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#### PREFACE.

It is a matter of great thankfulness to Almighty God that there is now among us a large and increasing number of devout persons, who habitually attend the public Daily Services of the Church, and have become thereby accustomed to that beautiful model of Prayer and Praise which, -consecrated as it then was by use during many ages in the Western Church,—the Catholic Church of this country three centuries ago revised, and placed in the hands of all

her children in their mother tongue.

And many such, from long use of the English Matins and Evensong as arranged in the Book of Common Prayer, have come to prefer to all other forms of devotion, even for private use, that regular order of Psalms and Lessons, Responsive Versicles, and Collects, which is there retained, and which also distinguished those other daily offices of the Ancient Breviary which the English Church did not at the Reformation think proper to retain for general and public use, the Offices, viz. for the First, Third, Sixth, and Ninth Hours, and the Night Office or Compline.

It is for such as these that this little work is intended. It seemed that for persons desirous in some way or other to observe those Canonical Hours of Prayer to whichreceiving them as she did from God's elder People—the Catholic Church has given a still deeper significance by connecting them with the events of the Lord's Passion, no better way could be recommended than that they should begin with the observance of them on all Fridays, and daily

during Passion-tide.

The Offices here provided for these Hours are taken wholly in form, and very largely in matter, from the ancient devotional manuals, which under the names of "Horæ," "Manuale," or "Enchiridion," were in common circulation in England before the Reformation, and which, also, under the names of "The Primer" or "Orarium," were issued, with more or less of authority, in a revised form after that event.



To the "Hours of the Passion" it was thought good to add, for the sake of greater completeness, the daily morning Office for the first Hour, or "Prime," and the daily final Office at night, or "Compline," as well as the latter or prayer-portion of the daily Mid-day Office, or "Sext." These three Offices are modelled as closely as possible from those of the Sarum Breviary, care being taken not to repeat those portions which, anciently occurring in Prime or Compline, were by the Reformers transferred to Matins and Evensong. On this principle that portion of the weekly recitation of the Psalms which fell in Prime has been removed, on the ground that the Ecclesiastical Authority definitely substituted a monthly for the old weekly recitation, and confined it entirely to Matins and Evensong. The recitation of certain selected Psalms at certain Hours. besides their recitation in the regular monthly order, seemed to stand on a different footing. Indeed, the change from weekly to monthly recitation of the Psalter, seemed to render it more needful than before that some Psalms should recur more frequently by being selected for use at certain fixed times. It is for this reason that, just as the Resurrection Psalms (liv. cxviii.) are appropriated to Sunday, and the Passion Psalms (xxii. lix. lxix. and lxxviii.) to Friday, so the Psalms which speak of the Incarnation (viii. xix. xxiv. anciently appointed for Matins in the Office of the Blessed Virgin,) should be said on all Festivals of our Lord, or of the Blessed Virgin, and daily during the great Festal Seasons of the Church; whilst other suitable Psalms are appointed for the Festivals of Saints. This ensures at the same time greater variety, without at all lengthening the office as actually used.

Similarly, the Athanasian Creed, being now appointed to be said at Matins, is removed from its ancient place among the daily Psalms of Prime. Still the association of that hour with the mystery of the Ever-Blessed Trinity has been preserved by the retention of the old Antiphons, or Anthems, to the "Psalmus, Quicunque Vult," as the Anthems for the Psalms at Prime.

Again, the Apostles' Creed and the Confession and Absolution have been omitted from among the Preces after the Lord's Prayer at Prime, because they are now said at Matins.

Lastly, for the old Collect at Prime, which we now say daily as the Third Collect at Matins, and for the old Collect a 3

at Compline, now said at Evensong, other suitable Collects have been substituted.

The Versicles and Responses after the Lord's Prayer at Prime, p. 21, are exactly those of the Salisbury Use. So, too, are those at Compline. p. 49, except that the second, ("Come, O Lord,") and the third ("Lord save us,") are two of the Sarum occasional Antiphons to "Nunc Dimittis," inserted among the Preces on account of their obvious appropriateness. The "Suffrages," or Prayers and Intercessions after the Collects, (such as those at pp. 24, 33, 51,) are not found in the Breviary, but are usual in the "Horæ" or "Prymers," of Sarum Use.

At Compline the Confession and Absolution have been removed from the Preces to the position which they occupy in the Reformed Matins and Evensong; the sentence of Scripture, "Brethren, be sober," &c., being prefixed to them (from the Roman Office,) from its exact analogy to the opening Sentences of our authorized daily office.

The Lessons from the Gospels at Prime, and from the Epistles at Compline, (for which see "Household Prayer," by the Rev. P. G. Medd, published by Messrs. Rivington,) are added as a suggestion to be adopted or omitted at the discretion of those who use the book.

Three Offices, viz., for Morning, Noon, and Night, are thus offered for the daily private or social use of Christian people, and Offices for all the seven Hours on Friday. They can be used by those who do, and by those who do not use, or attend at, the Public Daily Services; and to Lay persons it is of course open to use them either instead of, or in addition to, the Prayer Book Services. depend on their engagements, and the convenience of the times of public worship, but the Editor would earnestly deprecate the substitution of these offices for those which are of public authority, where the latter can conveniently be And even where the Prayer Book Services cannot be conveniently attended at Church, they may be used in private with great advantage, in a shortened form; e. q., the portion from the first Lord's Prayer to the Third Collect, omitting the Canticles and the First Lesson, and prefixing to this the Confession at Evensong, and adding any of the Intercessory Prayers, and the General Thanksgiving, at discretion. A short trial will convince any person of both the feasibility and the advantage of this use of the Daily Services of the Church, ensuring as it does the

regular reading of the Psalms and of the New Testament.

The Clergy need not be reminded that the daily saying

of the Authorized Matins and Evensong is for them of para-

mount obligation.

Where Matins is attended in Church at an early hour, the Office for Prime will of course be said in its usual place after Matins; and if Matins is said privately it should be said before Prime. When the Public Matins is at a late hour, Prime will of course be said privately, on first rising.

To these Daily Offices some other devotional Forms in use amongst us are added for convenience, and with the view of rendering the work more complete; and the sources from which these are taken are usually indicated as they occur. (See explanation of abbreviations appended to the Preface.)

The only hitherto unpublished portions are the Litany of Intercession for the Sick, parts of the Litanies on pages 73

to 85, and the short Litany for the Dying.

The Hymns in most cases are taken from "Hymns Ancient and Modern," with the kind permission of the Editors. For some of the Prayers the Editor is indebted to the admirable "Hours of Prayer for Daily Use," prepared for the Theological College at Cuddesden. Of these the Collect numbered 9, on page 26, may well be used by Members of our Universities on behalf of the College and University to which they belong.

#### The Slorious Sodhead of JESUS APRIST.

The beginning of the Holy Gospel according to S. John.

Glory be to Thee, O Lord.

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. The Same was in the beginning with God. All things were made by Him; and without Him was not any thing made that was made. In Him was Life; and the Life was the Light of men. And the Light shineth in darkness; and the darkness comprehended it not.

Part of the Holy Gospel according to S. Luke.

Glory be to Thee, O Lord.

The Angel Gabriel was sent from God unto a city of Galilee, named Nazareth, to a Virgin espoused to a man whose name was Joseph, of the house of David; and the Virgin's name was Mary. And the Angel came in unto her, and said, Hail, thou that art highly favoured, the Lord is with thee: blessed art thou among women.

And when she saw him she was troubled at his saying, and cast in her mind what manner of salutation this should be.

And the Angel said unto her, Fear not, Mary: for thou hast found favour with God. And, behold, thou shalt conceive in thy womb, and bring forth a son, and shalt call His Name JESUS. Elisabeth heard the salutation of Mary, the babe leaped in her womb; and Elisabeth was filled with the Holy Ghost: and she spake out with a loud voice, and said, Blessed art thou among women, and Blessed is the Fruit of thy womb. And whence is this to me, that the Mother of my Lord should come to me? For. lo, as soon as the voice of thy salutation sounded in mine ears. the babe leaped in my womb for joy. And blessed is she that believed: for there shall be a performance of those things which were told her from the Lord.

#### The Birth of JESUS CYRIST.

Part of the Holy Gospel according to S. Matthew.

Glory be to Thee, O Lord.

Now the Birth of Jesus Christ was on this wise: When as His Mother Mary was espoused to Joseph, before they came together she was found with child of the Holy Ghost. Then Joseph her husband being a just man, and not willing to make her a public example, was minded to put her away privily.

But while he thought on these things, behold, the Angel of the Lord appeared unto him in a dream, saying, Joseph, thou son of David, fear not to take unto thee Mary thy wife: for That which is conceived in her is of the Holy Ghost. And she shall bring forth a Son, and thou shalt call His Name JESUS: for He shall save His people from their sins.

Now all this was done, that it might be fulfilled which was spoken of the Lord by the prophet, saying, Behold, a Virgin shall be with child, and shall bring forth a Son, and they shall call His Name Emmanuel, which being interpreted is, God with us.

#### The Tobing Condescension of our Ford IESUS CHRIST.

"Ye know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that, though He was rich, yet for your sakes He became poor, that ye through His poverty might be rich." (2 Cor. viii. 9.)

"Let this mind be in you, which was also in Christ Jesus: Who, being in the Form of God, thought it not robbery to be equal with God: but made Himself of no reputation, and took upon Him the form of a servant, and was made in the likeness of men. And being found in fashion as a man, He humbled Himself, and became obedient unto death, even the death of the Cross. Wherefore God also hath highly exalted Him, and given Him a NAME Which is above every name: that at the NAME OF JESUS EVERY KNEE SHOULD BOW, of things in Heaven, and things in earth, and things under the earth; and that every tongue should confess that JESUS CHRIST IS LORD, to the glory of God the Father." (PHIL. ii. 5.) Ry. Thanks be to Thee, O Lord.

#### The Homage enjoined by the Church to IESUS.

"When in time of Divine Service the Lord Jesus shall be mentioned, due and lowly reverence shall be done by all persons present, as it hath been accustomed: testifying by these outward ceremonies and gestures, their inward humility, Christian resolution, and due acknowledgement that THE LORD JESUS CHRIST, THE

TRUE ETERNAL SON OF GOD, IS THE ONLY SAVIOUR OF THE WORLD. in Whom alone all the mercies, graces, and promises of God to mankind, for this life, and the Life to come, are fully and wholly comprised." (Canon XVIII. of the Constitutions and Canons Ecclesiastical of the Church of England.)

#### The Passion of our Ecord Sod and Subjour.

(Harmonized from the four Holy Gospels.)

Glory be to Thee, O Lord. The Agony of JESUS in the Garden.

When JESUS had spoken these words, and they had sung an hymn, He went forth with His disciples over the brook Cedron. to the Mount of Olives, where was a Garden called Gethsemane, into the which He entered, and His disciples. And Judas also which betrayed Him knew the place: for JESUS offtimes resorted thither with His disciples.

And when He was at the place, He said unto the disciples, Sit ye here, while I go and pray yonder. And He took with Him Peter and James and John, the two sons of Zebedee, and began to be sorrowful, sore amazed, and very heavy. Then saith He unto them, My Soul is exceeding sorrowful, even unto death: tarry ye here, and watch with Me. And He went a little farther, and was withdrawn from them about a stone's cast, and kneeled down, and fell on His Face on the ground, and prayed that, if it were possible, the hour might pass from Him. And He said, Abba, Father, if it be possible, and all things are possible unto Thee, take away this cup from Me: nevertheless, not My will, but Thine, be done. And He cometh unto the disciples, and findeth them asleep, and saith unto Peter, Simon, sleepest What, could ye not watch thou? with me one hour? Watch ve. rise and pray, that ye enter not into temptation: the spirit indeed is willing, but the flesh is weak. He went away again the second time, and prayed, saying, O My Father, if this cup may not pass away from Me, except I drink it. Thy Will be done. And when He returned. He found them asleep again, (for their eyes were heavy) neither wist they what to answer And He left them and went away again, and prayed the third time, saying the same words. And there appeared an Angel unto Him from Heaven, strengthening Him. And being in an agony He prayed more earnestly: and His sweat was as it were great drops of Blood falling down to the ground. And when He rose up from prayer, and was come the third time to His disciples. He found them sleeping for sorrow, and said unto them, Sleep on now, and take your rest: it is enough, the hour is come; behold the Son of man is betrayed into the hands of sinners. Rise up, let us go; he that betrayeth Me is at hand.

JESUS is betrayed and apprehended.

And immediately while He vet spake, lo, Judas, one of the Twelve, came, having received a band of men and officers from the Chief Priests and Pharisees, the scribes and the elders of the people, and with him a great multitude with swords and staves, with lanterns and torches and weapons. JESUS therefore, knowing all things that should come upon Him, went forth, and said unto them, Whom seek ye? They answered Him, of JESUS Nazareth. JESUS saith unto them, I am He. And Judas also, which betrayed Him, stood with them. As soon then as He had said unto them, I am He, they went backward, and fell to the ground. Then asked He them again, Whom seek ye? And they said Jesus of Nazareth. Jesus answered, I have told you that I am He: if therefore ye seek Me, let these go their way: that the saving might be fulfilled, which He spake, Of them which Thou gavest Me have I lost none. Now he that betrayed Him had given them a token, saying, Whomsoever I shall kiss, that same is He; take Him, hold Him fast, and lead Him away safely. And he went before them, and forthwith he came to Jesus. and said, Hail, master; kissed Him. And JESUS said Friend, wherefore unto him, art thou come? Judas, betrayest thou the Son of man with a kiss? Then came they, and laid hands on Jesus, and took Him. they which were about Him saw what would follow, they said unto Him, Lord, shall we smite with the sword? And, behold, one of them which were with Jesus, Simon Peter, having a sword, stretched out his hand, and drew it, and smote the high priest's servant, and cut off his right ear. The servant's name was Malchus. And Jesus answered and said, Suffer ye thus far. And He touched his ear and healed him. Then said Jesus unto Peter, Put up again thy sword into the sheath: for all they that take the sword shall perish with the sword. Thinkest thou that I cannot now pray to My Father, and He shall presently give Me more than twelve legions of Angels? how then shall the Scriptures be fulfilled, that thus it must be? The cup which My Father hath given Me, shall I not drink it?

In that same hour said Jesus unto the chief priests, and captains of the temple, and the elders, and to the multitudes which were come to Him, Are ye come out as against a thief with swords

and staves for to take Me? When I was daily with you in the temple teaching, ye stretched forth no hands against Me: but this is your hour, and the power of darkness. But all this was done that the Scriptures of the prophets might be fulfilled.

Then all the disciples forsook Him, and fled. And there followed Him a certain young man, having a linen cloth cast about his naked body; and the young men laid hold on him: and he left the linen cloth, and fled from them naked.

JESUS is brought before Annas and Caiaphas.

Then the band and the captain and officers of the Jews took Jesus, and bound Him, and led Him away to Annas first; for he was father in law to Caiaphas, which was the High Priest that same year. Now Caiaphas was he, which gave counsel to the Jews, that it was expedient that one man should die for the people. And Annas sent Him bound unto Caiaphas the High Priest: and with him were assembled all the chief priests and the elders and the scribes.

And Simon Peter followed Jesus afar off unto the High Priest's palace, and so did another disciple: that disciple was known unto the High Priest, and went in with JESUS into the palace of the High Priest. But Peter stood at the door without. Then went out that other disciple, which was known unto the High Priest, and spake unto her that kept the door, and brought in Peter. And the servants and officers stood there, who had made a fire of coals in the midst of the hall, for it was cold: and when they were set down together, and warmed themselves, Peter sat down among them to see the end, and warmed himself at the fire.

The High Priest then asked JESUS of His disciples and of His doctrine. JESUS answered him, I spake openly to the world; I ever taught in the synagogue, and in the temple, whither the Jews always resort; and in secret have I said nothing. Why askest thou Me? ask them which heard Me, what I have said unto them: behold, they know what I said.

And when He had thus spoken, one of the officers which stood by struck Jesus with the palm of his hand, saying, Answerest Thou the High Priest so? Jesus answered him, If I have spoken evil bear witness of the evil: but if well, why smitest thou Me.

Now the chief priests and elders, and all the Council, sought false witness against Jesus to put Him to death; but found none: yea, though many false witnesses came, and bare false witness against Him, yet found they none: for their witness agreed not together. At the last came two false witnesses, and said, We heard this fellow say, I will destroy this temple that is made with hands, and within three days I will build another made without hands. But neither so did their witness agree together. And the High Priest stood up in the midst, and asked Jesus, saying, Answerest Thou nothing? what is it which these witness against Thee? JESUS  $\mathbf{held}$ His peace, answered nothing.

Again the High Priest asked Him, and said unto Him, I adjure Thee by the Living God, that Thou tell us whether Thou be the Christ, the Son of God the Blessed. Jesus saith unto him, Thou hast said; I am: nevertheless I say unto you, Hereafter shall ye see the Son of man

sitting on the right hand of power, and coming in the clouds of Heaven.

Then the High Priest rent his clothes, saying, He hath spoken blasphemy; what further need have we of witnesses? behold, now ye have heard His blasphemy. What think ye? And they all answered and condemned Him and said, He is guilty of death.

Then did they spit in His Face, and buffeted Him; and the men that held Jrsus mocked Him, and covered His Face. And when they had blindfolded Him, they struck Him on the Face, and asked Him, saying, Prophesy, who is it that smote Thee? And many other things blasphemously spake they against Him. And the servants did strike Him with the palms of their hands.

Peter denies the Lord thrice.

Now Peter sat without in the palace: and as Peter was beneath in the palace, there cometh one of the maids of the High Priest: the damsel that kept the door. And when she saw Peter, as he sat by the fire, warming himself, she earnestly looked upon him, and said, Art not thou also one of His disciples? Thou also wast with JESUS of Galilee. But he denied before them all, saying, Woman, I am not. I know Him not. I know not, neither understand I what thou sayest. And he went out into the porch; and the cock crew.

And when he was gone out into the porch, another maid saw him, and said unto them that were there, This fellow was also with JESUS of Nazareth. And after a while came unto him they that stood by, and said to Peter, Surely thou also art one of them; for thy speech bewrayeth thee. And again he denied with an oath, I do not know the man.

And about the space of one hour after, one of the servants of the High Priest, being his kinsman whose ear Peter cut off, confidently affirmed, saying, Of a truth this fellow also was with Him: for he is a Galilman. And he said to Peter. Did not I see thee in the garden with him? Then began he to curse and to swear, saying, Man, I know not I know not what thou savest. this man of whom ye speak. And immediately, while he yet spake, the second time the cock crew.

And the Lord turned, and looked upon Peter. And Peter remembered the word of the Lord, how He had said unto him, Before the cock crow twice, thou shalt deny Me thrice. And when he thought thereon, he went out, and wept bitterly.

JESUS is brought before Caiaphas and the whole Jewish Council, and is pronounced worthy of death.

And as soon as it was day, the elders of the people and the chief priests and the scribes came together, and led Him into their Council, saying, Art Thou the Christ? tell us. And He said unto them, If I tell you ye will not believe : and if I also ask you, ye will not answer Me, nor let Me go. Hereafter shall the Son of man sit on the right hand of the power of God. Then said they all, Art Thou then the Son of God? And He said unto them, Ye say that I am. And they said. What need we any further witness? for we ourselves have heard of His own mouth. And the whole multitude of them arose, and when they had bound Jesus, they led Him away from Caiaphas unto the hall of judgment: and delivered Him to Pontius Pilate the Governor: and it was early.

JESUS before Pilate.

And they themselves went not into the judgment hall, lest they should be defiled; but that they might eat the Passover. Pilate then went out unto them, and said, What accusation bring ye against this man? They answered and said unto him, If He were not a malefactor, we would not have delivered Him up unto thee.

Then said Pilate unto them, Take ye Him, and judge Him according to your law. The Jews therefore said unto him, It is not lawful for us to put any man to death: that the saying of JESUS might be fulfilled, which He spake, signifying what death He should die.

Then Pilate entered into the judgment hall again, and called JESUS and said unto Him, Art Thou the King of the Jews?

JESUS answered him, Sayest thou this thing of thyself, or did others tell it thee of Me?

Pilate answered, Am I a Jew?
Thine own nation and the chief
priests have delivered Thee unto
me: what hast Thou done?

JESUS answered, My Kingdom is not of this world: if My Kingdom were of this world, then would My servants fight, that I should not be delivered to the Jews: but now is My Kingdom not from hence.

Pilate therefore said unto Him, Art Thou a King then?

JESUS answered, Thou sayest that I am a King. To this end was I born, and for this cause came I into the world, that I should bear witness unto the truth. Every one that is of the truth heareth My voice.

Pilate saith unto Him, What is truth? And when he had said this, he went out again unto the Jews, and saith unto them, I find in Him no fault at all. And they began to accuse Him, saying, We found this fellow perverting

the nation, and forbidding to give tribute to Cæsar, saving that He Himself is Christ a King. And JESUS stood before the Governor: and the Governor asked Him saying, Art Thou the King of the Jews? Jesus answering said unto him, Thou savest it. And the chief priests and elders accused Him of many things: but answered nothing. Pilate asked Him again, saving, Answerest Thou nothing? Behold how many things they witness against Thee. But JESUS vet answered him to never a word; insomuch that Pilate marvelled Then said Pilate to the chief priests and to the people, I find no fault in this Man. they were the more fierce, saying, He stirreth up the people, teaching throughout all Jewry, beginning from Galilee to this place. When Pilate heard of Galilee, he asked whether the man were a Galilæan. And as soon as he knew that He belonged unto Herod's jurisdiction, he sent Him to Herod, who himself also was at Jerusalem at that time.

JESUS before Herod.

And when Herod saw JESUS, he was exceeding glad: for he was desirous to see Him of a long season, because he had heard many things of Him; and he hoped to have seen some miracle done by Him. Then he questioned with Him in many words; but He answered him nothing. And the chief priests and scribes stood and vehemently accused Him. And Herod with his men of war set Him at nought, and mocked Him, and arrayed Him in a gorgeous robe, and sent Him again to Pilate. And the same day Pilate and Herod were made friends together: for before they were at enmity between themselves.

JESUS again before Pilate.

And Pilate, when he had called together the chief priests and the rulers and the people, said unto them. Ye have brought this Man unto me, as one that perverteth the people : and, behold, I, having examined Him before you, have found no fault in this Man, touching those things whereof ye accuse Him: no, nor yet Herod: for I sent you to him; and, lo, nothing worthy of death is done unto I will therefore chastise Him Him, and release Him. Now at that feast the Governor was wont to release unto the people a prisoner, whom they would. And they had then a notable prisoner, called Barabbas, which lay bound with them that had made insurrection with him, who had committed murder in the insurrection. And the multitude crying aloud began to desire him to do as he had ever done unto them. (For of necessity he must release one unto them at the feast.) Therefore when they were gathered together, Pilate said unto them, Whom will ve that I release unto you? Barabbas, or Jesus which is called Christ? Will ye that I release unto you the King of the Jews? For he knew that the chief priests had delivered Him for envy.

When he was set down on the judgment-seat, his wife sent unto him, saying, Have thou nothing to do with that Just Man: for I have suffered many things this day in a dream because of Him. But the chief priests and elders persuaded the multitude that they should ask Barabbas. and destrov The Governor answered and said unto them, Whether of the twain will ye that I release unto you? And they cried out all at once, saying, Away with this Man and release unto us

Barabbas. Pilate therefore, willing to release Jesus, answered and said again unto them, What shall I do then with JESUS which is called Christ, Him Whom ye call the King of the Jews? And they all cried out again, Crucify Him, crucify Him. And Pilate said unto them the third time, Why, what evil hath He done? I have found no cause of death in Him: I will therefore chastise Him, and let Him go. And they cried out the more exceedingly, and were instant with loud voices, requiring that He And the might be crucified. voices of them and of the chief priests prevailed.

When Pilate saw that he could prevail nothing, but that rather a tumult was made, he took water, and washed his hands before the multitude, saying, I am innocent of the blood of this Just Person: see ye to it. Then answered all the people, and said, His Blood be on us, and on our children. And so Pilate, willing to content the people. released Barabbas unto them, that for sedition and murder was cast into prison, whom they had desired; and took Jesus and scourged Him.

JESUS mocked by the Soldiers.

Then the soldiers of the Governor took JESUS and led Him away into the common hall, and gathered unto Him thewhole band of soldiers. And they stripped Him, and put on Him a scarlet robe.

And when they had platted a crown of thorns, they put it upon His Head, and a reed in His right Hand: and they bowed the knee before Him, and mocked Him, saying, Hail, King of the Jews! And they spit upon Him, and smote Him with their hands, and took the reed, and smote Him on the Head.

" Behold the Man."

therefore went forth again, and saith unto them, Behold I bring him forth to you, that ye may know that I find no fault in Him. Then came JESUS forth, wearing the crown of thorns and the purple robe. And Pilate saith unto them, Behold the Man! When the chief priests therefore and officers saw Him. they cried out, saying, Crucify Him, crucify Him. Pilate saith unto them, Take ye Him, and crucify Him; for I find no fault in Him. The Jews answered him, We have a law, and by our law He ought to die, because He made Himself the Son of God.

When Pilate therefore heard that saying, he was the more afraid; and went again into the judgment hall, and said unto Jasus, Whence art Thou? But Jasus gave him no answer.

Then saith Pilate unto Him, Speakest Thou not unto me? knowest Thou not that I have power to crucify Thee, and have power to release Thee?

JESUS answered, Thou couldest have no power at all against Me, except it were given thee from above: therefore He that delivered Me unto thee hath the greater sin.

And from thereforth Pilate sought to release Him: but the Jews cried out, saying, If thou let this Man go, thou art not Cæsar's friend: whosoever maketh himself a king speaketh against Cæsar.

When Pilate therefore heard that saying, he brought JESUS forth, and sat down in the judgment seat in a place that is called the Pavement, but in the Hebrew, Gabbatha. And it was the preparation of the passover, and about the sixth hour: and he saith unto the Jews, Behold your King! But they cried out, Away

with Him, away with Him, crucify Him. Pilate saith unto them, Shall I crucify your King? The chief priests answered, We have no king but Cæsar.

JESUS is led away to be Crucified.
And Pilate gave sentence that
it should be as they required, and
he delivered JESUS to their will

to be crucified.

And the soldiers after they had mocked Him, took off the purple from Him, and put His own clothes on Him, and led Him out

to crucify Him.

And He bearing His Cross, went forth into a place called the place of a skull, which is called in the Hebrew Golgotha: and as they led Him away, they laid hold upon a man of Cyrene, by name Simon, the father of Alexander and Rufus, who passed by, coming out of the country; and on him they laid the cross, and compelled him to bear it after Jesus.

And there followed Him a great company of people, and of women, which also bewailed and lamented Him. But JESUS turning unto them, said, Daughters of Jerusalem, weep not for Me, but weep for yourselves, and for your chil-For, behold, the days are coming, in which they shall say, Blessed are the barren, and the wombs that never bare, and the paps which never gave suck. Then shall they begin to say to the mountains, Fall on us; and to the hills, Cover us. For if they do these things in a green tree, what shall be done in the

And there were also two other, malefactors, led with Him, to be put to death.

And when they were come to the place, which is called Calvary, they gave Him vinegar to drink mingled with gall: and when He had tasted thereof He would not drink. And they gave Him to drink wine mingled with myrrh: but He received it not.

JESUS Crucified.

There they crucified Him, and the two malefactors with Him, one on the right hand, and the other on the left, and JESUS in the midst. And the Scripture was fulfilled, which saith, And he was numbered with the transgressors.

Thensaid JESUS, Father, forgive them; for they know not what they do. And Pilate wrote a title, and put it on the cross. And the writing was, JESUS OF NAZARETH THE KING OF THE JEWS. This title then read many of the Jews: for the place where JESUS was crucified was nigh to the city: and it was written in Hebrew, and Greek, and Latin. Then said the chief priests of the Jews to Pilate. Write not, The King of the Jews; but that He said, I am the King Pilate answered, of the Jews. What I have written I have written.

Then the soldiers when they had crucified Jusus, took His garments, and made four parts, to every soldier a part; and also His coat: now the coat was without seam, woven from the top throughout. They said therefore among themselves, Let us not rend it but cast lots for it, whose it shall be: that the Scripture might be fulfilled, which saith, They parted My raiment among them, and for My vesture they did cast lots. These things therefore the soldiers did. And sitting down they watched Him there. And it was the third hour.

And they that passed by reviled Him and railed on Him, wagging their heads, and saying, Ah, Thou that destroyest the

temple, and buildest it in three days, save Thyself. If Thou be the Son of God, come down from the Cross. And the people stood beholding. Likewise also the chief priests mocking said among themselves with the scribes and elders, He saved others; Himself He cannot save. If He be Christ the King of Israel, the Chosen of God, let Him now come down from the Cross, and we will believe Him. He trusted in God; let Him deliver Him now, if He will have Him: for He said, I am the Son of God. The thieves also which were crucified with Him, cast the same in His teeth, and reviled Him. And the soldiers also mocked Him, coming to Him and offering Him vinegar, and saying, If Thou be the King of the Jews, save Thyself.

And one of the malefactors which were hanged railed on Him, saying, If Thou be Christ save Thyself and us. But the other answering rebuked him, saying, Dost not thou fear God, seeing thou art in the same condemna-And we indeed justly; tion? for we receive the due reward of our deeds: but this Man hath done nothing amiss. And he said unto Jesus, Lord, remember me when Thou comest into Thy Kingdom. And Jesus said unto him, Verily I say unto thee, To day shalt thou be with Me in Paradise. Now there stood by the Cross of Jesus His Mother, and His Mother's sister, Mary the wife of Cleophas, and Mary Magdalene. When JESUS therefore saw His Mother, and the disciple standing by, whom He loved, He saith unto His Mother, Woman, behold thy Son! Then saith He to the disciple. Behold thy mother! And from that hour that disciple took her unto his own home.

And when the sixth hour was come, there was darkness over all the land unto the ninth hour. And at the ninth hour JESUS cried with a loud voice, saying, Eloi, Eloi, lama sabacthani? which is, being interpreted, My God, My God, why hast Thon forsaken Me? And some of them that stood by, when they heard that, said, Behold this Man calleth for Elias.

After this, JESUS, knowing that all things that were now accomplished, that the Scripture might be fulfilled, saith, I thirst. Now there was set a vessel full of vinegar: and straightway one of them ran, and took a spunge, and filled it with vinegar, and put it on a reed, and gave Him to drink. The rest said, Let be, let us see whether Elias will come to save Him.

When JESUS therefore had received the vinegar, He said, It is finished.

And when JESUS had cried again with a loud voice, He said, Father, into Thy Hands I commend My spirit: and having said thus, He bowed His Head, and gave up the ghost.

And, behold, the veil of the Temple was rent in twain from the top to the bottom; and the earth did quake, and the rocks rent; and the graves were opened; and many bodies of the saints which slept arose, and came out of the graves after His Resurrection, and went into the Holy City, and appeared unto many.

Now when the centurion, and they that were with him, watching Jesus, saw the earthquake, and those things that were done, and that He so cried out, and gave up the ghost, they feared greatly; and the centurion glorified God, saying, Certainly this was a Righteous Man; truly this was the Son of God.

And all the people that came together to that sight, beholding the things which were done, smote their breasts, and returned. And all His acquaintance, and the women that followed Him from Galilee, ministering unto Him, stood afar off beholding these things: among whom was Mary Magdalene, and Mary the mother of James the Less and of Joses, and Salome, the mother of Zebedee's children, and many other women were there, which came up with Him unto Jerusalem.

JESUS hangs dead upon the Cross. The Jews therefore, because it was the preparation, that the bodies should not remain upon the cross on the Sabbath day, (for that Sabbath day was an high day,) besought Pilate that their legs might be broken, and that they might be taken away. Then came the soldiers, and brake the legs of the first, and of the other which was crucified with Him. But when they came to JESUS, and saw that He was dead already, they brake not His legs: but one of the soldiers with a spear pierced His side, and forthwith came thereout Blood and Water. And he that saw it bare record, and his record is true: and he knoweth that he saith true, that ve might believe. For these things were done, that the Scripture should be fulfilled, A bone of Him shall not be broken. And again another Scripture saith, They shall look on Him Whom they pierced.

JESUS is taken down from the Cross.

And after this, when the even was come, there came a rich man of Arimathæa, a city of the Jews, named Joseph, an honourable counsellor, and he was a good man, and a just: the same had

not consented to the counsel and deed of them, but also himself waited for the Kingdom of God, being a disciple of JESUS, but secretly for fear of the Jews. This man went in boldly unto Pilate, and craved the Body of JESUS, that he might take it away. And Pilate marvelled if He were already dead: and calling unto him a centurion, he asked him whether he had been any while dead. And when he knew it of the centurion, he gave him leave, and commanded the Body to be delivered to Joseph. He came therefore and took the Body of Jesus. And there came also Nicodemus, which at the first came to JESUS by night, and brought a mixture of myrrh and aloes, about an hundred pound weight. Then took they the Body of Jesus, and wound It in linen clothes with the spices, as the manner of the Jews is to bury.

#### JESUS is buried.

Now in the place where He was crucified there was a garden; and in the garden a new sepulchre, which Joseph had hewn out in the rock; wherein was never man yet There laid they JESUS therefore because of the Jews' preparation day; for the sepulchre was nigh at hand; and he rolled a great stone to the door of the sepulchre, and departed. And the women also which came with Him from Galilee, followed after, and beheld the sepulchre. And there was Mary Magdalene, and the other Mary, sitting over against the sepulchre, and beheld how His Body was laid. And they returned, and prepared spices and ointments; and rested the Sabbath day, according to the commandment.

