MEMORANDUM FOR RECORD:

SUBJECT: Allocation of Man-hours, Entertainment Services, First Quarter, Japanese FY 49.

1. By C/N (2), dated 31 March 49, subject as above, (G-4 Journal No. 80344), SS, GHQ, furnished G-4 with their recommendations for the allocation of man-hours of entertainment services for the Jap FY 1949, G-1 concurred in the above mentioned recommendations. These recommendations include 406,125 man-hours for Eighth Army; 14,500 man-hours for COMNAVFE; 115,500 man-hours for FEAF; 182,875 man-hours for Hq & Sv Gp; and 31,000 man-hours for GHQ reserve. These total 750,000 man-hours which is the budget figure as recommended by G-4 and approved by the C/S for the Jap FY 49.

2. In accordance with instructions issued to the major commands (para 2, Ltr, GHQ, SCAP, file No. AG 353.8 (28 Mar 49) SS-GD, subject: "Entertainment Services Furnished by the Japanese Government", dated 28 March 49), Proposed radio allocates one-fourth of Jap FY 49 budget figure (750,000 man-hours) to the major commands for the 1st Quarter of Jap FY 49. Under this plan 101,531 man-hours are allocated to Eighth Army; 3,625 to COMNAVFE; 28,875 to FEAF; and 45,719 to Hq and Sv Gp. Reserve of 31,000 man-hours is not affected.

3. Recommend approval of proposed radio.

4. G-4, Operations, will follow up on subsequent quarterly allocations on entertainment services. In addition, ledger account will be maintained to control number of man-hours utilized by the Occupation Forces.

5. This action is within established policy.

6. Initiated action completed.

2. Purpose.

To prescribe revised policies and procedures effective 1 April 1949, covering the procurement and control of directly employed indigenous labor and to effect the consolidation of reports covering the use of such personnel.

3. Responsibilities.

Addressee commanders are responsible for adequate implementation and enforcement of policy and procedures as amended herein.

4. Definition.

Operative and productive labor referred to herein is defined as every form and type of indigenous labor employed under the direct supervision of the occupation forces for the operation of activities of the occupation forces and furnished by the Japanese Government under Labor Requisition Form No. 1. (Par 3c reference 1b (3) above).

5. Procurement.

The Eighth United States Army is the only agency authorized to issue procurement instruments. The method of issuance of procurement instruments is prescribed by Eighth Army. Labor using units and agencies will carefully analyze the labor requirements of each project, and will limit their requests for operative and productive labor to the minimum number of personnel essential to each project. Particular precaution will be exercised in planning work schedules to preclude requisitioning laborers in excess of the number which can be fully or profitably employed. All labor, reported for non-work allowances, will be included in and will be accounted for, against the ceilings established for the commands.

6. Control.

a. The Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers will continue to prescribe labor ceilings to addressee commanders. Commanders will require that manning tables be established for each facility utilizing operative and productive labor. All manning tables will be critically reviewed periodically by the respective major commands and adjusted as may be necessary to insure that they provide for minimum essential requirements only. Manning tables will not be submitted to General Headquarters

but will be readily available for inspection at each facility. Total personnel requirements as shown on manning tables will be included in the over-all ceiling prescribed for the commands (sample form, Incl 1).

b. The labor officer of each labor using unit will compare the number of operational and productive labor reported employed (daily average) with the payrolls to insure that the work was actually performed in the number of hours and days for which labor is being paid by the Japanese Government.

c. Payrolls will be prepared in accordance with established procedures and will include the following certificate bearing the personal signature of the receiving officer:

"I certify that the total number of man-days and/or man-hours for which each individual is entitled to receive payment from the Japanese Government on this payroll, is true and correct to the best of my knowledge and ability to ascertain and that the grand total of man-days and/or man-hours does not exceed the maximum allowable working time for the daily average number of employees during the period covered".

d. Special Allowances.

The payment to an excessive number of employees of the separation and/or discharge allowance, which is equal to one or more months pay, places an unwarranted drain on the labor portion of the Termination of War Budget. Consequently discharges when re-employment is immediately in prospect will be avoided. Considering the employment changes resulting from the transition of many activities from a service contract to a direct hire method of operation, an endeavor will be made to secure stability of employment at the earliest practicable date. In each instance where any of the special allowances listed below are shown on the payroll, the unit labor officer will attach to the payroll a statement of explanation and/or approval:

- (1) Non-work allowances
- (2) Special work allowances
- (3) Language allowances
- (4) Separation and/or dismissal allowances
- (5) Traveling expenses
- (6) Any other voucher requiring occupation force approval

e. Overtime.

Addressee commanders will establish and enforce strict controls limiting the man-hours of overtime in their respective commands to a total which shall not exceed in any one month 10% of the total man-hours of regular time authorized within their established ceilings in the same month, except that this limit on overtime employment may be exceeded in any emergency when excess overtime is necessary to protect life or property of value. Such excess overtime will be specifically explained on monthly report (Reports Control Symbol QGD-23 (R1)). In the case of activities in which continuous operation is essential to the health, security, or an important function of the command, the employment of an additional shift will be utilized when less expensive than employment of overtime. Overtime for domestic servants employed in dependent housing will continue to be limited to a maximum of twelve hours per week (Incl 1 to reference 1b (5)).

