsible to the officers of the Supreme Court under the Rules for the Taxing Office of that Court; and the like proceedings shall be had to enforce payment thereof, and, until such payment shall be made, the Attorney shall, in each case, incur the same liabilities and disabilities in the Supreme Court, as he would, if the fees had become due to any officer thereof.

29. It is ordered, that any Attorney practising in the Insolvent Court, and who, under the Rules for the Taxing Office of the Supreme Court, shall have fallen under a disability to practise in that Court, until he shall have paid his fees, shall in every such case be prohibited from practising in the Insolvent Court, in like manner as if the fees had become due to an officer thereof.

30. That the Court in its discretion, and if it think fit to award any costs, may do so against, or to any Assignee, any Insolvent finally discharged, any petitioner for Revocation of Adjudication, any creditor, or any person interested in an Insolvent Estate, applying, opposing or appearing on any application, and either out of the estate, or out of the private moneys of any such person or party; and may direct to what amount, how, in what manner and time, and by whom, the same shall be paid, recovered, or retained.

ADDITIONAL RULES.

IT IS ORDERED, that the following Additional Rule and Order be established pursuant to the Statute Eleventh Victoria Chapter Twenty-one as a Rule and Order of the Court for the Relief of Insolvent Debtors at Fort William in Bengal, this Twenty-fourth day of September, One thousand Eight hundred and Fifty.

That every petition for a Protection Order shall be left with the Chief Clerk of the Insolvent Court at his office, who, upon receiving the same, shall immediately make a minute of the receipt thereof and shall certify to the Insolvent the day on which the said petition will be heard by the Acting Judge of the Insolvent Court, according to the provisions of this order, and the said Chief Clerk shall cause an advertisement to be inserted in the *Government Gazette*, that shall be published next after the receipt of the said petition, and in such advertisement shall note that an application for an *ad interim* Protection Order has been made by the Insolvent, and that such application will be heard and disposed of on a day to be named in such advertisement, being the fourth day after the date thereof, and that any creditor, desirous of opposing such application, must appear before the Acting Judge of the Insolvent Court at the time to be mentioned in such advertisement, and in every case in which the Insolvent shall be in custody, or shall have reason to believe that process against his person has been issued at the suit of any creditor or creditors, notice of the time fixed for the hearing thereof shall also be served at least two clear days before such time upon the said creditors or creditor, or upon their or his Attorney on record; and IT IS ORDERED, that no *ad interim* Protection Order shall henceforth be granted, except upon the certificate of the said Chief Clerk of the publication of such advertisement as is herein directed to be published.

IT IS ORDERED, that the following Additional Rules and Orders be established pursuant to the Statute Eleventh Victoria Chapter Twenty-one, as the Rules and Orders of the Court for the Relief of Insolvent Debtors at Fort William in Bengal, to take effect from the First day of January, One thousand Eight hundred and Fifty-two, dated this Third day of December, One thousand Eight hundred and Fifty-one.

Any creditor, desirous of opposing the discharge of an Insolvent at the hearing, shall give notice of his intention to the Chief Clerk three clear days before the day of hearing, and the Chief Clerk shall make an entry of such notice in a book to be kept by him for that purpose in the event of such notice not being given, and any creditor shall appear to oppose at the hearing, the case shall be postponed to some future day, unless such postponement shall appear to the Court inexpedient.

That when any Insolvent shall obtain an order or leave to amend his Schedule or Estate Paper, such amendment shall be made at least eight clear days before the hearing, and that the Chief Clerk shall give notice of such amendment in the *Gazette*, if the Judge of the Court shall so direct.

CALCUTTA COURT OF SMALL CAUSES.

Whereas by Act No. LX. of 1850, entitled an Act for the more easy Recovery of Debts and Demands in Calcutta, Madras and Bombay, it is, amongst other things enacted, that

“ The judges of each court, holden under this act, subject to the approval of the judges of the Supreme Court, shall have power to make and issue all the general rules for regulating the practice and proceedings of the court, and also to frame forms for every proceeding in the court, for which they shall think it necessary that a form be provided, and also for keeping all books, entries and accounts to be kept by the clerk of the court, and from time to time to alter any such rule or form; and the rules so made, and the forms so framed, shall be observed and used in the court of that presidency, and shall be sent to the Supreme Court for approval, but shall be of force until disapproved.”

In pursuance of such power, therefore, it is hereby ordered, that the following be the

Rules of Practice for the Calcutta Court of Small Causes.

1st. All applications for the usual process of the court shall be made to the clerk in writing, setting out the names and designations in full, of plaintiff and defendant, if known; if not known, describing them by such names and descriptions to the extent to which the same are known, with their last place of abode or business, the cause, or causes of action, and the amount claimed to be recovered.

2nd. The summons to appear to suits, or actions, shall be issued according to the forms in the schedule, and shall be dated, as of the day when issued. Summonses shall be made generally returnable on the seventh day, but may be made returnable in a shorter or longer period, at the discretion of the judge.

3rd. Every such summons to appear to a suit or action shall be served by one of the bailiffs of the court, two clear days before the holding of the court, at which it shall be made returnable.

4th. The service of summons, to appear to a suit or action, must be, either personal, or by delivering the same to some person at the place of abode, or place of business of the defendant; and in such cases as the judge may deem it necessary, the plaintiff, or his agent, must accompany the bailiff to point out the defendant, or his place of abode, or place of business.

5th. When a defendant shall be living or serving on board of any ship or vessel, or be residing or quartered in any barracks, and serving Her Majesty or the East India Company, as a mariner or soldier, it shall be sufficient service to deliver the summons, to appear to a suit or action, to the senior officer on board, or to the person who may at the time have charge of such ship or vessel, or to the adjutant of the corps, or any officer or sergeant of the company to which such mariner or soldier shall belong or be attached.

6th. When any defendant shall, by keeping his house, place of abode, or place of business closed, or by absconding, or by violence or threats, prevent any bailiff from serving any summons to appear to a suit or action, as hereinbefore directed, and such summons shall have been conspicuously fixed on, or near to, such place of abode or place of business, or otherwise served, as nearly as may be according to the mode hereinbefore directed, such service may be deemed good service.

7th. Provided that in all cases where summons, to appear to a suit or action, shall not have been served personally, and the defendant shall not appear on the return day, or day for his appearance, it must be proved to the satisfaction of the judge, that the service of such summons was regularly made.

8th. When any such summons, to appear to a suit or action, has not been served as hereinbefore directed, it shall be lawful for the court to issue another summons, in continuation of, and founded on, the first summons, which shall be returned not served: the first summons shall be deemed the commencement of the suit.

9th. The bailiff, who serves a summons to appear to a suit or action, shall endorse on a copy of such summons the time and manner of the service thereof, and shall produce such copy so endorsed at the court, on the day in which the summons shall be returnable, and such copy shall be filed by the clerk of the court.

10th. The rules as to the mode of service of summons, to appear to a suit or action, shall apply to the service of all summonses, judgments, orders, notices, and processes whatsoever, issuing under the authority of Act IX. of 1854, except as to summonses to witnesses, service of which must be personal, and the cases in which it shall be otherwise directed by the said Act, or any rule made under the authority thereof.

11th. The clerk shall keep the several books, and in the form in the schedule, and every entry in such books shall have a number prefixed, corresponding with the number of the summons to which it refers.

12th. The clerk shall also keep a separate book (for the purpose of being submitted to the judges of the Supreme Court,) in which shall be transferred and entered the causes which may be removed, or the cases which may be sent to the Supreme Court.

13th. The attachment against defendant to compel his appearance in court, to answer to the suit or action, shall be made returnable on such a day as the judge may order, and on the defendant being arrested under the writ of attachment, immediate notice shall be given to the plaintiff to appear, and on the appearance of the plaintiff, the cause shall be called on before the judge, and the appearance of the defendant being duly noted, the judge, at his discretion, may either then proceed with the cause, or adjourn the hearing to the day, when the writ of attachment shall be returnable; or to such other day as he shall direct; and if the plaintiff shall not appear when the defendant is brought before the court in custody, by virtue of the writ of attachment, the absence of the plaintiff and the appearance of the defendant shall be minuted, and the defendant be discharged from custody and directed to attend on the day of the return of the writ of attachment, and on failure of the defendant's attendance on the day mentioned, the hearing of the cause shall be proceeded with, notwithstanding the non-appearance of the defendant; and the judge may make such order as to costs of attachment as he may think just.

14th. The clerk shall grant a receipt or memorandum for every sum paid into court by the suitors as fees or commission, or on any account whatsoever, and no money shall be paid out of the court, unless on production of said receipt, or memorandum, or by order of a judge.

15th. When the defendant pays money into court, the sum shall be large enough to include all necessary costs in court up to that time, incurred by the plaintiff, together with the costs of notification to be given by the plaintiff of his acceptance of the money and the costs of taking the same out of court: the amount so paid shall be duly registered. A receipt or memorandum shall also be granted by the clerk to the party for the amount so paid in.

16th. If the plaintiff elect to accept, in full satisfaction of the debt or damages claimed, and costs, the sum that has been so paid into court, by the defendant, and shall notify the same to the clerk in writing, the action shall be discontinued, and the parties to the suit or action shall not be liable to any further costs, after such payment and satisfaction to the plaintiff as aforesaid. But if in default of plaintiff notifying to the clerk such acceptance as aforesaid, or otherwise, the suit or action proceed, and the plaintiff fail to prove that he is entitled to more than has been paid into court, and the defendant is put to fresh costs, the plaintiff shall be liable to pay to the defendant such costs as the defendant may incur after such payment.

17th. The causes settled by agreement of the parties must be reported to the clerk by the plaintiff, or his constituted agent, previous to the day of the return of summons, or to the judge at the time when the cause is first called in court, on the return day of the summons.

18th. When a defendant is desirous to set-off any debt or demand alleged to be due to him by the plaintiff, he must state the particulars of such set-off to the clerk one clear day before the return of summons, unless the court shall fix some other day for stating the same.

19th. When a defendant intends to rely on the special defence of infancy, coverture, the statute of limitations, or his discharge under the statute relating to insolvent debtors, he must be personally present in court on the day of appearance to the summons, and orally plead such defence before the judge, or if unable to attend, by reason of illness or other allowable cause of absence, he must state in writing such special defence to the clerk at the time of his appearance.

20th. No new trial or motion to alter the amount of a judgment shall be granted, unless a motion be made for a rule *nisi*, by the plaintiff, within four days after the judgment has been given, or by the defendant on a certificate of the deposit in court of the amount for which the judgment has been given, including the costs, if any, within the same period if he were present, or were represented at the hearing, or within the same period after he shall have obtained the said certificate, if the judgment were given *ex parte*.

21st. In every case where the defendant intends to move to reduce the amount of a judgment, or for a new trial, he must give notice at the time of making the deposit to the clerk, who shall then retain the same for five days, within which time the defendant must move the court for the rule *nisi*. On the granting the rule *nisi*, the money shall be detained in court till the rule has been made absolute, or till such other time as the court shall order. In the event of notice not being given to the clerk as aforesaid, or of the rule *nisi* being refused, the plaintiff may take the money out of court without further delay.

22nd. When any order is made for the payment of any debt or damages, costs or other sums of money by instalments, such instalments shall be payable at the office of the clerk, at such periods as the court shall order, and if no order be made fixing the dates of payment of the instalments, then the first instalment shall become due at the expiration of one calendar month from the day of making the order, and every successive instalment at like periods of one calendar month from the day of the previous instalment becoming due.

23rd. When any cattle, goods, and chattels taken as a distress for rent in arrear, or damage *faisant*, shall have been replevied, the party at whose instance such replevin shall have been made, shall enter his suit in the court held under the authority of Act IX. of 1850, and thereupon summons shall issue against the defendant according to the form annexed in the schedule; and such summons shall be served in such time and manner as hereinbefore directed.

24th. On entering a suit in replevin, the plaintiff must specify and describe, in a statement of particulars to be made in writing, the cattle and the several goods and chattels taken under the distress, and of the taking of which he complains.

25th. All actions of replevin in cases of distress for rent in arrear or damage *faisant* shall be tried in a summary way as other suits and actions in the court held under the authority of Act IX. of 1850, and the judgment therein, in ordinary cases, whether for plaintiff or defendant, shall be according to forms in the schedule, or to the like effect.

26th. Execution on a judgment is not to issue by or against any person not a party to such a suit or action, without summons upon the judgment, the proceedings in which shall be the same as in ordinary cases.

27th. When judgment has been given for or against a person deceased, his executors or administrators may, in the same manner, sue and be sued upon the judgment.

28th. The ordinary judgment against executors or administrators shall be to pay the debt or damages and costs, to be levied out of the goods of the deceased in their hands, and as to the costs, if there are no such goods then to be levied out of their own goods.

29th. If the sole defence by executor or administrators be, that they have fully administered, and the judgment of the court is for the defendants, it shall be, that the amount found to be due be paid and levied out of the future assets of the deceased, and the costs shall be in the discretion of the judge. If the executor or administrator have assets to satisfy part of the debt only, then he must admit assets to satisfy the demand to that amount, and say that he has none besides, and if that be so found, then the plaintiff shall have judgment for the assets on hand; and for future assets as to the residue, and the costs shall be in the discretion of the judge.

30th. When judgment has been given against executors or administrators, that the amount be levied from the future assets of the deceased when they shall come to hand, the plaintiff may at any time proceed by application for summons against them, suggesting that assets have come to their hand, and the court shall proceed (after due service of summons) and give judgment thereon, as in Rule 28, and if for the defendants, they shall be entitled to their costs.

31st. When the ordinary judgment has been given, that the debt, or damages, and costs be levied out of the testator's effects, then, if there be no assets to satisfy the judgment in the whole or in part, the plaintiff may apply to the judge for leave to levy the whole, and costs, out of the defendant's own goods, on a suggestion of misapplication of the assets, and the judge shall direct such notice to be given of the application as he thinks fit, and dispose of the motion in a summary way.

32nd. If the party, sued as executor or administrator or representative, have set up any vexatious and groundless defence, and the matter of the defence be adjudged against him, and the judge shall think the defence vexatious and groundless, he shall give judgment out of the assets, and if none, out of the party's own goods for the sum which it adjudges.

33rd. All costs shall be taxed by the clerk.

34th. No warrant of execution or commitment shall be executed after the expiration of one calendar month from the date thereof, provided that second and successive warrants of execution may be issued by order of the judge, at the expiration of one calendar month from the date of each, on payment of the prescribed costs of execution by the party suing out the same, provided always that no warrant of execution shall issue upon any judgment or order of this court after the expiration of three years from the date of such judgment or order, but the parties in such a case shall institute a suit or action *de novo* on such unsatisfied judgment or order.

35th. When any claim shall be made to, or in respect of, any goods or chattels, taken in execution under the process of the court holden under the authority of Act IX. of 1850, or in respect of the proceeds or value thereof, or by any person not being the party against whom such process has issued, and summonses have been issued on the application of the officer charged with the execution of such process, such summons shall be served in such time and manner as hereinbefore directed for summons to appear to a suit or action, and the claimant shall be deemed plaintiff and the execution creditor the defendant, and the claimant shall, on the day on which he may prefer such claim, deliver to the said officer, or leave at the office of the clerk, a particular of any goods or chattels alleged to be the property of the claimant, and on the day on which the said summons is returnable, state to the judge the grounds of his claim, and in case of a claim for rent, the claimant shall, on the day on which he may prefer his claim, deliver to the said officer, or leave at the office of the clerk, a particular of the amount, and for what period the rent was claimed to be due.

36th. The clerk shall have an office in, or attached to, the court-house.

37th. All matters and things required to be done by the clerk may also be done by his deputy or deputies.

38th. The office of the clerk shall be open daily, (except on Sundays and authorized holidays) and the office hours shall be from 10 o'clock in the forenoon until 4 in the afternoon. No money shall be paid out of court on Saturday nor before 1 p. m. of any other day, nor shall any be received on account of costs after 3 p. m.

39th. At every court, or at such times as the judge shall require, the bailiffs of the court shall deliver statements and returns pursuant to the form in the schedule, of what shall have been done since their last return, under every process of execution or commitment which they shall have been required to execute.

40th. One day before the day of the holding of the court, the bailiffs shall deliver to the clerk a list of all summonses to appear to suits or actions, which shall have been issued, and the clerk shall forthwith cause such lists to be put up in the court-house.

41st. Every bailiff required to execute any warrant of execution or commitment, if he shall not have executed such warrant, shall return the same to the clerk's office, at the expiration of one calendar month from the date thereof.

42nd. Every bailiff levying or receiving any money by virtue of any process issuing out of the court shall forthwith, or on the day after the receipt thereof, pay over the same to the clerk of the court.

43rd. No summons, notice, order, or any execution on a judgment, or any other process whatsoever, shall be served or executed on Sunday, Christmas-day, and Good Friday.

44th. With reference to Section XXIII. of the Act IX. of 1850, the court, under the authority of the Governor in Council, will not hold sittings on any of the holidays which are observed as such in the General Treasury, and no writ of attachment, referred to in the 13th Rule, shall be served on those days.

45th. No summons, notice, order, execution on a judgment, or any other process whatsoever, shall be served or executed on a person professing the Hindoo religion, during the four days of Doorga Poojah, viz., Saptami, Ashtami, Navami and Dushami.

46th. Provided that all such days mentioned in the three preceding rules shall be counted in the computation of the time required by Rule 34th, unless any such days shall be the last day of such time, in which case it shall be excluded from such computation.

47th. In case of proceedings not provided for by the forms in the schedule, the clerk shall issue the necessary process, using, where practicable, the forms prescribed in the schedule as guides in framing the same.

48th. No process of any kind shall be set aside for irregularity; it shall be amendable and amended, and the judge may, if he think it right so to do, make the party in error pay the costs of the application for and of the amendment.

49th. All parties shall be liable to appear in person before the court, but when any person shall appear, with leave of the court not in person, nor by any relative or servant of his or any member of his establishment, but by some person previously unconnected with him, such person shall not only be constituted in writing the agent for the party for the conduct of the case; but he subject to the jurisdiction of the court and to summary taxation of any sum claimed as remuneration.

50th. No correspondence relating to suits instituted in, or proceedings before the Court of Small Causes, can be attended to, and parties having business with the clerk, or in his office, shall transact the same in person or by an accredited agent.

51st. Whenever the singular number is used in these rules, or the schedule, in reference to persons or things, it shall be understood, when necessary to give full effect to the rule, to mean several persons or things, and whenever the plural number is so used, it shall mean also, when necessary, one person and thing, and every word importing the masculine gender shall, in like manner when necessary, be understood to include the feminine gender.

ADDITIONAL RULES.

52nd. When an Advocate or Attorney of the Supreme Court shall appear on behalf of any party or parties in the Court of Small Causes, the highest amount of fees allowed to counsel at the termination of the suit, and on taxation of costs, shall be two gold-mohurs, and to the attorney one gold-mohur, but no fees or costs shall be allowed unless the debt or damages claimed or value of the property in dispute shall be more than one hundred rupees, nor in any case unless the judge shall certify, that the case was a fit one for the employment of counsel and attorney or attorney alone.

53rd. Summonses shall in future be returnable on the fourteenth day, unless when plaintiff shall apply for a summons at a shorter date in terms of the 2nd Rule of the court.

54th. Every case, in which the plaintiff, or his agent, on applying for a summons, or the defendant or his agent, prior to the returnable date of the summons, certifies to the chief clerk that a point of law of any difficulty is involved, shall be set down for hearing before the first judge.

55th. Motions for new trials, and new trials, will be heard before two judges at least, of whom one will be the judge who tried the case originally, and the other the first judge. If the case were heard by the first judge, he will call for the assistance of one or both of the other judges.

56th. If the court is of opinion that a new trial should be granted, the plaintiff shall proceed to set his case down for re-hearing within four days, unless some other time be granted by the court, and in default the defendant shall be at liberty to withdraw his deposit.

57th. Should the rule for a new trial be made absolute, the order shall be made on such terms as to the payment of costs, as the court shall direct.

58th. If on the hearing of the second trial, the verdict is entered for the plaintiff, the judgment may be satisfied *pro tanto* out of the sum already deposited for debt and costs by defendant, with right of execution against the goods or person of the defendant for the amount payable by the defendant over and above the sum so deposited by him in court.

59th. If on the hearing of the second trial, the verdict is entered for the defendant, he shall be at liberty to withdraw his deposit.

ADDITIONAL RULE.

Actions for the Recovery of Immoveable Property.

60th. In all actions for the recovery of immoveable property brought against tenants, it shall be necessary to serve a notice in the form provided by the rules of this court, on each of the tenants in possession of the lands or premises claimed, service whereof shall be proved to the

satisfaction of the court, prior to the hearing of the cause, unless the court shall otherwise order; and the landlord shall, on his application at any time before final judgment, be let in to defend, and such order shall be made thereupon as to the amendment of the plaint or the adjournment of the cause, as the court shall think fit.

ACT, No. VII. OF 1847.

AN ACT TO REGULATE DISTRESSES FOR SMALL RENTS IN CALCUTTA.

I. It is hereby enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners of the Court of Commissioners for the recovery of small debts in and for the settlement of Fort William in Bengal to appoint four or more persons to be bailiffs and appraisers for the purposes of this Act, and to fix such remuneration for the services of the said officers as shall appear to the said commissioners expedient, and that such persons shall be duly sworn before the said commissioners, and shall also give security to be approved by the said commissioners, faithfully to discharge the duties of their office, and that the said commissioners shall have power to suspend or remove such persons so appointed, provided that it shall be lawful for the said commissioners to appoint the bailiffs who may be attached from time to time to the said court to the office of distraining bailiffs and appraisers for the purposes of this Act, and to award to the said officers such remuneration in addition to their respective salaries drawn from the said court as to the said commissioners shall appear expedient.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall be lawful for any commissioner of the said court, upon the affidavit in the form contained in the schedule to this Act annexed (marked D) of any party claiming to be entitled to arrears of rent of any house or premises situate in Calcutta not exceeding the amount of 100 Rupees, or in case of absence of such party from Calcutta, or in case of respectable females, who do not appear in public, upon the affidavit of the constituted attorney of such party, stating the amount of such arrears, and for what time and at what rate the same became due, to issue a warrant under his hand and seal in the form contained in the schedule to this Act annexed (marked A.) addressed to any one of such officers, directing him to levy the amount of such rent, together with the costs of the said distress, in the manner therein mentioned, provided that it shall be lawful for any of the said commissioners, upon personal examination of the party applying for such warrant, to grant or withhold the same at the discretion of the said commissioner.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that by virtue of such warrant, it shall be lawful for such officer to seize the whole or such part of the goods and chattels upon the said premises as shall be sufficient to cover the amount of the said rent, together with the costs of the said distress, and that he shall thereupon make an inventory of the goods and chattels so seized, and shall give a notice in writing in the form in the schedule to this Act annexed (marked B) to the party from whom such rent is claimed to be due, or to any other person upon behalf of such party upon the said premises, that the said goods and chattels will be appraised and sold in manner therein mentioned. And that the said officer shall file in the said court true copies of the said inventory and notice, provided that it shall be lawful for the party from whom such rent is claimed to be due, at any time within five days from such seizure, to apply to any commissioner of the said court to discharge or suspend such warrant, and it shall be lawful for such commissioner to discharge or suspend such warrant accordingly, with or without costs, provided always that it shall be lawful for any of the said commissioners in his discretion to give reasonable time to such party to pay the said rent.

IV. And it is hereby enacted, that in default of such application, it shall be lawful for any two of such officers, at the expiration of five days from such seizure, to appraise the goods and chattels so seized, and to give notice in writing in the form in the schedule to this Act annexed (marked E) of the sale thereof at such time and place as they shall direct, after an interval of not less than two days, and that they shall file in the said court a true copy of the said notice, and that the same shall be sold accordingly, and that the said officers shall forthwith, after realization of the produce of the said sale, pay over the amount thereof to the chief clerk of the said court, and the amount of such produce shall be applied in satisfaction of the sum claimed to be due, together with the costs of the said distress, and that the surplus, if any, shall be returned to the party from whom the said rent was claimed to be due, provided that it shall be lawful for such party to direct that such sale shall take place in any other manner, such party giving security for any extra costs attending such mode of sale.

V. And it is hereby enacted, that no costs shall be taken or demanded for such distress, except those contained in the schedule to this Act annexed (marked C.) and that it shall be lawful for the said commissioners to apply the sum so raised as costs towards the payment of the contingent charges and remuneration of the said bailiffs and appraisers as shall appear to the said commissioners expedient, and that the chief clerk of the said court shall keep a book in which all sums received as costs upon distresses made under the provisions of this Act, and all sums paid as remuneration to the said bailiffs and appraisers, and all contingent charges incurred in respect of such distresses, shall be duly entered, and that the chief clerk of the said court shall

also enter in the said book all sums realized by sale of the goods and chattels distrained and paid over to the landlords under the provisions of this Act.

VI. And it is hereby enacted, that after the passing of this Act, no distress shall be levied for arrears of rent amounting to Rupees 100, or less, except under the provisions of this Act, and that any person, except such officer as appointed, levying or attempting to levy any such distress, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be liable to be punished by fine and imprisonment for the same in addition to any other liability he may have incurred by such trespass.

VII. And it is hereby enacted, that this Act shall not extend to any arrears of rent exceeding 100 Rupees, nor in respect of any house or premises situate out of Calcutta, nor to any rent due to Government nor to any seizure, except on the premises in respect of which such rent is claimed.

The following are the arrangements under which the business of the Police Office is conducted:—

1st.—The entire Executive Police Force is under the control of the Chief Magistrate.

2nd.—The following line of roads, from the Circular Road to the Strand, has been laid down as the demarcation of the extent of the Jurisdiction of two Calcutta Magistrates, who have special authority in their respective Divisions :

Boitakhannah, Bow-Bazar, Lall-Bazar road to Tank Square North, down Clive Street in a Northerly direction, till Fairlie Place, down Old Fort Ghaut Street to the banks of the Hooghly.

3rd.—The Senior Magistrate, G. S. Fagan, has special authority in the portion of the Town lying South of the above line of roads, including those thoroughfares themselves ; and Roy, Kissorechand Mitter, the Northern portion.

4th.—The Senior Magistrate has cognizance of all cases occurring on the river, and all complaints by, and against, Seamen should be preferred before him.

5th.—Parties complaining of felonies, assaults, misdemeanors, &c., will prefer their charges before the Magistrates, in whose jurisdiction they reside.

6th.—The Chief Magistrate will, as heretofore, reserve to himself the option of adjudicating cases of importance wherever they may occur within the limits of the Town.

7th.—Where felonies have been committed, and the offenders not apprehended, information should be lodged with the Deputy Superintendent of the Division, or at the nearest Police Station, or both.

8th.—Police Office hours are from 11 o'clock A. M. to 5 P. M., or till business is finished.

9th.—The Lock-up House, Jails, and Fire Engines are especially under the superintendence and control of the Chief Magistrate ; but the Magistrates generally will, of course, lend their hearty aid in cases of serious fire, and in visiting the Jails for the purpose of bringing forward improvements or new regulations.

10th.—The regulation of religious and other processions is vested in the Chief Magistrate, under the provisions of Act XIII. of 1852.

11th.—All correspondence on general points, affecting the Police, or the Police Buildings, or the Establishments, pass through the Office of the Chief Magistrate.

12th.—Complaints against Police Officers may be preferred before the Division Magistrates and the Chief Magistrate ; the former punish, on conviction, for assault or misdemeanor, the latter for neglect of duty.

13th.—Inspectors of Divisions are not to be addressed in ordinary Police matters.

HOUSE ASSESSMENT.*

As much misconception prevails on the part of landlords and others in regard to the remission of the house tax for periods during which houses are unoccupied, and to the rules established for hearing appeals against the assessment, the Collector of Assessment deems it necessary to inform landlords, where any house, building, or ground, within the said Town, has been vacant for sixty consecutive days in any quarter of a year, the rates for that quarter shall be remitted, provided that the owner of such house, buildings, or land, shall have given notice in writing of the vacancy thereof to the Secretary of the Commissioners, within seven days next after the day on which it becomes vacant; and if such notice of vacancy be not given within the said seven days, the said rates shall be remitted from the day on which the notice may be delivered to the Secretary.

The bills for house tax being made out from books prepared by the assessors, and approved by the Justices at their quarter sessions, neither the Commissioners nor Collector have power to alter those bills in any respect; consequently, when parties are desirous of having their own names substituted for the names in which the bills are made out, or when the assessor's valuation of premises is objected to, they should apply to the Justices at their quarter sessions for the alteration of names or the abatement of assessment, as the case may be, and landlords are particularly required to take notice that any abatement in the assessment which may be allowed by the Justices in sessions has effect from and after the quarter immediately succeeding that in which the abatement was allowed, and not retrospectively.

The Quarter Sessions are holden by H. M. Justices of the Peace in February, May, August, and November in each year; at these sessions the assessors make such increase in the valuation of premises as they may deem proper, timely notice being served upon the owners or occupiers of the premises, the assessment whereof it is proposed to increase. Public notice is given in the Calcutta *Exchange Gazette*, of the holding of the quarter sessions and of the period allowed by the Justices for receiving appeals against the assessment. Appeals should be delivered to the Clerk to the Justices, and receipts obtained from him of their having been filed in his office. The assessors give notice to appellants of the day and hour appointed by the Justices to hear their appeals.—*Vide Sections 39, 40, 41 and 42, of Act X. of 1852.*

The house tax is payable quarterly, and recoverable, in cases of default, by distress of the goods and chattels of the owner or occupier, under the provisions of Act X. of 1852.

Calcutta, 1st June, 1842.

A tax of 6½, or one anna in the Rupee per cent. per annum, on the rent, is levied quarterly by the Collector of Assessment on all dwelling houses or tenements in Calcutta.

The rent of houses occupied by the proprietors is estimated at the rent similar houses of the neighbourhood are let.

No tax is levied on empty houses, if the same be duly reported to the Collector within seven days of being vacated.—*Vide Section 37, Act X. of 1852.*

Public religious edifices are exempt from the payment of tax.

The assessment on all premises is taken on the rents already known. When rents fall, or the value decreases from any cause, parties may petition the Justices of the Peace, through the Clerk to the Justices in Session, when, after examination, their cases will be taken into consideration. In assessing new premises, the assessor will serve on the proprietor a notice, specifying the rate

* The collection of the house assessment is now transferred to the Municipal Commissioners, but is subject to the same rules as prevailed when it was under the Justices.

at which the tax will be levied ; should this appear to the owner excessive, he can, as in the above case, send to the Clerk of the Peace a petition stating his objections when his case will be brought forward and heard. Should no objection be made, the rate named by the assessor will be fixed. Sessions are held quarterly for hearing all objections as to rent, and any alteration made in session, whether of increase or decrease, will take place from the commencement of the next quarter, and will not have any retrospective effect, nor will the alteration break in upon a quarter.

When the property is occupied by huts, built by the tenants, besides the real amount of ground rent received by the proprietor, a valuation on the huts is also made, and the owner is assessed for both the ground rent and the value of the huts : he on his part may levy the tax, or the difference between the ground rent and the valuation, from his tenants. — *Vide Section 35, Act X. of 1852.*

On the sale or purchase of property, the purchaser should see that all balances are adjusted and proprietors should be careful to notify to the assessors that such change has taken place, the assessor on being satisfied of the correctness of such information will, during the next session, insert the name of the new proprietor in the assessment book; after which the bills will be issued in the name of the purchaser.

If any part of premises be occupied, *the whole* is considered as occupied. The owner can have the separate parts assessed separately by application to the Justices.

The tax is collected quarterly, and in case of refusal or evasion of payment, the Collector may levy the same by distress of property of the occupier or proprietor. — *Vide Sections 44, 47, 48, 49, 50, 51, 52, 54 and 55.* Parties often think it sufficient to intimate a fall in their rental to the collector, but this is of no avail, for the notice of occupation in which it is generally inserted, is obliged to be kept in his office, whilst the notice of reduction should be made to the Clerk to H. M.'s Justices in Sessions, if with the view to having it rated accordingly.

The first stone of St. John's Church was laid on Tuesday, the 6th April 1784. On a plate of copper, engraved on the stone, is the following inscription:—

"The first stone of this Sacred Building, raised by the liberal and voluntary subscriptions of British subjects and others, was laid under the auspices of the Hon'ble Warren Hastings, Governor General of India, on the 6th day of April 1784, and in the 18th year of his Government."

The total amount for building the Church was Rs. Rupees 1,84,836-14-11. The Architect was Lieutenant James Argg, of the Engineer Corps. On the 24th June 1787, the Church was consecrated and dedicated to St. John. St. John Zoffany, the celebrated Artist, bestowed the Altar

Piece representing "The Last Supper." In September 1787, the Vestry received from England a Chalice, two Cups, and two Salvers, weighing in all 287 ozs. 3 dwts. These articles are silver-gilt.

The following memorandum of the particulars, &c., regarding the Church, may be novel :—

The number of bricks expended in the erection of the Church was 15,50,000. There is in the foundation of the Church 27,460 feet of solid masonry. The floor of the Church forms a square of 70 feet, and the superficial contents of the roof are 10,700 square feet. The erection of the Spire from the level of the roof cost 15,000 Rupees. Lieutenant Agg's reward was 15 per cent on the whole expense.—*Rushton's Guide.*

The Architect was Mr. Martin Bentent de Mayell, a Dane. In 1793, the Church was much enlarged, and Mr. Kiernander, on the 29th December, was able to open the new Chancel, when he administered the Sacrament.

Extract from the Proceedings of the Right Honorable the Governor-General in Council, under date the 20th August 1812.

BURIALS.

With respect to the rates of fees for the ritual service, it has been thought proper to continue to charge the same sums which have heretofore been received on account of funeral fees, with some modifications, calculated to relieve the lower classes of the community, upon whom the fees formerly charged might be thought to press too heavily. With these views the following rates have been established, which, it is hoped, will afford relief to the public, without materially affecting the just rights of the Chaplains, viz.

Nos. 1 to 5 have been altered by Government Notification, dated 15th September 1853.

6th.—A tomb-stone perpendicular to the ground, not to be considered, as a monument, nor if laid on the grave it does not exceed two feet in width.

- 7th.—A monument, when the ground occupied is equal to the grave or not exceeding 10 feet in length and six in breadth Rs. 50
 8th.—A ditto, ground double the grave 100
 9th.—A ditto, ditto treble the grave 150
 10th.—The dimensions of a monument are not to exceed the above-mentioned sizes, without the special sanction of the Select Vestry, whose duty it should be to limit the spaces occupied in the Burying Ground.

DISSENTERS' BURIAL.

The following is an Extract from an official Communication to the Military Board, dated the 28th September 1848.

"It should be distinctly understood, that it is not optional with the Clergyman to give or withhold the key of the Burial Ground, which must be opened whenever it is required for purposes of interment by Europeans or Christians, of whatever sect, or denomination.

The Lord Bishop has also been informed, that in respect to ground which has been consecrated by him, or ground which may be set apart hereafter at a station, for the purpose of burial, it is desirable that a sufficient portion should be reserved for the use of Dissenters."

The Honorable the Governor-General of India in Council is pleased to notify, that in future no fees whatever shall be required from the Military Garrison, or from the families of military persons, by the Honorable Company's Chaplains, in the Provinces of Bengal and Agra, for the performance of sacred offices.

RULES AND REGULATIONS.

Abstract of Rules and Regulations relating to Leaves of Absence, Furlough, &c. to Chaplains, dated 29th December 1825.

1. Application for leave of absence to be made to Government through the Lord Bishop, or in his absence through the Archdeacon or Commissaries.
2. Applications for leave of absence for sickness, to be accompanied with certificate in duplicate of the medical officer of the station, countersigned by the senior medical officer, if more than one, of state of health.
3. When extension of leave of absence is required, a certificate of state of health of the senior surgeon of the station to be furnished.
4. Should the individual proceed to any other station without coming to Calcutta, certificate of state of health of the senior surgeon of such station to be sent. If he come to Calcutta, a similar certificate of the surgeon attending upon him, countersigned by the superintending surgeon of the presidency, or one of the members of the Medical Board.
- 5, 6 and 7 cancelled.
8. Chaplains who proceed to Europe without having returned to India, considered as on furlough from date of leaving India, and their allowances to cease from such date.
9. Officiating senior or junior presidency chaplain, entitled to all fees on performance of duties of such office, during absence of principal.
10. When voyage to sea, Cape of Good Hope, St. Helena, or any place within the Company's limits, necessary for health, certificate to that effect of surgeon in attendance, countersigned by a member of the Medical Board, to accompany application for leave. Application for leave to the presidency to be made first.
11. Certificate of pilot, of date of his quitting the vessel, to accompany intimation of final departure, to be forwarded addressed to civil auditor.
12. If no pilot on board, leave to commence from date of Government order granting the same.
13. Application on account of sickness, to be further accompanied by medical certificate.
14. The place to which desirous of proceeding to be specified in application for leave; general terms "to make a sea voyage" inadmissible.
15. If return to the presidency be delayed beyond term of leave, by uncontrollable circumstances, certificate of the fact by the chief officer at the place of detention to accompany application for further leave.
16. A chaplain on obtaining leave of absence to sea, to apply to Secretary in General Department for order to the commander of a vessel to be received on board (with family if any) as passenger, and to obtain certificates from Civil Auditor and Accountant General of no claim of Government against him.
17. If sickness prevent return to the presidency within leave of absence, application for extension of leave to be made, accompanied by a certificate of the chief medical officer of the place, stating necessity of extension of leave.
18. Similar course to be pursued on every subsequent application for renewal of leave for sickness.
19. If period of leave beyond the limits of presidency originally granted insufficient, sufficient reason to be assigned for its extension.
20. Period of absence from Bengal Presidency, not included in term of service, which entitled to retirement on pay of military rank.
21. On leave of absence for sickness to eastward of the Cape of Good Hope, to the Cape, or St. Helena, full allowance drawn for the certified time and not later, but not to be disbursed after embarkation or until return.
22. The above applicable only in cases of return to India after absence for sickness or private affairs, or in case of death (to be certified by the chief officer of the place,) previous to permission to proceed to Europe. If after leaving India on leave, and proceed to Europe without returning to India, then to be considered on furlough from time of departure from India, allowances to cease from such date of departure.
23. Chaplains returning to England on furlough, or retiring from the service, to be furnished with a certificate from the Secretary in the General Department of permission and of length of service.
24. In case of sickness, a certificate of state of health and necessity of proceeding to Europe by surgeon in attendance, countersigned by a member of the Medical Board, to accompany application for leave to Europe on furlough.
25. Statement of service or specifying period of actual residency in India, time of absence on furlough on former occasion, and intention of returning or otherwise, to be compared and certified by Civil Auditor, to accompany applications to Secretary in the General Department for furlough.

26. Furlough to Europe limited to three years from leaving India, on full pay of major, (15 shillings per day) after seven years' service. If granted for sickness period to completion of that period of service, then on full pay of captain (10 shillings per day.)
27. Advance of six months' pay of major or captain issuable in India, regulated according to period of actual service.
28. On arrival in England on furlough, report of same to be made to Secretary to Court of Directors, accompanied by certificate received in India.
29. Extension of furlough not granted in England, except in case of sickness or other necessary cause, to be proved to Court of Directors.
30. On expiration of extension of furlough, application to be made to return to duty, or reside further time in Europe.
31. Under 53, Geo. 3, Cap. 15, Sec. 84, an officer under lieutenant-colonel eligible to return to the service after five years' absence, or under 33, Geo. 3, Cap. 52, Sec. 70, who fails to receive extension of furlough.
32. Pay in England commences from last pay in India, and continues for 2 years and 6 months only from quitting India, although furlough extended, but on return to India, six months' pay advanced on application to Auditor of India Accounts.
33. If three years from quitting India extended, pay to cease after prescribed period.
34. On return to India, allowances re-commence from date of arrival in Bengal.
35. On returning to India from furlough, certificate and shipping order to be obtained from Secretary, India House, to be laid before Government on arrival in Bengal.
36. In payment of allowances, time of previous and every subsequent furlough to be reckoned.
37. In case of death on furlough, estate of deceased entitled to pay up to death, to be certified by minister or Church wardens, or chief magistrate of nearest town, borough corporate.
38. Certificate of unavoidable detention on homeward voyage, or in England, to be obtained from Auditor of India Accounts, as grounds of exception to general rules, if so admitted by Court of Directors.
39. Pay in England issues in England half-yearly at Midsummer and Christmas, on presenting bill to Auditor of India Accounts.
40. At time of payment, principal or his attorney to appear at the office of Auditor in England. Attorney to produce certificate of minister, church wardens, or chief magistrate of nearest town or borough corporate, of principal being alive.
41. Pay certificate from Auditor of India Accounts, of date up to which payment made in England, to be obtained.
42. In commutating service, which entitles to retirement, absence on sickness or under leave to Cape of Good Hope, or other place, to be included, but no absence on other accounts.
43. On quitting presidency with intention of retiring, certificate from Secretary in General Department, of permission to proceed to Europe with option of retiring, and of length of service, to be obtained.
44. Intention of retiring to be signified to Court of Directors within twelve months' arrival in England.
45. Vacancy by retirement reckoned from date pilot leaves vessel on which individual embarked for Europe.
46. Chaplains after 18 years' service, including 3 years for one furlough, entitled to retire on pay of lieutenant-colonel, viz. £365 per annum. If sickness compel quitting the country, after 10 years' service, then entitled to retire on half-pay of lieutenant-colonel, viz. £200-15 per annum; and if quit the country from same cause, after 7 years' service, then entitled to retire on half-pay of major, viz. £173-7-6 per annum.
47. Retirement from service when no intention signified, to be computed from expiration of 3 years from quitting India, unless furlough extended, then from expiration of such extension; or otherwise from date when application to retire laid before the Court, which ever shall first happen.
48. In cases of retirement, testimonials from the Lord Bishop, as to conduct, to be transmitted to Court of Directors through Government.

Abstract of Rules and Regulations relating to Leave of Absence, &c. to Chaplains, passed by the Government, 31st March 1831.

1. Any chaplain absent from his station without leave to forfeit the whole of his allowance for the period of unauthorized absence, unless specially permitted by Government. Any such leave to be held absent without permission for the time of such absence, when leaving his station, whether with or without orders, to report same to the Civil Auditor.

3. Any chaplain removed from his station to another, to report to the Civil Auditor the dates of departure from the one and of arrival at the other. Civil Auditor restricted from passing the bill of any chaplain appointed to a new station, for the allowances belonging to such station, until he receives a report of his arrival at the place of his appointment.
4. Leave of absence to any place on the continent of India, not to exceed six months, but extended by Government on cause being shown.
5. Any chaplain desiring to visit the presidency, with the intention of proceeding to sea, to specify in application the period of leave necessary for the first purpose, on expiration of which, renewed leave given, for periods not exceeding one month, until he finally avails himself of further permission to quit the presidency, when the vessel on which he embarks to be reported.
6. Any chaplain arriving at the presidency, to report his arrival to the Secretary to Government in the General Department, and to the chief Ecclesiastical authority at the presidency.
7. Any chaplain returning to the presidency from a sea voyage, to rejoin his station, within the prescribed time for travelling to such station, unless the contrary be specially sanctioned by Government.
8. One day allowed for every ten miles of distance, as recorded in the office of the Quarter Master General, a week being given over and above this allowance for preparation for the journey. If a longer period necessary, application to be made to Government for further time, or leave of absence for the excess.
9. The 5th, 6th and 21st Rules of the Ecclesiastical Resolution, dated the 29th December 1825, are hereby rescinded.
10. Chaplains absent from station without leave, whether on account of sickness or private affairs, for a period exceeding one month in the year, not subject to any deduction from their allowances.
11. Chaplains absent from station, on account of private affairs, for a continuous period, exceeding one month in the year, to forfeit one-third of their allowances during the whole time of their absence.
12. Chaplains absent from station on certificates of ill health, for a continuous period, exceeding one month in the year, to forfeit one-sixth of their allowances during time of absence. Chaplains proceeding to sea, or beyond the limits of the presidency, on certificate of ill health, for a continuous period exceeding one month in the year, to forfeit one-eighth of allowances for one year, and one-sixth for the next six months of absence.
13. Chaplains absent from station beyond limits of the presidency, on account of sickness or private affairs, for a period exceeding eighteen months, to forfeit their appointment, and receive only an allowance of 244 rupees per mensem until a new appointment.
14. These rules not applied to absent chaplains, whose leave granted previous to the date of them, and not intended to supersede the existing arrangement under which the Bishop is authorized to grant leave of absence from station, without the previous sanction of Government, a power which the Archdeacon may also exercise, during the Lord Bishop's absence from the presidency.

Extract from a letter from the Secretary to Government to the Archdeacon, Calcutta, dated 19th July 1831.

Determined, that the extra allowance at the rate of 360 rupees per mensem, drawn by the chaplains for visiting out-stations, be discontinued, and that instead, a travelling allowance be drawn, according to the rates fixed at the General Post Office, as in cases in which travelling allowances are granted to civil servants, the bills for which allowance to be submitted with the certificate of chief civil or military authority, and through the channel, countersigned by the Archdeacon, through whom they are to be forwarded to the Civil Auditor, and to be returned by the latter, direct to the respective chaplains prescribed in the 5th and 6th paragraphs of the orders of Government, dated the 10th March 1829.

Ecclesiastical Department, the 18th December 1832.

The Hon'ble the Vice-President in Council is pleased to resolve, in supersession of the rule passed under date the 19th July 1831, permitting chaplains to draw a travelling allowance according to the rates fixed at the General Post Office for visiting out-stations, that hereafter an extra allowance, not to exceed 300 Rupees per mensem, shall be paid to the district chaplains of the Bengal presidency upon periodical visitations, when these have been duly authorized, and that it shall be calculated at the rate of one day's allowance for every ten miles, allowing for a

halt on the Sabbath; provided, however, that the allowance drawn on this account shall in no case exceed 200 Rupees per mensem. The bills for this allowance are to be authenticated by a copy of the order or authority under which the visit has been made, and by a declaration on the part of the chaplain, that the journey has been performed, without which documents the Civil Auditor is prohibited from passing the charges.

OUR GOVERNOR GENERAL OF INDIA IN COUNCIL.

PARA. 1.—Having considered the position of Members of our Ecclesiastical Establishments in connexion with the Rules which we have lately laid down for the grant of Furlough and Leave of Absence to our Civil and Military, we have determined that Chaplains and Assistant Chaplains shall be entitled to take Furlough on Private Affairs and on Medical Certificate on the same terms and conditions as Military Officers, with the following modifications :—

1st.—Chaplains being allowed to retire after twenty years' service, the period of Furlough (Private Affairs) must in their case be limited to the present term of three years. The Furlough may, however, either be taken in one period, or be divided into two periods, whether of eighteen months each, or of two years and one year respectively, and, if divided, the first Furlough may be taken, as at present, after seven years' residence, and the second Furlough after a further residence of ten years in India. As respects Chaplains and Assistant Chaplains appointed before the 11th January 1854, when the period of service was only eighteen years, their second Furlough, if they should exercise the option of taking Furlough in two periods, will be available after a second residence in India for a term of eight years.

2nd.—No Furlough or Leave of Absence, whether on Private Affairs or on Sick Certificate, taken in Europe, or elsewhere out of India, in excess of three years, will be allowed to count as service in India, in the twenty years which qualifies Chaplains for their Retiring Pensions.