His countenance was like lightning, and his raiment white as snow: and for fear of him the keepers did shake, and became as dead men. And the Angel answered and said unto the women, Benot affrighted: for I know that ye seek JESUS of Nazareth, which was crucified. He is not here: for He is risen, as He said. Come, see the place where the Lord lay. And go quickly, and tell His disciples and Peter that He is risen from the dead; and, behold, he goeth before you into Galilee; there shall ye see Him, as He said unto you: lo, I have told you. And they departed quickly, and fled from the sepulchre with fear and great joy; for they trembled and were amazed: neither said they anything to any man; for they were afraid, and did run to bring His disciples word.

stone was rolled away : and enter-

cometh Mary Magdalene early, when it was yet dark, unto the sepulchre, and seeth the stone taken away from the sepulchre. Then she runneth, and cometh to Simon Peter, and to the other disciple, whom Jesus loved, and said unto them, They have taken away the Lord out of the sepulchre, and we know not where they have laid Him. It

was Mary Magdalene, Joanna, and Mary the mother of James, and other women that were with them, which told these things unto the apostles. Then arose Peter and that other disciple, and came to the sepulchre. So they ran both together: and the other disciple did outrun Peter, and came first to the sepulchre. And he stooping down, and looking in, saw the linen clothes lying; yet went he not in. Then cometh Simon Peter following him, and went into the sepulchre, and seeth the linen clothes lie, and the napkin that was about His head, not lying with the linen clothes, but wrapped together in a place by itself. Then went in also that other disciple, which came first to the sepulchre, and he saw, and believed. For as yet they knew not the Scripture, that He must rise again from the dead. Then the disciples went away again unto their own home, wondering at that which was come to pass.

But Mary stood without at the sepulchre weeping: and as she wept, she stooped down, and looked into the sepulchre, and seeth two Angels in white sitting, the one at the head, and the other at the feet, where the body of JESUS had lain. And they say unto her, Woman, why weepest thou? She saith unto them, Because they have taken away my Lord, and I know not where

they have laid Him. And when she had thus said, she turned herself back, and saw JESUS standing, and knew not that it was JESUS. JESUS saith unto her, Woman, why weepest thou? whom seekest thou? She, supposing Him to be the gardener, saith unto Him, Sir, if thou have borne Him hence, tell me where thou hast laid Him, and I will take Him away. Jesus saith unto her, Mary. She turned herself, and said unto Him, Rabboni; which is to say, Master. JESUS saith unto her, Touch Me not: for I am not yet ascended to My Father: but go to My brethren, and say unto them. I ascend unto My Father, and your Father; and to My God, and your God.

Mary Magdalene came to the disciples as they mourned and wept, and told them that she had seen the Lord, and that he had spoken these things unto her.

not walked in the counsel of the ungodly, nor stood in the way of sinners: and hath not sat in the seat of the scornful.

But his delight is in the law of the Lord: and in his law will he exercise himself day and night.

And he shall be like a tree planted by the water-side: that will bring forth his fruit in due season.

4. His leaf also shall not wither: and look, whatsoever he

doeth, it shall prosper.

- Therefore the ungodly shall not be able to stand in the judgement: neither the sinners in the congregation of the righteous.

In being diligent in prayers, and in the reading of God's Holy Word, and in such studies as help to the knowledge of the same?

In labouring carnestly for the salvation of souls, and for the defence and propagation of the Faith?

In framing and fashioning myself according to the doctrine of Christ, as a wholesome example and pattern to His flock?

In maintaining and setting forward quietness, peace, and love among all Christian people?

In cultivating Humility, Patience, Gentleness, Purity, Detachment from the world, Recollection, and Charity?

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OBS.—An ancient English devotional Book, (quoted in Maskell's "Monuments Ritualia," vol ii. p. 64, and in the Parker Society's Edition of the Latin "Orarium" of 1680, p. 154,) has the following note on the Compline Office. "Compline is the Seventh and the last Hory of Diving Sevence and thice

"Compline is the Seventh and the last Hour of Divine Service, and it is as much as to say, a 'fulfilling,' (Completorism.) And therewith also is ended and fulfilled, speaking, eating, and drinking, and labouring, and all bodily businesses. So that after that time ought to be kept great stillness and silence, not only from words, but also from all deeds save only soft prayer and holy thinking and bodily sleep. For Compline betokeneth the end of man's life, and therefore each person ought to dispose him to bed-ward as if his bed were his grave."

On lying down to sleep, say:

Lord, may my soul on Thee repose, And may sweet sleep mine eyelids close, Sleep that may me more vigorous make To serve my God when I awake.

Praise God from Whom all blessings flow, Praise Him all creatures here below! Praise Him above, ye heavenly host! Praise Father, Son, and Holy Ghost!

And signing yourself on the Forehead with the Sign of the Cross, say:

Father, into Thy Hands I commend my spirit, for Thou hast redeemed me, O Lord, Thou God of truth.

## The Gradual and Penitential Psalms.

Note.-According to the Ancient English Use of Sarum the Gradual Psalms, or "Songs of Degrees,"—i.e., the Fifteen Psalms from Ps. exx. Ad Dominum cum tribularer, to Ps. exxxiv. Ecce nunc. inclusive,—were said on behalf of the whole people of God ("Pro omni populo Dei,") on all ordinary week-days during Lent after Terce, with the Anthem, Remember not Lord, and with Glory be to the Father, and after them the Litany.

The Seven Penitential Psalms were also said on all ordinary week-days during Lent, one in the course of the Versicles and Responses at each of the Seven Hours, in the same way that Ps. li. Have mercy upon me, is said at Prime

and Compline.

It is suggested that the Gradual Psalms should be said at least on all Wednesdays, and the Penitential Psalms on all Fridays, during Lent, at such time as shall be convenient.

One of the Hymns which follow may be said before them at discre-

tion

Also, at discretion, the Litany of the Passion, or the Golden Litany, or the Litany for the Church, may be said after them.

In personal humiliation for past sin the Penitential Psalms may be said not only in Lent, but, according to the devotion of the Penitent;

On all Fridays from Septuagesima to Easter; or on all Fridays in Advent, as well as from Septuagesima to Easter;

Or, besides this, on all fasting-

days;

Or on all Fridays in the year except in Easter-week;

Or after any special act of sin, in which case the sin should first be distinctly confessed according to the form of Confession used at Compline, p. 41.

When the Penitential Psalms are said for this purpose, the Penitential Litany should also be said

after them.

The Gradual Psalms should be said, followed by the Litany for the Church, at all times when the Church, or any part of it, is afflicted and oppressed.

O God, Who invisibly containest all things, and yet for the salvation of mankind dost visibly shew the signs of Thy power: Glorify, we beseech Thee, this Temple with the might of Thy indwelling; and grant that all who shall assemble hither to entreat Thy mercy, from the midst of whatever tribulation they may call upon Thee, may obtain the benealt of Thy heavenly consolation. Through. Gr.

On the Dedication Festival of a Church.

O God, Who year by year bringest round to us the day of the consecration of this Thy Holy Temple, and bringest us continually in safety to Thy Holy Mysteries: Mercifully hear the prayers of Thy people, and grant that whosoever shall enter this Temple to ask Thy blessing may rejoice that he has perfectly obtained it. Through. Gr.

Be gracious, O Lord, we beseech Thee, to these our prayers, and grant that we, who are now assembled within Thy Temple, to celebrate the anniversary of its dedication, may please Thee with full and perfect devotion both of body and soul; that we who now pay Thee our vows on earth, may be enabled by Thy assistance to attain to eternal rewards in Heaven. Through.

O God, Who hast vouchsafed to call Thy Church Thy Bride, that as She enjoys Thy favour through the devoutness of her faith, She might also be adorned with dignity from the name Thou gavest: Grant that all these Thy people who devoutly worship Thee may be found worthy to share the honour of that glorious And let Thy Church. assembled before Thee in Thy Temple, evermore love, honour, and obey Thee, that, walking continually in Thy footsteps, She may by Thy guidance attain to Thy heavenly promises. Who livest and reignest. Gr.

After the death of a friend.

God, Whose nature and property is ever to have mercy and to forgive, we humbly beseech Thee for the soul of Thy servant for handmaid N: That Thou wouldest not deliver it into the hands of the enemy, nor forget it for evermore, but wouldest order it to be received by Thy holy Angels, and to be conducted even unto the land of the living; and, forasmuch as he hath hoped and believed in Thee, grant him to rejoice in the company of Thy Saints. Through.

For a Departed Friend.

O God, Whose nature and property is ever to have mercy and to forgive, have mercy upon the soul of Thy servant [or handmaid] N: And grant him eternal rest among Thy Saints and Elect, that he may enjoy their companionship in everlasting Life. Through.

O Lord. Thou God of mercy and forgiveness, grant that the soul of Thy servant, [or handmaid] N. may enjoy the place of refreshing, the blessedness of rest, and the clear shining of the light of

Paradise. Through.

In Commemoration of Founders and Benefactors.

NOTE .- In the Latin Book of Common Prayer issued in the year 1560, for use in the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge, and in the Colleges of Eton and Winchester, it is directed, that "at the end of every Term a Commemoration should be made of the Founder and of the other illustrious persons by whose munificence the College is en-riched," in the following form.

¶ Our Father.

O God, make speed to save us. O Lord, make haste to help us. Glory be to the Father. As it was.

Praise ye the Lord. The Lord's Name be praised.

Then shall be said the following three Psalms.

Psalm cxliv. Psalm cxlv. Psalm cxlvj.

 $\P$  Then shall be read the fortyfourth Chapter of the Book of Ecclesiasticus.

After which shall follow a Ser-

mon, in which the Preacher shall set forth the munificence of the Benefactors, and the use and advantage of learning, &c.

¶ After which shall be sung the Song of Zacharias, called, Benedictus.

After which shall be said the following Prayers.

Let us pray.

Our Father.

The righteous shall be had in everlasting remembrance.

He will not be afraid of any evil tidings.

The souls of the righteous are in the hand of God.

There shall no torment touch them.

Collect. O Lord our God, Who art the Resurrection and the Life

of them that believe; Who art to be praised evermore, alike among the living and for them that are departed: We yield Thee hearty thanks for our Founder N. and for N. and N. and all other our Benefactors, through whose goodness we are here nourished in religion and learning; and humbly beseech Thee to grant, that we may be enabled rightly to use these Thy gifts unto Thy glory, and may finally be made partakers together with them of a glorious Resurrection unto im-Through. mortal life.

Blessing. God grant unto the living grace; [to the departed rest;] to the Church, the Queen, and the whole realm, peace and concord; and unto us sinners life everlasting. Amen.

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## **Holy Communion.**

"Fet a man examine himself, and so let him eat of that Bread and drink of that Cny." 1 Con. xi. 28.

## The Church's Instructions on Holy Communion.

It is required of them who come to the Lord's Supper:

To examine themselves, whether they repent them truly of their former sins, steadfastly purposing to lead a new life; have a lively faith in God's mercy through Christ, with a thankful remembrance of His Death; and be in charity with all men. (Catechism.)

To consider the dignity of that Holy Mystery, and the great peril of the unworthy receiving

thereof:

To search and examine their own consciences, (and that not lightly, after the manner of dissemblers with God; but so) that they may come holy and clean to such a heavenly Feast, in the marriage-garment required by God in Holy Scripture, and be received as worthy partakers of that Holy Table. (First Exhortation to Holy Communion.)

The Way and Means to a proper examination of ourselves is:

- 1. To examine our lives and conversations by the rule of God's Commandments.
- 2. Whereinsoever we perceive ourselves to have offended, either by will, word, or deed, there to bewail our own sinfulness, and to confess ourselves to Almighty God, with full purpose of amendment of life.
- 3. And if we perceive our offences to be such as are not only against God, but also against our neighbours, then we must reconcile ourselves unto them, being ready to make restitution and satisfaction, according to the

uttermost of our powers, for all injuries and wrongs done by us to any other.

4. We must be likewise ready to forgive others that have offended us, as we would have forgiveness of our offences at God's hand. (*Ibid*).

The Church requires of all her adult and confirmed members

That they should communicate "at the least three times in the year, of which Easter to be one." (Rubric after Order of Holy Communion.)

That (unless they be known to him as regular Communicants) they should, when they intend to partake of the Holy Communion, "signify their names to the Curate, at least some time the day before." (Rubric before Order of Holy Communion.)

The Church exhorts all herchildren:

"To the often receiving of the Holy Communion of the Body and Blood of our Saviour Christ, when it shall be publickly administered in the Church; that so doing, they may, in case of sudden visitation, have the less cause to be disquieted for lack of the same." (Rubric before the Communion of the Sick.)

The Church moreover teaches us as follows:

"And because it is requisite that no man should come to the Holy Communion, but with a full trust in God's mercy, and with a quiet conscience; therefore if there be any of you, who cannot quiet his own conscience, but re-

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quireth further comfort or counsel, let him come to some discreet and learned Minister of God's Word, and open his grief, that by the ministry of God's Holy Word he may receive the benefit of absolution, together with ghostly counsel and advice, to the quieting of his conscience, and avoiding of all scruple and doubtfulness." (First Exhortation to Holy Communion.)

## Confession and Penitential Preparation.

After a careful examination of your life and conversation since your last Communion, (which unless you communicate weekly, you ought to make, at the latest, on the Friday evening before the Sunday on which you intend to communicate,) confess yourself to Almighty God, in the following form.

Confession of Sins.

I confess to God Almighty, To God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Ghost, Before the Angels and Archangels and all the Company of Heaven, That since my last Communion I have sinned, In thought, word, and deed, By my own fault, my own most grievous fault. I have sinned . . [Here specify the sins of which you find yourself guilty.] Whereof I truly repent, And earnestly desire God's mercy and forgiveness.

And for these, as well as for all the sins and negligences of my previous life, I sincerely humble myself before Thee, my Father, Which art in Heaven, and pray Thee to give me evermore still deeper repentance and contrition, and grace to forsake them entirely for the future, and to give myself wholly unto Thee. Through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Then, according to apportunity, you may say the Seven Penitential Psalms, (page 58.) or Psalms licxxx. cxliii. or at the least the Fifty-first Psalm with the Anthem, Remember not. And after that

the Penitential Litany. (p. 82.) or at least the latter portion of it from, O Lamb of God. (p. 83.) with the Prayer for forgiveness and the Renewal of Baptismal vows, (p. 84.)

And always be careful to be early in Church at the next service you attend, in order that, seriously recollecting your previous private Confession, you may join the more devoutly in the public general Confession in the Church, and may receive the full blessing of the Absolution pronounced by the Priest. It is very desirable that you should, if possible, go to Church on the Saturday with this especial object, that you may with a quiet conscience address yourself to the more joyful part of your preparation to meet your Lord; for, if we live as we ought, a joyful longing and desire for Him, grounded on a deep repentance and self-humiliation, ought to be the predominant feeling in our looking forward to the Holy Communion.

Should you find it necessary to confess to a Priest, you should be guided throughout by his instructions as to the mode of preparing yourself for Confession, the prayers and devotions you should use before and after, and the form in which to make the Confession itself.

During the Saturday, or on the Sunday morning before going to Church, you can use, according to opportunity, any of the following Meditations and Devotions before Holy Communion.

## Meditation before Koly Communion.

(From Bishop Ken's " Practice of Divine Love.")

Glory be to Thee, O crucified Love, Who at Thy last Supper didst ordain the holy Eucharist, the Sacrament and Feast of love.

It was "for the continual remembrance of the Sacrifice of Thy Death," O blessed Jesu, "and of the benefits we receive thereby," that Thou wast pleased to ordain this sacred and awful rite: all love, all glory, be to Thee.

Ah! dearest Lord, how little sensible is he of Thy love in dying for us, who can ever forget Thee!

Ah! woe is me, that ever a sinner should forget his Saviour, and yet, alas, how prone are we to do it!

Glory be to Thee, O gracious Jesu, Who, to help our memories, and to impress Thy love deep on our souls, hast instituted the blessed Sacrament, and commanded us, "Do this in remembrance of Me."

O Jesu, let the propitiatory sacrifice of Thy Death, which Thou didst offer upon the Cross for the sins of the whole world, and particularly for my sins, be ever fresh in my remembrance.

O blessed Šaviour, let that mighty salvation Thy love has wrought for us, never slip out of my mind; but especially, let my remembrance of Thee in the holy Sacrament be always most lively and affecting.

O Jesu, if I love Thee truly, I shall be sure to frequent Thy Altar, that I may often remember all the wonderful loves of my crucified Redeemer.

I know, O my Lord and my God, that a bare remembrance of Thee is not enough; O do Thou therefore fix in me such a remembrance of Thee as is suitable to the infinite love I am to remember; work in me all those holy and heavenly affections which become the remembrance of a crucified Saviour.

Glory be to Thee, O adorable Jesu, Who under the outward and visible part, the "Bread and Wine," things obvious and easily prepared, both which "Thou hast commanded to be" received, dost communicate to our souls the mystery of Divine love, the "inward and invisible grace," Thy own most blessed "Body and Blood, which are verily and indeed taken and received by the faithful in Thy Supper;" for which all love, all glory, be to Thee.

O God incarnate, how the Bread and the Wine, unchanged in their substance, become Thy Body and Thy Blood; after what extraordinary manner Thou, Who art in heaven, art present throughout the whole Sacramental action, to every devout receiver; "how Thou canst give us Thy Flesh to eat, and Thy Blood to drink; how Thy Flesh is meat indeed, and Thy Blood is drink indeed; how he that eateth Thy Flesh, and drinketh Thy Blood, dwelleth in Thee, and Thou in him; how he shall live by Thee, and be raised up by Thee to life eternal;" I can by no means comprehend, but I firmly believe all Thou hast said, and I firmly rely on Thy omnipotent love, to make good

Thy word; for which all love, all

glory, be to Thee.

I believe, O crucified Lord, that "the Bread which we break" in the celebration of the holy Mysteries is the communication of Thy Body, and the "cup of blessing which we bless" is the communication of Thy Blood; and that Thou dost as effectually and really convey Thy Body and Blood to our souls by the Bread and Wine, as Thou didst Thy Holy Spirit by Thy breath to Thy disciples; for which all love, all glory, be to Thee.

Lord, what need I labour in vain to search out the manner of Thy mysterious Presence in the Sacrament, when my love assures me Thou art there? All the faithful who approach Thee with prepared hearts, they well know Thou art there; they feel the virtue of Divine love going out of Thee, to heal their infirmities, and to inflame their affections; for which all love, all glory, be to

Thee.

O holy Jesu, when at Thy Altar I see the Bread broken, and the Wine poured out, O teach me to discern Thy Body there: O let those sacred and significant actions create in me a most lively remembrance of Thy sufferings, how Thy most blessed Body was scourged, and wounded, and bruised, and tormented; how Thy most precious Blood was shed for my sins; and set all my powers on work to love Thee, and to celebrate Thy love in thus dying for me.

O my Lord and my God, do Thou so dispose my heart to be Thy guest at Thy holy Table, that I may feel all the sweet influences of love crucified, "the strengthening and refreshing of my soul, as our bodies are by the Bread and Wine;" for which I will ever

adore and love Thee.

O merciful Jesu, let that im-

mortal food, which in the holy Eucharist Thou vouchsafest me, instil into my weak and languishing soul new supplies of grace, new life, new love, vigour, and new resolution, that I may never more faint, or droop, or tire in my duty.

O crucified Love, raise in me fresh ardours of love and consolation, that it may be henceforth the greatest torment I can endure ever to offend Thee, that it may be my greatest delight to

please Thee.

O amiable Jesu, when I devoutly receive the outward elements, as sure as I receive them, I receive Thee, I receive the pledges of Thy love, to quicken mine: O indulge me, though but for a moment, one beatific foretaste of the deliciousness of Thy love, that in the strength of that deliciousness I may perseveringly love Thee.

O my God, Thou Who alone changest the heart, O be Thou pleased to change mine; change my aversion to Thee into an entire love of Thee. O give me a filial repentance, that with a broken and contrite heart I may grieve, and mourn, and repent, for all my former sins, and may for ever forsake them, and return to my obedience.

Let Thy love, O my God, so perfectly exhaust my soul, that I may for the future "steadfastly purpose to lead a new life," that I may renew my baptismal vow, that I may hereafter live as a sworn votary to Thy love.

O heavenly Father, settle in my soul a "lively faith in Thy mercy through Christ," a steady belief of all Thy love to sinners, and an affectionate reliance on the merits and mediation of Thy crucified Son, of my being "accepted in the Beloved," for Whom I will ever adore and love Thee. O my crucified God, Thou sovereign inflammative of love, let the "remembrance of Thy death" set all the powers of my soul on work, that I may desire and pant after Thee; that I may admire and adore Thee; that I may take heavenly delight in Thy gracious presence; that with praise and thanksgiving, with jubilation and triumph, I may receive Thee into my heart; there I will have love, only love, always love, to entertain Thee.

Lord, when I present myself, and my love, as all the gift I have to offer, at Thy Altar, next to my love to Thee, and for the sake of Thine infinite love to me, which I there remember, give me grace to love my neighbour, "and to be in charity with all men, and to walk in love, as Thou hast loved us, and hast given Thyself for us, an offering and a sacrifice to God, for a sweet smelling savour;" for which all love, all glory, be to Thee.

### Bebotions before Koly Communion.

(From the Fourth Book of "The Imitation of Christ.")

#### CHAPTER II.

In confidence of Thy goodness and great mercy, O Lord, I draw near, as a sick person to the Healer, as one hungry and thirsty to the Fountain of life, a needy wretch to the King of Heaven, a servant unto his Lord, a creature to the Creator, a desolate soul to my own tender Comforter.

But whence is this to me, that Thou vouchsafest to come unto me? What am I, that Thou shouldest grant Thine own Self unto

me ?

How dare a sinner appear before Thee? and how is it that Thou dost vouchsafe to come unto a sinner?

Thou knowest Thy servant, Thou art aware that he hath in him no good thing, for which Thou shouldest grant him this favour.

I confess therefore mine own unworthiness, I acknowledge Thy goodness, I praise Thy tender mercy, and give Thee thanks for this Thy transcendent love.

For Thou doest this for Thine own sake, not for any merits of mine; to the end that Thy goodness may be better known unto me, Thy love more abundantly poured down, and Thy gracious humility the more eminently set forth.

Since therefore it is Thy pleasure, and Thou hast commanded that it should be so, this Thy condescension is also dearly pleasing unto me, and O that my iniquity may be no hindrance herein!

O most sweet and most benign Jesu, how great reverence and thanksgiving, together with perpetual praise, is due unto Thee for the receiving of Thy sacred Body and Blood, whose preciousness no mortal man is able to express!

But on what shall my thoughts dwell at this Communion, in thus approaching unto my Lord, Whom I am not able duly to honour, and yet Whom I cannot but desire devoutly to receive?

What can I think on better, and more profitable, than utterly to humble myself before Thee, and to exalt Thine infinite goodness above me?

I praise Thee, my God, and will exalt Thee for ever. I do

despise myself, and cast myself down before Thee, into the deep of mine own unworthiness.

Behold Thou art the Holy of Holies, and I the scum of sinners!

Behold, Thou inclinest Thyself unto me, who am not worthy so much as to look up unto Thee!

Behold, Thou comest unto me; it is Thy will to be with me; Thou invitest me to Thy banquet.

Thou art willing to give me heavenly Food and Bread of Angels to eat, which is indeed no other than Thyself the Living Bread, Which camest down from Heaven, and givest life unto the world.

Behold, from whence doth this love proceed! what a gracious condescension of Thine shineth forth herein! how great thanks and praises are due unto Thee for these benefits!

O how great and profitable was Thy counsel, when Thou didst ordain it! how sweet and pleasant the banquet, when Thou gavest Thyself to be our Food!

O how admirable is this Thy working, O Lord, how mighty is Thy power, how unspeakable Thy

truth!

For Thou didst speak the word, and all things were made; and this was done which Thou Thyself commandedst.

A matter of great admiration, worthy of all faith, and surpassing man's understanding, that Thou, my Lord God, True God and Man, art wholly contained in a little Bread and Wine, and without being consumed art fed on by him that receiveth.

Thou Who art the Lord of the universe, and standest in need of none, art pleased to dwell in us by means of this Thy Sacrament.

Do Thou preserve my heart and body undefiled, that with a cheerful and pure conscience I may be able often to celebrate, and to receive to my everlasting health, those Mysteries, which Thou didst specially ordain and institute for Thine own honour, and for a never-ceasing Memorial of Thyself.

#### CHAPTER III.

Behold, O Lord, I come unto Thee, that I may be comforted in Thy gift, and be delighted in Thy holy banquet, which Thou, O God, hast in Thy goodness prepared for the poor.

Behold in Thee is all whatsoever I can or ought to desire; and Thou art my Salvation and my Redemption, my Hope and my Strength, my Honour and Glory.

Make therefore this day the soul of Thy servant joyful; for unto Thee, O Lord Jesu, have I lifted up my soul.

I long to receive Thee now with devotion and reverence. I desire to bring Thee into my house, that with Zaccheus I may obtain to be blessed by Thee, and to be numbered amongst the children of Abraham.

My soul thirsteth to receive Thy Body and Blood, my heart longeth to be united with Thee.

Give Thyself to me, and it sufficeth; for besides Thee no comfort availeth aught.

Without Thee I cannot be; without Thy visitation I cannot endure to live.

And therefore I must needs often draw near unto Thee, and receive Thee for the medicine of my soul; lest haply I faint in the way, if I be deprived of the heavenly food.

For so, most merciful Jesus, Thou once didst say, preaching to the people, and curing divers diseases, I will not send them home fasting, lest they faint in the way.

Deal Thou therefore in like manner now with me, Who hast vouchsafed to leave Thyself in the Sacrament for the comfort of the faithful.

For Thou art the sweet refection of the soul; and he that eateth Thee worthily, shall be partaker and heir of everlasting glory.

It is necessary for me, who so often fall into error and sin, who so quickly wax dull and faint, that by frequent prayer and confession, and receiving of Thy Holy Body and Blood, I renew, cleanse, and inflame myself, lest haply, by long abstaining, I fall away from my holy purposes.

For the imagination of man's heart is evil from his youth, and unless some divine remedy help him, he quickly falleth away to

worse things.

This Holy Communion therefore draweth back from evil, and

strengtheneth in good.

For if I be now so often negligent and cold when I communicate, [or celebrate;] what would become of me if I received not this remedy, and sought not after so great a help?

Although every day I be not fit, nor well prepared to celebrate; I will endeavour notwithstanding at due times to receive the Divine Mysteries, and to be partaker of

so great a grace.

For this is the one chief consolation of faithful souls, so long as they are absent from Thee in this mortal body; that being mindful of their God, they often receive their Beloved with devout mind.

O the wonderful condescension of Thy tender mercy towards us, that Thou, O Lord God, the Creator and Giver of life to all spirits. dost vouchsafe to come unto a poor soul, and with Thy whole Deity and Humanity to replenish the hunger thereof!

O happy minds and blessed souls, who have the privilege of receiving Thee, their Lord God, with devout affection, and in so receiving Thee are permitted to be full of spiritual joy!

O how great a Lord do they entertain! how beloved a Guest do they harbour! how delightful a Companion do they receive! how faithful a Friend do they welcome! how lovely and noble a Spouse do they embrace; even Him Who is to be loved above all that are beloved, and above all things that can be desired.

O Thou, the most sweet, most beloved, let heaven and earth and all their grandeur be silent in Thy presence; for what praise and beauty soever they have, it is received from Thy bounteous condescension, and shall never equal the grace and beauty of Thy Name, Whose wisdom is beyond

all numbers.

#### CHAPTER IV.

O Lord, my God, do Thou prevent Thy servant with the blessings of Thy sweetness, that I may approach worthily and devoutly to Thy glorious Sacrament.

Stir up my heart unto Thee, and deliver me from all dulness. Visit me with Thy salvation, that I may taste in spirit Thy sweetness, which plentifully lieth hid in this Sacrament as in a fountain.

Enlighten also mine eyes to behold so great a Mystery, and strengthen me with undoubting faith to believe it.

For it is Thy work, and no human power; Thy sacred institution, not man's invention.

For of himself no man is able to comprehend and understand these things, which transcend even the exquisite skill of angels.

What portion then of so high and sacred a Mystery shall I, unworthy sinner, dust and ashes, be able to search out and comprehend ?

O Lord, in the simplicity of my heart, with a good and firm faith,



and at Thy commandment, I draw near unto Thee with hope and reverence; and I do truly believe that Thou art here present in this Sacrament, both God and Man.

Thy will is, that I should receive Thee, and that I should unite myself unto Thee in charity.

Wherefore I implore Thy mercy, and do crave Thy special grace, to the end I may wholly be dissolved, and overflow with love unto Thee, and never hereafter suffer any external consolation to enter in.

For this most high and precious Sacrament is the health both of soul and body, the medicine for all spiritual languor; hereby my vices are cured, my passions bridled, my temptations overcome or at least weakened; greater grace is infused, virtue begun is increased, faith is confirmed, hope strengthened, and love inflamed and enlarged.

For Thou hast bestowed, and still oftentimes dost bestow, many benefits in this Sacrament upon Thy beloved ones that communicate devoutly, O my God, the Protector of mysoul, the Strengthener of human frailty, and the Giver of all inward comfort.

Thou impartest unto them much comfort against sundry tribulations; and liftest them up from the depth of their own dejected state, to hope in Thy protection; and dost inwardly recreate and enlighten them with new grace, so that they who at first and before Communion felt themselves full of anxiety and heartlessness, afterwards, being refreshed with heavenly Meat and Drink, do find in themselves a change for the better.

In which thus with wise apportionment Thou dealest with Thine elect, to the intent that they may truly acknowledge, and clearly experience, how great their own infirmity is, and what goodness and grace they obtain from Thee.

For they of themselves are cold, dull, and undevout; but by Thee they are made fervent, cheerful, and full of devotion.

For who is there, that, approaching humbly unto the Fountain of sweetness, doth not carry away from thence at least some little sweetness?

Or who, standing by a great fire, receiveth not some small heat thereby?

And Thou arta Fountain always full and overflowing, a Fire ever burning and never decaying.

Wherefore if I am not permitted to draw out of the full fountain, itself, nor to drink my fill, I will notwithstanding set my lips to the mouth of this heavenly conduit, that I may receive from thence at least some small drop to refresh my thirst, that so I may not be wholly dried up.

And though I cannot as yet be altogether heavenly nor so inflamed as the Cherubim and Seraphim, yet notwithstanding I will endeavour to apply myself earnestly to devotion, and prepare my heart to obtain if it be but some small spark of divine fire, by the humble receiving of this life-giving Sacrament.

And whatsoever is hereunto wanting in me, O merciful Jesu, most Holy Saviour, do Thou bountifully and graciously supply for me, Thou Who hast vouch-safed to call us all unto Thee, saying, Come unto Me, all ye that labour and are heavy laden, and I will refresh you.

I indeed labour in the sweat of my brows, I am vexed with grief of heart, I am burdened with sins, I am troubled with temptations, I am entangled and oppressed with many evil passions; and there is none to help me, none to deliver and save me, but Thon, O Lord God my Saviour, to Whom I commit myself and all that is mine, that Thou mayest keep watch over me, and bring me safe to life everlasting.

Receive me for the honour and glory of Thy Name, Thou Who hast prepared Thy Body and Blood to be my Meat and Drink.

Grant, O Lord God, my Saviour, that by frequenting Thy Mysteries, the zeal of my devotion may grow and increase.

#### CHAPTER XVI.

O Thou most sweet and loving Lord, Whom I now desire to receive with all devotion, Thou knowest my infirmities, and the necessities which I endure; in how many sins and evils I am involved; how often I am weighed down, tempted, disturbed, and defiled by them.

Unto Thee I come for remedy. I entreat of Thee consolation and

support.

I speak to Thee Who knowest all things, to Whom all my inward thoughts are open, and Who alone canst perfectly comfort and help me.

Thou knowest what good things I stand in most need of, and how poor I am in all virtue.

Behold, I stand before Thee poor and naked, calling for grace, and imploring mercy. Refresh Thy hungry supplicant, inflame my coldness with the fire of Thy Love, enlighten my blindness with the brightness of Thy Presence.

Do Thou for me turn all earthly things into bitterness, all things grievous and contrary into occasions for patience, all low and created things into contempt and oblivion before me.

Lift up my heart to Thee in heaven, and do not send me away to wander over the earth.

Be Thou alone sweet unto me from henceforth for evermore; for Thou alone art my Meat and Drink, my love and my joy, my sweetness and all my good.

O that with Thy Presence Thou wouldest wholly inflame, burn, and conform me unto Thyself; that I might be made one Spirit with Thee, by the grace of inward Union, and by the meltings of ardent love!

Suffer me not to go away from Thee hungry and dry, but deal mercifully with me, as oftentimes Thou hast dealt wonderfully with Thy Saints.

What marvel is it if I should be wholly inflamed by Thee, and from myself fail and come to nothing; since Thou art fire alway burning and never decaying, Love purifying the heart and enlightening the understanding.

# A Leitany to our Blessed Subiour in Preparation for Koly Communion.

Jesus, God and Man, in Two Natures, and One Divine Person, Have mercy upon us and bless us.

(And repeat this prayer, Have mercy, &c., after each of the following Invocations.)

Jesus, our Wonderful God, Who

dost vouchsafe to be present upon the Altar when the Priest pronounces the words of Consecration,

Jesus, our Incomprehensible God, Who, though the Heaven of Heavens cannot contain Thee, art pleased to dwell among men, Jesus, our Sovereign King, Who, though Thy Throne is attended by glorified Spirits, vet dost not decline the service of

Jesus, our Heavenly Physician, Who vouchsafest to descend from Thy Palace of Immortal Bliss to our houses of clay, to visit us on beds of sickness, and to give Thyself to comfort our sorrows.

Jesus, our Glorious God, Who sittest at the Right Hand of Thy Eternal Father, adored by innumerable Angels, and encompassed with the splendours of inacces-

sible Light.

Jesus, our Gracious God, Who, condescending to the weakness of our nature, dost cover Thy Glory under the familiar forms of Bread and Wine; and so, dost give Thyself to us miserable sinners,

Jesus, our Merciful God, Who. concealing the Brightness of Thy Majesty under those low and humble Veils, dost invite us to approach unto Thee, to lay open our miseries before Thine Eyes, and to deliver our petitions into Thy Hands,

Jesus, our Pitiful God, Who, to communicate Thy Divine Nature to sinners, dost humble Thyself to descend into our hearts, and by an inconceivable Union to become One with us.

Jesus, the Bread of Life, Which camest down from Heaven; of Which whoseever eats shall live for ever,

Jesus, the Heavenly Manna. Whose Sweetness nourishes Thine Elect in the desert of this world,

Jesus, the Food of Angels, Whose Sweetness fills our hearts

with celestial joys.