7. Reports to General Headquarters.

a. Addressee commanders will submit an operative and productive labor report (Reports Control Symbol QGD-23 (R1)) in quadruplicate to the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers within forty days following the last day of the month for which the report is rendered. Initial report under the provisions of this directive will be submitted for the month of April 1949 to reach General Headquarters on or before 10 June 1949.

b. The labor report form (Incl 2) will be prepared by each technical service activity and/or other activity utilizing operative and productive labor. The appropriate requesting agency code and the project (purpose) code will be shown for all employees reported, as indicated in Incl 3. All information required by the report will be submitted from factual data and will not be based on estimates.

8. a. Under the provisions of Japanese laws, the Japanese Government as employer of all directly employed labor furnished to the occupation forces, has responsibilities for:


- (1) Establishment of wage scales
- (2) Payment of wages, supplements and allowances
- (3) Regulation of working hours, vacation time, transfers, separation and/or discharges
- (4) Immunization, medical care and treatment

b. While the above responsibilities are primarily a concern of the Japanese Government, the manner and extent of their application is prescribed by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers. Specifically, no payment for expenses incurred in the fulfillment of the above obligations can be made from funds appropriated for support of the occupation forces without a duly executed receipt signed by an authorized representative of the occupation forces (SCAPIN 1872). It is therefore the responsibility of the individual receiving officer to determine that the full requirements of the procurement instrument have been met and that payment is promptly authorized for only the amount of service delivered.

9. Field audits will be made by representatives of General Headquarters and frequent inspections will be made by addressee commanders to insure uniformity of application of the provisions of this directive and compliance therewith. Each unit utilizing operative and productive labor will maintain the minimum records essential for inspection and auditing purposes.

- (a) Installation or Facility: Name of facility, installation, unit or building employing labor.
- (b) Location: Geographical location as camp, city, or town, prefecture and major island of Japan.
- (c) Organization: Organization responsible for supervision and reporting of labor as regiment, division, base or command.
- (d) Type of Installation or Facility: Indicate type of installation or facility as reported in monthly QGD-23 (R1), for Operative and Productive Labor.
- (e) Capacity or Strength: Report capacity, number of personnel served or strength whichever is applicable to installation or facility reporting, (i.e., capacity for hotels, billets, apartment buildings, community housing projects; number of persons served for clubs, theatres, recreational facilities, schools, etc., strength for technical services, tactical troops, military government, missions, post-exchange, etc.)
- (f) Type of Labor: Operative and Productive Labor includes all labor secured by direct requisition from the Japanese Government. Note: Entertainment Services not included in the foregoing types of labor.

7. Reports to General Headquarters.

a. Addressee commanders will submit an operative and productive labor report (Reports Control Symbol QGD-23 (R1)) in quadruplicate to the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers within forty days following the last day of the month for which the report is rendered. Initial report under the provisions of this directive will be submitted for the month of April 1949 to reach General Headquarters on or before 10 June 1949.

b. The labor report form (Incl 2) will be prepared by each technical service activity and/or other activity utilizing operative and productive labor. The appropriate requesting agency code and the project (purpose) code will be shown for all employees reported, as indicated in Incl 3. All information required by the report will be submitted from factual data and will not be based on estimates.

8. a. Under the provisions of Japanese laws, the Japanese Government as employer of all directly employed labor furnished to the occupation forces, has responsibilities for:

- (1) Establishment of wage scales
- (2) Payment of wages, supplements and allowances
- (3) Regulation of working hours, vacation time, transfers, separation and/or discharges
- (4) Immunization, medical care and treatment

b. While the above responsibilities are primarily a concern of the Japanese Government, the manner and extent of their application is

prescribed by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers. Specifically, no payment for expenses incurred in the fulfillment of the above obligations can be made from funds appropriated for support of the occupation forces without a duly executed receipt signed by an authorized representative of the occupation forces (SCAPIN 1872). It is therefore the responsibility of the individual receiving officer to determine that the full requirements of the procurement instrument have been met and that payment is promptly authorized for only the amount of service delivered.

9. Field audits will be made by representatives of General Headquarters, and frequent inspections will be made by addressee commanders to insure uniformity of application of the provisions of this directive and compliance therewith. Each unit utilizing operative and productive labor will maintain the minimum records essential for inspection and auditing purposes.

MEMORANDUM FOR RECORD:

Subject: Operative and Productive Labor

1. Proposed letter is a revision of letter, General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, "Labor Requisitioned from Japanese Government," dated 14 February 1947. Proposed revision provides uniform reporting by all commands, strengthens control measures and consolidates three previously required reports into one report.

2. Proposed revision specifically provides for:

a. Consolidation of reports "Labor Requisitioned from Japanese Government" (RCS-QGD-23) with "Allowance of Service Personnel" (RCS-QGD-22) and "Domestic Servants", (RCS-QGD-26).

b. Instructing commands in regard to a uniform reporting procedure to enable General Headquarters to expedite analysis of subject reports and obtain a greater degree of accuracy.

c. Strengthen present controls by requiring new manning tables to be established. Requires commands to make frequent inspections at all levels to determine the measure of compliance with present directives on the economical utilization of Japanese labor. Establishes controls on overtime and requires addressee commanders to enforce limitations as set up in their individual commands.

d. Furnishing commands with information on Japanese payroll procedures and the responsibilities of labor receiving officers in connection with the verification of certain portions of these payrolls.

