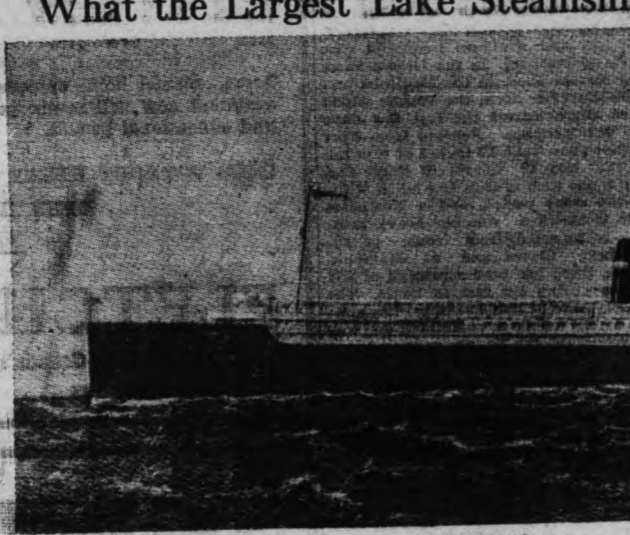



STILL DETERMINED TO SECURE EXHIBIT

Report of Special Committee of Board of Trade Adopted at Meeting Yesterday

The question of a made-in-Victoria exhibit which has been occupying the attention of the Board of Trade for some months past received full notice at the quarterly meeting of the board held yesterday afternoon in the Bastion street rooms. A report on the matter was presented by the special manufacturing committee, and afterwards R. W. Perry, one of the members, and Dr. Toimie, president of the Agricultural Association, spoke on the subject at some length, outlining what has already been done and also what it is hoped to do.

The following is the report presented by the special committee:

To the President and Council, Victoria, B. C., Board of Trade, Gentlemen,—Your committee on manufactures beg to report that, in accordance with your instructions, we waited on the finance committee of the corporation of Victoria and asked for funds for the construction of a building for a display of "made-in-Victoria" products and estimated to cost about \$10,000.00.

We were informed that the condition of the city finances does not warrant expenditure upon any new works. We then pointed out that in this case the work would be productive, as from 25 per cent to 30 per cent of the cost of the building would be paid for space by this year's exhibitors. We also presented an offer from a member of this board of trade, Mr. J. C. Cameron, on behalf of Cameron Lumbar Co., to supply lumber and cash for labor on the building to the value of \$5,000 upon the corporation undertaking to pay on or before 31st December next.

This also was without avail and we considered it injudicious to proceed further in that direction.

We are nevertheless strongly of opinion that further steps should be taken to meet the demands of the manufacturers for a thoroughly comprehensive exhibit of "made-in-Victoria" products this year, and it should be mentioned that your committee in asking for only one building have based space requirements at a minimum. Your committee having referred to the building as a source of revenue would also call attention to the "made-in-Victoria" exhibits as an extra attraction to the Fall Fair and to the increased gate receipts which would result therefrom. Further, the advertising and exhibiting of these "made-in-Victoria" products will naturally lead to increased demand for them and incidentally the employment of more hands in the various factories.

For these reasons it is now proposed to ask the British Columbia Agricultural Association to undertake the construction of the building required, and but for the absence from the city of the president and secretary this would already have been done.

In his remarks ament the work that had been done by the committee Mr. Perry ventured the statement that most people were little aware of the large number of things which are manufactured in Victoria and that if an exhibit of the kind spoken of could be secured there would be a big surprise for all and sundry.

He detailed how the committee had taken their case to the Mayor, who had said there was not enough money this year to warrant such an expenditure. Afterwards the committee had waited upon Sir Richard McBride, from whom he ventured to think the reply had been most satisfactory. Sir Richard had been most interested in the project and had asked many questions about disposition and arrangement.