Jesus, the Lamb without spot, Who, once sacrificed, art continually offered, yet art alive for evermore; Who art continually consumed, yet still for ever Perfect.

Jesus, the Good Shepherd, Who layest down Thy life for Thy sheep, and feedest them with Thine Own Body.

Jesus, Who, in this August and Venerable Mystery, art Thyself

both Priest and Victim,

Jesus, Who, in the Sacred Memorial of Thy Death, hast consummated all Thy Wonders into One Stupendous Miracle, and contracted all Thy Blessings into one Inestimable Bounty,

Jesus, Who, by this blessed Fruit of the Tree of Life, dost restore us again to Immortality,

Jesus, Who, by becoming Thyself our daily Food in this life. dost prepare us to feed on Thee for ever in the next,

Jesus, Who, in this Divine Banquet, givest us possession of Thy Grace here, and a certain pledge of our glory hereafter.

Have mercy upon us, and bless us.

Spare us, Good Lord, And pardon our sins. Spare us, Good Lord, And hear our prayers.

From presuming to measure the depth of Thy Almightiness by the short line of human reason.

Good Lord, deliver us.

(And after each of the following Deprecations, say, Good deliver us.)

From all idle and wandering thoughts while we offer and present this awful Sacrifice,

From neglecting to approach Thy Holy Table; and from coming to it unprepared,

From an unworthy and fruitless reception of this blessed Sacrament,

From all hardness of heart, and unthankfulness for sounspeakable a blessing,

By Thy resistless Power, which changeth the course of nature as Thou willest,

By Thine unsearchable Wisdom,

which disposeth all things in perfect order,

Thine infinite Goodness. which freely bestows Thyself, in this Incomprehensible Mystery

By Thy most Sacred Body, broken for us upon the Cross, and really given unto us in the Holy Communion,

By Thy most Precious Blood. poured out for us upon the Cross, and really given unto us in the Cup of Blessing,

Good Lord, deliver us.

We sinners most humbly beseech Thee to hear us, O Lord Jesu Christ.

That we may always believe nothing more reasonable than to submit our reason unto Thee:

We beseech Thee to hear us, Good Lord.

(And after each of the following Supplications shall be said, We beseech Thee to hear us, Good Lord.)

That, by this Sacred Oblation, we may acknowledge Thine infinite perfections in Thyself, and Thy supreme Dominion over all things; as well as our perpetual dependance upon Thee, and absolute subjection to Thy will;

That we may ever magnify Thy Goodness, Who, having no need of us, hast set forth such endearing motives to make us love Thee;

That we may thankfully comply with Thy gracious desire of being made One with us, by a fervent desire of being made One with Thee:

That, before we approach Thy Banquet of Divine Love, we may endeavour to be reconciled to Thee, and to be in perfect charity with all the world;

That, at the moment of receiving Thy Sacred Body and Thy Precious Blood, our Souls may be dissolved in reverence and love,

to attend on and entertain so glorious a Guest:

That, returning from the Holy Eucharist, we may collect all our thoughts to praise and bless Thee. and endeavour to amend our lives according to Thy Holy Word;

That, by this Heavenly Medicine, our heart may be healed of all infirmities, and our will strengthened against all relapses;

That as by Faith we adore Thee here present beneath these Sacred Veils; so we may hereafter behold Thee Face to face, and evermore be glad with the joy of Thy Countenance;

We beseech Thee to hear us, Good Lord.

O Lamb of God, That takest away the sins of the world; Grant us Thy Peace.

O Lamb of God, That takest away the sins of the world;

Have mercy upon us.

O Christ, hear us.

O Christ, hear us. Lord, have mercy upon us. Christ, have mercy upon us.

Lord, have mercy upon us.

Our Father.

O Lord, hear my prayer. And let my crying come unto Thee. The Lord be with you. And with thy spirit.

Let us pray. O God, Who in this wonderful Sacrament hast left us a perpetual Memorial of Thy Passion: Grant, we beseech Thee, that we may so reverently handle and devoutly receive the Sacred Mysteries of Thy Body and Blood, that we may ever feel within ourselves the fruit of Thy Redemption. Who livest and reignest with the Father, in the Unity of the Holy Ghost, ever one God, world without end. Amen.

Blessed Jesus, Who art about to come to us Thy unworthy servants in the Blessed Sacrament of Thy Body and Blood, prepare our hearts, we beseech Thee, for

Thyself.

Grant us that repentance for our past sins,—that faith in the Atonement made for them by Thee upon the Cross,—that full purpose of amendment of life, that perfect love to Thee and to all men, which shall fit us to receive Thee.

Lord, we are not worthy that Thou shouldest enter under our roof, much less that we should receive Thee into ourselves; but since Thou didst not disdain to be laid in a manger amongst unclean beasts, so vouchsafe to enter into our souls and bodies, unclean though they be through many sins and defilements.

Lord, come to us that Thou mayest cleanse us.

Lord, come to us that Thou mayest heal us.

Lord, come to us that Thou mayest strengthen us.

And grant that having received Thee, we may never be separated from Thee by our sins, but may continue Thine for ever, till we see Thee face to face in Thy heavenly kingdom, where, with the Father and the Holy Ghost, Thou livest and reignest, ever One God, world without end. Amen.

## Acts of the Principal Wirtnes.

An Act of Faith. Of a truth I firmly believe, O Good Jesu, and with lively faith confess, that Thou Thyself, Equal to God the Father in glory and in power, True God and Man, art verily and indeed present in this Sacrament. For Thou the Very Truth Itself hast said, This is My Body, This is My Blood. I believe whatever the Son of God hath said. Nothing can be truer than this word of Him Who is the Truth. Lord, I believe, help Thou mine unbelief, increase my faith. (Arvisenet.)

An Act of Hope. O Christ Jesus, I am sinful dust and ashes, but Thou callest to Thee them that labour and are heavy laden, that Thou mayest refresh them. Art not Thou my Refuge? whom else should I go? Alone hast the Words of Eternal Life, Thou Alone canst comfort me in every trouble. Lord, I am weak and sick, but Thou art my They that are whole Salvation. need not a Physician, but they that are sick. Therefore I come to Thee, my Physician and my Refuge, hoping that this Communion may be to me the increase of Faith, Hope, and Charity; a firm defence against the snares of my enemies; a help to the removal of the fault and defect ofand to the bringing forth of Works well pleasing unto Thee, especially-; and a pledge of future glory. This is the hope and desire which I cherish in my heart, for Thou art pitiful and of tender mercy, and in all Thy Promises most faithful. (Ibid.)

An Act of Love. O Most Sweet Saviour Jesus Christ, how great was Thy Love which drew Thee from the Bosom of the Father to this vale of tears, to take our flesh and endure infinite miseries and wrongs, and even the Death of the Cross, and that only for us miserable sinners, and for our salvation! O how great was Thy Love; Thou mightest have condemned us, and Thou didst rather choose to save us! We were guilty, and Thou, the Sinless One, didst endure our punishment to

set us free! Of Love it was that Thou camest down to us to take our flesh, and when about to depart from this world to the Father, Thou didst leave us this Sacrament, as a pledge of Love, that after a new and wondrous manner Thou mightest abide with us for ever, Thou Whose delights are to be with the sons of men. O Lord, how worthy art Thou of love, Who dost so much for love of us! Wherefore I will love Thee, O Lord, my Strength, my Refuge, and my Deliverer. O God, Thou art very Love, he that dwelleth in love dwelleth in Thee. I desire to receive Thee in this Sacrament that I may be more firmly united with Thee in the bond of love. Who shall separate me from the love of Christ my Saviour? that neither life, nor death, nor any other creature, may have power to do so. (Ibid.)

An Act of Humility. Yet how dare I venture to approach to Thee? Art not Thou, O God, my Lord, my Creator, my Redeemer, the King of Heaven and earth? and who am I? A poor worm of earth, and, what is yet more unworthy, so oft a disobedient and ungrateful sinner against Thee! Of a truth, Lord, I am not worthy that Thou shouldest come under my roof: yet remember, O Lord, that although Thou wast Lord of all, yet didst Thou take upon Thee the form of a servant, and, coming unto us, didst converse familiarly with publicans and sinners; and lastly didst humble Thyself even unto death. Let that Thy humility move Thee, I beseech Thee, not to despise me, vile and worthless as I am, but graciously to come unto me. and mercifully to receive me who come to Thee. (Ibid.)

## Prayers before Boly Communion.

Prayer of S. Thomas Aquinas, directed in the Ancient English Use of Sarum, to be said before Holy Communion.

Omnipotens sempiterne Deus.

Almighty and Everlasting God, behold I approach the Sacrament of Thy Only-Begotten Son, our Lord Jesus Christ. As one sick. I come to the Physician of Life: as unclean, to the Fountain of Mercy: as blind, to the Light of Eternal Splendour: as needy, to the Lord of Heaven and earth: as naked, to the King of Glory: a lost sheep, to the Good Shepherd: a fallen creature, to its Creator: desolate, to the kind miserable, to the Comforter: Pitier: guilty, to the Bestower of Pardon: sinful, to the Justifier: hardened, to the Infuser of Grace.

I implore therefore the Abundance of Thine Infinite Majesty that Thou wouldest vouchsafe to heal my sickness, to wash my foulness, to lighten my darkness, to enrich my poverty, and to clothe my nakedness, that I may receive the Bread of Angels, the King of kings and Lord of lords, with such reverence and fear, such contrition and love, such faith and purity, such devotion and humility, as is expedient for the welfare of my soul.

Grant me, I beseech Thee, to receive not only the Sacrament of the Lord's Body and Blood, but also the Virtue of the Sacra-

ment.

O Most Merciful God, grant me so to receive the Body of Thy Only-Begotten Son our Lord Jesus Christ, Which He took of the Virgin Mary, that I may be incorporated in His Mystical Body, and ever reckoned among His members.

And, O Most Loving Father, grant me that Whom I now purpose to receive under a veil I may at length behold with open face, even Thy Beloved Son, Who with Thee and the Holy Ghost liveth and reigneth ever one God, world without end. Amen.

A Prayer of S. Anselm before Holy Communion.

Rogo etiam Te, Domine.

O Great High Priest, the True Priest, Jesu Christ, I pray Thee by the Holy Mystery of Thy Body and Blood, Whereby in Thy Church we are evermore fed, washed, and sanctified, and made partakers of Thy Divine Nature; Grant to me the graces which are well pleasing unto Thee, especially-, with which fulfilled I may so with a clean conscience approach Thy Altar, that the Sacramental Gifts may be made to me health and life. For Thou with Thy holy and blessed Mouth hast said, The Bread Which I will give is My Flesh, which I will give for the life of the world. I am the Living Bread Which came down from heaven. Whosoever shall eat of this Bread shall live O Bread most sweet, for ever. heal Thou the palate of my heart, that I may feel the sweetness of Thy Love. Heal it of all weakness and frailty, that it may be set upon no sweetness but Thyself.

O Bread most fair, full of all delight and sweetness, That ever refreshest us and never failest, may my heart feed on Thee, and may my inmost parts be filled with the sweetness of Thy taste. Thy Angel Host feeds on Thee with full satisfaction: may man in his pilgrimage so feed on Thee

according to his measure, that he may not fail on the way, being refreshed with such Food for his journey.

O Holy Bread, O Living Bread, O Bread most Pure, Which camest down from Heaven, and givest life unto the world, come into my heart and cleanse me from all defilement of flesh and spirit. Enter Thou into my soul, and heal and cleanse me within and without, especially from Be Thou the succour and abiding defence of my soul and body. Drive far from me all the snares of the enemy. Let them be scattered afar from Thy powerful Presence, that being both outwardly and inwardly guarded by Thee, I may attain by a straight course to Thy Heavenly Kingdom, where no more as now in mysteries, but face to face, we shall see Thee, when Thou shalt have delivered up the Kingdom to God, even the Father, that God may be all in all. For then shalt Thou wondrously satisfy me from Thyself, so that I shall hunger no more nor thirst any more. For Thy tender Mercy's sake, Who livest and reignest with the Same Father and the Holy Ghost, ever One God, world without end. Amen.

¶ The following Prayer of S. Anselm, Archbishop of Canterbury, before receiving the blessed Sacrament, may be said in the morning before going to Church; or during the Service itself, either in the pause while the general Congregation is withdrawing, or in the pause after the Prayer of Consecration.

Ad mensam dulcissimi convivii.

To the table of Thy most sweet Feast, O Gracious Lord Jesu Christ, I a sinner approach with fear and trembling; nothing presuming on my own deserts, but trusting in Thy Mercy and Goodness. For my heart and body are stained with many sins, my thoughts and lips not diligently Wherefore, O Gracious God, O Awful Majesty, in my extremity I turn to Thee, the Fount of Mercy; to Thee I hasten to be healed, and take refuge under Thy protection; and Thee, before Whom as my Judge I cannot stand, I long for as my Saviour. To Thee, O Lord, I shew my wounds, to Thee I lay bare my I know my sins, for which I am afraid, are many and great. My trust is in Thy mercies, of which there is no end. Look therefore upon me with the eye of Thy Mercy, O Lord Jesu Christ, God and Man, for man's sake crucified. Hearken unto me whose trust is in Thee; have mercy upon me who am full of sin and misery, O Thou Fount of Mercy, That wilt never cease to

Hail, Saving Victim, offered for me and all mankind on the Cross of suffering and shame. Hail, noble and precious Blood, flowing from the Wounds of my Crucified Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, and washing away the sins of the whole world.

Bemindful, O Lord, of Thy creature which Thou hast redeemed with Thine Own Blood. It repents me that I have sinned, and I desire to amend what I have done. Take therefore away from me, O most merciful Saviour, all my iniquities and sins, especially . . . . . that being cleansed both in body and soul I may worthily taste the Holy of Holies.

And grant that this holy feeding on Thy Body and Blood, of Which-unworthy as I am I purpose to partake, may be for the remission of my sins, and the perfect cleansing of all my offences, for the driving away of all evil thoughts, and the renewal of all holy desires, for the healthful bringing forth of fruit well-pleasing unto Thee, and the most sure protection of my soul and body against the wiles of all enemies. For Thy tender Mercy's sake. Amen.

## Debotions at Koly Communion.

During the actual Celebration of the Holy Communion it is best not to use any private devotions whilst the Priest is saying anything at the Altar, but always to give our best attention to everything which he says and does, devoutly following him in our Prayer-Book, and inwardly joining with him.

There are usually three pauses in the Service which may be made use of for Private Devotion.

1. Whilst the non-communicants are withdrawing.

2. A short pause just before the Prayer of Consecration.

3. After the Prayer of Consecration, whilst others are receiving.

Sometimes after the General Confession the Priest pauses awhile before pronouncing the Absolution. This is intended to allow all to make briefly in secret a special confession to Almighty God of any particular sins which their selfexamination may have shewn them to have been guilty of since their Communion. We should gladly avail ourselves of this, and then give earnest heed to the Absolution whereby God declares His full forgiveness of us if we be truly penitent.

During the first pause we may make use of any of the foregoing Prayers and Devotions before Holy Communion, or else the following, from the Mozarabic Liturgy.

Conscious of our sinful thoughts and our shortcomings, we approach Thee, O Lord, not to sacrifice to Thee a bleeding victim, but with suppliant prayers to offer and present before Thee the Body of the Everlasting Priest.

Remember therefore, O Lord,

what He endured for us, Who bare our sins. And clothe Thou us in the Robe of righteousness, that none may sit down at Thy Supper without a wedding garment, but that the banquet of the New Testament may abound with celestial joys.

Far from us be the guile whereby the wicked disciple was deceived. May there be in all true Faith, sure Hope, and pure Love, that the conscience of none may be condemned by these spiritual Sacraments, but that we all, cleansed by the sweetness of Thy peace and love from all our faults, may venture even now on earth to draw near and call Thee Father. Through the Same Thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord.

During the second pause, before the Consecration, we may say, according to the ancient Use of York, the following, on behalf of the Officiating Priest:—

The Lord hear thee in the day of trouble: the Name of the God of Jacob defend thee.

Send thee help from the Sanctuary: and strengthen thee out of Sion.

Remember all thy Offerings: and accept thy burnt-sacrifice.

Grant thee thy heart's desire : and fulfil all thy mind.

Save, Lord, and hear us, O King of Heaven: when we call upon Thee. (Psalm xx.)

Adding this.

In the spirit of humility, and with contrite hearts, may we be accepted of Thee, O Lord: and may our offering be so made in Thy sight, that it may be accepted of Thee, and may please Thee, O Lord my God. S.M.

¶ The following Prayers, which may be used at this part of the Service according to opportunity and at discretion, are translated from the "Secreta," (or Collects appointed to be said silently before the Consecration) of the ancient English Use of Sarum.

#### Advent and Christmas.

Accept, we beseech Thee, O Lord, the Offering of Thy Faithful People: and grant that we may be partakers of Jesus Christ Thy Son our Lord, even as He vouchsafed to take upon Him our humanity. Epiphany.

We bring before Thee, O Lord, our Offerings in thanksgiving for the Manifestation of Thy Son: Humbly entreating, that as He is the Author of these our Gifts, so He may also mercifully present them unto Thee. Who liveth and reigneth with Thee, in the Unity of the Holy Ghost, ever One God, world without end. Amen. G.

That the gifts of Thy suppliant people may be acceptable unto Thee, O Lord, cleanse them, we pray Thee, from all defilement of wickedness and sin. Through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. Gr.

Lent.

Receive, O Lord, with favour, these gifts of Thy Holy Church, which Thou of Thy mercy gavest unto us to offer, and makest by Thy power to pass into the Mystery of our salvation. Through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. L.

O God, to Whom, now that the many and various Sacrifices of old time are ended, we offer and present the One and Only Victim: Mercifully assist the prayers conceived by Thine Own inspiration, and cause that both the desires

of us who trust in Thee may be fulfilled, and our sins may be done away. Through the Same Thy Son our Saviour Jesus Christ. Amen. S.M.

Grant, we beseech Thee, O Lord, that we may ever rejoice to be occupied in the solemnities of Thy holy worship, and also in body and mind alike may be duly fitted for the holy Mysteries. Through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. S.M.

Grant to us, we beseech Thee, O Merciful God, that we may ever worthily serve at Thy Altars, and by our continual partaking thereof be kept in the state of grace. Through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. Gr.

Accept, Almighty Creator, the gifts which, through Thy bountiful goodness, we with fasting present unto Thee: And as Thou hast given them unto us for our support in this transitory life, so do Thou mercifully cleanse them for our use towards the Life Eternal. Through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. S.M.

#### Holu Week.

Sanctify, O Lord, we beseech Thee, the oblations of Thy people who are dedicated unto Thee: That we, being cleansed from the corruption of our former earthly life, may be renewed by continual advances in the life of Heaven. Through Jesus Christ our Lord.' Amen. S.M.

Maundy Thursday.

We beseech Thee, O Lord, Holy Father, Almighty Everlasting God, that He may render this our sacrifice acceptable unto Thee, Who by the Institution, as on this day, of His holy Supper, taught His disciples that this should be done for the remembrance of Him, even Jesus Christ Thy Son our Lord, Who with Thee and the Holy Ghost liveth

and reigneth, ever One God, world without end. Amen. Gr.

#### Easter.

Accept, we beseech Thee, O Lord, the prayers of Thy People, together with the sacrifices which they offer: That the gifts which are offered on this Paschal solemnity, may by the working of Thy mighty power be profitable to us for our restoration unto eternal Life. Through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. G.

Receive, O Lord, the prayers of Thy Church, which rejoices in the grace of its Redemption: And grant that it may be nourished by a faithful partaking of these present gifts, and by a firm belief in Thy glorious Resurrection. Who livest and reignest with the Father and the Holy Ghost, ever One God, world without end. Amen. S.M.

#### Ascension-Tide.

Grant, we beseech Thee, Almighty God, that this offering which we present may be accepted of Thee, being consecrated to be the Body and Blood of Thy Son, Whom, as He sitteth at the Right Handof Thy Majesty, we assuredly believe to intercede for us. Who liveth and reigneth with Thee and the Holy Ghost, ever One God, world without end. Amen. S.M.

#### Whitsun-Tide.

O Lord, we beseech Thee, let Thy Holy Ghost descend upon this Altar: That He may both sanctify the gifts of Thy People, and also mercifully cleanse the hearts of those who receive there-of. Through Jesus Christ our Lord, Who liveth and reigneth with Thee, in the Unity of the Same Holy Ghost, ever One God, world without end. Amen. S.M.

#### Trinity Sunday.

O Fount of undying Love! how can I forget Thee, who hast vouch-safed to remember me, and to give Thyself to me? Thou hast shewed morcy upon Thy servant beyond all my hope, and grace and kindness beyond all my desert. What shall I render to Thee for this Thy Goodness?

For of a truth Thou art worthy of all devotion, all honour, and unceasing praise. Of a truth Thou art my Lord, and I Thy humble servant, who am bound with all my strength to serve Thee, and never ought I to be weary of Thy praises. For when we were not, by Thy Divine Power Thou didst create us: when we were Thine enemies, Thou camest down from Heaven and with wondrous wisdom didst redeem us: and since without Thee we cannot live, nor move, nor have any being, in body or in spirit, Thou, of Thine unbounded goodness, preservest us evermore by so many Sacraments and means of grace, nay in this blessed Sacrament Thou givest us Thy Body and Blood, that is, Thyself, after a manner altogether wonderful. O love! O tenderness! O new and mighty Mystery!

And dost Thou then vouchsafe to come to me, O my God? The King and Lord of Majesty Supreme to the meanest of Thy servants, the Almighty God to man, the Creator to the creature? Whence is this to me, that Thou Thyself, my Lord, shouldest come to me? O Lord our God, how excellent is Thy Name in all the Who can express the noble acts of the Lord, or shew forth all His praise? Lord. I am less than the least of all Thy mercies which Thou hast shewed unto Thy servant. Wherefore. acknowledging my own insufficiency, this only do I earnestly desire, that all creatures with me and for me may praise and bless Thy Name for evermore. Amen.

Offer to God the Father His Son Jesus Christ. O Father of mercies and God of all comfort, Who of the abundance of Thine Infinite Love hast given to me Thine Only-Begotten Son! Behold I a miserable sinner, being now made partaker of His most Blessed Body and Blood, embracing Him within my breast, and possessing Him joined in intimate union with myself, do offer Him to Thee in union with that His unspeakable love wherewith He offered Himself upon the Altar of His Behold, this is the treasure, O Father most merciful, wherein I have placed all my hope: this is the riches which I bring in satisfaction of my debts.

Look, gracious Father, on the Face of Thine Anointed, and forasmuch as this is Thy Beloved Son, in Whom Thou art evernore well pleased, Who now is most closely united unto me, I humbly entreat that Thou wouldest look upon me also with the eyes of Thy Mercy. Under His guardianship and protection, under the shadow of His merits I appear before Thee, that as Thou lookest chiefly upon Him, Thou mayest also favourably and with mercy look on me who belong unto Him as His servant for ever.

O Lord, I beseech Thee, suffer

not my soul to perish, which so oft receives Thy Son within itself, Who, being sent by Thee, hath come into the world to seek and to save that which was lost. Grant this, O Lord, of Thine infinite mercy, through the Same Jesus Christ Thy Son our Lord. Amen.

Call upon the Lord. O Lord, I beseech Thee, let this most excellent Victim. Which I have this day pleaded and presented before Thee, be accepted of thee in expiation and satisfaction of all my sins, negligences, and ignorances, and for the sins of the whole By It do Thou restore all world. the ruined places of my soul, and supply all my need. By It do Thou mortify in me whatever displeaseth Thee, and make me a man after Thine own heart. It do Thou conform my whole spirit and soul and body unto the Spirit and Soul and Body of Thy holy Manhood, and enlighten me wholly by the Light of Thy Perfect Godhead. By It vouchsafe that I may be stablished in Thee, may love Thee perfectly and perseveringly, may be closely united with Thee, and wholly transformed into Thine Image, to the glory of Thy Holy Name, Which called upon us. For Thy tender mercy's sake. Amen.

#### III.

I have found Him Whom my soul loveth: I have held Him, and will not let Him go. Thee, O my Jesus, I embrace. Thee, my love and my joy, I hold fast. Of Thee, the treasure of my heart, do I lay hold, in Whom I possess all things. From all my necessities deliver me, O Lord, and make me to be as wholly Thine as Thou art mine. Thou O Jesus, art my Creator that hast made me; create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a right

spirit within me. Thou art my King and my Lord, do Thou possess me, and none but Thee. Thou art my Teacher and my Master; O teach me true understanding and knowledge, and perfect obedience to Thy Law. Thou art my Advocate with God the Father, cause that He may turn away His anger from me. art He that shall come to judge the quick and dead, enter not into judgment with Thy servant, O Lord. Thou, Lord, art the Beloved of my soul, betroth me to Thee in lovingkindness and in Thou art my Guide mercies. and my Defender, hold me fast by Thee, and let who will lift his hand against me. Thou wast made a Victim for me; my trust hath been in Thee, O Lord, therefore shall I not fall.

Thou art my Saviour and Redeemer, finish Thy work, and let not Thy labour be of none effect. Thou art the portion of mine inheritance, my portion in the land of the living, do Thou restore my heritage unto me. Thou art my glory, my crown, and my exceeding great reward ; admit Thou me to those good things which Thou hast prepared for them that love Thee. O Jesu. O most merciful Jesu, O Jesu, gracious Son of Mary, pour Thou into me grace, wisdom, love, purity, and humility, that I may be able perfectly to love Thee, to praise Thee, to enjoy Thee, to serve Thee, and to glory in Thee, now and for evermore. Amen.

How fair art Thou, my beloved One, dearly beloved and longed for, my Saviour Jesus Christ! How fair art Thou, how good and amiable! My only delight, my life, my joy, my chiefest pleasure, my God and my all! For Thee I sigh, on Thee I call, for Thee I pant. I embrace and love Thee with the whole inmost affection

of my heart; for Thou art God, and Very Goodness Itself, everlasting Love and Wisdom inexhaustible, infinite Power and absolute Perfection. What shall ever separate me from the love of Thee? Shall short-lived pleasure, uncertain riches, empty honours, vanity of vanities? Neither the one nor the other shall do so, O Good Jesus! for it is good for me to hold me fast by God, and to put my trust in the Lord God. Help me, gracious Jesu, in this my holy purpose: and suffer me never to forget my resolutions. Let Thy most holy Sacrament be to me a most efficacious remedy to heal the wounds of all my sins, and an abundant storehouse of all needful grace and strength. Let it be to me a most strong defence against all evils and dangers, and a most firm support in my endeavour after eternal blessedness. Thy Mercy's sake. Amen.

#### IV.

Behold, Lord, I now have Thee, Who hast all things, I possess Thee, Who possessest all things and canst do all things. Therefore, O my God and my All, do Thou wean my heart from all things beside Thee, for in them there is nothing but vanity and vexation of spirit. May my heart be fixed on Thee alone, may my rest be in Thee alone, for in Thee is my treasure, in Thee is the sovereign Truth, true happiness, and everlasting Life.

O Lord, let my soul feel the sweetness of Thy dear presence, that, allured by love of Thee, it may seek for nothing wherein to rejoice out of Thee, for Thou art the joy of my heart, the strength of my life, and my portion for ever.

Thou art the Physician of my soul, Who with thine own stripes hast healed my sickness. I am that sick soul, whom Thou camest from heaven to heal; heal my soul therefore, for I have sinned

against Thee.

Thou art the Good Shepherd, Who hast laid down Thy life for Thy sheep. Behold, I am that sheep that was lost, and yet Thou deignest to feed me with Thy Body and Blood. Lay me now upon Thy shoulders, gather me in Thine Arm, and carry me in What wilt Thou Thy Bosom. deny me, Who hast given Thyself unto me? O be Thou my Shepherd, and I shall lack nothing in the green pastures wherein Thou feedest me, until Thou bring me unto the pastures of eternal Life.

O Thou True Light, Which enlightenest every man that cometh into the world, lighten mine eyes,

that I sleep not in death.

O Fire continually burning and never failing, behold how lukewarm and cold I am; O do Thou inflame my heart, that it may ever be warmed with the love of Thee.

O King of Heaven and Earth, great in power and rich in pity, behold, I am poor and needy, Thou knowest what I most require, Thou alone art able to enrich and help me; Help me, O God, and out of the treasures of Thy Goodness succour Thou my needy soul.

O my Lord and my God, behold, I am Thy servant and the son of Thine handmaid; O give me understanding, and kindle my affection by the grace of Thy Spirit, Who is Comfort, Life, and Fire of Love, that I may know and do Thy Will.

Thou art the Lamb of God, the Lamb without blemish and without spot, That takest away the sins of the world, take away from me whatever hurteth and displeaseth Thee, and give me what

is pleasing unto Thee, and good for my soul. Thou art my love, and all my joy. Thou art my God and my All. Thou art the portion of mine inheritance and of my cup. Thou maintainest my lot.

O Jesu, my Saviour, my God, and my All, may the sweet and burning power of Thy love, I beseech Thee, absorb my soul, that I may die unto the world for the love of Thee, Who for love of me didst vouchsafe to die upon the Cross. For Thy tender mercy's sake. Amen.

Lord, I believe, but would believe more firmly. I hope, O Lord, but would hope more securely. O Lord, I love, but yet would love more warmly. I grieve, O Lord, but yet would grieve more deeply.

May my path to Thee, I pray, be safe, straightforward, and perfect to the end, failing not either amid prosperity or adversity, that I may not be elated in the one, nor depressed in the other. But may I in prosperity give thanks to Thee, and in adversity preserve my patience, rejoicing in nought save what advances me towards Thee, grieving for nought save what withdraws me from Thee; neither seeking to please, nor fearing to displease, any save only Thee.

Grant me to do all I do in charity, and to regard as dead all that belongeth not to the service of Thee.

Let all that is transitory be worthless in my eyes because of Thee, and all that is Thine dear and precious, and Thou, my God, more than all. Let all toil that is for Thee be delightful to me, and all rest irksome that is not in

Grant me, O sweetest Lord, frequently and with fervency to direct my heart to Thee, and sadly with full purpose of amendment to think over my shortcomings.

### - Morning Rendings.

Note.—The following short passages selected from the Holy Gospels may be read as part of our devotions for the First Hour, either after the Psalms, in the place of the 'Text' or 'Little Chapter,' p. 20, or after the Suffrages, p. 26; or at Fumily Prayers, before the short office of Prayer which follows at the end of the volume.

# First Morning. S. Matthew v.

And seeing the multitudes, Jesus went up into a mountain: and when He was set His disciples came unto Him: And He opened His mouth, and taught them, saying,

Blessed are the poor in spirit: for their's is the Kingdom of

Heaven.

Blessed are they that mourn: for they shall be comforted.

Blessed are the meek: for they shall inherit the earth.

Blessed are they which do hunger and thirst after righteousness: for they shall be filled.

Blessed are the merciful: for

they shall obtain mercy.

Blessed are the pure in heart: for they shall see God.

Blessed are the peace-makers: for they shall be called the children of God.

Blessed are they which are persecuted for righteousness' sake: for their's is the Kingdom of Heaven.

Blessed are ye, when men shall revile you, and persecute you, and shall say all manner of evil against you falsely, for My sake. Rejoice, and be exceeding glad: for great is your reward in Heaven: for so persecuted they

the prophets which were before you.

Ye are the salt of the earth: but if the salt have lost his savour, wherewith shall it be salted: it is thenceforth good for nothing, but to be cast out, and to be trodden under foot of men.

Ye are the light of the world. A city that is set on an hill cannot be hid. Neither do men light a candle, and put it under a bushel, but on a candlestick; and it giveth light unto all that are in the house. Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in Heaven.

#### Second Morning. S. Matthew v. 17.

Jesus said, Think not that I am come to destroy the law, or the prophets: I am not come to destroy, but to fulfil. For verily I say unto you, Till heaven and earth pass, one jot or one tittle shall in no wise pass from the law till all be fulfilled.

Whosover therefore shall break one of these least commandments, and shall teach men so, he shall be called the least in the Kingdom of Heaven: but whosover shall do and teach them, the same shall be called great in the Kingdom of Heaven.

For I say unto you, That except your righteousness shall exceed the righteousness of the Scribes and Pharisees, ye shall in no case enter into the Kingdom of Heaven.

Ye have heard that it was said by them of old time, Thou shalt not kill; and whosoever shall kill shall be in danger of the judgment.

But I say unto you, That whosoever is angry with his brother without a cause shall be in danger of the judgment: and whosoever shall say to his brother, Raca, shall be in danger of the council: but whosoever shall say, Thou fool, shall be in danger of hell fire.

Therefore if thou bring thy gift to the altar, and there rememberest that thy brother hath ought against thee; Leave there thy gift before the altar, and go thy way; first be reconciled to thy brother, and then come and offer thy gift.

Agree with thine adversary quickly, whiles thou art in the way with him; lest at any time the adversary deliver thee to the judge, and the judge deliver thee to the officer, and thou be cast into prison. Verily I say unto thee, Thou shalt by no means come out thence, till thou hast paid the uttermost farthing.

Ye have heard that it was said by them of old time, Thou shalt not commit adultery:

But I say unto you, That whosoever looketh on a woman to lust after her hath committed adultery with her already in his heart.

And if thy right eye offend thee, pluck it out and cast it from thee: for it is profitable for thee that one of thy members should perish, and not that thy whole body should be cast into hell.

And if thy right hand offend thee, cut it off, and cast it from thee: for it is profitable for thee that one of thy members should perish, and not that thy whole body should be cast into hell.

### · Third Morning. S. Matthew v. 31.

Jesus said, It hath been said, Whosoever shall put away his wife, let him give her a writing of divorcement: But I say unto you, That whosoever shall put away his wife, saving for the cause of fornication, causeth her to commit adultery: and whosoever shall marry her that is divorced committeth adultery.

Again, ye have heard that it hath been said by them of old time, Thou shalt not forswear thyself, but shalt perform unto the Lord thine oaths:

But I say unto you, Swear not at all; neither by heaven; for it is God's throne: Nor by the earth: for it is His footstool: neither by Jerusalem for it is the city of the great King. Neither shalt thou swear by thy head, because thou canst not make one hair white or black. your communication be Yea, yea; nay, nay: for whatsoever is more than these cometh of evil.