3. It is considered by Operations Division that proposed revision will correct to a large degree errors in reports as furnished to General Headquarters at the present time. There is a definite need for uniform reporting throughout Japan and establishment of closer controls of the number of indigenous personnel employed, both of which are included in this proposed directive.

4. Recommend that the proposed letter be approved and dispatched to commands concerned.

5. Action is within established policy.

6. Initiated action complete.



To prescribe revised policies and procedures effective 1 April 1949, covering the procurement and control of directly employed indigenous labor and to effect the consolidation of reports covering the use of such personnel.

3. Responsibilities.

Addressee Commanders are responsible for adequate implementation and enforcement of policy and procedures as amended herein.

4. Definition.

Operative and productive labor referred to herein is defined as every form and type of indigenous labor employed under the direct

supervision of the Occupation Forces for the operation of activities of the Occupation Forces and furnished by the Japanese Government under Labor Requisition Form No. 1. (Par 3c reference 1b (3) above).

5. Procurement.

The Eighth United States Army is the only agency authorized to issue procurement instruments. The method of issuance of procurement instruments is prescribed by Eighth Army. Labor using units and agencies will carefully analyze the labor requirements of each project, and will limit their requests for operative and productive labor to the minimum number of personnel essential to each project. Particular precaution will be exercised in planning work schedules to preclude requisitioning laborers in excess of the number which can be fully or profitably employed. All labor, reported for non-work allowances, will be included in and will be accounted for, against the ceilings established for the commands.

6. Control.

a. The Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers will continue to prescribe labor ceilings to addressee commanders. Commanders will require that manning tables be established for each facility utilizing operative and productive labor. All manning tables will be critically reviewed periodically by the respective major commands and adjusted as may be necessary to insure that they provide for minimum essential requirements only. Manning tables will not be submitted to General Headquarters but will be readily available for inspection at each facility. Total personnel requirements as shown on manning tables will be included in the over-all ceiling prescribed for the commands (sample Form, Incl 1).

b. The labor officer of each labor using unit will compare the number of operational and productive labor reported employed (daily average) with the payrolls to insure that the work was actually performed in the number of hours and days for which labor is being paid by the Japanese Government.

c. Payrolls will be prepared in accordance with established procedures and will include the following certificate bearing the personal signature of the receiving officer:

"I certify that the total number of man-days and/or man-hours for which each individual is entitled to receive payment from the Japanese Government on this payroll, is true and correct to the best of my knowledge and ability to ascertain and that the grand total of man-days and/or man-hours does not exceed the maximum allowable working time for the daily average number of employees during the period covered".

d. Special Allowances.

In each instance where any of the special allowances listed below are shown on the payroll, the unit labor officer will attach ^{to the payroll} a statement of explanation and/or approval:

