I am to tell how 4-H club work offers recreational advantages to us. Last month I led recreation in my club. We played quiet games and active games, and did community singing. Everybody took part - old and young. To keep the older people from saying they could not play we started off with a game called "Birds have Feathers." When the players flew at the wrong time they had to pay a pawn, and to get their belongings, many stunts were done. Many of them were timid, but when they got into the spirit they enjoyed it.

We played other games as "Gossip," "Black Magic," and "Ford Car." We also had a spelling match between the night school students and the 4-H club members. Two long lists of words were called with each side trying to excel. The first list was won by the 4-H club members and the night school students won in the second. Before goin; outdoors we sang some of our spirituals - "Roll Jordan Roll," "Hy Lord is Writing All the Time," and "I Want to be Ready." The old folks and the young out their whole hearts into the singing for we can always have a good time singing spirituals. The 4-K club performs sang "Old McDonald had a Farm."

Some of our outdoor games were "Three Deen," and "Potato Race." There was lots of fun playing these, for several times the older people beat us running.

I take part at the night school in our community by helping with the singing, Since I have been a 4-H club member I have taken a course in singing and received a certificate. I am the leader of the junior choir in my church, and teacher of the fourth class in Sunday School.

We enjoy our club work and it seems like play when we come together for our home-making and farming projects. We try to give a part of every club meeting to play and games. Everyone of the fourteen 4-H clubs in Wake County, where I live, do the same thing and last year the membership of 300 boys and girls held what we call a Round-up Day at Pullen Park in Raleigh, the capital of the State. It was the largest crowd we ever had. Besides the boys and girls there were parents and other grown folks as well. A truck load of parents and club members went from my community. I enjoyed the day for I met many boys and girls of other clubs and learned something about what they are doing. The big county meeting in Raleigh showed us all what club work could do for our pleasure and we had more coming to club meetings than ever before, thereafter. Some of them became better club members and all of us are planning more community-get-togethers for fun. I will never forget the camp we had in Johnston County in 133. Seventy-five boys and girls went from Wake County and lived three days of camp life. We cooked our own meals. The boys helping with the cleaning. Each girl and boy took

I have enjoyed every one of my seven years in 4-H club work and think that it has many advantages for a girl or boy.

Of course I haven't much money to pay my way, but I am going to plant a plot of sweet potatoes as my project this year, hoping to have them accepted as part payment on my board.