In conclusion, Mr. Perry severely criticized the lack of public spirit shown by some of those who were approached for support. He was pleased to say, on the other hand, that many of the manufacturers of the city had shown great willingness to join in.

Dr. Toimie addressed the meeting much along the same lines. The Agricultural Association had for many years recognized the importance of a made-in-Victoria exhibit for the Fall Fair, but the project had never received much encouragement until this present year. He was disappointed at the city's action, but he considered the scheme of sufficient import for it to be prosecuted further. Vancouver had given \$165,000 to its agricultural association, and it was reasonable to suppose that a little support at least would be forthcoming from the local authorities.

By formal resolution the report of the special committee was unanimously adopted.

SAYS FINANCES IN "HEALTHY CONDITION"

President Shallcross of Board of Trade Addresses Meeting on Subject of City's Position

An important statement as to the state of the city's finances was made at yesterday's quarterly meeting of the board of trade by the president, J. J. Shallcross. Throughout his remarks Mr. Shallcross betrayed great optimism, which was in sharp contrast to the uneasiness which appears to have been felt by citizens of late, and his statement was received with much applause and earned a hearty vote of thanks from the members present for its lucidity and frankness.

The substance of the address was to the effect that Victoria is to-day in a sound condition. He believed that the true interpretation of the "tightness of money" which has been so much talked about, is that people have wanted to do as much in one year as should be done in ten.

In the president's opinion, however, Victoria itself is in a highly satisfactory condition, for there is money available for the prosecution of important public works, and the debt is much below that which the civic authorities are allowed to borrow. He enlarged on the "remarkable stability of the community" and believed that the basis of the same is honesty, fair dealing and good sense.

It was to be remembered, he continued, that the coming of numerous people to this city had made it necessary for new works of all kinds to be started, such as the extension of sewers and the building of more schools, things absolutely necessary in the corporate life of the community. There were also many local improvements necessary, such as cement sidewalks, asphalt streets and lighting facilities. This had made it necessary to arrange temporarily a large floating debt. Then came the trouble through war conditions on the continent, in marketing bonds. The conservatism of the banks had been another contingency which aided the stringency. These institutions would not advance any more money than they were absolutely obliged to do and also they would not give the city the usual overdraft on the security of the present year's taxes. Since that time, however, went on Mr. Shallcross, the city had disposed of \$4,000,000 of bonds, and of this amount about \$2,250,000 had been applied to the floating debt, which left in the neighborhood of \$1,750,000 for new work. It was planned to spend this sum on sewers, schools and the Sooke waterworks scheme.

Four Millions on Deposit.

He stated definitely that at the present time the city of Victoria had on deposit at the Bank of British North America \$4,000,000, against which there were advances of less than \$2,500,000, and he also believed there would be a credit balance for the rest of the year.

Mr. Shallcross stated that another million would be required to complete the local improvements which were now on hand, and he believed that it would be injudicious for the city to start on any other schemes this year. It was a duty to mark time for a while.

Alderman Cuthbert endorsed the remarks of the president. He was glad to hear his own opinion that the city was in a good order backed by so competent an authority. At the present time, in his opinion, no city in the Dominion was in a better condition financially.

Proposed by C. H. Lagrin, and seconded by R. W. Douglas, the vote of thanks was carried, passed to Mr. Shallcross for his address.

NOT FOR A PARK
Premier Does Not Encourage Vancouver Deputation to Expect Compliance With Request.

Promising an answer by August 1 but intimating that there was small probability of its being favorable, Premier McBride sent away the vast deputation from Vancouver and the whole surrounding districts expecting little yesterday after they had presented their series of propositions to the government by any one of which they hoped to have the site of the old court house in Vancouver for park purposes. Situated on the principal corner in the city right in the heart of the business section the site constitutes an ideal place for an oasis, but Sir Richard intimated that the government needed the money which would be derived from a sale of the property for business purposes. He said that the government had spent \$4,000,000 in Vancouver in the past five years and had received but \$2,000,000 revenue, and that it was unfair to ask them to forego this means of revenue, especially as more money was going to be spent at Point Grey and in other improvements.

