

# THE THIRTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES, FOR THE YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1888.

The Trustees of the Pennsylvania Museum and School of Industrial Art, in presenting to the Corporation their report for another year, take pleasure in calling attention to the constant growth of public interest in industrial education, and to the continued appreciation of our collections shown by the vast numbers who frequent them; and they are gratified that, in spite of the inadequate resources at their disposal, the condition of the Schools and Museum continue to show a steady and increasing degree of improvement.

The subject of industrial art has in late years risen to a foremost place in public interest, and, both in our own country and abroad, elicits widespread discussion and with ever improving results. In this movement we believe that your School plays no unimportant part. Your classes in the Textile and Dyeing departments are unrivalled among similar institutions in this country, and so soon as sufficient means can be obtained, it is desired that similar classes should be established for the different trades which depend upon decorative design, such as cabinet-making and metal working. The establishment, among other branches, of a school of architecture is a fit subject for your consideration.

Although crowded for lack of space, and suffering from inconvenient arrangement, the numbers attending your School have been maintained, and the proficiency of your scholars has been raised to a higher level. The evidences of appreciation of the methods and results of your School is shown by the increasing numbers who come from a distance to secure its advantages. There are now upon its rolls students from Arkansas, Delaware, Georgia, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, South Carolina, and Canada. The efforts to extend the interest of the School throughout our own State have also been, in a measure, successful. From ten counties outside of Philadelphia, we have twenty-one students, and are encouraged to believe that the continuation of the efforts recently made will lead to even better results.

By relieving our Principal of a portion of the clerical duties which have heretofore devolved upon him, and which have absorbed much valuable time, we hope that leisure can be afforded him, which will be used to very greatly promote the efficiency of the School, and to spread throughout this community and State the knowledge of the facilities which it affords, and to foster an interest in artistic and industrial education.

An opportunity was afforded by the munificence of the late Joseph E. Temple, to hold an exhibition of porcelain and pottery in Memorial Hall in the autumn. Although organized too late for the full co-operation of manufacturers, it was still in a good degree successful in promoting an intelligent interest in the furtherance of genuinely artistic work, and in attracting attention to the great strides that have already been made in this direction by our countrymen. Should the way open to repeat such exhibitions, it is hoped that their advantages will be still more evident.

A valuable addition has been made to the Museum by a loan from Dr. Robert H. Lamborn, of a valuable collection of Etruscan antiquities, and of old Mexican paintings illustrative of a period of pictorial art in America which flourished years before the first settlement of the United States. The work of cataloguing and arranging these collections is now in progress, and it is intended that they shall be placed upon exhibition in the coming spring.

The occupancy of Memorial Hall has, since the foundation of the Museum, provided spacious and convenient accommodation for your collections. Your Trustees, nevertheless, feel that the time may be approaching when a building of our own should be provided in some more central location, where the Museum and School could perhaps be united. The opportunity which this would afford of coming in closer touch with the life of the community, and the stimulus to the highest educational work, are objects to be greatly valued. Such an arrangement would also make possible an economy and efficiency of management which is perhaps not attainable while located, as at present, in buildings of which we have not the entire and unhampered administration. To provide in this way a permanent and truly suitable home for schools and museums of industrial art is, we believe, an object worthy of the consideration of those who desire to bestow great public benefactions upon their city.

Since our last annual report, material progress has been made in the reduction of the floating debt, which then stood at the figure of \$14,101.50, and is now \$6,300. The further sum of \$4,100 has been subscribed for this purpose, payable when the full amount necessary to extinguishing the debt has been raised. The Trustees have full confidence that this will be accomplished at an early day. The sum needed is a comparatively small one, and it is earnestly hoped that the members of the Corporation will co-operate, and aid the Trustees in finally relieving the institution of the debt which has so long weighed upon it.

Your Trustees have long felt the importance of increasing the membership in the Corporation to correspond with the importance of the work, and with the extent of the responsibility laid upon ns. With the view of doing this, it was determined early in the year to reduce the annual dues of members to five dollars, provided the annual membership should be increased during the year 1888 to the number of four hundred. They regret to say that their expectations in this matter have not been fulfilled, and that the present membership is only 183. In this matter they also solicit the earnest efforts of the members to secure an improvement, and although the reduction in the dues is not at this time possible, they stand ready to make it whenever the membership has been sufficiently enlarged.