Ye have heard that it hath been said, An eye for an eye, and a tooth for a tooth:

But I say unto you, that ye resist not evil: but whosoever shall smite thee on thy right cheek, turn to him the other also. And if any man will sue thee at the law, and take away thy coat, let him have thy cloke also. And whosoever shall compel thee to go a mile, go with him twain. Give to him that asketh thee, and from him that would borrow of thee turn not thou away.

Ye have heard that it hath been said, Thou shalt love thy neighbour, and hate thine enemy.

But I say unto you, Love your enemies, bless them that curse you, do good to them that hate you, and pray for them which despitefully use you, and persecute you; That ye may be the children of your Father which is in Heaven: for He maketh His sun to rise on the evil and on the good, and sendeth rain on the just and on the unjust.

For if ye love them which love you, what reward have ye? do not even the publicans the same? And if ye salute your brethren only, what do ye more than others? do not even the publicans so?

Be ye therefore perfect, even as your Father which is in Heaven is

perfect.

## Fourth Morning.

Jesus said, Take heed that ye do not your alms before men, to be seen of them: otherwise ye have no reward of your Father which is in Heaven.

Therefore when thou doest thine alms, do not sound a trumpet before thee, as the hypocrites do in the synagogues and in the streets, that they may have glory of men. Verily I say unto you, they have their reward. But when thou doest alms, let not thy left hand know what thy right hand doeth: That thine alms may be in secret: and thy Father Which seeth in secret Himself shall reward thee openly.

And when thou prayest, thou shalt not be as the hypocrites are: for they love to pray standing in the synagogues and in the corners of the streets, that they may be seen of men. Verily I say unto you, they have their reward.

But thou, when thou prayest, enter into thy closet, and when thou hast shut thy door, pray to thy Father Which is in secret; and thy Father Which seeth in secret shall reward thee openly.

But when ye pray, use not vain repetitions, as the heathen do: for they think that they shall be heard for their much speaking. Be not ye therefore like unto them: for your Father knoweth what things ye have need of, before ye ask Him. After this manner therefore pray ye:

Our Father Which art in heaven, Hallowed be Thy Name. Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done in earth, as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil: for Thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever. Amen.

For if ye forgive men their trespasses, your heavenly Father will also forgive you: But if ye forgive not men their trespasses, neither will your Father forgive

your trespasses.

Moreover when ye fast, be not, as the hypocrites, of a sad countenance: for they disfigure their faces, that they may appear unto men to fast. Verily I say unto you, they have their reward. But thou, when thou fastest, anoint thine head, and wash thy face; That thou appear not unto men to fast, but unto thy Father Which is in secret: and thy Father, Which seeth in secret, shall reward thee openly.

#### Fifth Morning. S. Matthew vi. 19.

Jesus said, Lay not up for yourselves treasures upon earth, where
moth and rust doth corrupt, and
where thieves break through and
steal. But lay up for yourselves
treasures in Heaven, where neither
moth nor rust doth corrupt, and
where thieves do not break through
nor steal: For where your treasure is, there will your heart be
also.

The light of the body is the eye: if therefore thine eye be single, thy whole body shall be full of light. But if thine eye be evil, thy whole body shall be full of darkness. If therefore the

light that is in thee be darkness, how great is that darkness!

No man can serve two masters: for either he will hate the one, and love the other; or else he will hold to the one, and despise the other. Ye cannot serve God and mammon.

Therefore I say unto you, Take no thought for your lite, what ye shall eat, or what ye shall drink; nor yet for your body, what ye shall put on. Is not the life more than meat, and the body than raiment?

Behold the fowls of the air: for they sow not, neither do they reap, nor gather into barns; yet your heavenly Father feedeth them. Are ye not much better

than they?

Which of you by taking thought can add one cubit unto his stature? And why take ye thought for raiment? Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow; they toil not, neither do they spin: And yet I say unto you, That even Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these. Wherefore, if God so clothe the grass of the field, which to day is, and to morrow is cast into the oven, shall He not much more clothe you, O ye of little faith?

Therefore take no thought, saying, What shall we eat, or, What shall we drink? or, Wherewithal shall we be clothed? (For after all these things do the Gentiles seek:) for your heavenly Father knoweth that ye have need of all these things. But seek ye first the Kingdom of God, and His righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you.

Take therefore no thought for the morrow: for the morrow shall take thought for the things of itself. Sufficient unto the day is the evil thereof.

## Sixth Morning. 8. Matthew vii.

Jesus said, Judge not, that ye be not judged. For with what judgement ye judge, ye shall be judged: and with what measure ye mete, it shall be measured to

you again.

And why beholdest thou the mote that is in thy brother's eye, but considerest not the beam that is in thine own eye? Or how wilt thou say to thy brother, Let me pull out the mote out of thine eye; and, behold, a beam is in thine own eye? Thou hypocrite, first cast out the beam out of thine own eye; and then shalt thou see clearly to cast out the mote out of thy brother's eye.

Give not that which is holy unto the dogs, neither cast ye your pearls before swine, lest they trample them under their feet, and turn again and rend

vou.

Ask, and it shall be given you; seek, and ye shall find; knock, and it shall be opened unto you: For every one that asketh receiveth; and to him that knocketh it shall be opened.

Or what man is there of you, whom if his son ask bread, will he give him a stone? or if he ask a fish will he give him a serpent? If ye then, being evil, know how to give good gifts unto your children, how much more shall your Father Which is in Heaven give good things to them that ask Him.

Therefore all things whatsoever ye would that men should do to you, do ye even so to them: for this is the law and the prophets.

Enter ye in at the strait gate: for wide is the gate, and broad is the way, that leadeth to destruction, and many there be which go in thereat: Because strait is the gate, and narrow is the way,

which leadeth unto life, and few there be that find it.

### Sebenth Morning.

S. Matthew vii. 15.

Jesus said, Beware of false prophets, which come to you in sheep's clothing, but inwardly they are ravening wolves.

Ye shall know them by their fruits. Do men gather grapes of thorns, or figs of thistles? Even so every good tree bringeth forth good fruit: but a corrupt tree bringeth forth evil fruit. A good tree cannot bring forth evil fruit, neither can a corrupt tree bring forth good fruit. Every tree that bringeth not forth good fruit is hewn down, and cast into the fre. Wherefore by their fruits ye shall know them.

Not every one that saith unto Me, Lord, Lord, shall enter into the Kingdom of Heaven; but he that doeth the will of My Father Which is in Heaven.

Many will say to Me in that day, Lord, Lord, have we not prophesied in Thy Name? And in Thy Name have cast out devils? And in Thy Name done many wonderful works? And then will I profess unto them, I never knew you: depart from Me, ye that work iniquity.

Therefore whosoever heareth these sayings of Mine, and doeth them, I will liken him unto a wise man, which built his house upon a rock: And the rain descended, and the floods came, and the winds blew, and beat upon that house; and it fell not: for it was founded upon a rock.

And every one that heareth these sayings of Mine, and doeth them not, shall be likened unto a foolish man, which built his house upon the sand. And the rain descended, and the floods came, and the winds blew, and

beat upon that house; and it fell: and great was the fall of it.

And it came to pass, when Jesus had ended these sayings, the people were astonished at His doctrine: For He taught them as one having authority, and not as the scribes.

#### Eighth Morning. 8. Matthew x. 28.

Jesus said to His disciples, Fear not them which kill the body, but are not able to kill the soul: but rather fear Him Which is able to destroy both soul and body in hell.

Are not two sparrows sold for a farthing? and one of them shall not fall on the ground without your Father. But the very hairs of your head are all numbered. Fear ye not therefore, ye are of more value than many sparrows.

Whosoever therefore shall confess Me before men, him will I confess also before My Father Which is in Heaven. But whosoever shall deny Me before men, him will I also deny before My Father Which is in Heaven.

Think not that I am come to send peace on earth: I came not to send peace, but a sword. For I am come to set a man at variance against his father, and the daughter against her mother, and the daughter in law against her mother in law. And a man's foes shall be they of his own household.

He that loveth father or mother more than Me is not worthy of Me: and he that loveth son or daughter more than Me is not worthy of Me. And he that taketh not his cross, and followeth after Me, is not worthy of Me.

He that findeth his life shall lose it: and he that loseth his life for My sake shall find it. And again we read in Saint Matthew xvi. 24.

Then said Jesus unto His disciples, If any man will come after Me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross, and follow Me.

For whosoever will save his life shall lose it; and whosoever will lose his life for My sake shall find it.

For what is a man profited, if he shall gain the whole world, and lose his own soul? or what shall a man give in exchange for his soul?

For the Son of man shall come in the glory of His Father with His Angels: and then He shall reward every man according to his works.

## Hinth Morning.

At the same time came the disciples unto Jesus, saying, Who is the greatest in the Kingdom of Heaven?

And Jesus called a little child unto Him, and set him in the midst of them, And said, Verily I say unto you, Except ye be converted, and become as little children, ye shall not enter into the Kingdom of Heaven. Whosoever therefore shall humble himself as this little child, the same is greatest in the Kingdom of Heaven. And whoso shall receive one such little child in My name receiveth Me. But whose shall offend one of these little ones which believe in Me, it were better for him that a millstone were hanged about his neck, and that he were drowned in the depth of the sea.

Woe unto the world because of offences! for it must needs be that offences come; but woe to that man by whom the offence cometh!

Wherefore if thy hand or thy foot offend thee, cut them off, and cast them from thee: it is

better for thee to enter into life halt or maimed, rather than having two hands or two feet to be cast into everlasting fire.

And if thine eye offend thee, pluck it out, and cast it from thee: it is better for thee to enter into life with one eye, rather than having two eyes to be cast into hell fire.

Take heed that ye despise not one of these little ones; for I say unto you, That in Heaven their Angels do always behold the Face of My Father Which is in Heaven. For the Son of man is come to

save that which was lost.

How think ye? if a man have an hundred sheep, and one of them be gone astray, doth he not leave the ninety and nine, and goeth into the mountains, and seeketh that which is gone astray? And if so be that he find it, verily I say unto you, he rejoiceth more of that sheep, than of the ninety and nine which went not astray. Even so it is not the will of your Father Which is in Heaven, that one of these little ones should perish.

#### Tenth Morning. 8. Matthew xviii. 15.

Jesus said to His disciples, Moreover, if thy brother shall trespass against thee, go and tell him his fault between thee and him alone: if he shall hear thee, thou hast gained thy brother.

But if he will not hear thee, then take with thee one or two more, that in the mouth of two or three witnesses every word may be established. And if he shall neglect to hear them tell it unto the church: but if he neglect to hear the church, let him be unto thee as an heathen man and a publican.

Verily I say unto you, Whatsoever ye shall bind on earth shall be bound in Heaven: and whatsoever ye shall loose on earth shall be loosed in Heaven.

Again I say unto you, That if two of you shall agree on earth as touching anything that they shall ask, it shall be done for them of My Father Which is in Heaven.

For where two or three are gathered together in My Name, there am I in the midst of them.

Then came Peter to Him, and said, Lord, how oft shall my brother sin against me, and I forgive him? till seven times?

Jesus saith unto him, I say not unto thee, Until seven times: but, Until seventy times seven.

Therefore is the Kingdom of Heaven likened unto a certain king, which would take account of his servants. And when he had begun to reckon, one was brought unto him, which owed him ten thousand talents. But forasmuch as he had not to pay, his lord commanded him to be sold, and his wife, and children, and all that he had, and payment to be made. The servant therefore fell down, and worshipped him, saying, Lord, have patience with me, and I will pay thee all. Then the lord of that servant was moved with compassion, and loosed him, and forgave him the But the same servant went out, and found one of his fellowservants, which owed him an hundred pence: and he laid hands on him, and took him by the throat, saying, Pay me that thou owest. And his fellowservant fell down at his feet, and besought him, saying, Have patience with me, and I will pay thee all. And he would not: but went and cast him into prison, till he should pay the debt. So when his fellowservants saw what was done, they were very sorry, and came and told unto their lord all that was done.

Then his lord, after that he had called him, said unto him, O thou wicked servant, I forgave thee all that debt, because thou desiredst me: Shouldest not thou also have had compassion on thy fellowservant, even as I had pity on thee? And his lord was wroth, and delivered him to the tormentors, till he should pay all that was due unto him.

So likewise shall My heavenly Father do also unto you, if ye from your hearts forgive not every one his brother their trespasses.

#### Elebenth Morning. S. Matthew xxiv. 36

Jesus said, Of that Day and Hour knoweth no man, no, not the Angels of Heaven, but My Father only.

But as the days of Noe were, so shall also the Coming of the Son of man be. For as in the days that were before the Flood they were eating and drinking, marrying and giving in marriage, until the day that Noe entered into the ark, And knew not until the flood came, and took them all away; so shall also the Coming of the Son of man be.

Then shall two be in the field; the one shall be taken, and the other left. Two women shall be grinding at the mill; the one shall be taken, and the other left.

Watch therefore: for ye know not what hour your Lord doth come.

But know this, that if the goodman of the house had known in what watch the thief would come, he would have watched, and would not have suffered his house to be broken up.

Therefore be ye also ready: for in such an hour as ye think not the Son of man cometh.

Who then is a faithful and wise servant, whom his lord hath

made ruler over his household, to give them meat in due season? Blessed is that servant, whom his lord when he cometh shall find so doing. Verily I say unto you, That he shall make him ruler

over all his goods.

But and if that evil servant shall say in his heart, My lord delayeth his coming; And shall begin to smite his fellowservants. and to eat and drink with the The lord of that serdrunken: vant shall come in a day when he looketh not for him, and in an hour that he is not aware of. And shall cut him asunder, and appoint him his portion with the hypocrites: there shall be weeping and gnashing of teeth.

### Twelfth Morning. S. Matthew xxv. 81.

Jesus said unto His disciples. When the Son of man shall come in His glory, and all the holy Angels with Him, then shall He sit upon the throne of His glory.

And before Him shall be gathered all nations: and He shall separate them one from another, as a shepherd divideth his sheep from the goats:

And He shall set the sheep on His right hand, but the goats on

the left.

Then shall the King say unto them on His right hand, Come, ye blessed of My Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world: For I was an hungred, and ye gave Me meat: I was thirsty, and ye gave Me drink: I was a stranger, and ye took Me in: Naked, and ye clothed Me: I was sick, and ye visited Me: I was in prison, and ye came unto

Then shall the righteous answer Him, saying, Lord, when saw we Thee an hungred, and fed Thee?

or thirsty, and gave Thee drink? When saw we Thee a stranger. and took Thee in? or naked; and clothed Thee? Or when saw we Thee sick or in prison, and came unto Thee?

And the King shall answer and say unto them, Verily I say unto you, Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these Mv brethren, ye have done it unto

Then shall He say also unto them on the left hand, Depart from Me, ye cursed, into everlasting fire, prepared for the devil and his angels: For I was an hungred, and ye gave Me no meat: I was thirsty, and ye gave Me no drink: I was a stranger, and ye took Me not in: naked, and ye clothed Me not : sick, and in prison, and ye visited Me not.

Then shall they also answer Him, saying, Lord, when saw we Thee an hungred, or athirst, or a stranger, or naked, or sick, or in prison, and did not minister

unto Thee?

Then shall He answer them, saying, Verily I say unto you, Inasmuch as ye did it not to one of the least of these, ye did it not to Me.

And these shall go away into everlasting punishment: but the righteous into life eternal.

### Thirteenth Morning. S. Mark xii. 28

And one of the scribes came, and having heard them reasoning together, and perceiving that He had answered them well, asked Him, Which is the first commandment of all?

And Jesus answered him, The first of all the commandments is, Hear, O Israel; The Lord our God is one Lord: And thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind, and with all thy strength: this is the first commandment. And the second is like, namely this, Thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself. There is none other commandment greater than these.

And the scribe said unto Him, Well, Master, Thou hast said the truth: for there is one God; and there is none other but He: And to love Him with all the heart, and with all the understanding, and with all the soul, and with all the strength, and to love his neighbour as himself, is more than all whole burnt offerings and sacrifices.

And when Jesus saw that he answered discreetly, He said unto him, Thou art not far from the kingdom of God. And no man after that durst ask Him any question.

#### Fourteenth Morning. S. Luke vi. 20.

And Jesus lifted up His eyes on His disciples, and said,

Blessed be ye poor: for yours is the kingdom of God.

Blessed are ye that hunger now: for ye shall be filled.

Blessed are ye that weep now:

for ye shall laugh.

Blessed are ye, when men shall hate you, and when they shall separate you from their company, and shall reproach you, and cast out your name as evil, for the Son of man's sake. Bejoice ye in that day, and leap for joy: for, behold, your reward is great in Heaven: for in the like manner did their fathers unto the Prophets.

But woe unto you that are rich! for ye have received your consolation.

Woe unto you that are full! for ye shall hunger.

Woe unto you that laugh now! for ye shall mourn and weep.

Woe unto you, when all men shall speak well of you! for so did their fathers to the false prophets.

But I say unto you which hear, Love your enemies, do good to them which hate you, Bless them that curse you, and pray for them which despitefully use you. And unto him that smiteth thee on the one cheek offer also the other; and him that taketh away thy cloke forbid not to take thy coat also. Give to every man that asketh of thee; and of him that taketh away thy goods ask them not again. And as ye would that men should do to you, do ye also to them likewise.

For if ye love them which love you, what thank have ye? for sinners also love those that love them. And if ye do good to them which do good to you, what thank have ye? for sinners also do even the same. And if ye lend to them of whom ye hope to receive, what thank have ye? for sinners also lend to sinners, to receive as much again.

But love ye your enemies, and do good, and lend, hoping for nothing again; and your reward shall be great, and ye shall be the children of the Highest: for He is kind unto the unthankful and to the evil.

Be ye therefore merciful, as your Father also is merciful.

### Fifteenth Morning. S. Luke vi. 37.

Jesus said to His disciples, Judge not, and ye shall not be judged: condemn not, and ye shall not be condemned: forgive, and ye shall be forgiven: Give, and it shall be given unto you; good measure, pressed down, and shaken together, and running over, shall men give into your bosom. For with the same measure that ye meet

withal it shall be measured to

you again.

And He spake a parable unto them, Can the blind lead the blind? shall they not both fall into the ditch?

The disciple is not above his master: but every one that is perfect shall be as his master.

And why beholdest thou the mote that is in thy brother's eye, but perceivest not the beam that is in thine own eye? Either how canst thou say to thy brother, Brother, let me pull out the mote that is in thine eye, when thou thyself beholdest not the beam that is in thine own eye? Thou hypocrite, cast out first the beam out of thine own eye, and then shalt thou see clearly to pull out the mote that is in thy brother's eye.

For a good tree bringeth not forth corrupt fruit; neither doth a corrupt tree bring forth good fruit. For every tree is known by his own fruit. For of thorns me do not gather figs, nor of a bramble bush gather they grapes.

A good man out of the good treasure of his heart bringeth forth that which is good; and an evil man out of the evil treasure of his heart bringeth forth that which is evil: for of the abundance of the heart his mouth speaketh.

And why call ye Me, Lord, Lord, and do not the things which

I say.

Whosoever cometh to Me, and heareth My sayings, and doeth them, I will shew you to whom he is like. He is like a man which built a house, and digged deep, and laid the foundation on a rock: and when the flood arose, the stream beat vehemently upon that house, and could not shake it: for it was founded upon a rock.

But he that heareth, and doeth

not, is like a man that without a foundation built an house upon the earth; against which the stream did beat vehemently, and immediately it fell; and the ruin of that house was great.

#### Sixteenth Morning. S. Luke xii. 15.

And Jesus said unto them, Take heed, and beware of covetcusness: for a man's life consisteth not in the abundance of the things which he possesseth.

And He spake a parable unto them, saying, The ground of a certain rich man brought forth plentifully. And he thought within himself, saying, What shall I do, because I have no room where to bestow my fruits? And he said, This will I do: I will pull down my barns, and build greater; and there will I bestow all my fruits and my goods. And I will say to my soul, Soul, thou hast much goods laid up for many years; take thine ease, eat, drink, and be merry. But God said unto him, Thou fool, this night thy soul shall be required of thee: then whose shall these things be, which thou hast provided?

So is he that layeth up treasure for himself, and is not rich toward God.

And He said unto His disciples, Therefore I say unto you, Take no thought for your life, what ye shall eat; neither for the body, what ye shall put on.

The life is more than meat, and the body is more than raiment.

Consider the ravens: for they neither sow nor reap; which neither have storehouse nor barn; and God feedeth them: how much more are ye better than the fowls;

And which of you with taking thought can add to his stature one cubit? If ye then be not able to do that thing which is least, why take ye thought for the rest?

Consider the lilies how they grow: they toil not, they spin not; and yet I say unto you, that Solomon in all his glory was not arrayed like one of these. If then God so clothe the grass, which is to day in the field, and to morrow is cast into the oven; how much more will He clothe you, O ye of little faith?

And seek not ye what ye shall eat, or what ye shall drink, neither be ye of doubtful mind. For all these things do the nations of the world seek after: and your Father knoweth that ye have need of these things. But rather seek ye the Kingdom of God; and all these things shall be added unto you.

Fear not, little flock; for it is your Father's good pleasure to

give you the Kingdom.

Sell that ye have, and give alms; provide yourselves bags which wax not old, a treasure in the Heavens that faileth not, where no thief approacheth, neither moth corrupteth. For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also.

Let your loins be girded about, and your lights burning; And ye yourselves like unto men that wait for their lord, when he will return from the wedding; that when he cometh and knocketh, they may open unto him immediately.

Blessed are those servants, whom the Lord when He cometh shall find watching: verily I say unto you, that He shall gird Himself, and make them to sit down to meat, and will come forth and serve them. And if He shall come in the second watch, or come in the third watch, and find them so, blessed are those servants.

And this know, that if the goodman of the house had known

what hour the thief would come, he would have watched, and not have suffered his house to be broken through.

Be ye therefore ready also: for the Son of man cometh at an hour when ye think not.

### Sebenteenth Morning.

Then said one unto Him, Lord, are there few that be saved? And He said unto them.

Strive to enter in at the strait gate: for many, I say unto you, will seek to enter in, and shall not be able.

When once the Master of the house is risen up, and hath shut to the door, and ye begin to stand without, and to knock at the door, saying, Lord, Lord, open unto us; and He shall answer and say unto you, I know you not whence ye are: Then shall ye begin to say, We have eaten and drunk in Thy presence, and Thou hast taught in our streets.

But He shall say, I tell you, I know you not whence ye are; depart from Me, all ye workers

of iniquity.

There shall be weeping and gnashing of teeth, when ye shall see Abraham, and Isaac, and Jacob, and all the prophets, in the Kingdom of God, and you yourselves thrust out.

And they shall come from the east, and from the west, and from the north, and from the south, and shall sit down in the Kingdom of God.

And, behold, there are last which shall be first, and there are first which shall be last.

#### Eighteenth Morning. S. Luke xiv. 25.

And there went great multitudes with Him: and He turned, and said unto them, If any man come to Me, and hate not his father, and mother, and wife, and children, and brethren, and sisters, yea, and his own life also, he cannot be My disciple.

And whosoever doth not bear his cross, and come after Me,

cannot be My disciple.

For which of you intending to build a tower, sitteth not down first, and counteth the cost, whether he have sufficient to finish it? Lest haply, after he hath laid the foundation, and is not able to finish it, all that behold it begin to mock him, saying, This man began to build, and was not able to finish.

Or what king, going to make war against another king, sitteth not down first, and consulteth whether he be able with ten thousand to meet him that cometh against him with twenty thousand? Or else, while the other is yet a great way off, he sendeth an ambassage, and desireth conditions of peace.

So likewise, whosoever he be of you that forsaketh not all that he hath, he cannot be My disciple.

#### Mineteenth Morning. S. Luke xv. 1.

Then drew near unto Jesus all the publicans and sinners for to hear Him. And the Pharisees and scribes murmured, saying, This man receiveth sinners, and eateth with them.

And He spake this parable unto them, saying, What man of you, having an hundred sheep, if he lose one of them, doth not leave the ninety and nine in the wilderness, and go after that which is lost until he find it? And when he hath found it, he layeth it on his shoulders, rejoicing. And when he cometh home, he calleth together his friends and

neighbours, saying unto them, Rejoice with me; for I have found my sheep which was lost.

I say unto you, that likewise joy shall be in Heaven over one sinner that repenteth, more than over ninety and nine just persons, which need no repentance.

Either what woman having ten pieces of silver, if she lose one piece, doth not light a candle, and sweep the house, and seek diligently till she find it? And when she hath found it, she calleth her friends and her neighbours together, saying, Rejoice with me; for I have found the piece which I had lost.

Likewise, I say unto you, there is joy in the presence of the Angels of God over one sinner

that repenteth.

And He said, A certain man had two sons. And the younger of them said to his father, Father, give me the portion of goods that falleth to me. And he divided unto them his living. And not many days after the younger son gathered all together, and took his journey into a far country, and there wasted his substance with riotous living. And when he had spent all, there arose a mighty famine in that land; and he began to be in want. And he went and joined himself to a citizen of that country; and he sent him into his fields to feed swine. And he would fain have filled his belly with the husks that the swine did eat: and no man gave unto him. And when he came to himself, he said, How many hired servants of my father's have bread enough and to spare, and I perish with hunger! I will arise and go to my father, and will say unto him, Father, I have sinned against Heaven and before thee, And am no more worthy to be called thy son: make me as one of thy hired servants.

And he arose and came to his father. But when he was yet a great way off, his father saw him, and had compassion, and ran, and fell on his neck, and kissed him.

And the son said unto him, Father, I have sinned against heaven, and in thy sight, and am no more worthy to be called thy son.

But the father said to his servants, Bring forth the best robe, and put it on him; and put a ring on his hand, and shoes on his feet: And bring hither the fatted calf, and kill it: and let us eat, and be merry: For this my son was dead, and is alive again; he was lost, and is found.

### Twentieth Morning. 8. Luke xviii. 18.

And a certain ruler asked Him, saying, Good Master, what shall I do to inherit eternal life?

And Jesus said unto him, Why callest thou Me good? none is good, save one, that is God.

Thou knowest the commandments, Do not commit adultery, Do not kill, Do not steal, Do not bear false witness. Honour thy father and thy mother.

And he said, All these have I

kept from my youth up.

Now when Jesus heard these things, He said unto him, Yet lackest thou one thing: sell all that thou hast, and distribute unto the poor, and thou shalt have treasure in Heaven: and come, follow Me.

And when he heard this, he was very sorrowful: for he was

very rich.

And when Jesus saw that he was very sorrowful, He said, How hardly shall they that have riches enter into the Kingdom of God! For it is easier for a camel to go through a needle's eye, than for

a rich man to enter into the Kingdom of God.

And they that heard it said, Who then can be saved?

And He said, The things which are impossible with men are possible with God.

Then Peter said, Lo, we have left all, and followed Thee.

And He said unto them, Verily I say unto you, There is no man that hath left house, or parents, or brethren, or wife, or children, for the Kingdom of God's sake, who shall not receive manifold more in this present time, and in the world to come Life Everlasting.

#### Twenty-first Morning. 8. John i. 1.

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God.

The Same was in the beginning with God.

All things were made by Him; and without Him was not any thing made that was made.

In Him was Life; and the Life was the Light of men.

And the Light shineth in darkness; and the darkness comprehended It not.

There was a man sent from God,

whose name was John.

The same came for a witness, to bear witness of the Light, that all men through him might believe.

He was not that Light, but was sent to bear witness of that

Light.

That was the true Light, Which lighteth every man that cometh into the world.

He was in the world, and the world was made by Him, and the world knew Him not.

He came unto His own, and His own received Him not.

But as many as received Him, to them gave He power to become the sons of God, even to them that believe on His Name: which were born, not of blood, nor of the will of the flesh, nor of the

will of man, but of God.

AND THE WORD WAS MADE FLESH, AND DWELT AMONG US, (and we beheld His glory, the glory as of the Only-Begotten of the Father,) full of grace and truth.

John bare witness of Him, and cried, saying, This was He of Whom I spake, He that cometh after me is preferred before me: for He was before me.

And of His fulness have all we received, and grace for grace.

For the law was given by Moses, but grace and truth came

by Jesus Christ.

No man hath seen God at any time; the Only-Begotten Son, Which is in the bosom of the Father, He hath declared Him.

#### Twenty-second Morning. S. John iii, 14.

Jesus said, As Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, even so must the Son of man be lifted up: that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have Eternal Life.

For God so loved the world, that He gave His Only-Begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have Everlasting Life.

For God sent not His Son into the world to condemn the world; but that the world through Him

might be saved.

He that believeth on Him is not condemned: but he that believeth not is condemned already, because he hath not believed in the Name of the Only-Begotten Son of God.

And this is the condemnation, that Light is come into the world, and men loved darkness rather

than Light, because their deeds were evil.

For every one that doeth evil hateth the light, neither cometh to the light, lest his deeds should be reproved.

But he that doeth truth cometh to the light, that his deeds may be made manifest, that they are wrought in God.

#### Twenty-third Morning. S. John vi. 26.

Jesus answered them, and said, Verily, Verily, I say unto you, Ye seek Me, not because ye saw the miracles, but because ye did eat of the loaves, and were filled.

Labour not for the mest which perisheth, but for that Meat Which endureth unto Everlasting Life, Which the Son of man shall give unto you: for Him hath God the Father sealed.

Then said they unto Him, What shall we do, that we might work the works of God?

Jesus answered and said unto them. This is the work of God. that ye believe on Him Whom He hath sent.

They said therefore unto Him, What sign shewest Thou then, that we may see, and believe Thee? what dost Thou work? Our fathers did eat manna in the desert; as it is written, He gave them bread from Heaven to eat.

Then Jesus said unto them, Verily, verily, I say unto you, Moses gave you not that bread from Heaven; but My Father giveth you the true Bread from Heaven. For the Bread of God is He Which cometh down from Heaven, and giveth Life unto the world.

Then said they unto Him, Lord, evermore give us this Bread.

And Jesus said unto them, I am the Bread of life: he that cometh to Me shall never hunger; and he that believeth on Me shall never thirst.

But I said unto you, That ye also have seen Me, and believe not.

All that the Father giveth Me shall come to Me; and him that cometh to me I will in no wise cast out.

For I came down from Heaven, not to do Mine own will, but the will of Him That sent Me.

And this is the Father's will Which hath sent Me, that of all which He hath given Me I should lose nothing, but should raise it up again at the last day.

And this is the will of Him That sent Me, That every one which seeth the Son, and believeth on Him, may have Everlasting Life: and I will raise him up at the last day.

#### Twenty-fourth Morning. 8. John vi. 41.

The Jews murmured at Jesus, because He said, I am the Bread Which came down from Heaven.

And they said, Is not this Jesus, the son of Joseph, whose father and mother we know? how is it then that he saith, I came down from Heaven?

Jesus therefore answered and said unto them, Murmur not among yourselves.

No man can come to Me, except the Father Which hath sent Me draw him: and I will raise him up at the last day.

It is written in the prophets, And they shall be all taught of God. Every man therefore that hath heard, and hath learned of the Father, cometh unto Me.

Not that any man hath seen the Father, save He Which is of God, He hath seen the Father.

Verily, verily, I say unto you, He that believeth on Me hath Everlasting Life. I am that Bread of Life.

Your fathers did eat manna in the wilderness, and are dead. This is the Bread Which cometh down from Heaven, that a man may eat thereof, and not die.

I am the Living Bread Which came down from Heaven: if any man eat of this Bread, he shall live for ever: and the Bread That I will give is My Flesh, Which I will give for the life of the world.

The Jews therefore strove among themselves, saying, How can this man give us his flesh to eat?

Then Jesus said unto them, Verily, verily, I say unto you, Except ye eat the Flesh of the Son of man, and drink His Blood, ye have no life in you.

Whoso eateth My Flesh, and drinketh My Blood, hath Eternal Life; and I will raise him up at the last day.

For My Flesh is Meat indeed, and My Blood is Drink indeed.

He that eateth My Flesh, and drinketh My Blood, dwelleth in Me, and I in him.

As the Living Father hath sent Me, and I live by the Father: so he that eateth Me, even he shall live by Me.

This is that Bread Which came down from Heaven: not as your fathers did eat manna, and are dead: he that eateth of this Bread shall live for ever.

These things said He in the synagogue, as He taught in Capernaum.

Many therefore of His disciples, when they had heard this, said, This is an hard saying; who can hear it?

When Jesus knew in Himself that His disciples murmured at it, He said unto them, Doth this, offend you? What and if ye shall see the Son of man ascend up where He was before? It is P 3

the Spirit that quickeneth; the Flesh profiteth nothing: the words that I speak unto you, they are Spirit, and they are Life.

#### Twenty-fifth Morning. 8. John x. 1.

Jesus said, Verily, verily, I say unto you, He that entereth not by the door into the sheepfold, but climbeth up some other way, the same is a thief and a robber. But he that entereth in by the door is the sheepherd of the sheep.

To him the porter openeth; and the sheep hear his voice: and he calleth his own sheep by name, and leadeth them out. And when he putteth forth his own sheep, he goeth before them, and the sheep follow him: for they know his voice. And a stranger will they not follow, but will flee from him: for they know not the voice of strangers.

This parable spake Jesus unto them: but they understood not what things they were which He

spake unto them.

Then said Jesus unto them

again,

Verily, verily, I say unto you, I am the door of the sheep. All that ever came before Me are thieves and robbers: but the sheep did not hear them.

I am the door: by Me if any man enter in, he shall be saved, and shall go in and out, and find

pasture.

The thief cometh not, but for to steal, and to kill, and to destroy: I am come that they might have Life, and that they might have it more abundantly.

I am the Good Shepherd: the Good Shepherd giveth His life for the sheep. But he that is an hireling, and not the Shepherd, whose own the sheep are not, seeth the wolf coming, and leaveth the sheep, and fleeth: and the

wolf catcheth them, and scattereth the sheep. The hireling fleoth, because he is an hireling, and careth not for the sheep.

I am the Good Shepherd, and know My sheep, and am known

of Mine.

As the Father knoweth Me, even so know I the Father: and I lay down My life for the sheep. And other sheep I have, which are not of this fold: them also I must bring, and they shall hear My voice; and there shall be One Fold and One Shepherd.

