Canada Continues Third Scoring 346 at 800 Yards and 332 at 900 Yards: Victoria Marksman Scores Forty-Four at First and Thirty-Nine at Second Range







Donohue, the mighty "Jiggs" of the Chicago White Sox. The great first baseman, who recently ended his days in an Ohio madhouse, was born in Springfield, O., thirty-four years ago to-morrow, July 13, 1879. "Jiggs," so called because of his ability as a clog-dancer, played with Nashville, Tenn., and several other minor league teams before he was admitted to the big show as a with Nashville, Tenn., and several rother minor league teams before he was admitted to the big show as a comember of Connie Mack's Milwaukee club in the infant American league. His wonderful fielding ability made him one of the greatest figures in baseball while playing the initial pillow for the Chicago Americans. He was at best in 1906, when he established a record by accepting 1,903 chances at first base, a record that is likely to stand for many years. Comiskey, of the White Sox, has always declared that "Jiggs" was the greatest of all first-sackers. He was the hero of the world's series of 1906 between the two Chicago clubs. Donohue was one of nine brothers, all of whom were ball players, although "Jiggs" was easily the greatest of the bunch.

Donohue started his baseball career as a pitcher, and occasionally played right field. He was nothing wonderful as a twirler, even in the minors, and it is said that in Nashville he was kept only because of his stick work, which is something unusual for a pitcher. Donohue was one of the very last of the baseball players to have his whiskers amputated, and for some time after smooth faces had become the rule among the diamond pastimers he continued to sport a facial regalla. Public opinion finally forced him to accident, in which his whiskers became entangled in a mass of thorns while he was going after the ball in the outfield of a southern baseball field, also had something to do with his decision to part with his whiskers.







Hoffman Philip, first secretary of the American embassy at Constantinople during Turkey's late unpleasantness with the Balkan states, played the role of hero during those terrible days when choiera threatened the capital of the Porte. Mr. Philip was one of the few Americans and Englishmen who volunteered to care for the sick and wounded at the camps outside of Constantinople. Major Doughty-Wiley, British consul at Adana, and Major Clyde S. Ford, a surgeon of the United States army, were two others of the noble and self-sacrificing few who risked their lives in the service of the Turks consigned to the "hell heaps" at San Stephano and Hademkuel.

Hoffman Philip was born in Washington forty-one years ago, Sunday, July 13, 1872, and was educated in England at Cambridge University. He served through the Spanish-American war with Col. Rossevelt's "Rough Riders." He began his foreign service for the United States government at Tangier, Morocco, where he was conut-general and secretary of legation.

Mr. Philip and his few American and English co-workers in the cause of humanity confronted a terrible situation at San Stephano, ten miles from the capital. That wealthy and fashionable suburb was transformed into what the Turks rightly called a "heil heap." A visitor to the cholera camp has thus described it:

"The so-called camp was by the side of a railroad embankment. There were just twenty-two tents for the accommodation of the thousands of sick and wounded men dumped off there for treatment." The track was higher than the camp, and when a train arrived from the front the patients had to scramble down the embankment, or, if it unable to do so, they were rolled down. The bank was a mass of dead and dying, as thick as ants on an anti-hill. Those who had chalers and those who were simply incapacitated were dumped together into the 'heil heap.' No accommodations were made for the No accommodations were made for the Treatment of the patients, and nobody attempted to alleviate their sufferings except Secretary Philip, Major Ford, and two brave women, Miss Schneider, a Hungarian, and Miss Alt, a Swiss. Bread and water wagons occasionally drove through the camps, but those unable to help themselves went hungry or thirsty, unless the foreign volunteer's found time to provide for them."

That the Dominion should send

That the Dominion should send troops to the aid of the Mother Country in the event of a serious war in South Africa was first urged officially by Lieut.-Colonel S. Hughes, M. P., who introduced the subject in the Canadian parliament 14 years ago to-day. Colonel Hughes expressed the opinion that not less than 5,000 Canadians would volunteer for service in case of need. No immediate action was taken, but on the last of the month the House of Commons expressed sympathy "with the efforts of Her Majesty's Imperial authorities to obtain for the subjects of Her Majesty, who have taken up their abode in the Transvaal, such measure of justice and political recognition as may be found necessary to secure them in the full possession of equal rights and liberties." Soon after the passing of this resolution, concurred in by the leaders of both parties, Colonel Hughes sought to raise a regiment for foreign service, but in this project clashed with the head of the militia. Following the outbreak of hostilities in South Africa, in October, Canadian imperialism found its first important military expression when a first contingent of a thousand men salled away from Quebec. These and subsequent Canadian forces played agailant and heroic part in the war, and their victories were greeted with patriotic enthusiasm all over the country.

On the 12th of July, 1759, a rocket was fired from Wolfe's headquarters at Quebec, as the signal for the batteries at Point Levi to open on the city. The first shots fell short, and the French defenders on the battlements cheered in derision. The laughter soon changed to cries of rage and screams of agony when the gunners found their range and began the storm of shot and shell that rained for weeks upon the city.

FIRST THINGS

The first observance of this date as Orangemen's Day was in 1796, the first lodge of Orangemen having been Lorned at Armegh late in the preceding year. The organization of the frish Protestants resulted from what was called "the battle of Diamond." fought at Diamond, a hambet in Armazh. North Ireland, in 1795, between the "Peep-o'-Day Boys" and the "Defenders." Many of the latter were killed. To commenorate this conflict the Orange hodge was formed soon interwards, and it was dedied to observe the anniversary of the kattle bethe Boyne, July 12th, as an annual holday. The "builte of Diamond" originated in a quarrel batween; a Catholic and a Presbyterian at Market Hill in July, 1784. Each was soon sided by a large body of friends and the neighborhood was divided into religious factoms—Catholic and Presbyterian-distinguished as Defenders and Peep-o'-Day Boys. The Interwere so called because they usually paid friendly utsits to the komes of the Befanders just shefore constructed.