Major Baxter, of Vancouver, headed the deputation which included representatives of all the important public bodies in Vancouver and representatives of every one of the contiguous municipalities. It was beyond doubt the most influential deputation ever sent over from Vancouver. The price they were willing to pay for the property was \$200,000, the price set by Captain Tatlow when he was Sir Richard's finance minister.

JUVENILES' LIBRARY ALREADY POPULAR

Seventy-Two Children Have Become Members and More Than 130 Books Out

DEPARTMENT TO HELP YOUTHFUL STUDENTS

Reference Works Will Grace Shelves; New Books to Be Added

It is only two days since the children's branch of the Victoria Public Library opened. Yet so eager are the youthful members for just the right kind of books that already 72 have joined, and more than 130 books have been taken out. This is not all. Morning and afternoon during both days the tables have been occupied with juvenile readers, others prowling round the shelves and dipping into books here and there when a picture or a title attracted them.

The department has been badly needed, and too much cannot be said of the energy and enterprise of the chief librarian, Miss Stewart, who instituted the work. Even when the only source of books was through the more puzzling route to be found in the main library downstairs, as many as six or seven hundred books were handed out every month to young people. Then the catalogue of suitable books was considerably less complete than at present, and when the juvenile department opened on Tuesday there were something over a thousand books on history, travel, handicrafts, religion, animals, and arts from which the young members might choose. This number will be added to in a few days, as 500 more books are now on their way from various eastern publishers to join those already on the shelves.

The department, although organized by Miss Stewart, is immediately in charge of Miss Steinberger, who just a few weeks ago concluded a special course in library work at the State University of Washington, and being also a lover of children and of books, is splendidly qualified for the work. There are plenty of preliminary attractions in the library, even for the child who makes his first entry rather under persuasion than through an unquenchable thirst for books.

Decorations Pleasing

To begin with, decorations of the juvenile's law department are in soft and reposeful sepia tones, and the shelves are surmounted by a number of Edmund Dulac's imaginative and wonderfully colored illustrations of Hans Andersen's fairy tales. At other places panels suggesting the nature of the books in that section are seen, a ship, with sails spread, giving a clue to books of travel, while another depicts a boy perched on the top of an airy globe soaring through space and contemplating the thing expressed in the verse beneath: "The world is so full of a number of things, I'm sure we should all be happy as kings." Animal stories occupy a corner all to themselves, a silhouette study of dog, cat and mouse, giving symbolic notice of the fact.

No high tables discourage the little readers, and low chairs and correspondingly approachable tables tend to encourage the smaller users of the books. Larger tables are provided for the larger boys and girls, and there is a delightful suggestion of the three bears so dear to every child's heart. But the librarian was hardly prepared for the necessity of accommodating full grown people, and the man who sauntered in and insisted on taking a juvenile work on electricity "because the ones downstairs were too advanced," found no chair exactly to his size in the children's room.

Grade Rather Than Age

It would be rather too much of a red-tape system for the librarian to regulate the membership of the children's library according to the age of the child. Some children at twelve can read very advanced books. Others are just beginning to take an interest even in their school-books. So the children will be given reading rather according to grade than to age, the librarians using their discretion as to when the older readers will be transferred to the membership in the adult library. Adults, however, may use the library. The limit is self-imposed, as it is assumed that few of the grown-ups will ask for books.

The following is the promise to which each of the children, in joining the library, binds itself: "In making application to become a member of the Victoria Public Library I promise to take good care of the books I borrow, to give immediate notice of change of address, and to obey all the other rules of the library."

This is no small promise for a child, and the small boy who refused, with tears, to sign his name to the card, although urged by his loving mother as well as the librarian to show how well he could write, was perhaps unusually wise in his generation. The very youngest member is just a little more than six years of age, and the size of her signature makes up a great deal for her own diminutive stature. Printing is very popular among the signatories, who show considerable character in the magic letters which spell their names.