Therefore doth My Father love Me, because I lay down My life, that I might take it again. No man taketh it from Me, but I lay it down of Myself. I have power to lay it down, and I have power to take it again. This commandment have I received of My Father.

#### Twenty-sixth Morning. 8. John xiv. 1.

Jesus said to His disciples, Let not your heart be troubled: ye believe in God, believe also in Me.

In My Father's House are many mansions: if it were not so, I would have told you. I go to prepare a place for you. And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again, and receive you unto Myself; that where I am, there ye may be also. And whither I go ye know, and the way ye know.

Thomas saith unto Him, Lord, we know not whither Thou goest; and how can we know the way?

Jesus saith unto him,

I am the Way, the Truth, and the Life: no man cometh unto the Father, but by Me. If ye had known Me, ye should have known My Father also: and from henceforth ye know Him, and have seen Him.

Philip said unto Him, Lord,

shew us the Father, and it suffi-

Jesus saith unto him, Have I been so long time with you, and yet hast thou not known Me, Philip? he that hath seen Me hath seen the Father; and how sayest thou then, Shew us the Father? Believest thou not that I am in the Father, and the Father in Me? the words that I speak unto you I speak not of Myself: but the Father that dwelleth in Me, He doeth the works. Believe Me that I am in the Father and the Father in Me: or else believe Me for the very work's sake.

Verily, verily, I say unto you, He that believeth on Me, the works that I do shall he do also; and greater works than these shall he do; because I go unto My Father.

And whatsoever ye shall ask in My Name, that will I do, that the Father may be glorified in the Son. If ye shall ask anything in My Name I will do it.

#### Twenty-sebenth Morning. S. John xiv. 14.

Jesus said to His disciples, If ye love Me, keep My commandments. And I will pray the Father, and He shall give you another Comforter, that He may abide with you for ever; Even the Spirit of truth; Whom the world cannot receive, because it seeth Him not, neither knoweth Him: but ye know Him; for He dwelleth with you, and shall be in you.

I will not leave you comfortless: I will come to you.

Yet a little while, and the world seeth Me no more; but ye see Me: because I live, ye shall live also

At that day ye shall know that I am in My Father, and ye in Me, and I in you.

He that hath My commandments, and keepeth them, he it is that loveth Me: and he that loveth Me shall be loved of My Father, and I will love him, and will manifest Myself to him.

Judas saith unto Him, not Iscariot, Lord, how is it that Thou wilt manifest Thyself unto us, and not unto the world.

Jesus answered and said unto him,

If a man love Me, he will keep My words: And My Father will love him, and We will come unto him, and make our abode with him.

He that loveth Me not keepeth not My sayings: and the word which ye hear is not Mine, but the Father's Which sent Me.

These things have I spoken unto you, being yet present with you. But the Comforter, which is the Holy Ghost, Whom the Father will send in My Name, He shall teach you all things, and bring all things to your remembrance, whatsoever I have said unto you.

Peace I leave with you, My peace I give unto you: not as the world giveth, give I unto you. Let not your heart be troubled, neither let it be afraid.

Ye have heard how I said unto you, I go away, and come again unto you. If ye loved Me, ye would rejoice, because I said I go unto the Father: for My Father is greater than I.

And now I have told you before it come to pass, that when it is come to pass, ye might believe.

Hereafter I will not talk much with you: for the prince of this world cometh, and hath nothing in Me.

But that the world may know that I love the Father; and as the Father gave Me commandment, even so I do. Arise, let us go hence.

#### Twenty-eighth Morning. 8. John xv. 1.

Jesus said to His disciples, I am the true vine, and My Father is the husbandman.

Every branch in Me that beareth not fruit He taketh away: and every branch that beareth fruit He purgeth it, that it may bring forth more fruit.

Now ye are clean through the word which I have spoken unto

you.

Abide in Me, and I in you. As the branch cannot bear fruit of itself, except it abide in the vine; no more can ye, except ye abide in Me.

I am the vine, ye are the branches: He that abideth in Me, and I in him, the same bringeth forth much fruit: for without Me ye can do nothing.

If a man abide not in Me, he is cast forth as a branch, and is withered; and men gather them and cast them into the fire, and they are burned.

If ye abide in Me, and My words abide in you, ye shall ask what ye will, and it shall be done unto you.

Herein is My Father glorified, that ye bear much fruit; so shall ye be My disciples.

As the Father hath loved Me, so have I loved you: continue ye

in My love.

If ye keep My commandments, ye shall abide in My love; even as I have kept My Father's commandments, and abide in His love.

These things have I spoken unto you, that My joy might remain in you, and that your joy might be full.

This is My commandment, That ye love one another, as I have loved you.

Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends. Ye are My friends, if ye do whatsoever I command you.

Henceforth I call you not servants; for the servant knoweth not what his lord doeth: but I have called you friends; for all things that I have heard of My Father I have made known unto you.

Ye have not chosen Me, but I have chosen you, and ordained you, that ye should go and bring forth fruit, and that your fruit should remain: that whatsoever ye shall ask the Father in My Name He may give it you.

These things I command you,

that ye love one another.

## Twenty-ninth Morning. S. John xvi. 1.

Jesus said to His disciples, These things have I spoken unto you, that ye should not be offended.

They shall put you out of the synagogues: yea, the time cometh that whosoever killeth you will think that he doeth God service.

And these things will they do unto you, because they have not known the Father, nor Me.

But these things have I told you, that when the time shall come, ye may remember that I told you of them. And these things I said not unto you at the beginning, because I was with you.

But now I go My way to Him that sent Me; and none of you asketh Me, Whither goest Thou? But because I have said these things unto you, sorrow hath filled your heart.

Nevertheless I tell you the truth: It is expedient for you that I go away: for if I go not away the Comforter will not come unto you, but if I depart I will send Him unto you.

And when He is come, He will reprove the world of sin, and of righteousness, and of judgment: Of sin, because they believe not on Me; Ofrighteousness, because I go to My Father, and ye see Me no more; Of judgment, because the prince of this world is judged.

I have yet many things to say unto you, but ye cannot bear

them now.

Howbeit when He, the Spirit of truth, is come, He will guide you into all truth: for He shall not speak of Himself; but whatsoever He shall hear that shall He speak: and He will shew you things to come.

He shall glorify Me: for He shall receive of Mine and shall

shew it unto you.

#### Thirtieth Morning. S. John xvi. 16.

Jesus said, A little while, and ye shall not see Me: and again, a little while, and ye shall see Me, because I go to the Father.

Then said some of His disciples among themselves, What is this that He saith unto us, A little while and ye shall not see Me: and again, a little while, and ye shall see Me: and, Because I go to the Father? They said therefore, What is this that He saith, A little while? We cannot tell what He saith.

Now Jesus knew that they were desirous to ask Him, and said unto them, Do ye enquire among yourselves of that I said, A little while, and ye shall not see Me: and again, a little while, and ye shall see Me? Verily, verily, I say unto you, That ye shall weep and lament, but the world shall rejoice: and ye shall be sorrowful, but your sorrow shall be turned into joy. A woman when she is in travail hath sorrow, because her hour is come: but as soon as she is delivered of

the child, she remembereth no more the anguish, for joy that a man is born into the world. And ye now therefore have sorrow; but I will see you again, and your heart shall rejoice, and your joy no man taketh from you.

And in that day ye shall ask Me nothing. Verily, verily I say unto you, Whatsoever ye shall ask the Father in My Name, He will give it you. Hitherto have ye asked nothing in My Name: ask, and ye shall receive, that your joy

may be full.

These things have I spoken unto you in proverbs: the time cometh when I shall no more speak unto you in proverbs: but I shall shew you plainly of the Father.

At that day ye shall ask in My Name: and I say not unto you, that I will pray the Father for you; for the Father Himself loveth you, because ye have loved Me, and have believed that I came out from God. I came forth from the Father, and am come into the world: again I leave the world, and go to the Father.

His disciples said unto Him, Lo, now speakest Thou plainly, and speakest no proverb. Now are we sure that Thou knowest all things, and needest not that any man should ask Thee: by this we believe that Thou camest forth from God.

Jesus answered them, Do ye now believe? Behold, the hour cometh, yea, is now come, that ye shall be scattered every man to his own, and shall leave Me alone: and yet I am not alone, because the Father is with Me.

These things I have spoken unto you, that in Me ye might have peace. In the world ye shall have tribulation; but be of good cheer, I have overcome the world,

## Thirty-first Morning. 8. John xvii.

These words spake Jesus, and lifted up His eyes unto Heaven, and said,

Father, the hour is come; glorify Thy Son, that Thy Son also may glorify Thee:

As Thou hast given Him power over all flesh, that He should give Eternal Life to as many as Thou hast given Him.

And this is Life Eternal, that they might know Thee the only true God, and Jesus Christ, Whom Thou hast sent.

I have glorified Thee on the earth: I have finished the work which Thou gavest Me to do.

And now, O Father, glorify Thou Me with Thine Own Self with the glory which I had with Thee before the world was.

I have manifested Thy Name unto the men which Thou gavest Me out of the world: Thine they were, and Thou gavest them Me; and they have kept Thy word.

Now they have known that all things whatsoever Thou hast given Me are of Thee.

For I have given unto them the words which Thou gavest Me; and they have received them, and have known surely that I came out from Thee, and they have believed that Thou didst send Me.

I pray for them: I pray not for the world, but for them which Thou hast given Me; for they are Thine: And all Mine are Thine, and Thine are Mine; and I am glorified in them.

And now I am no more in the world, but these are in the world, and I come to Thee. Holy Father, keep through Thine own Name those whom Thou hast given Me, that they may be one, as We are.

While I was with them in the

world, I kept them in Thy Name: those that Thou gavest me I have kept, and none of them is lost, but the son of perdition; that the Scripture might be fulfilled.

And now come I to Thee; and these things I speak in the world,

that they might have My joy fulfilled in themselves. I have given them Thy word;

and the world hath hated them, because they are not of the world, even as I am not of the world.

I pray not that Thou shouldest take them out of the world, but that Thou shouldest keep them from the evil.

They are not of the world, even as I am not of the world.

Sanctify them through Thy truth: Thy word is truth.

As Thou hast sent Me into the world, even so have I also sent them into the world.

And for their sakes I sanctify Myself, that they also might be sanctified through the truth.

Neither pray I for these alone, but for them also which shall believe on Me through their word.

That they all may be one; as Thou, Father, art in Me, and I in Thee, that they also may be one in Us: that the world may believe that Thou hast sent Me.

And the glory which Thou gavest Me I have given them; that they may be one, even as We are One.

I in them, and Thou in Me, that they may be made perfect in one; and that the world may know that Thou hast sent Me, and hast loved them, as Thou hast loved Me.

Father, I will that they also, whom Thou hast given Me, be with Me where I am; that they may behold My glory, which Thou hast given Me: for Thou lovedst Me before the foundation of the world.

O righteous Father, the world

hath not known Thee: but I have known Thee, and these have that the love wherewith Thou known that Thou hast sent Me.

And I have declared unto them

And I in them.

### Sbening Rendings.

Note.—The following passages selected from the Epistles may be read as part of our last devotions at night, as directed on page 45; or at Family Prayers before the short Evening Office of Household Devotion which follows.

### First Chening. Romans vi. 2.

How shall we, that are dead to sin, live any longer therein?

Know ye not, that so many of us as were baptized into Jesus Christ were baptized into His death? Therefore we are buried with Him by Baptism into death: that like as Christ was raised up from the dead by the glory of the Father, even so we also should walk in newness of life.

For if we have been planted together in the likeness of His death, we shall be also in the likeness of His resurrection: Knowing this, that our old man is crucified with Him, that the body of sin mlght be destroyed, that henceforth we should not serve sin. For he that is dead is freed from sin.

Now if we be dead with Christ, we believe that we shall also live with Him: Knowing that Christ being raised from the dead dieth no more; death hath no more dominion over Him. For in that He died, He died unto sin once: but in that He liveth, He liveth unto God.

Likewise reckon ye also yourselves to be dead indeed unto sin, but alive unto God through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Let not sin therefore reign in your mortal body, that ye should obey it in the lusts thereof. Neither yield ye your members as instruments of unrighteousness unto sin: but yield yourselves unto God, as those that are alive from the dead, and your members as instruments of righteousness unto God. For sin shall not have dominion over you: for ye are not under the law, but under grace.

### Second Chening.

I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service. And be not conformed to this world: but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind, that ye may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect, will of God.

For I say, through the grace given unto me, to every man that is among you, not to think of himself more highly than he ought to think; but to think soberly, according as God hath dealt to every man the measure of faith.

For as we have many members in one body, and all members have not the same office: So we, being many, are One Body in Christ, and every one members one of another.

Having then gifts differing according to the grace that is given to us, whether prophecy, let us prophesy according to the proportion of faith; Or ministry, let us wait on our ministering: or he that teacheth, on teaching; Or

he that exhorteth, on exhortation: he that giveth, let him do it with simplicity; he that ruleth, with diligence; he that sheweth mercy, with cheerfulness.

Let love be without dissimula-Abhor that which is evil: cleave to that which is good. kindly affectioned one to another with brotherly love; in honour preferring one another; slothful in business; fervent in spirit; serving the Lord; Rejoicing in hope; patient in tribulation; continuing instant in prayer; Distributing to the necessity of saints; given to hospitality.

Bless them which persecute you: bless, and curse not. Rejoice with them that do rejoice, and weep with them that weep. Be of the same mind one toward another. Mind not high things, but condescend to men of low estate. Be not wise in your own conceits. Recompense to no man evil for evil. Provide things honest in the sight of all men.

If it be possible, as much as lieth in you, live peaceably with

all men.

Dearly beloved, avenge not yourselves, but rather give place unto wrath; for it is written, Vengeance is mine; I will repay, Therefore if saith the Lord. thine enemy hunger, feed him; if he thirst, give him drink : for in so doing thou shalt heap coals of fire on his head. Be not overcome of evil, but overcome evil with good.

#### Third Ebening. Romans xiii.

Let every soul be subject unto the higher powers. For there is no power but of God: the powers that be are ordained of God. Whosoever therefore resisteth the power, resisteth the ordinance of God: and they that resist shall receive to themselves damnation.

For rulers are not a terror to good works, but to the evil. Wilt thou then not be afraid of the power? do that which is good, and thou shalt have praise of the same: For he is the minister of God to thee for good. But if thou do that which is evil. be afraid; for he beareth not the sword in vain: for he is the minister of God, a revenger to execute wrath upon him that doeth evil. Wherefore ye must needs be subject, not only for wrath, but also for conscience sake. for this cause pay ye tribute also: for they are God's ministers, attending continually upon this very thing.

Render therefore to all their dues: tribute to whom tribute is due: custom to whom custom: fear to whom fear; honour to

whom honour.

Owe no man anything, but to love one another: for he that loveth another hath fulfilled the law. For this, Thou shalt not commit adultery, Thou shalt not kill, Thou shalt not steal, Thou shalt not bear false witness, Thou shalt not covet; and if there be any other commandment, it is briefly comprehended in this saying, namely, Thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself. worketh no ill to his neighbour: therefore love is the fulfilling of the law.

And that, knowing the time, that now it is high time to awake out of sleep: for now is our salvation nearer than when we believed.

The night is far spent, the day is at hand: let us therefore cast off the works of darkness, and let us put on the armour of light. Let us walk honestly, as in the day; not in rioting and drunkenness, not in chambering and wantonness, not in strife and envying.

But put ye on the Lord Jesus

Christ, and make not provision for the flesh, to fulfil the lusts thereof.

#### Fourth Cbening. 1 Corinthians vi. 9.

Know ye not that the unrighteous shall not inherit the Kingdom of God? Be not deceived: neither fornicators, nor idolaters, nor adulterers, nor effeminate, abusers of themselves with mankind, nor thieves, nor covetous. nor drunkards, nor revilers, nor extortioners, shall inherit the kingdom of God. And such were some of you: but ye are washed, but ye are sanctified, but ye are justified, in the name of the Lord Jesus, and by the Spirit of our God.

All things are lawful unto me. but all things are not expedient: all things are lawful for me, but I will not be brought under the power of any. Meats for the belly, and the belly for meats: but God shall destroy both it and them.

Now the body is not for fornication, but for the Lord; and the Lord for the body. And God hath both raised up the Lord, and will also raise up us by His own power.

Know ye not that your bodies are the members of Christ? shall I then take the members of Christ, and make them the members of an harlot? God forbid. What? know ye not that he which is joined to an harlot is one body? for two, saith he, shall be one flesh. But he that is joined unto the Lord is one spirit.

Flee fornication. Every sin that a man doeth is without the body; but he that committeth fornication sinneth against his own body. What? know ye not that your body is the temple of the Holy Ghost which is in you. which ye have of God, and ye are not your own? For ye are bought with a price: therefore glorify God in your body, and in your spirit, which are God's.

#### fifth Ebening. 1 Corinthians xiii.

Though I speak with tongues of men and of Angels, and have not charity, I am become as sounding brass, or a tinkling cymbal. And though I have the gift of prophecy, and understand all mysteries, and all knowledge; and though I have all faith, so that I could remove mountains, and have not charity, I am nothing. And though I bestow all my goods to feed the poor, and though I give my body to be burned, and have not charity, it profiteth me nothing.

Charity suffereth long, and is kind; charity envieth not; charity vaunteth not itself, is not puffed up, doth not behave itself unseemly, seeketh not her own, is not easily provoked, thinketh no evil; rejoiceth not in iniquity, but rejoiceth in the truth; beareth all things, believeth all things, hopeth all things, endureth all

things.

Charity never faileth: but whether there be prophecies, they shall fail; whether there be tongues, they shall cease; whether there be knowledge, it shall vanish away.

For we know in part, and we prophesy in part. But when that which is perfect is come, then that which is in part shall be done away. When I was a child, I spake as a child, I understood as a child, I thought as a child: but when I became a man, I put away childish things. For now we see through a glass, darkly; but then face to face: now I know in part; but then shall I know even as also I am known.

And now abideth Faith, Hope, Charity, these three; but the greatest of these is Charity.

## Sixth Chening. 1 Corinthians xv. 89.

But some man will say, how are the dead raised up? and with what body do they come?

Thou fool, that which thou sowest is not quickened, except it die: And that which thou sowest, thou sowest not that body that shall be, but bare grain, it may chance of wheat, or of some other grain: but God giveth it a body as it hath pleased Him, and to every seed his own body.

All flesh is not the same flesh: but there is one kind of flesh of men, another flesh of beasts, another of fishes, and another of birds. There are also celestial bodies, and bodies terrestrial; but the glory of the celestial is one, and the glory of the terrestrial is another. There is one glory of the sun, and another glory of the moon, and another glory of the stars, for one star differeth from another star in glory.

So also is the resurrection of the dead. It is sown in corruption; it is raised in incorruption: it is sown in dishonour; it is raised in glory: it is sown in weakness; it is raised in power: it is sown a natural body; it is raised a spiritual body.

There is a natural body, and there is a spiritual body. And so it is written, The first man Adam was made a living soul; the last Adam was made a Quickening Spirit. Howbeit that was not first which is spiritual, but that which is natural; and afterward that which is spiritual.

The first man is of the earth, earthy: the second Man is the Lord from Heaven. As is the earthy, such are they also that are earthy: and as is the Heavenly, such are they also that are Heavenly. And as we have borne the image of the earthy, we shall also

bear the image of the Heavenly. Now this I say, brethren, that flesh and blood cannot inherit the Kingdom of God; neither doth corruption inherit incorruption.

Behold, I shew you a mystery; We shall not all sleep, but we shall all be changed, in a moment, in the twinkling of an eye, at the last trump: for the trumpet shall sound, and the dead shall be raised incorruptible, and we shall be changed. For this corruptible must put on incorruption, and this mortal must put on immortality. So when this corruptible shall have put on incorruption, and this mortal shall have put on immortality, then shall be brought to pass the saying that is written, Death is swallowed up in victory.

O death, where is thy sting? O grave where is thy victory?

The sting of death is sin; and the strength of sin is the law. But thanks be to God, which giveth us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ.

Therefore my beloved brethren, be yestedfast, unmoveable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, forasmuch as ye know that your labour is not in vain in the Lord.

## Sebenth Chening. 2 Corinthians iv. 16.

For which cause we faint not; but though our outward man perish, yet the inward man is renewed day by day.

For our light affliction, which is but for a moment, worketh for us a far more exceeding and eternal weight of glory; While we look not at the things which are seen, but at the things which are not seen; for the things which are seen are temporal; but the things which are not seen are eternal.

For we know that if our earthly house of this tabernacle were dissolved, we have a building of God, an house not made with hands, eternal in the Heavens.

For in this we grown, earnestly desiring to be clothed upon with our house which is from Heaven: if so be that being clothed we shall not be found naked.

For we that are in this tabernacle do groan, being burdened: not for that we would be unclothed, but clothed upon, that mortality might be swallowed up of life.

Now He that hath wrought us for the self-same thing is God, Who also hath given unto us the earnest of the Spirit.

Therefore we are always confident, knowing that, whilst we are at home in the body, we are absent from the Lord: (for we walk by faith, not by sight:) we are confident, I say, and willing rather to be absent from the body, and to be present with the Lord.

Wherefore we labour, that, whether present or absent, we may be accepted of Him.

For we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ; that every one may receive the things done in his body, according to that he hath done, whether it be good or bad.

## Eighth Chening.

Brethren, ye have been called unto liberty; only use not liberty for an occasion to the flesh, but by love serve one another. For all the law is fulfilled in one word, even in this; Thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself. But if ye bite and devour one another, take heed that ye be not consumed one of another.

This I say then, Walk in the Spirit, and ye shall not fulfil the lust of the flesh. For the flesh lusteth against the Spirit, and the Spirit against the flesh: and these are contrary the one to the other: so that ye cannot do the things that ye would. But if ye be led of the Spirit, ye are not under the law.

Now the works of the flesh are manifest, which are these; Adultery, fornication, uncleanness, lasciviousness, idolatry, witch-craft, hatred, variance, emulations, wrath, strife, seditions, heresies, envyings, murders, drunkenness, revellings, and such like: of the which I tell you before, as I have also told you in time past, that they which do such things shall not inherit the Kingdom of God.

But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, longsuffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, meekness, temperance: against such there is no law.

And they that are Christ's have crucified the flesh with the affections and lusts.

If we live in the Spirit, let us also walk in the Spirit.

Let us not be desirous of vain glory, provoking one another, envying one another.

## Hinth Chening.

Brethren, if a man be overtaken in a fault, ye which are spiritual, restore such an one in the spirit of meekness; considering thyself, lest thou also be tempted.

Bear ye one another's burdens, and so fulfil the law of Christ.

For if a man think himself to be something, when he is nothing, he deceiveth himself.

But let every man prove his own work, and then shall he have rejoicing in himself alone, and not in another. For every man shall bear his own burden, Let him that is taught in the word communicate unto him that teacheth in all good things.

Be not deceived; God is not mocked: for whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap. For he that soweth to his flesh shall of the flesh reap corruption; but he that soweth to the Spirit shall of the Spirit reap life everlasting.

And let us not be weary in well doing: for in due season we shall reap, if we faint not.

As we have therefore opportunity, let us do good unto all men, especially unto them who are of the household of faith.

### Tenth Chening. Ephesians iv.

I therefore, the prisoner of the Lord, beseech you that ye walk worthy of the vocation wherewith ye are called, with all lowliness and meekness, with longsuffering, forbearing one another in love; endeavouring to keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace.

There is one Body, and one Spirit, even as ye are called in one hope of your calling; one Lord, one Faith, one Baptism, one God and Father of all, Who is above all, and through all, and in you all.

This I say therefore, and testify in the Lord, that ye henceforth walk not as other Gentiles walk, in the vanity of their mind, having the understanding darkened, being alienated from the life of God through the ignorance that is in them, because of the blindness of their heart: who being past feeling havegiven themselves over unto lasciviousness, to work all uncleanness with greediness.

But ye have not so learned Christ; if so be that ye have heard Him, and have been taught by Him, as the truth is in Jesus: that ye put off concerning the former conversation the old man, which is corrupt according to the deceitful lusts; And be renewed in the spirit of your mind; and that ye put on the new man, which after God is created in righteousness and true holiness.

Wherefore putting away lying, speak every man truth with his neighbour: for we are members one of another. Be ye angry, and sin not: let not the sun go down upon your wrath: neither give place to the devil.

Let him that stole steal no more: but rather let him labour, working with his hands the thing which is good, that he may have to give to him that needeth.

Let no corrupt communication proceed out of your mouth, but that which is good to the use of edifying, that it may minister grace unto the hearers.

And grieve not the holy Spirit of God, whereby ye are sealed unto the day of redemption.

Let all bitterness, and wrath, and anger, and clamour, and evil speaking, be put away from you, with all malice: and be ye kind one to another, tenderhearted forgiving one another, even as God for Christ's sake hath forgiven you.

### Elcbenth Ebening. Ephesians v. 1.

Be ye therefore followers of God, as dear children; and walk in love, as Christ also hath loved us, and hath given Himself for us, an Offering and a Sacrifice to God for a sweet-smelling savour.

Butfornication, and all uncleanness, or covetousness, let it not be once named among you, as becometh saints; neither filthiness, nor foolish talking, nor jesting,

which are not convenient: but rather giving of thanks.

For this ye know, that no whoremonger, nor unclean person, nor covetous man, who is an idolater, hath any inheritance in the Kingdom of Christ and of God. Let no man deceive you with vain words: for because of these things cometh the wrath of God upon the children of disobedience. Be not ye therefore partakers with them.

For ye were sometimes darkness, but now are ye light in the Lord: walk as children of light: (for the fruit of the Spirit is in all goodness and righteousness and truth;) proving what is acceptable unto the Lord. And have no fellowship with the unfruitful works of darkness, but rather reprove them. For it is a shame even to speak of those things which are done of them in secret.

But all things that are reproved are made manifest by the light: for whatsoever doth make manifest is light. Wherefore he saith, Awake thou that sleepest, and arise from the dead, and Christ shall give thee light.

See then that ye walk circumspectly, not as fools, but as wise, redeeming the time, because the days are evil. Wherefore be ye not unwise, but understanding what the will of the Lord is.

And be not drunk with wine, wherein is excess; but be filled with the Spirit; speaking to yourselves in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing and making melody in your heart to the Lord; giving thanks always for all things unto God and the Father in the Name of our Lord Jesus Christ; submitting yourselves one to another in the fear of God.

#### Twelfth Chening. Ephesians vi. 10.

Finally, my brethren, be strong in the Lord, and in the power of His might.

Put on the whole armour of God, that ye may be able to stand against the wiles of the devil. For we wrestle not against flesh and blood, but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of the darkness of this world, against spiritual wickedness in high places. Wherefore take unto you the whole armour of God, that ye may be able to withstand in the evil day, and having done all, to stand.

Stand therefore, having your loins girt about with truth, and having on the breastplate of right-eousness; and your feet shod with the preparation of the gospel of peace; above all, taking the shield of faith, wherewith ye shall be able to quench all the fiery darts of the wicked. And take the helmet of salvation, and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God:

Praying always with all prayer and supplication in the Spirit, and watching thereunto with all perseverance and supplication for all saints; and for me, that utterance may be given unto me, that I may open my mouth boldly, to make known the mystery of the gospel.

# Thirteenth Chening. Philippians iii. 7.

But what things were gain to me, those 1 counted loss for Christ.

Yea doubtless, and I count all things but loss for the excellency of the knowledge of Christ Jesus my Lord: for Whom I have suffered the loss of all things, and do count them but dung, that I may win Christ, and be found in Him, not having mine own right-eousness, which is of the law, but that which is through the faith of Christ, the righteousness which is of God by faith: that I may know Him, and the power of His Resurrection, and the fellowship of His Sufferings, being made conformable unto His Death; if by any means I might attain unto the resurrection of the dead.

Not as though I had already attained, either were already perfect: but I follow after, if that I may apprehend that for which also I am apprehended of Christ Jesus.

Brethren, I count not myself to have apprehended: but this one thing I do, forgetting those things which are behind, and reaching forth unto those things which are before, I press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus.

Let us therefore, as many as be perfect, be thus minded: and if in anything ye be otherwise minded, God shall reveal even this unto you.

Nevertheless, whereto we have already attained, let us walk by the same rule, let us mind the same thing.

Brethren, be followers together of me and mark them which walk so as ye have us for an ensample. (For many walk, of whom I have told you often, and now tell you even weeping, that they are the enemies of the cross of Christ: whose end is destruction, whose God is their belly, and whose glory is in their shame, who mind earthly things.) our conversation is in Heaven; from whence also we look for the Saviour, the Lord Jesus Christ: Who shall change our vile body, that it may be fashioned like unto His glorious Body, according to the working whereby He is able even to subdue all things unto Himself.

Therefore, my brethren dearly beloved and longed for, my joy and crown, so stand fast in the Lord, my dearly beloved.

Rejoice in the Lord alway: and again I say, Rejoice. Let your moderation be known unto all men. The Lord is at hand. Be careful for nothing; but in every thing by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known unto God. And the peace of God, which passeth all understanding, shall keep your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus.

Finally, brethren, whatsoever things are true, whatsoever things are honest, whatsoever things are just, whatsoever things are pure, whatsoever things are lovely, whatsoever things are of good report: if there be any virtue, and if there be any praise, think on these things.

#### Fourteenth Chening. Colossians iii.

If ye then be risen with Christ, seek those things which are above, where Christ sitteth on the right hand of God. Set your affection on things above, not on things on the earth. For ye are dead, and your life is hid with Christ in God. When Christ, Who is our life, shall appear, then shall ye also appear with Him in glory.

Mortify therefore your members which are upon the earth; fornication, uncleanness, inordinate affection, evil concupiscence, and covetousness, which is idolatry: for which things' sake the wrath of God cometh on the children of disobedience: in the which ye also walked some time, when ye lived in them.

But now ye also put off all

these; anger, wrath, malice, blasphemy, filthy communication out of your mouth.

Lie not one to another, seeing that ye have put off the old man with his deeds; and have put on the new man, which is renewed in knowledge after the image of Him that created him: where there is neither Greek nor Jew, circumcision nor uncircumcision, Barbarian, Scythian, bond nor free: but Christ is all, and in all.

Put on therefore, as the elect of God, holy and beloved, bowels of mercies, kindness, humbleness of mind, meekness, longsuffering; forbearing one another, and forgiving one another, if any man have a quarrel against any: even as Christ forgave you, so also do ye.

And above all these things put on charity, which is the bond of

perfectness.

And let the peace of God rule in your hearts, to the which also ye are called in one body; and be ye thankful.

Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly in all wisdom; teaching and admonishing one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing with grace in your hearts to the Lord.

And whatsoever ye do in word or deed, do all in the Name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God and the Father by Him.

# fifteenth Ebening. 1 Thessalonians iv. 18.

But I would not have you to be ignorant, brethren, concerning them which are asleep, that ye sorrow not, even as others which have no hope. For if we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so them also which sleep in Jesus will God bring with Him.

For this we say unto you by the word of the Lord, that we which are alive and remain unto the coming of the Lord shall not prevent them which are asleep.

For the Lord Himself shall descend from Heaven with a shout, with the voice of the Archangel, and with the trump of God: and the dead in Christ shall rise first: Then we which are alive and remain shall be caught up together with them in the clouds, to meet the Lord in the air: and so shall we ever be with the Lord. Wherefore comfort one another with these words.

But of the times and the seasons, brethren, ye have no need that I write unto you. For yourselves know perfectly that the day of the Lord so cometh as a thief in the night. For when they shall say, Peace and safety; then sudden destruction cometh upon them, as travail upon a woman with child; and they shall not escape.

But ye, brethren, are not in darkness, that that day should overtake you as a thief. Ye are all the children of light, and the children of the day: we are not of the night, nor of darkness. Therefore let us not sleep, as do others; but let us watch and be sober: For they that sleep sleep in the night; and they that be drunken are drunken in the night. But let us, who are of the day, be sober, putting on the breastplate of faith and love; and for an helmet, the hope of salvation.

For God hath not appointed us to wrath, but to obtain salvation by our Lord Jesus Christ, Who died for us, that, whether we wake or sleep, we should live together with Him. Wherefore comfort yourselves together, and edify one another, even as also ye do.

And we beseech you, brethren, to know them which labour among you, and are over you in the Lord, and admonish you; And to esteem them very highly in love for their work's sake. And be at

peace among yourselves.

Now we exhort you, brethren, warn them that are unruly, comfort the feeble-minded, support the weak, be patient toward all men. See that none render evil for evil unto any man; but ever follow that which is good, both among yourselves, and to all men. Rejoice evermore. Pray without ceasing. In every thing give thanks: for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus concerning Quench not the Spirit. you. Despise not prophesyings. Prove all things; hold fast that which is Abstain from all appearance of evil.

And the very God of peace sanctify you wholly; and I pray God your whole spirit and soul and body be preserved blameless unto the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ. Faithful is He That calleth you, Who also will do it.

# Sixteenth Chening.

Having therefore, brethren, boldness to enter into the Holiest by the Blood of Jesus, By a new and living way, which He hath consecrated for us, through the Veil, that is to say, His flesh; And having an High Priest over the House of God; let us draw near with a true heart in full assurance of faith, having our hearts sprinkled from an evil conscience, and our bodies washed with pure water.

Let us hold fast the profession of our faith without wavering; (for He is faithful that promised;) And let us consider one another to provoke unto love and to good works: not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together, as the manner of some is; but exhorting one another: and so much the more, as ye see the day

approaching.

For if we sin wilfully after that we have received the knowledge of the truth, there remaineth no more sacrifice for sins, but a certain fearful looking for of judgment and fiery indignation, which shall devour the adversaries. He that despised Moses' law died without mercy under two or three witnesses: of how much sorer punishment, suppose ye, shall he be thought worthy, who hath trodden under foot the Son of God, and hath counted the Blood of the Covenant, wherewith He was sanctified, an unholy thing, and hath done despite unto the Spirit of grace?

For we know Him that hath said, Vengeance belongeth unto Me, I will recompense, saith the Lord. And again, The Lord shall

judge His people.

It is a fearful thing to fall into the hands of the living God.