2. The Furlough Pay of Chaplains will remain as at present. With regard to their allowance during Sick Leave to any place out of India, we have resolved that, in accordance with the principle adopted for Military Officers, they shall receive salary, (but at a rate not exceeding £600 per annum) for the first six months of absence, and for the remaining twelve months, an allowance equal to the Furlough pay of their standing. If the leave be extended, an allowance equal to Furlough pay may be drawn for a further period of eighteen months.

3. You will communicate this Despatch to the Governments of the Subordinate Presidencies.

The congregation assembling in this Church was formed in 1843, after the disruption of the Church of Scotland. It met, for the first time, in the Free Mason's Hall, on Sunday, the 13th August 1843, on which occasion the Reverend Dr. Duff conducted divine service.

The foundation stone of the new Church was laid on the 18th August 1844, and the building was opened for public worship on the 13th August 1848.

The late Reverend John Macdonald acted as interim Pastor till January 1847, when the Reverend J. Mackneil was admitted to the charge. In consequence of sickness, Mr. Mackneil resigned the office and proceeded to Europe in May 1852. The present pastor, the Reverend John Milne, arrived in the country on the 29th May 1853, and was duly inducted to the ministerial and pastoral charge on Sunday, the 12th June 1853, by the Reverend David Ewart.

A SHORT ACCOUNT OR HISTORY OF THIS CHAPEL.

This place of worship was opened for divine worship in June 1821. The form of worship is that adopted by the Independants, and its form of Church government is Independant. It is the property of the London Missionary Society, and the Minister must be a Missionary of that Society, approved by the Church and by the Mission families, though the form of Church government is Independant.

Evangelical denominations are admissible to the Lord's Supper: as its name imports, it is a Union Church. The first pastor was the Reverend J. Hill, who held that office for fourteen years. To him succeeded the Revd. R. C. Mather, A. M.; who held the office of pastor for a few months previous to the arrival of the present pastor, the Revd. T. Boaz, in January 1834. The management of the affairs of the Chapel are in the hands of the Deacons and Managers; the former attend to the spiritual, the latter to the temporal affairs of the Church and congregation. The Church, as intimated above, consists of Christians of different denominations who agree in the main points of the Christian Faith.

The Chapel is built in a plain Grecian style; the interior is commodious and elegant. The Bishop said of it, that in his time, it was one of the simplest and chastest buildings he had seen in India. It was erected and is supported by voluntary contributions, and always maintained the character of a Missionary Church.

The days of Abstinence from Flesh-meat are all the Fridays in the year. When Christmas Day falls on a Friday, there is no abstinence from meat on that day.

Regulations upon Abstinence sanctioned by the Holy See for the Vicariate Apostolic of Western Bengal for three years, beginning on the 1st of May 1853.

1. Whenssoever two immediately successive days of Abstinence shall occur, the faithful are permitted to make use of Flesh-meat for dinner on the second day, except when the second day of Abstinence shall fall on a Friday. In this latter case, the faithful are permitted to use Flesh-meat for dinner on the preceding Thursday, and abstinence is to be observed on the succeeding Friday.
2. On days of Fasting and Abstinence, the faithful are permitted to make use of Fish, in the dressing of which oil, butter or lard have been employed.
3. Catholic Soldiers in this Vicariate are wholly exempted from the obligation of Abstinence.
4. It is permitted to any of the faithful of this Vicariate, whilst journeying by sea, to make use of Flesh-meat on the days of Fasting and Abstinence, and the same privilege is also granted to any of the faithful, whilst journeying by land in this Vicariate.

When the subscription closed, all deficiencies were made up by the Barretto family.

On the establishment of Calcutta in 1689, the Armenians were invited by Job Charnock, the then Governor, to reside in Calcutta; subsequently, Kenanentch Phanoos was permitted to purchase the ground on which the Church now stands, and which was used as their burying ground until the year 1724, when the present Church was built by Aga Nazar out of his own private resources - the steeple was added by the Huzoor Mull family in 1734. The architect was Savond, an Armenian from Persia. In 1763 it was enlarged, and the two Altars on the right and left of the middle one were added by a wealthy Armenian named Arratoon Petrus. In 1790, Catchick Arakiel erected the wall surrounding the Church and the Parochial building, who also presented the Clock which is in use to this day.

The Church is called *St. Nazareth's*, in honor of the founder. Previous to its erection, the Armenian community performed Divine Service in a temporary Chapel about a hundred yards to the South of the present Church.

By the sanction of the Patriarch of Constantinople, Alexios Argree brought a minister from Alexandria, and under the auspices of the munificent Hastings, purchased, with the assistance of

the Greeks, a small house in the alley contiguous to, and in the rear of the steeple of the Portuguese Church of the Virgin Mary of Rosary, where Divine Service was performed.

The foundation of the present Greek Church was laid in June 1780. It was consecrated on the 6th of August 1781, and dedicated to the transfiguration on Mount Tabor. The purchase of the ground and erection of the building cost 30,000 Rupees, which amount was principally raised from voluntary contributions.

The Greek Church is, in fact, a Sacellum: in it is a Sanctorum. The Thuribula and Chandeliers are of silver, and made after the Jewish fashion.

The Greek Society at Calcutta is called among the brethren '*The Orthodox Brotherhood of the Greeks in Calcutta.*'

The Greeks declare the Crown of England the Protector of their Temple. Their ministers are sent to India by permission of the Patriarch of Constantinople from whatever part of Greece the congregation are desirous to have them.

GOVERNMENT AGENCY.

Fort William, Financial Department, the 29th April, 1848.

1. In compliance with instructions received from the Hon'ble the Court of Directors, the Right Hon'ble the Governor General in Council is pleased to direct that the following Regulations for conducting the Government Agency business at the several Presidencies, be published for general information.

2. The Governor General in Council has been pleased to authorize the Government Agent at Fort William and the Accountants General and the Sub-Treasurers at Fort St. George and at Bombay for the time being to act under the responsibility of the Hon'ble East India Company, as Agents for the purposes hereinafter mentioned of the public Creditors of Government whether residing in Europe or elsewhere. The Government Agent at Fort William is also authorized to act as Agent for the purposes hereinafter mentioned to absent Proprietors of Shares in the Capital Stock of the Bank of Bengal, and the Accountants General and the Sub-Treasurers at Fort St. George and at Bombay are also authorized to act as Agents for similar purposes to absent Proprietors of Shares in the Capital Stock respectively of the Bank of Madras and of the Bank of Bombay.

3. The Officers abovementioned are authorized to receive charge of and to grant receipts in duplicate for any Obligations or Loan Acknowledgments of the Government of India, or for Certificates of Shares in the abovementioned Banks at their respective Presidencies which the Proprietor may wish to deposit with them, and the Accountant General and the Sub-Treasurer at Fort St. George are also authorized on the application of the Proprietor to receive charge of and to grant receipts in duplicate for Promissory notes of the Government of Fort St. George issued on account of the Tanjore Debt. No Note or Certificate is to be received in deposit which shall not appear to be made out in the name of or be regularly endorsed to the person depositing it or on whose account the deposit may be made. Persons desiring to deposit their Government Securities or Bank Share Certificates shall make their applications to the Government Agent at Fort William, or to the Accountant General and Sub-Treasurer at Fort St. George or at Bombay in the Form hereunto subjoined No. 1, and the receipts of those Officers will be given in the form No. 2.

4. The Officers abovementioned will receive the interest on any Government Paper, or the dividend on any Bank Share Certificates which may be deposited with them, and will according to the instructions of the proprietors either remit the amount of such interest to England in Bills to be drawn on the Hon'ble Court of Directors, if the interest shall be payable in such Bills by the terms of the Loan, or they will pay the amount of such interest or dividend at the Presidency, to any person nominated by the Proprietor to receive such payment. The Government Agent at Fort William will also, according to the instructions of the Proprietor, remit the amount of interest on such Government Paper as may be deposited with him to the Presiden-

cies of Fort St. George or Bombay by Drafts on the Public Treasuries of those Presidencies or to any of the Stations subordinate to the Presidency of Fort William by Drafts on the Collectors or on the Residents at Delhi or Lucknow according to the rates of exchange at which Government may draw at the time. The Accountant General and the Sub-Treasurer at Fort St. George will also, according to the instructions of the Proprietor, remit the amount of interest or dividend on such Government Paper or Bank Share Certificates as may be deposited with them to any of the Stations subordinate to the Presidency of Fort St. George by Drafts on the Collectors, Commissioners or Residents according to the rates of exchange at which Government may draw at the time. The Accountant General and the Sub-Treasurer at Bombay will also, according to the instructions of the Proprietor, remit the amount of interest on such Government Paper as may be deposited with them by Drafts drawn upon any of the Civil Treasuries subordinate to the Presidency of Bombay according to the rates of exchange at which Government may draw at the time. The instructions as to the manner in which the interest or dividend is to be paid, must be made out according to the Forms hereunto subjoined, Nos. 3, 4 and 5, which are adapted to the several cases above specified, and the Power of Attorney for drawing the dividends on Bank Share Certificates must be made out according to form No. 6. The Proprietor will be at liberty to substitute one of these modes of receiving the interest or dividend for the other as often as he shall think fit, provided that the fresh instructions be furnished one month before the day on which the interest may fall due. Persons having more Promissory Notes or Bank Share Certificates than one in deposit may give separate instructions regarding the interest on each Note, or the dividend on each Certificate, but the whole of the interest or dividend on each Note or Certificate must be received in the same manner and at the same time.

5. When the Principal of any Government Paper so deposited shall become payable, the abovementioned Officers will, according to the instructions of the Proprietor, either pay the amount with interest due upon it to such person as may be appointed to receive the payment or they will re-invest it in any other Loan to which it may be subscribable at the time, or in the purchase of other Obligations or Loan Acknowledgments of the Government of India, or of Shares in the Capital Stock of the Banks abovementioned at their respective Presidencies in the market at the current price of the day. The Accountant General and the Sub-Treasurer at Fort St. George will also, according to the instructions of the Proprietor, re-invest the amount in the purchase of Promissory Notes granted by the Government of Fort St. George on account of the Tanjore Debt. The instructions for these purposes must be made out according to the Forms hereunto subjoined Nos. 7, 8 and 9, which are adapted to the several cases above specified. The Proprietor may at any time substitute one of these modes of disposing of the Principal for the other provided that the fresh instructions be furnished one month before the day on which the principal falls due. Persons having more Notes than one in deposit may give separate instructions regarding each Note, but the whole amount of each Note must be disposed of in the same manner and at the same time.

6. If any Loan be opened by the Government into which the Paper deposited may be receivable, the Officers abovementioned are authorized to subscribe the Paper so deposited to such Loan upon receiving the instructions of the Proprietors for that purpose although the Notes may not be in course of payment: instructions for this purpose must be made out according to the Form No. 10.

7. The Officers abovementioned are authorized to receive remittances in Government Bills only from individuals desiring to purchase the Public Securities or Bank Shares for deposit with them, provided such Bills shall be payable at the General Treasury, or Presidency Pay Office at Fort William if remitted to the Government Agent at Fort William, and at the General Treasuries or Government Agent's Offices at Fort St. George and Bombay if remitted to the Accountants General and the Sub-Treasurers at those Presidencies. The Officers abovementioned are authorized to invest the amount of such remittances according to the instructions of the Proprietor either by subscribing the amount to any Loan which may be open for the receipt of cash or by purchase in the market at the current price of the day. Instructions for the purpose shall be made out according to the Forms hereunto subjoined Nos. 11 and 12.

8. The Officers abovementioned are further authorized to invest the amount of interest for dividends due on Paper deposited with them in either of the modes mentioned in the last Clause, upon receiving the Proprietor's instructions for that purpose: such instructions must be made out in the Form hereunto subjoined No. 13.

9. The same Officers are further authorized at any time on receiving proper authority and instructions from the Proprietor for that purpose to endorse any one or more Promissory Notes or Bank Share Certificates deposited with them as Attorneys of the Owner to such person as he shall direct, or to sell the same on the Owner's account at the current price of the day, and to pay over the proceeds in cash at the General Treasury to such person as the Proprietor may appoint to receive the same, provided that the whole amount of each Note or Bank Share sold shall be payable in one sum and to the same person. They are also authorized on receiving proper

CUSTOM HOUSE REGULATIONS.

(*Corrected from Campbell's Custom House Vade Mecum.*)

REGULATION IX. OF 1810.

Manifests to be entered at the Custom House and sworn to, as soon as the vessels arrive off town.

Registers, cockets, and other credentials to be produced.

• Crew lists to be entered and sworn to of all persons who have been on board during the voyage.

No goods to be passed until the above forms have been duly observed.

Every boat-load and each single package, to be accompanied by boat-note.

The manifest must be full and true as to all goods and packages imported under penalties, including refusal of port clearance.

No claim for remission of duty on goods, stated to be damaged or unmerchantable, shall be admitted, unless so found at the Custom House;—when, after previous advertisement in the Government Gazette, they must be sold on the wharf and pay duty on gross amount sales.

Rules for wharfage and godown-rent may be learnt on personal application to the Wharf Comptroller.

No arms nor military stores to be imported without the special sanction of Government.

No claim for drawback shall be admitted, unless the goods have been regularly passed, and duly entered in sworn export manifest; nor in any case for goods shipped, after the issue of port clearance.

No Pilot shall allow any goods to be taken on board a vessel which has obtained her port clearance, without seeing a certificate from the Custom House, which document is to be signed by the Pilot and returned to the Collector.

The Pilot shall detain the vessel for further orders from the Master Attendant, if any goods, without such certificate, should be taken on board by the commanding officer, and such goods are to be detained by the Pilot, and shall be liable to confiscation, when the Pilot will obtain his proper share of reward. Moreover, goods seized, in the attempt to ship them clandestinely, shall be liable to confiscation.

All goods transhipped in port are liable to the prescribed duty for importation, and if the transaction be regular, may claim drawback. But goods which are transhipped, without due permission first obtained, or shipped, or attempted to be shipped, on any other vessel than that for which they may have been passed at the Custom House, or without pass, shall be liable to confiscation.

No arms, ammunition, nor military stores, shall be shipped without the special sanction of Government.

To protect from imposition such persons as are strangers in Calcutta, and who employ natives to transact business for them at this office, it is notified that for every sum taken, as government custom or duty, a receipted bill is given under the signature of the Collector, or of his deputy, or his covenanted assistant.

Clearances, whether inward or outward, can be given only in regular turn, and it is for commanders or others on their part, to see that their applications be duly noted, with the date and hour of receipt by the Supervisor respectively. Applications for outward clearance, (or export manifests cannot be received, unless that such applications be presented, at least three complete days previously to the date on which port clearance is desired, in order that time may be allowed for the adjudgment of export cargoes, though it will be issued earlier, if practicable.

No fees are taken for any affidavits sworn in this office, on subjects of Custom House business, nor are any fees whatever allowed to be taken by any person belonging to this establishment, whether sitting within the office, or stationed out of doors.

Importers of gunpowder are requested to refer to the notification, by order of the Board of Customs, dated the 18th and published in the Government Gazette of 23d January, 1823.

The proprietors of dock-yards, and the public at large, are requested to take notice, that no goods nor packages are allowed to be imported, exported, re-landed, re-shipped, transhipped, or removed from vessels to sloops or boats, after shipment, without due sanction from this office; whether the same be liable to, or exempt from duty. Attention is directed to clause seventh, section 45, to sections 61, 64, 74, 82, 83 and 84, of regulation IX. of 1810 and to section 8 of regulation III. of 1830, also to clauses 4 and 5 of Government Notification of the 28th June, 1822, for conditions of certain exemptions.

A. D. 1833, REGULATION VI.

A REGULATION for rescinding part of Regulation XV. of 1829, and for enacting other rules in the case of goods imported by sea. Passed by the Governor-General in Council on the 3d June, 1833, corresponding with the 22d Jeyte, 1240, Bengal Era; the 1st Assar, 1510, Fushy; the 23d Jeyte, 1240, Willaity, the 1st Assar, 1890, Sumbat; and the 13th Moherren, 1249, Hijree.

Whereas so much of the rule contained in clause 2, section 3, Regulation XV. of 1829, as provides, that in cases where goods are taken by the officers of the customs on account of Government, under circumstances of a presumed under-valuation, an allowance of ten per cent. in addition to the declared value, shall be paid to the importer, has been found in its operation prejudicial to the revenue; and whereas it has appeared reasonable in all cases in which goods undervalued shall be so taken on account of Government, that the customs duties payable on the importation thereof shall be levied at the valuation at which the said goods shall have been so taken by Government, the following rules have been passed by and with the sanction of the Honorable Court of Directors, and with the approbation of the honorable the Board of Commissioners for the Affairs of India, to take effect from the date of their promulgation within the provinces subject to this presidency.

II. Regulation XV. of 1829, with the exception of section 2, is hereby rescinded.

III. *First.* The duty leviable according to the schedule annexed to Regulation XV. of 1825, on goods and merchandize imported by sea, shall be levied *ad valorem* that is to say, according to the market value at the place and time of importation, except when otherwise specially provided in that or in any other regulation, and the value of all such goods and merchandize shall be stated on the face of the application to clear the same from the custom house, that may be presented by the importer, consignee or proprietor of such goods, or his known agent or factor, who shall further subjoin to the said application a declaration of the truth of the same in the manner and form following :

Second. The above declaration shall be subscribed by the proprietor, importer or consignee, or his known agent or factor, and if upon view or examination of such goods, wares or merchandize, by the officers of the customs, it shall appear to them that such goods, wares or merchandize, or any portion thereof, or any article or articles separately

valued as above, for assessment of duty, are not or is not valued according to the fair Calcutta market price at the time of such declaration, then it shall be lawful for the collector or other officer or officers of the customs, duly authorized in that behalf, to detain such goods, wares or merchandize, or such article or articles, and to cause the same to be lodged in the government ware-houses, or otherwise secured until the pleasure of the board of customs, or other authority acting with the powers of the board, shall be known and declared; and it shall be lawful for the said board or other authority, to order the collector to take such goods, wares or merchandize for the use and benefit of the honorable company at any time within eight days from the date on which the application of the importer or proprietor may have been made, and the collector or other officer aforesaid shall, in such case, within fifteen days of the same date, pay to the proprietor, importer or consignee of such goods, wares or merchandize, or article or articles so detained and taken for the company, the value thereof, as declared and set forth upon the import application by such proprietor, importer or consignee, or by his known agent or factor.

Third. When payment may be so made to the importer or proprietor of such goods, wares and merchandize the same shall be in full satisfaction for the goods, in the same manner as if such goods, wares or merchandize had been transferred by ordinary sale and the collector under the direction of the board of customs, shall cause the said goods, wares or merchandize to be sold to the best advantage on account of government.*

IV. In all cases in which goods shall be taken, purchased by or on account of government, the duties payable thereon shall be levied from the proprietor, importer or consignee thereof, according to the value declared and set forth on the import application.

THE TARIFF.

FORT WILLIAM, LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT.

30th May, 1836.

The following Act passed by the right hon'ble the Governor-General of India in council, on the 30th May, 1836, is hereby promulgated for general information.

ACT No. XIV. OF 1836.

I. It is hereby enacted, that from the first of June next, such parts of Regulations IX. and X. of 1810, Regulation XV. of 1825, and of any other regulations of the Bengal presidency as prescribe the levy of transit or inland customs duties, or of town duties; and likewise the schedules of duties and provisions of any kind continued in these or any other regulations for fixing the amount of duty to be levied upon goods imported into or exported from the said presidency by sea, shall be repealed provided, however, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to prevent the levy of duties at the rates now in force at the custom houses and chokies established on the line of the Jumna, or on any frontier line, upon goods crossing that line for import into, or export from the territory of the East India Company by land, nor to effect the regulation in force for imposing and levying duties on salt, the produce of western and central India.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that duties of customs shall be levied on country goods imported by sea into Calcutta or into any other place within the province of Bengal and Orissa, according to the rates specified in schedule A. annexed to this act, and with the exceptions specified therein; and the said schedule with the notes attached thereto, shall be taken to be a part of this act.

III. And it is hereby further enacted, that duties of customs shall be levied upon country goods exported by sea from any port of Bengal or Orissa, according to the rates specified in schedule B. annexed to this act, with the exceptions therein specified, and the said schedule with the note, attached thereto, shall also be taken to be a part of this act.

IV. And it is hereby enacted, that no goods or articles whatsoever, entered in either of the said schedules as liable to duty, shall be exempted from the payment of such duty or any part thereof, except under special orders from the Governor of Bengal—provided, however, that it shall and may be lawful for the collector of customs or other officer in charge of a custom house, to pass free of duty, as heretofore, any baggage in actual use at his discretion; and in case of any person applying to have goods passed as such, the collector acting under the orders of the board of customs, salt and opium, shall determine whether they be baggage in actual use, or goods subject to duty under the rules of this act.

V. And it is hereby enacted, that the rules and regulations now established for the levy of duties of customs on goods imported into or exported from Calcutta, and other ports of the presidency of Fort William in Bengal, shall continue to be in force, and shall be observed and applied for the levy of the import and export duties imposed by this Act, unless repealed or altered, or repugnant to the provisions thereof.

* This Regulation is now extended to Exports.

VI. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor of the presidency of Fort William in Bengal, by an order printed in the Calcutta Gazette, to fix a place in any river or port in Bengal or Orissa, beyond which place it shall not be lawful for any inward bound vessel, save and except such dhonies and country craft as are referred to in Section 22 of this act, to pass until the master or commander shall have delivered to the pilot on board, for the purpose of being forwarded by the public dawk or otherwise as he may be ordered by the board of customs, salt and opium, a manifest made out in the form prescribed by Section 45, Regulation IX. of 1810. And it is hereby enacted, that if the manifest so delivered* by the master and commander shall not contain a full and true specification of all the goods imported in the vessel, the master or person in charge thereof shall be liable to a fine of 1,000 Rs. ; and any goods or packages that may be found on board in excess of the manifest so delivered or differing in quality or kind, in marks and number, from the specification contained therein, shall be liable to be seized and confiscated or to be charged with such increased duties† as may be determined by the board of customs, salt and opium ; and if any inward-bound vessel shall remain outside or below the place so fixed by the Governor of Bengal, the master or commander shall in like manner, deliver to the pilot, so soon as the vessel shall anchor, a manifest as above prescribed ; and if any such vessel entering a port for which there is a custom house established, and shall lie at anchor therein for the space of twenty-four hours, and the master and commander whereof shall neglect to deliver the said manifest to the pilot on board, he shall for such neglect be liable to forfeit the sum of one thousand rupees, and no entry or port clearance shall be given for such vessel until the fine is paid.

VII. And it is hereby enacted, that no vessel shall be allowed to break bulk until the manifest described in the preceding section of this act, another copy thereof to be presented at the time of applying for entry inwards, shall have been received by the collector of customs, and order shall have been given by the said collector for the discharge of the cargo, and the said collector may further refuse to give such order if he shall see fit until any port clearance, cockets, or other papers known to be granted at the places from which the vessel is stated to have come, shall likewise be delivered to him ;

VIII. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall be competent to the collector of customs at any port of Bengal or Orissa, at his discretion to send one or more officers of customs on board of any vessel at any time, and the custom house officer so sent, shall remain on board of such vessel by day and by night, until the vessel shall leave the port, or until it be otherwise ordered by the collector of customs.

IX. And it is hereby enacted, that any master or person in charge of such vessel, who shall refuse to receive a custom house officer on board, when so deputed as above provided, or shall not afford such officer suitable shelter and sleeping accommodation while on board, shall be liable to fine, not exceeding the sum of 500 rupees for each day during which such officer shall not be received and provided with suitable shelter and accommodation, which fine shall be adjudged by and at the discretion of the board of customs, salt and opium at Calcutta ; and the vessel, by the master or person in charge of which such fine shall have been incurred, shall not be moved until the same shall be paid.

X. And it is hereby enacted, that whenever a collector of customs shall see cause to direct that any vessel shall be searched, he shall issue his warrant or written order for the same, addressed to the custom house officer on board, or to any other officer under his authority, and upon production of such order, the officer bearing it shall be competent to require any cabins, lockers or bulk-heads to be opened in his presence, and if not opened upon his requisition, to break the same open ; and any goods that may be found concealed, and that shall not be duly accounted for to the satisfaction of the collector of customs, shall be confiscated, and any master or person in charge of a vessel, who shall resist such officer or refuse to allow the vessel, to be searched when so ordered by the collector of customs shall be liable upon conviction for every such offence, to a fine of 1,000 rupees, to be adjudged by any magistrate or justice of the peace of the place.

XI. And it is hereby enacted, that no goods shall be allowed to leave any vessel, or to be put on board thereof, until entry of the vessel shall have been duly made in the custom house of the port, and order shall have been given for discharge of the cargo thereof as above provided, and it shall be the duty of the custom house officer on board, and of all officers of customs, to seize as contraband any goods which shall have been removed or put on board of any vessel in contravention of the above provision, or which any attempt shall have been made to remove from or to put on board of any vessel in contravention of the above provision. And after entry

of the vessel at the custom house in due form, or such part of the cargo as may not be intended and declared for re-exportation in the same vessel, shall be sent to land. And export cargo shall be laden on board thereof, according to the rules and practice now in force, and if an attempt be made to land or put on board goods or merchandize in contravention thereof, the goods or merchandize shall be liable to seizure and confiscation.

XII. Provided, however, and it is hereby enacted, that no goods shall be allowed to leave any vessel under the said rules, unless the same be duly manifested, and any goods found on board in excess of the manifest, or not corresponding with specification and description therein contained, shall be seized by the custom house officer on board, in order that they may be dealt with as described in section 6 of this act; and if goods entered in the manifest shall not be found on board the vessel, or if the quantity found be short and deficiency be not duly accounted for, or if goods sent out of the vessel be not landed at the custom house, or at such other ghaut or place as the collector of customs shall have prescribed or permitted them to be passed in due form, the master or commander shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding five hundred rupees for every missing or deficient package of unknown value, and for twice the amount of duty chargeable on the goods deficient and unaccounted for, if capable of being assessed therewith. Provided, however, that nothing herein contained, shall be construed to prevent the collector of customs from permitting the master or commander of any vessel to amend obvious errors or to supply omissions from accident or inadvertence, by furnishing an amended or supplemental manifest,* but their receiving of such shall always be discretionary.

XIII. And it is hereby enacted, that any custom house officer whatsoever, who shall demand or expect any gratuity not authorized by any existing regulation or order of Government in consideration of doing or of omitting to do, any act in his official capacity, shall forfeit for every such offence the sum of five hundred rupees, and any person who shall offer a bribe to any custom house officer in order to induce such officer to act in a manner inconsistent with his duty, shall forfeit a like sum; and these penalties shall be adjudged on conviction before any magistrate or justice of the peace of the town, district or place where the custom house may be established, by such magistrate; and in default of payment any person so convicted shall be committed to the civil jail of the city or district until the fine be paid, or for a period not exceeding six months.

XIV. And it is hereby enacted, that when goods shall be seized as contraband and liable to confiscation, the collector of customs shall investigate the case, and according to his judgment shall either release the goods or adjudge them to confiscation; and whenever he shall declare goods to be confiscated, he shall report his proceedings for confirmation and final adjudication by the board of customs, salt and opium. Provided, however, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to prevent the Governor of Bengal from ordering the release of goods seized, or from remitting any penalty whatsoever that may be incurred for contravention of the customs laws.

XV. And it is hereby further enacted, that twenty days, exclusive of Sundays and holidays, shall be allowed for the discharge of the import cargo of vessels not exceeding six hundred tons burthen, and thirty days, exclusive of Sundays and holidays, for the discharge of the import cargo of vessels exceeding that burthen; and the said periods shall be calculated from the day of the tidewaiter† or other custom-house officer first going on board. And if the whole cargo be not discharged by the expiration of the above stated periods respectively, the master or commander shall be charged with the tidewaiter's or other officer's wages, and other expenses for any further period that he or they may be detained on board. And if the owners, importers or consignees do not bring their goods to land within the periods above fixed, it shall be the duty of the master or commander so to do. And if any goods remain on board after the time fixed as above for the discharge of the import cargo, the collector may order the same to be landed and warehoused for the security of the duties chargeable, and of any freight and primage and other demands that may be due thereon, giving his receipt to the master for the same. Provided always, that in all cases it shall be lawful for the collector or other officer in charge of the custom-house, with the consent of the master of the vessel, to cause any packages to be brought on shore and to be deposited in the government warehouse for the security of the duties and charges thereon, although twenty days may not have expired from the entry of such vessel; and in case goods so landed and warehoused, or any goods brought to land from any vessel be not claimed and cleared from the custom-house within three months from the date of landing, it shall be competent for the collector to sell the same on account of the duties, freight, and other charges incurred and due thereon.

XVI. And it is hereby enacted, that a further period of twenty-five days‡ Sundays and

holidays excluded, shall be allowed for putting on board export cargo if the vessel shall not exceed 600 tons burthen, and thirty-five days,* if exceeding that burthen, when the lading and unlading thereof shall be continuous, and the master or commander shall in such case not be charged with the wages and expenses of the custom-house officer on board, until after the expiration of such additional periods respectively.

And if a vessel having discharged its import cargo shall be laid up, the custom-house officer on board shall be withdrawn so soon as he shall certify that no goods remain on board excepting necessary stores and articles for use, and when a vessel so laid up shall be entered at the custom-house for receipt of export cargo, a custom-house officer shall be sent on board, and if the said last mentioned officer shall certify that no goods are on board, saving as above excepted, twenty days, exclusive of Sundays and holidays as above, shall be allowed from the date of such certificate, for the lading outwards of a vessel not exceeding 600 tons, and thirty days for vessels exceeding that burthen, after which periods respectively the master and commander shall be charged with the wages and expenses of the custom-house officer on board, to the date of the vessel's sailing from the port.

XVII. And it is hereby enacted, that if any person in charge of a vessel shall have become liable to any penalty, fine or demand, on account of any act or omission relating to customs the collector of customs shall be competent, subject to the orders of the board of customs, salt and opium, to refuse port-clearance to such vessel until the fine shall be discharged.

XVIII. And it is hereby enacted, that upon any goods passed through the custom-house for shipment, the application for which shall be presented after port-clearance shall have been taken out, double the prescribed duty shall, in all cases, be levied, and if the goods be free, five per cent. upon the market value, shall be levied thereon.

XIX. And it is hereby enacted, that when a vessel having cleared out from any port shall put back from stress of weather, or it shall for any damage, or from other cause be necessary that the cargo of a vessel that has cleared out shall be unshipped or re-landed, a custom-house officer shall be sent to watch the vessel and take charge of the cargo during such re-landing or removal from on board; and the goods on board of such vessel shall not be allowed to be transhipped or re-exported free of duty, by reason of the previous settlement of duty at the time of first export, unless the goods shall be lodged in such place as shall be allowed by the collector of customs, and shall remain while on land, or while on board of any other vessel under special charge of the officers of customs until the time of re-export, and all charges attending such custody, shall be borne by the exporter or by the applicant for this advantage. Provided, however, that in all cases of return to port after port-clearance on account of damage or for stress of weather, it shall be lawful for the owner, or for the master and commander, to re-enter the vessel and land the cargo under the rules for the importation of goods;† and export duty shall in that case be refunded and the amount paid in drawback be reclaimed, and the goods be placed in all respects as before being passed for exportation, and if goods, on account of which drawback has been paid, be not found on board the vessel the master shall forfeit the entire value thereof, unless he account for them to the satisfaction of the collector of customs.

XX. And it is hereby enacted, that when goods shall be re-landed before the lading of any vessel is complete, and port-clearance has been granted, the duty levied upon such goods shall be returned to the exporter, but no refund‡ shall be made of duty paid on the export of any goods after port-clearance shall have been granted for the vessel on which the goods were exported, except the vessel shall have put back for stress of weather or for damage and the goods shall have been re-landed under the rule contained in section 19 of this Act.

XXI. And it is hereby further enacted, that vessels owned by natives of Arabia and coming from the ports there, and likewise the vessels of any country or port of Asia not subject to the dominion of the King of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, excepting dhonies and small craft from the Maldives and Nicobar Islands, as herein under provided, shall be deemed foreign vessels.||

the board of customs, salt and opium, and if any such vessel shall anchor or moor in any other part of the river than as so marked out, and the master or person in the charge thereof shall not immediately upon being ordered so to do, move his vessel to the place marked out, he shall be liable to fine of 100 rupees, to be adjudged by the collector of customs and the vessel or any part of its equipment or cargo may be seized and sold in satisfaction of such fine, and goods shall be landed from such vessel and put on board for export according to such rules and at such places as shall be prescribed by the collector of customs, and vessels of this description coming from the Maldives, or from the Nicobar Islands, shall be considered British vessels.

And when the duty is declared to be *ad valorem*, it shall be levied on the market value without deduction; and if the collector of customs shall see reason to doubt whether the goods come from the country from which they are declared to come by the importer, it shall be lawful for the collector of customs to call on the importer to furnish evidence as to the place of manufacture or production, and if such evidence shall not satisfy the said collector of the truth of the declaration, the goods shall be charged with the highest rate of duty subject always to an appeal to the board of customs, salt and opium.

And upon the re-export by sea of goods imported, excepting opium and salt, provided the re-export be made within two years of the date of import as per custom-house register, and the goods be identified to the satisfaction of the collector of customs, there shall be retained one-eighth of the amount of duty levied, and the remainder shall be repaid as drawback. And if goods be reported in the same ship without being landed (always excepting opium and salt in regard to which the special rules in force shall continue to apply,) there shall be no import duty levied thereon.—See also article xvi of 1837, sec. 14. This clause has no retrospective effect.

And after the said 1st April 1837, credit shall not be given, nor shall drawback be allowed of any inland customs or land frontier duty, paid at any custom-house or chokee of the Jumna frontier line, or of Benares, except only upon the article of cotton wool, covered by ruwannas taken out at the custom-houses of the western provinces, and proved to have been destined for export by sea when passed out of those provinces.

ACT NO. VI. DATED MARCH 4TH, 1848.

An Act for equalizing the Duties on Goods imported and exported on Foreign and British Bottoms, and for abolishing duties on goods carried from Port to Port in the Territories subject to the Government of the East India Company.

I. It is hereby enacted, that from and after the Twenty-fifth day of March 1848, all Goods imported on foreign Bottoms by Sea into any Port of the Presidencies of Fort William in Bengal, Fort St. George, or Bombay, shall be charged only with the same rates of duty as such goods would now by law be charged with if such goods were imported into any of the said Ports on British Bottoms any thing in any Act of the Council of India contained to the contrary notwithstanding.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that from and after the said day all Goods exported on Foreign Bottoms by Sea, from any Port of the said Presidencies, shall be charged only with the same rates of duty as such goods would now by law be charged with if such goods were exported from any of the said Ports on British Bottoms, any thing in any Act of the Council of India contained to the contrary notwithstanding.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that from and after the said day no duty shall be charged on any Goods lawfully carried from any Port in the Territories subject to the Government of the East India Company to any other Port in the said Territories, any thing in any Act of the Council of India contained to the contrary notwithstanding.

IV. Provided always, that nothing in this Act contained shall apply to the Articles of Salt or Opium.

FORT WILLIAM, GENERAL DEPARTMENT.

30th May, 1836.

Under the powers conferred by the 6th Section, Act No. XIV. of this year, the Governor of Bengal has fixed the station of Kedgoree, in the river Hooghly, as the place beyond which no vessel, inward bound, shall pass, until the master and commander shall have delivered a manifest of the cargo and goods laden therein, drawn up in the form prescribed by section 45, regulation IX. 1810, to the pilot on board, in order that it may be forwarded to Calcutta in such manner as may be ordered by the Marine Board.

Transhipment of Goods in Port without being landed.

Regular Import application to be made. The Import manifest of the Ship to be noted. Reference to be made to cockets for kind and description of Goods and the value to be determined in communication with the appraiser. If there be no cockets, and if kind and description of goods, for due valuation cannot be otherwise determined to the satisfaction of the Officer, the goods must necessarily be landed for examination.

When the Import Duty shall have been paid, the proprietor will make regular Export application with the claim to Draw-back, for registry, or order that the goods may be recognized as forming part of the Export Cargo of the Vessel to which they are to be transhipped upon the ordinary Export Perwannah. The tranship stamp will be affixed, on delivery of which to the head Tide-waiter, he will send a wharf Tide-waiter to superintend the transhipment.

Under Sections 61 and 74, and 86, of Regulation IX. of 1810, the forms must be observed in respect of free goods.

ACT NO. VII. DATED MARCH 25TH, 1848.

An Act to except certain free Ports from the operation of Section 3, Act No. VI. of 1848, and otherwise to amend that Act.

I. In modification of Section 3, Act No. VI. of 1848, it is hereby enacted, that the provisions of the said Section shall not apply to Goods exported from any part of the Territories subject to the Government of the East India Company, to any of the ports in the Straits of Malacca, or to any of the ports in the Tenasserim Provinces, or to any of the ports in the Province of Arracan, nor to Goods imported from any of those ports into any port of the said Territories.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that no drawback shall be allowed on the re-export of Goods from any port in the Territories subject to the Government of the East India Company to any other port in the said Territories, to which the operation of Section 3, Act No. VI. of 1848, may extend.

NOTIFICATION.

Customs.—In further modification of the rules in force for warehousing imported Salt under bond it is hereby notified, that in settling for the import duty on clearance of the Salt, a deduction will be allowed on account of wastage at a rate not exceeding four per cent. upon the quantity delivered over the Ship's side. Provided, however, that if the Collector of Customs have reason to believe, that any portion of the Salt has been clandestinely or fraudulently removed, he will be at liberty to levy duty on the entire quantity so delivered.

The duty upon bonded Salt will be levied at the rate in force at the time of clearance.

The Collector of Customs, may, at his discretion, allow parties to whom Salt stored in bond may be transferred to enter into a new engagement for the payment of duty upon the entire quantity weighed over the Ship's side, and upon execution thereof, to cancel the bond of the first owner, importer or Consignee, and release him from further responsibility.

GOVERNMENT NOTIFICATION.

Fort William, Home Department, Separate—Revenue, the 4th November, 1848—Notification.
It having been represented to the Government of India that sugar from Singapore and Malacca has hitherto, in contravention of the law, been imported into the Tenasserim provinces: and further that the prevention of such importation would be likely to check the increasing rice cultivation and trade of the Tenasserim provinces without any present benefit to sugar-growers in those provinces, the hon'ble the President of the Council of India in Council has resolved to remove the existing prohibition against the importation into the Tenasserim provinces to foreign sugar, rum, and rum shrub, or sugar, rum and rum shrub, the produce of any British territory into which foreign sugar, rum and rum shrub can be legally imported; and it is hereby declared, that the resolutions of the 18th July 1846, making such importation illegal are rescinded accordingly.

Great delay occurring, very frequently, in the clearance of Goods from the Custom House Wharf, the attention of Importers and Consignees is directed to the liability which they incur, under the Provisions of Section 12, Act XVI. of 1837. Parties who may not find a ready market for their Goods should avail themselves of the privileges of the Bonding Act (No. XXV. of 1836,) for which purpose the Ware-houses of the Bonded Ware-house Association and the Godowns of the Custom House are available. The latter, however, are but little used as Bonded Ware-houses, the Merchants who rent Godowns on the Wharf being probably, unwilling to appropriate them exclusively to Bonding purposes.

With the view therefore of affording greater facilities for the clearance of Goods within the time prescribed by law, Godown, No. 2, on the Import Wharf, has been set apart for the reception of Goods bonded for duty. Ware-house rent will be charged on each package according to the Table of Wharfage Rates now in force, but at the lower or *single* rate for the whole time the Goods may remain in the Ware-house. As the space is limited, and it is not intended that parties should make use of the Ware-house merely for the purpose of avoiding the double Wharfage rates to which, under existing Rules, they are liable in the event of delay in clearing their Goods, only such Goods will be received into *this* Ware-house as may have remained for two months uncleared on the Wharf.

Instances very frequently occurring of Refund of Duty being claimed on the plea that the Goods upon which duty has been paid, though landed from sailing Ships, are the *personal* Baggage of parties travelling by the Overland route, Agents and Consignees are hereby warned that exemption from duty must be pleaded *at the time of passing goods*; and that after they have once been removed from the Ship or the Wharf, [unless passed on Deposit,] no claim to Refund or Re-adjustment of Duty will be admitted.

The only Goods shipped as Cargo, which will be admitted to Free Entry, as belonging to Overland Passengers, are Wearing Apparel, and articles which have been *previously in use in India.*

A NEW CUSTOM HOUSE TARIFF OF VALUATIONS IS ABOUT TO BE PUBLISHED.

BONDED WARE-HOUSE.

Act No. XXV. of 1836.

Passed on the 31st October, 1836.

I. It is hereby enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor, or Governor in Council of any Presidency, to declare any Port within the Territories of such Presidency, a Ware-housing Port.

II. And it is hereby enacted, that it shall be lawful for any person who imports Goods into any such Ware-housing Port, to lodge such Goods in any Public Ware-house, or in any Private Ware-house, licensed in the manner hereinafter described.

III. And it is hereby enacted, that applications shall be made for the admission of such Goods into such Ware-houses as aforesaid in the Form A. attached to this Act, and the said Form shall be signed by the Importer, Owner, or Consignee; and no goods shall be lodged in any such Ware-house until they shall have been assessed for Customs Duty according to the Rules in force at the place of importation, and the Keeper of every such Ware-house shall be answerable for the weight or gauge reported by the Custom House Officers, who shall have assessed the said Goods, deducting the wastage hereinafter allowed.

IV. And it is hereby enacted, that when Goods shall be passed by Tals or by Package, every omission or misdescription tending to injure the Revenue, shall be an offence punishable with fine, not exceeding ten times the greatest amount of duty which could have been lost to the Government in consequence of such omission or misdescription; and if Goods shall have been overstated in quantity or value, the error may be rectified prior to the lodging of the said Goods in such Ware-houses as aforesaid, but not after the said Goods have been so lodged.

V. And it is hereby enacted, that no packages of Goods shall be admitted into any public or licensed Ware-house unless numbered and marked in plain and legible characters, with the initials of the Owner, Importer, or Consignee, and with a description of Goods contained therein.

VI. And it is hereby enacted, that upon Goods ware-housed under the provisions of this Act, when the Import Duty chargeable shall exceed the sum of one hundred Rupees, the Importer or Consignee shall be allowed to execute a Bond for the amount of duty chargeable in the Form heretunto annexed marked B., and when such Bond shall have been executed, the Goods shall be allowed to remain in Ware-house for a period not exceeding two years and a half without being liable to the demand of Import Duty thereon. And the Bond to be taken under this Section, shall be for twice the amount of Import Duty assessed on the Goods, and shall stipulate for interest to be payable from the date of the demand of any sum due on account of the Goods at such rate not exceeding six per cent. as shall be fixed by the Board or other controlling authority of Customs. And the Party executing the same, shall be bound thereby for the payment of all Duties and Charges that shall be claimable on account of the Goods and of any penalties that may be incurred for violation of the Custom Laws in respect to the same.

VII. Provided always, that if any Owner, Importer, or Consignee shall omit to pay any duty or penalty that may fall due, on account of Goods ware-housed under this Act, it shall be lawful for the Collector of Customs at his option, either to proceed upon the Bond, or to cause such portion of the Goods ware-housed on account of which the duty or penalty may be demanded, as to him may seem fit to be detained, in satisfaction thereof; and if the demand be not discharged within ten days from the date of such detention (due notice thereof being given to the Importer, Owner or Consignee) the Goods so detained shall be liable to be sold in satisfaction of the demand. And the proceeds of any sale so made of Goods detained, shall be written off upon the Bond in discharge thereof to the amount received less the charges of the sale, and if there be any surplus obtained from such sale beyond the amount demanded, such surplus shall be paid over to the Owner or Consignee of the Goods, and no transfer or assignment of the Goods shall prevent the Collector from proceeding against the Goods in the manner above provided for, any demand of Custom Duties or Penalty claimed thereon.

VIII. And it is hereby provided, that if at the end of two years and a half the Owner or Consignee of Goods shall desire to keep them in Ware-house for a further period, the Board or other controlling authority of Customs, shall be competent to permit him so to keep them for a like further period not exceeding two years and a half, on the Bonds being renewed by the parties applying for the same.

IX. And it is hereby enacted, that when a Vessel after having cleared from the Port shall return, and the Owners, Agents, or Shippers of the Cargo of such Vessel, or any part thereof, shall desire to land the same for re-export, such Goods shall be admitted to Ware-house, and being so declared and registered, re-export may be made thereof under the previous Settlement of Duty, unless the bottom in which the re-export is made, be one on account of which the Goods are chargeable with increased Duty Exception, in which case the Goods shall be chargeable only with the difference and no Bond shall be taken on account of Duties for such re-landed Goods, unless the Goods should be liable to duty on being passed through the Custom House for Importation.

X. And it is hereby enacted, that upon the re-exportation by Sea of Goods imported and ware-housed under Bond for the Duty, as provided in this Act, within the period during which such Goods are by this Act permitted to continue in Ware-house, and upon payment of all reserved duty which may be due on account of such Goods, and any charges or penalties that may have been incurred on account of the Goods, the Bond executed at the time of lodging the Goods in Ware-house, shall be deemed to have been discharged and be cancelled accordingly.

XI. And it is hereby enacted, that if any Goods lodged in Ware-house, in the manner aforesaid shall be removed or taken from the Ware-house, otherwise than for exportation by Sea, or if the Goods be not cleared from the Ware-house and exported at the expiration of the time during which such Goods are permitted by this Act to remain in Ware-house, the Collector of Customs shall demand the full amount of Import Duty chargeable thereon, and any charges or penalties that may have been incurred. And if the amount so claimed be not paid within ten days from the date of the demand, the Collector of Customs shall be entitled to realize the same either by putting the Bond in suit, or at his option, by causing the Goods, or any sufficient portion thereof, to be sold in satisfaction of the demand.

XII. And it is hereby enacted, that whenever any Goods ware-housed and bonded as aforesaid, shall be removed from any public or licensed Ware-house, the Collector of Customs shall cause such removal to be noted on the back of the Bond, and every note so made, shall specify the quantity and description of Goods removed, the purposes for which they have been removed, the date of removal, and name of the person removing them, and the number and date of the Export Pass under which they have been taken away, if removed for exportation by Sea; and of the Import Pass or Order, if removed for importation and the amount of Duty paid.

XIII. And it is hereby enacted, that a Register shall be kept of all Bonds entered into for Customs Duties on Goods ware-housed as aforesaid, and entry shall be made in the said Register of all particulars prescribed in the preceding Section of this Act, as to be noted on the Bond, and when the Register shall show that the entire quantity of the Goods covered by any Bond has been withdrawn from Ware-house either through Importation and the payment of duties, or through re-exportation by Sea and payment of the reserve Duties upon such re-export, it shall then be competent to, and be the duty of, the Collector of Customs to cancel the Bond as discharged in full, and deliver it so cancelled to the Parties who shall have executed, or who shall be authorized to receive the same.

