NEW DODGE COACH HAS ARRIVED HERE

Dodge Brothers' much-heralded new coach arrived in California this week, according to Dessin Bros., San Mateo county Dodge dealers. It was announced nationally at the New York Auto Show, and reports from that source have mentioned it as one of the prominent features of the national show. It is a characteristic Dodge Brothers product in appointments, finish, and detail.

The graceful lines are set off to advantage by the lacquer finish in Dodge Brothers' blue, with a body stripe of cartouche yellow. Shroud and belt are black. Doors and windows are exceptionally large, affording a clear vision on all sides and permitting passengers to enter and leave the car with the greatest ease. Each of the two doors is equipped with a pull-to-handle on the molding, greatly simplifying the closing. The car is locked on the right side by a key lock and the left door is locked from the inside by a small trip lock.

The City Marshal of the City of South San Francisco together with the chairman of the street committee of the Board of Trustees of said City, are ordered and directed to abate same, as hereinafter specified.

SECTION 1. When it appears that any tree in the City of South San Francisco is of the character as set forth in Section 1 of said Ordinance, and is not on private property, the City Marshal, together with the chairman of the street committee of the Board of Trustees of said City, shall cause same to be removed forthwith so as to remove such obstruction, and when said tree is of the character as mentioned in Section 1 of this Ordinance and is partially on private property and partially on public parking, the City Marshal, together with the Chairman of the street committee of the Board of Trustees of said City, shall give a written notice to the owner, lessee or agent of said property where said tree is located to remove the tree within ten days from the receipt of said notice; and if not so removed within that time, the City Marshal and Chairman of the Board are directed to summarily abate said nuisance by causing same to be removed in such manner as will be least objectional to the neighborhood. But in abating such nuisance only such part of the tree as is objectional shall be removed, and when a tree can be saved by removing certain branches or roots, such abatement shall go no further than the removal of such branches or roots.

SECTION 2. When damage is done to sidewalk caused by a tree or trees of owner, lessee or agent, the cost of repair shall be borne by said owner, lessee or agent.

SECTION 3. Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall upon conviction thereof be fined in a sum not to exceed \$100 or by imprisonment in the City Jail not to exceed ten days or by both said fine and imprisonment.

SECTION 4. Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall upon conviction thereof be fined in a sum not to exceed \$100 or by imprisonment in the City Jail not to exceed ten days or by both said fine and imprisonment.