Already some of the little folks have shown pronounced taste in their choice of books. One little girl of nine, who lives somewhere near an orchard and a green field, asked earnestly for books about birds. The library did not happen to be very rich in such works, so she was offered something else in the way of nature study. But she would have none of them. They were nice, but things that few and had feathers were

The only ones she was the least bit interested in.

Help With Stables.
Another, a boy, had already, while the juvenile books were still in the main library, devoured everything in the way of sea stories that he can lay hand upon. When school reopens the librarians intend assisting the children with reference books which will help them in their history, literature and other studies. Just at present the reference department has not been opened nor catalogues prepared. The card system is being used and by degrees the children will be taught the use of this.

As yet the actual organization is in its embryo stage. The officials are measuring up and testing the application of the system premeditated. It is their intention, however, once the mechanism is working quite smoothly, and the membership has increased, to give, sometime during the day, short talks to the children in an informal way. There is no doubt that the younger members will appreciate this, as it has been observed that all the children who sit at the tables with books before them are not so intently absorbed all the time in their reading that they would not find listening for a few minutes a pleasant diversion, particularly when the topic was anything so generally attractive as a fairy story.

During the summer months, while the children have the entire day in which to use the library, the juvenile department is open from 9 to 6. When school reopens, however, the children will all be busy at their lessons during the morning hours and the room will be open for an hour and a half at noon and from 3 to 7 in the afternoon. The "Kin," the "Jungle Books" and "Just So Stories," books on handicrafts, locomotives, aeroplanes and other mechanical and engineering works having to do with steam and electricity; more classical literature, such as "Gulliver's Travels," beautifully illustrated by Arthur Rackham, whose pictures also punctuate the pages of the story of Candide. Then there is the ever-popular "Pied Piper of Hamelin," illustrated by Hope Dulac; and Mother Goose, illustrated by Kate Greenaway. History is fairly well represented and will be added to by other works shortly, books on English, French, Italian, Indian and Ancient history already adorning the section devoted to this study.

Kindergarten books include illustrated action songs and finger plays for little folks. The Canterbury Pilgrims of Chaucer await some of the more advanced readers, and "The Story of the Grail and the Passing of Arthur" have already proved popular. Lovers of wild animals are duly considered, and Seton Thompson, Roberts and Bostock all find space on the shelves, another part of the collection being devoted to books on games and sports.

Religious books include popular versions of Bible stories from the New and Old Testament, stories of the Greek, Persian and more modern heroes, and myths of all nations.

WEEK CLOSED WITH MARKET LIFELESS

Buying Power Limited to Professionals but No Investment Liquidation

(By F. W. Stevenson & Co.)
New York, July 12.—The week closed with the market still being in a lifeless state, with very little buying power in evidence outside of professional operations and with the large short interest constituting the principal element of support.

At the same time there is no investment liquidation of consequence and the trading element taken as a whole has apparently assumed a waiting attitude pending other occurrences of sufficient importance to provide an incentive for greater activity.

The foreign situation continues mixed, though signs are not lacking of a disposition on the part of large European powers to force a suspension of hostilities as it is generally realized that the money strain on the other side will continue until hoarded gold returns in volume to commercial channels, the movement having been retarded by the constant fear of complications growing out of the belligerency of the Balkan states.

The wage controversy among trainmen on eastern railways promises to command wide attention next week, as judging by expressions in circulation the carriers are disposed to take a firm stand and either stem the tide of rising operating costs or else secure permission to increase revenues through means of advanced rates, for new financings are now so many and varied that some means will have to be provided to encourage belief on the part of holders of liquid capital that investments in the securities of railroads will not be prejudiced by demands of various kinds without compensation in other directions of sufficient degree to equalize matters and thus safeguard the status of the principal.