XIV. And it is hereby enacted, that the Ware-house of the Custom House, together with such other Buildings as shall be directed by the Governor in Council, or Governor of the Presidency, or Settlement, shall be Public Ware-houses for the reception of the Goods under the provisions of this Act. And every Public Ware-house shall be under the lock and key of the person whom the Governor or Governor in Council of the Presidency, shall appoint to be Keeper of such Ware-house, and such Keeper shall be responsible for all duties connected with the charge of goods, their reception into, and delivering from the Ware-houses.

XV. And it is hereby enacted, that the Board or other controlling authority of Customs, shall determine what Goods shall be admitted into every Public Ware-house, in what manner, and on what terms; and shall, from time to time, fix rates of hire for every Public Ware-house, or for the custody of Goods therein, and a Table of the Rates so fixed, shall be placed in a conspicuous part of every such Ware-house.

XVI. And it is hereby enacted, that the Owners or Consignees of Goods lodged in a Public or Licensed Ware-house under this Act, or their Agents shall have access to their Goods at any time, within the hours of business, in the presence of a Custom House Officer, who shall be deputed to accompany them, upon their making application in writing to the Collector of Customs, or to the Ware-house keeper for the purpose.

XVII. And it is hereby enacted, that the expenses of carriage, packing, and stowage of Goods, on their reception into, or removal from, a Ware-house shall, if paid by the Collector or Ware-house-keeper, be chargeable on the Goods, and be defrayed by the Owners or Consignees, in like manner as the Customs Duties before the Goods are removed. And if the Goods be lodged in a Public Ware-house, the Owners or Consignees shall, further pay monthly the Rent and Ware-house Dues on receiving a Bill or written demand from the Collector or Ware-house-keeper for the same. And if the Bill for rent or Ware-house Dues, be not discharged within ten days from the date of presentation, the Collector of Customs shall have power, (any private transfer or assignment of the Goods notwithstanding) to cause to be sold by Public Auction such sufficient portion of the Goods as he may select in liquidation of his demand. And the Owners and Consignees of Goods shall not be entitled to claim from the Collector of Customs or Ware-house-keeper, any compensation for any loss that may occur while the Goods are passed into, or out of the Ware-house, or while they remain therein, unless such loss or injury shall be proved to have been occasioned by the wilful act or neglect of the Ware-house-keeper, or his Officers or of the Officers of Customs.

XVIII. And it is hereby enacted, that allowance shall be made for the Wastage of Goods, deposited in Ware-houses according to the following Table as the rate of Wastage for one year, and the Import Duty shall be settled on the quantities registered at the time of Importation. Wastage at these rates notwithstanding.

Wines and Spirits in Casks—a deduction from ullage of 10 per cent. shall be allowed at the time of being received into Ware-houses.

XIX. And it is hereby enacted, that the Board or other Controlling Authority of Customs, shall have power to license Ware-houses belonging to private persons for the reception of Goods, with duty bonded under the rules of this Act, in like manner as prescribed for Public Ware-houses; and every License so granted to a private Ware-house, shall be liable to be revoked at pleasure by the Board or other Controlling Authority of Customs, unless otherwise specifically stipulated in the License.

XX. And it is hereby enacted, that applications for Licenses for private Ware-houses shall be drawn up in the Form marked C. annexed to this Act, and shall specify the particulars therein stated and the situation of the Ware-houses, and their distances respectively from the Custom House in English Yards.

XXI. And it is hereby enacted, that the Collector of Customs or other Ware-house-keeper shall have access for himself or for any Officer he may depute for the purpose, to any private Ware-house licensed as above. And if the Proprietor thereof shall not open the same when required, or shall refuse to admit the Collector or Ware-house-keeper, or the Officer of either, upon demand made, at any time within the hours of business at the Port, the Proprietor of the Ware-house shall be liable to a fine not exceeding one Thousand Rupees, and further to have the License for the Ware-house cancelled and withdrawn; and all Bonds executed for Duty chargeable upon Goods therein deposited, shall become due and be put in suit for the levy of the Duty and other demands of Customs, after seven days shall have passed from the date when the Collector of Customs or Ware-house-keeper shall give notice of any License being withdrawn.

XXII. And it is hereby enacted, that if Goods lodged in a Private Ware-house shall be found to be deficient at the time of delivery therefrom beyond the allowance for wastage prescribed in the Table annexed to Section 18 of this Act, the Owner or Consignee, or other Party who may have lodged the Goods in the Ware-house shall, unless the deficiency be accounted for to the satisfaction of the Collector of Customs, forfeit to Government a sum equal to ten times the Duty chargeable on the quantity of Goods deficient, and if Goods be found to exceed the registered quantity, such excess, unless similarly accounted for, shall be charged with ten times the ordinary Duty thereon; and when any penalty shall be incurred under this Section, the Goods shall not be removed until the sum is paid.

XXIII. And it is hereby enacted, that the Collector of Customs shall have authority at any time to issue his Warrant or written Order, and to cause any Goods or Packages lodged in a

public or private Ware-house to be opened and weighed, or otherwise examined as he may direct. And after Goods shall have been so opened or examined he shall cause the same to be sealed or marked in such manner as to him may seem fit, and when Goods shall have been so sealed or marked (after examination) they shall not be again opened without permission from the Board, or other Controlling Authority of Customs, except when the Proprietor or Consignee shall apply to have them opened, and in every such case, the Packages shall be again sealed or marked as before.

XXIV. And it is hereby enacted, that when Goods shall be received into Ware-house, or shall be removed therefrom, the Packages shall be stamped with a conspicuous seal or stamp containing the words :

Ware-housed and Duty Bonded.	or	Delivered for Exportation.	or	Removed for Importation.
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accordingly as the Goods may be received or removed for one or other purpose, and any person who shall remove or efface a stamp or seal, affixed by an Officer of Customs, or who shall change the outer cover of any package so marked, or change the contents thereof while Goods are in Ware-house, without giving notice and obtaining permission of the Collector of Customs, shall for every such offence forfeit the sum of five hundred Rupees upon conviction before a Magistrate or Justice of Peace of the place. Provided however that the Owners and Consignees of Goods shall be at liberty to take out samples of their Goods of such limited quantity as shall be deemed by the Collector of Customs reasonable and proper.

XXV. And it is hereby enacted, that no Goods shall be removed from any Ware-house except under application to the Collector of Customs for the Goods to be passed for Export or for Importation, in like manner as for other Goods passed through the Custom House, or for removal to another Ware-house, as prescribed in Section XXVIII. of this Act.

XXVI. And it is hereby enacted, that if any Owner or Consignee of Goods, shall in any way break a Package for removal of any part of the Goods, the entire Duty shall be levied for all the Goods contained therein.

XXVII. And it is hereby enacted, that Applications to remove Goods from Ware-house shall be made in the Form Marked D. hereunto annexed, and twenty-four hours' notice shall ordinarily be given to the Collector of Customs or Ware-house-keeper of the intention to remove Goods.

XXVIII. And it is hereby enacted, that Owners or Consignees of Goods Ware-housed and Bonded for Duty under this Act, may remove the same from one public or licensed Ware-house to any other, and when they shall desire so to remove Goods they shall make application in the Form marked E. hereunto annexed, furnishing the information specified, and filling up the columns left blank in the said Form, with all the particulars therein contained.

XXIX. And it is hereby enacted, that if Goods Ware-housed and Bonded for Duty shall be destroyed by fire or other accident, no Duty shall be chargeable thereon, provided that if they be destroyed in a private Ware-house, notice thereof be given to the Collector of Customs or Ware-house-keeper, within forty-eight hours of the discovery of the accident. And if Goods when lodged in Ware-house shall receive damage, they shall be assessed for Duty according to their actual value and Bond for the same executed for the unexpired term of Ware-housing.

XXX. And it is hereby enacted, that whenever any person shall be charged with having committed any act or neglect for which he is liable to penalty under this Act, the Collector of Customs at the Port, shall be competent to investigate the case, and to adjudge the penalty or to dismiss the complaint, as to him may seem fit. Provided, however, that if the Collector shall adjudge any penalty to be incurred, such judgment shall not be conclusive until the case shall have been reported to the Board or other superior authority of Customs, and the award shall have been confirmed by that Authority; and it is further enacted, that the Board or other Controlling Authority of Customs shall have the power of mitigating any penalty that may be incurred on account of Ware-housed Goods to the extent of reducing the same to a levy of double Duty.

With regard to the above regulations, some of the forms have been modified by the Collector and sanctioned by the Board, which can be ascertained by applying at the Custom House.

NOTICE.

The Bond of the Bengal Bonded Warehouse Association, given under Section XXVI. of Act V. of 1838, having been cancelled at their request in respect to all Goods warehoused in the Godowns of the Association after the 1st of October, 1854, parties warehousing Goods will, in future, be required to execute Bonds at the Custom House for the duty chargeable in each case, in accordance with Section VI., Act XXV. of 1836.

REGULATIONS ON FOREIGN SUGAR.

Fort William Legislative Department, the 28th November, 1836.

The following Act, passed by the Right Hon'ble the Governor-General of India in Council on the 29th November, 1836, is hereby promulgated for general information.

Act No. XXXII. of 1836.

I.—It is hereby enacted, that if any person after the first day of December, 1836, lands or attempts to land in any part of the Territories subject to the Government of the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal any Sugar which is not the growth of a British possession into which Foreign Sugar cannot be legally imported, such Sugar shall be seized and confiscated by the Collector of the Customs or by any other Officer thereunto authorized by the Government of the said Presidency, unless the district in which such Sugar is landed or in which an attempt has been made to land such Sugar be a district in which the Governor-General of India in Council has authorized the importation of such Sugar.

II.—And it is hereby enacted, that if any Owner of Sugar, the produce of the said Territories, or duly authorized Agent of such Owner, desires to obtain a Certificate of origin from the Collector or Assistant Collector of the land or Custom Revenue of any district within the said Territories, or from any other Officer appointed by the Governor-General of India in Council to give such Certificates, such Owner or Agent shall, in the presence of the Officer from whom he de-

sires to obtain such Certificates, make and subscribe a Declaration in the form contained in the Schedule hereunto annexed marked A.

III.—And it is hereby enacted, that if the district be one into which the Governor-General of India in Council has not by any order authorized the importation of Foreign Sugar or of Sugar the growth of any British Possession into which Foreign Sugar can be legally imported, the Officer before whom such a Declaration as is aforesaid shall have been made, shall grant under his hand and seal to the Declarant a Certificate in the form contained in the Schedule hereunto annexed marked B.

IV.—And it is hereby enacted, that every person who intends to ship Sugar from any place within the said Territories for any part of the United Kingdom, shall be entitled to produce to the Collector of Customs at that place, or to any other Officer who may have been appointed by the Governor-General of India in Council, to act on such occasions in place of the Collector of Customs, a Certificate such as is above described, and also in the presence of the Officer to whom he has so produced such Certificate to make and subscribe a Declaration in the form contained in the Schedule hereunto annexed marked C.

V.—And it is hereby enacted, that the Officer to whom such a Certificate shall have been so produced, and before whom a Declaration in the last mentioned form shall have been so made and subscribed, shall grant to the person who has made the last mentioned Declaration a Certificate in the form contained in the Schedule hereunto annexed marked D.

VI.—And it is hereby enacted, that any person who shall in making any Declaration under the authority of this Act, knowingly affirm an untruth shall on conviction thereof before such Court as would be competent to try such person for perjury, be punished by fine to an amount not exceeding Five Thousand Rupees, and imprisonment for a term not exceeding two years.

RULES FOR BONDING SALT.

Rules for Bonding Salt imported by Sea and deposited in Private Ware Houses to take effect from this Date, 28th September, 1841.

First—Parties wishing to store Salt in private Godowns, under the Government orders of 11th August 1841, to give notice of their intentions to the Collector of Customs in writing, pointing out the location of the Godowns in which the Salt is to be stored and making a deposit of the Duty in Government Promissory Notes, or in Bills accepted by Government.

Second—On receipt of this deposit, the Collector of Customs will cause the Salt to be weighed and delivered from on board Ship as at present, sending with each boat load of Salt for its protection in transit, between the Ship and the Importer's Godowns, a boat Note (as per Form annexed) signed by both the Preventive Officers, delivering and the Salt Chowkée Officer superintending the weighment.

Third—On completion of weighment, the Collector to report the out-turn together with the amount of Company's Paper held in deposit on receipt of this information, and the boat Notes which must be delivered up by the Importer, the Board will supply the importer with a Rowannah for the full quantity weighed over the Vessel's side.

Fourth—On the expiration of three months from the date of entry of the Ship on which the Salt may have been imported, the Collector of Customs, will call upon the Importer or Consignee to pay the duty on the full quantity weighed over the Vessel's side, less 3½ per cent. wastage.

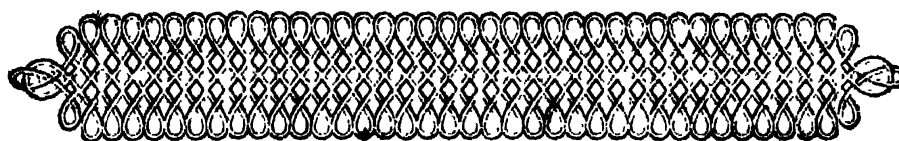
Fifth—The Importer to write off all Salt sold by him on the back of the Rowannah, giving due intimation of Salt within 40 hours to the Board, to enable them to depute a Salt Officer to be present at the weighment and delivery, this Officer will not suffer any Salt to be removed save under a separate Rowannah to be granted from the Board's Office. He will also attest the endorsement on the Rowannah, as above provided, of the quantity delivered.

Sixth—A Salt Officer will attend during the landing of the Salt in order to put his adal on the Salt imported, and it will be expected that the Stamp so applied shall not be broken save in his presence.

Seventh—Notice shall in all cases of Rowannahs granted for bonded Salt be given to the Superintendent of Calcutta Salt Chowkées.

NOTIFICATION.

In modification of the rules for bonding Salt promulgated on the 28th September, 1841, under the authority of the Board of Customs, Salt and Opium, it is hereby notified, that parties desirous of bonding imported Salt in private Ware-houses may apply to the Collector of Customs for a license in the form C. appended to Act No. XXV. of 1836

If the Board are satisfied on the Collector's report, that the Ware-houses mentioned in the application are well adapted for the secure custody of the Salt, a license will be granted under Section 19 of the above mentioned Act, and Salt may then be bonded therein under restrictions provided by the Act in respect of any other article of merchandize bonded in a private Ware-house.

A portion of the Government Golah, at Sulkea, will be set apart from the 15th proximo, as a public Ware-house for the reception of Salt on the same terms at a fixed rent; and will continue to be available for that purpose until required by Government.

The rate of wastage allowed upon Salt so ware-housed, will be at the rate of four per cent. per annum upon the quantity weighed over the ship's side; but the Import duty will be settled on the quantity so delivered according to the provisions of Section 18, Act No. XXV. of 1836.

Ware-houses licensed for the reception of Salt under bond, will not be available for goods of any other description.

All expenses attending the receipt, storage, custody and delivery of Salt at Ware-houses licensed as above, or in the Sulkea Golahs, will be borne by the parties availing themselves of the privilege.

Parties who are unable to provide Ware-houses so constructed and situated, as in the opinion of the Board, effectually to provide for the secure custody of Salt while under bond, will be allowed as before to Ware-house their Salt under the rules of the 28th September, 1841, which otherwise remain in full force, except in so far as they are modified by this notification.

Is hereby given, that the practice of granting Temporary Passes for Salt is discontinued; and that, in future, no Salt (except for the purpose of being Bonded,) will be delivered from Ships lying in the River, except on production of a Rowannah. The Passes will be current for (48) Forty-eight hours, from the time at which delivery may be completed, as shown by the Certificate of the Preventive Officer, on the back of the document.

3. Preventive Officers will be instructed not to give delivery on any Pass, unless it be countersigned by the Superintendent of Calcutta Salt Chowkeys, and to be careful in endorsing the Pass, to enter the full quantity delivered, and the precise time, (hour and minute,) at which the delivery is completed.

4. It is further notified, for general information, that Commanders of Salt-laden Vessels *must* invariably enter in the Import Manifest, the quantity of Salt *actually* shipped, as shown in the Cockets, Export Manifest, Port Clearance, or other document, of the Port of Export. If no such document exist, then the quantity shown by the Bill-of-Lading, that is, the quantity which at the time of shipment the Commander believed to be put on Board, *must* be entered in the Import Manifest. In the event of no Bill-of-Lading, the Commander *must* specially state how the Salt was put on board: if in baskets, the number shipped, and the mode in which he has estimated the entered weight.

5. The Board have fixed rates of wastage, sufficient to cover deficiencies arising from ordinary causes. Should greater wastage be apprehended from any extraordinary cause, it must be noted at the foot of the Manifest, at the time of entry. Commanders will not be held responsible for a larger quantity of Salt than they have reason to believe they have brought into Port; but they must state the grounds of their belief, fully and accurately, and support them by such documentary evidence, as may be available.

The Board of Revenue having, in communication with the Chamber of Commerce, deemed it expedient to revise the system at present in force for weighment of Salt on board ship, the following Rules are published for general information, to have effect from the 15th instant :

1st. Choppadars for the purpose of weighment of Salt on board ship will be furnished only by the authorized Salt weighman attached to the Custom House.

2nd. The rate of payment for the Choppadars is for the present fixed at 3 Rupees per 100 maunds weighed : to secure which payment, on the entering of a Salt laden vessel at the Custom House, the Owner or Consignee of the Salt will be required to make a deposit in cash, calculated at the above rate on the full manifested quantity, and also a thousand maunds in addition to cover possible excess out-turn, and until such deposit be made, no entry for Salt on board such vessel will be admitted.

3rd. The presentation of the official receipt for that deposit will be sufficient authority to the Salt weighman to furnish Choppadars and Khyals on requisition duly made to him in writing.

4th. When the weighment of Salt on board any ship has been completed, the Salt weighman will present his Bill to this Office for the work done ; which Bill must be countersigned as *correct* by the Superintendent of Calcutta Salt Chowkies, under whose immediate supervision and control the Salt weighman's Office is placed ; the Deposit will be adjusted accordingly and the balance returned to the Depositor.

5th. Salt weighing during extra hours is grantable only on the requisition of Commanders or their known Agents, who must be prepared to abide by the Rules in force for such extra work.

REVISED RULES FOR BONDING SALT.

Passed by the Board of Revenue J. P. in their letter to the Collector of Customs, No. 434 of 29th March, 1853, and published for general information.

I. Parties desirous of bonding imported Salt in private Ware-houses, may apply to Collector of Customs for a License in the form C. appended to Act No. XXV. of 1836.

If the Board are satisfied, on the Collector's Report, that the Ware-houses mentioned in the application are well adapted for the secure custody of the Salt, a License will be granted under Section 19 of the abovementioned Act, and Salt may then be bonded therein under the restrictions provided by the Act in respect of any other article of Merchandize bonded in a private Ware-house.

II. Ware-houses licensed for the reception of Salt under Bond, will not be available for goods of any other description.

III. A portion of the Government Golahs at Sulkea has been set apart as a public Ware-house for the reception of Salt on the same terms at a fixed rent, and will continue to be available for that purpose until required by Government.

IV. All weighing transport and storage charges will be borne by the Bonder, as also all delivery charges on the Salt being cleared out from Bond.

V. The Salt will be weighed over the Ship's side, for which purpose weighmen will be furnished from the Custom House on requisition from the Bonder, and on his complying with the forms lately prescribed by the Board for their remuneration at the rate of 3 Rupees per 1000 maunds.

VI. The Bonders will be required to make use of covered boats and to provide wax and tape for sealing the hatches. Each boat will be sealed by the Preventive Officer on board, and be furnished at the same time with the usual Boat Note, specifying the quantity placed under Seal.—[*Vide Notification in "Exchange Gazette" of the 11th May, 1853.*]

VII. Bonded Salt will be stored under the supervision of an Officer deputed for this purpose by the Collector of Customs or the Superintendent of the Government Golahs, and it will be the duty of such Officer to receive and examine the Boat Notes, and to see, that the Seals of the hatches are entire. The Salt will not be weighed into Ware-houses, but in other respects the precautions in use for storing Government Salt will be observed.

VIII. The Superintendent of the Government Golahs, will Report for the Board's sanction such disbursements as may be necessary for preparing Golah accommodation, or for Extra Establishment, on account of Salt warehoused in the Golahs, all of which will, after audit, be charged to the fund derivable from Golah rents.

IX. Any Extra Establishment that may be necessary for the surveillance of Salt lodged in private Warehouses, both while it remains in Bond and on delivery, must be paid by the Bonder.

X. In settling for duty on the clearance of Salt warehoused in the Government Golahs, a deduction will be allowed on account of wastage, at a rate not exceeding two and a half per cent. upon the quantity delivered over the Ship's side. Provided, however that if the Collector of Customs have reason to believe, that any portion of the Salt has been clandestinely or fraudulently removed, he will be at liberty to levy duty on the entire quantity so delivered.

XI. For Salt deposited in private Ware-houses, the duty will be settled on the quantity weighed over the Ship's side, according to the provisions of Section 18, Act XXV. of 1836.

XII. Parties desiring to Bond Salt, who may be unable to provide Ware-houses so constructed and situated as, in the opinion of the Board, effectually to provide for the secure custody of Salt while under Bond, will be allowed, as before, to warehouse their Salt under the Rules of the 28th September, 1841.

PASSAGE OF SERVANTS.*

Mistakes having occurred on the part of individuals applying to Government for permission for servants to proceed on board ship, with respect to the description of such servants, the Governor-General in Council is pleased to direct, that all persons applying to Government to authorize the reception of any servant on board ship, shall distinctly specify in their application, after careful inquiry, the country to which such servant may belong.

His Excellency in council is also pleased to direct, the extracts from the former orders of the honorable the court of directors, relative to servants proceeding on board ship, be now re-published for general information :—

Extract from a public general letter from the Honorable the Court of Directors, dated the 19th August, 1807.

4th.—“ We have resolved, that in future, previous to any black servant, or the wife of any non-commissioned officer or private, either in His Majesty's or the company's service, being allowed to come to England, in attendance upon passengers on board any ship whatever, deposit of £100 instead of £50, as heretofore, be made in the company's treasury, at your presidency.”

Extract from paragraph 17th of a public general letter from the Honorable the Court of Directors, dated the 14th of January, 1809.

“ We think it necessary here to state, that in giving these directions. it was our intention, that the deposit should be made, not only for the return of natives of India, but for that of black servants in general, and we, therefore, now direct, that the prescribed deposit shall be made, for the return of all servants who may be natives of any parts of Asia, or Africa, or other countries whatever, continents, or islands, which are situated within the limits of the Company's exclusive trade.”

Extract from a public general letter from the Honorable the Court of Directors, dated the 22d July, 1814.

69th.—“ We however direct, that in future, upon permission being given for any female European servant to proceed to Europe, the deposit ordered by our general letter of the 19th August, 1817, be made previous to the order for the person to be received on board being delivered, and that it be particularly expressed in the order, whether the female servant is the wife of a non-commissioned officer or private in His Majesty's or the company's service; if so, to what regiment

or corps the husband belongs, and whether it is the woman's intention to apply for leave to return to India."

Extract from a public general letter from the Honorable the Court of Directors, dated the 7th of January, 1820.

4.—“ We have of late received various applications from the wives of soldiers in the company's service, who have come to England in attendance on passengers during the voyage, to be granted a passage back to India, at the company's expense.

These persons have no claim whatever upon the company, and we have resolved not to accede to such applications under any circumstances. We therefore desire, that you will make our determination, in this respect, public, in order that females coming home in the service of individuals may be aware that they cannot entertain any expectation of being returned to India at the company's expense.”

PASSENGERS' BAGGAGE.

Considerable misapprehension is prevailing as to what articles are comprized in the term “ baggage in use,” and so entitled to free duty, it is hereby declared, that the term applies solely to wearing apparel, second-hand, or in use, cabin furniture and trifling personal property, all in use and accompanying; the baggage of overland passengers not accompanying them is also imported free, if it would have been free, had the proprietor come in the ship with it.

The tide-waiter on board each vessel after satisfying himself by inspection, that baggage as above defined, has been in use, will pass it direct from the ship.

Fresh millinery, saddlery, musical instruments, guns, pistols, carriages, wines, spirits, plate, glass, crockery, &c. not used. [although for personal use and not brought for sale] are liable to duty; all packages containing such articles as well as all closed packages, whatever contents may be stated to be, must be sent to the custom house, at the expense of the proprietor, for examination and levy of duty, unless the proprietor can produce to the tide-waiter, a custom house permit or pass, particularly specifying such packages.

Passengers, whose baggage may have been forwarded to the custom house, are requested to apply in writing to the collector of customs at the custom house, for a permit; and such applications should contain the number of packages, and the contents and value of each.

The inward baggage rules having in practice been modified to the extent of allowing free entry to the following articles, viz.

Each lady passenger One closed package of new millinery.
Each gentleman ditto. { One closed case new saddlery, one ditto wearing apparel, and accoutrements, one gun and pair of pistols.

The inspectors will save the collector much trouble by going on board British passenger ships at the time of their arrival off town and passing all such packages.

The inspectors may likewise take the word of any gentleman in the Queen's or Company's service for the contents of any closed packages, and pass direct all such as may not appear to contain dutiable articles.

N. B. The above applies solely to the baggage of passengers arriving from beyond sea. In passing the baggage of passengers to a ship leaving the port, the tide-waiter on board will exercise greater discretion in passing all wearing apparel new or old, furniture and personal property in use, and stores, such as wines, spirits, tea, sugar and biscuits; in short, all edible and drinkable articles, for the consumption of a passenger on board ship.

NOTICE.—Commanders of vessels being in the habit of inserting at the bottom of their manifests “ surplus stores may be landed, if required,” and subsequently importing large quantities of wines, spirits, hams, cheeses and other edible articles, and claiming exemption from the penalties prescribed by section 6th, of the act for goods unmanifested, on the ground, that such importations are comprehended in the manifest under the term surplus stores, notice is hereby given, that in future all goods of the above description, landed in excess of the quantity stated in the victualling bill, will be considered merchandize unmanifested, and be subjected to double duty or confiscation under the above section, as the Board of Customs may be pleased to direct.

All parcels of the above description exceeding 120 tolahs shall be charged at the Bangy Postage rates as in Section XI. of the Act.

NOTE.—The Calcutta Post Office will not receive two Books under the same cover at these rates.

POST OFFICE ACT.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL, 12th August, 1854.

The following Act, passed by the Legislative Council, received the assent of the Most Noble the Governor-General of India on the 12th of August 1854, and is hereby promulgated for general information :

ACT No. XVII. OF 1854.

An Act for the management of the Post Office, for the regulation of the duties of Postage, and for the punishment of offences against the Post Office.

I. Act No. XVII. of 1837, Act No. XX. of 1838, and Act No. XVII. of 1839 are hereby repealed, except so far as they repeal the whole, or any part of any other Act or Regulation, and except as to any act or offence which shall have been done or committed, or to any money which shall have become due, or to any fine or penalty which shall have been incurred, or to any proceedings which shall have been commenced, before this Act shall come into operation.

II. Wheresoever, within the territories under the Government of the East India Company, posts or post communications are, or shall be established by the East India Company, the said East India Company shall have the exclusive privilege of conveying by post, from one place to another, all letters other than letters conveyed by Her Majesty's mails, except in the following cases, and shall also have the exclusive privilege of performing all the incidental services of receiving, collecting, sending, despatching, and delivering all letters, except in the following cases, that is to say :

1. Letters sent by a private friend in his way, journey, or travel, so as such letters be delivered by such friend to the person to whom they shall be directed, without hire, reward, or other profit or advantage, for receiving, carrying, or delivering the same.

2. Letters solely concerning the affairs of the sender or receiver thereof, sent by a messenger on purpose.

3. Letters solely concerning goods or other property sent either by sea or land, to be delivered with the goods or property which such letters concern, without hire, reward, or other profit or advantage, for receiving, carrying or delivering such letters.

But nothing herein contained shall authorize any person to make a collection of such accepted letters for the purpose of sending them in the manner hereby authorized.

III. Wheresoever, within the said territories, posts or post communications are, or shall be established by the East India Company, the following persons are expressly forbidden to collect, carry, or deliver any letter or letters, or to receive any letter for the purpose of carrying or delivering the same, although they shall not receive hire or reward for so doing, that is to say :

1. Common carriers of passengers or goods, and their drivers, servants or agents ; except letters solely concerning goods in their carriages.

2. Owners and Commanders of ships, steamboats, or other vessels passing on any river or canal, or to or from any port in the territories under the Government of the East India Company, and their servants or agents ; except letters solely concerning goods on board.

IV. Every person who shall convey otherwise than by the post a letter not excepted from the said exclusive privilege shall, for every letter so conveyed, forfeit a sum not exceeding fifty rupees ; and every person who shall be in the practice of so convey-

Penalties for breach of privilege.

ing letters not so excepted shall, for every week during which the practice shall be continued, forfeit a further sum not exceeding five hundred rupees; and every person who shall perform otherwise than by the post any services incidental to conveying letters from place to place, whether by receiving, taking up, ordering, collecting, carrying, or delivering a letter or letters not excepted from the said exclusive privilege, shall forfeit for every such letter a sum not exceeding fifty rupees: and every person who shall be in the practice of so performing any such incidental services shall, for every week during which the practice shall be continued, forfeit a further sum not exceeding five hundred rupees; and every person who shall send a letter not excepted from the said exclusive privilege otherwise than by the post, or shall either tender or deliver a letter not so excepted in order to be sent otherwise than by the post, shall forfeit for every such letter a sum not exceeding fifty rupees; and every person who shall be in the practice of committing any of the acts last mentioned shall, for every week during which the practice shall be continued, forfeit a further sum not exceeding five hundred rupees; and every person who shall make a collection of excepted letters for the purpose of sending them otherwise than by the post shall forfeit for every such letter a sum not exceeding fifty rupees; and every person who shall be in the practice of making a collection of excepted letters for such purpose shall forfeit, for every week during which the practice shall continue, a further sum not exceeding five hundred rupees. Every person who shall carry, receive, or deliver a letter, or collect letters contrary to the provisions of Section 3, of this Act, shall forfeit for every such letter a sum not exceeding fifty rupees; and every person who shall be in the practice of committing any of the acts last mentioned shall, for every week during which the practice shall be continued, forfeit a further sum not exceeding five hundred rupees.

V. For carrying on the service of the Post Office, it shall be lawful for the Governor General of India in Council to appoint, or to authorize the local Governments to appoint such Officer or Officers, with such official styles or designations, and to vest them

with, and delegate to them such powers not inconsistent with the provisions of this Act, as the said Governor General of India in Council may deem expedient.

VI. Wheresoever posts or post communications are, or shall be established by the East India Company, postage, if pre-paid by a stamp or stamps, as hereinafter provided, shall be charged by weight on letters transmitted by the letter post by sea or land, or

Postage rates on letters.

partly by sea and partly by land, according to the following scale:

On every letter not exceeding a quarter of a tolah in weight, six pies.

On every letter exceeding a quarter of a tolah, and not exceeding half a tolah in weight, one anna.

On every letter exceeding half a tolah, but not exceeding one tolah in weight, two annas.

On every letter exceeding one tolah, and not exceeding one tolah and a half in weight, three annas.

On every letter exceeding one tolah and a half, and not exceeding two tolahs in weight, four annas.

And for every tolah in weight above two tolahs, two additional annas; and every fraction of a tolah above two tolahs shall be charged as one additional tolah.

Every packet or other article transmitted by the letter post shall be deemed a letter within the meaning of this Section, unless it be a packet or other article on which a different rate of postage shall be chargeable under this Act.

The rates of postage specified in this and the following Section may be charged on all letters or other articles which shall pass through any Post Office, provided that such postage shall not be charged on letters or other articles received through Her Majesty's Mails, when such letters or articles are delivered at the place of receipt; nor on any letter or article transmitted by Her Majesty's Mails, when posted at the place of dispatch of such Mails; nor on any newspaper received by sea otherwise than through the East India Company's post and delivery at the place of receipt; nor on any newspaper posted for dispatch by sea otherwise than through the East India Company's post when posted at the place of dispatch.

VII. Wheresoever posts or post communications are, or shall be established by the East India Company, postage on newspapers, pamphlets,

Postage rates on newspapers, &c.

and other printed or engraved papers transmitted by the letter post by sea or land, or partly by sea and partly by land, shall be charged by weight according to the following scale:*

1. On every imported newspaper, pamphlet, or other printed or engraved paper—

If the same shall not exceed six tolahs in weight, two annas.

If the same shall exceed six, but shall not exceed twelve tolahs in weight, four annas.

If the same shall exceed twelve tolahs in weight, there shall be charged and taken two addi-

tional annas for every six tolahs in weight above twelve tolahs ; and every fraction of six tolahs above twelve tolahs shall be charged as six additional tolahs.

2. On every newspaper, pamphlet, or other printed or engraved paper not imported —

If the same shall not exceed three and a half tolahs in weight, two annas.

If the same shall exceed three and a half tolahs, and not exceed six tolahs in weight, four annas.

If the same shall exceed six tolahs in weight, there shall be charged and taken two additional annas for every three tolahs in weight above six tolahs ; and every fraction of three tolahs above six tolahs in weight shall be charged as three additional tolahs.

An extra or supplement to any newspaper, bearing the same date as the newspaper and transmitted therewith under the same cover, shall be deemed part of the newspaper.

Nothing contained in this Act shall be construed to oblige any person to send any newspaper, pamphlet, or other printed or engraved paper through the Post Office, but it shall be lawful for all persons to send the same in any other manner.

VIII. A newspaper, pamphlet, or other printed or engraved paper shall not be sent by the letter post at the rates prescribed in the preceding Section, unless the following conditions be observed, that is to say :

1. It shall be without a cover, or in a short cover open at both ends.

2. There shall be no word printed on such newspaper, pamphlet, or other printed or engraved paper after its publication, or upon the cover thereof, nor any writing or mark upon it or upon the cover of it, except the name and address of the person to whom it is sent, and the name and address of the sender.

3. There shall be no paper or thing enclosed in or with any such newspaper, pamphlet, or other printed or engraved paper.

IX. Any newspaper, pamphlet, or other printed or engraved paper sent by the letter post, in respect of which the above conditions shall not be observed, shall, together with any thing enclosed in or with the same, be charged with postage at the rate which would be charged on an unstamped letter of equal weight.

X. Proof sheets marked as such may be sent by the letter post at the rates prescribed for newspapers, provided the contents be correctly certified on the cover by the signature in full of the sender, otherwise the same shall be charged with postage at the rate which would be charged on an unstamped letter of equal weight.

XI. Inland banghy postage shall be charged by weight and distance, on parcels sent by the banghy post, according to the following scale :

Provided that several letters shall not be enclosed in a banghy parcel under a penalty not exceeding fifty rupees, and letter postage shall be chargeable on every letter contained therein.

XII. Books, pamphlets, packets of newspapers, and of printed or engraved papers other than newspapers, provided they do not exceed one hundred and twenty tolahs in weight, and be sent without covers or packed in short covers open at both ends, and provided the postage thereon be pre-paid by means of a proper stamp or stamps to be affixed thereon as hereinafter provided, shall, if sent by the banghy post, or by sea as banghy parcels, or partly by the banghy post and partly by sea, be charged with the following rates of postage, without reference to the distance to which they may be carried :

If not exceeding twenty tolahs in weight, one anna.

If exceeding twenty tolahs, but not exceeding forty tolahs in weight, two annas.

And for every twenty tolahs in weight above forty tolahs, there shall be charged and taken one additional anna ; and every fraction of twenty tolahs above forty tolahs shall be charged as twenty additional tolahs.

If any such book, pamphlet, or packet exceed one hundred and twenty tolahs, or if the postage chargeable thereon be not pre-paid as aforesaid, it shall be subject to the rate of postage prescribed for banghy parcels in the preceding Section of this Act.

XIII. Banghy postage, when chargeable by distance under Section XI., shall be calculated and charged according to a Polymetrical Table of distances, showing, as accurately as practicable, the distance by the nearest road between every two Post Office Stations in India, which Table shall be prepared by order of the Governor General of India in Council and corrected from time to time as need be. Each Post Master General shall prepare from the aforesaid Polymetrical Table, in the English and Vernacular languages for the use of every Post Office under his control, a list of all the other Post Offices of India, arranged alphabetically and showing the distance of each of them from the Post Office for the use of which it is made; and such list shall be affixed in some conspicuous place in such Post Office.

XIV. Where there is a banghy post established on any line of road, no letter or other article exceeding twelve tolahs in weight shall be conveyed by the letter post on that line of road, except in such cases and under such restrictions as the Governor General of India in Council may direct; and every letter or other article not exceeding twelve tolahs in weight shall be conveyed by the letter post, unless expressly directed to be sent by the banghy post.

XV. Where there is no banghy post established on any line of road, letters, parcels, and packets exceeding twelve tolahs, and not exceeding forty tolahs in weight, shall be received and transmitted by the letter post. Letters shall be charged according to the scale in Section VI. and newspapers, pamphlets, and other printed or engraved papers according to the scale in Section VII of this Act, as the case may be; parcels and packets shall be charged with banghy postage according to the scale in Section XI. or Section XII. of this Act, as the case may be, if it be certified in writing on such parcel or packet, under the full signature and address of the sender, that it does not contain any letter or other written communication, or any newspaper, pamphlet, or other printed or engraved paper. If any such certificate be false, any such thing contained in such certified letter or other article shall be charged with postage according to the rates specified in Section VI. or Section VII. of this Act as if sent separately, and the sender will be subject to the penalty hereinafter provided. Parcels exceeding forty tolahs, and not exceeding six hundred tolahs in weight, shall be transmitted along any such line as banghy parcels; but it shall be in the discretion of the Post master or Deputy Post Master, to whom such parcels are brought for dispatch, to forward them at such times and in such manner as may be convenient.

XVI. Whenever the Post Master General of any Presidency shall have notified in the official *Gazette*, that the banghy post is conveyed in the same carriage with the letter post along any line of road it shall not be lawful to send by the banghy post any letter or written communication of less weight than twelve tolahs, or any packet of newspapers; and every person who shall knowingly send by the banghy post, along any such line of road, any such letter, written communication, or newspaper enclosed in a parcel, shall forfeit for every such offence a sum not exceeding fifty rupees, and postage shall be charged for every such letter, packet, or newspaper, as if sent separately by the letter post.

XVII. On all parcels chargeable under Section XI. with banghy postage according to distance when conveyed by land, ship postage shall be charged when they are conveyed by means of the East India Company's post by sea according to the following scale, *viz* :
On every parcel not exceeding one hundred tolahs in weight, eight annas.
And for every hundred tolahs in weight above one hundred tolahs, eight additional annas; and every fraction of one hundred tolahs above one hundred tolahs shall be charged as one hundred additional tolahs; and if such parcel be conveyed by the East India Company's post, partly by banghy and partly by sea, ship postage shall be charged in addition to inland banghy postage.

XVIII. No parcel exceeding six hundred tolahs in weight, or three feet in length, or one foot in breadth, or one foot in depth, or two thousand five hundred and ninety-two cubic inches in bulk, shall be received at any Post Office for dispatch either by ship or steam-boat, or by banghy post, except in such

Limitation of weight and dimensions of parcels.

cases and under such restrictions as the Governor General of India in Council shall direct. On parcels exceeding six hundred tolahs in weight, when so forwarded, there shall be charged and taken an additional single rate of banghy postage according to distance for every hundred tolahs above six hundred tolahs; and every fraction of one hundred tolahs above six hundred tolahs shall be charged as one hundred additional tolahs.

XIX. Letters and newspapers posted for dispatch, either by Her Majesty's Mails or otherwise to Ceylon, or to any place to which a post communication shall not have been established by the East India Company, upon which the full amount of postage chargeable under this Act has not been pre-paid by a postage stamp or stamps, shall not be dispatched, but shall be dealt with as unclaimed letters are hereinafter directed to be dealt with. No parcel shall be received for dispatch as above to any such place, unless the full amount of postage chargeable thereon shall be pre-paid in money or by a postage stamp or stamps. Provided that nothing in this Section shall be construed to require the re-payment of British postage on letters, parcels, or other articles, upon which the pre-payment of such postage has been left optional by Her Majesty's Post Master General.

XX. Subject to any alteration which may be made by virtue of the power hereinafter vested in the Governor General of India in Council, letters posted for dispatch, either by sea or land, to any place to which a post communication is, or shall be established by the East India Company, upon which the postage chargeable under Section VI. of this Act has not been pre-paid by a postage stamp or stamps, shall be forwarded to their destination, and upon every such letter double postage shall be charged on delivery. Newspapers, pamphlets, and other printed and engraved papers so posted, not pre-paid by a postage stamp or stamps, shall be forwarded to their destination, and the postage chargeable on them shall be levied on delivery; but no money shall be received at any Post Office in pre-payment of postage on any letter, newspaper, pamphlet, or other printed or engraved paper so posted. On parcels so posted, the postage chargeable according to Section XI. or Section XVII. may be pre-paid in money or by a postage stamp or stamps: when not pre-paid, they shall be forwarded to their destination, and the postage thereon shall be levied on delivery.

XXI. It shall be lawful for the Governor General of India in Council at any time to direct that all or any letters, packets, parcels, or other articles, shall not be forwarded by post, unless the postage thereof shall be pre-paid by means of a proper stamp or stamps; or that on all or any letters, packets, parcels, or other articles on which the postage shall not be pre-paid by a stamp or stamps, or otherwise, as the said Governor General in Council shall direct, there shall be charged such higher rates of postage as from time to time may be deemed expedient, not exceeding double the rates of postage hereinbefore specified.

XXII. If any letter be posted, having affixed thereto a postage stamp or stamps the value of which shall be less than the rate of postage to which such letter would be liable if duly and properly stamped when posted, there shall be charged on such letter a postage of double the amount of the difference between the value of the stamp affixed thereto and the postage to which such letter would be liable as aforesaid if duly and properly stamped when posted. If any parcel, newspaper, pamphlet, or other printed or engraved paper shall be so posted, having affixed thereto any such stamp or stamps, the value of which shall be less than the rate of postage to which the same would be otherwise liable under this Act, there shall be charged thereon a postage equal to the amount of the difference between the value of the stamp or stamps affixed thereto, and the postage to which such parcel, newspaper, pamphlet, or other printed or engraved paper shall be otherwise liable, as aforesaid.

XXIII. On every letter or packet, which shall be re-directed and forwarded by the letter post, from any place to which it shall have been conveyed by the letter post, there shall be charged for the postage thereof from the place at which the same shall be re-directed, in addition to all other postage paid or due thereon, the rate of postage to which it would be liable, if posted and pre-paid by stamp at the place where it shall be re-directed.

XXIV. No person shall knowingly post, or send, or tender, or deliver in order to be sent by the post, any letter, parcel, or packet containing any explosive or other dangerous material or substance; and any person contravening this prohibition shall forfeit for every such offence a sum not exceeding two hundred rupees.

XXV. It shall be lawful for the Governor General of India in Council at any time to authorize the levy of postage at rates different from those prescribed in this Act, provided there be no increase made thereby in any particular of the rates so prescribed except as provided in Section XXI. of this Act.

Governor General of India in Council may alter the rates of postage.

XXVI. No person having delivered into any Post Office any letter, parcel, or packet shall be entitled to recall the same; but nothing in this Section shall prevent the re-delivery of any such letter, parcel, or packet to the sender thereof, subject to such rules and regulations, if any, as the Governor General of India in Council may direct; but newspapers, pamphlets, or other printed or engraved papers may be so recalled or restored, provided that the person claiming the same shall satisfy the Officer in charge of the Post Office that he was the sender thereof, and provided the amount of postage which would have been due thereon, if the same had been forwarded, be paid.

XXVII. The postage charged on letters and packets by Her Majesty's Post Master General under the name of Steamer or British packet postage, or by any other denomination, shall, after the rates of such postage have been published in the official *Gazette* of any presidency be recovered in the same manner as postage chargeable under this Act.

XXVIII. All letters and other articles, having a stamp or stamps affixed thereto, (such stamp or stamps in every case being affixed on the outside and being equal in value to the rate or rates of postage to which such letters or other articles are liable under this Act,) shall, provided the stamp or stamps shall not have been used before, be considered as pre-paid.

XXIX. The Governor General of India in Council shall cause postage stamps to be provided denoting such values as the said Governor General of India in Council may direct, and shall give such orders, and make such other regulations relative thereto, as may be deemed expedient.

XXX. Postage stamps provided as aforesaid shall be under the care and management of such Officer or Officers as the Governor General of India in Council shall direct; and all sums of money realized by the sale of postage stamps shall be carried in the public accounts to the credit of the Post Office.

XXXI. The Governor General of India in Council may make rules for the appointment and government of venders of postage stamps, and thereby direct how and under what terms and conditions postage stamps may be supplied to them for sale; and whether any and what security shall be given by such venders, and whether any and what remuneration or discount shall be allowed to them, and how and in what manner and at what time or times such venders shall keep and render their accounts and pay over the proceeds of any sales made by them or re-deliver the stamps entrusted to them.

XXXII. Government venders of postage stamps shall be bound by such rules, and in case of any wilful breach thereof, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding two hundred rupees, in addition to any other proceedings to which they may be liable.

XXXIII. Any Government vender of postage stamps, who shall be convicted of refusing or unnecessarily delaying, without reasonable excuse, to furnish postage stamps to any person desiring to purchase the same, and tendering in lawful currency the full value thereof (the stamp vender having in his possession for sale sufficient stamps of the description and value required.) shall be subject to a fine not exceeding one hundred rupees.

XXXIV. Any Government vender of postage stamps, convicted of taking from a purchaser a higher price than the value denoted on the stamps sold, shall be deemed guilty of extortion, and shall be punished, on conviction, with imprisonment, with or without hard labor, for any term not exceeding six months, or to a fine not exceeding one hundred rupees, and shall also be liable to refund to the purchaser the whole amount proved to have been taken in excess, which amount may be recovered by such purchaser before a Magistrate in the same manner as any penalty under this Act.

XXXV. Clause 1. If any person shall forge or counterfeit, or cause or procure to be forged or counterfeited, any die, plate, or other instrument used for the purpose of making postage stamps; or if any person shall forge or imitate, or cause to be forged or imitated, any postage stamp; or if any person shall knowingly, and without lawful excuse (the proof of which excuse shall lie on the person accused,) have in his possession any false, forged or counterfeited die, plate or other instrument resembling, or intended to resemble, either wholly or in part, any die, plate, or instrument used for the purpose aforesaid; or if any person shall stamp or mark any paper or other substance with any such false, forged, or counterfeit die, plate, or instrument as aforesaid; or if any person shall knowingly use, utter, sell, or expose for sale, or shall knowingly and without lawful excuse (the proof of which excuse shall lie on the person accused) have in his possession any paper or other substance having thereon the impression of any such false, forged, or counterfeit die, plate, or other instrument as aforesaid; or having thereon any counterfeit stamp resembling, or intended to resemble, or to be mistaken for a postage stamp, such person so offending, and every person knowingly aiding, abetting, or assisting such person in committing any such offence, shall be punished with imprisonment, with or without hard labor, for a term not exceeding seven years, and shall also be liable to fine.

Clause 2. Any Officer of Police may seize and transmit to the Magistrate any such forged or counterfeit die, plate, or other instrument, or any such forged or counterfeit postage stamp.