But call to remembrance the former days, in which, after ye were illuminated, ye endured a great fight of afflictions; partly, whilst ye were made a gazing-stock both by reproaches and afflictions; and partly, whilst ye became companions of them that were so used. For ye had compassion of me in my bouds, and took joyfully the spoiling of your goods, knowing in yourselves that ye have in Heaven a better and an enduring substance.

Cast not away therefore your confidence, which hath great recompence of reward. For ye have need of patience, that, after ye have done the will of God, ye might receive the promise. For yet a little while, and He that shall come will come, and will not tarry.

Now the just shall live by faith: but if any man draw back, my soul shall have no pleasure in him. But we are not of them who draw back unto perdition; but of them that believe to the saving of the soul.

#### Sebenteenth Chening. Hebrews xii.

Wherefore seeing we also are compassed about with so great a cloud of witnesses, let us lay aside every weight, and the sin which doth so easily beset us, and let us run with patience the race that is set before us. Looking unto Jesus the author and finisher of our faith; Who for the joy that was set before Him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is set down at the right hand of the throne of God.

For consider Him that endured such contradiction of sinners against Himself, lest ye wearied and faint in your minds. Ye have not yet resisted unto blood, striving against sin. ye have forgotten the exhortation which speaketh unto you as unto children, My son, despise not thou the chastening of the Lord, nor faint when thou art rebuked of Him: For whom the Lord loveth He chasteneth, and scourgeth every son whom He receiveth.

If ye endure chastening, God dealeth with you as with sons; for what son is he whom the father chasteneth not? But if ye be without chastisement, whereof all are partakers, then are ye bastards, and not sons.

Furthermore we have had fathers of our flesh which corrected us, and we gave them revence: shall we not much rather be in subjection unto the Father of spirits, and live? For they verily for a few days chastened us after their own pleasure; but He for our profit, that we might be partakers of His holiness.

Now no chastening for the present seemeth to be joyous but grievous: nevertheless afterward it yieldeth the peaceable fruits of righteousness unto them which are exercised thereby.

Wherefore lift up the hands which hang down, and the feeble knees; and make straight paths for your feet, lest that which is lame be turned out of the way; but let it rather be healed.

Follow peace with all men, and holiness, without which no man shall see the Lord: Looking diligently lest any man fail of the grace of God; lest any root of bitterness springing up trouble you, and thereby many be defiled: Lest there be any fornicator, or profane person, as Esau, who for one morsel of meat sold his birth-For ye know how that afterward, when he would have inherited the blessing, he was rejected: for he found no place of repentance, though he sought it carefully with tears.

For ye are not come unto the mount that might be touched, and that burned with fire, nor unto blackness, and darkness, and tempest: and the sound of a trumpet, and the voice of words; which voice they that heard entreated that the word should not be spoken to them any more: (For they could not endure that which was commanded, And if so much as a beast touch the mountain, it shall be stoned, or thrust through with a dart: and so terrible was the sight, that Moses said, I exceedingly fear and quake:) But ye are come unto mount Sion, and unto the City of the Living God, the heavenly Jerusalem, and to an innumerable company of Angels, to the general assembly and church of the firstborn, which are written in Heaven, and to God the Judge of all, and to the spirits of just men

made perfect, And to Jesus the Mediator of the New Covenant. and to the Blood of sprinkling, that speaketh better things than that of Abel.

See that ye refuse not Him that speaketh. For if they escaped not who refused Him that spake on earth, much more shall not we escape, if we turn away from Him that speaketh from Heaven: Whose voice then shook the earth: but now He hath promised, saying. Yet once more I shake not the earth only, but also Heaven. And this word, Yet once more, signifieth the removing of those things that are shaken, as of things that are made, that those things which cannot be shaken may remain.

Wherefore we receiving a kingdom which cannot be moved, let us have grace, whereby we may serve God acceptably with reverence and godly fear. For our God is a consuming fire.

#### Gighteenth Chening. Hebrews xiii.

Let brotherly love continue. Be ye not forgetful to entertain strangers: for thereby some have entertained angels unawares. Remember them that are in bonds. as bound with them; and them which suffer adversity, as being yourselves also in the body.

Marriage is honourable in all, and the bed undefiled: but whoremongers and adulterers God will

judge.

Let your conversation be without covetousness; and be content with such things as ye have: for He hath said, I will never leave thee, nor forsake thee. So that we may boldly say, The Lord is my helper, and I will not fear what man shall do unto me.

Remember them which have the rule over you, who have spoken unto you the word of God: whose faith follow, considering the end of their conversation.

Jesus Christ the same vesterday, and to day, and for ever. Be not carried about with divers and strange doctrines. For it is a good thing that the heart be established with grace; not with meats, which have not profited them that have been occupied therein.

We have an altar, whereof they have no right to eat which serve the tabernacle. For the bodies of those beasts, whose blood is brought into the sanctuary by the high priest for sin, are burned without the camp. Wherefore Jesus also, that He might sanctify the people with His own Blood, suffered without the gate.

Let us go forth therefore unto Him without the camp, bearing His reproach. For here have we no continuing city, but we seek

one to come.

By Him therefore let us offer the sacrifice of praise to God continually, that is, the fruit of our lips giving thanks to His Name. But to do good and to communicate forget not: for with such sacrifices God is well pleased.

Obey them that have the rule over you, and submit yourselves: far they watch for your souls, as they that must give account, that they may do it with joy, and not with grief: for that is unprofitable for you.

#### Mineteenth Chening. James i. 12.

Blessed is the man that endureth temptation: for when he is tried, he shall receive the crown of life, which the Lord hath promised to them that love Him.

Let no man say when he is tempted, I am tempted of God: for God cannot be tempted with evil, neither tempteth He any man. But every man is tempted, when he is drawn away of his own lust, and enticed. Then when lust hath conceived, it bringeth forth sin: and sin, when it is finished, bringeth forth death.

Do not err, my beloved brethren. Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above, and cometh down from the Father of lights, with whom is no variableness, neither shadow of turning.

Of His own will begat He us with the word of truth, that we should be a kind of firstfruits of His creatures.

Wherefore, my beloved brethren, let every man be swift to hear, slow to speak, slow to wrath: for the wrath of man worketh not the righteousness of God.

Wherefore lay apart all filthiness and superfluity of naughtiness, and receive with meekness the engrafted word, which is able to save your souls.

But be ye doers of the word, and not hearers only, deceiving your own selves. For if any be a hearer of the word, and not a doer, he is like unto a man beholding his natural face in a glass: for he beholdeth himself, and goeth his way, and straightway forgetteth what manner of man he was. But whose looketh into the perfect law of liberty, and continueth therein, he being not a forgetful hearer, but a doer of the work, this man shall be blessed in his deed.

If any man among you seem to be religious, and bridleth not his tongue, but deceiveth his own heart, this man's religion is vain.

Pure religion, and undefiled before God and the Father is this, to visit the fatherless and widows in their affliction, and to keep himself unspotted from the world.

# Twentieth Chening.

What doth it profit, my brethren, though a man say he hath faith, and have not works? can faith save him?

If a brother or sister be naked, and destitute of daily food, And one of you say unto them, Depart in peace, be ye warmed and filled; notwithstanding ye give them not those things which are needful to the body; what doth it profit? Even so faith, if it hath not works, is dead, being alone.

Yea, a man may say, Thou hast faith, and I have works: shew me thy faith without thy works, and I will shew thee my faith by my works.

Thou believest that there is one God; thou doest well: the devils also believe, and tremble.

But wilt thou know, O vain man, that faith without works is dead?

Was not Abraham our father justified by works, when he had offered Isaac his son upon the altar? Seest thou how faith wrought with his works, and by works was faith made perfect? And the Scripture was fulfilled which saith, Abraham believed God, and it was imputed unto him for righteousness: and he was called the friend of God. Ye see then how that by works a man is justified, and not by faith only.

Likewise also was not Rahab the harlot justified by works, when she had received the messengers, and had sent them out another way?

For as the body without the spirit is dead, so faith without works is dead also.

# Twenty-first Chening. S. James iii.

My brethren, be not many masters, knowing that we shall receive the greater condemna-

For in many things we offend all. If any man offend not in word, the same is a perfect man, and able also to bridle the whole body.

Behold, we put bits in the horses' mouths, that they may obey us; and we turn about their whole body. Behold also the ships, which though they be so great, and are driven of fierce winds, yet are they turned about with a very small helm, whithersoever the governor listeth. Even so the tongue is a little member, and boasteth great things.

Behold, how great a matter a little fire kindleth! And the tongue is a fire, a world of iniquity: so is the tongue among cur members, that it defileth the whole body, and setteth on fire the course of nature; and it is set on fire of hell. For every kind of beasts, and of birds, and of serpents, and of things in the sea, is tamed, and hath been tamed of mankind.

But the tongue can no man tame; it is an unruly evil, full of deadly poison. Therewith bless we God, even the Father; and therewith curse we men, which are made after the similitude of Out of the same mouth God. proceedeth blessing and cursing. My brethren, these things ought not so to be. Doth a fountain send forth at the same place sweet water and bitter? Can the fig tree, my brethren, bear olive berries? either a vine, figs? so can no fountain both yield salt water and fresh.

Who is a wise man and endued with knowledge among you? let him shew out of a good conversation his works with meekness of wisdom. But if ye have bitter envying and strife in your hearts, glory not, and lie not against the truth.

This wisdom descendeth not from above, but is earthly, sensual, devilish. For where envying and strife is, there is confusion and every evil work.

But the wisdom that is from above is first pure, then peaceable, gentle, and easy to be intreated, full of mercy and good fruits, without partiality, and without hypocrisy. And the fruit of righteousness is sown in peace of them that make peace.

## Twenty-second Chening. 8. James iv.

From whence come wars and fightings among you? come they not hence, even of your lusts that war in your members?

Ye lust, and have not: ye kill, and desire to have, and cannot obtain: ye fight and war, yet ye have not, because ye ask not.

Ye ask, and receive not, because ye ask amiss, that ye may consume it upon your lusts. Ye adulterers and adulteresses, know ye not that the friendship of the world is enmity with God? whoseever therefore will be a friend of the world is the enemy of God.

Do ye think that the Scripture saith in vain, The spirit that dwelleth in us lusteth to envy?

But He giveth more grace. Wherefore He saith, God resisteth the proud, but giveth grace unto the humble.

Submit yourselves therefore to God. Resist the devil and he will flee from you. Draw nigh to God, and He will draw nigh to you. Cleanse your hands, ye sinners; and purify your hearts, ye double minded. Be afflicted, and mourn, and weep: let your laughter be turned to mourning, and your joy to heaviness. Hum-

ble yourselves in the sight of the Lord, and He shall lift you up.

Speak not evil one of another, brethren. He that speaketh evil of his brother, and judgeth his brother, speaketh evil of the law, and judgeth the law: but if thou judge the law, thou art not a doer of the law, but a judge. There is one lawgiver, who is able to save and to destroy: who art thou that judgest another?

Go to now, ye that say, To-day or to-morrow we will go into such a city and continue there a year, and buy and sell, and get gain: Whereas ye know not what shall be on the morrow. For what is your life? It is even a vapour, that appeareth for a little time, and then vanisheth away. For that ye ought to say, If the Lord will, we shall live, and do this, or that. But now ye rejoice in your boastings: all such rejoicing is evil.

Therefore to him that knoweth to do good, and doeth it not, to him it is sin.

# Twenty-third Chening. S. James v.

Go to now, ye rich men, weep and howl for your miseries that shall come upon you. Your riches are corrupted, and your garments are motheaten. gold and silver is cankered; and the rust of them shall be a witness against you, and shall eat your flesh as it were fire. Ye have heaped treasure together for the Last Days. Behold, the hire of the labourers who have reaped down your fields, which is of you kept back by fraud, crieth: and the cries of them which have reaped are entered into the ears of the Lord of Ye have lived in Sabaoth. pleasure on the earth, and been wanton; ye have nourished your

hearts, as in a day of slaughter. Ye have condemned and killed the just: and he doth not resist you.

Be patient therefore, brethren, unto the coming of the Lord. Behold the husbandman waiteth for the precious fruit of the earth, and hath long patience for it, until he receive the early and latter rain. Be ye also patient; stablish your hearts: for the coming of the Lord draweth nigh.

Grudge not one against another, brethren, lest ye be condemned: behold, the Judge standeth before the door.

Take, my brethren, the prophets, who have spoken in the Name of the Lord, for an example of suffering affliction, and of patience. Behold, we count them happy which endure. Ye have heard of the patience of Job, and have seen the end of the Lord; that the Lord is very pitiful, and of tender mercy.

But above all things, my brethren, swear not, neither by heaven, neither by the earth, neither by any other oath: but let your yea be yea: and your nay, nay; lest ye fall into condemnation.

Is any among you afflicted? Let him pray. Is any merry? Let him sing psalms. Is any sick among you? let him call for the Elders of the Church; and let them pray over him, anointing him with oil in the Name of the Lord: and the prayer of faith shall save the sick, and the Lord shall raise him up: and if he have committed sins, they shall be forgiven him.

Confess your faults one to another, and pray one for another, that ye may be healed. The effectual fervent prayer of a righteous man availeth much. Elias was a man subject to like passions as we are, and he prayed earnestly that it might not rain: and it rained not on the earth by the space of three years and six months. And he prayed again, and the heaven gave rain, and the earth brought forth her fruit.

Brethren, if any of you do err from the truth, and one convert him; let him know, that he which converteth the sinner from the error of his way shall save a soul from death, and shall hide a multitude of sins.

## Twenty-fourth Ebening. 1 Peter i. 18.

Gird up the loins of your mind, be sober, and hope to the end for the grace that is to be brought unto you at the Revelation of Jesus Christ: As obedient children, not fashioning yourselves according to the former lusts in your ignorence: But as He Which hath called you is holy, so be ye holy in all manner of conversation; because it is written, Be ye holy; for I am holy.

And if ye call on the Father, Who without respect of persons judgeth according to every man's work, pass the time of your sojourning here in fear: Forasmuch as ye know that ye were not redeemed with corruptible things. as silver and gold, from your vain conversation received by tradition from your fathers; but with the precious Blood of Christ, as of a Lamb without blemish and without spot: Who verily was foreordained before the foundation of the world, but was manifest in these last times for you, who by Him do believe in God, That raised Him up from the dead, and gave Him glory; that your faith and hope might be in God.

Seeing ye have purified your souls in obeying the truth through the Spirit unto unfeigned love of the brethren, see that ye love one another with a pure heart fervently: being born again, not of corruptible seed, but of incorruptible, by the Word of God, which liveth and abideth for ever. For all flesh is as grass, and all the glory of man as the flower of grass. The grass withereth, and the flower thereof falleth away: but the Word of the Lord endureth for ever. And this is the Word which by the Gospel is preached unto you.

## Twenty-fifth Chening. 1 St. Peter ii.

Wherefore laying aside all malice, and all guile, and hypocrisies, and envies, and all evil speakings, as newborn babes desire the sincere milk of the Word, that ye may grow thereby : if so be ye have tasted that the Lord is gracious. To Whom coming, as unto a living stone, disallowed indeed of men, but Chosen of God, and precious, ye also, as lively stones, are built up a spiritual house, an holy Priesthood, to offer up spiritual sacrifices, acceptable to God by Jesus Christ.

Wherefore also it is contained in the Scripture, Behold, I lay in Sion a Chief Corner Stone, elect, precious: and he that believeth on Him, shall not be confounded. Unto you therefore which believe He is precious: but unto them which be disobedient, the Stone which the builders disallowed, the Same is become the head of the corner, and a stone of stumbling, and a rock of offence, even to them which stumble at the word, being disobedient; whereunto also they were appointed.

But ye are a Chosen Generation, a Royal Priesthood, an Holy Nation, a Peculiar People; that ye should shew forth the praises of Him Who hath called you out of darkness into His marvellous light: which in time past were not a people, but are now the People of God: which had not obtained mercy, but now have obtained mercy.

Dearly beloved, I beseech you as strangers and pilgrims, abstain from fleshly lusts, which war against the soul; having your conversation honest among the Gentiles; that, whereas they speak against you as evildoers, they may by your good works, which they shall behold, glorify God in the day of visitation.

Submit yourselves to every ordinance of man for the Lord's sake: whether it be to the King as supreme, or unto governors, as unto them that are sent by him for the punishment of evildoers, and for the praise of them that do well. For so is the will of God, that with well doing ye may put to silence the ignorance of foolish men. As free, and not using your liberty for a cloke of maliciousness, but as the servants of God. Honour all men. the brotherhood. Fear God. Honour the King.

### Twenty-sixth Chening. 1 S. Peter iii. 8.

Finally, be ye all of one mind, having compassion one of another, love as brethren, be pitiful, be courteous: not rendering evil for evil, or railing for railing: but contrariwise blessing; knowing that ye are thereunto called, that ye should inherit a blessing. For he that will love life, and see good days, let him refrain his tongue from evil, and his lips that they speak no guile: let him eschew evil, and do good; let him seek peace, and ensue it. the eyes of the Lord are over the righteous, and His ears are open unto their prayers: but the face of the Lord is against them that

And who is he that will harm you, if ye be followers of that which is good?

But and if ye suffer for righteousness' sake, happy are ye: and be not afraid of their terror. neither be troubled; but sanctify the Lord God in your hearts: and be ready always to give an answer to every man that asketh you a reason of the hope that is in you with meekness and fear: having a good conscience; that, whereas they speak evil of you, as of evildoers, they may be ashamed that falsely accuse your good conver-

sation in Christ.

For it is better, if the will of God be so, that ye suffer for well doing, than for evil doing. For Christ also hath once suffered for sins, the Just for the unjust, that He might bring us to God, being put to death in the flesh, but quickened by the Spirit: By which also He went and preached unto the spirits in prison; which sometime were disobedient, when once the longsuffering of God waited in the days of Noah, while the ark was a preparing, wherein few, that is, eight souls were saved by water. The like figure whereunto even Baptism doth also now save us (not the putting away of the filth of the flesh, but the answer of a good conscience toward God) by the resurrection of Jesus Christ: Who is gone into Heaven, and is on the Right Hand of God; Angels and authorities and powers being made subject unto Him.

### Twenty-sebenth Ebening. 1 S. Peter 4.

Forasmuch then as Christ hath suffered for us in the flesh, arm yourselves likewise with the same mind: for he that hath suffered in the flesh hath ceased from sin, that he no longer should live the rest of his time in the flesh to the lusts of men, but to the will of God.

For the time past of our life may suffice us to have wrought the will of the Gentiles, when we walked in lasciviousness, lusts, excess of wine, revellings, banquetings, and abominable idolatries: wherein they think it strange that ye run not with them to the same excess of riot, speaking evil of you: who shall give account to Him That is ready to judge the quick and the dead.

For for this cause was the Gospel preached also to them that are dead, that they might be judged according to men in the flesh, but live according to God

in the spirit.

But the end of all things is at hand: be ye therefore sober, and

watch unto prayer.

And above all things have fervent charity among yourselves: for charity shall cover the multitude of sins. Use hospitality one to another without grudging. every man hath received the gift. even so minister the same one to another, as good stewards of the manifold grace of God. If any man speak, let him speak as the oracles of God; if any man minister, let him do it as of the ability which God giveth: that God in all things may be glorified through Jesus Christ, to Whom be praise and dominion for ever and ever. Amen.

Beloved, think it not strange concerning the fiery trial which is to try you, as though some strange thing happened unto you: but rejoice, inasmuch as ye are partakers of Christ's sufferings; that, when His Glory shall be revealed, ye may be glad also with exceeding joy.

If ye be reproached for the

Name of Christ, happy are ye; for the spirit of glory and of God resteth upon you: on their part He is evil spoken of, but on your part He is glorified. But let none of you suffer as a murderer, or as a thief, or as an evildoer, or as a busybody in other men's matters. Yet if any man suffer as a Christian, let him not be ashamed; but let him glorify God on this behalf.

For the time is come that judgment must begin at the House of God: and if it first begin at us, what shall the end be of them that obey not the Gospel of God? And if the righteous scarcely be saved, where shall the ungodly and the sinner appear?

Wherefore let them that suffer according to the Will of God commit the keeping of their souls to Him in well doing, as unto a faithful Creator.

Twenty-eighth Ebening.

Which was from the beginning, Which we have heard. Which we have seen with our eyes, Which we have looked upon. and our hands have handled, of the Word of Life; (For the Life was manifested, and we have seen It, and bear witness, and shew unto you that Eternal Life. Which was with the Father, and was manifested unto us;) which we have seen and heard declare we unto you, that ye also may have fellowship with us; and truly our fellowship is with the Father, and with His Sen Jesus Christ.

And these things write we unto you, that your joy may be full.

This then is the message which we have heard of Him, and declare unto you, that God is Light, and in Him is no darkness at all.

If we say that we have fellow-

ship with Him, and walk in darkness, we lie, and do not the truth: But if we walk in the light, as He is in the light, we have fellowship one with another, and the Blood of Jesus Christ His Son cleanseth us from all sin.

If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness. If we say that we have not sinned, we make Him a liar, and His word is not in us.

My little children, these things write I unto you, that ye sin not. And if any man sin, we have an Advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the Righteous. And He is the Propitiation for our sins: and not for our's only, but also for the sins of the whole world.

And hereby we do know that we know Him, if we keep His Commandments. He that saith, I know Him, and keepeth not His Commandments, is a liar, and the trath is not in him. But whoso keepeth His Word, in him verily is the love of God perfected: hereby know we that we are in Him. He that saith he abideth in Him, ought himself also so to walk, even as He walked.

Brethren, I write no new commandment unto you, but an old commandment which ye had from the beginning. The old commandment is the word which ye have heard from the beginning. Again, a new commandment I write unto you, which thing is true in Him and in you: because the darkness is past, and the true light now shineth.

He that saith he is in the light, and hateth his brother, is in darkness even until now. He that loveth his brother abideth in the light, and there is none occasion of stumbling in him. But he that

hateth his brother is in darkness, and walketh in darkness, and knoweth not whither he goeth, because that darkness hath blinded his eyes.

I write unto you, little children, because your sins are forgiven you for His Name's sake. I write unto you, fathers, because ye have known Him That is from the beginning. I write unto you, young men, because ye have overcome the Wicked One. I write unto you, little children, because ye have known the Father. have written unto you fathers, because ye have known Him That is from the beginning. I have written unto you, young men, because ye are strong, and the Word of God abideth in you, and ye have overcome the Wicked

Love not the world, neither the things that are in the world. If any man love the world, the love of the Father is not in Him. For all that is in the world, the lust of the flesh, and the lust of the eyes, and the pride of life, is not of the Father, but is of the world. And the world passeth away, and the lust thereof: but he that doeth the Will of God abideth for ever.

# Twenty-ninth Chening. 1 S. John iii.

Behold, what manner of love the Father hath bestowed upon us, that we should be called the Sons of God: therefore the world knoweth us not, because it knew Him not.

Beloved, now are we the Sons of God, and it doth not yet appear what we shall be: but we know that, when He shall appear, we shall be like Him; for we shall see Him as He is. And every man that hath this hope in Him purifieth himself, even as He is pure.

Whosoever committeth sin transgresseth also the law: for sin is the transgression of the And ye know that He was manifested to take away our sins; and in Him is no sin.

Whosoever abideth in Him sinnot: whosoever sinneth hath not seen Him, neither known Him.

Little children, let no man deceive you: he that doeth righteousness is righteous, even as He is righteous. He that committeth sin is of the Devil; for the Devil sinneth from the beginning. For this purpose the Son of God was manifested, that He might destroy the works of the Devil. Whosoever is born of God doth not commit sin; for His seed remaineth in him: and he cannot sin because he is born of God. In this the Children of God are manifest, and the children of the Devil: whoseever doeth not righteousness is not of God, neither he that loveth not his brother.

For this is the message that ye heard from the beginning, that we should love one another. Not as Cain, who was of that Wicked One, and slew his brother. wherefore slew he him? Because his own works were evil, and his brother's righteous.

Marvel not, my brethren, if the

world hate you.

We know that we have passed from death unto Life, because we love the brethren. He that loveth not his brother abideth in death. Whosoever hateth his brother is a murderer: and ye know that no murderer hath Eternal Life abiding in him.

Hereby perceive we the love of God, because He laid down His Life for us: and we ought to lay down our lives for the brethren. But whose hath this world's good, and seeth his brother have need. and shutteth up his bowels of compassion from him, how dwelleth the love of God in him?

My little children, let us not love in word, neither in tongue: but in deed and in truth. And hereby we know that we are of the truth, and shall assure our hearts before Him. For if our heart condemn us, God is greater than our heart, and knoweth all things. Beloved, if our heart condemn us not, then have we confidence toward God. whatsoever we ask, we receive of Him, because we keep His Commandments, and do those things that are pleasing in His sight.

And this is His Commandment, That we should believe on the Name of His Son Jesus Christ, and love one another, as He gave

us commandment.

And he that keepeth His Commandments dwelleth in Him, and And hereby we He in him. know that He abideth in us. by the Spirit Which He hath given us.

### Thirtieth Chening. 1 S. John iv.

Beloved, believe not every spirit, but try the spirits whether they are of God: because many false prophets are gone out into the world.

Hereby know ye the Spirit of God: every spirit that confesseth that Jesus Christ is come in the flesh is of God: and every spirit that confesseth not that Jesus Christ is come in the flesh is not of God: and this is that spirit of Antichrist, whereof ye have heard that it should come; and even now already is it in the world.

Ye are of God, little children, and have overcome them : because greater is He that is in you, than he that is in the world. are of the world: therefore speak they of the world, and the world heareth them. We are of God: he that knoweth God heareth us; he that is not of God heareth not us. Hereby know we the spirit of truth, and the spirit of error.

Beloved, let us love one another: for love is of God; and every one that loveth is born of God, and He that loveth knoweth God. not knoweth not God; for God is love. In this was manifested the love of God toward us, because that God sent His Only Begotten Son into the world, that we might live through Him. Herein is love, not that we loved God, but that He loved us, and sent His Son to be the propitiation for our sins. Beloved, if God so loved us, we ought also to love one another.

No man hath seen God at any time. If we love one another, God dwelleth in us, and His love is perfected on us. Hereby know we that we dwell in Him, and He in us, because He hath given us of His Spirit. And we have seen and do testify that the Father sent the Son to be the Saviour of the world.

Whosoever shall confess that Jesus is the Son of God, God dwelleth in him, and he in God.

And we have known and believed the love that God hath to us. God is love; and he that dwelleth in love dwelleth in God, and God in him.

Herein is our love made perfect, that we may have boldness in the day of judgment: because as he is, so are we in this world. There is no fear in love; but perfect love casteth out fear: because fear hath torment. He that feareth is not made perfect in love.

We love Him, because He first loved us.

If a man say, I love God, and hateth his brother, he is a liar: for he that loveth not his brother whom he hath seen, how can he love God Whom he hath not seen?
And this commandment have
we from Him, That he who loveth
God love his brother also.

### Thirty-first Chening. 1 S. John, v.

Whosoever believeth that Jesus is the Christ is born of God: and every one that loveth Him that begat loveth him also that is begotten of Him.

By this we know that we love the children of God, when we love God, and keep His Commandments. For this is the love of God, that we keep His Commandments: and His Commandments are not grievous. For whatsoever is born of God overcometh the world: and this is the victory that overcometh the world, even our faith. Who is he that overcometh the world, but He that believeth that Jesus is the Son of God?

This is He that came by Water and Blood, even Jesus Christ: not by water only, but by Water and Blood. And it is the Spirit that beareth witness, because the Spirit is truth. For there are Three that bear record in Heaven. the Father, the Word, and the Holy Ghost: and these Three are One. And there are three that bear witness in earth, the Spirit, and the Water, and the Blood: and these three agree in one. we receive the witness of men, the witness of God is greater: for this is the witness of God which He hath testified of His

He that believeth on the Son of God hath the witness in himself: he that believeth not God hath made Him a liar; because he believeth not the record that God gave of His Son. And this is the record, that God hath given to us Eternal Life, and this Life is

in His Son. He that hath the Son hath Life; and he that hath not the Son of God hath not Life.

These things have I written unto you that believe on the Name of the Son of God; that ye may know that ye have Eternal Life, and that ye may believe on the Name of the Son of God.

And this is the confidence that we have in him, that if we ask any thing according to His will, He heareth us: and if we know that He hear us, whatsoever we ask, we know that we have the petitions that we desired of Him.

If any man see his brother sin a sin which is not unto death, he shall ask, and He shall give him life for them that sin not unto death. There is a sin unto death: I do not say that he shall pray for it.

All unrighteousness is sin: and there is a sin not unto death.

We know that whosoever is born of God sinneth not; but he that is begotten of God keepeth himself, and that Wicked One toucheth him not.

And we know that we are of God, and the whole world lieth in wickedness.

And we know that the Son of God is come, and hath given us an understanding, that we may know Him That is true, and we are in Him That is true, even in His Son Jesus Christ. THIS IS THE TRUE GOD, AND ETERNAL LIFE. Little children, keep yourselves from idols. Amen.

### On Hamily Prayer.

Every Christian Household ought to be a Church in miniature. ties of Family are ordained of God, and should be consecrated to Him by the regular collective worship of the Family, conducted, in the absence of a Priest, by its Head. In the houses of Clergymen, and elsewhere, when possible, it is well to have a room set apart for the purpose, simply furnished in such a manner as to indicate its appropriation to holy uses. An oblong room is best, with a Prayer Desk, at which the Reader may kneel facing the end wall or window furthest away from the door. The congregation should range themselves down the two sides of the room, with their backs to the wall, and, without turning round, kneel down in that position, so as still to face each other. The males and females may take opposite sides, or the family one side and the servants the other. Chairs, or long benches, may be placed along, and close to, the side walls. But if the room be narrow this is not necessary, as those assembled may stand during the saying of the Psalms or the reading of the Lesson.

With regard to the Prayers to be used, the Editor would give the following recommendations:—

I. In cases where attendance at the daily Church Service is out of the question, to use as much of the daily Matins and Evensong of the Prayer-Book as may be possible. It is the greatest possible mistake to suppose that familiarity with them, from constant private or household use, lessens their value, or our reverent appreciation of them, as Public Offices of the

Church. All experience proves the contrary. Indeed it were most earnestly to be desired that they were really 'familiar in our mouths as household words.' For use in families they would of course be shortened. This may be done in the following ways.

(a) Begin with the Lord's Prayer, (except in the Evening, when the Confession may be said); omit the Canticles and the first Lesson; after the Third Collect say, in the Morning, only the Prayers 'For the Clergy and People,' and 'For all Conditions,' and in the Evening, only the 'General Thanksgiving;' concluding with 'The grace of our Lord,' &c. This will not take more than a quarter of an hour.

(b) The Daily Services may be still further shortened by saying the Creed only once, either Morning or Evening, and concluding after the Third Collect.

(c) On Wednesdays & Fridays, after the Psalms and Lesson, the Litany might be said instead of the Daily Prayers.

II. On Sundays, and whensoever attendance at the public Service is possible, it is undesirable to have at home a form of Prayer involving repetition in the case of those members of the Household who may be able to go to Church. We may then adopt either of the two following forms of daily Prayer for a Household, of which the first is abridged from the Offices prescribed in the ancient English Use of Salisbury for use at morning and night, and the second from those given in American Book of Common Prayer.

## Morning Prager for a Ramily.

(From the Ancient English Use of Sarum.)

- First, according to discretion and opportunity, may be said the Hymn and Psalms of the day or Season, (for which see page 7, &c.) the Reader first stating the page on which the Hymn will be found.
- ¶ Next the Lesson for the day of the month shall be read, from the preceding short Lessons selected from the Holy Gospels, (page 145) except on Sundays or Festivals, when the Gospel of the day shall be read.
- ¶ After that, the Apostles' Creed may be said, all standing.

¶ Then the Reader shall say: The Lord be with you. Answer. And with thy spirit.

Reader. Let us pray. Lord, have mercy upon us. Christ, have mercy upon us. Lord, have mercy upon us.

Our Father, Which art in Heaven, Hallowed be Thy Name.
Thy Kingdom come. Thy Will be done in earth, as it is in Heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive them that trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation; But deliver us from evil. Amen.

O Lord, turn Thy Face away from my sins. And put out all my misdeeds.

Make me a clean heart, O God.

And renew a right spirit within me.

Cast me not away from Thy presence. And take not Thy Holy Spirit from me.

O give me the comfort of Thy help again. And stablish me with Thy free Spirit.

O Holy God, Holy and Strong, Holy and Immortal. O Lamb of

God, That takest away the sins of the world, Have mercy upon us.

Bless the Lord, O my soul.

And all that is within me bless
His holy Name.

Bless the Lord, O my soul.

And forget not all His benefits.

Who forgiveth all thy sins. And healeth all thine infirmities.

Who saveth thy life from destruction. And crowneth thee with mercy and loving kindness.

Who satisfieth thy mouth with good things. Making thee young and lusty as an eagle.

Wilt Thou not turn and quicken us, O God. That Thy people may rejoice in Thee.

O Lord, shew Thy mercy upon us. And grant us Thy salvation.

Vouchsafe, O Lord. To keep us this day without sin.

O Lord, have mercy upon us. Have mercy upon us.

O Lord, let Thy mercy lighten upon us. As our trust is in Thee. O Lord, arise, help us. And

deliver us for Thy Name's sake.

Turn us again, Thou Lord God
of Hosts. Shew the Light of Thy
Countenance, and we shall be
whole.

O Lord, hear our prayer. And let our crying come unto Thee.

- ¶ And after these Versicles shall follow the Collects.
- 1. The Collect of the Day, at discretion.

2. On Sundays and Festivals. Lord, in this early morning hour fulfil us with Thy mercy; that, rejoicing all the day long, we may take pleasure in Thy praises. Through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. S.B.

3. O Almighty and Everlasting God, direct all our actions according to the good pleasure of Thy Will: That in the Name of Thy Beloved Son we may have grace to bring forth plenteously the fruit of good works. Through the Same Thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. S.B.

2. On Festivals of Apostles.

O Almighty God, Who hast built Thy Church upon the foundation of the Apostles and Prophets, Jesus Christ Himself being the Head Corner-stone; Grant us so to be joined together in unity of Spirit by their doctrine, that we may be made an holy Temple acceptable unto Thee. Through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. P.B.