- (1) Non-work allowances

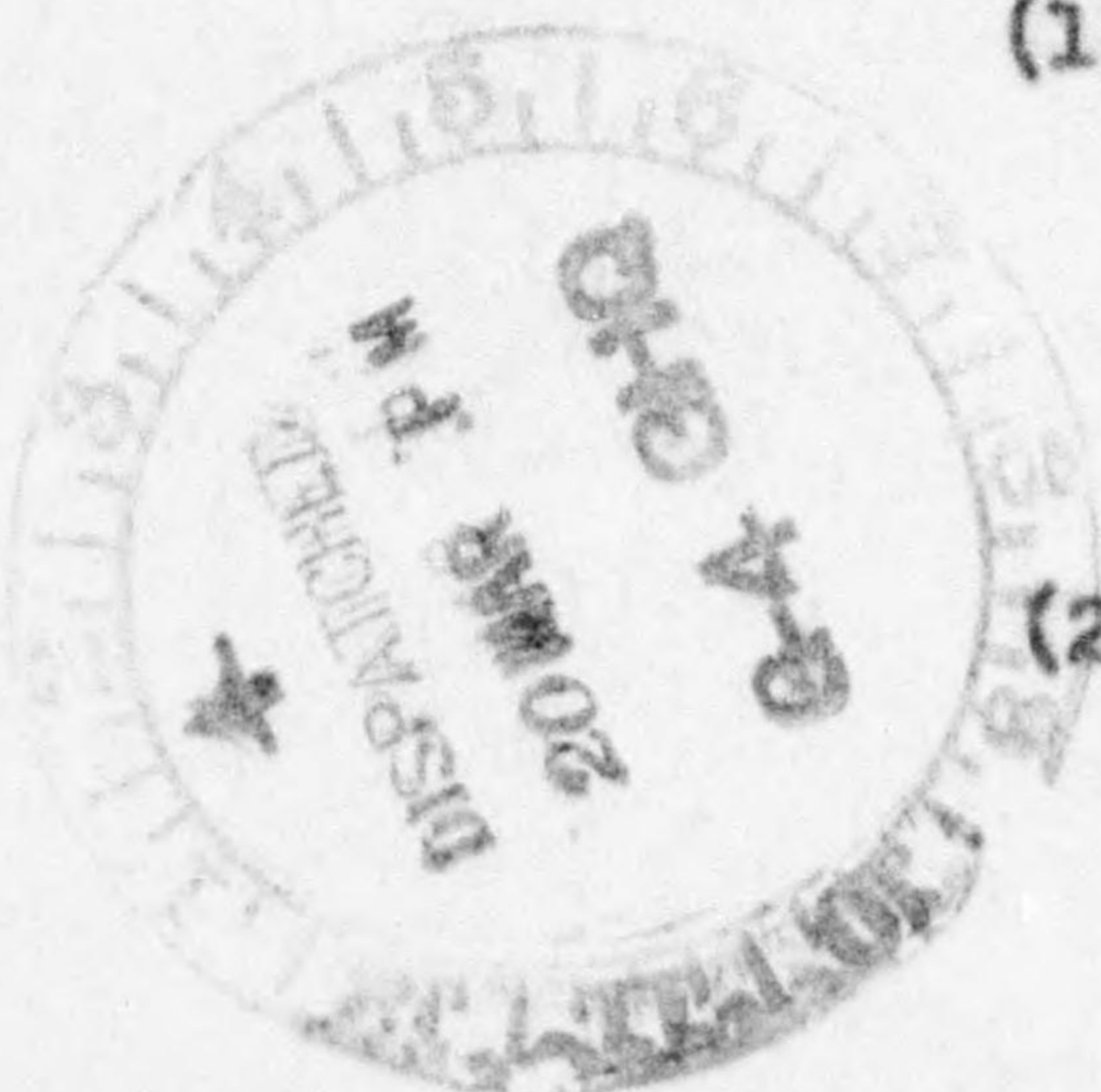

MEMORANDUM FOR RECORD:

SUBJECT: Procurement and Accounting for Services of the Japanese Merchant Marine

1. Basic is letter from CG 8th Army, subject, "Procurement and Accounting for Services of the Japanese Merchant Marine," dated 15 March 1949, which requested clarification and instructions on the following points concerning the receipting and accounting for Services of the Japanese Merchant Marine:

- a. Application of per diem hire rates for reserve fleet vessels.
- b. Provisions to be made for services rendered by SCAJAP shipping to United States Forces in Korea.
- c. Demurrage charges on Japanese owned SCAJAP vessels.
- d. Authority for continuing procurement of SCAJAP shipping.

2. At the request of Lt Col Cornutt (G-4) the above action was forwarded to G-4 by C/N from CTS who inclosed a per diem schedule of rates which were received from CMNC as the actual operating expenses for manning and operating the U. S. owned vessels (49 LSTs, 10 Liberties and 8 CIMAVI's) of the SCAJAP fleet. CTS, in coordination with COMNAVFE, has reviewed these rates, and recommend they be approved as rates to be used for both payments by the Japanese Government to CMNC and Occupation Force accounting. These rates have been approved by COMNAVFE (Comdr Meola) and are based on actual manning and operating expenses of CMNC. Since the rates include only actual expenses, COMNAVFE (Comdr Meola) feels that payment to CMNC should be allowed for each day as an Occupation expense except for those days a ship was actually used for Japanese civilian economy uses.

3. At the oral request of Lt Col Cornutt (G-4) on 17 March 1949, COMNAVFE, by letter, file CNFE/Q515, Serial 1171, subject "Employment of Japanese Manned U.S. Owned Shipping," dated March 19, 1949, submitted a breakdown of the operations of the U.S. owned SCAJAP fleet for the period 1 April 1948 to 31 January 1949, by "Days in port" and "days at sea" for the total of 10 Liberty, 8 CIMAVI's and 49 LST's. This includes all uses of these vessels for occupation force requirements. The days reported by COMNAVFE total 20,193 ship days for Occupation Force use out of a total of 20,502 ship days (306 days times 67 ships) for the 306 day period from 1 April 1948 to 31 January 1949. This leaves a balance of 309 ship days chargeable to the civilian economy which will not be receipted for. According to COMNAVFE (Comdr Meola) the only time these U.S. owned SCAJAP vessels

were used to haul Japanese civilian cargoes was when two Liberties were dispatched to Alaska to pick up petroleum products.

4. At a conference called by CTS on 7 March 1949, attended by G-4 (Lt Col DeYoung and Lt Col Cornutt), CTS (Mr. Spear), Trans Sec (Lt Col Albaugh), COMNAVFE (Comdr Meola and Lt Comdr Malone) and Eighth Army Trans (Mr. Vrugtman) it was generally agreed that immediate steps should be taken to prepare and process on a "per diem" basis procurement demand receipts for the services of U.S. owned SCAJAP shipping under JPNO 3831 since these receipts could not be satisfactorily accomplished on a "cargo hauled plus demurrage basis" for the following stated reasons:

a. According to 8th Army (Mr. Vrugtman) it has been impossible to prepare receipts accurately on a "tonnage hauled" basis and no receipts are now so prepared.

b. Since subject U. S. owned vessels are in a "stand-by" or "reserve" status most of the time, their payment on a "tonnage hauled" basis would not provide CMME with sufficient funds to operate or man the entire U. S. owned fleet. According to Trans O and COMNAVFE, there have been no civilian economy requirements for these U.S. owned vessels. Occupation force requirements have been mainly of "stand-by" status. The COMNAVFE letter referred to in paragraph 3 above, shows that approximately 22% of the total ship days (20,193) were days at sea (5,606 days at sea) and approximately 78% were days in port (14,587 days in port). Only 309 days or about 1.5% of the total days in port and at sea, have been established by COMNAVFE, as for the account of the Japanese civilian economy.