Clause 3. Any Officer of Police having power by law to search for stolen property may, subject to the provisions under which he is empowered to make such search, proceed to search houses or other places in which there may be reasonable cause to suspect that there is any such forged or counterfeit article, and shall seize and transmit to the Magistrate any such counterfeit article that may be found therein.

XXXVI. If any person shall fraudulently remove any postage stamp from any letter or other thing to which such stamp shall have been affixed; or if any person shall knowingly use any such stamp or stamps so fraudulently removed; or if any person shall fraudulently erase or remove, from any such stamp or stamps, any writing or other matter or thing thereon written or impressed, every person so offending shall forfeit a sum not exceeding two hundred rupees for every such offence.

XXXVII. The person to whom any letter or other article, the postage of which has not been paid, shall be delivered, shall not be bound to pay the postage if he forthwith return the same unopened, but if he open the same, he shall be bound to pay the postage due thereon. If he forthwith return the same unopened, the sender of the letter or packet shall be bound to pay the postage thereof. If any person shall refuse to pay any postage which he is legally bound to pay for any letter or other article, the same may be recovered for the use of the East India Company by any Post Master General, or by any Officer in charge of a Post Office, by order of a Post Master General, in the same manner as a fine may be recovered under this Act; and it shall be lawful for the Officer in charge of any Post Office to withhold from the person so refusing, until such postage be paid, any other letter or packet addressed to that person, not being superscribed as on the public service. Provided always, that if a letter or other article shall appear to the satisfaction of the Post Master of the Office of delivery to have been maliciously sent for the purpose of annoying the person to whom it is addressed the Post Master of the delivery Office may remit the postage.

XXXVIII. Any person posting a letter or other article shall be entitled to require that it shall be registered at the receiving Post Office and that a receipt shall be granted for such registered letter or article, and it shall be lawful for the Governor General in Council to direct, that, in addition to any rates of postage payable under this Act, a fee not exceeding four annas shall be charged on any letter or other article which the sender thereof shall require to be so registered, and such registration fee shall be paid on the letter or other article being delivered at the Post Office.

XXXIX. It shall be lawful for the Governor General of India in Council to fix and order any rate of postage to be charged for the conveyance of letters or other articles by express, in addition to or instead of any other rates of postage chargeable on such letters and articles under this Act.

XL. When any vessel arrives by sea at any place within the territories under the Government of the East India Company at which there is a Post Office, the Commander of such vessel shall, as speedily as possible, cause every letter and packet on board of such vessel, which is directed to that place, and not excepted from the exclusive privilege of the Post Office, to be delivered either at the Post Office or to some Officer of the Post Office authorized to receive the same; and if there be on board any letter or packet directed to any other place, and not excepted from the exclusive privilege aforesaid, the said Commander shall, as speedily as possible, report the same to the Post Master of the place at which he has arrived, and shall act according to the directions he may receive from such Post Master, and the receipt of such Post Master shall discharge such Commander from all responsibility in respect of such letter or packet. Every Commander of a vessel who shall wilfully disobey any of the directions contained in this Section, shall be punished with a fine not exceeding one thousand rupees.

Penalty.

XLI. Every person, being either the Commander of a vessel inward-bound, or any one on board such vessel, who shall, within the said territories, knowingly have in his possession any letter not excepted from the privilege of the Post Office, after any part of the letters on board the said vessel shall have been sent to the Post Office, shall forfeit for every such letter a sum not exceeding fifty rupees, whether the letter be in the baggage or on the person of the offender or otherwise in his custody; and every such person who shall detain any such letter after demand made for the same by an Officer of the Post Office shall forfeit for every such letter a sum not exceeding one hundred rupees.

XLII. For every letter delivered by the Commander of any ship in conformity with the directions of Section 40 of this Act, the Officer in charge of the Post Office shall pay to the said Commander the sum of one anna; and the sum of one anna shall be chargeable as postage on such letter in addition to any other postage chargeable thereon under this Act. Provided that no payment shall be made to the Commander of any vessel on account of the delivery of any letter, unless the claim of such Commander shall be preferred before the vessel leaves the place at which the letter was delivered, or before the expiration of two months from the date of the arrival of such vessel. Provided also, that nothing contained in Sections 40, 41 and 42, of this Act shall extend to any letter or packet conveyed by Her Majesty's Mails.

Bounty money.

XLIII. The Commander of every vessel leaving any place in the said territories by sea shall receive on board of such vessel every letter and packet which he shall be required so to receive by any Officer of the Post Office, and shall give a receipt for such letter or packet; and every Commander of a vessel who shall wilfully disobey any direction contained in this Section shall be punished with a fine not exceeding one thousand rupees.

XLIV. Clause 1. A list of all letters, packets, and parcels posted and addressed to persons who cannot be found, shall be prepared daily in every Post Office and exposed for not less than two weeks in the most conspicuous part of such Office; and all such letters, packets, and parcels, which shall have remained three weeks unclaimed in any Office, shall, if the sender's name and address are written on the cover, be returned to the Posting Office to be delivered to the sender free of all charge; all letters, packets, and parcels, of which the sender's name and address cannot be ascertained, unless they be opened, shall, after remaining unclaimed for three weeks as above, be forwarded to the Office of the Post Master General of the Presidency.

Clause 2. The Post Master General, or some person duly appointed for the purpose and bound to secrecy, shall immediately open all such letters, packets, or parcels, and if the address of the sender can be discovered, shall enclose them in dead letter covers and return them to the sender. All letters, packets, and parcels, of which neither the person addressed nor the sender can be found, shall, after they have remained unclaimed in the Office of the Post Master General for one year, be destroyed.

Clause 3. All money found in any unclaimed letter, packet, or parcel shall be paid into the Public Treasury, and all other valuable property found as above shall be sold by the Post Master General of the Presidency, or by some one duly authorized by him for that purpose, and the proceeds of the sale shall be paid into the Public Treasury for the

Money, &c. found therein.

for that purpose, and the proceeds of the sale shall be paid into the Public Treasury for the

benefit of any person who may have a right thereto, after deducting all sums due from such person for postage.

XLV. Letters, parcels, or packets rejected unopened by the person to whom they are addressed shall be forthwith sent to the Office of the Post Master General of the Presidency, who shall open the letter, parcel, or packet, and take measures to recover the postage from the sender, or shall at his discretion destroy the letter, parcel, or packet; and all money, or other valuable property, which such letter, parcel, or packet may contain shall be disposed of in the manner prescribed in the preceding Section, with respect to such money or property contained in unclaimed letters.

XLVI. On and after the passing of this Act, the privilege of sending and receiving letters and packets by the post, free of postage, whether official or otherwise, shall wholly cease; and all letters and packets, to which any such privilege now extends, shall henceforth be charged with the same rates of postage as any other letters sent by the post. Provided that letters and packets on the public service, certified to be such by the signature of any public officer, authorized in that behalf by the Governor General of India in Council, shall be forwarded by the post as if they were duly stamped, and the postage due thereon shall be charged to the several public departments from which such letters or packets are sent, in such manner as the said Governor General of India in Council shall direct.

XLVII. Every person who shall, for the purpose of defrauding the Post Office Revenue, wilfully certify, by writing, on any official or other letter or packet delivered at any Post Office for conveyance by post, that which is not true in respect of such letter or packet, or in respect of the whole of its contents, or shall knowingly send or deliver, or attempt to send or deliver for conveyance by post, any letter or packet with any such false certificate thereon; and every person who shall knowingly send, or permit to be sent by post, under color or pretence of an official communication, any letter, paper, writing, or other enclosure of a private nature; and every person who shall aid, abet, or conceal any of the offences in this Section above-mentioned shall, for every such offence, forfeit a sum not exceeding five hundred rupees.

XLVIII. If any Officer in charge of a Post Office shall suspect that any letter, parcel, or packet, lying for delivery at his Office, contains any contraband article, or any article on which duty is owing to Government, or that any letter, parcel, or packet lying for delivery at the Post Office, contains any writing or enclosure in contravention of the provisions of Sections 8, 15, 16, or 37, of this Act it shall be lawful for such Officer to summon the person to whom the letter, parcel, or packet is directed to attend at the Post Office by himself or agent within forty-eight hours after the arrival thereof at that Post Office, and to open the same in the presence of the person to whom it is directed, or of that person's agent, and if that person shall not so attend by himself or agent, then to open it in the absence of that person. Provided that if the Officer in charge be under the rank of a Post Master, he shall call in two respectable persons as witnesses before he shall open a letter, parcel, or packet in the absence of the person to whom it is addressed. Provided also, that in all cases the opened letter, parcel, or packet shall be subsequently delivered to the person to whom it is addressed, unless it be required for ulterior proceedings, and that the opening of the same, and the circumstances connected therewith, shall be immediately reported to the Post Master General. It shall also be lawful for any Officer in charge of a Post Office to refuse to forward any parcel or packet through the Post Office by sea to any foreign port or to any place not on the continent of India, unless such parcel be accompanied by a Custom House Pass.

XLIX. The Government shall not be responsible for any loss or damage which may occur in respect of anything entrusted to the Post Office for conveyance, and no person employed by the Government in the Post Office Department shall be responsible for any such loss or damage, unless that person shall cause such loss or damage, negligently, maliciously, or fraudulently.

L. Whoever being in the employ of the Government in the Post Office Department shall fraudulently secrete, make away with, or appropriate any letter, parcel, or packet which may have been entrusted to him, or anything contained in any such letter, parcel, or packet, or shall mutilate or break open any

Penalty for secreting, opening, or making away with letters, &c., by persons employed in the Post Office.

such letter, parcel, or packet, or any baggy parcel or box, with the intention of fraudulently appropriating anything therein contained, shall be punished with imprisonment, with or without hard labor, for a term not exceeding seven years, and shall also be liable to fine.

LI. It shall not be lawful for any person, unless acting by express order of the Government to detain, except for a criminal offence, a Post Office messenger, whilst carrying the mails or to detain any carriage or horse upon which the mails are being carried,

or on any pretence to open a packet in transit from one Post Office to another; and every person who shall be guilty of any of the above-mentioned offences shall be punished with a fine not exceeding five hundred rupees.

LII. Every person who shall fraudulently retain, or wilfully secrete, or make away with, or keep or detain, or being required to deliver up by an Officer of the Post Office, shall neglect or refuse to deliver up a post letter or other article which ought to have been delivered to any other person, or a post letter bag containing a letter or other article or packet which shall have been sent by the post, shall be punished, on conviction before a Magistrate, with imprisonment, with or without hard labor, for a term not exceeding two years, and shall also be liable to fine.

LIII. Every person employed to convey or deliver any post-bag, or any letter, parcel, or packet sent by post, who shall be guilty while so employed of any act of drunkenness, carelessness, or other misconduct, whereby the safety of any such bag or letter, parcel or packet shall be endangered; or who shall loiter or make delay in the conveyance or delivery of any such bag, letter, parcel, or packet; or who shall not use proper care and diligence safely to convey or deliver any such bag, letter, parcel, or packet, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding fifty rupees; and any person employed to deliver a letter, parcel or packet sent by the post, who shall not duly deliver the same, shall, within a reasonable time, not exceeding twenty-four hours, report the fact at the Post Office where he received such letter, parcel, or packet, and return the same; and if any such person shall wilfully make a false report, he shall be liable to a fine not exceeding fifty rupees.

LIV. Whoever being in the employ of the Government in the Post Office Department, and being entrusted to receive money for postage duty or any other public purpose, shall fraudulently appropriate the same, shall be punished on conviction before a Magistrate, with imprisonment, with or without hard labor for a term not exceeding two years, and shall also be liable to fine.

LV. Whoever being in such employ as is described in Section 54 shall fraudulently put any wrong mark on any letter, parcel, or packet, or shall fraudulently alter, remove, or cause to disappear, any mark or stamp which is on any letter or packet, or shall fraudulently use or place with or upon any letter or packet any stamp which shall have been removed from any other letter or cover, or shall aid, abet, or conceal any of the above-named acts, shall be punished, on conviction before a Magistrate, with imprisonment, with or without hard labor, for a term not exceeding two years, and shall also be liable to fine.

LVI. Whoever being in such employ as is described in Section 54, and being entrusted with the preparing or keeping of any document, shall, with a fraudulent intention, prepare that document incorrectly, or alter that document, or shall aid, abet, or conceal any of the abovesaid acts, or secrete or destroy that document, shall be punished, on conviction before a Magistrate, with imprisonment, with or without hard labor, for a term not exceeding two years, and shall also be liable to fine.

LVII. Whoever being in such employ as is described in Section 54, shall send by the post, or put into any post bag, any unstamped letter, parcel, or packet, upon which postage has not been paid or charged in the manner prescribed in this Act, intending thereby to defraud the Government of the postage on such letter, parcel, or packet, or shall aid, abet, or conceal any such acts, shall be punished on conviction before a Magistrate, with imprisonment, with or without hard labor, for a term not exceeding two years, and shall also be liable to fine.

LVIII. Any person, whether a European British subject or not, who shall be guilty of any offence for which, according to the provisions of this Act, he shall be liable to a fine only, shall be punishable, for such offence, by any Justice of the Peace for any of the Presidency Towns of Calcutta, Madras, and Bombay, Magistrate, Joint Magistrate, or person lawfully exercising the powers of Magistrate; and any person hereby made punishable by a Justice of the Peace shall be punishable upon summary conviction.

LIX. No conviction, order, or judgment of any Justice of the Peace shall be quashed for error of form or procedure, but only on the merits, and it shall not be necessary to state on the face of the conviction, order, or judgment, the evidence on which it proceeds, but the depositions taken, or a copy of them, shall be returned with the conviction, order, or judgment, in obedience to any writ of *certiorari*, and if no jurisdiction appears on the face of the conviction, order, or judgment, but the depositions taken supply that defect, the conviction, order, or judgment shall be aided by what so appears in such depositions.

LX. A Magistrate may refer for trial and decision any charge of an offence hereby made punishable by fine only to any of his Assistants, or to any Deputy Magistrate lawfully appointed to exercise the powers of a Covenanted Assistant, and in such case every such Assistant or Deputy Magistrate may exercise all the powers vested in a Magistrate, subject to all the rules applicable to criminal cases deputed to such Assistants or Magistrates acting judicially.

LXI. The local Government may give general authority to any such Assistant or Deputy Magistrate to exercise, without reference by a Magistrate, any of the powers which they are hereby rendered competent to exercise upon reference by a Magistrate, subject to appeal to the Magistrate from any conviction by such Assistant or Deputy Magistrate, within one month from the date of the conviction. Provided that a Magistrate may at any time call from any of his Assistants, or from any Deputy Magistrate subordinate to him, any case pending before such Assistant or Deputy Magistrate.

LXII. All fines imposed under the authority of this Act, for offences punishable by fine only, by any Justice of the Peace, Magistrate, Joint Magistrate, or person lawfully exercising the powers of a Magistrate, or by any Assistant to a Magistrate or Deputy Magistrate, may, in case of nonpayment thereof, be levied by distress and sale of the goods and chattels of the offender, by warrant under the hand of any of the above-named Officers, and in case any such fine shall not be forthwith paid, any such Officer may order the offender to be apprehended and detained in safe custody until the return can be conveniently made to such warrant of distress, unless such party shall give security to the satisfaction of such Officer for his appearance at such place and time as shall be appointed for return of the warrant of distress, and such Officer may take such security by way of recognizance or otherwise; and if upon the return of such warrant, it shall appear that no sufficient distress can be had whereon to levy such fine, and the same shall not be forthwith paid, or in case it shall appear to the satisfaction of such Officer by the confession of the party or otherwise, that he has not sufficient goods and chattels whereupon such fine or sum of money could be levied if a warrant of distress

were issued, any such Officer, by warrant under his hand, may commit the offender to prison, there to be imprisoned only, or to be imprisoned and kept to hard labor, according to the discretion of such Officer, for any term not exceeding two calendar months, where the amount of the fine shall not exceed fifty rupees, and for any term not exceeding four calendar months where the amount shall not exceed one hundred rupees, and for any term not exceeding six calendar months in any other case: the commitment to be determinable in each of the cases aforesaid on payment of the amount.

LXIII. A share not exceeding one moiety of every fine imposed and recovered under this Act may be awarded to the informer.

LXIV. No proceedings shall be taken for the recovery of any such fine without an order of Government, or an order in writing of the Director General of the Post Office, or of a Post Master General.

LXV. If any servant of the East India Company, who shall be employed by the said Company in the Post Office Department, or shall be appointed a vender of postage stamps, or entrusted by the said Company or any of the said local Governments with the sale of postage stamps within the dominions of any Foreign Prince or State in alliance with the said Company, in which a post shall be established by the said Company, shall, within the dominions of such Prince or State, commit any act hereby prohibited, or omit to do any act hereby required to be done, by any person similarly employed, appointed, or entrusted as aforesaid within the territories under the Government of the said Company, such servant of the said Company shall be guilty of an offence, and, on conviction thereof, shall be punished in the same manner as if such act had been done or omitted within the said last-mentioned territories, and every such person may be tried, convicted, and punished, either by fine or otherwise, according to the nature of the offence, by any Court or Officer duly empowered by the Governor General of India in Council to take cognizance of offences committed in such dominions by servants of the East India Company, or by any Court or Magistrate, or other competent Officer, in any part of the territories within the Government of the East India Company, in the same manner as if the offence had been committed in such part of the said territories.

LXVI. The word "Magistrate" in this Act shall include Joint Magistrates and persons lawfully exercising the powers of Magistrates, and the word "fine" shall include a penalty or forfeiture, or a sum of money due upon a forfeited recognizance.

Interpretation.

LXVII. It shall be lawful for the Governor General of India in Council to frame rules for the conduct of the Post Office not inconsistent with this Act, and therein to prescribe the regulations, conditions, and restrictions according to which all letters and other articles shall be posted, forwarded, conveyed, and delivered.

LXVIII. Unless the Governor General of India in Council shall otherwise order, nothing in this Act shall authorize the charge of postage upon printed books, magazines, reviews, or pamphlets (whether British, Colonial, or Foreign) sent through the post from the United Kingdom to any place to which the East India Company, or from such place to the United Kingdom, provided the British postage chargeable thereon be pre-paid.

Books, &c., sent by post to or from the United Kingdom.

there shall be a post established by the Kingdom, provided the British postage

LXIX. It shall be lawful for the Governor General of India in Council, by an order in Council, to direct that postage shall not be chargeable under this Act on any letters or other articles to be specified in such order through the post from any part of the British Dominions to any place to which there shall be a post established by the East India Company, or from such place to any part of the British Dominions, subject to such conditions, as to the pre-payment of British postage or otherwise, as the Governor General of India in Council may think fit

Government General in Council may exempt from postage letters sent to or from the United Kingdom.

LXX. It shall be lawful for the Governor General of India in Council to frame Rules for the management of all or any Zemindaree, Thannah, or other District dawks, and to declare, from time to time, what portions of this Act shall be applicable to such dawks and to persons employed in connexion therewith.

LXXI. This Act shall commence and take effect from and after the first day of October, 1854.

RULES FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF THE POST OFFICE DEPARTMENT.

Passed by the Governor General of India in Council, on the 12th of August, 1854.

I. All existing Rules, General Orders and Proclamations issued by the Government, for the guidance of the Post Office Departments of the different Presidencies and Settlements of India, saving such as relate to Dawk Travelling and matters of account, shall cease to have effect from 1st of October next, and the following Rules and Orders shall be substituted for the same, to be in force at all Post Office Stations in any of the Presidencies, Settlements, or Possessions of the East India Company, and to take effect from the above-mentioned date.

All existing orders passed by Government rescinded.

ent Presidencies and Settlements of India, saving such as relate to Dawk Travelling and matters of account, shall cease to have effect from 1st of October next,

and the following Rules and Orders shall be substituted for the same, to be in force at all Post Office Stations in any of the Presidencies, Settlements, or Possessions of the East India Company, and to take effect from the above-mentioned date.

- II. Letters, papers and parcels shall be received at every Post Office, for despatch by land or sea, to every part of India, to Ceylon, and to every other part of the world with which there is a Post Office communication. Unless specially superscribed for the first despatch by land or by sea, or by some particular ship, they shall be sent by such route as shall appear to the Post Master to afford the means of most speedy and secure transmission. Letters and papers not exceeding 12 tolahs in weight shall also be received at every Receiving House or other place which the Post Master General may appoint. Letters, papers and parcels shall likewise be received for despatch by post as above at every Thannah or District Dawk Office.
- III. Letters, papers or parcels required to be transmitted *via* Great Britain or Ireland to foreign countries must, unless the pre-payment of postage from the United Kingdom to such countries be optional, be addressed to the care of an agent or other person in the United Kingdom, by whom the foreign postage demandable at the London General or other Post Office may be paid. Such postage cannot be received in this country, and unless it be paid through an agent as above described, the letters are liable to be returned to India.
- IV. The name of the sender of any letter, paper or parcel shall not be demanded in any Post Office, whether the postage be pre-paid or not.
- V. Letters, papers or parcels shall be received at any Presidency or Provincial Post Office, or Receiving House, for delivery at the same station, within the ordinary range of delivery.
- VI. Parcels exceeding 600 tolahs in weight may be received at the discretion of any Officer in charge of a Post Office for despatch along any line of road on which the banghy parcels are not carried by foot-runners; but no parcel exceeding 2,000 tolahs in weight shall be received at any Post Office for despatch by banghy or letter mail under any circumstances whatever.
- VII. Parcels received by post from seaward, exceeding the maximum weight, which may be sent by banghy post, shall be made over to the Collector of Customs for publication in his lists of Unclaimed Packages.
- VIII. Newspapers or other printed or engraved papers, packed in open covers or letters certified to be on the Public Service, respecting any of which there is reason to believe that the provisions of the Post Office Act have been infringed, shall not be detained for examination at the Despatching Office, but shall be forwarded marked "Doubtful." The Post Master receiving such letters, &c. by the mail, shall then be guided by the instructions laid down in Section 48, of the Post Office Act; but unless for the causes specified above, and in Sections 37, and 48, of the Post Office Act; all Post Office authorities are prohibited from detaining any letter, paper or packet received for delivery by post.
- IX. All letters, newspapers or other papers and packets received for despatch by post or banghy post, shall be weighed at the Post Office of despatch, and shall be stamped with the office stamp, and marked single, double, &c., as the case may be; and all letters, &c., the full postage on which has not been pre-paid by stamps, shall have the postage to which they are severally liable marked on them. Service letters shall never be re-weighed prior to delivery, nor newspapers, except in case of suspicion. Banghy parcels shall in all cases be re-weighed on delivery. The re-weighing of private letters shall be at the discretion of the Officer in charge.
- X. Persons not belonging to the Department shall not be admitted into the interior, nor permitted to examine the records of any Post Office, without the special permission of the Post Master General, to whom, or to the Post Master, applications for information or redress must be made, either in person, or in writing, by the party requiring the same.

XI. At each Presidency Post Office, banghy parcels will be received every day, Sundays excepted, for despatch, from 10 A. M. till 5 P. M. and newspapers and letters every day till 6 P. M. after which hours, respectively, they will be received till 7 P. M., on payment of an extra half-rupee each, which shall be credited to Government.

XII. At Receiving Houses and places where there are letter-boxes, letters, papers and packets not exceeding 12 tolahs in weight will be received daily from 11 A. M. to 4 P. M. or at such other hours as may be determined by the Post Master General, provided that no Receiving House shall remain open for less than five hours daily, and that letter-boxes for letters unpaid and pre-paid by stamps be kept open, day and night, except for a quarter of an hour subsequent to the time fixed for the closing of each mail.

XIII. At Provincial Post Offices, banghy parcels will be received for despatch from 10 A. M. till 4 P. M., and letters and newspapers till 5 P. M. after which hours respectively they will be received till 5½ P. M., on the sender paying an extra half-rupee each, to be appropriated as provided in Section 11.

XIV. Although all Post Offices will be open for receipt of letters, papers and parcels as above, official references shall be made to Post Office authorities only between the hours of 11 and 5, Sundays excepted.

XV. At each Presidency Post Office, there shall be three deliveries daily, the first delivery not to be later than 7, the second at 11 A. M. and the third at 3 P. M. at which hours respectively, the peons shall quit the Office with the letters, &c. entrusted to them, all letters, papers and parcels received from 3 P. M. till 5 A. M. shall be sent out at the first delivery, all from 5 to 10 A. M. at the second delivery, and all from 10 A. M. to 3 P. M. at the third delivery, and mails received after 3 P. M. shall not ordinarily be opened till the following morning, except when received by Express or from seaward.

XVI. At Provincial Post Offices the delivery of letters, papers and parcels must depend upon the hour of the arrival of the mails at each station, after which they shall be delivered with all possible despatch.

XVII. The delivering peons are prohibited from going out of their usual course to deliver letters, papers or parcels and from delivering them without immediate payment of the exact amount of postage; and they are not bound to give change. Should they be subject to detention, they are not to deliver the letters, papers or parcels, but to return them in the evening to the Post Office for delivery the following day.

XVIII. Whatever postage is marked on a letter, paper or parcel must be paid at once on delivery, after which any complaint of over-charge will be duly attended to. In all complaints of over-charge or unnecessary delay in delivering letters, papers or parcels, the covers or envelopes bearing the Post Office stamp must be presented for inspection and when any complaints are preferred against any peon, the number on his badge should be specified.

XIX. From each Presidency Post Office the mails shall be despatched daily at 8 P. M. and the banghies as soon after as possible.

XX. At Provincial Post Offices the packets for all mails to be despatched in the course of the night shall be finally closed at 6 P. M. but for mails which usually pass in the course of the day, the packets shall be made up half an hour before the time appointed for the arrival of such mails which are in no case to be subjected to any detention beyond the regulated time. Notice of the hour at which such packet is closed shall be hung up outside the Office, both in English and in the language of the district, after which hour, letters, papers or parcels received shall not be forwarded till the following day, unless such mails should not arrive until after 6 P. M., in which case a second packet shall be made up.

- XXI.** The Post Master at any station, or person in charge of the Office, shall have power to refuse letters, papers or parcels bearing the appearance of having been opened and re-closed, or otherwise improperly dealt with, unless the writer or sender thereof shall attest with his full signature, that they were sent in that state.
- Letters, &c., damaged, not to be received.
- XXII.** In order to protect, as far as possible, the public mails from the chance of robbery, Officers in charge of Post Offices shall not knowingly receive coin, bullion, precious stones or jewels for despatch, either by letter or banghy post.
- Post Offices not to receive valuables for despatch.
- XXIII.** The servants at the several Post Offices are prohibited from giving change to parties sending or receiving letters in any case.
- Post Office prohibited from giving change.
- XXIV.** Letters will be registered on payment of a fee of 4 annas, and parties posting such letters will be furnished with a receipt bearing the address of the letter and the office stamp. The fee must in all cases be paid in money. On the delivery of a registered letter a receipt for the same must be given to the delivery peon.
- Registered letters.
- XXV.** Receipts will not be granted for any letters or papers received at any Post Office for despatch, except in the case of registered letters; and will be granted for parcels only when presented ready written, either in books or on separate slips of paper along with the parcels. Receipts so presented will be duly stamped.
- Receipts will not be given for letters, &c.
- XXVI.** On the arrival of any ship or vessel off any British Indian port, a printed notice, under the signature of the Post Master of the port or station, shall be delivered to the Commander by the first boat despatched to board the vessel, according to the requisition of which, the Commander shall proceed to dispose of such packets as he may have on board, as directed in Section XL. of the Post Office Act. a copy of which Clause shall be communicated to the said Commander.
- Notice to arriving vessels for disposal of packets.
- XXVII.** The Master Attendant of each Presidency port, or such other Officer as may be directed by Government, shall furnish the Post Master with early intimation of the intended departure of all vessels to any part of the world, and the Post Master shall cause a list of the vessels for which packets are open to be published weekly in the official *Gazette* of his own Presidency.
- Master Attendant to notify intended departure for all vessels.
- Post Master to publish weekly lists.
- XXVIII.** The Post Master shall also cause to be published weekly, in the official *Gazette* of the Presidency, a notice of the several dates up to which packets have been despatched by each vessel carrying a mail, that may have left the port.
- Post Master to publish weekly notice of packets despatched.
- XXIX.** All public despatches are to be made up in the most compact form possible, and whenever two or more letters are despatched from any one Office to the same individual, by the same day's post, they are to be put up under one cover, provided they do not, in the aggregate, exceed 12 tolas weight.
- Public despatches to be compactly made up.
- XXX.** When the number of covers received at any Post Office shall cause the weight of the mail to exceed the regulated weight, the Post Master is authorized to keep back a portion of the heavier public despatches and imported newspapers till the following day, but private letters and public letters marked "Despatch" shall not be kept back.
- When bulk of mails exceeds regulated weight how to be disposed of.
- XXXI.** Despatches to be transmitted by Express must bear on the face of them the words "By Express," and the signature in full of the Officer sending them.
- Expresses.
- XXXII.** As the employment of Expresses interferes with the celerity and regularity of the ordinary mails, and is attended with expense, public Officers are enjoined to employ them as sparingly as possible, and any public Officer despatching an Express, when the exigency of the Public Service does not, in the opinion of the authority to whom he is subordinate, require it, will be held answerable for the expenses attending that method of transmission. Public Expresses from a Presidency Post Office can only be ordered by a Secretary to Government.
- Public Officers to employ them sparingly under a penalty.

- XXXIII.** Expresses may be employed by private individuals at the discretion of the Post Master applied to, on payment being made at the rate of 4 annas per mile in advance.
- XXXIV.** Letters directed to Native Officers, or men of their Regiments or Detachments, shall be delivered to an Orderly, or any other fit person, who shall be deputed by the Officer Commanding the Regiment or Detachment to receive the same; but letters on which postage may be due shall not be delivered to such person, unless the postage be first paid.
- XXXV.** Letters which individuals address on their private affairs to any Government Officer must be sent pre-paid by stamps; and this rule is to be understood to include letters transmitting Bills of Exchange, Promissory Notes, Receipts, Government Securities, &c., to the Accountant General, Government Agent, or any other public Officer. When public Officers write letters on such subjects to individuals, they shall subscribe on the envelopes, with their official signatures, the words "Bearing Postage."
- XXXVI.** The postage on letters and parcels sent on the Public Service, by the public Officers mentioned in the subjoined lists, shall be charged to the Departments to which they severally belong; such letters must be addressed according to the subjoined form:—
- Expresses for private persons.
Commanding Officers may receive letters for their own Regiments.
Letters addressed to public Officers on private affairs to be pre-paid by stamps.
Public Officers write letters on such subjects with their official signatures, the words "Bearing Postage."
- Postage on letters on Public Service to be charged to the Department to which Officers signing them belong.

N. B.—The privilege of sending letters by post, without actual payment of postage, extends only to letters exclusively on the Public Service, and all Public Officers are prohibited from sending on service letters relating to the private concerns of individuals, though they may be in reply to communications addressed to them in their official capacity. Such letters must either be pre-paid by stamps, or sent bearing postage.

All Periodical Returns and Reports, and all letters not of an important or confidential nature are to be packed in covers open at each end.

Letters on the Public Service, not intended to be permanently retained on record, are to be written on paper of the smallest size (compatible with clear and legible writing.)

XXXVII. All letters, papers and packets whatever, received at any Post Office in India, for despatch by post, whether paid, stamped, or liable to postage, as the case may be, are to be marked with the appropriate stamp, bearing the name of such Office of despatch; and when slide stamps, showing the date of the month and year, are not provided, the said date must be entered in writing across the middle of the face of the stamp. If the letter or packet received for despatch be bearing postage, the amount of postage due must be entered in writing on the face of the letter.

XXXVIII. All letters, papers and packets whatever, received at any Post Office, by post, for delivery at such Office, are in like manner to be stamped with the appropriate office stamp, and marked with the date of the month and year; but the amount of postage paid or due is not to be marked, unless the letter has been under-charged with postage at the Despatching Office.

- XXXIX. All postage stamps on letters, papers, or parcels must be carefully obliterated with the stamp furnished for that object; and the black composition supplied for the purpose must be used in all cases. Letters bearing stamps, which have been obliterated or defaced, must be treated as unpaid letters.
- Obliterating stamp.
- XL. No Post Master is allowed to affix a postage stamp to a letter brought unstamped to his Office.
- Post Master not himself to affix a stamp on letters, &c.
- XLI. Forward letters, papers or packets, *i. e.*, those which follow a party addressed from station to station, are to be stamped at each Office of fresh despatch and marked with the additional postage due on such fresh despatch.
- Forward letters, &c., to be stamped and marked with additional postage.
- XLII. On banghy parcels the exact weight must in all cases be entered in writing on the face thereof.
- Extra weight of banghy parcels to be marked.
- XLIII. Supplementary rules, regarding the shape and size of the office stamps to be used on the several description of letters, shall be, when necessary, circulated by the Director General of the Post Office.
- Other letters, &c., how to be stamped.
- XLIV. At such Post Offices as have more than one delivery daily, all letters, papers and packets must be marked with a stamp, showing at which delivery they were distributed.
- At such Post Offices as have more than one delivery daily, letters, &c., to be stamped A. M. or P. M., according to time of delivery.

GENERAL RULES RELATING TO THE RECEIPT, DESPATCH AND DELIVERY OF LETTERS BY DISTRICT POSTS.

Approved of by the Governor General of India in Council, on the 12th August, 1854.

1. WHEREVER any local establishment may be maintained for the conveyance or delivery of the Police, Revenue or other official communications, it shall also be made use of for the conveyance and delivery of private correspondence, and be designated a District Post.
2. All Office or Road establishments, attached to any District Post, will be under the control and management of the Officer to whom they may be entrusted by the Local Government.
3. Such Police Stations and other Public Offices, as may be selected by the Local Government, shall be constituted District Post Offices, but this shall remain under the management and supervision of the same officials who are at present in charge of them.
4. A Letter Box, with a slit in the top or side, shall be fixed in a conspicuous place outside of every District Post Office. The words "Letter Box," in English and the Vernacular of the district shall be painted on each box in legible characters.
5. All letters (except those to be specially registered,) intended for despatch from any District Post Office, must be dropped into the Letter Box. No receipt will be given. Every letter posted at a District Post Office must have its proper postage stamp affixed to it.
6. Any person wishing to post a registered letter at any District Post Office can do so on payment of a registry fee of four annas, in addition to the ordinary postage chargeable on the letter, according to its weight. A receipt in the proper form must, in all cases, be given to the poster of a registered letter, whether it be demanded or not. One anna of the registration fee will be allowed to the person registering the letter, the remaining three annas must be sent with the letter by the same day's despatch to the nearest Post Office.
7. Every District Post Office will be supplied by the Post Office Department with registered letter covers, forms of receipt and of register, and with the rules relating to registered letters.
8. Except when it may be opened for the purpose of taking out the letters preparatory to their despatch, the Letter Box shall remain locked, the key being in custody of the person in charge of the Office.
9. Fifteen minutes before the hour at which the despatches of the Office are usually made up, the Letter Box will be opened and the letters in it taken out. Those addressed to places to which there is direct communication through the District Post will be separated from all other letters, sorted and packed in covers addressed to the Officer in charge of the District Post Office from which they will be delivered. The remaining letters will be made up into one packet and addressed to the nearest Post Office with which he has a communication.

10. A Chulan or Letter Bill in the Vernacular (Form 1) will be sent with every packet despatched from a District Office to a Post Office. The Deputy Post Master or person in charge of the Post Office will, after satisfying himself that the contents of the packet agree with the Chulan, copy the entries into his register, sign, and by the next day's despatch return the Chulan. The receipted Chulans will be filed and form the only record in any District Post Office of the despatches made from it.

11. All Chulans are to be numbered consecutively in a series, commencing on the 1st of May; and if any District Post Office is in the habit of sending packets to more than one Post Office, the Chulans sent to each Post Office will be numbered in a separate series.

12. All letters sent from one District Post Office to another will be accompanied by a Chulan (Form 2), which will be receipted and returned to the Despatching Office, to be filed as a record.

13. All letters received at any Post Office, the address of persons resident in the same district, but beyond the limits of any ordinary post delivery, will, if the Post Office be at the head-quarters of the district, be sent with a Chulan (Form 1) to the Officer in charge of the District Post, to be by him sorted and forwarded to the District Post Offices of the several sub-divisions in which the residence of the addressees may be situated.

14. Persons in charge of Post Offices in the interior of districts receiving letters for persons residing beyond the limits of their ordinary delivery, but within the sub-division of a District Post Office with which they have direct communication, will send them, if pre-paid, for delivery to that Office, with a Chulan (Form 1.) Letters for persons resident in the district, but within a subdivision with which the Receiving Office has no direct communication, must be sent to the Post Office of the head-quarters of the district. All letters bearing postage for delivery in the interior must be sent to the Post Office at the head-quarters of the district.

15. Officers in charge of District Post Offices will carefully compare with the Chulan the contents of every packet received. If the Chulan is correct, it will be receipted and returned; if not correct, the discrepancies will be noted thereon.

16. A delivery book (Form 3,) showing the names of persons entrusted with the delivery of letters, will be kept in every District Post Office, and be the only record of letters received for delivery.

17. Letters will be delivered by such persons and under such rules as the Local Government may from time to time determine. Every person, through whom any District Post letter may be delivered, is authorized to receive a fee of one pice (a fourth of an anna) for his own use, in addition to any unpaid postage which may be due on it.

18. All postage realized on letters sent from any Post Office for delivery through the District Post will be remitted every Saturday to the Post Office at the head-quarters of the district with the remittance book (Form 4.) The person in charge of the Post Office will give a receipt for the amount in the opposite column and return the book by the first despatch. At the close of the month, a balance will be struck, showing the postage still due to the Post Office on letters which have been received; this balance will be brought forward and a new account commenced on the 1st of the following month.

19. All letters, which from any cause cannot be delivered, will be returned with as little delay as possible to the Post Office from which they were received and if any unpaid postage be due on them, credit for the amount will be taken in the remittance book. Unpaid letters are never, under any circumstances, to be sent from one District Post Office to another.

20. A monthly memorandum (Form 5.) showing the number of letters received for delivery at each District Post Office, will be prepared by the person in charge and sent on the 2nd of the following month to the Officer in charge of the Post Office at the head-quarters of the district. Persons in charge of Post Offices will prepare similar memoranda and send them to the Post Office at the head-quarters of the district. The Officer in charge will, before the 15th of each month, prepare a general statement showing the number of letters posted at, and delivered through the agency of the District Post Office in the preceding month.

NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC.

As Act No. XVII. of 1854 "for the management of the Post Office, the regulation of duties of postage, and for the punishment of offences against the Post Office," will come into operation on the 1st of October next, the attention of the public is drawn to some of the most material of the changes which have been made in the rates of postage to be paid, and to the conditions under which letters, banghy-parcels, newspapers, pamphlets, &c., will be conveyed by post.

On and after the 1st October, 1854, no money payments will be received at any Post Office on account of letters to be despatched pre-paid; letters which the sender wishes to despatch pre-paid, must have postage stamp labels pasted or gummed on them, of value sufficient to cover the postage.

If the value of the stamps affixed to any letter be less than the full amount of postage chargeable, twice the difference between the value of the stamps affixed and the proper postage will be charged on delivery.

Letters sent unpaid, will, on delivery, be charged double postage.

Parcels, newspapers, pamphlets and printed and engraved papers may be sent paid or unpaid, at the discretion of the sender.

No receipt will be given for any but registered letters, on which the authorised registration fee has been paid.

Letters re-directed or forwarded, will be charged in addition to the postage paid or due on them, with the rate of postage which they would be liable to, had they been posted and pre-paid at the place at which they may be re-directed.

Provided that the full amount of postage is pre-paid, the following rates of postage will be charged for the conveyance of a letter from one Post Office to another within the territories under the Government of the East India Company, without reference to the distance to which it may be carried:—

For every tolah weight above two tolahs, two additional annas, or 4 rates of postage. Every fraction of a tolah above two tolahs will be charged as an additional tolah.

Postage stamp labels should be pasted or gummed on the upper right hand corner of the letter, on the side of which the direction is written, as in the specimen given in the margin. Postage stamps can only be used once.

The postage chargeable on a newspaper, pamphlet, or other printed or engraved paper published in India, and not exceeding $3\frac{1}{4}$ tolahs in weight, will be two annas; without reference to the distance to which it may be conveyed. Imported newspapers, &c., not exceeding 6 tolahs in weight, will be conveyed for the same charge. The conditions under which newspapers are received and transmitted by post, remain unaltered.

When Letter and Banghy Mails are conveyed in the same carriage, letters must not be enclosed in Banghy Parcels, under a penalty of 50 Rupees.

On all parcels chargeable with Banghy postage according to distance when conveyed by land, Ship-postage is chargeable when they are conveyed by means of the East India Company's post by Sea, according to the following scale, viz.:

On every parcel not exceeding one hundred tolahs in weight, eight annas.

And for every hundred tolahs in weight, above one hundred tolahs, eight additional annas; and every fraction of one hundred tolahs above one hundred tolahs, shall be charged as one hundred additional tolahs; and if such parcel be conveyed by the East India Company's post, partly by Banghy and partly by Sea, Ship-postage shall be charged in addition to inland Banghy Postage.

No person shall knowingly post or send, or tender, or deliver in order to be sent by the post, any letter, parcel or packet, containing any explosive or other dangerous material or substance; and any person contravening this prohibition, shall forfeit for every such offence, a sum not exceeding Two Hundred Rupees. Section 21, Act XVII. of 1854.

Postage stamps, in small quantities, can be purchased for Cash at every Post Office and Receiving House, and from every licensed stamp vender. Persons requiring more than nine rupees' worth of stamps, can procure them at any public Treasury, and will be entitled to receive a discount at the rate of four annas for every nine rupees paid.

Unclaimed letters, if the sender's name and address be written on the cover, will be returned to the Posting Office, to be delivered to the sender free of all charge. If the sender's name and address is not on the cover, the letters will be sent to the Post Master General of the Presidency, to be by him opened and returned (if possible) to the sender.

No letter on which the Indian rate of postage is not pre-paid, can be despatched by H. M.'s Mails, or to any place to which a communication shall not have been established by the East India Company.

Letters conveyed by the East India Company's packets or posts from place to place by Sea, or partly by land and partly by Sea, are liable to Inland postage only. But letters sent by Her Majesty's Mail Packets, are liable to British packet postage, and letters sent or received by private ship, are chargeable on delivery with a Ship-postage of one anna in addition to the Inland Postage chargeable according to their weight under Act No. XVII. of 1854.

Letter boxes for the receipt of unpaid and stamped letters, will remain open at every Post Office day and night, except for a quarter of an hour after the hour fixed for the closing of each Mail.

Letters may be registered on payment of a fee of four annas, which must be pre-paid. A receipt will be given to the person posting a registered letter, and a receipt will be demanded from the addressee on the letter being delivered.

POSTAGE STAMPS.

THE sale of Postage Stamp Labels to the Public commenced on the 20th September, 1854.

The Stamps now available are of the value of Half Anna, One Anna, Two Annas, and Four Annas.

The Calcutta Postage Stamps can be purchased at the Office of the Collector of Calcutta and at the General Post Office.

Purchasers of Stamps of the value of nine Rupees or more, will be entitled to discount at the rate of four annas for every nine Rupees paid. This discount will be allowed *only on stamps purchased at a public Treasury.*

Persons wishing to purchase a smaller number of Stamps than nine Rupees worth can procure them at the Post Office or from any Licensed Judicial Stamp-vender, but on such purchases no discount will be claimable.

Before dropping any letter into the Letter Box, care should be taken that the Postage Stamps by which the Postage is paid are firmly attached to the letter, and that the gum or paste is dry.

Letters found in the Box without Stamps will be liable to be despatched bearing Postage, and will in that case be charged with double Postage on delivery.

REDUCTION OF THE RATES OF NEWSPAPER POSTAGES.

The 16th October, 1854.

The Most Noble the Governor General in Council is pleased, under the authority vested in him by Section 25 of Act No. XVII. of 1854, to direct that the single Postage on Newspapers, Pamphlets and other printed or engraved Papers shall be one Anna.

From and after the 1st November next, the Postage on every imported Newspaper, Pamphlet or other printed or engraved Paper shall be one Anna, if the same shall not exceed six tolahs in weight, two Annas if the same shall exceed six but shall not exceed twelve tolahs in weight, and one additional Anna shall be charged for every six tolahs, or a fraction thereof, in weight above twelve tolahs.

The postage on every Newspaper, Pamphlet or other printed or engraved Paper not imported shall be one Anna, if the same shall not exceed three-and-a-half tolahs in weight; two Annas, if the same shall exceed three-and-a-half tolahs and not exceed six tolahs, and one additional Anna shall be charged for every three tolahs, or a portion thereof, in weight above six tolahs.

IMPORTANT NOTICE.

THE attention of the public is drawn to Section 19 of the Post Office Act, which directs that no Letter or Newspaper shall be despatched by *Her Majesty's Mails or otherwise to any place beyond the Territories of the East India Company* unless the full amount of Indian postage has been pre-paid by a Stamp or Stamps. If such letters are posted, they are to be treated as unclaimed letters. It must also be observed, that when, according to the instructions received from Her Majesty's Post Master General, pre-payment is ordered of the Steam postage on letters for despatch by Her Majesty's Contract Mail Steamers, such letters cannot be despatched unless the proper amount of postage is pre-paid by Stamps.

The annexed Table gives full information regarding the rates of Steam postage and the places to which pre-payment is optional or otherwise; by attention to it, all risk of inconvenience will be obviated. It must be remembered that Post Masters have no discretion allowed them: they must act according to the Rules prescribed.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL—23RD DECEMBER, 1854.

THE following Act, passed by the Legislative Council, received the assent of the Most Noble the Governor General of India on the 23rd of December, 1854, and is hereby promulgated for general information :—

ACT NO. XXXIV. OF 1854.

An Act for regulating the establishment and management of Electric Telegraphs in India.

WHEREAS it is expedient that provision should be made for regulating the establishment and management of lines of Electric Telegraph in India, enacted as follows :—

Preamble.

I. Within the territories in the possession and under the Government of the East India Company, the said East India Company shall have the exclusive privilege of establishing lines of Electric Telegraph. Provided that the Governor General of India in Council may grant a license to any person or Company to establish a line of Electric Telegraph within any part of such territories, which license shall be revocable on the breach of any of the conditions therein contained.

The E. I. Company to have the exclusive privilege of establishing Electric Telegraphs.

Company to establish a line of Electric Telegraph within any part of such territories, which license shall be revocable on the breach of any of the conditions therein contained.

Proviso.

II. Whoever shall, otherwise than under a license duly granted as aforesaid, establish or after revocation of such license maintain a line of Electric Telegraph within the said territories, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding one thousand rupees, and for every week during which such line shall be maintained shall be liable to a further fine not exceeding five hundred rupees.

Penalties for establishing or maintaining unauthorized Electric Telegraphs.

III. Whoever shall use a line of Electric Telegraph, knowing or having reason to believe that it is an unlicensed line, for the purpose of sending or receiving messages, or shall perform any service incidental thereto, shall, for every such offence, be liable to a fine not exceeding fifty rupees.

Penalty for using or working such Telegraphs.

IV. The Governor General of India in Council may, on the occurrence of any public emergency, take temporary possession of any line of Electric Telegraph established under license within the said territories.

Government may take possession of Telegraphs established by license.

