Gendarmes Open Fire on Strikers, Killing and Wounding Many.

(Associated Press.)

St. Petersburg, May 21.—The Obokonforf Armor Plats Ordane Works, a government institution midway between St. Petersburg and Schiusselbourg, was the scene of various demonstrations, involving severe fighting between soldiers, police and mounted gendarmes and strikers to-day.

Workmen, numbering several thousand men, struck on Monday and the windows of the factory on the Schlusselbourg road were smashed. The gendarmes fired on the strikers, killing several and wounding many, according to information given by local witnesses. The soldiers were patrolling the districts in couples when the scene was visited this afternoon. The chaussee was lined for long distance with idle workmen. The eight-hour movement is spreading rapid.

Confession Of Faith

Question of Revision Is Now Being Discussed at Presbyterian General Assembly.

Debate Will Not Be Interrupted Until a Definite Settlement Is Reached.

Controversy Has Resulted in Commissioners Forming Into Three Groups.

(Associated Press.)

Philadelphia, May 23.—The important estion of revising the creed, which for e past two years has been agitating general assembly to-day and promised a lengthy debate. The discussion is not to be interrupted by other business until

the commissioners shall reach some definite conclusion.

The controversy regarding revision has led to the formation of three groups among the 040-commissioners to the general assembly. First there is the conservative group, composed of those opposed to any change whatever in the doctrinal standard of the church. Then there is the party desirous of setting aside the Confession of Faith as not truthfully expressing the belief of the church. Between these stand the centrists, who favor maintaining the old confession with a few modifications and who desire the adoption of a clear declarative statement setting forth the most important doctrines, and laying special emphasis upon the love of God for mankind, and on the work of the Holy Spirit.

In answer to the questions submitted

In answer to the questions submitted to the Presbyteries, fifty asked the assembly to dismiss the whole subject, one was undecided, four said they desired neither a revision nor a supplemental statement, nor the dismissal of the whole subject, and of 233 Presbyteries, 15 in the United States and 16 in foreign lands, failed to respond.

Of the remaining Presbyteries, nearly two-thirds of the whole number asked for some change in the creedal statement, 47 desired a revision of the confession, 11 an explanatory statement, one revision, and an explanatory statement, one an explanatory statement, 15 revision and a supplemental statement, 15 revision and a supplemental statement, one an explanatory statement and a supplemental statement, 14 a substitute creed, one an alternative creed, and six some change not specified.

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