c. Procurement demand JPNO 3831, under which SCAJAP shipping is procured, visualized considerable "stand by" time in the use of these U.S. owned vessels and provided for payment of demurrage as "set forth in a demurrage schedule agreed upon by CTS, SCAJAP and Transportation Officer, Eighth Army". This demurrage schedule has never been prepared.

d. Information from ESS (Mr. McGlaufflin) reveals that 2,128,000,000 yen is included in the JFY 48 budget for the occupation force use of U.S. owned and Japanese owned SCAJAP ships. Of this sum only a token amount has been paid CMME by the Japanese Government as an advance payment. This sum has been established to cover all SCAJAP shipping for the first 2 quarters of JFY 48, for 80% of the 3rd quarter and of 30% of the 4th quarter. It was visualized that due to the time lag in the submission of procurement receipts, receipts could not be submitted prior to about 21 March 1949 to cover more than 80% of the 3rd quarter and 30% of the 4th quarter. The balance of these two quarters would be paid from ^{carryover} funds in the JFY 49 budget.

e. Receipts must be processed by 8th Army prior to 21 March 1949 in order that funds of the JFY 48 budget may be obligated against them. Otherwise, the obligation will have to be made against the JFY 49 budget.

f. According to Mr. Vrugtman (8th Army Transportation) receipts could not be properly prepared and processed on a "tonnage hauled" basis prior to 31 March 1949 for U. S. owned vessels. Receipts have been prepared but not processed by 8th Army to cover occupation cargo moved on Japanese owned vessels, up to 30 November 1948, on a cargo moved basis.

5. a. The following is based on information obtained from 8th Army Trans (Mr. Vrugtman) concerning obligations incurred against JPNO 3831 for use of Japanese owned shipping for transporting occupation cargo:

6. As pointed out in paragraph 4d above, the JFY 48 budget was intended to include only 80% of the 3rd quarter and 30% of the 4th quarter. According to Mr. McGlaufflin, payments for the balance of these two quarters will be made from carry over funds which will be included in the JFY 49 budget. The 1948 budget, therefore, includes funds for 74 days in the 3rd quarter and 27 days in the 4th quarter. The figures listed in paragraph 5 above include payment for:

7. From the above, information, it is determined that the funds presently set aside in the JFY 48 budget for SCAJAP shipping (2,128,000,000 yen) may be properly obligated if procurement demand receipts (GPA Form 2) are executed by 21 March 1949 by Eighth Army as follows:

a. For Japanese owned vessels - on a cargo ton basis and passenger mile basis. These receipts, in amount of 765,291,453.43 yen, have been prepared by 8th Army.

b. For U. S. owned vessels - on a "days at sea" and "days in port" basis - based on the information furnished (No. of days) by COMNAVFE and on the rates furnished by GTS, concurred in by COMNAVFE.

8. It has been further determined that funds are available in the JFY 48 budget to cover the preparation of receipts for U. S. owned SCAJAP vessels on a per diem basis as outlined in paragraph 7b above.

9. In discussions with Trans O, 8th Army (Mr. Vrugtman) and COMNAVFE (Cmdr Meola) it was learned that the records being kept on the use of SCAJAP shipping do not permit procurement demand receipts to be prepared under separate account code numbers in connection with the redistribution of excesses in Korea. SCAP letters, file AG 400.12 (7 Aug 48) OGA, dated 7 August 1948 and 21 September 1948, directed that 8th Army utilize 8 separate account codes in accounting for shipments from Korea to Japan, RYCOM, MARBO and PHILRYCOM, and with separate account code numbers for U.S. owned shipping and Japanese owned shipping. These account code numbers were to appear on the procurement demand receipts (GPA-2) covering the use of SCAJAP shipping in connection with the redistribution of these excesses from Korea. Mr. Vrugtman states that it would take approximately 3 weeks to obtain the necessary information to enable 8th Army to break down their receipts for SCAJAP shipping by the above designated code number. In order to obligate the funds set aside in the JFY 48 budget for SCAJAP shipping, receipts must be processed by 21 March 49. To permit the receipts to be prepared and processed immediately special arrangements have been made by OGA (Maj Mitchell) with 8th Army Accounting Sec to have all the receipts on SCAJAP shipping submitted under 2 account code numbers, one for U.S. owned ships and one for Japanese owned ships. These will be held in a separate account until 8th Army is able to determine what amounts should be transferred to the 8 code account numbers referred to above. In order to expedite this procedure it is felt that instant proposed letter to CG, 8th Army should direct that the receipts for SCAJAP shipping be broken down into the appropriate account codes not later than 1 May 49 and a report made to OGA, GHQ. Maj Mitchell, OGA, concurs in this portion of the proposed action.

10. Instant letter to CG, 8th Army is self-explanatory.

11. This is interim action on G-4 Journal No. 79562. Action complete on G-4 Journal No. 79563.

2. Subject correspondence relates to 170 Japanese personnel who were requested by the Occupation Forces in the area of Oita Prefecture to serve as civilian guards during the period 1 June through 24 July 1948.

3. Radio, this headquarters, Cite D 72409 DC, dated 20 August 1948, requested your headquarters to make an investigation to determine whether there was any violation of Eighth Army directives relating to utilization of Japanese guards. In your reply, dated 24 August 1948, it was stated that investigation failed to disclose any violation of Eighth Army directives.