Your Trustees desire to call attention to the continued zeal of

the Associate Committee of Women, whose interest and activity in promoting the efficiency of the Museum and School, and in obtaining funds for their support has, as always, been of inestimable value.

Following are the reports of the Curator of the Museum and Principal of the School :

### THE MUSEUM.

During the year two hundred and sixty-eight thousand four hundred and seventy-three persons visited the Museum. Of these, one hundred and forty thousand one hundred and sixty-nine were Sunday visitors. The special exhibition of American Pottery and Porcelain, held October 16th to November 13th, attracted thirtytwo thousand two hundred and thirty-four persons; nevertheless, the total number of visitors for the year were some thirty-five hundred less than in 1887.

The purchases made at the Exhibition on account of the Joseph E. Temple Trust consisted of five vases and one plaque. Further additions to the Museum collections purchased out of the Temple Fund include a cabinet and four chairs, examples of early English workmanship, specimens of French and Flemish metal work, original and electro-reproduction, a miniature suit of plate-armor, and an illustrative example of embossed leather work. These were bought in Europe by Mr. Miller, the Principal of the School.

The autotype reproduction of the Bayeux Tapestry, purchased last year, has been framed and mounted behind glass on the wall of the West Gallery. A translation of the text of the Latin inscription, explanatory of the figures, has been printed on the frame above each group.

### THE SCHOOL.

The work of the School continues to be as satisfactory as is possible with the limited accommodation at 1336 Spring Garden Street, which is much overcrowded. No changes in the departments as organized last year have taken place, except that the Wood-carving Department, which had heretofore been conducted as part of the evening school has been changed to the day school. Four new looms, two of which are Jacquards, and other machinery have been added to the equipment of the Textile Department, having been provided by the Philadelphia Textile Association, under whose auspices this department is conducted. This makes twenty-three hand-looms and five powerlooms, besides card-stampers and a great deal of other machinery, which are at present in use in this department. The most gratifying progress has been made in the Department of Chemistry and Dyeing, the facilities for this branch of study being filled to their utmost, quite as many applicants having registered early in the season as it was possible to accommodate. The corps of instructors remains the same as last year.

The usual closing exercises were held in Memorial Hall on Saturday, June 2d, 1888. Addresses were made by the President, Governor Beaver, by the Honorable Robert R. Dearden, and others.

An exhibition of students' work was made at the same time and place, which remained open during the summer.

A number of State scholarships, one for each county, having been established by the Legislature of 1887 as a feature of the bill affording State aid to the School, appointments to several of these were made by the Governor during the year, and nine holders of these appointments are at present registered in the School.

The scholarships placed at the disposal of the Board of Education of the city were filled as usual by a competitive examination conducted by the Principal, each grammar school Principal being authorized to send candidates. It is gratifying to note that this method of making the appointments which was adopted in 1887 is producing gratifying results, the class of students admitted being better qualified each year, and a considerable increase of interest on the part of the teachers and pupils alike in the public schools having clearly resulted from this arrangement.

### ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

# ASSOCIATE COMMITTEE OF WOMEN. 1888.

The Report of the Treasurer gives the financial result of labors of the Committee during the past year, and in addition to the sums paid to the Trustees by the Treasurer, thirty subscriptions of five dollars each have been paid to the Trustees by the Chairman of the Associate Committee.

Greater prosperity than ever before is found in the School, the usefulness of which is greatly extended through the appropriation from the Legislature of 1886. Eleven counties from this State have sent scholars, and students from nine of our States and Canada are now enrolled on the list of pupils who have come to avail themselves of opportunities more favorable perhaps than are offered in any school in our country.

For the first time in the history of the Institution, it comes before the public almost free from debt and free to ask from the Legislature and from our own citizens such a measure of support as will be adequate to its increasing needs.

In view of this prospect, the Committee respectfully present to the Corporation the imperative necessity of securing suitable accommodations for the Museum and the School under the same roof.

The School building, 1336 Spring Garden Street, is totally inadequate to furnish accommodations for the steady increase in the number of pupils, and, at the same time, the attendance at the Museum shows a falling off from previous years.

The advantages to be gained by uniting the two branches of the Institution in some central location, can scarcely be estimated, except by those who have taken the pains to examine into the wants of both.

The Principal of the School and the teachers employed under him command the respect not only of the pupils, but of all interested in the welfare of the School.
