WENT UP IN FLAMES.

The Residence of F. M. Righter Burned to the Ground.

On Tuesday at about 11 A. M. an alarm of fire startled the people of Campbell and the news sped around that F. M. Righter's house was on fire. The fire buckets and ladders were rushed out in double quick and taken to the scene of the conflagration where many willing hands set to work to save all that there was any hope of saving. The house with its contents were too far gone by the time help arrived to admit of a possibility of saving them and the attention of the volunteer firemen was directed to the tank house barn and tool house which were very near the fire. Fortunately water was secured in considerable quantity from the tank and the building's were drenched as far as it was possible to do so. But in spite of all the efforts to save them it seemed for a time that the tank-house must go. It was not over fifteen feet north of the house and though the wind was in its favor the fire was so intensely hot that the water thrown on it seemed to have but little effect. It was in this emergency that the boys of Campbell made their record for grit and daring as they climbed ladders to the top of the building and stood in the intense heat throwing water over on the smoking cornice and rustic below. This was the work that saved the building. If there ever have been doubts in the minds of any one as to their being material for a good fire company in Campbell they will certainly not be found since this fire. The fire was confined to the main building entirely, which with all its contents was a total loss. A piano, a valuable microscopic instrument, many valuable books and papers, household furniture etc., were included among

the articles destroyed. An insurance of \$1300 on all the buildings on the place will give Mr. Righter but a small amount in comparison to his loss. The whole community very much regret the unfortunate accident. As to its cause the family cannot account for it. All were out of the house when it started but as Mrs. Righter was washing she had quite a good fire in the cook stove upon which she had placed her wash boiler and it must in some way have started from this. Campbell has been fortunate in escaping disastrous fires so long this being the first in the history of the town which is now nine or ten years old. It comes, however, as a lesson to us and should hasten the arrangement of a good fire department. We should have a fire company and some additional apparatus as well as a means of securing an abundant supply of water in all parts of the town. Without these we may see our town go up before our eyes while we can only look on with vain regrets.

At Los Gatos on next Tuesday evening an entertainment will be given by the San Jose Orchestral Society which will be of a very high order. The society orchestra will consist of thirty pieces. BENJAMIN CASEY.

A Californian for Forty Years and a Model Citizen.

On Wednesday of last week at about 1 o'clock were laid to rest in Oak Hill cemetery the earthly remains of Benjamin Casey who for almost forty years has resided in Santa Clara county and most of the time not far from Campbell. Mr. Casey was born in Holmes county Ohio in 1810, being in his eighty-sixth year at the time of his death. He lived in his native state until his twenty-ninth year when he moved to Iowa and lived for a number of years. In about 1854 he gathered up some nursery stock and a lot of seed and started for California taking a boat down the Mississippi river and intending to come out by way of Panama over one of the steam ship routes. When in the vicinity of New Orleans, however, his boat was wrecked and he lost everything. This caused him to go back and delay his journey to the Golden West for two years when he gathered up a second stock of trees and seed and made another start taking the ship this time at New York. He arrived at his destination without accident and settled on a piece of land a mile south east of Campbell where he had a large nursery for several years. He finally sold the place and went into the newspaper business in San Jose first running a temperance then an agricultural paper.

In '80 or '81 he went to Lompoc in the southern part of the state and while there had a stroke of paralysis. This, with a complication of other ailments, broke down his health and he came back to live with his brother Louis, a helpless invalid. For the past twelve years he has been a patient sufferer until at last death came to release him.

His character was beyond re-

proach. All who knew him speak of uncle Ben Casey as a model man as to all the principals which make up true manhood. He belonged to the Wesleyan Methodist church, was a great temperance worker and during the days of slavery in the South a very active abolitionist.

A Pleasing Entertainment.

On Tuesday evening the lecture and stereoptican exhibition arranged by the ladies of the M. E. church was held with a large attendance. Rev. Wong Foo Shun, the Chinese minister proved a most interesting speaker and the views thrown on the screen with a powerful dissolving stereoptican were some of the finest we have ever seen. A Chinese wedding was represented during the evening by several young ladies in elegant costume showing in a very realistic manner the way they "woo and wed" in the Chinese empire.

Peach Borers.

The following information given by a prominent horticulturist with regard to treatment for peach borers may be of considerable value to our ranchers: "After the borers have been dug out of the trunk and larger roots make a brush out of an old broom and get some North Carolina pine tar and some fish oil. Take 1 part fish oil to 2 parts pine tar, heat them together and paint the roots and trunk thoroughly with it. This will form a perfect preventative as the young borers cannot penetrate it. It would be well to put it on right now."

Without a cool head to direct in the work at a fire we always see a great deal of energy wasted in doing things that

bring no good result and the work done in some cases is worse than thrown away. The first move that is made in the way of town improvement, in our opinion, should be to provide something to protect what improvements we already have.

NO PLACE LIKE SANTA CLARA VALLEY.

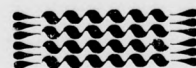
