**Berlin** (/bɜːrlɪn/; German pronunciation: [bɛʁˈliːn] (listen)) is the capital city of Germany and one of the 16 states of Germany. With a population of 3.3 million people,<sup>[1]</sup> Berlin is Germany's largest city and is the second most populous city proper and the seventh most populous urban area in the European Union.<sup>[4]</sup> Located in northeastern Germany on the River Spree, it is the center of the Berlin-Brandenburg Metropolitan Region, which has about 4½ million residents from over 180 nations.<sup>[5][6][7][8]</sup> Due to its location in the European Plain, Berlin is influenced by a temperate seasonal climate. Around one third of the city's area is composed of forests, parks, gardens, rivers and lakes.<sup>[9]</sup>

First documented in the 13th century, Berlin was the capital of the Kingdom of Prussia (1701–1918), the German Empire (1871–1918), the Weimar Republic (1919–33) and the Third Reich (1933–45).<sup>[10]</sup> Berlin in the 1920s was the third largest municipality in the world.<sup>[11]</sup> After World War II, the city, along with the eastern part of the city, was divided into four occupation zones by the Allies. The eastern part of the city, known as East Berlin, was a political enclave (surrounded by the Berlin Wall from 1961 to 1989) and was part of the German Democratic Republic (DDR). The western part of the city, known as West Berlin, was a political enclave (surrounded by the Berlin Wall from 1961 to 1989) and was part of the Federal Republic of Germany (FRG). German reunification in 1990, the city was once more designated as the capital of a united Germany.

Berlin is a world city of culture, politics, media, and science, hosting 147 world heritage sites, 100 museums, and 100 theatres. Significant industries include IT, pharmaceuticals, and engineering. The city is also a popular location for international film and television production.

Berlin is home to renowned universities, research institutes, orchestras, and opera houses. The city is well known for its festivals, diverse architecture, and vibrant nightlife.

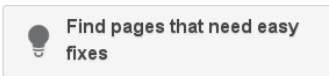
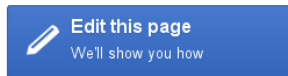

**Ludwig Mies van der Rohe** (born **Maria Ludwig Michael Mies**; March 27, 1886 – August 19, 1969) was a German-American [architect](#).<sup>[1]</sup> He is commonly referred to, and was addressed, as **Mies**, his surname. He served as the last director of Berlin's [Bauhaus](#), and then headed the department of architecture, [Illinois Institute of Technology](#) in Chicago, where he developed the Second Chicago School. Along with [Le Corbusier](#), [Alvar Aalto](#), and [Frank Lloyd Wright](#), he is widely regarded as one of the pioneering masters of [modern architecture](#).

Mies, like many of his post-World War I contemporaries, sought to establish a new architectural style that could represent modern times just as [Classical](#) and [Gothic](#) did for their own eras. He created an influential twentieth century architectural style, stated with extreme clarity and simplicity. His mature buildings made use of modern

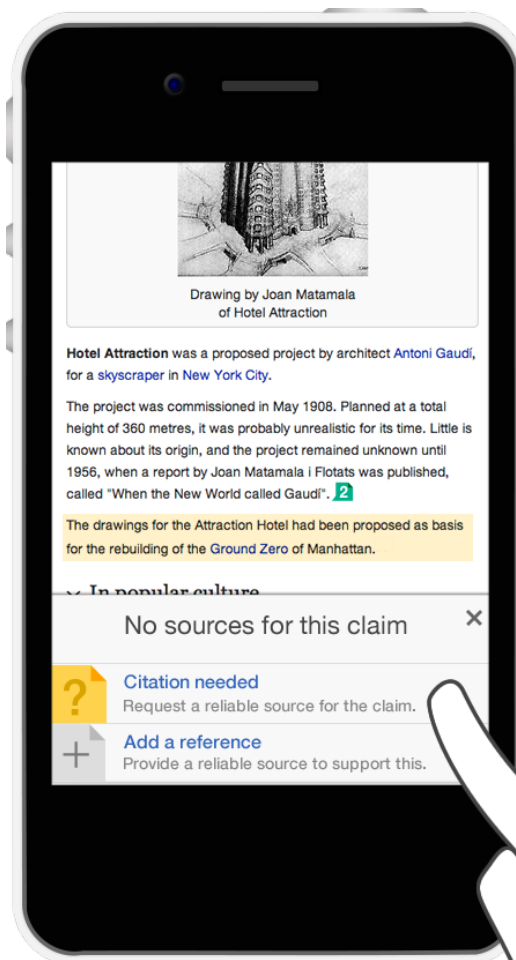

## Wardenclyffe Tower

**Wardenclyffe Tower** (1901–1917) also known as *Wardenclyffe* was an early [wireless](#) transmission tower designed by [Nikola Tesla](#) in [Long Beach, New York](#) and intended for commercial trans-Atlantic [wireless telephony](#), broadcasting, and proof-of-concept demonstrations of [wireless power transmission](#).<sup>[2][3]</sup> It was never fully operational,<sup>[4]</sup> and the tower was demolished in 1917.

The tower was named after James S. Warden, a western lawyer and banker who had purchased land for the endeavor in [Shoreham, Long Island](#), about sixty miles from [Manhattan](#). Here he built a resort community known as Wardenclyffe-On-Sound. Warden believed that with the implementation of Tesla's "world system" a "Radio City" would arise in the area. He offered Tesla 200 acres (81 ha) of land close to a railway line on which to build his wireless

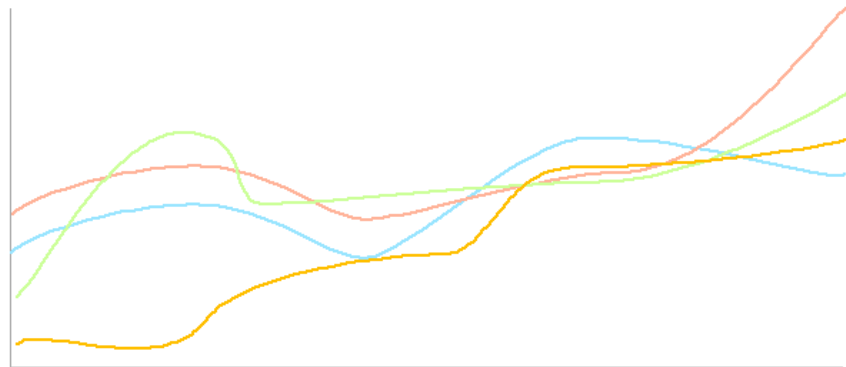