3. On all Festivals of Saints.

O Almighty God, Who hast knit together Thine elect in one communion and fellowship, in the mystical Body of Thy Son Christ our Lord: Grant us grace so to follow Thy blessed Saints in all virtuous and godly living, that we may come to those unspeakable joys which Thou hast prepared for them that unfeignedly love Thee. Through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. P.B.

2. On Minor Festivals and Com-

mon Week-days.

O Almighty Lord, and Everlasting God, vouchsafe, we beseech Thee, to direct, sanctify, and govern, both our hearts and bodies in the ways of Thy Laws and in the works of Thy Commandments: That through Thy most mighty protection, both here and ever, we may be preserved in body and soul. Through our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. Amen. Gr.

3. Direct us, O Lord, in all our doings with Thy most gracious favour, and further us with Thy continual help; That in all our works, begun, continued, and

ended in Thee, we may glorify Thy Holy Name, and finally by Thy mercy obtain everlasting life. Through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. Gr.

¶ After the third Collect may be said the Daily Memorials, appointed in the ancient Use of Salisbury to be said every Morning in thankful remembrance of the principal mysteries of Redemption.

Daily from Christmas to Epiphany.

Almighty God, Who hast given us Thy Only-Begotten Son to take our nature upon Him, and as at this time to be born of a pure Virgin: Grant that we being regenerate, and made Thy children by adoption and grace, may daily be renewed by Thy Holy Spirit. Through the Same our Lord Jesus Christ, Who liveth and reigneth with Thee and the Same Spirit, ever One God, world without end. Amen. P.B.

O God, Who makest us glad by the yearly Festival of our Redemption: Grant that as we do joyfully welcome Thine Only-Begotten Son as our Redeemer, so we may also without fear behold Him when He cometh to be our Judge, even Jesus Christ Thy Son our Lord, Who liveth and reigneth with Thee and the Holy Ghost, ever One God, world without end. Amen. G.

Daily at Morning Prayer in Lent and on other Fasting Days.

O Lord, Who for our sake didst fast forty days and forty nights: Give us grace to use such abstinence, that our flesh being subdued to the Spirit, we may ever obey Thy godly motions in righteousness and true holiness, to Thy honour and glory, Who livest and reignest with the Father and the Holy Ghost, One God, world without end. Amen. P.B.

At Evening Prayer, daily in Lent, all present joining with the Reader, as when the Confession or the Lord's Prayer is said.

Turn Thou us, O Good Lord, and so shall we be turned. Be

favourable, O Lord, Be favourable to Thy People, Who turn to Thee in weeping, fasting, and praying. For Thou art a merciful God, Full of compassion, long-suffering, and of great pity. Thou sparest when we deserve punishment, And in Thy wrath thinkest upon mercy. Spare Thy people, Good Lord, spare them, And let not Thine Heritage be brought to confusion. Hear us, O Lord, for Thy mercy is great, and after the multitude of Thy mercies look upon us; Through the merits and mediation of Thy Blessed Son, Jesus Christ our Lord. (Ash-Wednesday Service.)

Note.—If the Evening Prayer on p. 194 is used, this Prayer should be said immediately after the words 'Let us pray,' at the beginning of that form. If the Evening Prayer on page 199 is used, this preceding Prayer should be used in the place of the 'Prayer for pardon.'

Daily during the week before Easter.

Almighty God, we beseech Thee graciously to behold Thy Family, for which our Lord Jesus Christ was contented to be betrayed, and given up into the hands of wicked men, and to suffer death upon the Cross, Who now liveth and reigneth with Thee and the Holy Ghost, ever One God, world without end. Amen. G.

Daily from Easter-Day to Ascension-Day.

O God, Who makest us glad by the yearly Festival of the Resurrection of the Lord: Mercifully grant that we, who now do celebrate these joyous holydays en earth, may attain hereafter to eternal joys in Heaven. Through

the Same Thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. Gr.

Daily from Ascension-Day to Whitsun-Day.

Grant, we beseech Thee, Almighty God, that like as we do believe Thy Only-Begotten Son our Lord Jesus Christ to have ascended into the Heavens, so we may also in heart and mind thither ascend, and with Him continually dwell, Who liveth and reigneth with Thee and the Holy Ghost, One God, world without end. Amen. Gr.

#### Daily in Whitsun-Week.

God, Who didst teach the hearts of Thy faithful people by sending to them the Light of Thy Holy Spirit: Grant us by the Same Spirit to have a right judgement in all things, and evermore to rejoice in His holy comfort; Through the merits of Christ Jesus our Saviour, Who liveth and reigneth with Thee, in the Unity of the Same Spirit, One God, world without end. Amen. Gr.

Also daily in Whitsun-Week, for the spread of the Gospel.

O God, Who by the mystery which at this season we celebrate dost sanctify Thy Church in every people and nation: Spread, we beseech Thee, the gifts of Thy Spirit through the whole breadth of the world; and grant that the nations which were separated by the confusion of tongues, may by the Heavenly Gift be gathered again together into the one confession of Thy Name. Through Jesus Christ our Lord, Who liveth and reigneth with Thee, in the Unity of the Same Spirit, ever One God, world without end. Amen. G.

¶ Daily during the Four Ember weeks, i. e. The Third week in Advent, the First week in Lent, Whitsun-Week, and the Third week in September.

Almighty God, our Heavenly Father, Who hast purchased to Thyself an Universal Church by the Precious Blood of Thy dear Son: Mercifully look upon the same, and at this time so guide and govern the minds of Thy servants the Bishops and Pastors of Thy Flock, that they may lay hands suddenly on no man, but faithfully and wisely make choice of fit persons to serve in the Sacred Ministry of Thy Church. And to those which shall be ordained to any holy function give Thy grace and heavenly benediction; that both by their life and doctrine they may set forth Thy glory, and set forward the salvation of all men. Through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. P. B.

¶ After which shall follow one of the four following Prayers according to the Season.

The Prayers proper to the Four several Ember Weeks. From Bp. Cosin.

I. In the time of Advent.

Grant, we most humbly beseech Thee, O heavenly Father, that with holy Simeon and Anna, and all Thy devout servants, who waited for the consolation of Israel, we may at this time so serve Thee with fasting and prayer, that by the celebration of the Advent and Birth of our blessed Redeemer, we may with them be filled with true joy and consolation. Through the Same Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

II. For the Ember Week in Lent. O Lord Jesus Christ, the Son of God, and Saviour of the world, Who didst foretell to Thine Apostles, that at the time of Thy Sufferings, they should weep and lament while the world rejoiced, and that they should be sorrowful, but their sorrow should be turned into joy; Grant that during this time wherein Thou didst suffer, and wast afflicted with extreme sorrow and anguish for the sins of the whole world, we Thy unworthy servants may so weep and lament, and be sorrowful for our sins, the cause of all those Thy Sorrows and Sufferings. that on the day of Thy triumphant Resurrection, we may rejoice with that joy, which no man can take from us. Grant this, O blessed Lord and Saviour, Who didst die for our sins, and rise again for our justification, and now livest and reignest with the Father, in the unity of the Holy Ghost, world without end. Amen.

## III. For the Ember Week after Pentecost.

O Lord Jesus Christ, the Eternal Son of the Eternal Father, Who at the time of Thy glorious Ascension didst command Thine Apostles to tarry in Jerusalem, until they were endued with power from on high; and when, in obedience to this Thy commandment, they had there continued with one accord in prayer and supplication, didst, according to Thy promise, send down upon them the Holy Ghost the Comforter; Grant, we beseech Thee, that we Thy most humble servants, abiding in the unity of Thy holy Catholic Church, the mother of us all, and continually serving Thee as Thou hast commanded, may be evermore replenished with the heavenly grace of the Holy Ghost; through Thy precious merits and most powerful intercession, Who livest and reignest with the Father in the unity of the Same Spirit, ever world without end. Amen.

IV. For the Ember Week in September.

Almighty God, Who givest to all life, and breath, and all things; and bringest forth food out of the earth for the use of man; Keep us ever in mind, that this world, with all the glory of it, fadeth, and the fashion thereof passeth away; and grant that we may so use the fruits of the ground which Thou hast now given us, and all other Thy temporal blessings wherewith Thou crownest the year, that we abuse them not to the satisfying of our wanton and inordinate appetites; but may evermore serve Thee in Christian temperance and sobriety, as it becometh those who, living on earth, have their conversation in Heaven, that at the last we may be admitted into Thy heavenly Kingdom, where we shall never hunger or thirst again, being satisfied with the plenteousness of Thy house, and filled with the abundance of Thy pleasures for evermore. Grantthis, O heavenly Father, for Jesus Christ's sake our Lord. Amen.(Bp. Cosin.)

On the day when the Ordination is held for the Diocese.

Almighty God, the Giver of all good gifts, Who of Thy Divine Providence hast appointed divers orders in Thy Church; Give Thy grace, we humbly beseech Thee, to all those who are called to any office and administration in the same; and so replenish them with the truth of Thy doctrine, and endue them with innocency of life, that they may faithfully serve before Thee, to the glory of Thy great Name, and the benefit of Thy Holy Church. Through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. P.B.

After the Birth of a Child.
O Almighty God, we give Thee
humble thanks for that Thou hast

vouchsafed to deliver Thy servant from the great pain and peril of Child-birth; Grant, we beseech Thee, most merciful Father, that she, through Thy help, may both faithfully live, and walk according to Thy Will in this life present, and also may be partaker of everlasting glory in the life to come. Through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. P.B.

O Lord Jesus Christ, Who wast pleased for our sakes to be born as an infant, and hadst compassion upon little children, taking them up in Thine Arms and blessing them; Bless the child now born into a world of sin and misery, and grant that it may be brought unto Thee in the laver of Regeneration, to receive Thy Name and to be numbered among Thy people, Who livest and reignest with the Father and the Holy Spirit, One God, world without end. Amen. (Lord Nelson's Family Prayers.)

Before the Baptism of a Child. Almighty and Immortal God, the Aid of all that need, the Helper of all that flee to Thee for succour, the Life of them that believe and the Resurrection of the dead; we call upon Thee for the Infant this day to be baptized, that he, coming to Thy Holy Baptism, may receive remission of his sins by spiritual regeneration. Receive, him, O Lord, as Thou hast promised by Thy wellbeloved Son, saying, Ask and ye shall have; seek, and ye shall find; knock, and it shall be opened unto you. So give now unto us that ask; let us that seek find; open the gate unto us that knock; that this Infant may enjoy the everlasting benediction of Thy heavenly washing, and may come to the Eternal Kingdom which Thou hast promised by Christ our Lord. Amen. P.B.

After the Baptism of a Child.

Almighty and Everlasting God. Who renewest human nature beyond the dignity of its first Creation: We beseech Thee by Thy continual grace to preserve Thy heavenly gifts in him whom Thou hast this day vouchsafed to renew by the mystery of Regeneration. Through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. Gr. \*

Preserve, we beseech Thee, O Lord, in the new-born offspring of Thy heavenly Family, the Spirit of adoption Which Thou hast given: That he being renewed in body and soul, may offer unto Thee a pure and holy service. and, being guided by Thy continual protection in the way of salvation, may finally attain to everlasting life. Through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Before and after a Confirmation.

Almighty and Everliving God, we make our humble supplications unto Thee for Thy servants, and more especially for those of [this household, and of] this Parish, upon whom, (after the example of Thy holy Apostles,) the Bishop this day is about to lay [or has laid] his hands, to certify them by that sign of Thy favour and gracious goodness towards them.

Before Confirmation.

Strengthen them, we beseech Thee, O Lord, with the Holy Ghost the Comforter, and daily increase in them Thy manifold gifts of grace; the Spirit of wisdom and understanding; the Spirit of counsel and ghostly strength; the Spirit of know-ledge and true godliness: and fill them, O Lord, with the Spirit of Thy holy fear now and for Amen. ever.

After Confirmation.Let Thy Fatherly Hand, we beseech Thee, ever be over them;

let Thy Holy Spirit ever be with them; and so lead them in the knowledge and obedience of Thy word, that in the end they may obtain Everlasting Life. Through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. P.B.

Before Holy Communion.

Blessed Jesus, Who art about to come to us Thy unworthy servants in the Blessed Sacrament of Thy Body and Blood, prepare our hearts, we beseech Thee, for Thyself.

Grant us that repentance for our past sins,-that faith in the Atonement made for them by Thee upon the Cross,—that full purpose of amendment of life,that perfect love to Thee and to all men, which shall fit us to

receive Thee.

Lord, we are not worthy that Thou shouldest come under our roof, much less that we should receive Thee into ourselves; but since Thou didst not disdain to be laid in a manger amidst unclean beasts, so vouchsafe to enter into our souls and bodies, unclean though they be through many sins and defilements.

Lord, come to us that Thou mayest cleanse us.

Lord, come to us that Thou mayest heal us.

Lord, come to us that Thou

mayest strengthen us.

And grant that having received Thee, we may never be separated from Thee by our sins, but may continue Thine for ever, till we see Thee face to face in Thy heavenly Kingdom, where, with the Father and the Holy Ghost, Thou livest and reignest, ever One God. world without end. Amen.

After Holy Communion. We praise Thee, O Lord, Holy Father, Almighty Everlasting God, for all the blessings wherewith Thou hast blessed us in heavenly things in Christ, for our new birth in Baptism, for the grace of Confirmation, for Thy Holy Word, for Thy duly appointed Ministers, and for all the spiritual gifts whereof we are made partakers in Thy Holy Catholic Church.

More especially do we yield Thee hearty thanks for that Thou dost vouchsafe to feed our souls with the Divine Food of the most blessed Body and Blood of Thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord. And we beseech Thee, O Lord, that Thou wouldest evermore vouchsafe unto us, who have this day partaken of the Heavenly Gift, both the desire to live a holy and religious life, and also strength and power faithfully to fulfil the same. Through the Same Thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

When any of the Family is seriously ill.

O Gracious Father, Who chastenest us of Thy great mercy, for our good, and not for our destruction, have mercy upon Thy servant N. whom it has pleased Thee to affliot with sickness.

Strengthen him, O Lord, to bear it patiently, and give him grace to lift up his heart to Thee, and to find Thee in his trial. O be Thou with him and give him patience, and faith, and the spirit of prayer, and of repentance, and of hope. Help him to set his affections upon things above, and so to meditate upon Thee and upon Thy goodness, that this his affliction may draw him closer and closer unto Thee. In all his pains and weakness enable him evermore to turn to Thee, and in Thee to find health and refreshment for his soul.

Restore him, if it please Thee, to his bodily health; and if it be Thy Will to take him to Thyself, prepare him for his change, and receive him at last into that

blessed abode where Saints departed dwell with their Redeemer and their Lord. Through the Same Thy Son our Saviour Jesus Christ. Amen. (Rev. C. Marriott.)

After a recovery from a dangerous sickness.

O Lord God, in Whose hand is the soul of every living thing, and the breath of all mankind; Give this Thy servant grace holily to spend in Thy service that life which Thou hast now so mercifully prolonged. Grant that he may consecrate his whole life to Thee; and so live henceforth in Thy fear, that he may at last die at peace with all the world and with Thee, O Holy Father, Who with the Son and the Holy Ghost livest and reignest, ever One God, world without end. Amen. (Visitatio Infirmorum.)

O Most Mighty and Gracious God, Who hast chastened and corrected this Thy servant, but hast not given him over unto death: For these and all other Thy great mercies, kindle in his heart a lively thankfulness, and in his soul the most sincere and holy love. Let him not forget from what a perilous condition Thou hast released him; but give him such a due sense of all Thy mercies that his heart may be unfeignedly thankful, and that he may show forth Thy praise not only with his lips but in his life; by giving up himself to Thy service, and by walking before Thee in holiness and righteousness all his days. Through Jesus Christ our Lord, to Whom with Thee and the Holy Ghost be all honour and glory, world without end. Amen. (Ibid.)

After the death of a Child.

O Almighty and Everlasting God, the Lover of holiness and purity, Who hast been graciously pleased to call the soul of a Child of this family into Thine heavenly Kingdom; So vouchsafe, O Blessed Saviour, to deal mercifully with us who survive, that, through the merits of Thy most sacred Passion, Thou mayest cause us ever to rejoice with all Thy Blessed Saints and Thine Elect, Who livest and reignest with the Father, in the Unity of the Holy Spirit, One God, world without end. Amen. (Visitatio Infirmorum)

O Lord Jesu Christ, Who didst restore the widow's son to his weeping mother, and the daughter of the ruler of the synagogue to her lamenting parents: We beseech Thee to have compassion on the [Father and Mother] of the child whom Thou hast now called to his Heavenly Father's King-Make them know and feel. O Lord God, that he is committed to Thy merciful arms, and ever beholdeth Thy blissful presence. Let this assurance assuage their tears, and mitigate their present sorrow. And grant, O Lord, that as they have experienced the blessing Thou gavest them in this child, and now feel the affliction Thou hast laid upon them, in taking him from them; so they may know assuredly that Thou wilt comfort them by restoring him to them in Thine Everlasting Kingdom; to which vouchsafe to conduct them by Thy merits, O Holy and most merciful Saviour, Who livest and reignest with the Father and the Holy Ghost, ever One God, world without end. Amen. Ibid.

After the death of an adult member of the Family.

O Almighty God, Who knowest the weakness and frailty of our nature: We beseech Thee to give unto us Thy servants, whom Thou hast stricken with this sad visitation, such a supply of the graces of Thy Holy Spirit as may enable us

to bear it with that humility, resignation, and submission to Thy Divine Will, which become our Christian Profession; that so no repining thoughts may find place in our hearts. Grant that we may not sorrow as those who have no hope. Let not our grief exceed the bounds of reason or religion; but so temper it, we beseech Thee, with the consola-tions of Thy Holy Spirit, that whatever we may want in outward comfort, we may find made up to us in the inward joys of a good conscience, and a sure and certain Christian faith and hope.

Make, we beseech Thee, the affliction wherewith Thou chastenest us a means of drawing us nearer unto Thyself, and bless it to the good of our souls and our eternal welfare. Help us to search out, and stedfastly to set ourselves to remove all our offences against Thee, and to amend our lives. Teach us to set our affections on things above, not on things on the earth, but on those joys which never fade, the pleasures that are at Thy Right Hand for evermore, where all Thy Redeemed shall be gathered into Thy Heavenly Kingdom to go no more out for ever.

And so fit and prepare us for the great account which we must one day give, that when the time of our appointed change shall come, we may look up unto Thee with joy and comfort, and may at last be received, together with him whom Thou hast now taken from us, and with all that are near and dear to us, into that place of rest and peace where Thou shalt Thyself wipe off all tears from off all faces, and where all our troubles and sorrows shall have an end.

Grant this, O Heavenly Father, for Jesus Christ's sake, our only Mediator and Redeemer. Amen.

## Instructions concerning Sickness.

The first duty of a Christian visited with sickness is to resign himself absolutely to the Will of our Father Which is in Heaven, leaving the issue entirely in His Hands. Received in this spirit, and as a call to more serious thought, and an opportunity, through the cessation of ordinary occupations, of more frequent and closer communion with God, sickness may be the means of the greatest spiritual blessings.

In time of sickness we ought, except so far as pain and weakness are a real hindrance, to keep up the same habits of prayer and devotion as we are accustomed to in health. Our enforced leisure may even enable us to devote more time than in health to religious meditation, prayer, and the reading of good books. And we ought to endeavour to offer up our daily sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving in union with the Church at large, from whose public worship we are now debarred, by using the daily Psalms and Second Lessons. which another may read to us when we are ourselves too weak to

do so. On Fridays a sick person ought to find especial profit in devoutly following the successive stages of our Redeemer's Passion by the recitation of at least the "Memorials of the Passion," as now the proper hours as may be.

Next, we ought, in the first beginnings of more than ordinary sickness, to inform our Clergyman of our condition, that we may have the benefit of his advice and prayers and spiritual ministrations, and may request through him a share in the public Intercessions offered in the Church for all that are afflicted in mind, body, or estate.

We ought not to allow more than a month to elapse without our receiving the Holy Communion, which our Parish Priest will gladly administer to us in private, at regular intervals, so long as we are debarred from the Public Worship of the Church.

For special devotions in time of sickness, see "The Churchman's Guide to Faith and Piety," or the following may be used.

## Considerations and Prayers, in the Bieb of Sickness and Beath.

(From Bishop Wilson's "Sacra Privata.")

Sickness, if you consider it as painful to nature, and not as a favour from God, will be a torment to you. To make it really comfortable, believe it to be ordered by a loving Father, a wise Physician; that it is the effect of His mercy for our salvation; that, being fastened to the Cross, you become dearer

to God, as being most like His Own Son. God will loose you when it is best for you.

Consider well, that life is given and continued for no other end but to glorify God in working out our own salvation.

This is the comfort of all God's servants: if He gives them opportunities of renewing their vows and a will to do them; if He accepts their alms and their good deeds, that is, gives them a heart to do such; if He touches their hearts with a sense of their unworthiness; if He opens their ear to discipline; if He chastises them with His Holy Spirit, &c.: all these are reasons for a Christian to hope that these graces are not in vain, but that God will crown them with pardon, favour, and happiness eternal.

Now is the time in which we are to choose where and what we are to be to all eternity; there is therefore no time to be lost to

make this choice.

Death is inevitable; the time uncertain; the judgment which follows without appeal; and followed by an eternity of happiness or misery.

If we consider death as the night of that day which is given us to work in, in which to work out our salvation; and that when the night is come, no man can work; how frightful must death be to such as are not prepared for it! And if we consider it as the beginning of eternity, it is still more dreadful.

The sting of death is sin; therefore, an holy life is the only cure for the fear of death. We ought to fear sin more than death, because death cannot hurt us but by sin.

As Christianity alone can take from us the love of life, so it alone can free us from the fear of death.

A person whose life is full of good works, whose heart is devoted to God, whose faith and hope are pure and sincere, will never be surprised by death.

If we desire that our death should, like that of Jesus Christ, be a sacrifice of love and obedience, we must take care to make our life so too. Happy that soul which death finds rich, not in gold, furniture, learning, reputation, or barren purposes and desires, but in good works.

It is purely for want of faith that we tremble at the approach of our Deliverer; which is to destroy in us the reign of sin, and instate us in that of glory.

A Christian should not look upon death with anxiety, but with the satisfaction of a good servant who waits with impatience for his Master's return, in hopes of being approved of.

Let us resign up ourselves to God as to the time and the manner in which it shall please Him to bring our lives to an end, praying only that it may be to His Glory, and our salvation.

O may the constant expectation of that happy day, and a faith and hope full of immortality, sweeten all the troubles of this mortal life!

What a wise man then when he comes to die would wish he had done, that he ought to do forthwith, for death is ever at hand, and the consequences of a surprise most dreadful.

He will then wish, if he has not done it, with all his soul:

1. That he had made a just and Christian settlement of his worldly concerns; so as not to be distracted with the cares of this world, when all his thoughts should be upon another.

2 That he had made his peace with God by a timely repentance.

That he had faithfully lived to God's glory in discharging the duties of his calling.

4. That he had weaned his affections from things temporal, and loosened the ties which fasten us to the world.

5. That, to this end, he had crucified the flesh with its affec-

tions and lusts: so that, being weary of this life, he might be more desirous of a better.

6. That by acts of justice, mercy, charity, and alms, he may be entitled to the mercy of God when he will stand most in need of it, in the hour of death, and at the Day of Judgment.

7. That he had got such habits of patience and resignation to the Will of God, during his health, as may render Death with all the train of miseries leading to it, less frightful and amazing.

8. That by a constant practice

of devotion preparatory to death, he had learned what to pray for, what to hope for, what to depend

on, in his last sickness.

Prayers in preparation for sickness and death.

May Almighty God, Who alone can do it, effectually convince me of the vanity of all that is desirable in this present life, that I may not, like an unbeliever, look for happiness here.

Give me, O Lord, a perfect indifference for the world, its profits, pleasures, honours, fame, and all its idols.

Represent Thyself unto me as my true happiness, that I may love Thee with all my heart and mind and soul and strength: so that when I am called out of this world, I may rejoice in hope of going to the Paradise of God, where the souls of the faithful enjoy rest and felicity, in hopes of a blessed Resurrection, through

Jesus Christ our Saviour. Amen. May the thoughts of death, and of what must follow, by the grace of God, mortify in me all carnal security, and fondness for this world and all that is in it, the lust of the flesh, the lust of the eye, and the pride of life. And, O that I may make my calling and election sure, that I may

die in peace, and rest in Paradise, in hopes of a blessed Resurrection, and a favourable judgment

at the great Day.

And may the consideration of a judgment to come oblige me to a sincere holiness, make me careful of my thoughts, designs, ends, and actions, oblige me to try and examine, and to judge myself, that I may prevent a severe judgment of God, by prayers, by tears, by alms, by mortifications, and all other expressions of a true repentance, that in the day of visitation I may find mercy.

Give me true repentance for all the errors of my life past, and steadfast faith in Thy Son Jesus Christ; that my sins may be done away by Thy mercy, and my pardon sealed in Heaven, before I go hence, and be no more seen.

Grant, O Lord, that the end of my life may be truly Christian; without sin, without shame, and if it so please Thee, without pain.

Apply to my soul in that hour all the wholesome medicines of Thy Son's Passion, Death, and Resurrection, against the powers of Satan, against all unreasonable fears and despair, and ease my fearful conscience.

And when I shall not be able to pray for myself, hear the prayers of Thy Church for me, and for all in my condition, for Thy Son our Lord Jesus Christ's sake. Amen.

Blessed Jesus, Who pleasedst not Thyself, but tookest upon Thee the form of a servant to teach mankind the great duty and blessing of self-denial; Assist me to follow Thy commands and Thy holy example, though I should be obliged to lose anything as dear as a right hand or a right eye.

Give me resolution to deny my inclinations for the good things of

this world, even while I may command them: to subdue my corrupt affections, and to take revenge upon myself-for my intemperance, by mortification; for mis-spending my time, by retirement: for the many errors of my tongue, by silence; for my great neglect of duty, by a laborious diligence for the time to come; and for all the sins of my life, by a deep humiliation, patiently submitting to all the troubles with which Thou shalt think fit to exercise or punish me; so that being effectually weaned from this world, and weary of its corruptions, I may be satisfied to repose myself in the grave, in hopes of a better life, through Thy mercy and merits, O Lord Jesus Christ. Amen.

Fortify my soul, Blessed Jesus, with the same spirit of submission with which Thou underwentest the death of the Cross, that I may receive all events with resignation to the Will of God; that I may receive troubles, afflictions, disappointments, sickness, and death itself, without amazement; these being the appointment of Thy justice for the punishment of sin, and of Thy mercy for the salvation of sinners.

Grant, O Lord, that I may not be of the number of those who dread Thy Coming, who cannot but with regret submit to the necessity of dying, and who have neglected to prepare for death till the last hour.

Rather give me, O Lord, that desire and earnest longing, which I ought to have, for that happy moment which is to release me from this state of banishment, and translate me to a better place.

And grant, O Lord, that though my outward man decay daily, yet that my inward man may grow and increase in piety and virtue unto the day of my death.

O Blessed Advocate, Who by Thy Death hast destroyed death, Thou art able to save them for ever who come unto God by Thee. Seeing Thou ever livest to make intercession for us, I put my cause into Thy Hands; let Thy power defend me; Thy Blood and Merits plead for me, supply all the defects of my repentance, and procure for me a full discharge of all my sins before I die; and by Thy mighty grace confirm and strengthen me in all goodness during the remainder of my life, that my death may be a blessing to me, and that I may find mercy at the great day.

O Blessed Jesu, support my spirit when I come to die with this comfortable promise, "This day shalt thou be with Me in Paradise."

We indeed suffer justly the sentence of death. O Thou, Who didst nothing amiss, and yet didst suffer for me, remember me, O Lord, now that Thou art in Thy Kingdom.

O Lord Jesus, Who hast redeemed us with Thy Precious Blood, Who lovedst me, and gavest Thyself for me, make me to be numbered with Thy Saints in Glory Everlasting. For Thy most tender mercy's sake. Amen. (From Bishop Wilson's "Sacra Privata."\*)

Amen. (Bp. Cosin's Devotions.\*)

A Prayer for a Sick Person.

O merciful and righteous Lord, the God of health and of sickness, of life and of death, I most unfeignedly acknowledge that my great abuse of those many days of strength and welfare, which Thou hast afforded me, hath most justly deserved Thy present visitation. I desire, O Lord, humbly to accept of this punishment of mine iniquity, and to bear the indignation of the Lord, because I have sinned against Him.

And, O Thou most merciful

Father, Who designest not the ruin, but the amendment of those whom Thou scourgest, I beseech Thee by Thy grace so to sanctify this correction of Thine to me, that this sickness of my body may be a means of health to my soul; make me diligent to search my heart, and do Thou, O Lord, enable me to discover every accursed thing, how closely soever concealed there, that by the removal thereof. I may make way for the removal of this punish-Heal my soul, O Lord, which hath sinned against Thee; and then, if it be Thy blessed will, heal my body also: restore the voice of joy and health unto my dwelling, that I may live to praise Thee, and to bring forth fruits of repentance.

But if in Thy wisdom Thou hast otherwise disposed, if Thou hast determined that this sickness shall be unto death. I beseech Thee to fit and prepare me for give me that sincere and earnest repentance, to which Thou hast promised mercy and pardon: wean my heart from the world, and all its fading vanities, and make me to gasp and pant after those more excellent and durable joys, which are at Thy Right Hand for ever. Lord, lift Thou up the Light of Thy Countenance upon me, and in all the pains of my body, in all the agonies of my spirit, let Thy comforts refresh my soul, and enable me patiently to wait till my change come.

And grant, O Lord, that when my earthly house of this tabernacle is dissolved, I may have a building of God, an house not made with hands, eternal in the Heavens; and that for His sake, Who by His Precious Blood hath purchased it for me, even Jesus Christ Thy blessed Son our Lord. Amen.

# A Prayer at the Approach of Death.

O eternal and ever-living God, Who first breathedst into man the breath of life, and when Thou takest away that breath he dies and is turned again to his dust; look with compassion on me Thy poor creature who am now drawing near the gates of death, and, which is infinitely more terrible, the bar of judgment. Lord, my own heart condemns me, and Thou art infinitely greater than my heart, and knowest all things. The sins I know and remember, fill me with horror; but there are also multitudes of others, which I either observed not at the time. or have since carelessly forgot, which are all present to Thee. Thou settest my misdeeds before Thee, and my secret sins in the Light of Thy Countenance; and to what a mountainous heap must the provocation of so many years arise? how long shall one so ungodly stand in Thy Judgment, or such a sinner in the congregation of the righteous? and to add yet more to my terror, my very repentance, I fear, will not abide the trial; my frequent relapses heretofore, have sufficiently witnessed the unsincerity of my past resolutions. And then, O Lord, what can secure me that my present dislikes of my sins are not rather the effects of my amazing danger than of any real change? And, O Lord, I know Thou art not mocked, nor wilt accept of anything that is not perfectly sincere. O Lord, when v 2

I consider this, fearfulness and trembling come upon me, and an horrible dread overwhelmeth me; my flesh trembleth for fear of Thee, and my heart is wounded within me.

But, O Lord, one deep calleth upon another, the depth of my misery upon the depth of Thy mercy: Lord, save now, or I perish eternally. O Thou Who willest not that any should perish, but that all should come to repentance, bring me, I beseech Thee, though thus late, to a sincere repentance, such as Thou wilt accept, Who triest the heart. Create in me, O God, a clean heart, and renew a right spirit within me. Lord, one day is with Thee as a thousand years; O let Thy mighty Spirit work in me now in this my last day, whatsoever Thou seest wanting to fit me for Thy mercy and acceptance. Give me a perfect and entire hatred of my sins, and enable me to present Thee with that sacrifice of a broken and contrite heart, which Thou hast promised not to despise; that by this I may be made capable of that atonement which Thy dear Son hath by the more excellent oblation of Himself made for all repenting sinners. He is the propitiation for our sins, He was wounded for our transgressions. He was bruised for our iniquities, the chastisement of our peace was on Him; O heal me by His stripes, and let the cry of His Blood drown the clamour of my sins. I am indeed a child of wrath, but He is the Son of Thy love; for His sake spare me, O Lord, spare Thy creature, whom He hath redeemed with His most precious Blood, and be not angry with me In His Wounds, O for ever. Lord, I take sanctuary, O let not Thy vengeance pursue me to this city of refuge: my soul hangeth upon Him, O let me not perish

with a Jesus, with a Saviour in my arms.

By His Agony and Bloody Sweat; by His Cross and Passion, by all He did and suffered for sinners, good Lord, deliver me; deliver me, I beseech Thee, from the wages of my sins, Thy wrath and everlasting damnation, in this time of my tribulation, in the hour of death, and in the day of judgment.

Hear me, O Lord, hear me, and do not now repay my former neglects of Thy calls, by refusing to answer me in this time of my greatest need. Lord, there is but a step between me and death. O let not my sun go down upon Thy wrath, but seal my pardon before I go hence and be no more Thy loving-kindness is better than life itself, O let me have that in exchange, and I shall most gladly lay down this mortal life.

Lord, Thou knowest all my desire, and my groaning is not hid from Thee; deal Thou with me, O Lord, according to Thy Name, for sweet is Thy mercy; take away the sting of death, the guilt of my sins, and then though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil; I will lay me down in peace, and Lord, when I awake up, let me be satisfied with Thy presence in Thy Glory. this, merciful God, for His sake Who is both the Redeemer and Mediator of sinners, even Jesus Christ Thy blessed Son our Lord. Amen.

Ejaculations to be used as opportunity, and the sick person's strength, permit.

O Lord, of whom may I seek for succour but of Thee, Who for my sins art justly displeased? Yet, O Lord God most holy, O Lord most mighty, O holy and

most merciful Saviour, deliver me not into the bitter pains of eternal death.

Thou knowest, Lord, the secrets of my heart, shut not Thy merciful ears to my prayer, but spare me, O Lord most holy, O God most mighty, O holy and merciful Saviour, Thou most worthy Judge eternal, suffer me not at my last hour for any pains of death to fall from Thee.

