

LA ABEJA.

NUEVA-ORLEANS, 18 DE SEPTIEMBRE

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Por el último correo hemos recibido noticias de Inglaterra que alcanzan al 10 de julio de 1830, que extractamos lo siguiente:

El correspondiente del *Liverpool Journal* residente en Londres, le dice con fecha del 8; que, se opina que habrá un cambio en el ministerio; y que corren los rumores de que el rey tiene alguna inclinación al partido con el cual comúnmente vota el lord Howard. El partido de Mr. Huskisson ha publicado en forma de folleto una violenta diatriba contra el primer ministro, pero se duda si los cartistas podrán formar entre ellos una administración bastante fuerte. Esto es de creerse, puesto que hasta su día que en Francia se hallogre aplaudida la doctrina de Canning para que en Inglaterra se desredituen.

El *Times*, sin embargo no es de la misma opinión del correspondiente del *Journal*; con respecto a esto dice: Nosotros referimos los hechos con la mayor calma y no pedimos a ningún partido, excepto al del bien general del imperio. Pero el nombre del rey es el apoyo comunitario y combierte, (al 8. M. tiene firmeza y constancia, lo que no dudamos) que todos los partidos sepan lo que deban esperar. El rey, al recibir a los ministros, nos suponemos que habrá dicho algo acerca de este asunto: "Estoy satisfecho de veros dijo, colectiva e individualmente: he aprobado lo y aprobé vuestras medidas; habeis tenido y continuareis teniendo mi confianza y mi apoyo."

La disolución del parlamento inglés de día es estorva, según se opinaba, acia al 14 de julio; pero en todo caso no devía prorrogarse más alla del 10 del mismo mes. Los funeralés de George IV debían efectuarse el 15. La coronación de William IV hará en octubre. El rey ha indultado a 37 presos sentenciados a muerte, que estaban en la carcel del Newgate.

En la cámara de comunes hubo una larga e interesante discusión el 6 de julio a consecuencia de una moción hecha por Mr. Grant, con el objeto de nombrar una regencia: la moción fue desaprobada por una mayoría de 247 votos contra 93. Parece que un tercio del parlamento no estuvo de acuerdo con el gobernante del *Times* que la Inglaterra era seriamente "A Tower of Strength".

Según un diario de Londres del 4 de julio, el gobierno inglés habrá recibido aviso de que una expedición española que se supone ser destinada contra México, arribó a las islas de Cabo verde.

Cartas de Madrid, del 17 de Junio, anuncian que el gobierno inglés acaba de dirigir a la corte de España una nota diplomática muy urgente sobre la necesidad de reconocer la independencia de sus antiguas colonias. (Standard.)

El *Globe and Traveller* del 9 de julio publica las últimas novedades del teatro de la guerra en África. El hospital francés en Sidi-Feruch recibió antes del 25 de junio, 523 heridos y 75 enfermos de calentura. Los periódicos franceses del 6 de julio contienen los detalles de las operaciones del ejército francés hasta el 28 de junio y una comunicación telegráfica fechada del 30 que da a conocer las operaciones del 29. Los detalles nada dicen de la perdida de un convoy, que se refiere en los periódicos de Londres del 8; pero, (parece que por calma la inquietud que se manifestaba concerniente a las comunicaciones del ejército) se publicó en el *Monitor* una comunicación atrazada del general Bourmont fechada del 22 en la que espone que el General Valladolid, ha habido un buen camino semejante casi a los de Europa en que se evitan subidas y bajadas rápidas. En otra comunicación que contiene la descripción bastante singular de un ataque que debía efectuarse el 29, (el que por un parte telegráfico parece haberse hecho con buen éxito) Bourmont anuncia que la división de Lavard, estable escalonado sobre la línea de comunicación entre el ejército y Sidi-Feruch. El parte del almirante Duperrey demuestra que la flota apenas puede permanecer por más tiempo en la bahía.

ESTADOS-UNIDOS MEXICANOS.

Méjico 30 de julio. La correspondencia recibida ayer muestra que la tranquilidad reina en todas partes. El supremo gobierno ha recibido oficialmente la noticia de que en el Sur del Estado de Michoacán no ha habido movimiento alguno, según han querido hacer creer y difundir los mercaderes.

Belize 6 de julio de 1830.—Por cartas particulares de aquél establecimiento inglés conducidas pgo. el último paquete, se subió la llegada allí del coronel D. Vicente Domínguez con un tal Inestosa de Teguigalpa, y otros de los que sostuvieron la guerra en Honduras contra los actuales gobernantes de Centro América.

Las causas que han obligado a goatos caudillos a abandonar la cumbre, es seguramente española, y debe poner en peligro a todos las repúblicas del Nuevo Mundo. Domínguez, que había organizado alguna fuerza e internándose con ella, iba a brío que la gente de color, de que se compone dicha fuerza, no aspiraba ya al restablecimiento del orden, sino al exterminio de los blancos; y sobre todo con ideas tan espantosas, resolvió dirigirse de fuga a Belice, con algunos paquetes que querían seguirle. Despedido su marcha, algunos militares habían formado partida, y proclamado abiertamente la guerra contra los blancos, tratando de someter a Morazán, habiendo sido este el motivo de los que desaparecieron en la multitud tales
