My dear Friend,

I thank you for your
note. Somebody in Washington has
sent me a sketch, from Forney's
Chronicle, of Channing's sermon.
I say sketch, for as it fills not

report. I have not yet had
time to examine it, but if I
find it ^a worthy sketch, shall
print it - perhaps this week.

I should be heartily glad of an opportunity to see and talk with you and your sisters, ^{not only} about your Washington experiences, but in relation to our cause in its widest aspects; and if you come to the city, I shall take it as a particular favor if you will call. Our office now, you will remember, is ~~not~~ in the same building with the Independent, but at 48 Beckman St., second story. If you will let me know when I may expect you, I will be sure not to be out.
