United States

A record increase of 12.5 million in the number of housing units occurred in the 10 years preceding April 1, 1950, according to the preliminary count for the 1960 Census of Housing. The increase for the previous decade was only 8.7 million. The preliminary total of housing units for 50 States and the District of Columbia is 58.6 million compared to 46.1 million in 1950, an increase of 27 percent.

The region showing the greatest relative growth was the West with a 43-percent increase compared with a 23-percent increase for the Northeast and North Central Regions. The greatest absolute increase, 3.6 million, occurred in the South.

The two geographic divisions in the West led all divisions in the growth of the housing supply. The 45-percent increase in the Pacific Division was more than three times as great as the 13-percent increase in the East South Central Division.

The preliminary count was larger in all 50 States, ranging from a 2-percent increase in Arkansas to a 99-percent gain in Alaska. One other State, Florida, increased its housing supply more than 90 percent and three others increased more than 50 percent--Nevada, ⁸2 percent; Arizona, 73 percent; and California, The housing inventory of 11 ad-53 percent. ditional States increased more rapidly than the national average. The increases in the 16 fastest growing States, which account for only a third of our housing supply, comprised almost half of the total increase in the Nation. These States include the seven southwestern States, Arizona, California, Colorado, Nevada, New Mexico, Texas, and Utah; Connecticut and New Jersey in the Northeast Region; Delaware, Florida, Maryland, and Virginia on the East Coast; Michigan and the two new States, Alaska and Hawaii. Only two States had less than a 5-percent increase -- Arkansas, 2 percent, and Mississippi, 3 percent.

The pattern of growth in the States in the 1950-1960 decade differed only slightly from the pattern in the previous decade. In general, the same States in both decades had an increase above the national average. Four of the five States leading in housing growth in the past decade also were the leaders in 1940 to 1950 -- Florida, Arizona, Nevada, and Similarly, of the States that California. increased the least between 1950 and 1960, three, Mississippi, North Dakota, and South Dakota, were in that same category between 1940 and 1950.

HOUSING UNITS, FOR PLACES OF 10,000 INHABITANTS OR MORE: 1960 AND 1950








HOUSING UNITS, FOR PLACES OF 10,000 INHABITANTS OR MORE: 1960 AND 1950

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


HOUSING UNITS, FOR PLACES OF 10,000 INHABITANTS OR MORE: 1960 AND 1950