4. It is directed that a new investigation be made to ascertain if 170 Japanese were employed by the Occupation Forces in the Oita Prefecture during period mentioned in paragraph 2, above. A report stating results of such investigation will be rendered to this headquarters without delay. Should this investigation disclose that such personnel were actually utilized, immediate steps will be taken to effect a legal labor instrument, retroactively to period mentioned above, to insure payment by Japanese Government.

1. In compliance with preceding indorsement an investigation of the matter referred to in basic communication has been made with results as follows:

a. 170 Japanese performed work as civilian guards for the 19th Infantry Regiment during the period 1 June 1948 - 24 July 1948 and were not paid therefore until 28 December 1948.

b. Reason for delayed payment was that these 170 Japanese were not covered by proper procurement instrument during the period 1 June 1948 - 24 July 1948.

c. Payment of these 170 Japanese was accomplished as a result of a letter and time sheets signed by Captain Dalton C. Bartlett, 19th Infantry Labor Officer and submitted to the Oita Ken Government on 21 October 1948. Authority for issuance of this letter and time sheets cannot be ascertained. Copy of this letter is inclosed herewith. Captain Bartlett cleared the 19th Infantry Regiment on 15 December 1948 bound for the U.S.

d. These 170 Japanese had been working for the 19th Infantry Regiment prior to 1 June 1948 as civilian guards. It appears that thru a lack of understanding of regulations governing the employment of Japanese that these 170 Japanese were improperly retained during the period 1 June 1948 - 24 July 1948, pending clarification of regulations on the matter. See inclosed statements of 1st Lt. Joseph T. Cadden and Mr. Kakuo Tsueki, Chief Foreign Affairs Section, Oita Ken Government.

e. Captain Nett, the Provost Marshal referred to in the statement of Mr. Kakuo Tsueki was not available for questioning, having been transferred from the 19th Infantry on 29 October 1948 to Hq. Kobe Base, APO 317.



1. Paragraph 4, 1st Indorsement complied with. Attention is invited to report of investigation contained in the 5th Indorsement above and inclosures thereto.
2. It appears that subject civilian guards were inadvertently omitted from requisitioned labor manning tables for the month of June 1948. During May 1948, this headquarters was advised that the ceiling for requisitioned labor for this command would be reduced by 40%, which necessitated a study with a view of operating with the proposed reduction. Subsequently, Messageform your headquarters, file AG 230.145-E, dated 12 June 1948, Subject: "Japanese Labor Serving the Occupation Forces", established the maximum allowance for the employment of requisitioned Japanese Labor to 5200 with instructions that the allocation will not be exceeded subsequent to 30 June 1948. During the interim period and readjustment of Japanese Labor in order to operate efficiently with the reduced allocation, the 19th Infantry Regiment apparently overlooked the reporting of subject 170 civilian guards on proper procurement instrument, due to awaiting clarification of directives in this matter.
3. Attention is invited to Inclosure 3 which states that the 19th Infantry Regiment continued use of the civilian guards on separate residences which probably was brought about due to the number of attempts of robbery during the period April and May in the Beppu Area.
4. Reference is made to inclosure 4, statement of Kakuo Tsueki, Chief of the Foreign Affairs Section, Oita Ken Government. Subject civilian guards were paid on 28 December 1948. These guards will be included on QGD-23 report and charged against requisitioned labor allocations for this command during the month of January 1949.
5. It is believed that there was no intention of defraud or preemption in this case but that the action taken was in the best interests of the Occupation Forces. Positive and completed action was taken by the unit concerned to effect payment to the civilian guards prior to receipt of attached correspondence. Attention is invited to the fact

that the Japanese civilian guards in question could also have been included on QGD-23 reports and charged against requisitioned labor manning table ceiling for June, July or December 1948, without exceeding the maximum allowance of this command during subject months.

6. In view of the above and information contained in 5th Indorsement with inclosures thereto, and since payment to subject civilian guards has been effected, it is recommended that no further action be taken in this matter.

1. Reference: Paragraph 3 of the Memorandum of the General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, File AG 230.14 (26 Jul. 1948) GD. SCAPIN 1932, Dated 11 September 1948, Subject: "Deviation Report on Employment of Japanese Civilian Guards and Firemen.

2. It seems to us that the matter stated in above subject has hardly been settled so far as being reported from the Oita prefectural government as follows:

3. 170 Japanese were requested by the Occupation Forces unit in area of Oita prefecture to serve as civilian guards during the period of 1st June through 24th July 1948. The Oita prefectural government was assured by the Occupation Forces that those personnel would be covered by labor requisition retroactively since 1 June.

4. Although the Occupation Forces in that area is reported to have requested Hq. 8th Army to the effect cited in the preceding paragraph, the matter has not yet come to a solution in the three months after their discharge.

5. It is hereby respectfully requested that necessary steps be taken by your Hq. at the earliest possible opportunity for the solution of this matter.





1. During the month of June 1948 a directive was received from Higher Headquarters relative to dismissal of Japanese Civilian Guards employed on Labor Requisition, who were guarding separate residences. The directive was not complied with immediately in order to clarify a few points, the MG and 19th Inf chose to await further instructions from Div Hq and continued the use of the guards on separate residences. This action was probably brought about due to the number of attempts of robbery during the period April and May, the attempts were frustrated by the Civilian Guards. It was general belief that the facilities of the Japanese Police were not adequate for the protection of Occupation Forces in separate residences and a request for retention of the Guards was forwarded but disapproved. During the period involved no provisions were available for the hiring of guards by individuals, at present this is corrected by Cir 47 H8A 1948.

