OBITUARY.

Mr. James L. Mitchell, civil engineer, of Kansas City, Mo., died Dec. 25, aged 52.

Mr. Edward Benson, Superintendent of the Sewer Department of Jersey City, N. J., died Jan. 2, aged 56.

Mr. Charles E. Deal, contractor and builder, of Philadelphia, Pa., died Jan. 1, aged 81.

Mr. William L. Elseffer, civil engineer, died in New York city, Jan. 2, aged 71. He was born in Red Hook, N. Y., and was engaged as an Assistant Engineer on the surveys for the Hudson River R. R. He was also engaged in the development of Central Park, New York city, and in draining the meadows between Jersey City and Newark, N. J.

Mr. Gouverneur Morris, M. Am. Soc. C. E., of Detroit, Mich., died Dec. 30. He was a great-grandson of Robert Morris, one of the signers of the Declaration of Independence, and was born in Pottsville, Pa., Nov. 5, 1847. He was educated in the Polytechnic College of Pennsylvania, and from 1867 to 1874 was engaged in the construction of railways in various parts of the United States. Later he became interested in coal mining operations and made an examination of the coal deposits of the Yellowstone Valley for the Northern Pacific Ry. in 1880. He was connected with the construction of the New Croton Aqueduct, and afterwards was engaged in coal mining operations.

Mr. James Platt, M. Inst. M. E., M. Inst. C. E., head of the firm of Fielding & Platt, Limited, hydraulic machine tool builders, of Gloucester, England, died Dec. 29. He was born in Manchester, England, Feb. 4, 1834, and was educated and served his apprenticeship in Sowerby Bridge, Yorkshire, where his father, Mr. John Platt, was the Engineer and Manager for the (at that time) celebrated tool builders, Messrs. Francis Berry & Sons. When about 24 years of age he left their works and became Manager of a general engineering works in Gloucester, and about this time designed and built several blast furnace plants, some of the first in England to be equipped with the modern hot blast stoves. He also put in a number of large pumping plants in the Forest of Dean. In 1866 he founded the firm of Fielding & Platt, and worked this business up until it now employs over 150 men. In 1873, with Mr. R. H. Tweddell, he took out the first patent on a hydraulic riveting machine. This was followed by many more, and since that date he has been more nearly identified with the development of hydraulic machine tools than any one else. It was he who saw the need of making riveting and flanging machines of heavy power, to enable boilers to be built to stand the heavy pressures then coming into use. It was this foresight which enabled his firm to equip three-fourths of the marine and locomotive shops in England and on the Continent with their hydraulic systems. His most important plant in this country is that of the hydraulic tools at the Juniata shop of the Pennsylvania R. R., at Altoona, Pa. The last large piece of work he conceived and designed was the building of the gigantic gantry, superstructure and riveting plant for Harlan & Wolff, of Belfast, Ireland, now being used for the building of the large White Star Line steamship "Oceanic." With this plant practically every rivet in the ship will be put in by hydraulic power. Mr. Platt always took an active part in the work of the English engineering institutions, and was a regular attendant at their meetings. He visited this country with the Iron & Steel Institute when it made its memorable trip. He took an active interest in local politics, being a Liberal and a follower of Mr. Gladstone. He was Mayor of the ancient city of Gloucester for two terms; was for 29 years a Town Councillor and Alderman; was a Justice of Peace, and also held numerous other local offices. Few men in the English engineering world will be so much misused, as with his tactful and genial way he made many friends. Mr. Platt was a member of the Council of the Institution of Mechanical Engineers, a member of the Institution of Civil Engineers and also of the Iron and Steel Institute. He was Vice-Chairman of the Board of Directors of the Gloucester Railway Carriage & Wagon Co., the largest and best equipped car building establishment in England. Mr. Platt leaves a widow, five sons and a daughter. His eldest son, Mr. John Platt, M. Am. Soc. M. E., is a member of the firm of Thorpe & Platt, of New York city.