V. Any Railway Company, on being required so to do by the Governor General of India in Council, shall permit the Government to establish upon the land of such Company adjoining the line of Railway a line of Electric Telegraph, and shall give every reasonable facility for establishing and using the same.

Government may establish Telegraph on land of Railway Company.

VI. The Governor General of India in Council may from time to time frame rules for the conduct of Electric Telegraphs established by Government not inconsistent with this Act, and therein prescribe the regulations, conditions, and restrictions according to which all messages and signals shall be transmitted.

Governor General in Council to frame rules for the conduct of Government Telegraphs.

VII. The Government shall not be responsible for any loss or damage which may occur in consequence of any person employed by the Government in the Electric Telegraph Department failing to transmit with accuracy any message entrusted to him for transmission; and no such person shall be responsible for any such loss or damage, unless he shall cause the same negligently, maliciously, or fraudulently.

Government not responsible for loss or damage.

VIII. Whoever shall without permission enter into a Government Telegraph Office, or shall refuse to quit the same on being requested to do so by any officer or servant employed therein, or shall wilfully obstruct or impede any such officer or servant in the performance of his duty, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding one hundred rupees.

No person to intrude into a Telegraph Office.

IX. Whoever shall wilfully cause or attempt to cause any interruption to the transmission of signals along a line of Electric Telegraph established by the Government, by cutting or injuring the wire, or by injuring any portion of the line, or any instrument or apparatus, or by any other means, shall be liable to be imprisoned, with or without hard labour, for a term not exceeding two years, or to fine, or to both.

Penalties for cutting the line.

- X. Whoever shall wilfully or negligently damage or injure any post or any portion of the line of such Electric Telegraph, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding fifty rupees.
- Injuring posts, &c.
- XI. Whoever, being in the employ of the Government in the Electric Telegraph Department, shall fraudulently or maliciously secrets, make away with, alter, or omit to transmit any message which he may have received for transmission, or shall fraudulently or maliciously disclose any message so received by him and directed to be kept secret, shall be liable to be imprisoned, with or without hard labour, for a term not exceeding two years, or to fine, or to both.
- Penalties for fraudulently omitting to transmit messages or for disclosing secret messages.
- XII. Whoever being in such employ shall be guilty of any act of drunkenness, carelessness, or other misconduct, whereby the transmission or delivery of any message shall be endangered, or who shall loiter or make delay in the transmission or delivery of any message, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding one hundred rupees.
- Penalty for misconduct.
- XIII. Whoever being in such employ shall transmit by the Electric Telegraph any message upon which the prescribed charge has not been paid, intending thereby to defraud the Government shall be liable to be imprisoned, with or without hard labour, for a term not exceeding two years, or to fine, or to both.
- Penalties for sending messages without payment to Government.
- XIV. Whoever shall fraudulently or maliciously transmit or cause to be transmitted by an Electric Telegraph established by Government a message which he knows to be false or fabricated, shall be liable to be imprisoned, with or without hard labour, for a term not exceeding two years, or to fine, or both.
- Penalties for transmission of fabricated messages.
- XV. Any person not being a European British subject, who shall, beyond the local limits of the jurisdiction of her Majesty's Supreme Court of Judicature, commit any of the offences mentioned in Sections IX. XI. XIII. and XIV. of this Act, shall be punishable upon conviction by any Magistrate within whose jurisdiction the offence shall be committed.
- Persons other than European British subjects liable to be punished.
- XVI. Any person, whether a European British subject or not, who shall be guilty of any offence for which, according to the provisions of this Act, he shall be liable to a fine only, shall be punishable for such offence by any Justice of the Peace for any of the Presidency Towns of Calcutta, Madras, and Bombay, or for any of the Settlements of Prince of Wales' Island, Singapore, and Malacca, Magistrate, Joint Magistrate, or person lawfully exercising the powers of Magistrate, within whose jurisdiction the offence shall be committed; and any person hereby made punishable by a Justice of the Peace, shall be punishable upon summary conviction.
- Fines how to be recovered.
- XVII. No conviction, order, or judgment of any Justice of the Peace shall be quashed for error of form or procedure, but only on the merits; and it shall not be necessary to state on the face of the conviction, order, or judgment, the evidence on which it proceeds: but the depositions taken, or a copy of them, shall be returned with the conviction, order, or judgment, in obedience to any writ of *certiorari*; and if no jurisdiction appears on the face of the conviction, order, or judgment, but the depositions taken supply that defect, the conviction, order, or judgment shall be aided by what so appears in such depositions.
- Conviction to be quashed on merits only. Form of conviction, &c.
- XVIII. A Magistrate may refer for trial and decision any charge of an offence hereby made punishable by fine only, to any of his Assistants or to any Deputy Magistrate lawfully appointed to exercise the powers of a Covenanted Assistant; and in such case every such Assistant or Deputy Magistrate may exercise all the powers vested in a Magistrate, subject to all the rules applicable to criminal cases deputed to such Assistants or Magistrates acting judicially.
- Magistrate may refer charge to his Assistants.
- XIX. The local Government may give general authority to any such Assistant or Deputy Magistrate to exercise, without reference by a Magistrate, any of the powers which they are hereby rendered competent to exercise upon reference by a Magistrate, subject to appeal to the Magistrate from any conviction by such Assistant or Deputy Magistrate, within one month from the date of the conviction. Provided that a Magistrate may at any time call from any of

his Assistants, or from any Deputy Magistrate subordinate to him, any case pending before such Assistant or Deputy Magistrate.

XX. All fines imposed under the authority of this Act, for offences punishable by fine only, by any Justice of the Peace, Magistrate, Joint Magistrate, or person lawfully exercising the powers of a Magistrate, or by any Assistant to a Magistrate, or Deputy Magistrate, may, in case of non-payment thereof, be levied by distress and sale of the goods and chattels of the offender, by warrant under the hand of any of the above-named Officers; and in case any such fine shall not be forthwith paid, any such Officer may order the offender to be apprehended and detained in safe custody until the return can be conveniently made to such warrant of distress, unless such party shall give security to the satisfaction of such Officer for his appearance at such place and time as shall be appointed for the return of the warrant of distress, and such Officer may take such security by way of recognizance or otherwise; and if, upon the return of such warrant, it shall appear that no sufficient distress can be had whereon to levy such fine, and the same shall not be forthwith paid, or in case it shall appear to the satisfaction of such Officer, by the confession of the party or otherwise, that he has not sufficient goods and chattels whereupon such fine or sum of money could be levied if a warrant of distress were issued, any such Officer by warrant under his hand may commit the offender to prison, there to be imprisoned only, or to be imprisoned and kept to hard labour, according to the discretion of such Officer, for any term not exceeding two calendar months where the amount of the fine shall not exceed fifty rupees, and for any term not exceeding four calendar months where the amount shall not exceed one hundred rupees, and for any term not exceeding six calendar months in any other case; the commitment to be determinable in each of the cases aforesaid on payment of the amount.

XXI. If any Servant of the East India Company, employed in the Electric Telegraph Department within the dominions of any Foreign Prince or State in alliance with the said Company, in which an Electric Telegraph is established by the said Company, shall, within the dominions of such Prince or State, commit any act hereby prohibited, or omit to do any act hereby required to be done by any person similarly employed within the territories under the Government of the said Company, such Servant of the said Company shall be guilty of an offence, and on conviction thereof shall be punished in the same manner as if such act had been done or omitted within the said last mentioned territories; and every such person may be tried, convicted, and punished either by fine or otherwise, according to the nature of the offence, by any Court or Officer duly empowered by the Governor General of India in Council to take cognizance of offences committed in such dominions by servants of the East India Company, or by any Court or Magistrate or other competent Officer in any part of the territories within the Government of the East India Company, in the same manner as if the offence had been committed in such part of the said territories.

XXII. The word "Magistrate" in this Act shall include Joint Magistrates and persons lawfully exercising the powers of Magistrates; and the word "Fine" shall include a penalty or forfeiture.

XXIII. It shall be lawful for the Governor General in Council to frame rules for the conduct of any Electric Telegraph established by license under this Act, and to declare from time to time what portions of this Act shall be applicable to such Telegraph and to persons using the same or employed in connexion therewith.

XXIV. Government to frame rules for Telegraphs established by license.

NEW RULES FOR LEAVE OF ABSENCE TO CIVIL SERVANTS,
LAW OFFICERS, CHAPLAINS, &c.

No. 32.

Fort William, Financial Department, the 25th August, 1854.

The Most Noble the Governor General in Council is pleased to direct that the following Despatches from the Hon'ble the Court of Directors and the Rules passed in conformity with the instructions therein conveyed, be published for general information :-

Public Department, No. 23 of 1854. Our Governor General of India in Council.

1. By the provisions of Section 32 of the new Act for the Government of India the prohibition of the receipt by our Servants, of any part of their Indian Allowances while absent in Europe is repealed, and as the legal obstacle to carrying out our views for the complete revision of the Rules for the grant of Leave of Absence to our Civil Servants under Sick Certificate, or on Furlough, is thus removed, we lose no time in conveying our instructions on this important subject, a measure which we have long had in contemplation.

2. The present Rules allow of the absence of Civil Servants from their Stations under Medical Certificate within the limits of their Presidencies, for a period of two years with retention of Office, but subject to a deduction of one-third from the salary.

Leave on Medical Certificate.

thereof for the whole period of absence. They allow a Civil Servant to proceed under Medical Certificate to any place beyond the limits of the Presidency to which he belongs, but within the limits of the Company's Charter for any period not exceeding two years, without loss of office, but subject to deduction* from the Salary thereof to the extent specified in the margin.

3. After having given our best consideration to the subject we propose to adopt the following Rules in lieu of those which have been referred to. We do not think it necessary, adverting to the increased facility of communication which has been afforded by the improved means of transport, and which the construction of Railroads in India will further increase, to maintain the restriction as to places and geographical limits which are now imposed by the regulations on Officers absent on Sick Leave. We are disposed to permit any Officer of this class to proceed to any place in India, in Europe, or elsewhere, as he may consider most conducive to the restoration of his health, and we intend therefore to impose no restrictions whatever as to the places to which he may resort.

If not more than Rs. 500 per month, no deduction for the 1st year, and only so much of the $\frac{1}{4}$ th as will reduce it to Rs. 500 if above that sum— for the 2nd year $\frac{1}{4}$ th.

4. The following conditions must in future attach to Leaves of Absence granted to Servants who shall have resided ten years and upwards in India and who may be declared by a sufficient Medical Certificate to require such leave for the recovery of their health.

1st. The total period of absence with the privileges hereinafter provided, shall not (save as specially excepted in para. 5 of this Despatch) exceed eighteen months in the whole, nor shall it exceed fifteen months on any one occasion.

2nd. The Office of the Absentee will be considered to be vacated if he shall be absent beyond eighteen months altogether, or beyond fifteen months at any one time, such absence to be computed, if he shall proceed to a Sanitarium within the Presidency from the date of his arrival thereat, if to any place beyond the Presidency but within the Continent of India from the date of his reaching the limits of his own Presidency, and if he shall proceed to Sea, from the date of the sailing of the vessel on which he may have embarked, from any Port in India which is not more distant from his Station than the Ports of his own Presidency, to the date of his arrival at any Port within the Presidency to which he belongs, or at any other Port which is not more distant from his Station than the Ports of his own Presidency.

3rd. The Absentee will be entitled to draw a moiety of his Salary, and the same will be paid to him during such period of absence provided that he shall in no case draw a larger sum than Rupees 10,000 (£1000) per annum during that period. In cases in which the emolument of the Absentee's Office does not exceed Rupees 5000 per annum, no deduction therefrom shall be made for the period of eighteen months, nor shall such a deduction be made in other cases as shall reduce the allowance below Rupees 5,000 (£500) per annum.

4th. If the Absentee be compelled by the state of his health, under due Medical Certificate, to remain absent for a longer period than eighteen months, or fifteen months, at any one time, he will as before stated, vacate his appointment, but he will be permitted to receive an allowance at the rate of £500 per annum for such further period of absence as shall not exceed the entire term of three years in the whole. At the expiration of that term, all allowance must cease until the Servants return to India.

5. If a Civil Servant of more than fifteen years service after having been absent on Sick Leave for eighteen months in the whole or for fifteen months at one time, at whatever period of his service such Sick Leave shall have been taken shall be again compelled by the same cause to apply for Leave of Absence, your Government and those of the subordinate Presidencies may on special grounds grant Leave of Absence for one further period not exceeding six months, during which the Absentee may retain his Office and half his salary under the limits above enjoined.

6. If a Civil Servant after fifteen years service shall be compelled by ill-health to apply for further Leave of Absence he may be permitted on special grounds to obtain it, but his Absence will involve the loss of Office and Salary, we shall however vest in your Government and in the subordinate Governments respectively, a discretionary power to grant in such last mentioned cases a Sick Absentee Allowance not exceeding Rupees 5,000 or £500 per annum for a further period not exceeding twelve months.

7. With regard to Junior Civil Servants who may be compelled by Sickness certified in a similar manner, to quit their Stations before the completion of ten years' residence, we have resolved to modify the existing rule by limiting the period of absence to eighteen months, or fifteen months at any one time. They will not retain their appointments, but we shall permit them to draw during this period, an allowance at the rate of £250 per annum as at present, and if any Junior Servant absent as aforesaid be prevented by the state of his health under due

Medical certificate, from returning to his duty at the end of the periods above-named, he will be permitted to continue absent for a further term not exceeding eighteen months with the same allowance.

8. A Junior Civil Servant having enjoyed either of the above-named advantages will not be entitled to the Leave of Absence provided for Servants of more than ten years service, after he shall have attained that standing, but if after he has attained it, he shall be compelled again by ill-health, to quit his Station, and provided that his former periods of absence shall have fallen short of three years in the aggregate, he may be permitted, under medical Certificate, to receive a further Leave of Absence for such a period as shall make up the entire length of absence to three years, and during that additional period he shall receive an allowance at the rate of £500 per annum. He will however be entitled after fifteen years service to the benefit of the special leave authorized to be granted according to paras. 5 and 6 of this Despatch.

9. None of the above-mentioned Rules will be applicable to Members of Council, each Member, may however, with the special sanction of the Government, be permitted to be absent under Medical Certificate, for a period not exceeding six months, retaining his Office and receiving half his salary, which shall be paid to him during such absence, but if his absence shall exceed six months his Office will be vacated.

10. The privilege of retaining Office and a portion of salary for a limited period when on Sick Leave, will render it necessary that great attention should be paid to the Medical Certificates which may be produced by applicants for this leave. It is most essential to provide against any abuse of this privilege, and we desire that your immediate attention may be given to this subject with the view of such strict Regulations being framed as may prevent certificates being obtained on insufficient grounds. You will forward to us the Regulations that you may think requisite for this purpose.

11. It appearing that the existing Rules with respect to the grant of Leave of Absence on Private Affairs for short periods work well on the whole, we do not propose to make any change in them. The maximum continuous period for which such leave can be granted (without loss of Office) will therefore continue to be four months, *viz.* one month privilege leave, and three months "special leave" on sufficient cause being shown as provided in the present Rule.

12. We have on many former occasions adverted to the evils connected with the multiplication of *Acting Appointments* and we rely upon your exercising the most vigilant attention that the repeated and particular instructions addressed to you from time to time upon this subject may be carried into effect, and especially those contained in our Financial Letter of the 3rd July 1844, No. 11.

13. You will not fail also to recollect, that it is to be held as a principle not to be departed from that no expense to Government is to ensue from the absence of Officers from their Stations whether on Sick Leave or on short Furlough on Private Affairs, and you will therefore so regulate the sums to be paid to the persons holding Acting Appointments as to ensure that the aggregate amount of Official Salaries and emoluments shall on the one hand be appropriated to the liberal remuneration of the Acting Officers, and on the other hand cover the expense of the sums paid to the Absentees. We desire that an annual account may be transmitted to us showing how this Rule is carried out at each of the Presidencies.

14. In place of the period of three years (in one term) for which the Furlough is now granted, we have determined to concede to our Civil Servants the option of taking a Furlough of three years as at present or of dividing the Furlough into two periods which may either be of one or two years respectively, or of eighteen months each, provided that in every such case the Civil Servant shall declare on taking his Furlough, whether he intends it to be for twelve, eighteen or twenty-four months, in order that the Government may make its arrangements accordingly. In case of such division the first Furlough to be taken after residence of not less than ten years and the second Furlough after a further residence in India of ten years from the date of return from the first Furlough. But Civil Servants returning on Furlough to this Country will continue as at present to vacate their Offices.

15. Having thus regulated the periods of Furlough, we shall continue to grant for those periods, the Furlough Allowance at present given, namely, £500 per annum.

16. We shall not encourage the grant of extensions of Furlough beyond the prescribed period, nor shall we, upon any ground whatever, permit the receipt of Furlough Allowance for any longer period than three years under the Rules above stated.

17. Civil Servants who may have been compelled by Sickness to quit their duty under Medical Certificate before completing ten years' residence, will be entitled to receive during their Furlough on Private Affairs taken subsequently to their completion of that period of residence the ordinary Furlough Allowance of £500 per annum for three years.

18. In applying the foregoing Rules in substitution of those now existing, periods of absence

to the limit of three years, either on Medical Certificate or on Furlough Private Affairs, will count as Service in India in the twenty-five years entitling to the Annuity, the present qualification of twenty-two years' residence being retained. Periods of short Leave of Absence on Private Affairs taken in India will count as Service and residence as at present.

19. In the above Regulations we have endeavoured to provide for the efficiency of the Public Service while we have been anxious to extend every fair and reasonable allowance to our Servants, and considering the present Rules for the grant of leave to the Cape, &c., to admit of much abuse which cannot fail to be disadvantageous to the Public Service, it is our desire that the new Rules with regard to Sick Leave shall apply to all our Servants from the date of their promulgation.

20. We entirely concur in the opinion expressed in paras. 5 and 6, of your Despatch in this Department, dated the 3rd May 1850, No. 21, that it is advisable to prescribe by Rules, some period of service after which Civil Servants shall not be appointed to any new Office, nor be permitted to retain Office which they may have held for a period of five years and upwards, and we have resolved to establish thirty-five years as the period of service for the purpose in question. This Rule must, as you suggest be subject to exceptions in special cases which are to be referred for our decision. In such cases, your recommendation will not fail to receive our prompt consideration. The above Rule may be applied to every Civil Servant appointed to Office after its promulgation, and to the case of every other Civil Servant to whom it relates, at the close of five years from the date of its promulgation.

21. We desire that the Rules for the grant of Leave of Absence on Sick Certificate and on Furlough, be at once modified in accordance with the views contained in this Despatch, and that Copies thereof be transmitted to us.

22. Military Officers employed in the Civil Department will be subject to the Rules laid down in our Military Despatch, dated the 30th December 1853, No. 18, for the grant of Leave of Absence and Furlough to Officers holding Military Staff Appointments.

23. You will communicate this Despatch to the Governments of Madras and Bombay and to the Lieutenant-Governor N. W. Provinces together with Copies of the Rules so soon as they shall have been revised.

OUR GOVERNOR GENERAL OF INDIA IN COUNCIL.

Para. 1. Since our Despatch in this Department dated the 5th April 1854, No. 23, on the subject of the Civil Furlough and Absentee Rules was prepared, we have received your Financial letter of the 16th December 1853, No. 73, enclosing a Memorial from several Members of the Bengal Civil Service praying for such modification of section 11 of the existing Code, as will allow of the privilege leave of one month in each year being accumulated at the option of the Civil Servant for two or three years, after which leave may be taken, at the pleasure of Government, for either two or three months, (as the case may be) without deduction from allowances.

2. Section 11 formerly provided for the grant of privilege leave on the terms now solicited, and the old Regulation was altered in the year 1843, on the last occasion of the general revision of the Absentee Rules by your Government.

3. We have no objection to modify the Rule in accordance with the request of the Service, and with your recommendation, and to authorize you, should you consider that the Fund formed by deductions from the salaries of Absentees will admit of this additional charge upon it, to grant privilege leaves free of all deduction, even in cases in which some expense may be occasioned by the temporary absence.

4. The Government of Bengal having in their letter to you on the above subject, alluded to the question of Deputation Allowances, we refer you to para. 13, of our Public Despatch, dated 5th April 1854, No. 23, wherein we have authorized you to lay down such Rules as will "ensure that the aggregate amount of Official Salaries and Emoluments shall, on the one hand, be appropriated to the liberal remuneration of the Acting Officers, and, on the other hand cover the expense of the sums paid to the Absentees. We can of course, have no wish that the state should derive financial gain in consequence of the absence of our Servants, although we think it proper to insist that no extra charge shall thereby be incurred. Within that necessary limit, you may deal as liberally as you may be able, with the temporary occupants of the Offices of Absentees.

5. Our attention has also been given to the question of including the Law Officers of the Company in the new Code of Absentee Regulations. On several occasions we have received memorials upon this subject, which we have treated in the Judicial Department; and so lately as the year 1852, a memorial was addressed to us by the Law Officers at the three Presidencies, praying to be granted the privilege of a Furlough to Europe.

6. We cannot extend to the Law Officers any boon which is not conceded to our Civil Servants, and as the retention of Office during Furlough on Private Affairs is prohibited, any rule for granting Furlough to Law Officers would be inoperative.

7. As respects Sick Leave, the following is the only Rule which has yet been applied to them. "Whenever* our Advocate General or Attorney may quit the Presidency and proceed

to Sea, the Local Government is to appoint a competent person to Act, during his absence, the Absentee receiving one-half of the salary for the period of his Absence, not exceeding 18 months, and the locum tenens receiving the other half for that period, and

after its expiration the whole. In cases of absence a second time, the Absentee is to receive no part of the salary, the whole of which is to be paid to the Officiating Advocate or Attorney."

8. We have resolved to substitute for the foregoing rule, the rules which we have laid down for the grant of Sick Leave and short leave on Private Affairs, to our Civil Servants, both as respects the periods of absence and the limitation of allowances during such absence. Leave will of course only be granted at the convenience of the Government, and no additional expense will, on any consideration, be incurred by the Government on account thereof. If any Law Officer shall quit his duty, save on leave under Medical Certificate, or on short leave on private Affairs, he will be considered to have vacated his appointment.

9. We desire that Rules may at once be framed in accordance with the views expressed in this Despatch, and that the same be embodied in the new Code, and circulated for information and guidance.

ECCLESIASTICAL DEPARTMENT, NO. 2 OF 1854.

OUR GOVERNOR GENERAL OF INDIA IN COUNCIL.

Para. 1.—Having considered the position of Members of our Ecclesiastical Establishments in connexion with the Rules which we have lately laid down for the grant of Furlough and Leave of Absence to our Civil and Military, we have determined that Chaplains and Assistant Chaplains shall be entitled to take Furlough on Private Affairs and on Medical Certificate on the same terms and conditions as Military Officers, with the following modifications:—

1st.—Chaplains being allowed to retire after twenty years' service, the period of furlough (Private Affairs) must in their case, be limited to the present term of three years. The Furlough may, however, either be taken in one period, or be divided into two periods, whether of eighteen months each, or of two years and one year respectively, and, if divided, the first Furlough may be taken, as at present, after seven years' residence, and the second Furlough after a further residence of ten years in India. As respects Chaplains and Assistant Chaplains appointed before the 11th January 1854, when the period of service was only eighteen years, their second Furlough, if they should exercise the option of taking Furlough in two periods, will be available after a second residence in India for a term of eight years.

2nd.—No Furlough or Leave of Absence, whether on Private Affairs or on Sick Certificate, taken in Europe, or elsewhere out of India, in excess of three years, will be allowed to count as service in India, in the twenty years which qualifies Chaplains for their Retaining Pensions.

3. The Furlough Pay of Chaplains will remain as at present. With regard to their allowance during Sick Leave to any place out of India, we have resolved that, in accordance with the principle adopted for Military Officers, they shall receive salary, (but at a rate not exceeding £600 per annum) for the first six months of absence, and for the remaining twelve months an allowance equal to the Furlough pay of their standing. If the leave be extended an allowance equal to Furlough pay may be drawn for a further period of eighteen months.

4. You will communicate this Despatch to the Governments of the Subordinate Presidencies.

THE following Rules for the grant of Leave of Absence for regulating Deductions from Salaries and Deputation Allowances, and for limiting the period of Service of Civil Servants, will take effect in all the Presidencies and Settlements under the Government of India from the 1st October 1854, in supersession of the Rules of the 17th May, 1843.

CHAPTER I.

RULES FOR APPLICATION FOR LEAVE OF ABSENCE.

Section I. No Leave of Absence from any Office or Station can be granted, but by the Government under which the employment is held, and

NOTE.—This Rule must be considered as superseding the Rule under which Commissioners of the Land Revenue and other Officers have heretofore been allowed to grant Leave of Absence in Bengal.

Section II. The official allowances of the holder of a Civil Office quitting his Station without leave will entirely cease from the date of his quitting until his return, or, in the event of his subsequently obtaining leave, to the date of such leave being granted to him.

Section III. No Leave of Absence shall have any retrospective effect, except in cases of severe illness, to be attested by Medical Certificate, conforming in every respect to the directions contained in Section 5.

CHAPTER II.

RULES FOR SICK LEAVE.

Section IV. Upon application duly made, the Government may grant Leave of Absence on Medical Certificate to any Civil Servant, to any place in India, in Europe, or elsewhere, as he may consider most conducive to the restoration of his health, without any restrictions whatever as to the places to which he may resort.

Section V. When an application for Leave of Absence is made on the ground of ill-health, it must be accompanied by a Certificate and a Statement of the case from the Medical Officer, by whom the applicant has been attended, distinctly stating, from personal observation, the nature of the disease, the symptoms by which it is manifested, the period during which it has existed, as far as the knowledge of the Medical Officer extends, and the necessity for temporary removal to some other place in India, or in Europe, or elsewhere, as laid down in Section 4; and in case of the applicant visiting the Presidency preparatory to obtaining leave, the Certificate must be counter-signed by the Members of the Medical Board, on their being satisfied, on a perusal of the Medical Attendant's statement of the case, that the leave applied for is absolutely necessary towards his recovery. Should the applicant's Medical Attendant be of opinion that he ought to proceed to a Sanitarium or other place without visiting the Presidency, the Certificate must, in the first instance, be counter-signed by the Superintending Surgeon of the Division in which the applicant may be located, and afterwards submitted with the statement of the case for the consideration and counter-signature of the Members of the Medical Board.

The Certificate shall be given in the following form:—

I, A. B., Surgeon at or of _____ do hereby certify that E. F., of the Civil Service, is in a bad state of health, and I solemnly and sincerely declare that, according to the best of my judgment, a change of air is essentially necessary to his recovery, and do therefore recommend that he may be permitted to proceed to Sea, (or to such place as the Surgeon may think proper, expressing it in the Certificate.)

The following form shall be observed by the Members of the Medical Board or the Superintending Surgeon, in counter-signing the Surgeon's Certificate:—

We (or I) do hereby certify, that, according to the best of our (or my) professional judgment, after careful personal examination of his case, we (or I) consider the state of health of E. F. to be such as to render Leave of Absence for a period of _____ absolutely necessary (or highly desirable) for his recovery.

An application for extension of leave must, if the applicant be in India, be accompanied by a Certificate to a like effect from the Medical Officer by whom the applicant is attended, together with a statement showing sufficient reason for this extension solicited; and such Certificate

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d beyond the Territories
under the Government of the East India Company, he must furnish a Certificate and Statement to the required effect from a Surgeon or Physician at the place of his temporary residence by

whom he has been attended, such attendance, and the period of it to be stated, and the Certificate to be counter-signed by the Examining Physician of the East India Company, if the applicant is in England, or if not in England, by the principal Medical authority of the Colony or Country to which the Absentee may have proceeded, or some sufficient reason stated for the want of such counter-signature if the Certificate be not so counter-signed. The Medical Board or Superintending Surgeon, before counter-signing a Certificate as above-mentioned, must either personally examine the applicant or state some sufficient reason why they, or he, have or hath been unable to do so. When any of the required particulars are neglected, leave will be refused.

Section VI. The following conditions will in future attach to leaves of Absence granted to Servants who shall have resided ten years and upwards in India, and who may be declared by a sufficient Medical Certificate to require such leave for the recovery of their health:—

1st.—The total period of absence, with the privileges hereinafter provided, shall not (save as specially excepted in Section 7 of these Rules) exceed eighteen months in the whole, nor shall it exceed fifteen months on any one occasion.

2ndly.—The office of the absentee will be considered to be vacated if he shall be absent beyond eighteen months altogether, or beyond fifteen months at any one time, such absence to be computed, if he shall proceed to a Sanitarium within the Presidency, from the date of his arrival thereat; if to any place beyond the Presidency, but within the Continent of India, from the date of his reaching the limits of his own Presidency; and if he shall proceed to Sea, from the date of the sailing of the Vessel on which he may have embarked from any Port in India which is not more distant from his Station than the Ports of his own Presidency, to the date of his arrival at any Port within the Presidency to which he belongs, or at any other Port which is not more distant from his Station than the Ports of his own Presidency.

3rdly.—The absentee will be entitled to draw a moiety of his salary, and the same will be paid to him during such period of absence, provided that he shall in no case draw a larger sum than Rupees 10,000 (£1,000) per annum, during that period. In cases in which the emolument of the absentee's office does not exceed Rupees 5,000 per annum, no deduction therefrom shall be made for the period of eighteen months, nor shall such a deduction be made in other cases as shall reduce the allowance below Rupees 5,000 (£500) per annum.

4thly.—If the absentee be compelled by the state of his health, under due Medical Certificate, to remain absent for a longer period than eighteen months, or fifteen months at any one time, he will, as before stated, vacate his appointment, but he will be permitted to receive an allowance at the rate of £500 per annum, for such further period of absence as shall not exceed the entire term of three years in the whole. At the expiration of that term, all allowances must cease until the Servant's return to India.

Section VII. If a Civil Servant of more than fifteen years' service, after having been absent on sick leave for eighteen months in the whole, or for fifteen months at one time, at whatever period of his service such Sick Leave shall have been taken, shall be again compelled by the same cause to apply for Leave of Absence, the Government of India and the subordinate Governments may, on special grounds, grant Leave of Absence for one further period not exceeding six months, during which the absentee may retain his office, and half his salary under the limits above enjoined.

Section VIII. If a Civil Servant, after fifteen years' service, shall be compelled by ill health to apply for further Leave of Absence, he may be permitted on special grounds to obtain it, but his absence will involve the loss of office and salary; the Government of India and the subordinate Governments will however, respectively, exercise a discretionary power to grant, in such last-mentioned cases, a sick absentee allowance, not exceeding Rupees 5,000 or £500 per annum, for a further period not exceeding twelve months.

Section IX. Junior Civil Servants, who may be compelled by sickness, certified as aforesaid, to quit their Stations before the completion of ten years' residence in India, will be allowed to be absent for eighteen months in the whole or fifteen months at any one time. They will not retain their appointments, but they will be permitted to draw, during this period, an allowance at the rate of £250 per annum as at present; and if any Junior Servant, absent as aforesaid, be prevented by the state of his health, under due Medical Certificate, from returning to his duty at the end of the periods above-named, he will be permitted to continue absent for a further term, not exceeding eighteen months, with the same allowance.

Section X. A Junior Civil Servant, having enjoyed either of the above-named advantages, will not be entitled to the Leave of Absence provided for Servants of more than ten years' service, after he shall have attained that standing, but if after he has attained it, he shall be

Certificate, to receive a further Leave of Absence for such a period as shall make up the entire length of absence to three years, and during that additional period he shall receive an allowance at the rate of £500 per annum. He will however be entitled, after fifteen years' service, to the

benefit of the special leave authorized to be granted according to Sections 7 and 8 of these Rules.

Section XI. None of the above-mentioned Rules will be applicable to Members of Council. Each Member may, however, with the special sanction of the Government, be permitted to be absent, under Medical Certificate, for a period not exceeding six months, retaining his office and receiving half his salary, which shall be paid to him during such absence, but if his absence shall exceed six months, his office will be vacated.

Section XII. Civil Servants who may desire to draw their allowances while absent on account of sickness under the above Rules, will be required to give security in such amount and form as may be fixed by the Government for the refund of any excess that may be drawn either by the Agents at the Presidency or by themselves in case of their coming under retrenchment.

CHAPTER III.

RULES FOR SHORT LEAVE ON PRIVATE AFFAIRS.

Section XIII. The Government may grant to Civil Servants Leave of Absence to any place or places in the Continent of India, whether within the Territories subject to the Government of India or not, or to proceed to the Island of St. Helena, the Colony of the Cape of Good Hope, or to any place situate between the 36th degree of North latitude and the 50th degree of South latitude, such place being likewise between the 30th and the 180th degrees of longitude East of Greenwich, excepting however any Islands in the Mediterranean or Levant, and excepting all places within the said geographical limits which may form part of Europe, for one month in each year, without deduction from the salaries and emoluments drawn by such Servants—such leave, however, will only be granted when the Government is satisfied that no inconvenience will arise from the departure of the Officer seeking it. No second leave can be granted under this Rule until the completion of eleven months from the expiration of the last leave; but Servants not availing themselves of the indulgence in any one year, may obtain, under the like conditions Leave of Absence for two successive months, to commence at or after the expiration of twenty-two months from the termination of their former leave; and if two years elapse without enjoyment of the privilege, leave for three months may, in like manner, be granted at the expiration of thirty-three months from the termination of the last preceding leave; but no leave shall be granted under this Rule for any period exceeding three months. If an Officer shall not return at the expiration of the period of leave granted him under this Rule, he shall forfeit all pay and allowances during the time of his remaining so absent without leave, and if he shall so continue absent for more than one month beyond the term granted, his office shall become vacant.

Civil Servants absent from their Stations under Medical Certificate cannot be admitted to leave under this Rule in continuation of their sick leave; and if, while absent under this Rule, they be granted extended leave under Medical Certificate, they shall be considered liable to the Rules applicable to Leave of Absence on Medical Certificate for the whole period of their absence.

Civil Servants who have been absent on Medical Certificate during any portion of a calendar year are not entitled to leave under this Rule during that year; but in determining the interval necessary to entitle a person to leave under this Rule, no reference will be made to any intermediate Leave of Absence that may have been granted under Section 15.

Section XIV. As a general Rule, when leave is granted under Section 13, such leave will be in one period only, whether for a whole month or less, and not in detached portions to complete one month within the year, and the term year shall be held to mean the calendar year commencing with the 1st of January and ending with the 31st of December, but as an exception to this Rule, it shall be discretionary with the several Local Governments, where good cause is shown for the indulgence, and it is attended with no public inconvenience, to sanction Leave of Absence under this Rule to such parties as may not have occasion to apply for the whole at once, in instalments, not to exceed in the aggregate one month within the calendar year, on the understanding that no leave can be granted for any fresh calendar year until the completion of three months from the expiration of the entire leave or of the last instalments of leave taken in the past calendar year.

Section XV. The Government may, on sufficient cause being shown, grant to a Civil Servant special Leave of Absence on Private Affairs for three months, to any place or places within the limits mentioned in Section 13, provided, however, that if any Officer to whom such leave shall be granted shall be absent from his Station for any period exceeding that to which he may be entitled without deduction, under Section 13, the absentee shall for the period in excess, draw no more than one-half of his salary and allowances. After an absence of three months (exclusive of any period which may be granted under Section 13) any office held by the absentee shall become vacant.

CHAPTER IV.

FURLOUGHS ON PRIVATE AFFAIRS.

Section XVI. In the place of the period of three years (in one term,) from which Furlough has hitherto been granted, Civil Servants will be allowed the option of taking a Furlough of three years as at present, or of dividing the Furlough into two periods, which may either be of one or two years respectively, or of eighteen months each, provided that, in every such case the Civil Servant shall declare, on taking his Furlough, whether he intends it to be for twelve, eighteen, or twenty-four months, in order that the Government may make its arrangements accordingly. In case of such division, the first Furlough to be taken after a residence of not less than ten years, and the second Furlough after a further residence in India of ten years from the date of return from the first Furlough; but Civil Servants returning on Furlough to Europe will continue, as at present, to vacate their offices.

Section XVII. The Furlough Allowance granted during the periods mentioned in the last Section will be at the rate of £500 per annum, and the receipt of it will not, on any grounds whatever, be permitted for any longer period than three years.

Section XVIII. Civil Servants who may have been compelled by sickness to quit their duty under Medical Certificate, before completing ten years' residence in India, will be entitled to receive during their Furlough on Private Affairs, taken subsequently on their completion of that period of residence, the ordinary Furlough Allowance of £500 per annum for three years.

Section XIX. In applying the foregoing Rules in substitution of those before existing, periods of absence to the limit of three years, either on Medical Certificate, or on Furlough on Private Affairs, will count as service in India in the twenty-five years entitling to the annuity, the present qualification of twenty-two years' residence being retained. Periods of short Leave of Absence on private affairs taken in India will count as service and residence as at present.

Section XX. Military Officers employed in the Civil Department will be subject to the Rules laid down in the Court's Military Despatch dated the 30th December 1853, No. 18, for the grant of Leave of Absence and Furlough to Officers holding Military Staff Appointment.

CHAPTER V.

RULES FOR JOINING STATIONS.

Section XXI. There shall be allowed to Officers appointed to any new Office the periods of one month, two months, or three months for joining, accordingly as the distance may not exceed 300 or 600 miles, or be in excess of the last-mentioned distance.

NOTE.—The time allowed for joining is computed from the date of the Order reaching the Officer appointed. Officers not joining their Station within the said periods, respectively, shall forfeit their salary for the time delayed in excess of the above periods, and if such excess shall exceed one month, the office shall be vacated, unless otherwise specially ordered by Government.

Section XXII. Upon the first appointment of any Civil Servant, who shall be reported qualified for Public Service by the Examiners appointed by the Government, to any Civil Station, there shall be allowed for travelling expenses to the Station, an allowance at the rate of 8 annas per mile by the direct Post Road, according to the Polymetrical Tables of the Post Office, the Bill for which allowance will be passed by the Civil Auditor after the Officer shall have joined the Station: if required in advance, an order of the Government shall be necessary.

Section XXIII. The salary of office will be payable from the date only of the Officer joining, but in case of Junior Civil Servants, the salary of Assistants will be payable from the date of their being reported qualified for the Public Service, unless forfeited under the preceding Rule, through delay in joining the Station to which they may be appointed.

Section XXIV. In case of a change of office, when an Officer is appointed to a higher situation, he shall not draw the higher salary until he joins. For the period occupied in travelling, the Rule No. XXI., regulating the time and distance for joining Station, shall be applicable, and the Officer will, for the periods allowed in that Rule respectively, draw out of the salary of the office he is about to join, a sum equal to that of his previous situation.

CHAPTER VI.

RULES FOR DEPUTATION ALLOWANCES.

Section XXV. The sum of Company's Rupees 52,200 per annum having been fixed, under the orders of the Court of Directors, as the maximum salary of Civil Offices for the offices of Government under the situation of Member of Council, Civil Servants

NOTE.—This Rule will equally apply in case of a Political Resident taking a

leave of one, two or three months, for which in other cases he would suffer no deduction. The excess above the maximum monthly salary will in that case be enjoyed by the person in charge.

who may draw larger allowances than this annual sum, as a consolidated personal and sumptuary allowance, in consideration of the necessary expenses of their position, will, in all cases of absence, be treated in respect to deductions as drawing only the allowance thus limited, and the excess above the monthly salary yielded by that annual sum shall remain as a local addition to the

usual Deputation Allowance to be drawn by the Officer performing the duties, to meet the necessary expenses of his position; provided however, that in the cases of Civil Servants appointed to offices of the description referred to subsequent to the 2nd June 1854, the sum of Rupees 50,000 shall be held to be the maximum salary, under the Government Resolution, No. 563, of that date.

Section XXVI. Deputation Allowances shall be granted to Civil Servants temporarily performing the duties of an office according to the following rates, and subject to the limitations and conditions hereinafter laid down:—

To Civil Servants not holding any substantive appointment, at the rate of 50 per cent. on the monthly salary of the appointment officiated in, such Deputation Allowance being in addition to the Subsistence Allowance of their respective ranks.

To Civil Servants holding an office of inferior emolument, when officiating in an Office of superior emolument, at the rate of 20 per cent. upon the monthly salary of the appointment officiated in, in all cases in which the salary of such appointment shall not exceed Company's Rupees 2,000 per mensem, and in respect to all appointments of which the salary shall be more than Company's Rupees 2,000 per mensem, at the rate of 20 per cent. upon Company's Rupees 2,000, and of 10 per cent. on the amount in which the monthly salary may exceed Company's Rupees 2,000, provided however that no lower rate of Deputation Allowance shall be given than Rupees 200 per mensem.

The Deputation Allowance shall in all cases be in addition to the salary of the substantive appointment held by the Officer on deputation.

The above rates are granted provisionally, subject to future revision.

In the Punjab, Nagpore and other places, where appointments are by classes, the amount of Deputation Allowances, payable at the above rates, will be calculated, not upon the salary of the individual Officer holding the substantive appointment in which the Officer deputed may be temporarily officiating, but on the average rate of salary attached to the particular class to which the appointment may belong.

A Civil Servant acting for another shall have no claim to Commission or Fees, where any such sources of emolument exist. These shall be regarded as forming part of the income of the Officer to be relieved, subject to the prescribed deductions.

A Civil Servant acting in an appointment, the salary of which is to be reduced on the retirement of the present incumbent, will draw deputation allowance on the reduced salary.

An Officer officiating in more than one appointment will be entitled to Deputation Allowance, regulated by the aggregate amount of the salary of the offices.

An Officer appointed permanently to a higher situation, but prevented from joining his appointment by an order of Government, and detained to officiate in a situation of still higher emolument than the one to which he has been permanently appointed, will be entitled to a Deputation Allowance in addition to the higher salary to which he has been promoted.

Section XXVII. No Civil Servant, temporarily officiating for another, shall draw an amount larger than the entire emoluments of the office in which he is officiating, and if the amount of the Deputation Allowance, according to the prescribed scale, added to the permanent emoluments of the officiating Servant, would exceed the emoluments of the office in which he is temporarily acting, the excess shall not be drawn. But this provision shall not apply to the case of any Officer deputed for special reasons to act in an office of inferior emolument to his own. In cases where an Officer holding two appointments, on being deputed to officiate for another, shall be relieved only from one, he shall receive no Deputation Allowance, unless the emoluments of the office in which he is deputed to act exceed the united emoluments of his permanent appointments, and in that case the Deputation Allowance shall be limited to the difference.

Section XXVIII. No subordinate Officer acting for his principal or for any other person holding a superior appointment in the same office or establishment, at the same Station, shall be entitled to any Deputation Allowance until after the expiration of one month, and then the allowance is not to be drawn in arrear. But a Servant previously out of employment, or who may be deputed to act from a different Station, shall be entitled to Deputation Allowance from the date at which he may enter upon the discharge of the duties to which he has been temporarily appointed.

Section XXIX. Civil Servants, if deputed to act at a distance from the Stations where they are employed, or if ordered by Government on special duty, shall be permitted to draw Travelling Allowances at the rate sanctioned in the case of a first appointment.

CHAPTER VII.

RULES FOR LIMITING THE PERIOD OF SERVICE.

Section XXX. After thirty-five years' service no Civil Servant shall be appointed to any new office, nor be permitted to retain an office which he has held for a period of five years and upwards, except in special cases, which are to be referred for the decision of the Hon'ble the Court of Directors. This Rule will be applicable to every Civil Servant appointed to office after its promulgation, and to the case of every other Civil Servant to whom it relates at the close of five years from the date of its promulgation.

CHAPTER VIII.

RULES FOR THE GRANT OF LEAVE OF ABSENCE TO LAW OFFICERS.

Section XXXI. The East India Company's Law Officers may obtain Sick Leave and Short Leave on Private Affairs under the conditions prescribed in the case of Civil Servants, both as respects the periods of absence and the limitation of allowances during such absence. Leave will however only be granted at the convenience of the Government, and no additional expense will on any consideration be incurred by the Government on account thereof.

If any Law Officer shall quit his duty, save on leave under Medical Certificate or on Short Leave on Private Affairs, he will be considered to have vacated his appointment.

CHAPTER IX.

RULES FOR CHAPLAINS AND ASSISTANT CHAPLAINS.

Section XXXII. Chaplains and Assistant Chaplains may take Furlough on Private Affairs and on Medical Certificate, also Short Leave on Private Affairs, on the same terms and conditions as Military Officers, with the following modifications:—

1st.—Chaplains being allowed to retire after twenty years' service, the period of Furlough on Private Affairs, is in their case limited to the present term of three years. The Furlough may however either be taken in one period, or be divided into two periods, whether of eighteen months each, or of two years and one year, respectively, and if divided, the first Furlough may be taken, as at present, after seven years' residence, and the second Furlough after a further residence of ten years in India. As respects Chaplains and Assistant Chaplains appointed before the 11th January 1854, when the period of Service was only eighteen years, their second Furlough, if they should exercise the option of taking Furlough in two periods, will be available after a second residence in India for a term of eight years.

2ndly.—No Furlough or Leave of Absence, whether on private Affairs or on sick Certificate, taken in Europe or elsewhere out of India, in excess of three years will be allowed to count as Service in India in the twenty years which qualifies Chaplains for their Retiring Pensions.

Section XXXIII. The Furlough Pay of Chaplains will remain as at present. With regard to their allowance during Sick Leave to any place out of India, they shall receive salary (but at a rate not exceeding £600 per annum) for the first six months of absence, and, for the remaining twelve months, an allowance equal to the Furlough Pay of their standing. If the leave be extended, an allowance equal to Furlough Pay may be drawn for a further period of eighteen months.

RULES

As passed at the General Meeting of Subscribers to the Bengal Civil Fund on 31st July, 1850.
(With revision of Articles V. and VIII. at Meeting of the 30th March, 1852, as announced to the Meeting of 31st July, 1852.)

ART. I. The object of the Bengal Civil Fund shall henceforth be to provide for the widows and children of deceased Members, without reference to any property they may possess or acquire.

II. The Hon'ble the Court of Directors, and the Governor General of India in Council, shall be solicited to continue patrons of the Institution.

III. The Fund shall be supported by the contributions of the Company's Covenanted Civil Servants on the Bengal Establishment now subscribing, or who may hereafter join the Service, aided by the donation of the Hon'ble the Court of Directors; it being, as heretofore, at the option of such of the subscribers as were admitted to the Service prior to the 17th of January 1823, and have not, in pursuance of a resolution passed at the General Meeting of the 28th of July 1817, signed the declaration of a determination to continue their contributions to the Fund during the whole period of their Service in India, at any time to withdraw altogether therefrom, forfeiting thereby all claims upon the Fund, whether for sums subscribed, or on any other account whatsoever.

IV. The Subscribers shall contribute, from the 1st January, 1850, at the following rates of per centage on their salaries and other authorized public emoluments, including furlough allowance.

Married subscribers $4\frac{1}{2}$ per cent.

Widower and unmarried subscribers $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent.

The subscriptions on this account being liable to increase or decrease, according to the necessities of the Fund, as ascertained by a quinquennial adjustment of its assets and liabilities.

V. Married and widower subscribers, with families, desirous of securing the benefits of the Fund for all, or any of their children, shall contribute further for such children at the following rates.

Married Subscribers—for each unmarried daughter $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent.—for each son under the age of 21 years $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent.—for Widower Subscribers, double the above rates.