2. The Civilian Guards were aware of the fact that they might not be reimbursed for their services but decided to take a chance. They were also informed that a request for retention of their services was forwarded.

3. It is firmly believed that the action taken was in the best interest of the Occupation Forces in this area.

SUBJECT: The particulars of getting Labor Requisition for the
Civilian Guards.

1. Circumstances at the time of getting Labor Requisition.

Receiving telegrams two, three times from the Special Procurement Board in Tokyo that suggested to require the Labor Requisition. We negotiated with the Occupation Forces in Oita Prefecture (mainly with Military Government) about issuing the Labor Requisition based on the Government Financial Department Letter Part. 1 No. 366 (which shows the applicable directives for SCAPIN-1872) and Directives from the Chief of the Superintendent Bureau of the Government Financial Department, but the opinion of the Military Government was that it was difficult to give us any definite responsible decision until the necessary directives were given to the Military Government. And we received an order from the Commanding Officer of the Oita Military Govt. Headquarters, Col. Goodrich through the interpreter, Miss Kusaka at 14:35 on 4 June 1948, not to discharge the guards and have them do their duty as before unless the 19th Infantry Regiment and the Military Government notified us the necessary action.

The person who received this order was Mr. Sannosuke Warisaya, an employee of my office at that time.

So according to this order, we continued to keep the guards. But we did inquire of the Occupation Forces for the Labor Requisition. And, later, the Oita Military Government showed us a disposition not to be able to get the Labor Requisition and told us that to guard scattered dependent homes should be done by the civilian police under the responsibility of the Japanese Government.

So, conforming to this opinion we transferred those civilian guards to the Police Guard which was organized by the plan of the Chief of the Beppu Police Station, and we removed the civilian guards on 24 July 1948.


The above stated action of transferring civilian guards to the Police Guard was done with the understanding of the Commanding Officer in Oita Military Government and the Provost Marshall in Beppu Military Police Station.

And beside this, we had submitted two petitions which were "Gai" No. 949, dated 1 July 1948 and "Gai" No. 949, dated 30 July 1948 to Col. Goodrich, the Commanding Officer of the Oita Military Government Headquarters in order to get the Labor Requisition issued to take care of the period employed from 1 June 1948 to 24 July 1948. So we were issued the Labor Requisition for the 170 guards from Capt Dalton C. Bartlett on 21 Oct. 1948.

Then this case has been all fixed up.

2. Number of guards involved is 170.
3. Classification of these guards is all Civilian Guards for the Occupation Forces Installations in Beppu and Oita Area.
4. These Civilian Guards were considered to work for the Provost Marshall, Capt Nett, because assignment of the post, increasing and decreasing the number of the Guards were done under the supervision of the Provost Marchall.
5. The Labor Requisition was received from the S-4 Officer of 19th Infantry Regiment, Capt Bartlett through the interpreter, Mr. Morita on 22 Oct 1948.
6. All the guards in question have been paid on 28 Dec 1948.

