ABOUT WIKIMEDIA PHILIPPINES



- We are the Wikimedia Foundation's twentyseventh chapter, being founded on April 12, 2010.
- We are one of only five chapters in East and Southeast Asia (the others being in Indonesia, Taiwan, Hong Kong and Macau).
- We currently have around forty members, but had over 120 prior to 2014.
- As of 2014, we were handling a budget of over two million pesos (around \$43,000), managing a number of projects.
- Yes, we tried to bid for Wikimania 2016.




ONCE YOU PUT UP A NON-PROFIT ORGANIZATION, WHAT'S NEXT?

THE WORLD OF WIKIMEDIA AFFILIATES



As of the last count, there are:

- 41 chapters, present on all six inhabited continents
- One thematic organization (Amical Wikimedia)
- ▶ 60 Wikimedia user groups, of which a number of are incorporated

WHEN YOU HAVE THIS MANY AFFILIATES, PROBLEMS WILL NATURALLY ARISE.

WHEN WIKIMEDIA AFFILIATES FAIL

- ▶ <u>Wikimedia Macedonia</u>: their president lost a vote of no confidence but he refused to step down, forcing community members to form a new user group.
- ▶ <u>Wikimedia Hong Kong</u>: the chapter has had issues with remitting unused Wikimania 2013 funds, coupled with the chapter's very ambitious funding program being denied funding by the Wikimedia Foundation, severely dampening morale.
- ▶ <u>Wikimedia UK</u>: members of the chapter's board was implicated in a conflict of interest issue involving one of the chapter's projects, prompting a governance review.
- ▶ <u>Wikimedia Taiwan</u>: the chapter basically stopped functioning for a number of years after Wikimania 2007 due to burnout.
- ▶ Wikimedia Macau: a total black box, with no activity at all since recognition in 2008.

But enough of their problems.

WHAT ABOUT OURS?

WHEN WIKIMEDIA PHILIPPINES FAILS

- Projects still come from the Board of Trustees rather than members, and consequently the Board implements projects as well.
- We are taxed administratively, with administrative tasks being divided only among a small group of chapter members.
- We have a low intake rate for projects and our projects, while impactful, don't always meet WMF impact targets.
- A large chunk of our community is disinterested in what we're doing in the chapter, with many not even knowing what it is that we do.

NOT THE IDEA OF HOW A SUCCESSFUL ORGANIZATION SHOULD BE, WE KNOW.

This is a recipe for disaster.