VI. Subscribers, whether in Europe or India, are required to intimate to the Secretary to the Fund, the date of their marriage, and of the birth of each child, within one month after the date of the occurrence. On failure of such intimation within the prescribed time, but if made within three months, the additional subscriptions will be levied with interest at 8 per cent., and a fine of Rupees 50 (fifty,) and if made within six months, with interest at 8 per cent., and a fine of Rupees 100 (one hundred). After six months the admission of the wife or child to the benefits of the Fund will be dependent on the decision of a General Meeting, subject to such penalty, not being less than Rupees 100 in the case of a child, or rupees 500 in that of a wife, besides arrears of subscription with interest at 8 per cent., as the meeting may determine upon in each case.

VII. On the death of a subscriber, should the amount of his subscriptions levied under Articles IV. and V., with interest, fall short of one-third of the value of the pension or pensions granted by the Fund, his family shall be allowed to make up the deficiency: failing with a deduction at the rate of one-sixth shall be made from such pension or pensions, until the minimum payment of one-third has been completed. In calculating this minimum, the whole of the contributions of the deceased subscriber shall be taken into account, and the deduction, if any, shall be made rateably from the pension of each member of his family.

VIII. *First.* Subscribers who may hereafter retire from the Service on Annuities of the Civil Service Annuity Fund, wishing to secure to their Widows and Children the full benefits of the Fund, must, on retirement, make up the amount of their subscriptions with interest to Rupees 25,000, and must also continue their contributions at the same rates on their annuities, as those levied from Subscribers in the Service on their allowances, and under the same conditions in regard to minimum payments, and liability to increase or decrease of rates; and option being allowed to each Subscriber of paying up, once for all, either at the time of resigning the Service, or at any subsequent period, the full value of his contributions, according to the Tables of Mortality which, on the advice of an Actuary, may be adopted by the Managers. This commutation will be calculated at 5 per cent., in the following manner: Ordinary subscriptions, on the life of the Subscriber alone, additional subscriptions on the joint lives of husband and wife, and extra contributions for children on the joint lives of father and child. But such settlement will be open to re-adjustment, if the necessities of the Fund shall be found to require an enhanced rate of subscription; and every retired Subscriber will also be liable to pay in the same manner for each child afterwards born, and, in case of subsequent marriage, the additional premium as a Married Subscriber.

Second. But subscribers hereafter so retiring from the service may at their option, and making up the amount of their subscriptions with interest, either to Rupees 12,500 or to Rupees 6,250, and by continuing or compounding for, their contributions at the rates on their annuities as those levied from subscribers in the Service on their allowances, secure to their families, on the same conditions as above, in the former case one-half, and in the latter one-quarter of the amount of pensions and other allowances granted to the family of a subscriber dying in the Service, or of an Annuitant who has made up on retirement the full amount of Rupees 25,000.

IX. The amount of contribution payable by each subscriber in the Service shall, with the permission of Government, be deducted by the Civil Auditor or other officer auditing the monthly pay bills of Civil Servants, and be transferred to the Treasurer of the Fund in such manner as may be found most advantageous to the Fund, under the direction of the Committee of Managers: and all subscribers, from whose salaries deductions may be made less than may be due from them, shall be obliged, on discovery of the error, to make up the difference to the Fund with interest thereon, at the rate of five per cent^{um} per annum.

X. Annuitants shall pay their subscriptions either to the Agents of the Fund, in England, or to the Treasurer of the Fund in Calcutta, under the rule prescribed in Article XXXVIII.

XI. The Sub-Treasurer of Government shall, with the permission of Government, be Treasurer to the Fund; and all money and securities for money, belonging to the Fund in India shall with the like permission, be kept in the public Treasury, subject to the direction and control of the Managers of the Fund.

XII. The unappropriated receipts of the Fund exceeding the sum of two thousand (2,000) Company's Rupees (to be reserved for current expenses,) shall be vested in the Securities of Government, and made payable on account of the Fund under the signatures of any three of the Managers, but the Treasurer of the Fund shall be competent of himself to pass receipts for the interest receivable thereon.

XIII. The Managers of the Fund in India shall nominate such persons as may appear to them proper, to act as Agents for the Fund in England; and any moneys that may be required for the disbursements of the Fund in Europe shall be drawn for by, or remitted to, the Agents, as may be most advantageous to the Fund, in such manner as the Managers, under control of the subscribers, from time to time, may determine.

XIV. A duplicate copy of all rules and resolutions, which may be passed relative to the Fund, shall be transmitted to the Agents in England for their information, and that of all persons who may apply to them upon the subject.

XV. A Half-Yearly General Meeting of the Subscribers to the Fund, shall be held at the Presidency of Fort William, in the months of January and July of each year, on a day to be fixed by the Committee of Managers, and notified in the *Calcutta Gazette*, in two of the daily Calcutta papers, and in not less than two newspapers published in the North-Western Provinces two months before the day fixed upon.

XVI. The Committee of Managers, or any nine Members of the Institution, may also convene a Special General Meeting at the Presidency, by public notice, provided that the day fixed for holding such Special Meeting, and the object of it, be advertised, in the manner prescribed in the foregoing article, for the general information of the subscribers.

XVII. All questions proposed at a General Meeting, whether half-yearly or special, shall be determined by a majority of votes; but the concurrent voices of at least nine Members shall be requisite to carry any motion whatever. The resolutions or proceedings of all General Meetings shall be signed by the Chairman, and published in the *Calcutta Gazette*. They shall also be printed and circulated to the subscribers.

XVIII. Should the Managers or any Member or Members be desirous of bringing forward at a half-yearly Meeting, any new general question, or any question involving an increase or diminution of the rate of contribution now fixed, or any essential addition to, or alteration in the rules and principles of the Institution, now established, or any case not distinctly provided for under these rules, due notice of the purport thereof shall be given in the *Calcutta Gazette*, in two of the daily Calcutta papers, and in not less than two newspapers published in the North-Western Provinces, at least two months before such meeting. Provided, however, that on such questions and cases no resolution of a general Meeting, whether half-yearly or special, shall be conclusive; but the determination of the Meeting shall be referred to the subscribers at large, for final adoption or rejection, by the transmission of their votes to the Managers within two months after the date of issuing the notice, either by advertisement or by separate letters to each subscriber, as may be determined by the meeting. It shall be the special duty of the Chairman of any Meeting to require attention to this rule.

XIX. The resolution of a General Meeting on any question not falling within the provisions of the preceding article, shall be open to revision after two months' previous notice given through the Secretary, and published in the *Calcutta Gazette*, in two of the daily Calcutta papers, and in not less than two newspapers published in the North-Western Provinces, of a motion to that effect at the next General Meeting which may be held at a period of not more than four months

subsequently to the General Meeting at which such resolution was passed, and two months subsequently to the date of the notification above prescribed; but the resolution of such subsequent Meeting on such question shall be final and conclusive; provided always, that no resolution of a prior Meeting shall be reversed or altered at a subsequent Meeting, except by a majority consisting of as many votes, at least, as decided the question in the first instance. All resolutions not subjected to revision under this article shall be deemed final and conclusive.

XX. Upon all questions duly advertised for discussion at any half-yearly or special General Meeting, all subscribers shall be allowed to deliver their sentiments and votes by proxy. General proxies will only be allowed on behalf of Members who have left India, and, unless revoked, will be of force during the absence of such Members, or until the receipt of intelligence of their death.

Parties holding general proxies shall be entitled to vote on any question whatever that may arise. The holder of a special proxy shall be entitled to vote on any point connected with the question for which the special proxy was given, that may be discussed at the Meeting, summoned for its determination.

No person shall hold general or special proxy, or be entitled to vote at any General or Special Meeting, who is not a subscriber to the Fund.

It shall be the duty of the Chairman of every General Meeting, after taking the votes of those present on each question, to call for the votes of proxies on the same question; the Chairman shall examine the proxies to see if they are in the prescribed form, and if not, shall reject them.

For forms of general and special proxies, see A and B of the Appendix.

XXI. The Annual Accounts of the Fund shall be made up to the end of April, and submitted by the Managers at the half-yearly General Meeting of the subscribers to be held in the month of January of each year. After being approved by the Meeting, a general statement of the state of the Fund shall be published for the information of the subscribers in the *Calcutta Gazette*. A Committee of Managers of the Fund shall, at each January Meeting, be appointed for the ensuing year, and shall consist of the Secretaries to the Government of India in the Home and Financial Departments, the Sub-Treasurer, and the Civil Auditor for the time being, with five other Members to be elected at such General Meeting.

XXII. The Committee of Managers, or the majority of those present at a meeting of five or more, or, if less than five be present, any three Members of the Committee who may concur in opinion, shall be competent to decide, in the first instance, upon all matters connected with the Fund not expressly reserved for the determination of a General Meeting; but every act of the Managers shall be liable to revision and control by the resolution of a General Meeting. It shall, moreover, be the duty of the Managers to report at the half-yearly Meetings the matters determined by them in the expired period.

XXIII. The Committee of Managers shall, subject to the control of a General Meeting, appoint the Secretary and Accountant to the Fund, and shall fix such allowance for him, payable from the Fund, as they may consider adequate to his services. The officer so appointed shall act under the immediate directions of the committee of Managers, and shall also attend and obey the instructions of all General Meetings of the subscribers, the proceedings of which, and of the Committee of Managers and generally all papers appertaining to the Institution, which may not be intrusted to the Treasurer in India, or the Agents in England, shall be kept under the charge of such Secretary and Accountant, and shall, on application to him, or the Committee of Managers, be open to the inspection of any of the subscribers to the Fund.

It is to be understood that the Secretary and Accountant appointed as above, shall not be subject to removal from his situation by any future Committee of Management, but in concurrence with a majority of subscribers at a General Meeting held as prescribed; provided, however, that it shall, at any time, be competent to the Committee to suspend the said Secretary and Accountant from the exercise of his functions, and to delegate them to another, pending the disposal of the question which may have given rise to such a proceeding.

XXIV. In the event of any of the Managers who may be selected annually being subsequently removed from the Presidency without an intention or expectation of returning during the year of their election, it shall be communicated to the subscribers at the next General Meeting, and in such instances, as well as in all instances of a vacancy in the situation of a Manager by death or otherwise, a new election, if necessary shall take place for the unexpired term of the current year.

XXV. All applications for admission to the benefits of the Fund shall be made to the Committee of Managers. The Managers after calling for any further information which may appear to them requisite, are to submit the application and the decision they may have come to thereupon for the determination of the subscribers at the next General Meeting. In cases of emergency and distress, when the Managers may consider the party for whom the application is made clearly entitled to the benefit of the Fund, they are authorized to advance such proportions of the fixed allowance hereafter specified, as may appear to them indispensably requisite till a final determination can be passed by the subscribers at the next General Meeting aforesaid.

XXVI. The widow of every Subscriber who may die on or after the 1st January, 1850, and by whom the additional subscription levied from that date from married subscribers has been paid, shall, on furnishing a certificate of baptism, or a declaration, on honor, of her age, together with a certificate of marriage, and of the death of her husband with the date of his decease, be entitled to receive, subject to the deduction provided for in Articles VII and VIII, a pension of £300 (three hundred pounds sterling) a year if residing in Europe, or of Rupees 300 (three hundred Rupees) a month if residing in India.

XXVII. No widow shall be entitled to the benefits of the Fund who may have been separated under a legal decision from her husband for misconduct on her part, or who may be known to have been living in a state of adultery, though not divorced or separated from him by law.

XXVIII. One-half of the pension of a widow shall cease upon her re-marriage, the amount of deduction to complete the minimum payment prescribed by Article VII, remaining unaltered.

XXIX. A widow admitted to the benefit of the Fund and losing a moiety of her allowance by marriage, shall be entitled on again becoming a widow, to receive from the Fund the same allowance that she received previous to her last marriage. If her last husband be a subscriber to the Fund, she becomes again entitled to the benefit of the Fund as his widow. But in no case shall a widow receive from the Fund more than one full pension of £300 a year in England, or Rupees 300 a month in India.

XXX. On the death of any Member of the Fund, on or after the 1st January, 1850, leaving a daughter or daughters born in lawful wedlock, for whom the additional subscription of $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. indicated in Article V. has been paid, an allowance shall be made to every such daughter from the Fund, to be paid in England or India, as circumstances may require, (without any reference to property,) at the following rates:

Till five years of age, Rupees 30 a month in India, or £30 a year in England.

From the commencement of the sixth year to the end of the eighth year, Rupees 40 a month in India, or £60 a year in England.

From the commencement of the ninth year to the end of the eleventh year, Rupees 50 a month in India, or £80 a year in England.

From the commencement of the twelfth year till marriage, Rupees 60 a month in India, or £100 a year in England.

A donation of £300 will also be paid to each daughter on her marriage.

XXXI. On the death of any Member of the Fund, on or after the 1st January, 1850, leaving a son or sons born in lawful wedlock, for whom the additional subscription of $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. indicated in Article V. has been paid, an allowance shall be made to every such son from the Fund, to be paid in England or India, as circumstances may require, (without any reference to property) at the following rates:

Till five years of age, Rupees 30 a month in India, or £30 a year in England.

From the commencement of the sixth year to the end of the eighth year, Rupees 40 a month in India, or £60 a year in England.

From the commencement of the ninth year to the end of the eleventh year, Rupees 50 a month in India, or £80 a year in England.

From the commencement of the twelfth year to the end of the twenty-first year, Rupees 60 a month in India, or £100 a year in England.

Provided that at any time between the age of sixteen and twenty-one, on being settled in any profession or employment, he may receive, in advance, the whole amount of the annuity due to him up to the end of his twenty-first year, his claim on the Fund ceasing.

XXXII. In the case of a posthumous child, if the subscriber, its father, had no other children, or if, having other children, he contributed for them the extra payment prescribed by Article V., the same allowances shall be granted to it as if the extra contribution had been paid on its account; but if the father of a posthumous child, having other children, did not contribute the extra payment prescribed by Article V. for the youngest child living at the time of his death, the posthumous child shall not be entitled to derive any support from the Fund.

XXXIII. The pensions of widows who may be admitted to the benefit of the Fund shall be paid in advance quarterly to themselves or to their authorized agents, but the acknowledgment of the widow herself shall be taken for all sums paid on her behalf.

XXXIV. All allowances granted from the Fund for the maintenance and education of children, shall be paid in advance quarterly to their guardians or relatives having the care of them, or to such persons as may be entrusted with the disbursement of the sums allotted for them, either by the Managers of the Fund in India or by the Agents of the Fund in England. No advances made under this or the preceding rule shall be liable to be recovered on the death, marriage or coming of age of any incumbent on the Fund.

XXXV. The pensions payable quarterly, in advance to widows and children, under Articles XXXIII, and XXXIV, shall be considered due on the 1st of January, 1st of April, 1st of July, and 1st of October in each year; and should any pension be left undrawn in the hands of the

Home Agents of the Fund beyond three months after it becomes due, the same shall be at the risk of the pensioner.

XXXVI. The mother, guardian, or other person who may be in charge of any child or children entitled to a provision under Articles XXX., XXXI. and XXXII. of these rules, or any other person who may be authorized to receive the same on account of such child or children, shall, on each occasion of payment, before receiving the annuity payable, or any part thereof, take and subscribe, before a justice of the Peace or other competent officer, a solemn declaration according to form C. of the Appendix; and such declaration shall be dated and signed on or subsequent to the day on which the annuity is claimable, and shall, in the event of the widow, guardian or other person entitled to receive the same being in Europe, be delivered to and left with the Agents for the Fund in England, or if such widow, guardian, or other person shall be in India, it shall be delivered to, and left with the Managers of the Fund for the time being.

XXXVII. If a subscriber to the Fund, continuing in the Civil Service, and wishing to retain his interest in the Fund, shall have proceeded to, or remain in Europe, otherwise than on furlough allowance, he shall be required, while absent from India, to pay to the Fund a monthly subscription equal to that which he would have been required to pay if on furlough allowance; provided, however, that no subscriber shall be permitted to avail himself of the above rule for any period exceeding five years, from the date of his departure from India.

XXXVIII. If any subscriber, absent from India either on furlough or otherwise, shall omit to pay his subscription for the period of one entire year, his family shall not, in the event of his death during his absence, have any claim upon the Fund. It shall be the duty of the Managers to cause a written communication to this effect to be made to every subscriber so discontinuing his subscription; and it shall be competent to a General Meeting to admit to the benefits of the Fund the family of any such defaulting subscriber, on good and sufficient cause being shewn for the omission, and on payment of all arrears with interest at 8 per cent. On the return to India of a subscriber who has failed during his absence to pay the full amount of his subscriptions, his allowances will be subject to the same rule of deduction as those of other subscribers, and on all arrears of subscription being made good, with interest at 8 per cent. his family will be entitled in the event of his death, to the full benefits of the Fund.

XXXIX. If a subscriber to the Fund shall be suspended from the Service of the Hon'ble Company, and shall die during the period of his suspension, his widow and children shall be entitled to the benefits of the Institution, in like manner as if he had not been suspended, provided he continue to pay at the rate fixed on his actual allowances under Articles IV. and V.

XL. If a subscriber to the Fund shall be dismissed from the Service of the Hon'ble Company, in the event of his death, his widow and children shall have no claim to the benefit of the Institution, and he shall not be allowed to retain any interest in the Fund by making any payment whatever.

XLI. Any person admitted into the Bengal Civil Service, with permission to take rank in that Service above any person that has been a subscriber to the Fund for a longer period than one year, shall not be entitled to become a subscriber to the Fund except upon the following conditions, viz.:

First.—If the individual so circumstanced shall be unmarried, he shall not become a member of the Fund, except on condition of his paying to the Treasurer, within a period not exceeding six months from his commencing to receive salary from the Bengal Government, a sum of money equal to the average amount of the aggregate subscriptions of the unmarried members in whose year the individual wishing to subscribe may rank in the Bengal Civil Service, with interest thereon at the rate of five per cent. per annum.

Second.—If the individual so circumstanced shall be married or be a widower, having a child or children, he shall not become a Member of the Fund except on condition of his paying to the Treasurer, within a period of six months from his commencing to receive a salary from the Bengal Government, a sum of money equal to the average amount of the aggregate subscriptions of the married Members, retaining a contingent interest in the Fund, in whose year the individual wishing to subscribe may rank in the Bengal Civil Service, with interest thereon at the rate of five per cent. per annum.

Third.—Any applicant giving to the Secretary of the Fund, a written authority for the deduction of twenty per cent. from his future monthly allowances until the sums due from him, under the above rules, with interest, at the rate of five per cent. per annum, be paid up, shall be considered as having fulfilled the conditions required of him; provided always, that his family shall not benefit from the Fund, if he quit the Service before paying up the whole amount due from him.

Fourth.—The Managers are authorized to admit applicants in the first instance agreeably to the foregoing rules, but in all such cases the application shall be submitted for confirmation at the next General Meeting.

XLII. The actual value of all annuities, granted under the foregoing rules, as well as those already granted, shall be passed to a separate account on the books of the Institution, under the head of "Appropriated Funds," agreeably to the value shewn in the annexed Tables, or any other

which, on the recommendation of a professional actuary, may hereafter be adopted, by which Tables the one-third minimum value shall also be determined. Provided that, until the state of the Fund will admit of this rule being fully carried out, the Managers shall be at liberty to suspend such portion of it as relates to the pensions of incumbents under the old rules.

XLIII. On the 30th April, 1853, and subsequently at the close of every fifth year, the Managers shall, according to these tables, calculate the actual values of the pending annuities to widows and children of deceased members, and shall then compare the total of their values with the assets belonging to the Appropriated Funds of the Institution. Should these assets exceed in value the said total, the difference shall be transferred back to the credit of the Unappropriated Funds, and be available for the purposes of the Institution; on the other hand, should the value of the said assets be less than the total aforesaid, the deficiency shall be applied by a transfer from the latter branch to the former.

XLIV. At the same periods the Managers shall prepare and submit a complete valuation of the assets and probable liabilities of the Unappropriated Funds, and found thereon a recommendation for an increase or decrease of the contributions according to the necessities of the Institution.

XLV. It is hereby declared that the old rules of the Bengal Civil Fund, as they stood on the 31st December, 1849, are and will continue hereafter to be in force, in respect to the families of subscribers who died on or previous to that date, as also to the families of all subscribers, then retired from the Service, who have retained a contingent interest in the Fund. And all allowances granted to such families will be regulated as heretofore according to the provisions of those rules, in the same manner as if the new rules had not been passed. Provided that every widow now deriving support from the Fund, shall, in case of re-marriage, be entitled to an allowance of £150 a year, if residing in Europe, or of Rupees 150 a month, if residing in India, subject to limitation under the old rules to the extent of any private income she may possess or acquire in excess of £100 a year, or Rupees 100 a month, as the case may be.

RULES OF THE BENGAL CIVIL SERVICE ANNUITY FUND, AS ADOPTED AT THE SPECIAL GENERAL MEETING OF SUBSCRIBERS, ON 14TH FEBRUARY, 1853.

1. The Subscribers to the Bengal Civil Service Annuity Fund are the Covenanted Civil Servants upon the Bengal Establishment. They shall continue as long as they remain in the Service, to contribute for purposes of the Fund, four per cent. of their salaries and all other public emoluments whatever (travelling allowance alone excepted.)

2. The Annuities are fixed at 10,000 Sicca Rupees payable in India, or £1,000 Sterling payable in England. In discharge of each Annuity payable in England, the sum of £1,000 Sterling shall be paid to the Annuitant through the Company's Treasury in London, the Managers of the Fund undertaking to pay over to the Government of Bengal 10,000 Sicca Rupees for every year's Annuity so paid.

3. Those Subscribers only shall be qualified for Annuities of the amount aforesaid, who have served in the Civil Service 25 years and actually resided 22 years in India.

4. The Annuities of each year shall commence with the 1st of May, and shall be payable quarterly at the close of each quarter and to the date of the Annuitant's decease.

5. The number of Annuities assignable on account of each year from the 1st of May 1851, shall be ten, and they shall be available, subject to the provisions of the following rule, to all qualified Subscribers according to their seniority in the gradation List of the Service as fixed by the Court of Directors. But if any Subscriber having become qualified for an Annuity, shall retire from the Service before the option of an Annuity may devolve upon him, he shall nevertheless be entitled to the same in his turn, as though his name had remained upon the gradation List of the Service.

6. On the 1st of November of every year, the ten Annuities that are to become available on the following 1st of May, shall be assigned to those qualified Subscribers, in order of seniority, from whom applications for Annuities shall have been received before the said 1st November. After the 1st of November, any of the said ten Annuities which shall not have been assigned under the preceding clause, shall be assignable to all qualified Subscribers in order of application.

7. As soon as possible after the 1st of May of every year, the Managers shall notify in the *Calcutta Gazette* the number of Annuities of that year which remain unassigned, and also the number of Annuities (if any) which remain not taken from previous years, and these Annuities shall be assignable at any subsequent period to all qualified Subscribers, in order of application. But for the year in which any such Annuity may be assigned, a ratable portion only of the Annuity shall be payable, calculated from the date on which it is taken.

8. Every Subscriber to whom an Annuity shall be assigned, shall be required in order to entitle him to the full Annuity fixed by Article II., to pay, on or before the date from which the Annuity is to commence, the difference between one-half of the value of the Annuity and the accumulated amount of his contributions, whenever the latter shall be less than the former.

The value of an Annuity on the life of any Subscriber shall be determined by such Table of Valuation as may be sanctioned by the Hon'ble the Court of Directors, and to determine the accumulated amount of a Subscriber's contributions, a separate account shall be kept for each Subscriber, and the account shall be made up annually, with interest at the rate of 6 per cent. calculated on the Subscriber's contributions as allowed by the Court of Directors.

9. Any Subscriber who shall decline to pay the difference defined in the foregoing article, shall be entitled to an Annuity of a reduced amount, to be calculated in the following manner, *viz.*, he shall receive an Annuity of 5,000 Sicca Rupees or of £500 Sterling, increased by such additional amount as his contributions may suffice to purchase, according to the Table of Valuation in force.

10. The acceptance of the resignation of the Hon'ble Company's Service is an essential condition to entitle a Subscriber to an Annuity, and Annuitants will not be permitted by the Court of Directors to return to the Service; any Subscriber therefore, to whom an Annuity shall have been assigned under Article VI. or VII., who shall fail to tender his resignation of

the Hon'ble Company's Service, on or before the 1st of May following, shall not only forfeit his right to the Annuity so assigned, but shall also forfeit a sum of Ten Thousand Rupees, to be paid by the Subscriber within one week from the said 1st of May; or in the event of non-payment by the Subscriber, to be deducted from his allowances by the Civil Auditor, in such instalments, not exceeding one-half, or being less than one-third of his total Official receipts, as the Managers may direct, and in the latter case, interest shall be charged at the rate which the Fund would have received had the amount of the fine been paid by the Subscriber within the prescribed term of one week from the 1st of May.

No Subscriber who shall incur the above penalty shall be deemed entitled to an Annuity until the amount of such penalty, together with all interest which may become due thereon, shall have been fully paid.

11. Any Subscriber not having served 25 years and actually resided 22 years, who may be compelled to retire from the Hon'ble Company's Service by sickness, duly certified as below provided, shall be entitled to receive either a donation or an invalid Pension of reduced amount, as follows :—

If he shall not have completed 10 years' residence, a donation of 5,000 Sicca Rupees or £500 sterling.

If he shall have completed 10 years' residence but less than 15 years, a pension of 2,500 Sicca Rupees, or £250 Sterling.

If he shall have completed 15 years' residence, a pension of 5,000 Sicca Rupees or £500 Sterling.

12. The grant of invalid pensions shall be made in all respects upon the same principles as are prescribed in Articles VIII. and IX. of the Rules; that is to say, in order to entitle a Subscriber to an invalid pension of £500 a year, or £250 a year, as the case may be, it will be necessary for him to make good one-half of the value of such pension, but it will be optional with him, in the event of his subscriptions not being equal to the half value, to take a reduced pension of £250 or £125 a year increased by such additional amount as his contributions may suffice to purchase according to the Table of Valuation in force.

13. It will be necessary for every Subscriber applying for an Invalid Pension, to furnish to the Managers of the Fund, a Certificate from his usual Medical Attendant, countersigned either by the Medical Board in Calcutta, or by a special Committee of Medical Officers, to consist of not fewer than three Members, convened by the Hon'ble the Lieut.-Governor of the North-Western Provinces, certifying that he is, from some permanent cause or complaint, incapable of rendering service in the climate of India, and it will further be necessary that such certificate be confirmed by the examining Physician of the Hon'ble Court of Directors, after the Subscriber shall have resided one year in England.

14. The value of every Annuity or Pension which is granted, shall be passed to a separate Account under the head of "Appropriated Funds," and to the debit of that Account shall be entered all payments in satisfaction of Annuities.

15. At the close of every third year, the Managers shall calculate, according to the Table of Valuation then in force, the values of the existing Annuities and Pensions, and shall compare the total of their values with the Assets of the "Appropriated Funds." If the amount of these Assets shall exceed the said total, the difference shall be carried to the credit of the Unappropriated Funds, but if the amount of the Assets of the Appropriated Funds shall be less than the total aforesaid, then the deficiency shall be made good by a transfer to the head of "Appropriated Funds" of any balance remaining unappropriated, and a representation with regard to the difference (if any) shall be made by the Managers to the Government of India.

16. Every Annuitant or invalid Pensioner, shall be furnished with a Certificate of his admission to an Annuity or Pension, under the hands of not less than three of the Managers of the Fund, and a duplicate of the Certificate shall be furnished to the Government for transmission to the Hon'ble Court of Directors.

17. Any Subscriber who may be dismissed from the Hon'ble Company's Service shall forfeit all right to any benefit from the Civil Service Annuity Fund.

18. The interest in the Fund of any Subscriber who may be suspended from the Hon'ble Company's Service, shall be in abeyance during his suspension, and shall revive upon his restoration. But this provision shall not be held to apply to Civil Servants out of employ (from whatever cause) who shall be permitted to draw the subsistence allowance of their rank.

19. The affairs of the Institution shall be conducted by nine Managers, of whom four shall be ex-officio, viz., the Secretary to the Government of India in the Financial Department, the Accountant to the Government of Bengal, the Sub-Treasurer and the Civil Auditor. The other five shall be Subscribers and shall be elected at a General Meeting of Subscribers, to be held in January of each year in Calcutta.

20. The Sub-Treasurer of Government shall, with the permission of Government, be the Treasurer of the Institution, and the Funds of the Institution shall be deposited in the public Treasury, subject to the direction and control of the Managers.

21. The Managers, or the majority of those present at a Meeting of five or more, or if less than five be present, any three Managers who may concur in opinion, shall be competent to decide in the first instance upon all matters relative to the Receipts and Disbursements of the Fund, as well as generally upon all subjects connected with the management of the Fund, not expressly reserved for determination by a General Meeting of Subscribers. But the decisions of the Managers in all cases shall be liable to revision by a General Meeting.

22. The Managers shall appoint a Secretary and Accountant to the Fund, and shall fix such allowance for him, payable from the Fund, as they may consider adequate to his services. The officer so appointed shall act under the direction of the Managers, and shall attend the General Meetings of the Subscribers. The proceedings of the Managers, and generally all papers appertaining to the Fund, shall be kept under the charge of the Secretary and Accountant to the Fund, and shall on application to him, or to the Managers, be open to the inspection of any of the Subscribers.

23. All appointments to the office of Secretary and Accountant to the Fund, as well as the appointments of any other persons whom the Managers may find it necessary to employ, and the allowances assigned to such officers, shall be subject to the control of a General Meeting.

24. A General Meeting of the Subscribers shall be held in Calcutta in January of every year, (or as soon afterwards as the Accounts can be made up and prepared for inspection) to receive and audit the accounts of the preceding year, and to decide on all questions duly brought before it. The Managers or any nine Members of the Institution may convene at any time a special General Meeting at the Presidency, by notice in the *Calcutta Gazette*, and in two newspapers, one of the two being a newspaper published in the North-Western Provinces, provided that the day fixed for holding such special Meetings and the object of it be advertised as above, at least six weeks before the same is held.

25. Upon all questions duly advertised for discussion at a General Meeting, whether annual or special, all Subscribers shall be allowed to deliver their sentiments and votes by proxy, and all questions shall be determined by a majority of two-thirds of the Subscribers, who may be present at such General Meetings, or who may vote thereat by proxy. But the concurrent voices of nine Members at least actually present, shall be requisite to determine upon any question whatever. General proxies will only be allowed on behalf of Members who have left India, and unless revoked will be of force during the absence of such Members, or until the receipt of intelligence of their death.

Parties holding general proxies, shall be entitled to vote on any question whatever that may arise. The holder of a special proxy shall be entitled to vote on any special point connected with the question for which the special proxy was given, that may be discussed at the meeting summoned for its determination.

No person shall hold a general or special proxy, or be entitled to vote at any General or Special Meeting, who is not a Subscriber to the Fund.

It shall be the duty of the Chairman of every General Meeting, after taking the votes of those present on each question, to call for the votes of proxies on the same question, the Chairman shall also carefully examine the proxies, to see if they are in the prescribed form, and if not, shall reject them.

The forms of general and special proxies shall be those marked A and B appended to the Rules.

26. Upon all general questions, involving any increase or diminution of the rate of the contributions, or any essential addition to, or alteration in, the original rules and principles of the Institution, no decision of the Subscribers shall be valid or have any effect until sanctioned and approved by the Court of Directors, to whom all parties considering themselves aggrieved by such decision, shall have a right of appeal, and the decision of the Court of Directors shall in all cases be final. Provided, however, that the determination of a General Meeting on such cases and questions be referred to the Subscribers at large for adoption or rejection, before being submitted for the sanction and approval of the Court of Directors.

ELECTRIC TELEGRAPH.

Fort William, 13th January, 1855.

No. 67 of 1855.—The following Notification from the Home Department (Electric Telegraph) is published in General Orders :—

RULES FOR THE TRANSMISSION OF MESSAGES BY THE ELECTRIC TELEGRAPH.

Passed by the Governor General of India in Council, on the 5th January, 1855.

- I. MESSAGES on the Public Service shall take precedence of all others.
- II. Service Messages shall be charged for at the same rate as private Messages, but the former shall be paid for by a transfer in account, covered by a *pro forma* receipt, without cash payments.
- III. A Return shall be made every quarter to the Government of India and to the local Governments, showing the number and cost of Messages transmitted by each Department during the preceding quarter.
- IV. No Government Officer shall employ the Telegraph except on urgent and important occasions, and no Message shall be sent on Service by the Electric Telegraph unless the saving of time effected by the Telegraph is of real importance.
- V. At the seats of the local Governments authority to despatch Messages is vested in the head of the Government and in his Private Secretary. All other Service Messages, Civil and Military, shall be sent under the authority only of the Chief Secretary to Government, and of the chief Military Officer respectively.
- VI. At Calcutta, Messages will be sent under the signature of the Governor General, of his Private Secretary, and of the Secretaries to Government. The power of communication along the river is also vested in the Superintendent of Marine and the Master Attendant.
- VII. At Telegraph Stations not being seats of Government, no Service Message shall be sent unless it be signed by the Chief Civil, or Military Officer of the station, each for his own Department.
- VIII. The Officer who signs the Message will be responsible for the necessity of sending it by the Telegraph, and if on the periodical inspection of the Station-books, it shall be discovered that Messages of a trifling nature have been despatched, the Officer who authorized them will be made to pay for them.
- IX. Officers, whose signatures will authorize Messages to be sent free, are bound in honor not to send private communications under cover of that authority.
- X. All Service Messages must be conveyed in as few and as short words as possible.
- XI. Messages will be received for transmission by Electric Telegraph on and after the 1st of February 1855, at the under-mentioned rates of charge and subject to the following rules :—
 - A single rate is one Rupee for 16 words and under, and for that sum the Message may be transmitted 400 miles.
 - A single rate, or distance of 400 miles from Calcutta, will include Benares, and all Telegraph Stations between those cities.
 - A double rate from Calcutta will include Agra and the intermediate Stations at Allahabad and Cawnpore.
 - A treble rate from Calcutta will include Meerut, Delhi, Loodianah, Lahore, Gwalior, Seepree and Indore.
 - A quadruple rate from Calcutta will include Peshawur and Bombay.

Peon hire, at the rate of 4 annas per mile, will be charged for extra, if the Message be sent to any place at a distance from a Telegraph Station.

The rates for the Madras line will be established on the same principle, and will be announced when the Offices under that Presidency are opened.

XII. No Message, however brief, will be charged for at less than a single rate, and the reply will in every case be charged for separately.

XIII. Mercantile or other Messages involving important results, will only be received on condition of being repeated back from each Receiving Station, and at double price, according to the practice in Europe.

XIV. The sender of a Message may pre-pay the charge for a reply, which must be limited to the number of words so pre-paid for.

XV. All Messages must be in the English language, and must be pre-paid in cash, including Peon hire, excepting Messages sent from River Stations below Calcutta.

XVI. No unpaid Message, with the above exceptions, shall on any account be transmitted. A violation of this rule will subject the Signaller, or Assistant in charge of the Station whence the message may be sent, to dismissal from Office.

XVII. Messages in cypher will be charged for at triple rates under special rules which may be learned at the different Telegraph Offices.

XVIII. All communications in cypher must also be repeated back to obtain accuracy, and the repetition will be charged for in addition at single rate.

XIX. Should a Message in cypher be tendered for transmission simultaneously with a Message in ordinary language, the latter will take precedence of the former.

XX. Subscriptions for daily Messages of 48 words or more will be received at an abatement of one-fourth of the above-named rates.

XXI. Violation of secrecy on the part of any Officer, Assistant, Clerk, or Signaller, in the Telegraph Department, will be punished by dismissal from Office, forfeiture of arrears of pay, and a declaration in the official *Gazette* of the incapability of the delinquent to serve the Government in any public capacity.

XXII. Officers in charge of Telegraph Stations may refuse to transmit a Message which may be of a decidedly objectionable character. Should the character of the Message be disputed, the matter may be referred to a Secretary to Government if the dispute occur at the seat of a Government, or to the Chief Civil Officer if it occur at a Mofussil Station.

XXIII. Private Messages shall be transmitted in the order of their receipt in the Telegraph Office. Should two or more Messages be tendered for transmission at the same time, the shortest shall have the precedence without reference to its relative importance.

XXIV. No Message, or Messages, beyond 200 words in all, can be sent at one time by one individual or firm; and no second Message can be sent by the individual or firm till after the lapse of three hours, unless the line be free and not required by any one else.

XXV. Private Messages will, until otherwise notified, only be received between sunrise and sunset.

XXVI. During the receipt of Messages signalled as "Confidential," visitors shall be excluded from the Signalling Room. A violation of this rule shall subject the Assistant in charge to dismissal from Office.

XXVII. News and Messages shall be conveyed in the following order:—

1st.—Intelligence of the English Mails.

2nd.—Messages for the Press.

3rd.—Messages for Subscribers.

4th.—Messages for non-Subscribers.

XXVIII. Overland intelligence, or other public news of great importance, shall be given to the Press free of charge, at the seats of the different Governments and at all other places on the line where Newspapers are published, and where there are regular Repeating Stations. The intelligence or news will ordinarily be given in two Messages; the first in as few syllables as possible, and containing not more than 25 or 30 words, the second Message will be full, but shall not exceed 640 words.

XXIX. Messages will, under these rules, be received by Post from Europe or elsewhere for transmission, if money be deposited beforehand sufficient to pay for the transmission.

NEW FURLOUGH REGULATIONS.

Fort William, 17th November.—No. 1150 of 1854.—The Hon'ble the Court of Directors having transmitted to the Government of India further explanatory instructions regarding the furlough regulations published in Government Gazette No. 110, of the 1st of February 1854, the Most Noble the Governor General in Council is pleased to cancel that General Order, and to promulgate in a connected form rules which have been laid down by the Hon'ble Court for regulating furloughs and leaves of absence.

With the view of adapting the regulations to the present increased facilities of communication, and to correct, as far as possible, any tendency in them to deter officers from resorting to the places which may be most conducive to the restoration of their health, when a change of climate is required for that purpose; the following rules are established, and are to have effect from the 1st February 1854:—

1. All regimental officers in the Service on the 1st February 1854, who prefer retaining what may be considered the advantages of the old regulations, may do so, provided they signify their wish to that effect when they next apply for furlough or leave of absence, without any limitation whether such leave be in India or elsewhere; and officers, who once make their election will not be entitled to any other choice, but will be afterwards subject to the new or old regulations according to their decisions.

2. Staff officers, as such, have not the above option allowed them, but they may retain the advantages of the old regulations by giving up their appointments, which in such cases, will be considered vacated from the date of embarkation.

3. To those officers who adopt them, the new regulations will apply retrospectively in respect of furlough and leave of absence beyond sea, and in computing their time of service for retirement; so that their furloughs or leaves of absence, whether under the old or the new rules, and whether on private affairs or sick certificate within or beyond India will count for service to the authorized extent only, in computing the time for retirement on full pay.

4. Officers who have availed themselves of the option of the old rules, are allowed to re-consider the question under the modifications now sanctioned.

5. Officers who have not taken leave subsequent to the publication of the new rules, on the 1st February 1854, and who consequently may not have been called upon to declare whether they would abide by the old or the new Regulations will, on retirement from the Service, be entitled to take full advantage of the privileges given by the new Regulations.

Furloughs on Private Affairs.

6. Every officer will be allowed a furlough to Europe or elsewhere, beyond sea, for a period of two years at the expiration of ten years' service, and for a second period of two years after twenty years' service in India.

7. The second furlough of two years will only be granted after ten years' service in India, from the date of the return to duty after the first furlough of two years. These furloughs are not to be cumulative under any circumstances, but are limited to two years. Officers who have taken leave of absence on sick certificate to Europe or elsewhere beyond sea, will be ineligible to a furlough on private affairs until they have served six years from their last return to duty. This rule does not apply to short leaves to sea.

8. All grants of furlough on private affairs are subject to the exigencies of the Public Service, and to the regulations framed for the preservation of the efficiency of each regiment by limiting the number of absentees.

9. Officers holding staff or other detached appointments may be allowed furlough for a period of six months without losing their appointments; but, during that period, they will not be entitled to any portion of their staff salary, which will be drawn in full by the officers officiating for them.

10. All officers, whether staff or regimental, while on furlough on private affairs, will be entitled to "furlough pay" only.

Leave of Absence on Sick Certificate.

11. Leave of absence on sick certificate will be granted for a term not exceeding eighteen months, whether it be to any place in Europe or elsewhere out of India.

12. Extensions of such leave may be granted, as at present, on production of medical certificates, for further periods not exceeding eighteen months in the whole.

13. An officer holding a staff or other detached appointment will be allowed to be absent on sick certificate in England or elsewhere, beyond sea, for a period of fifteen months, without losing his appointment; and, during the first six months only of such absence, he will be entitled to draw half the staff salary of his appointment, the officer officiating for him drawing the remaining half salary during the first six months and the whole salary during the remainder of the time.

14. An officer's claim to half staff salary for six months, as sanctioned in the preceding rule, will not be affected by his subsequently retiring from the Service in Europe or elsewhere.

15. No portion of command allowance, medical staff salary, or other similar allowance, which under the old rules was inadmissible to officers absent from their corps or stations at the Cape or elsewhere, will be allowed to absent officers under these regulations.

16. All officers, whether staff or regimental, while on leave of absence on sick certificate, will be entitled for a period of six months to the same rate of Indian pay and allowances as was allowed under the old regulations to officers proceeding to the Cape on medical certificate, and for the remaining period of their leave they will receive furlough pay only.

17. If the leave on sick certificate be extended, furlough pay will be continued; but under no circumstances for a longer period than three years altogether from the commencement of the absence.

Staff Officers.

18. The term staff officer applies to all officers holding staff or detached appointments, military, (general or regimental,) political or civil; also to general officers commanding divisions, members of the medical board, superintending surgeons, and others who, under the old rules, were entitled to draw half staff allowance when absent at the Cape.

19. Staff officers, absent on leave beyond the periods stated in rules 9 and 13 respectively, cannot retain their appointments and allowances except on special grounds, to be sanctioned by the Government of the Presidency. Any such special grant of leave is to be reported at once to the Hon'ble the Court of Directors, with the reasons for it, and to be subject to their approbation.

20. The privilege of retaining staff appointments during leave of absence on sick certificate, or on furlough on private affairs, will not be available a second time, if the fresh leave is on sick certificate, until an officer has been three years, or if on private affairs, until he has been six years in the discharge of the duties of his appointment, from the date of last return to it.

21. This rule, however, does not apply to leaves of absence, whether on sick certificate or on private affairs in India, or for brief periods to Ceylon, the Mauritius, or other places out of India.

22. Officers commanding troops of horse artillery and light field batteries, and officers generally in employment, will be allowed leave out of India under the same rules with respect to allowances and tenure of command or office as regulated the grant of leave to the Cape to such officers under the old regulations, except as to the duration of those advantages, the time for their continuance being subject to the provisions of the new regulations.

Date of Furlough and Advances of Pay.

23. The period of furlough on private affairs, or leave of absence on sick certificate, is to be calculated from the date of the departure from India of the ship in which the officer proceeds.

24. Advances of pay and allowances, staff and regimental, to officers proceeding on leave of absence on sick certificate, who may be entitled to them, will be made in India for three months from date of embarkation. Payments in continuation will be made in England at the rates of exchange fixed annually for re-payment of advances made on account of Her Majesty's government. Furlough pay will continue to be issued in advance for six months when required by officers obtaining furlough on private affairs.

25. The existing regulations regarding passage-money to officers are not affected by these rules.

26. The certificates issued to officers who are granted furloughs on private affairs, or leave of absence on sick certificate, are to specify the time each officer has been absent on leave within Indian limits, as well as the time of his previous absence in Europe; but will not include the periods allowed for proceeding to the Presidency or port of embarkation, and to enable officers to rejoin their regiments or stations after their return to India, nor the leave of one month's absence in six months as unauthorized by the regulations. The last pay certificate of all officers proceeding to England on sick certificate is to specify the rate of regimental pay and allowances and staff salary to which they would have been entitled under the old regulations if proceeding to sea on medical certificate. This information is necessary in order that no difficulty may arise in the pay department of the India House in adjusting the several pay which may be due.

Officers of H. M.'s Service.

27. Officers of Her Majesty's Service in India, whether employed regimentally or in staff or detached situations, are entitled to the advantages above laid down in respect to allowances and tenure of office when on furlough or leave of absence.

28. In the case of officers of Her Majesty's Service on furlough or sick certificate in England or elsewhere, who may retire or exchange into Regiments not on the Indian establishment, the grant to these officers of Indian allowance will cease from the date of their retirement or exchange, if it take place before the expiration of six months from the date of quitting India.

Periods of absence allowed to be counted as Service for Retiring Pensions.

29. In order that all officers quitting India on furlough, or sick certificate, may be placed on an exact equality as regards loss of time, the period allowed by regulation for proceeding to the Presidency or to the nearest port of embarkation, as well as the time to enable officers to rejoin their corps or station after their return to India, will be considered as time counting for service for the Retiring Pension.

30. No furlough or leave of absence, as announced in General Orders, exceeding two years in twenty years' aggregate service, three years in twenty-five years' service, and four years in thirty years' service, shall be allowed to count as service for the retiring pension; and no difference will be made in this respect between leave of absence taken in Europe or elsewhere, in or out of India, or whether the leave be on sick certificate or on private affairs.

31. In the term "leave of absence as announced in General Orders" is to be included all leave of absence except the period allowed in rule 29, and the ordinary indulgence of one month's leave in six months, as authorized by the existing Regulations, and which are in all cases, whether of regimental or staff officers, to be allowed to count as service for the pension. All leave to a greater extent, granted by political and other authorities, which may not hitherto have been published in General Orders, must be so announced hereafter.

32. Officers to be entitled to retire on the full pay of their regimental rank (under the regulation of 1796,) must have served twenty-two years in India, out of which leaves of absence for two years in the aggregate, and not more, will be allowed to count as service for the retiring pension.

33. Officers to be entitled to retire on the full pay of Captains and Majors (under the regulations of 1835-7,) must have served twenty and twenty-four years respectively, out of which time leaves of absence for two years in the aggregate, and not more, will be allowed to count as service.

34. Officers to be entitled to retire as Lieutenant-colonels must have served twenty-eight years, out of which leaves of absence for three years in the aggregate, and not more, will be allowed to count as service.

35. Officers to be entitled to retire as Colonels, must have served thirty-two years, out of which leaves of absence for four years in the aggregate, and not more, will be allowed to count as service.

36. The scale for medical officers and veterinary surgeons of privileged furlough, and leave of absence as counting for the retiring pension, will be as follows :

37. It is to be distinctly understood, that under no circumstances whatever will an officer be permitted to retire on full pay, until he has completed the *full time of service* above specified, whether he be in England at the close of his service or elsewhere.

38. The privileged time of absence may, with the permission of the local Government, be taken at any time subject to these regulations. If therefore, at the end of twenty years' service, of which eighteen had been passed on actual duty in India, an officer should be on furlough, or sick certificate in Europe, or elsewhere, he will be entitled to retire on the full pay of a Captain without returning to India, and so in the other terms of service for the higher pensions. In like manner a medical officer on furlough, or sick certificate in Europe, or elsewhere, at the end of seventeen years' service, fifteen years and four months of which had been passed on actual duty in India, will be entitled to retire on the lowest rate pension, without returning to India, and so in the other terms of service for the higher pension.