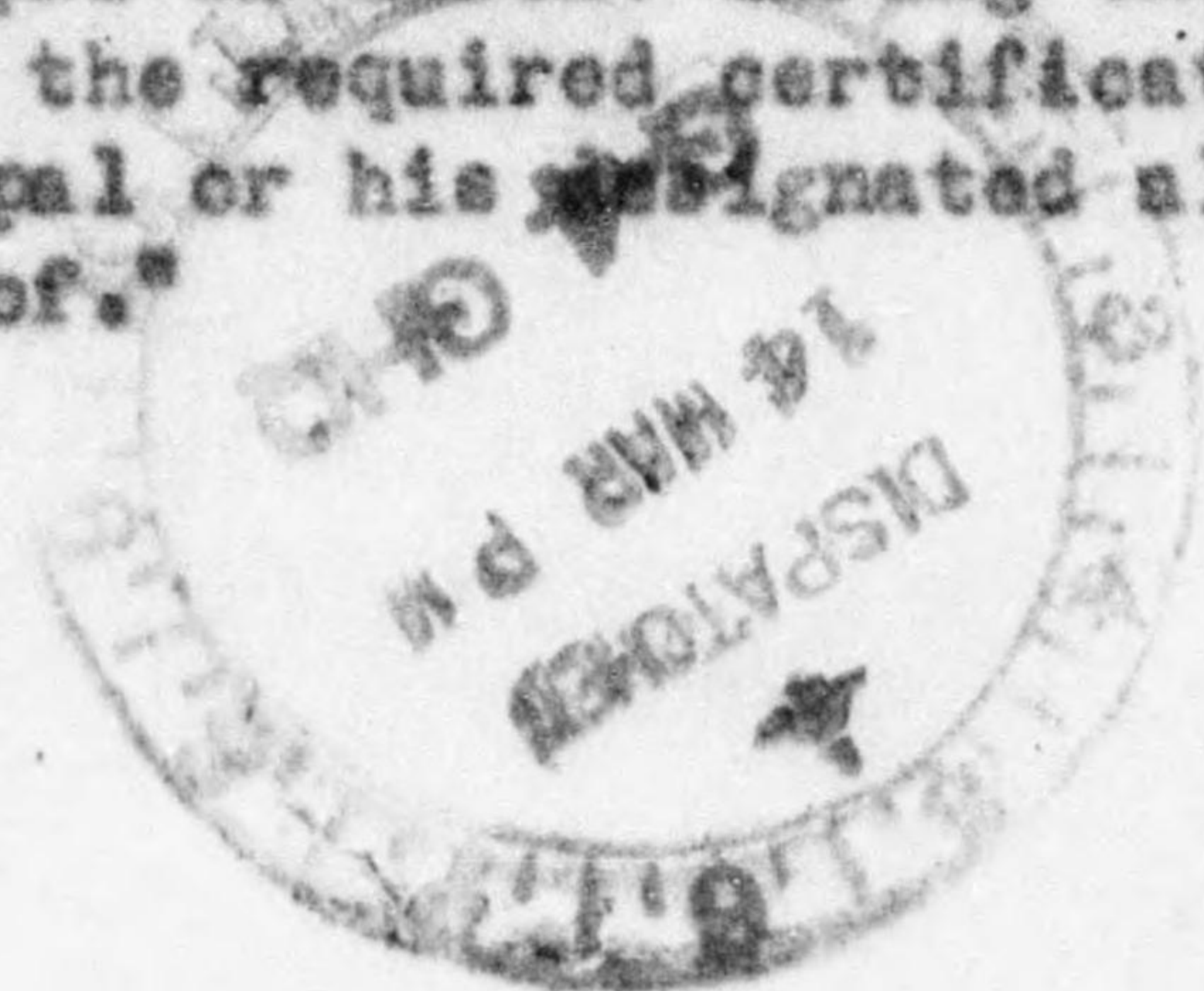

1. The monthly reports of delinquent accounts for personal services submitted by your headquarters reveal a steadily increasing number of delinquencies. The number reported as remaining uncollected as of 10 March 1949 was 1650, representing a dollar value of \$9,791.44. The delinquencies extend as far back as August 1948.

2. It is desired that immediate action be taken to collect all amounts due for Category II personnel employed by U. S. agencies or individuals for which you are responsible for collection. For the time being the matter of the foreign missions payment is in abeyance due to negotiations for settlement on government level.

3. In those cases where individuals fail to pay after reasonable notice you will cause their Category II employees to be withdrawn. Employees once withdrawn will not be replaced until the account is settled in full. In this connection, in billets no individual room service will be rendered. When no money is actually due, but only a failure to sign the required certificate is involved, employees will not be withdrawn.

4. Existing instructions are modified to the extent that where the principal is absent during the period of collection, the payment and signing of the required certificates may be accomplished by the wife of the principal or his designated alternate who will sign "For and in the absence of."

MEMORANDUM FOR RECORD:

SUBJECT: Ltr to Hq & Sv Gp re Delinquent Accounts Category II Personnel

1. Monthly reports of the number of delinquent accounts in payment for Category II personnel submitted by Hq & Sv Gp revealed a steadily increasing number.
2. The January report showed 752 for that month alone. Inquiry revealed that an accrued total of 1650 such accounts existed as of 10 March 1949, representing a dollar value of \$9,791.44. Some confusion appeared to exist in the minds of Hq & Sv Gp personnel as to the authority they had to proceed with enforcing payment. On 11 March G-4 directed a command letter be prepared covering the points in question.
3. Instructions were to direct prompt collection, and in cases of refusal or neglect to pay after reasonable notice CG Hq & Sv Gp authorized to withdraw Category II personnel and withhold further service until the delinquent account was cleared. To modify existing instructions to Hq & Sv Gp to the extent that the certificate of employment or non-employment may be executed by the wife or principal alternate during the absence of the principal. A report to be called for as of 1 April giving status of delinquent accounts and proposed further actions by Hq & Sv Gp to effect collection.
4. The attached draft accomplishes the above.
5. Approved by C/S (Gen Almond) 13 Mar 49.
6. Action modifies established policy as regards certificate and establishes policy regarding non-payment.

MEMORANDUM FOR RECORD:

Subject: Reduction of Yen Cost in Japanese Payrolls.

1. By message form, 7 March SCAP approved action taken by COMNAVFE in effecting a 20% reduction in yen costs at COMNAVFE Hq and APL 46, but requested further information concerning COMNAVFE's request for either an undetermined overtime basis for Sasebo, or an increase of 50 spaces in COMNAVFE's requisitioned labor ceiling.
2. By 090104 Z dated 10 Mar COMNAVFE gives the additional information. Specifically we asked for the past three months average of overtime man-hours by personnel classified as yard craft personnel and firemen. They report a monthly average of 4,420 man-hours overtime for the past three months, and give as a justification an average of one US or allied vessel per week requiring water deliveries, the requirement for 24 hour turn around servicing on tankers, average two per week, and the unpredictable overtime for firemen once a blaze has started. They forecast that overtime will never exceed 6,000 man-hours per month.
3. The requested increase of 50 spaces in COMNAVFE's labor ceiling on a thirty day basis in lieu of undetermined overtime would represent 8,000 man-hours. Comparison between the undetermined overtime basis, (4,420 man-hours three months average) and an increase in the labor ceiling gives a saving of 2,000 man-hours minimum in favor of undetermined overtime. Inasmuch as the type of operation involved is unpredictable in labor requirements, an overtime arrangement appears more feasible and more economical use of man-hours than does a fixed manning table.
4. This action approves undetermined overtime for COMNAVFE's Sasebo operations.
5. Recommend approval of proposed message form.