Father, I have sinned against heaven and before Thee, and am not worthy to be called Thy child; yet, O Lord, do not Thou cast off the bowels and compassions of a Father; but even as a Father pitieth his own children, so be

Thou merciful unto me.

Lord, the Prince of this world cometh, O let him have nothing in me, but as he accuseth, do Thou absolve; he lays many and grievous things to my charge, which he can too well prove; I have nothing to say for myself, do Thou answer for me, O Lord my God.

O Lord, I am clothed with filthy garments, and Satan stands at my right hand to resist me;
O be Thou pleased to rebuke him, and pluck me as a brand out of the fire; cause mine iniquities to pass from me, and clothe me with the righteousness of Thy

Son.

O my God, I know that no unclean thing can enter into Thy Kingdom, and I am nothing but pollution, my very righteousnesses are as filthy rags. O wash me and make me white in the Blood of the Lamb, that so I may be fit to stand before Thy Throne.

Lord, the snares of death compass me round about, O let not the pains of hell also take hold upon me, but though I find trouble and heaviness, yet, O Lord, I beseech Thee, deliver my soul.

O dear Jesus, Who hast bought me with the precious price of Thine own Blood; challenge now Thy purchase, and let not the malice of hell pluck me out of Thy hand.

O blessed High Priest, Who art able to save them to the utmost who come unto God by Thee, save me, I beseech Thee, who have no hope, but in Thy merits

and intercession.

O God, I confess I have defaced that image of Thine Thou didst imprint upon my soul; yet, O Thou faithful Creator, have pity

on Thy creature.

O Jesu, I have by my many and grievous sins crucified Thee afresh, yet Thou Who prayedst for Thy persecutors, intercede for me also, and suffer not, O my Redeemer, my soul (the price of

Thy Blood) to perish.

O Spirit of grace, I have by my grievous offences done despite to Thee; yet, O blessed Comforter. though I have often grieved Thee, be Thou pleased to succour and relieve me, and say unto my soul, I am Thy Salvation.

Mine eyes look unto Thee, O Lord, in Thee is my trust, O cast

not out my soul.

O Lord, in Thee have I trusted, let me never be confounded.

O blessed Lord, Who scourgest every son whom Thou receivest, let me not be weary of Thy correction, but give me such a perfect subjection to Thee the Father of spirits, that this chastisement may be for my profit, that I may thereby be partaker of Thy holiness.

O Thou Captain of my salvation, Who wert made perfect by sufferings, sanctify to me all the pains of body, all the terrors of mind, which Thou shalt permit to fall upon me.

Lord, my sins have deserved eternal torments, make me cheerfully and thankfully to bear my present pains, chasten me as Thou pleasest here, that I may not be condemned with the world.

Lord, the waters are come in even unto my soul. O let Thy Spirit move upon these waters, and make them like the pool of Bethesda, that they may cure whatsoever spiritual disease Thou discernest in me.

O Christ, Who first sufferedst many and grievous things, and then enteredst into Thy glory, make me so to suffer with Thee, that I may also be glorified with Thee.

O dear Jesus, Who humblest Thyself to the death of the Cross for me, let that death of Thine sweeten the bitterness of mine.

When Thou hadst overcome the sharpness of death, Thou didst open the Kingdom of Heaven to all believers.

I believe that Thou shalt come to be my Judge.

I pray Thee, therefore, help Thy servant whom Thou hast redeemed with Thy Precious Blood.

Make me to be numbered with Thy Saints in Glory Everlasting.

Thou art the Resurrection and the Life, he that believeth in Thee, though he were dead, yet shall he live: Lord, I believe, help Thou my unbelief.

My flesh and my heart faileth, but God is the strength of my heart, and my portion for ever.

I desire to be dissolved, and to be with Christ, which is far better: Lord, I groan, earnestly desiring to be clothed upon with the house which is from heaven.

I desire to put off this my tabernacle. Obe Thou pleased to receive me into everlasting habitations.

Bring my soul out of prison, that I may give thanks unto Thy Name.

I cannot here attend one minute to Thy service without distraction, O take me up to stand before Thy Throne, where I shall serve Thee day and night.

I am here in heaviness through many tribulations, O receive me into that place of rest, where all tears shall be wiped from my eyes, where there shall be no more death, nor sorrow, nor crying, nor pain.

I am here in the state of banishment and absence from the Lord, O take me where I shall for ever behold Thy Face, and follow the Lamb whithersoever He goeth.

O blessed Jesu, Who hast loved me, and washed me from my sins in Thine own Blood, receive my soul.

Into Thy Hands I commend my spirit, for Thou hast redeemed me, O Lord, Thou God of truth. Come, Lord Jesu, come quickly.

The Blessing.

The Almighty Lord, Who is a most strong tower to them that put their trust in Him, to Whom all things in heaven, in earth, and under the earth, do bow and obey, be now and evermore my defence; and make me know and feel, that there is no other Name under heaven given to me, in Whom and through Whom I may receive health or salvation, but only the Name of our Lord Jesus Christ. Amen.

## Selected Passages of Soly Scripture, for the Comfort of the Sick and Dying.

"Fear not, little flock, for it is your Father's good pleasure to give you the Kingdom."

"The Son of Man came to save

that which was lost."

"His Name is JESUS, for He shall save His people from their sins."

"He bare our sins in His own

body on the tree."

"God so loved the world, that He gave His Only-Begotten Son, that whosever believeth in Him should not perish but have everlasting Life. For God sent not His Son into the world to condemn the world; but that the world through Him might be saved. He that believeth on Him is not condemned. He that believeth on the Son of God hath everlasting Life."

JESUS says, "Whose eateth My Flesh and drinketh My Blood hath eternal Life, and I will raise Him up at the Last Day. For My Flesh is Meat indeed, and My Blood is Drink indeed. He that eateth My Flesh and drinketh My Blood dwelleth in Me, and I in him. As the Living Father hath sent Me and I live by the Father, so he that eateth Me even he shall live by Me. This is that Bread which came down from Heaven, he that eateth of this Bread shall live for ever."

"I am come a Light unto the world, that whoseever believeth on Me should not abide in darkness."

"Come unto Me, all ye that labour and are heavy laden, and I will refresh you." "Him that cometh unto Me I will in no wise cast out."

"Let not your heart be troubled: ye believe in God, believe also in Me. In My Father's House are many mansions. I go to prepare a place for you. And I will come again, and receive you unto Myself, that where I am ye may be also."

"Because I live, ye shall live

also."

"Peace I leave with you, My peace I give unto you: not as the world giveth give I unto you. Let not your heart be troubled neither let it be afraid."

"As My Father hath loved Me,

so have I loved you."

"Your sorrow shall be turned into joy. Ye now have sorrow, but I will see you again, and your heart shall rejoice, and your joy no man taketh from you."

"The Father Himself loveth you, because ye have loved Me, and have believed that I came out

from God."

JESUS prayed for us, and said "Father, I will that they whom Thou hast given Me, be with Me, where I am: that they may behold My glory, which Thou hast given Me: for Thou lovedst Me before the foundation of the world."

"Through His Name, whoseever believeth in Him shall receive

remission of sins."

"Through Him is preached unto us forgiveness of sins, and by Him all that believe are justified from all things."

"Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, and thou shalt be saved." "We are justified freely by His grace, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus; Whom God hath set forth to be a Propitiation through faith in His Blood, to declare His righteousness for the remission of sins that are past, through the forbearance of God; that God might be just, and the justifier of him which believeth in Jesus."

"Being justified by faith we have peace with God through our

Lord Jesus Christ."

"God commendeth His love toward us, in that, while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us. Much more then being now justified by His Blood, we shall be saved from wrath through Him.

"For if, when we were enemies, we were reconciled to God by the Death of His Son, much more, being reconciled, we shall be saved by His Life. And not only so, but we also joy in God through our Lord Jesus Christ, by Whom we have now received the atonement."

(See also the whole of the Eighth chapter of St. Paul to the Romans.)

"God hath reconciled us to Himself by Jesus Christ. God was in Christ reconciling the world unto Himself, not imputing their trespasses unto them. For He hath made Him to be sin for us Who knew no sin, that we might be made the righteousness of God in Him."

Every sincere Christian may say of himself, as Saint Paul said, "I live by the faith of the Son of God, who loved me, and GAVE HIMSELF FOR ME."

"We are all the Children of God by faith in Christ Jesus."

"He hath made us accepted in the Beloved, in Whom we have redemption through His Blood, the forgiveness of sins, according to the riches of His grace."

"In Christ Jesus we who were

sometime far off are made nigh by the Blood of Christ. For He is our Peace."

"He is made unto us wisdom and righteousness and sanctifica-

tion and redemption."

"We look for the Saviour, the Lord Jesus Christ, Who shall change our vile body, that it may be fashioned like unto His glorious Body, according to the mighty working whereby He is able even to subdue all things unto Himself."

Let us give thanks "unto the Father, Who hath made us meet to be partakers of the inheritance of the Saints in light; Who hath delivered us from the power of Darkness, and hath translated us into the Kingdom of His Dear Son, in Whom we have redemption through His Blood, even the forgiveness of sins."

"Our life is hid with Christ in God. When Christ, Who is our Life, shall appear, then shall we also appear with Him in Glory."

"We wait for His Son from Heaven, Whom He raised from the dead, even Jesus, Who delivered us from the wrath to come."

"God hath not appointed us to wrath, but to obtain salvation by our Lord Jesus Christ, Who died for us, that, whether we wake or sleep, we should live together with Him."

"This is a faithful saying, and worthy of all acceptation, that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners."

"Our Saviour Jesus Christ hath abolished death, and brought life and immortality to light through the Gospel."

"It is a faithful saying, For if we be dead with Him, we shall also live with Him: if we suffer we shall also reign with Him."

Jesus, by the grace of God, did "taste death for every man.

For it became Him, for Whom are all things and by Whom are all things, in bringing many sons unto glory, to make the Captain of their salvation perfect through sufferings. For both He that sanctifieth and they who are sanctified are all of one: which cause He is not ashamed to call them brethren. much then as the children are partakers of flesh and blood He also Himself likewise took part of the same; that through death He might destroy him that had the power of death, that is, the devil; and deliver them who through fear of death were all their life-time subject to bondage."

"Seeing then that we have a great High Priest, that is passed into the Heavens, Jesus the Son of God, let us hold fast our profession. For we have not an High Priest that cannot be touched with the feeling of our infirmities; but was in all points tempted like as we are, yet without sin. Let us therefore come boldly unto the Throne of grace, that we may obtain mercy, and find grace to help in time of need."

"He is able to save them to the uttermost that come unto God by Him, seeing He ever liveth to make intercession for them."

"By His Own Blood He entered in once into the Holy Place, having obtained Eternal Redemption for us."

"My son, despise not the chastening of the Lord, nor faint when thou art rebuked of Him: for whom the Lord loveth He chasteneth, and scourgeth every son whom He receiveth."

"If ye endure chastening, God dealeth with you as with sons; for what son is he whom the Father chasteneth not? But if ye be without chastisement, whereof all are partakers, then are ye bastards, and not sons. Further-

more we have had fathers of our flesh which corrected us, and we gave them reverence: shall we not much rather be in subjection to the Father of Spirits, and live? For they verily for a few days chastened us after their own pleasure; but He for our profit, that we might be partakers of His holiness. Now no chastening for the present seemeth to be joyous, but grievous: nevertheless afterward it yieldeth the peaceable fruit of righteousness unto them that are exercised thereby."

"My brethren, count it all joy when ye fall into divers temptations; knowing this, that the trying of your faith worketh patience. But let patience have her perfect work, that ye may be perfect and entire, wanting nothing. . . Blessed is the man that endureth temptation; for when he is tried, he shall receive the crown of life, which the Lord hath promised to them that love Him."

"Take, my brethren, the Prophets, who have spoken in the Name of the Lord, for an example of suffering affliction, and of patience. Behold, we count them happy which endure. Ye have heard of the patience of Job, and have seen the end of the Lord; that the Lord is very pitiful and of tender mercy. . . . Is any among you afflicted? Let him pray. Is any merry? Let him sing psalms. Is any sick among you? Let him call for the Elders of the Church; and let them pray over him, anointing him with oil in the Name of the Lord; and the prayer of faith shall save the sick, and the Lord shall raise him up; and if he have committed sins, they shall be forgiven him. Confess your faults one to another, and pray for one another, that ye may be healed. The effectual

fervent prayer of a righteous man availeth much."

"Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, Which according to His abundant mercy hath begotten us again unto a lively hope by the Resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, to an inheritance incorruptible, and undefiled, and that fadeth not away, reserved in Heaven for you. who are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation ready to be revealed in the last time. Wherein ye greatly rejoice, though now for a season, if need be, ye are in heaviness through manifold temptations; that the trial of your faith, being much more precious than of gold which perisheth, though it be tried with fire, might be found unto praise and honour and glory at the Appearing of Jesus Christ: Whom having not seen ye love; in Whom, though now ye see Him not, yet believing, ye rejoice with joy unspeakable and full of glory; receiving the end of your faith, even the salvation of your souls."

"Be clothed with humility: for God resisteth the proud, and giveth grace to the humble. Humble yourselves therefore under the mighty hand of God, that He may exalt you in due time; casting all your care upon Him, for He careth for you."

"If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness."

"If any man sin, we have an Advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the Righteous, and He is the Propitiation for our sins."

"Behold, what manner of love the Father hath bestowed upon us, that we should be called the sons of God." "Beloved, now are we the sons of God, and it doth not yet appear what we shall be: but we know that when He shall appear, we shall be like Him; for we shall see Him as He is. And every man that hath this hope in Him purifieth himself even as He is pure."

"Hereby perceive we the love of God, because He laid down His

Life for us."

"In this was manifested the love of God towards us, because He sent His Only-Begotten Son into the world, that we might live through Him. Herein is love, not that we loved God, but that He loved us, and sent His Son to be the Propitiation for our sins. Beloved, if God so loved us we ought also to love one another."

Here follow the glorious promises of our Lord and only Saviour JESUS CHRIST to them that overcome in the power of His grace, and are faithful unto the death, revealed in vision to S. John in Patmos, for the comfort of Christ's Church militant here in earth.

"He that hath an ear let him hear what the Spirit saith to the Churches."

I. "To him that overcometh will I give to eat of the Tree of Life, which is in the midst of the Paradise of God."

II. "He that overcometh shall not be hurt of the Second Death."

III. "To him that overcometh will I give to eat of the Hidden Manna, and will give him a white stone, and in the stone a new Name written, Which no man knoweth saving he that receiveth it."

IV. "He that overcometh, and keepeth My works unto the end, to Him will I give power over the nations: and he shall rule them with a rod of iron; as the vessels of a potter shall they be

broken to shivers: even as I received of My Father. And I will give him the Morning Star."

V. "He that overcometh the same shall be clothed in white raiment; and I will not blot out his name out of the Book of Life, but I will confess his name before My Father, and before His Angels.

VI. "Him that overcometh will I make a pillar in the Temple of My God, and he shall go no more out: and I will write upon him the Name of My God, and the name of the City of My God, which is New Jerusalem, which cometh down out of Heaven from My God; and I will write upon him My new Name."

VII. "To him that overcometh will I grant to sit with Me in My Throne, even as I overcame, and am set down with My Father in His Throne."

O God, Who hast graciously

promised that though Thou cause grief, Thou wilt yet have compassion according to the multitude of Thy mercies,

O Heavenly Father, Who of Thy tender mercy dost assure us that Thou chastenest those whom Thou lovest, and scourgest those whom Thou dost receive for Thy children,

O God, Who as a most loving Father dost chasten us for our profit, that we may be partakers of Thy righteousness.

O Heavenly Father, Who teachest us in Thy holy Word, that it is Thou that makest sore and bindest up, and that as Thou woundest so Thy hands make whole,

O Heavenly Father, Who dost encourage us in all our troubles to fly to Thee in prayer, and to cast all our care on Thee Who carest for us,

O God, Who at the prayer of Moses didst heal Miriam of her leprosy,

O God, Who at the prayer of

Elijah didst restore to life the widow's son

O God, Who hadst mercy even on wicked Ahab when he humbled himself before Thee,

O God, Who at the prayer of Elisha didst restore to life the son of the Shunamite.

O God, Who didst hear the entreaty of Hezekiah, and didst pro-

long his days,

O Heavenly Father, Who in the example of Job hast taught us that if we be patient under affliction Thou art in the end very pitiful and of tender mercy,

Have mercy, we humbly beseech Thee, on Thy sick and suffering servant, on whose behalf we fly to

Thee for succour.

O Jesus our Saviour, Who of Thine unspeakable love didst take our nature upon Thee, and wast in all points tempted like as we are, yet without sin,

Have mercy upon him.

O Jesus our Saviour, Who in our flesh didst suffer hunger, thirst, and weariness for us,

O Jesus our Saviour, Who didst go about doing good, healing all manner of sickness and disease

among the people,

O Jesus our Saviour, Who in Thine earthly ministry of love shewedst especial pity towards them that were afflicted with bodily suffering and disease, and didst never refuse to heal any that came or were brought unto Thee in faith,

O Jesus our Saviour, Who in healing certain sick persons didst bid them sin no more, to shew unto us that our sicknesses are the consequences of our sins,

O Jesus our Saviour, Who in going to the grave of Lazarus didst weep when Thou sawest the sorrow of his family and friends,

O Jesus our Saviour, Who didst raise up even from the dead the daughter of Jairus, the son of the widow, and Lazarus Thy friend,

O Jesus our Saviour, Who of Thy tender mercy didst accept the prayer of the Gentile woman for her daughter, of the father of the lunatick for his son, of the faithful centurion for his servant. and of his friends for the helpless paralytic,

O Jesus our Saviour, from Whose immaculate and life-giving Body there went forth virtue which healed all who touched Thee with the touch of faith,

O Jesus, our Saviour, Who for us didst suffer unspeakable anguish both of body and soul, in the Garden of Gethsemane, and upon the Cross.

O Jesus our Saviour, Who in Thy glorious Resurrection didst triumph over Death and corrup-

Have mercy, we humbly beseech Thee, on Thy sick and suffering servant, on whose behalf we fly to Thee for succour,

Jesus, Son of the Living God. Have mercy upon him.

Jesus, Son of the Blessed Virgin Mary,

Jesus, Most Mighty, Jesus, Most Merciful, Jesus, our Refuge, Jesus, our God and Saviour, Jesus, our only Hope, Jesus, our Advocate with the Father.

Jesus, the lover of our souls, Have mercy upon him. By Thy Holy Incarnation. By Thy sinless Birth, By Thy lowly childhood,

By Thy love of children, By Thy tender Pity for the suffering,

By Thy compassion for the bereaved and afflicted.

By Thy mission to redeem and save, and to heal the broken hearted,

By Thine Almighty all-constraining Love.

By Thine own Pains and Sufferings,

By Thy Death and Burial,

By Thy Descent into the Place of Departed Spirits,

By Thy Glorious Resurrection and Ascension,

By the unspeakable tenderness of Thy Human Heart whereby Thou, Who art our God, art touched with the feeling of our infirmities,

Have mercy upon him.

We sinners do beseech Thee to hear us, O Lord God, that Thy suffering servant may know and feel that Thou of very faithfulness hast caused him to be troubled, and that as many as Thou lovest Thou doat rebuke and chasten, that they may earnestly repent,

We beseech Thee, Good Lord.
(And after each of the following supplications, shall be said, We beseech Thee, Good Lord.)

That he may so take this visitation that it may effectually accomplish Thy purposes of mercy in the amendment of his life, his more complete devotion to Thee, and the final salvation of his soul,

That it may especially work in him a deeper repentance for and hatred of sin, and a more earnest resolution for the future to forsake all that displeaseth Thee,

That it may lead him to set his affections on things above, not on things on the earth, remembering that the things which are seen are temporal, and the things which are not seen are eternal,

That Thou by Thy Holy Spirit wouldest teach him that it shall profit a man nothing to gain the whole world and lose his own soul, but that he that loseth his life for Thy sake, and according to Thy Will, the same shall save it,

That Thou wouldest graciously assure him that our Heavenly

Father knoweth what things we have need of before we ask Him; and that we are of such value in His sight that even the hairs of our head are all numbered,

That Thou wouldest richly give to him Thy Holy Spirit to comfort and sustain him, to inspire him with perfect patience and resigned submission to Thy Holy Will, both under the present painfulness of his sickness, and as to its final issue, as well as with calm and humble confidence in Thee.

That in the midst of anguish and pain he may draw strength and patience from the thought of Thy Sufferings upon the Cross,

That as Thou, for the joy that was set before Thee, didst endure the shame and torment of the Cross, so he may remember that the sufferings of this present time are not worthy to be compared with the glory that shall be revealed hereafter,

That he may remember that unless we take up our Cross and follow Thee we cannot be Thy disciples; that we must through much tribulation enter into the Kingdom of God; and that if we suffer patiently, and as Christians should, we shall also reign with Thee.

That Thou wouldest graciously provide him with all things needful as well for the body as the soul in this his time of trial; with the kind care and loving attendance of friends and physicians, and whatever may tend to ease his pain, to alleviate the discomforts of his sickness, and to restore his health; and wouldest mercifully bless the means employed to his perfect recovery, that he may praise Thy Holy Name, Who forgivest all our sins, and healest all our infirmities,

That Thou wouldest take from him the spirit of impatient murmuring and repining at Thy All-Wise and gracious visitation, and wouldest give to those about him the grace of unwearied tenderness and of loving patience towards him in all his weaknesses of body, or mind, or temper,

We beseech Thee, Good Lord.

[¶ The following Supplications may be used when there appears to be no hope of the sick person's recovery.

O JESUS, Conqueror of sin and death, hear us of Thine unspeakable and most tender mercy, we most humbly beseech Thee, on behalf of this Thy servant whom, as it seemeth, Thou art calling unto Thyself: be with him as his Saviour and support, now and in his last hour, and let Thy Holy Spirit renew and sanctify and strengthen him with all needful grace, that in him Thou mayest see of the travail of Thy soul, and be satisfied with the redemption of a soul whom Thou didst die to save.

Hear us, Good Lord.

Though, if so be, he must walk through the valley of the shadow of death, yet be Thou so with him to sustain and comfort him, that he may fear no evil,

Hear us, Good Lord.

Give him that sincere repentance for the sins, negligences, and ignorances of his past life, which Thou wilt accept: Give him full trust in Thee and in Thee alone: Seal unto him, in the holy ordinances of Thy Church, the full absolution and remission of all his sins: Vouchsafe unto him an abundant measure of Thy gracious presence in his last Communion, and so fill him with unfeigned love for and longing after Thee, that he may be indeed assured that it is far better to depart and to be with Thee,

Hear us, Good Lord.

Grant him, we pray Thee, that his departure may be without great terrors of mind or pains of body: and assure him that Thou wilt not afflict him with a single needless pang: suffer him not by any extremity of pain to be betrayed into sinful impatience, even in thought; and enable him in all things to say to our Heavenly Father, as Thou didst, "Thy Will be done,"

Hear us, Good Lord.

Suffer him not to be distracted from the thought of God, and of the needs of his soul, by too anxious fears for the welfare of those whom he leaves behind, as knowing that Thou carest for and lovest all more tenderly than we can think,

Hear us, Good Lord.

Suffer him not to sin in leaving undone any act of justice towards others, or of needful restitution and satisfaction, according to the uttermost of his power, for all injuries and wrongs done by him to any other,

Hear us, Good Lord.

Suffer him not to be tormented by any doubts of that which he ought to believe to his soul's health, nor by any assaults or illusions of the Evil One; nor from extremity of pain or sickness to lose the right use of his reason; nor to be overcome with unreasonable amazement and terror at the approach of death,

Hear us, Good Lord.

Assure him that when he passeth through the waters Thou wilt be with him, and through the rivers they shall not overflow him; that Thy Hand will hold him fast, and Thine Arm will strengthen him; that Thy saving Presence can shield him even in the midst of the very fires; say unto his soul, I am Thy Salvation; say unto him, Fear not, for I have redeemed thee, I have called

thee by thy name, thou art Mine, Hear us, Good Lord.

Teach him to remember Thy far greater Sufferings both of Body and Mind in Thy most holy Passion and Death, although Thou hadst done nothing amiss; and that we in all our sufferings suffer justly, as receiving but the due reward of our deeds,

Hear us, Good Lord.

Teach him in true penitence and humility to pray unto Thee, Lord, remember me when Thou comest in Thy Kingdom; and comfort Thou him with the gracious assurance, To-day shalt thou be with Me in Paradise,

Hear us, Good Lord.

Strengthen him in his last agony, as Thou didst holy Stephen, by faith to see Thee standing at the Right Hand of God, and to commit himself to Thee, saying, Lord Jesus, receive my spirit,

Hear us, Good Lord.

Let Thy holy Angels meet his departing soul and carry it into the place of peace and rest and refreshment in Paradise, where it may enjoy the blessedness of Thy more immediate Presence, and the happy companionship of the Spirits of the Just,

Hear us, Good Lord.

Support and comfort us that survive in our hour of sorrow and bereavement; teach us not to sorrow as those that have no hope, but to take refuge in Thy most tender and loving mercy, and to give up ourselves more earnestly to serve and follow Thee, to love and desire Thee above all things, and more and more to set our affections on things above, Hear us, Good Lord.

O Lamb of God, That takest away the sins of the world. Comfort and strengthen him.

tify and redeem him. O Jesus, hear us,

O Jesus, graciously hear us. Let us pray.

Collect. Almighty, everliving God, Maker of mankind, Who dost correct those whom Thou dost love, and chastise every one whom Thou dost receive; We beseech Thee to have mercy upon this Thy servant visited with Thine Hand, and to grant that he may take his sickness patiently, and recover his bodily health, (if it be Thy gracious Will;) and whensoever his soul shall depart from the body, it may be without spot presented unto Thee; Through Jesus Christ our Lord Amen. Give him unfeigned repentance for all the errors of his life past, and stedfast faith in Thy Son Jesus; that his sins may be done away by Thy mercy, and his pardon sealed in heaven, before he go hence, and be no more We know, O Lord, that seen.

there is no word impossible with Thee; and that, if Thou wilt, Thou canst even yet raise him up, and grant him a longer continuance amongst us: Yet, forasmuch as in all appearance the time of his dissolution draweth near, so fit and prepare him, we beseech Thee, against the hour of death, that after his departure hence in peace, and in Thy favour, his soul may be received into Thine Everlasting Kingdom, Through the merits and mediation of Jesus Christ, Thine only Son our Lord and Saviour. Amen. (Ibid.)

A Prayer for persons troubled in mind or in conscience.

O blessed Lord, the Father of mercies, and the God of all comforts; We beseech Thee, look down in pity and compassion upon this Thy afflicted servant. Thou writest bitter things against him, and makest him to possess his former iniquities; Thy wrath lieth hard upon him, and his soul is full of trouble: But, O merciful God, Who hast written Thy holy Word for our learning, that we, through patience and comfort of Thy holy Scriptures, might have hope; give him a right understanding of himself, and of Thy threats and promises; that he may neither cast away his confidence in Thee, nor place it any where but in Thee. Give him strength against all his temptations, and heal all his distempers. Break not the bruised reed, nor quench the smoking flax. Shut not up Thy tender mercies in displeasure; but make him to hear of joy and gladness, that the bones which Thou hast broken may rejoice. O God, Whose days are without end, and Whose mercies cannot be numbered, make us, we beseech Thee, deeply sensible of the shortness and uncertainty of human life, and let Thy Holy Spirit lead us through this vale of misery, in holiness and righteousness, all the days of our lives: That, when we shall have served Thee in our generation, and are to be gathered to our fathers, we may have the testimony of a good conscience, and may die in the Communion of the Catholic Church, in the confidence of a certain faith, in the

comfort of a reasonable, religious, and holy hope, in favour with Thee our God, and in perfect charity with all the world. All which we ask through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. (Ibid.\*)

A Thanksgiving for the beginning of a recovery.

Into Thy merciful hands, O Lord, we commend the soul of this Thy servant now departing from the body: acknowledge, we meekly beseech Thee, a work of Thine hands, a sheep of Thine own fold, a lamb of Thine own flock, a sinner of Thine own redeeming. Receive him into the blessed arms of Thine unspeakable mercy, into the sacred rest of Thine everlasting peace, and into the glorious estate of Thy chosen saints in heaven.

God the Father, Who hath created thee; God the Son, Who hath redeemed thee; God the Holy Ghost, Who hath poured down His grace upon thee; be now and evermore thy defence, assist thee in this thy last trial, and bring thee into the way of everlasting life. Amen.

Christ, Who redeemed thee with His Agony and bloody Death, have mercy upon thee, and strengthen thee in this agony of death. Amen.

Christ Jesus, Who rose the third day from death, raise up thy body again in the resurrection of the just. Amen.

Christ, Who ascended into heaven, and now sitteth on the right

hand of God, bring thee unto the place of eternal happiness and joy. Amen.

God the Father preserve and keep thee. God the Son assist and strengthen thee. God the Holy Ghost defend and aid thee. God the Holy Trinity be ever with thee, that thy death may be precious in the sight of the Lord, with Whom thou shalt live for ever. Amen. (Bp. Cosin.)

Lord, now lettest Thou Thy servant depart in peace. Remember not, we beseech Thee, the sins of his youth; but according to Thy mercy think Thou upon him. O Lord, for Thy goodness. Into Thy hands, O God, we commend his spirit, for Thou hast redeemed it, O Lord, Thou God of truth. Bring his soul out of prison, that it may praise Thee. O deliver him from the body of this death. Say unto his soul, I am Thy salvation. Say unto him, To-day shalt thou be with Me in Paradise. Let him now feel the salvation of Jesus, let him now feel the ancinting of Christ, even the oil of gladness wherewith Thou art anointed. Guide Thou him through the valley of the shadow of death. Let him see the goodness of the Lord in the land of the living. O Lord, command his spirit to be received up to Thee in peace. O Lord, bid him come to Thee. Lord Jesus, receive his spirit, and open to him the gates of everlasting glory. Let Thy loving Spirit lead him forth into the land of righteousness, into Thy holy hill, into Thy heavenly Kingdom: Send Thine Angel to meet him and carry him into Abraham's bosom. Place him in the habitation of light, and peace, and joy, and gladness. Receive him into the arms of Thy mercy, and give him an in-heritance with Thy Saints in light, there to reign with Thy

elect Angels, Thy blessed Saints departed. Thy holy Prophets and glorious Apostles, in all joy, glory, felicity, and blessedness, for ever and ever. Amen. (Visitatio Infirmorum.)

Go forth, Christian soul, out of this world,

In the Name of God the Father Almighty, Who created thee; of Jesus Christ the Son of the Living God, Who suffered for thee; and of God the Holy Ghost who was poured forth upon thee.

And all shall answer, Amen.

Almighty God, with Whom do live the spirits of them that depart hence in the Lord, and with Whom the souls of the faithful. after they are delivered from the burden of the flesh, are in joy and felicity; We give Thee hearty thanks for that it hath pleased Thee to deliver this our brother out of the miseries of this sinful world; beseeching Thee, that it may please Thee, of Thy gracious goodness, shortly to accomplish the number of Thine elect, and to hasten Thy Kingdom: that we with all those that are departed in the true faith of Thy holy Name, may have our perfect consummation in bliss, both in body

and soul, in Thy eternal and everlasting glory; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

After the death of a Child.

O Almighty and Everlasting God, the Lover of holiness and purity, Who hast been graciously pleased to call the soul of a Child of this family into Thine heavenly Kingdom; So vouchsafe, O Blessed Saviour, to deal mercifully with us who survive, that, through the merits of Thy most sacred Passion, Thou mayest cause us ever to rejoice with all Thy Blessed Saints and Thine Elect, Who livest and reignest with the Father, in the Unity of the Holy Spirit, One God, world without end. Amen. (Visitatio Infirmorum)

O Lord Jesu Christ, Who didst restore the widow's son to his weeping mother, and the daughter of the ruler of the synagogue to her lamenting parents: We beseech Thee to have compassion on the [Father and Mother] of the child whom Thou hast now called to his Heavenly Father's King-Make them know and feel, O Lord God, that he is committed to Thy merciful arms, and ever beholdeth Thy blissful presence. Let this assurance assuage their tears, and mitigate their present sorrow. And grant, O Lord, that as they have experienced the blessing Thou gavest them in this child, and now feel the affliction Thou hast laid upon them, in taking him from them; so they may know assuredly that Thou wilt comfort them by restoring him to them in Thine Everlasting Kingdom; to which vouchsafe to conduct them by Thy merits, O Holy and most merciful Saviour, Who livest and reignest with the Father and the Holy Ghost, ever One God, world without end. Amen. (Ibid.)

After the death of an adult member of the Family.

O Almighty God, Who knowest the weakness and frailty of our nature: We beseech Thee to give unto us Thy servants, whom Thon hast stricken with this sad visitation, such a supply of the graces of Thy Holy Spirit, as may enable us to bear it with that humility, resignation, and submission to Thy Divine Will, Which become our Christian Profession; that so no repining thoughts may find place in our hearts. Grant that we may not sorrow as those who have no hope. Let not our grief exceed the bounds of reason or religion; but so temper it, we beseech Thee, with the consolations of Thy Holy Spirit, that whatever we may want in outward comfort, we may find made up to us in the inward joys of a good conscience, and a sure and certain Christian faith and hope.

Make, we beseech Thee, the affliction wherewith Thou chastenest us a means of drawing us nearer unto Thyself, and bless it to the good of our souls and our eternal welfare. Help us to search out, and steadfastly to set ourselves to remove all our offences against Thee, and to amend our lives. Teach us to set our affections on things above, not on things on the earth, but on those joys which never fade, the pleasures that are at Thy Right Hand for evermore, where all Thy Redeemed shall be gathered into Thy Heavenly Kingdom to go no more out for ever.

And so fit and prepare us for the great account which we must one day give, that when the time of our appointed change shall come, we may look up unto Thee with joy and comfort, and may at last be received, together with him whom Thou hast now taken from us, and with all that are near and dear to us, into that place of rest and peace where Thou shalt Thyself wipe off all tears from off all faces, and where all our troubles and sorrows shall have an end. (Ibid.)

Grant this, O Heavenly Father, for Jesus Christ's sake, our only Mediator and Redeemer. Amen.