39. These rules do not in any way affect the existing regulations regarding the grant of leave in India, or for short periods to sea, whether on private affairs or on sick certificate, except as to the periods of such absence being taken into calculation in the time allowed to count as service for retirement on full pay.

RULES APPLICABLE TO STAFF SITUATIONS.

FORT WILLIAM, 10TH JUNE, 1853.

WITH the sanction of the Hon'ble the Court of Directors, as communicated in their Military Letters to the Government of the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal, No. 130, of the 20th October 1852, and No. 49, of the 20th April 1853, para. 14, all existing orders, as far as they relate to the withdrawal of Officers from their Regiments for Staff, Civil, or Military or other detached employ, are hereby cancelled, and the following Rules, applicable to the three Presidencies, are substituted :

1. No Officer can be appointed to a situation on the General Staff, or to any other detached employment, Military or Civil, (except that of Aide-de-Camp,) until he shall have performed three years' Regimental duty with a corps of the line.

2. An Officer may hold the situation of Aide-de-Camp after having served one year with his Regiment; but the period passed in that situation, except when employed on Field service, is not to be counted in the Regimental duty above prescribed.

3. No Officer is eligible to hold the situation of Adjutant General, Quarter Master General, Military Auditor General, or Commissary General, who has not previously attained the rank of Major in the Army, unless he shall have actually served *twenty* years in India. The Deputies in those Departments must have attained the rank of Captain in the Army, or have served *twelve* years in India, and the Assistants, if they have not attained the rank of Captain, must have served *ten* years in India. No Commissioned Officer is eligible to an appointment in the Ordnance Commissariat Department, until five complete years from his first joining the Artillery. The situation of Deputy Principal Commissary of Ordnance may be held by a Regimental Field Officer, or by a Captain, if he be actually serving in the Department; but no Officer under the degree of a Field Officer in the Army can be appointed Principal Commissary of Ordnance.

4. No Officer can be appointed to the Department of the Quarter Master General of the Army until he shall have passed an examination in surveying and plan-drawing.

5. No Officer can be appointed to the Commissariat Department until he shall have passed the examination in the Native languages prescribed for Interpreters, as well as the prescribed Departmental examinations.

6. No Officer who has entered the Service since the 9th January 1837, can be appointed to any Staff situation, or to any other detached employment, Military or Civil, until he shall have passed the prescribed examination in Hindoostanee.

7. No more than *six* Officers, including Field Officers, Captains, and Subalterns, can be permanently withdrawn for Staff or detached employ, from any Regiment of Native Cavalry or Infantry; but a *seventh* may be taken in cases of great emergency, with the sanction of Government: of these numbers, however, no more than *three* can be of the rank of Regimental Captain.

8. As a general rule, when three Captains are absent from a corps, all on permanent employ, and a Subaltern of the same corps, holding also a permanent detached appointment to which he is eligible both as Subaltern and Captain, is promoted to Regimental Captain, the Officer so promoted shall be required to vacate his appointment; but if one or more of the three Captains withdrawn be officiating only, the Subaltern promoted will retain his appointment, and the Captain last withdrawn for an officiating appointment shall rejoin his Regiment. It is, however, optional with Government to retain, on public grounds, the services of the Subaltern promoted, notwithstanding the number of absent Captains may exceed the limit of three.

9. Officers unequal for a limited period to the performance of Regimental duty, from wounds received on service, may be appointed to Staff and Civil situations, without reference to the number absent from the corps to which they belong; but this rule is not to be considered as sanctioning any permanent increase of withdrawals for Staff employ from the Regiments of such Officers, the number allowed from them being, as from all other corps, limited to six, to which it is to be reduced as situations lapse.

10. A Staff situation, which can be held only by an Officer whose Regiment is serving at the station, or forming part of the Garrison to which the appointment appertains, and any vacancy occasioned by the absence of the permanent incumbent for a short period, may, on an emergency, be filled up by the nomination of an Officer on the spot, without reference to the number of permanent absentees, provided the Commander-in-Chief is of opinion that he can be spared from Regimental duty; but an Officer so nominated, if not before relieved, must return to Regimental duty on his corps marching from the Station or Garrison in which he is so temporarily employed on the Staff.

11. The tenure of Staff, Civil and other detached employment is regulated as follows:--

Band Subscription and Donation.

1. The Most Noble the Governor General of India is pleased, under instructions from the Hon'ble the Court of Directors, to lay down the following Regulations for the establishment and maintenance of Bands of Music in the several Regiments in the Armies of the three Presidencies.

2. All applications to establish Bands are to be made, through the Commanders-in-Chief, to the Government of the Presidency to which the Regiments belong.

3. It is left optional with Officers to establish Bands in Native Regiments, in which they do not at present exist; but those now established, and any which may hereafter be established, are to be maintained under these Regulations.

4. Every Officer borne on the Rolls of a Regiment, whether on staff employ, on local leave, or on Furlough, (Medical Certificate to Europe alone excepted,) is to contribute the following amount to the maintenance of the Band of his Regiment, viz.:—A donation of 30 (thirty) days' net pay of Regimental Rank on appointment; and a Monthly Subscription of 2 (two) days' net pay of Regimental Rank in support of the Band expenses.

5. In all cases of promotion, each Officer is to pay the difference, on thirty days' pay, between the Rank attained, and that previously held.

6. Officers transferred from one Regiment to another, are not to pay a second donation; and their Monthly Subscription to the Band of their new Corps, is to commence from the 1st of the month following their transfer.

7. All Officers on the strength of Regiments having Bands, to the support of which they have not already contributed, are to pay the donation of thirty days' pay; and their monthly Subscription is to commence from the 1st proximo.

8. Donations and Subscriptions to Bands are to be deducted by the Pay-Masters.

9. The affairs of the Band are to be conducted by a Committee, consisting of three Officers, to be nominated half-yearly by the Officer commanding the Corps, in Regimental Orders.

10. The Books of accounts are to be open at stated periods to the inspection of every Officer in the Corps, and the Commanding Officer and Committee are held responsible that no undue expenditure is allowed on account of the Band, and that its affairs are conducted with the greatest economy.

11. The establishment of a Regimental Band is to consist of one Sergeant (in European) or one Havildar (in Native Corps) per Regiment, and two Privates per Troop or Company. These men are to be included in the authorized Establishment of the Regiment; they are to be effective to the Service as Soldiers; to be perfectly drilled; and liable to serve in the Ranks on any emergency.

12. Musicians may be entertained to supply vacancies in Bands, notwithstanding the existence of supernumeraries in Regiments.

13. The Bands of Regiments of Cavalry are to be dressed in Clothing of the same Color as worn by their respective Corps; the Bands of Infantry are to be dressed in White with the Regimental Facings; and Commanding Officers of Corps in which Bands are established will indent accordingly on the Clothing Boards.

PUNJAB IRREGULAR FORCE.

The force raised in the Punjab by G. O. G. G., dated 18th May 1849, shall be denominated the Punjab Irregular Force, and shall consist of

- 3 Light Field Batteries of Artillery,
- 5 Regiments of Infantry, and
- 5 Regiments of Cavalry.

The Establishment and Allowances of each Battery and Regiment will be as detailed in the accompanying Tables.

The Punjab Irregular Force is for General Service in the Punjab, and the Trans-Indus Provinces under British Rule, as well as beyond these limits, should the exigencies of the service require it.

The Force will be commanded by a Brigadier, on a consolidated Salary of Rs. (2,000) Two Thousand per mensem.

A Brigade Major is allowed for the Staff duties, and will receive, in addition to the Pay and Allowances of his rank, the Staff and Office Allowance of a Brigade Major of a Station, viz. Rs. (354) Three Hundred and Fifty-four per mensem.

No additional Batta will be allowed to the Native portion of the Artillery or Infantry of the Force when on Field Service, or marching, but a proportion of Camels and Mules, to be fixed hereafter, will be attached to each Corps for the carriage of the men's baggage.

No additional or extra pay beyond the rates stated in the Table, will be granted to either Artillery, Cavalry, or Infantry, while employed in any part of the British Territories.

The Artillery and Infantry will be entitled to hutting money.

The Native Officers and Men of the Forces are admissible to Invalid and to Wound and Family Pensions, according to the Regulations applicable to Local and Irregular Troops.

Men who have been transferred from the Line or Irregular Cavalry will retain all Pensionary claims to which they were entitled at the time of their transfer.

The full proportion of Camp Equipage will be attached to the Artillery and Infantry.

The three Light Field Batteries now ordered to be attached to the Punjab Irregular Force, will be formed from the Troops of Durbar Horse Artillery to whom service was guaranteed.

Men belonging to the late Durbar Establishment, to whom a higher rate of Pay than now laid down or other advantage has been guaranteed, will be entitled to retain such advantage and superior Pay.

RULES REGARDING THE PERIODS ALLOWED TO OFFICERS AND OTHERS PROCEEDING TO JOIN THEIR REGIMENTS, &c.

Fort William, the 24th September 1853.

The Most Noble the Governor General in Council is pleased to direct, that the following Rules shall be substituted for the regulations now in force, regarding the periods allowed to Officers and others ordered, or proceeding in ordinary course, from the Presidency to Stations, or from one Station to another, to join their Regiments or Staff appointments:—

I. One month of 30 days will be allowed for preparation in the following cases, viz.:—

1st.—To Officers proceeding from the Presidency, or from one Station to another, to join or to do duty with Regiments, or on appointment to Staff or detached situations.

2nd.—To Officers on return from furlough to Europe, having to proceed from the Presidency to join Corps or Staff or detached appointments.

3rd.—To Officers who return to the Presidency from leave beyond Sea, on Medical certificate, with the privilege of drawing Indian allowances for the time necessary for joining their Regiments or Stations.

4th.—To Warrant Officers under any of the conditions above specified, or when promoted to the Warrant grade and posted to Magazines or stationary Departmental charges, at Stations other than those at which they may be serving.

Also in each subsequent change of Station, by removal to another Magazine or Stationary Departmental charge.

5th.—To European Non-commissioned Officers or Soldiers, on being appointed to the Town Major's list, and directed to join a regiment or appointment at a Station other than that at which they may be serving; and on each subsequent change of Station, by removal to another Regiment or appointment.

II. The time allowed for journeys by water will vary as they may be performed on River Steamers or on common Boats.

III. 1st.—The annexed Table, which is identical with that in Section VII. Pay Code of 1849, shows the time allowed for travelling in Pinnaces, Budgerows or Country Boats, from one River Station to another named therein, which lying on the route to be travelled in each case may be most convenient for embarkation and debarkation.

2nd.—It is to be clearly understood, that Officers and others, proceeding upwards by water to Stations beyond Delhi or Meerut, will be allowed the time for proceeding by the Ganges to Gurhmuktesur Ghât, and not by the Jumna; and the same rule applies to persons travelling from distant Stations downwards.

3rd.—The Ganges route will, in like manner, alone be allowed for in proceeding by water to any Station in the Doab which is not actually upon the Jumna.

4th.—Except under special orders arising from an emergency of the Service, Officers or others will not be allowed to reckon the route by water, from one Station to another, the distances between which are marked in the annexed Table with the letter "A," as for instance from Agra to Cawnpore, or from Lucknow to Delhi. The time allowed in such cases will be only for the journey as performed by land.

IV. 1st.—When the journey or part of it is performed by Steamer, the actual time occupied in transit on board a Steamer from the Station of embarkation to that of debarkation will be allowed.

2nd.—When in consequence of no Steamer being available at the place of embarkation, unavoidable detention may occur, the term of such detention will be allowed, in addition to the actual time of transit.

3rd.—In cases of Officers or others entitled to the month for preparation allowed by Rule I. of this order, should that time be exceeded in consequence of no Steamer being available, it will be necessary to show that no avoidable delay has occurred, but that the first available opportunity has been taken advantage of.

4th.—In case of proceeding by Steamer, the time allowed both for transit and unavoidable detention is not to exceed the time granted for marches, with regular halts, according to the official book of routes and stages from the place of embarkation to that of debarkation; added to the unexpired portion (if any) of the month for preparation specified in Rule I. of this order.

V. If on disembarking from Steamers or other boats, any portion of the journey remains to be prosecuted by land, 15 days from date of disembarkation will be allowed before commencing the land journey.

VI. The time allowed for journeys or portions of journeys by land will, in all cases, be regulated by the official book of routes and stages, one day in seven being considered a halting day.

VII. Time in excess of the periods specified in the foregoing Rules can be allowed only in case of Government or His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief being pleased to grant general leave to cover that excess.

VIII. As the Absentee Rules remain unaffected by the present order, an Officer who shall have proceeded to Sea on leave, under Medical certificate, with a right to full pay and allowances for two years from date of the Pilot's certificate of his having put to Sea, and who shall have returned before the expiry of his leave, will not, by obtaining leave under Rule VII. of this Regulation, even under Medical certificate, secure his allowances for any time in excess of the unexpired portion of his leave to Sea, nor can he retain even his pay proper for any time in excess of 3 years' absence from duty on Medical certificate.

IX. When an Officer or other individual not described in the foregoing Rule VIII., who shall have enjoyed the month for preparation, shall exceed the time allowed under this General Order, and shall obtain leave to cover that excess on grounds other than Medical certificate, he will, from the expiration of 7 months from the date of his arrival at the Presidency, the month of preparation being included therein, forfeit all allowances, retaining only pay proper for the period of excess. If leave be not obtained, pay also will be forfeited.

X. Staff Officers of any Military Department, who, while in transit, are entitled to full Staff allowance, or Horse allowance, under the general Staff Regulations, will, on proceeding from one Station to another, unless expressly ordered to adopt a quicker mode of travelling, be allowed the time prescribed in the official book of routes and stages, with one halt in 7 days. They are however at liberty to adopt, at their own expense, any more expeditious means of conveyance.

XI. Whenever journeys may be performed, partly by land and partly by water, the above Rules for each mode of travelling will govern the time allowed for the several portions of the journey, whether towards or from the Presidency.

XII. 1st.—A declaration showing the route taken, and modes of travelling adopted, also the dates of embarkation and debarkation at the commencement and end of the water route, and dates of prosecuting the journey, to be appended to his first pay-bill after joining by each Officer, or by Officers of departments on account of Warrant and Non-Commissioned Officers and Soldiers.

2nd.—Where detention from a Steamer not being available shall have arisen, a certificate signed by the Superintendent of Marine, if the detention occurred at the Presidency, or if elsewhere, signed by the Commander of a Government Steamer, or by the Agent or Commander of private Companies' Steamers, stating the extent of unavoidable detention and the date on which a passage was obtained, must be attached to the first pay-bill of Officers or others.

The rate of Exchange is fixed annually that for 1859-54 is 2 shillings per Rupee. Officers on the Pension Establishment are not entitled to the indulgence.

The above remittances are effected quarterly, reckoning the year from 1st May to 30th April, and cannot be remitted in advance, for instance no party can remit during the first quarter more than $\frac{1}{4}$ of the amount exhibited above. During the 2nd quarter more than $\frac{1}{4}$ the amount, provided he may have not already remitted for the first quarter. During the 3rd quarter more than $\frac{1}{4}$ of the amount provided also that he may have not remitted for the two previous quarters, and during the 4th quarter more than the established amount under the above proviso, and no arrears of remittances can be allowed beyond the official year.

On a review of the whole of the circumstances connected with these appointments, we have resolved to grant to Veterinary Surgeons the same Pay and Allowances when in India, and the same Furlough Pay in Europe—

- As Cornets of Cavalry during their first 10 years' service,
- As Lieutenants of Cavalry after 10 years' service, and
- As Captains of Cavalry after..... 20 years' service.

This will accord with the relative rank now assigned to our Veterinary Surgeons, and is in conformity with the rule of rank in Her Majesty's Service.

Veterinary Surgeons of Her Majesty's Regiments will receive such addition to the British Pay of their rank, as will place them in the receipt of corresponding allowances to those granted to Veterinary Surgeons in the Company's Service of the same standing.

We have also resolved to grant to Veterinary Surgeons, in lieu of the present scale of Retiring Pensions, the rates specified in the annexed paper, showing the present and revised rates of Pay and Allowances, Furlough Pay and Pensions to Veterinary Surgeons of the Company's Service.

Veterinary Surgeons now in the Service will not be deprived of the benefit of the present Regulations.

Every Officer who shall have served 28 years [3 years furlough included] are permitted to retire on the pay of a Captain; 27 years, on the pay of a Major; 31 years, on the pay of a Lieutenant-Colonel, whether he shall have attained the rank regimentally or not.

Having served 20 years in India, including a three years' furlough, members of the Medical Board and Superintending Surgeons, who have been two years in those situations, are allowed to retire from the Service on Pensions of £500 and £300 per annum respectively, or having served five years therein, on Pensions of £700 and £365 per annum respectively, compelled, by certified sickness, to return to Europe at any time prior to completion of two years, are nevertheless entitled, on retirement, to full pension fixed for that period of Service; and if so compelled after 3 years' service in those situations to return to Europe and retire, to the full pension of £700 and £365 per annum respectively. Retirements under this regulation may take place either at Home or in India.

A Veterinary Surgeon, after having served 20 years, including a Furlough of three, is allowed to retire on 7 shillings per diem; after 13 years, including a Furlough of three, he is allowed to retire on 5s. 6d. per diem; or after 6 years' actual service in India, on 3 shillings per diem, provided, in the two latter cases, the state of his health does not permit him to continue his service in India. Period of service commences from date of landing at the Presidency to which appointed.

INCREASED RATE OF RETIRING PENSION FOR MEDICAL OFFICERS.

The following paragraphs of a Military Letter, No. 3, from the Honourable the Court of Directors, to the Governor General of India in Council, dated 28th February 1844, establishing an increased rate of Retiring Pension for Medical Officers, are published for general information.

Para. 1st. Referring to our Military Letter of the 4th May 1843, No. 6, announcing the introduction of a new scale of pension for our Medical Officers, we have now to apprise you, that we have resolved to establish an intermediate period between the services of twenty and twenty-eight years (three years' furlough included,) on completing which our Medical Officers shall be permitted to retire on an increased pension, and that, accordingly from the date of this despatch, Medical Officers who have served twenty-four years (three years' furlough included) will be entitled to retire on a pension of Pounds Two Hundred and Fifty a year.

2nd. The period of service and rates of pension will, in consequence, hereafter be as follows, viz. —

3rd. With the above exception, no alteration can be admitted in the scales of retiring allowances, which have been established for the various branches of our service.

STAMPS ON COMMISSIONS.

REGULATIONS
OF
THE BENGAL MILITARY FUND.

ESTABLISHED 1ST NOVEMBER 1824.

CORRECTED TO 1ST JANUARY 1858.

SECTION I.

Admission of Subscribers.

ART. 1. The following description of persons, and they alone, are eligible to be subscribers to the Bengal Military Fund.—

1st. Officers or cadets in the military service of the honorable company under the presidency of Fort William.

2nd. Captains of the Bengal establishment.

3rd. Officers of the Bengal medical establishment and veterinary surgeons.

4th. Officers of the Bengal establishment, on the retired list.

ART. 2. Individuals of the descriptions enumerated in the 1st article, who entered the service previous to the 30th August 1826, and who hitherto have not become subscribers, shall only be admissible on the following conditions:—

1st. That the application for admission be accompanied by the certificate of two surgeons, that the person desiring to subscribe is then, to the best of their knowledge, in good health. This certificate being confirmed by the declaration to the same effect, from the person so applying to be admitted. Applications from married officers being also accompanied by a certificate of their marriage, and intimation of the correct age of the parties.

2nd. That donation and arrears of subscription, according to the rank at the time of admission, be paid with compound interest on those sums accumulated half-yearly at the rate of eight per cent. per annum. The arrears to commence from the date of the institution of the fund, or from the entrance of the person into the service, if subsequent to the institution of the same, and prior to 30th August 1826. If the arrears are paid by instalments (which are not to exceed twelve monthly payments from the date of admission) interest at 8 per cent. per annum to be charged on all intermediate balances.

ART. 3. A subscriber withdrawing from the fund, forfeits, *ipso facto*, all claims to its benefits, as also the amount of his donation and subscription, and all other sums which he may have paid up to the period of his secession. Should he afterwards be desirous of again becoming a subscriber, he will be admissible on the same terms as a new subscriber, as described in the 2nd article. Note—This article is applicable to voluntary subscribers only.

ART. 4. Subscribers who may retire from the service on the prescribed pension of their ranks, or in ill-health before entitled thereto, or who may return, permanently, or upon furlough, to Europe, shall not forfeit their title to the benefits of the fund, provided they continue the regular payments of the monthly subscription of their ranks agreeably to the rates laid down for each rank in table No. 11.

ART. 5. Subscribers not in ill-health retiring from the service before they are entitled to the full pension of their rank shall not forfeit all claims on the institution, provided they continue to pay the Indian rates of subscription of their respective ranks.

ART. 6. Officers are permitted to subscribe according to army rank, on furnishing the prescribed certificate of health, subscription and donation, as in every other case, being calculated from date of such rank. Under this rule, medical officers and Veterinary Surgeons may subscribe as captains after 15 years' service.

SECTION II.

Donations and subscriptions to be paid to the Bengal Military Fund.

ART. 7. All subscribers to pay a donation or premium on entering the fund, agreeably to the rates specified in the accompanying table No. 1., and shall also allot for the support of the fund, as long as they shall continue subscribers, the monthly sums specified in table No. 11, agreeably to their rank, whether in India or Europe. The subscriptions of cadets to be calculated at the rank of ensign. Subscription by medical officers in the several grades attached to the 1st, 2nd and 3rd classes is compulsory unless the privilege under article 8 has been assumed.

ART 8 The following rules have effect from first January 1837:—
First.—All members who have served 32 years may subscribe as colonels; all who have served 27 as lieutenant-colonels; all who have served 22 as majors; all who have served 12 as captains; and all junior officers as lieutenants.
Second.—Medical and Veterinary officers may subscribe as colonel after 27 years' service; as lieutenant-colonel after 22 years; as majors after 17 years; and as captains after 10 years.
Third.—Chaplains may subscribe after 15 years as lieutenant-colonels; after 20 years as colonels.
Fourth.—Admission to subscribe in the next higher rank, to which his service may render an officer eligible, shall depend on the payment of the increased donation within the period prescribed by regulation XI. Further, the claim must be made to the managers in India within three months if he be in India, or if at home, within 12 months from the completion of the qualifying service.
Fifth.—If the privilege to subscribe in the next higher rank be not embraced within the above periods, the application, whenever subsequently made, must be accompanied by a health certificate, and compound interest at 8 per cent. per annum shall be charged upon the additional donation and arrears of subscription accumulated half-yearly (as by article 2 of the regulations) from the date of this rule taking effect, or from the completion of the qualifying service.
Sixth.—Retired officers are entitled to enter the higher classes of subscription under the above

conditions, on the expiration of the several periods, which, had they remained in the service, would have given them the same privilege. This rule is applicable to subscribers under article 5.

N. B.—The period of service under this article is calculated by certificates of admission to be furnished from the adjutant general's office. Officers embracing the privilege granted by this rule must comply with all its provisions, calculated through each grade of service.

ART. 9. Subscribers may redeem by a single payment the periodical subscription exigible under article 7, the equivalent fund being determined on this principle.

1. Members in Europe to redeem at Europe rates; in India at Indian rates: calculated by two tables of different values of an annuity, one adapted for Europe (as the Northampton tables,) the other for India (as the Indian tables,) receiving back, or paying the difference of premium according to residence in one, or other country. Parties visiting Europe on furlough, or for a temporary residence not exceeding three years, not to receive the difference, nor parties revisiting India to pay it, if the temporary residence does not exceed 1 year. The value to be taken from tables of which the following is a specimen:

On promotion the subscriber will be liable to pay the donation and to pay or redeem difference of subscription.

2. Members who may redeem their periodical subscriptions by a single payment are precluded the benefit of passage-money and equipment allowance.

3. All subscribers who may, from this date, 1st July 1846, redeem their periodical subscriptions by a single payment shall be liable for the difference between existing rates of subscription and any future higher rates that it may be found necessary to adopt.

ART. 10. Subscribers on promotion shall pay the donation of their increased rank as married or unmarried, agreeably to the rates specified in table No. 1, whether in India or in Europe. If in Europe, the exchange to be calculated at 2s. 6d. per Company's Rupee.

ART. 11. The donation may be paid at once, or by monthly instalments not exceeding twelve, at the option of the subscriber; in failure of which all claims shall be forfeited upon the fund, either for himself or widow, unless the amount be paid with interest at 8 per cent. per annum from the day of admission. Subscribers paying donation by instalments pay interest at 8 per cent. per annum upon all unpaid balances until the whole is liquidated.

ART. 12. Monthly subscriptions shall be made within four months after they become due, in default of which 8 per cent. per annum will be charged on all arrears after that period.

It will be the duty of the secretary to forward a statement of his account to every subscriber, on his payments to the fund, whether subscription or donation, becoming one year in arrears.

In all cases when the above notice has been given, and payment not made interest on the arrears will be charged for the full period.

In the event of payment, as above, being refused, the name will be struck off, if the party entered the service before subscription was compulsory.

Should this account not be furnished, subscribers will not be held liable for the payment of interest beyond the first year.

The secretary will also call on subscribers, who may fall into arrears for three months, for the amount of such arrears, and if unsuccessful in recovering them, lay the case before the directors for their orders.

ART. 13. All members marrying, and who may be desirous that their widows should possess claims to the eventual benefits of the fund, are required to inform the Secretary and Paymaster (if in India and the Agents if in Europe) of their marriage, and unless the payment of the additional donation be made within six months after such marriage, the subscribers will be required to pay the amount with interest at 8 per cent. per annum, calculated from date of marriage, and to furnish a health certificate as required by Art. 2, clause 1st, and no claim for pension on the part of the widow of an officer not subscribing as a married member at the time of his death shall be admissible.

Arrears which may be due to the fund by a married subscriber at the time of his death, will be discharged by the paymaster of the corps to which the deceased was attached, or by the President of the Committee of Adjustment, or by his Executors or Agents, he deceased from the pension of the widow, and the whole donation and arrears to be paid, although the subscriber should become a widower before completing the full payment. In all cases when the difference of

age of the husband exceeds that of the wife 15 years, the donation to be increased 10 per cent. when 20 years, 15 per cent. when 25 years, 20 per cent. when 30 years, 25 per cent. when 35 years, 30 per cent. when 40 years, 35 per cent. and thereafter in a similar proportion in every grade of promotion.

All members re-marrying, to pay the prescribed married donation of their rank as on their first marriage. A subscriber withdrawing his name from the married list during the life-time of his wife and afterwards wishing to be again placed in the same position for her benefit, shall pay a second time the marriage donation, and furnish a health certificate of the form laid down in the Regulation.

N. B.—A member marrying is required to furnish his marriage certificate, and to state his own and his wife's age.

An unmarried subscriber to the fund marrying a person who has borne him children, or with whom he may have been cohabiting, shall not be transferred to the married list, unless he furnishes a health certificate of the form laid down in the Regulations, and pays up the prescribed marriage donation and subscription, with interest, calculated half yearly at 8 per cent. per annum, for five years, commencing in the rank he then held, and paying the difference through each successive rank he may have attained by Regimental promotion.

For the purpose of ensuring accurate information on the required points from applicants, power is vested in the Directors, in all cases seeming to them to call for its exercise, to forward certain sealed queries, to be filled up, on honor, by the parties applying.

ART. 14. As is the case in the funds at Madras and Bombay, a minimum shall be established for each rank, and in the event of a member's contributions not having reached that minimum, a deduction shall be made from the sums otherwise receivable from the fund on account of equipment and income allowances, and from the widows' pension till the deficit be made good; such deduction being, as in the Bombay fund, according to the following scale:—

Ensign,	Two-tenths.
Lieutenant,	Two-ninths.
Captain,	Two-eighths.
Major,	Two-sevenths.
Lieutenant Colonel, ..	Two-sixths.
Colonel,	Two-fifths.

ART. 15. When an officer receives aid from the fund, the aggregate amount of such aid shall be deducted from the amount of his contributions in estimating his minimum.

ART. 16. Subscribers who may be prevented from drawing pay from a temporary cause, over which they had no control, such as captivity, or furlough extended on medical certificate, shall during such period, be exempted from the payment of monthly subscription, without forfeiture of the rights of the subscription; but on the removal of such incapacity and upon the receipt of pay, the arrears are to be made good within six months, with interest at 8 per cent. per annum for any time beyond that period. But if the incapacity to pay proceed from any other cause, dependant upon the choice or conduct of the individual, such as furlough extended on private affairs, or any penal suspension from rank and pay, not only shall the arrears so accumulated be paid up within the above term, but compound interest charged at 8 per cent. per annum on the amount.

SECTION III.

Benefits derivable from the Bengal Military Fund

ART. 17. The benefits derivable from the Military Fund are two-fold:—

1st. Such as are granted by the regulations to subscribers while living.

2nd. Such as are granted to widows of deceased subscribers.

ART. 18. The benefit granted to subscribers while alive, are considered personal, and subject to the decision of the Directors for the time being, who will be guided in their decision on each claim by the regulations of the fund, except when they have reason to entertain doubts with respect to any such claim; it will in such cases be their duty to call for further information from the claimant; and if this information should not be satisfactory to the Directors, they are authorized to withhold the payment of the claim.

ART. 19. A subscriber of whatever rank who may proceed to Europe on sick certificate, and who may not be allowed passage-money from Government, shall be authorized to apply to the Military Fund for the sum of rupees 500 to defray that expense, provided his application shall be accompanied by a sincere and solemn declaration that he does not possess the sum of rupees 500, or property of any description to that amount; and also that he is not in receipt of any pension or gratuity from the agents in England, the sum regulated for the purpose being 500 rupees.

production of a declaration that he neither possesses, nor has at any time possessed, £500 sterling (exclusive of pay) during the period he has been in receipt of English pay on Furlough.

All applications from subscribers for passage-money from the fund, whether proceeding to or returning from Europe, must be accompanied by a guarantee (Form No. VI.) on the part of the Agents of the Ship or other respectable party, that they will be responsible for a moiety of the passage-money allowed by the fund, being returned, in case of death previous to the Pilot quitting the Vessel on which the claimant's passage may have been taken.

ART. 20. A subscriber so proceeding to England on sick certificate, shall be authorized to apply for the further sum of rupees 300 for his equipment, his application being accompanied by a solemn and sincere declaration of his not being possessed of the sum of rupees 2,000, or property of any description to that amount; but no allowance will, in any case, be made for equipment to a subscriber returning to India.

N. B.—The benefits held out in the two preceding articles should be applied for when claiming; and no claim will be admitted which is not preferred within 12 months from date of furlough.

ART. 21. Subaltern officers proceeding to England on sick certificate, who shall make a solemn and sincere declaration that they do not possess from any source (exclusive of pay and pension for wounds) a sum of money that will enable him to expend £30 per annum, shall be allowed that sum annually during the period of receiving English pay on Furlough. The declaration to be renewed annually.

N. B.—The possession of Company's rupees 1,500, or £150, precludes all claim to the above allowance.

ART. 22. It having, however, been deemed necessary to set limits to the claims for gratuitous passage-money, equipment allowance, and income to subscribers proceeding to England on a sick certificate, no subscriber who has received the benefits he is entitled to at any one time shall receive a second indulgence until the expiration of eight years, reckoning from the renewal of Indian subscription.

A subscriber who shall have received these benefits, before he has served 8 years in India, will not be entitled to a second indulgence until he shall have been (exclusive of first Furlough) 16 years in the service.

ART. 23. Subscribers proceeding to England from any place not under the presidency of Bengal, shall be entitled to the personal benefits which have been above enumerated, provided they shall have complied with the local regulations, and shall make immediate communication of the circumstances to the Directors of the fund.

ART. 24. The second class of benefits, namely, those granted to widows of deceased subscribers, are absolute, not dependant on the decision of the Directors, but controlled solely by the regulations of the Institution.

ART. 25. The widows of deceased subscribers shall be entitled to receive the annuities specified in the annexed table:—

Provided that nothing contained herein, or in any other part of these rules of the Institution shall be considered to entitle to the benefits of it any widow who may have been legally divorced or separated from her husband for adultery, or who at the period of her husband's demise may have quitted his protection, and be living in a state of notorious adultery, though not divorced or separated from him by law, or who subsequently to her husband's decease may be living in a notorious state of adultery.

ART. 26. If a widow pensioner on this fund marries, her pension is to cease during her coverture; but in the event of her again becoming a widow, she shall be re-admitted to all the benefits she was entitled to as a widow, in like manner as if she had never been married, provided she complies with the conditions prescribed by the regulations.

In the first instance: If the second husband shall also have been a subscriber to the fund, the widow will receive however only one annuity, making that which may be the greatest; that is to say, according to the rank of the first or second husband, whichever may be the higher.

ART. 27. Every widow benefitting by the military fund, and not provided by government with a passage to Europe, shall be entitled (for one passage only) to an allowance of rupees 1,000. All applications from widows for passage-money from the fund, must be accompanied by a guarantee (Form No. V.) on the part of the Agents of the Ship, or other respectable party, that they will be responsible for a moiety of the passage-money allowed by the fund being returned in cases of death previous to the Pilot quitting the Vessel, on which the claimant's passage may have been taken. No claim for passage-money is admissible after the lapse of one year from the date of embarking for Europe.

ART. 28. Should the fund, however, at any period fall short of the demands upon it, so that the annual income will not defray the amount of the annuities and other claims, then it shall be in the power of the directors, after submission to the Army, to make a proportionate deduction from the annuity of each annuitant, excepting always the present annuitants of the Bengal widows fund, and from the payments to other claimants above the rank of subaltern, until the state of the fund shall afford the means of complete payment; when, if a surplus income exists, the arrears shall be made good from the amount of surplus, but not otherwise.

SECTION IV.

General Regulations.

ART. 29. The Bengal military fund is to be administered by a president and directors, the number of directors to be regulated by the number of divisions in the army as defined by orders issued from time to time by government, for the guidance of the orphan society, each division, being as in the case of the orphan fund management, invited to elect a representative from among the officers residing at Barrackpore, Dum-Dum and the Presidency, who may be available and who are inclined to serve as director, and the directors so chosen shall elect another as their president from among the members at the presidency.

ART. 30. A general meeting of the subscribers at the presidency shall be held annually, at which the accounts of the fund and proceedings of the directors for the past year shall be accounted, for inspection and approval by the subscribers present, who were not of the direction. The accounts to be published for general information two months previous to the annual meeting, the precise day and place of holding which are to be notified by public advertisement simultaneously with the publication of the accounts.

ART. 31. All subscribers, who may have contributed to the fund by paying donations and subscriptions in their respective ranks, during six continued months before any meeting, are entitled to attend to examine the accounts and proceedings.

ART. 32. On occasion of any particular and important business which may necessarily require the opinion of the society at large, special meetings will be called of the subscribers at the presidency (others voting by proxy.) Or if any alleged mismanagement, or other emergent cause should occur to any twelve subscribers to require the notice of the society at large, a special meeting shall be summoned by the president on the written requisition of such twelve subscribers.

ART. 33. The directors shall have a secretary chosen by themselves, who also shall be accountant, with an establishment upon such allowances as shall be deemed adequate to the respective duties.

ART. 34. The secretary will be expected to have an office at his own residence for the accommodation of the meetings of the directors, for the preservation of the records, and for the purpose of affording access to the officers of the army at large to the books of the institution.

ART. 35. The directors of the fund will hold regular monthly meetings, but no meetings, which are to be open for the reporters of the public press, but no meeting of the directors consisting of a smaller number than five, shall be competent to the transaction of business; and it will rest with any director, or with the secretary, to represent the occurrence of such necessity to the president, who will convene a special meeting within ten days from the date of his receiving the application. A special meeting shall be called with the view of re-considering resolutions which may already adopted by a former meeting of directors, unless at the requisition of a number greater than that which attended such meeting.

ART. 36. The secretary will invariably lay before the directors, although the reports of all letters that may have been received by him since the last meeting. Minutes of the special meetings will be recorded, and authenticated by the signatures of the directors. The secretary will also submit to the directors, who attend, a list of the names of the subscribers who may have been desired to contribute to the fund, and when such may be of an ordinary nature, may be replied to by the secretary, without waiting for a

meeting of the directors: but every letter proposed to be dispatched by the secretary, must previously receive the special sanction of one director, signified by his initial to the drafts, which will be sent to him for consideration.

ART. 37. The secretary will keep the set of books in use in the military widows' fund under instructions which he may receive from time to time from the directors of the fund.

ART. 38. The books and correspondence of the fund shall be at all times open to the inspection of subscribers.

ART. 39. When any new regulation shall appear to the directors or to any thirty subscribers, to be advisable, such regulation shall be circulated to corps for consideration, and the affirmative or negative of the majority of individual votes (to be ascertained at the expiration of four months) shall decide its adoption or rejection.

Before being circulated for votes all propositions shall be printed and a copy sent a month previously for publication to each newspaper throughout the Bengal presidency and for circulation to each division and station staff officer; in private cases at the expense of the appellant. The proceedings of the directors' meetings to be published and circulated in like manner.

ART. 40. If any subscriber or claimant on the fund shall be desirous to appeal from the decision of the directors to that of the subscribers at large, upon any subject which may not be specifically defined by the regulations, such appeal, provided it be approved by three directors, shall be referred by the directors, and decided upon in the manner prescribed in the preceding article, and the decision on such appeal, or that of the directors in cases not appealable, shall be final in all cases whatever, any further agitation of the question by a process of law or otherwise, being deemed in itself to be an absolute forfeiture of all claim on the fund.

ART. 41. When a reference shall be made to the subscribers at large respecting either a proposed regulation, or an appeal, the result of such reference shall be communicated to corps for the information of subscribers.

ART. 42. Generally all payments due from the fund are made quarterly in England, and monthly in India; but in cases when pensioners or claimants on the fund are about to embark for Europe, all arrears must be paid up to the end of the preceding month.

ART. 43. Any arrear which may be due to the fund by a subscriber or by an annuitant who may have received an over-payment, shall in all cases be deducted from the first payments to be made from the fund to the person owing such arrear.

ART. 44. All income derived from the Bengal Military Fund is declared to be unalienable, and the fact of attempting the alienation of such income in any manner, or under any pretence, shall be deemed in itself a forfeiture of all future benefits from the fund.

ART. 45. If a subscriber who may be dismissed from the service by a court martial or otherwise, shall afterwards be restored to the service, he shall be re-admissible to the fund on payment of the arrear that may have accumulated, with compound interest thereon, in the same manner as if he had suffered only temporary suspension. See Art. 14.

ART. 46. All property belonging to the military fund at any period shall be invariably vested in the honorable company's securities. The necessity for retaining any balance is now dispensed with; and the secretary's office has no cash transactions. All payments in India are, in future, to be made at the Bank of Bengal, as sanctioned by the honorable court of directors, in 1852. All contributions from subscribers generally must be made through the pay department or public treasury. Private drafts are prohibited.

ART. 47. The business of the fund in Europe is conducted through the home agent of the fund, who will from time to time receive the necessary instructions for their guidance, and to whom such applications will be preferred as cannot with equal convenience be submitted to the directors of the fund in India.

ART. 48. As soon as new rules are made out, one copy shall be sent to all officers commanding stations and posts for official record and the rules shall be corrected and published annually in the Army List printed at the Orphan Press, the dates when each was passed or altered, being noted in the margin.

N. B. In general it may be mentioned that where no particular dates are referred to, the rules have not been altered since the establishment of the fund.

NOTE.—As subscribers falling into arrears often request exemption from the penalties prescribed by the regulations, on the plea of ignorance of the rules, or of no demand having been made by the secretary, the Directors notify that they do not admit either of these reasons as sufficient to entitle a subscriber to the exemption called for, and that every penalty incurred by non-payment of Donations and Subscriptions must invariably and strictly be enforced, as prescribed by the rules of the Institution. The Secretary will continue to give notice when arrears are due, in all cases brought to his knowledge, but every subscriber should protect his own interests, and see that his Donations and Subscriptions are regularly deducted by his paymaster, and immediately sent to the Secretary of the fund.

QUEEN'S MILITARY FUND.

Regulations of a General Military Fund, for the benefit of widows and children of deceased officers, in Her Majesty's Service in India, established in 1820, and revised in 1821; and Rules 21 and 22 added in 1845.

Under the protection and countenance of the Most Noble the Marquess of Hastings, commander-in-chief in India, the above named fund was established in the year 1820, for the purpose of sending home, in comfort and respectability, the families of deceased officers in her majesty's regiments, serving in India, who may have been left destitute; and of preventing the painful and degrading practice of appealing to the public for subscriptions on such occasions; and also of providing relief in such cases as may require it, until they can be conveniently sent home.

It having since been found advisable to make some alterations in the rules and regulations then established, the following revised regulations, passed with the general consent of the officers of the army, have been approved of by his excellency the right honorable Viscount Combermere, commander-in-chief in India, who has been pleased to become patron to the institution.

His Excellency Sir Hugh Gough, Bart. G. C. B., commander-in-chief in India, with reference to several cases, arising out of the death of officers on the voyage from India to England, leaving their widows and children in circumstances of great distress, and with advertence also to the manifest justice of allowing all widows and children of officers, being subscribers to the fund, who may die at the Cape of Good Hope, the Mauritius, or New South Wales, the benefits of the Military Fund, directed Rule 21—to be proposed for the consideration of the whole body of subscribers, and it having been carried by the votes of 227 members, with a minority only of 35, the Rule is accordingly rendered permanent, together with Rule 22, proposed at the same time, which was voted for by 233 members, and a minority of 29.

1st. That the committee of general management formed at Calcutta, shall consist of the following persons for the time being, they being subscribers; viz:—

The major-general commanding the presidency division.
 The adjutant general of her majesty's forces in India.
 The quarter master general of her majesty's forces in India.
 The inspector General of Hospitals.
 The Commandant of Fort William.
 The assistant adjutant general of her majesty's forces in India.
 The two senior officers of her majesty's regiment quartered in Fort William.
 Two senior subalterns of ditto.
 Commandant of depot.
 The military secretary to the commander-in-chief.
 The major of brigade of her majesty's forces.
 The paymaster of her majesty's troops, and
 The paymaster of her majesty's Regiment, quartered in Fort William.

2nd. That a sub-committee for inquiring into all circumstances connected with this fund, and acting under the general committee, shall be formed at Madras and Bombay, composed as follows:—such officers being subscribers:—

The commander-in-chief, the Patron.
 The senior officers of her majesty's army at the presidency.
 All officers of the general staff.
 The two senior officers of her majesty's regiments stationed at the presidency.
 The two senior subalterns of ditto.

And that the major of brigade of Queen's Troops may be good enough to act as honorary secretary.

3rd. That every officer shall pay monthly according to his rank, as specified in the margin.

5th. All officers shall subscribe to the fund within three months after joining their regiments or stations, and bachelors within three months after their marriage: any officer neglecting so to do, shall at no future time be admitted as a subscriber, unless by the sanction of the general committee, always paying up arrears from the date of his joining or marriage, (as the case may be) or if in India at the time, from the date, of the revision of these regulations, 1st August 1827.

6th. That in order to obviate the difficulties which would arise from the occasional remote situations of her majesty's corps, serving under the several presidencies, the most noble the governor general in council, was pleased to order and direct, when the fund was established, that bills may be granted to the paymasters of her majesty's regiments by the governments of Madras and Bombay, on the government of Bengal, at the exchange of 108 Calcutta sicca rupees for every 116 Madras rupees, and 325 Calcutta sicca rupees, for every 350 Bombay rupees, payable at sight to the agent or agents of the Queen's Military Fund, acting for the committee of general management, Fort William, thereby avoiding commission, double agency, and risks of exchange.

7th. That all grants of assistance from this fund shall be regulated and assigned by committees of subscribers, as herein declared.

8th. That in order to ascertain the circumstances of any widow or family, who may have become destitute by the death of any regimental officer, such widow shall memorialize or represent the case of herself and family, through the commanding officer of the corps, the casualty occurred in, in order to its being brought to the consideration of a committee, and the commanding officer shall, as far as his knowledge will enable him, state his opinion of any case so received.

9th. That whenever there may be fixed corps of her majesty's service or more than one stationed together at the same time, every application for relief from this fund shall be heard and decided on by a general committee, composed as equally as possible, of officers from such corps present, being subscribers to the fund.

GENERAL COMMITTEE.

President.—A field officer, (if practicable)
1 Captain, or Surgeon, or Paymaster ? Lieutenants, or 1 Lieutenant and 1 Quarter Master, 1 Ensign, or Assistant Surgeon.

10th. As it may often happen, that officers die while the corps they belong to is stationed by itself or remotely detached, it shall be in the power of every commanding officer of a regiment so situated, to assemble a committee of any five officers (being subscribers,) to hear and decide upon the case of any widows and children, so become destitute, and seeking relief from this fund. It shall also be competent for the commander-in-chief at either presidency, to assemble a special committee, to report on the case of any lady who may become a widow, whilst the regiment, to which her husband belonged, shall be at another distant station, or on service beyond sea.

11th. That such general, special, or regimental committees as the case shall be, having duly examined into the circumstances of the party seeking relief, shall report their opinion on, and recommend the amount to be granted, whether for passage-money or maintenance, strictly in conformity with the regulations annexed. The opinion and recommendation of such committees shall be forwarded to the agent or agents of the general committee, if in Bengal, or to the honorary secretary of the sub-committee, or such person as may be appointed by the commander-in-chief; if at the presidency of Madras or Bombay, by the officer commanding the corps in which the casualty may have occurred.

Paymaster authorized to afford immediate relief to prevent distress or inconvenience.

12th.—The Sub-Committee at Madras and Bombay will, on satisfying themselves with the accuracy of the statements laid before them, draw upon the Agent or Agents of the Queen's Military Fund, acting for the Committee of General Management, Fort William, for the amount of the sum which may be awarded: but in the final adjustment of the accounts of such Sub-Committee, the General Committee will consider themselves bound to object to any sum, however trifling, which may be granted in excess of the Rules laid down.

13th.—The Sub-Committee will, on drawing for any sum on the Agent or Agents of the Queen's Military Fund, acting for the Committee of General Management, transmit the Report of the Station Committee, as well as their own opinion and explanations of the Award, as a voucher, and they will afterwards, as soon as possible, transmit the proper Receipts and Certificates, showing that the money has been appropriated in the manner and for the purposes for which it was awarded.

Appeal to all Officers to support the Fund.

14th.—The object of this Fund being clearly confined to tending Home distressed Families of deceased Officers, with a view of preventing those painful appeals for assistance to the Public, at once so humiliating to respectable individuals and the Queen's Service in India, it is earnestly hoped that all ranks of Staff and Regimental Officers will support it.

Limit of time as hereafter, it is distinctly declared, that no Widow who is not in distressed circumstances or no Lady continuing to reside in this country after the death of her husband, can expect any provision or pension for herself or children from the Fund further than is stated in the 8th Clause of the Schedule of Awards. It is also declared, that no Widow is entitled to passage-money or allowance for travelling, unless she shall actually proceed to Sea or on her journey in the manner for which any allowance may have been drawn, and should she have received such allowance, she will be required to refund: and further that no Widow, under any circumstances, shall be entitled to any assistance from this Fund, unless the application shall be made in the usual form within six months after the demise of her husband.

15th.—But to prevent doubts and misconceptions which might possibly arise hereafter, it is distinctly declared, that no Widow who is not in distressed circumstances or no Lady continuing to reside in this country after the death of her husband, can expect any provision or pension for herself or children from the Fund further than is stated in the 8th Clause of the Schedule of Awards. It is also declared, that no Widow is entitled to passage-money or allowance for travelling, unless she shall actually proceed to Sea or on her journey in the manner for which any allowance may have been drawn, and should she have received such allowance, she will be required to refund: and further that no Widow, under any circumstances, shall be entitled to any assistance from this Fund, unless the application shall be made in the usual form within six months after the demise of her husband.

16th.—Orphan Children are eligible for the benefits of this Fund, but awards for them must be specially made by a General or Sub-Committee and sanctioned by the Commander in-Chief of the Presidency, who is requested to appoint some eligible person to take care of them, and provide a passage, &c. &c.

Orphan Children.

17th.—That the Agent or Agents of the Queen's Military Fund, acting for the Committee of General Management, Fort William, shall furnish an annual Account of the Receipts and Disbursements of this Fund, agreeably to forms annexed, to the Adjutant General of Her Majesty's Forces; and that, that Officer be applied to, to circulate the same amongst the Subscribers, and the several Officers of Government at the three Presidencies.

Annual account to be furnished by Secretary.

18th.—That Commanding Officers of Her Majesty's Regiments be requested to pay particular attention in causing the regular quarterly remittances to be made to the Agent or Agents of the Queen's Military Fund, acting for the Committee of General Management, Fort William, who are requested from time to time to apprise Commanding Officers whenever any Corps may fail in making such remittances.

Commanding Officers to cause regular Remittances quarterly of Subscriptions.

19th.—That no general Rule or Regulation of this Fund shall be altered, except recommended by the General Committee, and approved by a majority of the Subscribers.

Alteration of rules of the Subscribers.

20th.—In taking the opinion of the Regiments and Staff Officers Her Majesty's Forces in India, a very general wish has been expressed that all Widows should have their passage to England, &c. &c. defrayed. The Funds will not now admit of it, but should the positive standing balance of the Fund ever amount to forty thousand rupees (40,000) the committee will again put the question for the sense of the subscribers, with a provision that such charge should again cease or the balance falling to thirty-thousand rupees (30,000) and as in that event all married officers will have a claim on the Fund their subscriptions should then be augmented. As an officer ceases to be a subscriber on leaving India, all claims on the Fund must in like manner cease from the same period; but an officer going to Sea for the benefit of his health, being entitled to his company's allowances, will be considered as a subscriber during his absence.

Officers on leave drawing Indian Pay.

21st.—That all widows of officers, who were subscribers to the Fund, shall be entitled to the amount granted to all widows and children, for passage-money to England, if their husbands die on their passage to England, or during their absence on sick certificate, at the Cape of Good Hope, the Mauritius, or New South Wales.

Special Grants.

22nd.—That no special grants, in cases of great distress, (not provided for in the regulations of the Fund) shall be passed by the General Committee in Calcutta, or the sub-committee at Madras or Bombay, without the sanction of the majority of subscribers; which sanction is to be declared in the General Abstract of Account, published annually for the information of subscribers.

If an officer shall die at Calcutta, Madras, or Bombay, or within 14 days' march of the three presidencies, his widow shall receive an allowance equal to the full pay and allowance of her deceased husband for two months, and no longer, unless it shall be certified by a Queen's medical officer, that she is, from ill health or an approaching confinement, unable to proceed to sea; in which case this allowance may be extended to such further period, (on no occasion exceeding in the whole four months,) as may be considered necessary by the medical officer. Maintenance.

4th. Subsidies according to the same rate be granted to such widows, whose husbands may die at a greater distance from either presidency, according to the annexed scale No. 1.

As to Travelling. 3th. The nature of the climate not admitting persons to travel at all seasons of the year, and the months noted in the annexed scale, No. 1, having been ascertained to be the only practicable ones, any lady becoming a widow at any other period, shall, in addition to all other claims, be allowed subsistence until she can proceed on her journey.

8th. An officer travelling, being allowed no additional pay, unless on duty, the full pay and allowances of her deceased husband's rank, are deemed sufficient to enable any lady to proceed to the presidency.

7th. Every lady receiving subsistence under Regulations 5 and 6, shall be entitled to one month's full pay and allowance, and no more, over and above the time required for her journey to the presidency, unless it is shown by a medical certificate, as per No. 3, that she is, from ill-health or approaching confinement, unable to travel; but in no case shall the allowance be drawn for a period exceeding 3 months in addition to the time allowed for travelling.

8th. Any lady intending to reside in the East Indies, shall be allowed to draw for the number of months' march, required to proceed to the place of intended residence, under the restrictions, &c. allowed for those proceeding to England, and three months' full pay, and allowance in addition, in full of all demands on the fund.

Pensions to non-commissioned officers and privates, are paid from the day of their debarkation in England, as follows:—

Sergeant of artillery, 9d. per day, 1st to those who have lost a limb. Privates of ditto, 6d, ditto and 9d, to ditto ditto.

All other non-commissioned officers and privates receive 4 pence 3 farthings. The pensions to commissioned, warrant, and non-commissioned officers and soldiers, are payable half-yearly, at the India House, in London, without deduction, at Midsummer and Christmas; but if non-commissioned officers and soldiers receive their pensions in the country, which, if they reside more than 25 miles from London, they are permitted to do by the special leave of the Court of Directors, who will appoint a proper person for paying them, a shilling will be charged on each payment, for the person who pays them.

The pensions of commissioned and warrant officers are payable as they fall due; non-commissioned officers and privates paid in advance, on their landing, for the broken period, to the end of the first half year, and afterwards half yearly, in advance.

PENSION TO WIDOWS.

The widows of commissioned and warrant officers, are entitled to a sum equal to one-fourth of the pay of their husbands, upon providing satisfactory evidence that their husbands did not die possessed of property, to the amount stated opposite to their respective rank, as follows:—

Widows of non-commissioned officers and privates, are entitled to the sum fixed for the pensions of their husbands, payable half-yearly in England or monthly in India.

Deed of the Bengal Medical Retiring Fund being the Regulations of the Society, prepared by Messrs. Collier, Bird and Grant.

To all to whom these presents shall come, the persons whose names are hereunder written, respectively of the Medical Service of the Honorable East India Company, on their Bengal establishment, send greeting. **Preamble.** WHEREAS in the year of Our Lord 1833, certain members of the said Medical Service of the said Honorable East India Company, for the purpose of establishing a fund sufficient to provide annuities for the senior officers of the said Medical Service, and to enable them to retire sooner than they could previously have done from and to accelerate promotion in the said service, formed themselves into a society and instituted a fund by subscriptions; and also made certain regulations for the management and conducting of the said society, which were printed, but no deed was ever executed by the subscribers to the said fund. And whereas, for the purposes of carrying into effect the intentions of the subscribers to the said fund, the persons whose names are hereunder written, being members of the said Medical Service and subscribers to the said fund, have obtained the sanction of the Honorable Court of Directors, and have also agreed to become parties to, and execute these presents, as hereinafter is expressed and contained. Now THEREFORE **KNOW YE** and these presents WITNESS, that for the purpose of providing annuities for the senior officers, of the said Medical Service of the said Honorable East India Company on their said Bengal establishment, who are subscribers to the said fund, and to enable the said senior Medical officers to retire sooner than they could previously have done from, and to accelerate promotion in the said Medical service, and for the better management of the said society, the persons whose names are hereunder written, respectively of the said Medical Service, do, and each and every of them doth, covenant, promise, declare, and agree, with and to the others and other of them collectively and individually, in manner following, that is to say: that they, the said parties, whose names are hereunder written, and each and every of them, each covenanting for himself respectively as aforesaid, shall and will observe, perform, abide by, confirm to, fulfil, and keep, all and singular, the several and respective articles, clauses, provisos, powers, conditions, declarations, agreements, matters, and things whatsoever, hereinafter contained expressed and declared, that is to say:—

I. That the several persons, parties to these presents, whose names are hereunder written, covenant and agree, in manner aforesaid, to be and remain members of the said society, and subscribers to the said fund. **Covenant.**

II. That the said fund shall be called the "Bengal Medical Retiring Fund."

III. That the said society and fund shall be open for admission as members and subscribers to all the officers of the said Bengal Medical Service; (with the exception of those Assistant Surgeons who have given up promotion) who were in India on the 1st day of January 1833, the date of the institution of the said fund; or who were on leave or furlough, but who have now returned, and who shall pay up their Subscriptions after the rate agreed to by the original subscribers to the said fund, and hereinafter expressed, to be computed from the said 1st day of January 1833; and to all Medical servants, who have since the said 1st day of Jan. 1833, entered the said Medical service, and who shall pay up their subscriptions after the rate hereinafter mentioned, to be computed

Who are eligible to be members of the society and subscribers to the fund.

from the day of their arrival in India; and to all such Medical servants on the said Bengal establishment, who are now absent on leave or on furlough, who shall apply for admission to become members of the said society and subscribers to the said fund, on or before the expiration of six calendar months from the day of their return to India from such leave or furlough, and shall pay up all such subscriptions and arrears of subscriptions, in the manner hereinafter provided for persons on leave or furlough. Provided always, and it is hereby declared by and between the several parties to these presents, that all such Medical

servants who were in India on the 1st day of January 1833, and who shall not become subscribers to the said fund on or before the 31st day of October 1836, must obtain the consent of a majority of the subscribers to the said fund, before they can become subscribers thereto; and shall also pay up all arrears of subscriptions to be computed from the 1st day of January 1833, together with interest thereon, after the rate of 6 per cent. per annum, with annual rests on the 1st day of January; in each and every succeeding year; and (in case any of such subscribers shall not pay up all their arrears at once) shall also insure their lives for the said arrears, or so much thereof as shall from time to time remain due and unpaid, and keep up such life insurance until the whole arrears are fully paid up; and also all Medical servants who were in the said service on the said 1st day of January 1833, but were absent from India on furlough or leave, who shall, on returning from such furlough or leave to India, refuse or neglect, before the expiration of six calendar months after such return, to apply for admission to become subscribers to the said fund, such Medical servants must procure the consent of a majority of the subscribers to the said fund, at the time being in India, before they shall be admitted to be subscribers to the said fund; and shall also pay up all arrears of subscriptions, to be computed from the said 1st day of January 1833, together with interest thereon after the rate of six per cent. per annum with annual rests on the 1st day of January in each and every succeeding year; and (in case all such arrears shall not be paid up at once) shall also insure their lives for the amount of the said arrears, in the manner last aforesaid.

IV. That the monthly subscriptions to the said fund shall be in the proportions, and after the manner following, that is to say, all members of the Bengal Medical Board, who are or may be subscribers to the said fund, shall pay, or cause to be paid, the monthly sum of Sa. Rs. 120, or Co.'s Rs. 128; and such of the said subscribers of the said fund as are or may become Superintending Surgeons, the monthly sum of Sa. Rs. 80, or Co.'s Rs. 85-5-4; and such as are or may become surgeons, the monthly sum of Sa. Rs. 25, or Co.'s Rs. 29-13-10 One hundred and eighty Major Assistant Surgeons the monthly sum of Sa. Rs. 16, or Co.'s Rs. 17-1; the succeeding sixty 1st. Surgeons the monthly sum of Sa. Rs. 10 or Co.'s Rs. 10-10-8; and all remaining Assistant-Surgeons the monthly sum of Sa. Rs. 6 or Co.'s Rs. 6-6-4; which said several monthly subscriptions shall be paid and payable on or before the 12th day of each and every succeeding month.

(Modifications of Rule IV.)—This rule modified as respects subscriptions of Members of the Medical Board and Superintending Surgeons who proceed on furlough, as per undermentioned extract from the quarterly proceedings, dated 12th April 1841.

As by General Orders dated 24th April 1844 No. 93 a higher rate of furlough Pay has been granted to members of the Medical Board (£456-11-3 per annum) and superintending surgeons (£365 per annum) than had been previously assigned to those ranks, it becomes necessary to adopt a scale of subscriptions for them commensurate with their enhanced furlough pay, and in proportion to the amount payable by surgeons, to which effect no provision had been made in the full rules because when they were framed the higher ranks of the Medical Service enjoyed no higher furlough pay than that of surgeons. The under-mentioned new scale of subscriptions was accordingly submitted for the notes of subscribers with the secretary's letter No. 216 of the 17th December last, and the following is the state of the Poll. Members of the Medical Board to pay Sa. Rs. 67 or Co. Rs. 71 7-5 per month at the minimum on Sa. Rs. 133 or Co. Rs. 141 13-10 at the maximum rate while on furlough.

In consequence of a difference of opinion in the reading of the proviso of Rule V., which provides for the sum Sa. Rs. 30,000, or Co.'s Rs. 32,000, being held as surplus to meet contingencies beyond each year's requirement; a proposition was submitted for votes of Subscribers, June 5th 1843.

VI. That for the purpose of securing the regular payment of the said subscriptions, or monthly payments as aforesaid, each and every of the subscribers to the said fund, do, shall and will authorize and empower the Pay-Master of the said Honorable East India Company, or other officer acting as Pay-Master for the time being, to deduct and retain, from the respective pay and allowances of the said subscribers to the said Fund, such sum and sums of money as shall and may be requisite for the payment of their respective subscriptions and donations, according to their respective grades in the Medical service, and in the proportions aforesaid, to be paid over by the said Pay-Master, or other

Subscribers shall authorize the paymaster of the honorable East India Company, to deduct their subscriptions from their pay

officer so acting as aforesaid as Pay-Master, to the Sub-Treasurer of the said Honorable East India Company, or to such other person or persons as may be legally authorized, by a majority of the subscribers and the said Honorable East India Company, to receive the same.

Members on admission, to pay four months' subscriptions as donations to the Society.

VII. That each of the members of the said Medical Service shall on becoming a subscriber to the said fund, pay up four months' subscriptions of his particular class, and each subscriber, on commencing a higher class, shall pay the difference between four months' subscriptions of his previous class, and four months' subscriptions of his new class, as donations to the said fund, in addition to his monthly subscriptions.

Subscriptions falling in arrears, to be paid off within six months, and if not paid off, interest to be charged, &c.

VIII. That, in the event of any subscriber permitting his subscriptions or payments to fall in arrear, unless occasioned by absence on furlough, or otherwise, from India, such arrears of subscriptions shall be paid up within six calendar months after they shall so become payable, and at the expiration of that period, and after due notice being given to the subscribers whose subscriptions or payments may so fall in arrear, of such arrears being due and payable, and in the event of the said subscriber still refusing or neglecting to pay up the said arrears, interest shall be charged upon the said arrears, at the rate of eight per cent. per annum, to be computed from the day on which the said arrears shall so fall due; and in case the said arrears, together with interest as last aforesaid, shall not be paid off and satisfied, or satisfactory security shall not be given for the due payment thereof, on or before the expiration of twelve calendar months after the said arrears shall so fall due, the Committee of Management shall submit the circumstances of such cases to the subscribers to the said fund, as to whether such subscriber, so allowing his subscription to fall in arrear, shall be thereafter considered as a subscriber to the said fund; and in case it shall be decided by a majority of the subscribers, that he shall not be longer considered as a subscriber, his previous subscriptions and payments shall be forfeited to the said fund.

Subscribers on furlough or leave, permitting their subscriptions to fall in arrears, shall, unless paid sooner, pay arrears by instalments, with interest, and each instalment to be at least double his monthly subscription.

IX. That if any subscriber shall, while absent on furlough or otherwise absent from India, permit his subscriptions to fall in arrears, such subscriber, (Addition to Rule IX.) That a Life Insurance be also required to obviate loss to the fund in case of laps. Vide proceedings of Quarterly General Meeting held on the 14th January 1830.

IX. The above proposition was submitted for votes of Subscribers, 5th March 1839—

unless he shall sooner pay off the same, shall pay the said arrears by monthly instalments together with interest thereon, at the rate of six per cent. per annum, such interest to be computed from the expiration of three calendar months, after the return of the said subscriber to India, and the instalments in no case to be less than twice the said subscriber's monthly subscription.

Subscriber suspended from the service, to forfeit all benefit in the Fund, and his subscriptions previously to his suspension; Or dismissed.

X. That in case any subscribers shall, or may be suspended from the said service, such subscriber shall not from and after the date of his suspension, be considered a subscriber to the said fund, nor entitled to any benefit from it; nor to receive back the whole, or any part of the sums of money which he may have subscribed. And in case of his final dismissal, from the said service, he shall, from the date of such dismissal, cease to be a member of the said society; and to have any interest in the said fund; but shall forfeit to

the said Society whatever subscriptions, payments, and sums of money he may have paid into the said fund, previously to his dismissal as aforesaid. Provided always, that if any subscriber, so suspended or dismissed as last aforesaid, shall be afterwards restored to said service, he shall again be a member of the said society, and a subscriber to the said fund, and shall have the same interest and benefit in the said fund, as if he had not been suspended or dismissed as aforesaid, upon the said subscriber paying up all arrears of subscriptions and payments, which may be due at the time of, and which may become payable after his suspension or dismissal with interest thereon, after the rate of six per cent. per annum.

The secretary not to retain more than Rs. 1,000 in his possession at one time.

XI. That at no time shall the Secretary to the said society, to be appointed as hereinafter is mentioned, retain in his possession a larger sum of the said funds of the said Society than Rs. 1,000; but when, and as soon as, any of the funds of the said Society shall accumulate in his hands, to that sum, he shall immediately pay over the same, to the Sub-Treasurer of the said Honorable East India Company, or to such other person or persons as may be legally authorized, to receive the same as aforesaid, to be placed to the credit of the said society.

Note XI. N. B.—The Secretary receives no moneys; because the Sub-Treasurer is to

Government, as officio Treasurer of the Fund, and as such he is also the custodian of all Treasury Notes belonging to it. The Secretary's Office not being one of receipt and payment, no money is to be remitted to it, but all payments of subscription current or in arrear on account of the Fund must be made through a Government Treasury. Claims on the Fund are discharged by order of payment on the General Treasury under the countersignature of the Finance Committee.

N. B.—That three now constitute a quorum, and their proceedings be subject to the approval of a majority of the Committee, (vide Report of the Quarterly Meeting, held 11th January 1839.)

N. B.—A Section of the Committee of Management, consisting of three members, act as a Finance Committee, and countersign all orders on the General Treasury for payment of claims upon the Fund.

XII. That there shall be a Committee of Management for the managing and conducting the business of the said society which said committee shall be made up, and consist of eight subscribers to the said fund, holding appointments within the presidency of Fort William, or not residing further from Calcutta than Barrackpore, of which said committee five shall always form, and be a quorum.

Committee of Management.

XIII. That the said Committee of Management shall be elected by a majority of the subscribers to the said fund resident in India at the time of the election.

How the Committee of Management is to be elected.

XIV. That the two senior members of the said Committee of Management shall go out of the said committee annually by rotation, on the second Monday, of January in each and every year, and two others shall be elected in their places and stead as aforesaid; Provided always, and it is hereby declared, that such members of the said Committee of Management so retiring by rotation as aforesaid, or either of them, may be immediately re-elected to be members of the said Committee of Management, provided they or he be otherwise qualified to be members of the said Committee of Management; any thing hereinbefore contained, to the contrary in anywise notwithstanding.

The two senior members of the Committee of Management to retire annually. *Proviso.*

XV. That in the event of any vacancy or vacancies occurring in the said Committee of Management, by the departure of any one or more of the said committee from the presidency, without the intention of returning before the expiration of one year from such departure; or by death, or by a majority of the subscribers removing, any one or more of the said committee from the said management, by any of the said committee themselves, being desirous of retiring from the said management, or otherwise howsoever; such vacancy or vacancies shall be filled up for the remaining part of the year, betwixt the day of such vacancy or vacancies occurring; and the next following day of election, by a majority of the subscribers who may be present at such meeting as shall be called for the purpose of filling up such vacancy or vacancies. Provided always, and it is hereby declared, that on the said election day next following, such vacancy or vacancies shall be filled up by a majority of the subscribers then resident in India; in the same manner as the vacancies occasioned by the two senior members of the said committee retiring, as hereinbefore is mentioned. And it is hereby declared, that such members so appointed to fill up such last mentioned vacancies in the said Committee of Management, shall stand in the places and stead of the persons so vacating their places; and shall retire at the same time, and in the same manner, as if they had been originally appointed, instead of the persons so occasioning such vacancies as aforesaid.

How to fill up vacancies in the Committee of Management.

Proviso.

XVI. That the Secretary to the said Society shall hereafter, as heretofore, be elected by the subscribers resident in India at the time being, when such election shall take place, and shall be allowed a monthly salary, to be paid out of the said fund, the amount of which shall be declared by a majority of the said subscribers; and in the event of the said office of Secretary becoming vacant, in any manner howsoever, the said office shall be filled up temporarily by a majority of the Committee of Management; and such vacancy shall be filled up permanently by a majority of the subscribers as aforesaid, whose votes shall be obtained through the Acting Secretary for the time being, by circular letter, as soon as conveniently may be after such vacancy occurring.

How the Secretary to be elected on a vacancy occurring.

XVII. That the subscribers to the said fund, resident in India at the time being, may at any time remove any member or members of the said Committee of Management from acting in the management of the affairs of the said Society, and from being members of the said Committee; and also may, in like manner, remove the Secretary to the said Society, from being Secretary, whose respective places shall be filled up as hereinbefore mentioned in that behalf.

Member of the Committee of Management and Secretary may be removed.

Agents to be appointed in England.

XVIII. That an agent or agents shall be appointed in England by a majority of the subscribers present at any quarterly or other general meeting at which such appointment shall be made, and which agent or agents shall act under the directions of the said Committee of Management; for the management of the affairs of the said Society in England; which said agent or agents may be removed from each agency, and another or others appointed in his or their place and stead, by a majority of the subscribers who shall be present at any quarterly or other general meeting, at which such removal and appointment shall respectively take place and be made.

General Meeting of the subscribers to be held four times a year.

XIX. That a general meeting of the subscribers to the said fund shall be held four times in every year, viz. on the second Monday of January, on the second Monday of April, on the second Monday of July, and on the second Monday of October, for the purposes of inspecting and auditing all accounts, in any way or manner chargeable upon the said fund; or considering and examining all minutes of the said committee, and for passing all such orders and resolutions as may be necessary for the management of the affairs of the said Society.

V. B.—Messrs. Coutts and Co., Bankers, Strand, London, are the present Agents to the Fund, appointed in succession to Cockerell, Larpent and Co., on their becoming Bankrupt.

How matters affecting the fund are to be disposed of.

XX. That all applications and proposals of every kind and nature whatsoever, in any manner affecting the said fund, shall be first laid before the said Committee of Management, for their investigation and decision, after which they shall be submitted by the said Committee of Management, to the first general quarterly meeting, after such application or proposal being made, for the approval of such general quarterly meeting; provided such application or proposal be laid before the said Committee of Management at least forty-two days previously to such general quarterly meeting being held; and it is hereby declared, that in case the person or persons, so making any application or proposition as aforesaid, shall not be satisfied with the decision of the said Committee of Management, and general quarterly meeting to which such application or proposition may have been submitted, then such person or persons making such application or proposal may appeal against the decision of the said Committee of Management and general quarterly meeting, to the judgment and decision of the whole of the said subscribers in India; which appeal shall be submitted to the said subscribers, individually, by circular letter, by and through the said Committee of Management; and that the decision of such of the subscribers as shall give in their votes to the said Committee of Management, on or before the expiration of three calendar months next after such appeal shall be submitted to them, shall be final.

All approved transactions to be printed and distributed amongst the members.

XXI. That after the transactions of the said Committee of Management have been approved of by the general quarterly meeting to which they may be submitted for that purpose, the said Committee of Management shall cause the said approved transactions to be printed; and shall furnish each subscriber with a copy thereof, together with an abstract of the accounts of the said fund at the termination of every year.

Six annuities of £70 to be offered annually to the subscriber.

XXII. That six annuities of three hundred pounds sterling each, shall be offered annually to the subscribers to the said fund, the six senior servants of the said medical service (such seniority, to be computed according to their standing in the service) shall have the first refusal, and in the case of all, or any of the said six senior subscribers, declining to accept of the said annuities, then the next senior subscribers in succession shall have a like refusal of the said annuities, or so many of them as shall be so refused. And in the event of all or any of the said annuities being refused, such unaccepted annuities shall stand over until the following year, unless accepted in the mean time, when they shall be again offered as above-mentioned, together with the six annuities for the said following year; and so on in like manner every succeeding year, which said annuities shall continue during the natural life of the said annuitants. Provided always that the subscribers who shall be entitled, from their seniority in the said medical service, to the refusal of the said annuities, shall have conformed in all respects with the rules, provisions, declarations and agreements of the said society herein contained or to be at any time hereafter made.

N. B.—Any annuity that may remain unappropriated after 31st October of each year, will be held available until July succeeding, to any subscriber qualified by service; and in case of any one annuity only remaining available, and there being two or more applications for the same, on the same day, such remaining annuity will be appropriated to the senior applicant, according to his standing in the graduation list of the Bengal Medical Service.

XXIII. That no subscriber shall be entitled to the said annuity of three hundred pounds sterling, until he shall pay into the said fund, at the least, one half of

And that such sum shall include all subscriptions, donations, and other sums of money, which he may have paid into the said fund previously to his application for the annuity together with compound interest upon such subscriptions and sums of money respectively, to be computed from the day of his paying them into the said fund, and after the rate of six per cent. per annum. Provided always, and in case such subscriptions, and other sums of money, together with interest thereon as aforesaid, as such applicant for the said annuity may have paid into the said fund, previously to such application, shall not amount to the value of half of the said annuity; it shall and may be optional with the said applicant, either to pay up the difference between such subscriptions and sums of money so by him paid into the said fund and interest as aforesaid, and half of the value of the annuity so applied for, and to receive the full annuity of three hundred pounds; or to accept double such annuity as the sum of his subscriptions and other sums of money which he may have paid into the said fund, together with compound interest thereon as aforesaid, may be sufficient to procure; according to the rate contained in the table of rates herein-before contained.

XXIV. That each and every subscriber to the said fund, after having served in India for seventeen years, may retire from the said medical service, without prejudice to his claim on the said fund, for the said annuity of three hundred pounds, at such time as he would be entitled thereto by virtue of his seniority in the said service; and that he shall be entitled to the same in like manner, as if he had continued in India, and in the said services; and such subscriber, on retiring, shall not be liable to pay the said monthly subscription, or other sums of money, after the day on which he shall so retire from the said medical service, until he shall accept the said annuity; but when he shall accept the said annuity, then he shall be required to pay up all arrears of subscriptions, which may accrue for the time, from the day on which he so retired, up to the day on which he shall accept of the said annuity.

Subscribers after serving in India 17 years, may retire without prejudicing their claim to the annuity.

NOTE — A Surgeon having been allowed to count as Indian service the period he was in England on duty, inquired whether or not the Subscribers of the Fund will accede the same terms to him, should he apply for an Annuity, as if he had served his full time in India, the following proposition was put to the Subscribers—

To remove doubts for the future it is proposed to insert after the word "Served in India for 17 years," in the second line of Rule XXIV. the following clause, "Served in India being understood to mean such service as is recognized by the Government as qualifying for the Government pension."

XXV. The assistant surgeons who may have given up promotion since the institution of the said society, or who may hereafter give up promotion, shall not have any claim whatsoever upon the said fund; but shall forfeit all subscriptions which they may have paid into the said fund, previously to their resigning promotion.

Assistant surgeons who hereafter give up promotion, shall have no claim on the fund.

Subscribers holding rank higher than assistant surgeon, shall not prejudice their claim to the annuity by giving up promotion.

Proviso.

When annuities shall be declared.

XXVI. That subscribers holding rank in the said medical service higher than the rank of assistant surgeons, shall not prejudice their right to the said annuity, by their giving up promotion. Provided always, that such last-mentioned subscribers shall continue, after having given up promotion in the said medical service, to pay up the monthly subscriptions to the said fund, in the same manner and after the same rate, which they would have had to do in case they had not given up such promotion in the said medical service.

XXVII. That the annuities shall be declared at the third quarterly meeting of each succeeding year for the year following such third quarterly meeting by the said committee of Management, and the said committee of Management shall transmit notices of such declaration to the subscribers who shall be entitled to the annuities, which said subscribers shall send into the said Committee of Management their acceptance or refusal of such annuities, on or before the thirty-first day of October then next; and it is hereby declared, that in case of the said subscribers accepting the annuities, they shall be allowed until the thirty-first day of March then next, to give in their resignations of the said medical service; and it is also hereby declared, that those who do not send in their acceptance of the said annuities, on or before the thirty-first day of October then next, after such intimation having been given to them as last aforesaid, and those who may be absent from India, and who have not appointed a constituted attorney to act for them in this behalf, shall be held and considered to have declined the said annuities for the then following year; and it is hereby also declared, that if any of the subscribers who shall accept the said annuity, shall, after having accepted the said annuity, refuse to take the same, such subscribers shall pay a fine of one year's annuity to the said fund. And also, in case any of the subscribers after having accepted the said annuity, shall refuse or neglect to send in his resignation of the said medical service, within the time above-mentioned for that purpose, such subscribers shall pay, as a fine to the said fund, one-twelfth of one year's annuity for each month he so delays to send in his resignation.

Application for the annuity to be accompanied by an affidavit of the applicant's age.

Annuities may be paid in England or India.

XXVIII. That all applications for an annuity from the said fund shall be accompanied by an affidavit of the applicant of his age, to be sworn before one of his Majesty's Justices of the Peace, or other person legally authorized to administer oaths.

XXIX. That annuities may be paid either in the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or in British India, according as the annuitant may desire; and that all annuities to be paid in the said United Kingdom or Ireland, shall amount to the clear sum of 300 pounds sterling as aforesaid, without being liable to any deduction for exchange or any other charges whatsoever; and that all annuities, to be paid in British India, shall be calculated after the rate of exchange allowed by the Honorable East India Company to their retired covenanted servants residing in India for the time being, which said annuities, whether paid in the said United Kingdom or India, shall be paid regularly half-yearly, in whatsoever part of the said United Kingdom or British India the parties entitled to receive the same, may direct the payment to be made.

Applications for the payment of annuities; how to be made.

On an annuitant's death, between the days of payment of annuity, his Executors, &c. receive a sum for the last pay day and the day of his death.

Conditions under which members of the Medical Board are entitled to annuities.

XXX. That all applications for the payment of annuities, both in England and India, shall be made by the annuitant in person; or by some person or persons legally authorized to receive the same; who shall be required to produce a certificate from a Magistrate or Justice of the Peace, of the annuitant having been to which he claims payment.

XXXI. That in the event of the death of any annuitant happening between the said half-yearly periods of payment of his annuity, his Executors, Administrators, or Assigns, shall be entitled to receive a proportionable sum for the number of days from the day of the last payment, before such annuitant's death, and the day of the said annuitant's death.

XXXII. That all members of the Medical Board, who may be desirous of retiring upon the said annuity, and whose services in the said Medical Board shall not exceed two years, shall be entitled to the said annuity, upon paying, including all sums which they may have paid into the said fund previously to such retirement, the half of the value of the said annuity; and, in case any of the members of the said Medical Board who may have served upwards of two, but not longer than three years, or such members of the said Medical Board, be desirous of retiring upon the said annuity, such members of the said Medical Board shall be entitled to retire upon the said annuity on paying to the said fund eleven-sixteenths of the value of the said annuity; and in case any of the members of the said Medical Board shall be desirous of retiring upon the said annuity, after having served in a member of the said Medical Board for upwards of three, but not longer than five years, such members of the said Medical Board shall be entitled to retire upon the said annuity on paying to the said fund three-quarters of the value of the said annuity; and in case any of the members of the said Medical Board shall be desirous of retiring upon the said annuity, after

having remained in the said Medical Board for upwards of four years, such members of the said Medical Board shall not be entitled to retire upon the said annuity, until they have paid up the full value of the said annuity, to be calculated according to the rate contained in the table of rates heretofore contained. Provided always, and it is hereby declared and agreed, by and between all the said parties to these presents, that if such of the members of the said Medical Board as may be desirous of retiring upon the said annuity, after having served two, three, or four years respectively, as members of the said Medical Board, shall, on or before the expiration of such two, three, or four years respectively, notify to the Committee of Management their intention of accepting the said annuity, they shall be allowed a further period of six calendar months next after the expiration of such two, three or four years' service respectively, to enable them to resign the said service, without being liable to pay an additional sum for such last-mentioned period of service—any thing herein before contained to the contrary in anywise notwithstanding.

N B.—Rule XXXII. rescinded as per following resolution, vide Report of the Quarterly General Meeting held 14th January 1839.

Resolved.—That Rule XXXII. appearing not to be founded on liberal or just principles towards one class of subscribers and that its tendency to accelerate promotion being questionable, while its direct effects in keeping back from joining the fund several of the seniors on the Medical List who would otherwise probably join it, is very obvious, the resolution moreover, not having been included in the original scheme of the fund submitted for the approval of the Honorable the Court of Directors, the said rule be rescinded from the regulations of the Fund.

XXXIII That all subscribers who shall retire from the said medical service, before they shall have served seventeen years in India, and all subscribers who shall be transferred from the said medical service to the pension establishment of the said Honorable East India Company, shall have no claim whatsoever on the said fund; provided always, that if such subscriber, so retiring before he shall have served seventeen years in India, or such subscriber as may be transferred to the pension establishment as aforesaid, shall apply to the subscribers in India, through the said Committee of Management, the whole, or a part of the sum of money which he may have paid into the said fund, previously to such retirement, or transfer, a majority of the said subscribers shall have the power to cause the whole, or a part of such sum of money as the persons so retiring or transferred as aforesaid, may have paid into the said fund, to be repaid to him, if his circumstances appear to the subscribers to require such consideration.

Subscribers retiring before serving 17 years, & being transferred to the pension establishment, to have no claim on the fund.
Proviso.

XXXIV. That all subscribers who may be invalidated, or put upon the home half-pay list, on account of ill-health; all who may be invalidated in India, on account of ill-health; and all subscribers who may be put upon the half-pay list in consequence of ill health not permitting their longer residence in India; before they shall have respectively served seventeen years in India, shall receive back their subscription, and all sums of money which they may have paid into the said fund, together with interest on the same, after the rate of six per cent per annum.

In what cases subscribers shall receive back their subscription.

Rule XXXIV. abrogated as per following Resolution passed at the 2nd Quarterly General Meeting, held 13th April 1840.

Resolved.—That as the amount of loss likely to be entailed on the institution by the operation of Section XXXIV. of the Fund Regulations will in all probability prove very great, and interfere most essentially with the possibility of arriving at perfectly accurate conclusions in the calculation of chances, it be abrogated from the 1st January 1840, except as respects incumbents who entered the Fund on the faith of that Rule's continued operation.

XXXV. That the Committee of Management for the time being, may, in matters requiring despatch, call extraordinary general meetings of the said Society, by public advertisement in, at least, two of the most extensively circulated daily papers of the presidency; and in the *Calcutta Gazette*, which must be advertised at least ten days previously to the day on which such extraordinary general meeting shall be held.

XXXVI. That the payment of each annuity shall be secured to the respective annuitants, by depositing with the sub-Treasurer of the Honorable East India Company, such a sum of money as shall be sufficient to meet the annual payments of such annuity, for a certain number of years which are to be named by the said Committee of Management for the time being; and it is hereby declared, that in case any of the annuitants shall die before the expiration of the time

Annuitants to be secured to annuities by depositing with the Sub-Treasurer the value of each annuity.

which the Committee of Management may so name as aforesaid, the unappropriated moneys of such deposit shall be carried to the credit of the unappropriated funds of the said Society, and in the event of any annuitant surviving such period, a further sum shall be deposited as aforesaid, for the purpose of meeting the annual payments to such annuitant, and so on from time to time as the respective cases require; and it is hereby declared that such deposits so to be deposited, shall be carried to the credit of the appropriated funds in the books of the said Society.

XXXVII. That an account of the appropriated funds shall be taken at the close of every year by the Committee of Management, when the sums necessary to meet the existing annuities shall be compared with the funds appropriated, for that purpose, according to the table of rates hereinafter contained, and if there appears a large sum appropriated for the existing annuities, than is necessary to meet the annual payments of such annuities, the surplus shall be carried to the unappropriated funds as aforesaid, and if a deficit appear, the deficiency to be made up from the unappropriated funds, as aforesaid.

All matters connected with the Society shall require the sanction of a majority of subscribers.

XXXVIII. That all matters and things, of what nature or kindsoever, be transacted and done by the said Committee of Management for the time being, or by the subscribers to the said fund, in any manner or way howsoever connected with the said Society, whether transacted or done at any of the said general quarterly meetings, or by extraordinary meetings especially called, or by the subscribers to the said fund present at any meeting, shall require a majority of the votes or voices of such meetings respectively, to pass and carry such transactions, matters and things, so as to be acted upon. Provided always, and is hereby declared,

Proviso. that all propositions, resolutions, acts, matters, or things, for changing, altering, or affecting the matters, hereinafter contained, in any manner however, shall require a majority, consisting of two-thirds of the subscribers to the said fund, whose votes or voices shall be obtained by the Committee of Management by circular letter. Provided also,

Proviso. that in no case whatsoever shall any subscribers be permitted to vote or act in any matter, or thing, touching or affecting the said funds, or in anywise connected with the said Society, by proxy; but in every case to be brought before the whole subscribers, their votes shall be obtained individually, through the Committee of Management, by circular letter as aforesaid.

Annuities paid through the Agents of the Society, to be as regular as those through the East India Company.

XXXIX. That the said Committee of Management shall and will pay, or cause to be paid, in England or in India, such annuities as shall be payable by and through their agent, with the same regularity as the payments made by and through the treasury of the said honorable East India Company and that the necessary arrangements shall be made with the respective annuitants for this purpose, by the said Committee of Management. In witness whereof the said several parties to these presents have hereunto set their respective hands and seals, this tenth day of October, in the year of our Lord 1836.

B.—The following resolution passed by the Committee of Management of the Bengal Medical Retiring Fund at their Meeting held on the 28th February 1836, having received the sanction of more than two thirds of the number of subscribers then in India, is passed into a Bye Law of the fund and under its conditions all admissions of subscribers who were in the service on the 31st October 1836, and did not then become subscribers are regulated.

Resolved.—That as the admission from the medical list as it now stands of new Members to the Bengal Medical Retiring Fund so many years after its formation gives advantages to such new Members over the earlier supporters of the fund, having avoided the Tontine risk incurred by the latter, all persons applying for admission as subscribers to the said fund, or who are not actually subscribers this Wednesday, 24th February 1836, shall, previous to their application for admission (in the conditions of section III. of the fund's deed being circulated for the votes of the subscribers resident in this country, pay as a penalty for the exclusive benefit of the fund (not to be repaid to the applicant should he be rejected by a majority of vote) a sum of money equal to one moiety of his years of subscription, to be calculated from the first instance from the 1st January 1833 to the date of his application, and in the fund, from the date of his application to the date of his first admission as a Member, to be deposited in the hands of the Committee of Management of the fund, after due equalization of the votes of the subscribers resident in India, such amount of penalty to be according to the rate of the application, as provided in section IV. of the fund's deed, or the amount according to the following table; and that such applicant or applicants shall also pay the expense of printing and circulating the references for his or their admission previous to the results of votes being decided.

"We regret that in the present state of the Company's affairs, it is not possible for us to aid the fund by a direct contribution, but we are willing not only to bear the increased charge of retiring pay that will be consequent upon the establishment, but also to sanction the grant of an interest of 6 per cent. per annum on the balances of the several funds and the remittance of the annuities which they may grant through our treasury at the rate of 2s the sicca rupee.

4. "The only conditions we require are that the regulations shall be submitted to us for our approbation, that the aggregate amount of the annuities to be granted in each year, shall not exceed £7,750, in the proportions of

Copy of Paragraphs of a letter from the Honorable the Court of Directors, No. 88, dated 6th September 1832.

Par. 1. The Bombay Government have lately submitted to us a scheme for the institution of a Medical Retiring Fund at that presidency, and as the reply which we have made to that communication is applicable to your medical establishment, we transcribe it for your information and guidance.

"We are of opinion that the object of accelerating the retirement of medical servants by means of annuities, would be best provided for, by incorporating that service with the military in the institution of the fund, for the latter sanctioned in our despatch to the Government of Bengal, dated 6th March 1832, copy of which accompanied our despatch to you, dated the 28th of that month; and if this arrangement can be accomplished, we shall not object to a proportionate increase in the number of annuities remittable through our treasury."

"We are aware that at Madras annuities for medical officers are provided for distinctly from the military, in consequence of their being a separate fund, embracing for medical servants and their families, various compassionate objects similar to what are provided for military officers and their families by the military fund. But at your presidency, and in Bengal, the military fund embraces both services, and we think the retiring fund should do the same."

2. "In the event of any arrangement being adopted, consequent upon this communication, you will understand, that the number and amount of additional annuities remittable through our treasury, is to be strictly regulated by the proportion which the number of medical officers bears to the number of officers in the army.

No. 114 of 1833; paragraphs 8 to 4—submit a memorial from the medical officers, praying the Court to give their support to a separate Medical Retiring Fund, and to bestow similar benefits to those granted to the Madras Medical Retiring Fund, with reference to donation, rates of interest, and exchange.

1. We are prepared to sanction the institution of a separate retiring fund for the medical officers upon your establishment, but we cannot consent to grant to it any specific donation nor any advantages in the shape of interest or exchange beyond those mentioned in our despatch, dated the 6th March 1832, (No. 15 of 1832.)

2. Neither can we allow of the remittance through our treasury of so large a number of annuities of £300, as will provide for six, being annually granted. The number must be limited to three, which is a full proportion relatively with that which we fixed for the military service in the event of a retired fund being instituted by the army.

Para. 1. We have directed a clause to be inserted in the covenants, of Assistant-Surgeons who may be appointed to your establishment, by which they will bind themselves to subscribe to the Medical Retiring Fund.

Letter from No. 11, dated 27th January 1835, soliciting the consideration and orders of the Court on propositions submitted by the Managers of the Bengal Medical Retiring Fund.

2. The disposal of the surplus funds will of course rest with the managers and we will not object to the remittance through private agency, of annuities granted in excess of those reinstituted through our treasury, provided that not more than the six annuities specified in the regulations be granted in any one year.

3. We sanction a retrospective operation of the fund from the date when it was formed, viz. the 1st of January 1833.

4. At the same time that you communicate the concessions to the Managers, you will signify, that Regulation I. of Section V. of the rules of the fund must be modified, by excluding from the class of medical servants who may receive back their subscriptions, those who shall be "struck off," or "dismissed the service," in conformity with a similar regulation of your civil annuity fund.

Para. 1st. The object of this representation is to induce the Court to relax the orders (Letter dated 20th January 1848. No. 2.) contained in our Military despatch, dated 11th July 1834, No. 19, limiting the remittance through the Company's Treasury to three of the Annuities granted from the Bengal Medical Retiring Fund annually, and permit the whole number of six annually granted to be issued from our Treasury here.

Transmit for the Court's consideration a copy of a representation from the Committee of Management of the Bengal Medical Retiring Fund.

2. The grounds urged by the Managers of the Fund in support of their application are the failure of their Agents, Messrs. Cockerell, Larpent and Co., and the difficulty in times of commercial distress, as at present, of procuring any Bills of Exchange in the Market that could be relied on.

3. We regret the circumstances, but the Managers of the Fund must be aware that the same causes operate to our disadvantage also in obtaining remittance necessary to meet our existing engagements, or we should not import Bullion from India.

4. We cannot therefore admit of the payment from our Treasury of a larger number of Annuities from the Bengal Medical Retiring Fund than has already been sanctioned.

Extract from Proceedings of Second Quarterly Meeting held 10th July 1848.

Dr. F. H. Brett, an Annuitant on this Fund, having taken the benefit of the Bankruptcy Act in England, and the Committee of Management having served with notice not to pay the future Annuities to this Annuitant, but to the Official Assignee of the London Bankrupt Court; the following case was submitted to Counsel for opinion, and the opinions of Mr. Advocate General Colvile and Mr. Morton thereon are submitted for the information of Subscribers.

Case for the opinion of Counsel.

Dr. Frederick Harrington Brett was Surgeon in the East India Company's Bengal Medical Service, and was also Subscriber in the Bengal Medical Retiring Fund, and afterwards became an Annuitant on the Fund. Dr. Brett went to England some years ago, and becoming involved in debt, he became bankrupt, and Mr. A. B. Belcher was appointed Assignee. Dr. Brett was entitled to an Annuity from the Bengal Medical Retiring Fund of £300 per annum, and on the bankruptcy occurring the Assignee claimed payment of the amount of the Annuity from Messrs. Coutts and Co, the Agents in London of the Fund, and a claim has also been made on the Secretary in Calcutta for the money. Copy of the letter and notice accompany. As also a copy of the Book of the Fund Rules.

Counsel's opinion is solicited as to whether the Annuity so payable from the Bengal Medical Retiring Fund, passes to the Assignee by reason of the bankruptcy, or not, and whether the Officers of the Fund are discharged from farther liability by paying to the Assignee, or whether any and what precautions should be observed by the Committee or the Secretary of the Fund, or the Agents in London, in making the periodical payment and generally, &c.

Opinion of Mr. Advocate General James William Colvile.

There seems to me to be nothing in the Rules of the Bengal Medical Retiring Fund, which affords any ground for contending that in its legal incidents an Annuity payable out of that fund differs from any other Annuity. It would, therefore, in my opinion, pass to the Assignee under an ordinary bankruptcy, a fortiori it will I think, do so when, as in this case, the appointment of Assignee and the consequent transfer of property takes place under a spontaneous application for relief under and submission to the provisions of the Statute 7 and 8 Vic. c. 96.

I think, therefore, that the Officers of the Fund will be discharged from farther liability

by paying to the Assignee as the person legally authorized to receive the same, see Rule 30; nor do I know what precautions they should observe other than that of paying only on the receipt of the Official Assignee for the time being, or his duly Constituted Attorney. The more convenient course seems to be that the London Agents should pay in London to the Assignee personally.

Opinion of Mr. Counsellor T. C. Morton.

I have read the rules of the Bengal Medical Retiring Fund, the same being contained in the Deed of 10th October 1836; and it seems clear, that the Annuity is not in the nature of a pension or voluntary grant, but that it is a benefit which the retiring officer actually purchases, and for which (in ordinary cases) he could proceed by suits at law or in equity. This distinguishes the case from Gibson vs the East India Company, 5 Bingh. N. C. 282, where the Court of Common Pleas in England held, that the pension of a Military Officer of the Company does not upon his bankruptcy pass to his Assignees. I am of opinion therefore that Mr. F. H. Brett's right, title and interest in the Annuity of £300 a year, to which he is entitled from the Bengal Medical Retiring Fund, pass wholly to his Assignees Mr. Belcher. The Secretary of the Fund, or the London Agents, therefore will be justified in making the payments henceforth as they accrue, direct to the Assignee, for the time being. The only precaution necessary to be observed is to take a receipt from the Assignee as such.
