THE books whose titles appear in the following catalogue, relating solely to Irish literature, have been collected almost entirely within the last twenty years. It need scarcely, however, be observed, that they do not by any means pretend to be a perfect collection of the great number of works which have from time to time been printed on the history of the sister kingdom. It is a library of a far less comprehensive character, relating, in the first place, to Irish history and antiquities, together with a less perfect collection of authors who have written on Ireland, in illustration more particularly of its progress and improvement. Indeed, the

collector of this Irish library would not have committed the catalogue to the press, but for the opinion of more than one gentleman well versed in the history of Ireland, who persuaded him that it would be desirable to do so, considering, perhaps with the too partial judgment of friends, that the library was of a somewhat rare and uncommon character, and deserved therefore to be permanently remembered, even after it may have been dispersed by the hammer of the auctioneer—a fate, however, which the owner has endeavoured to avert, by making it an heirloom in his family.

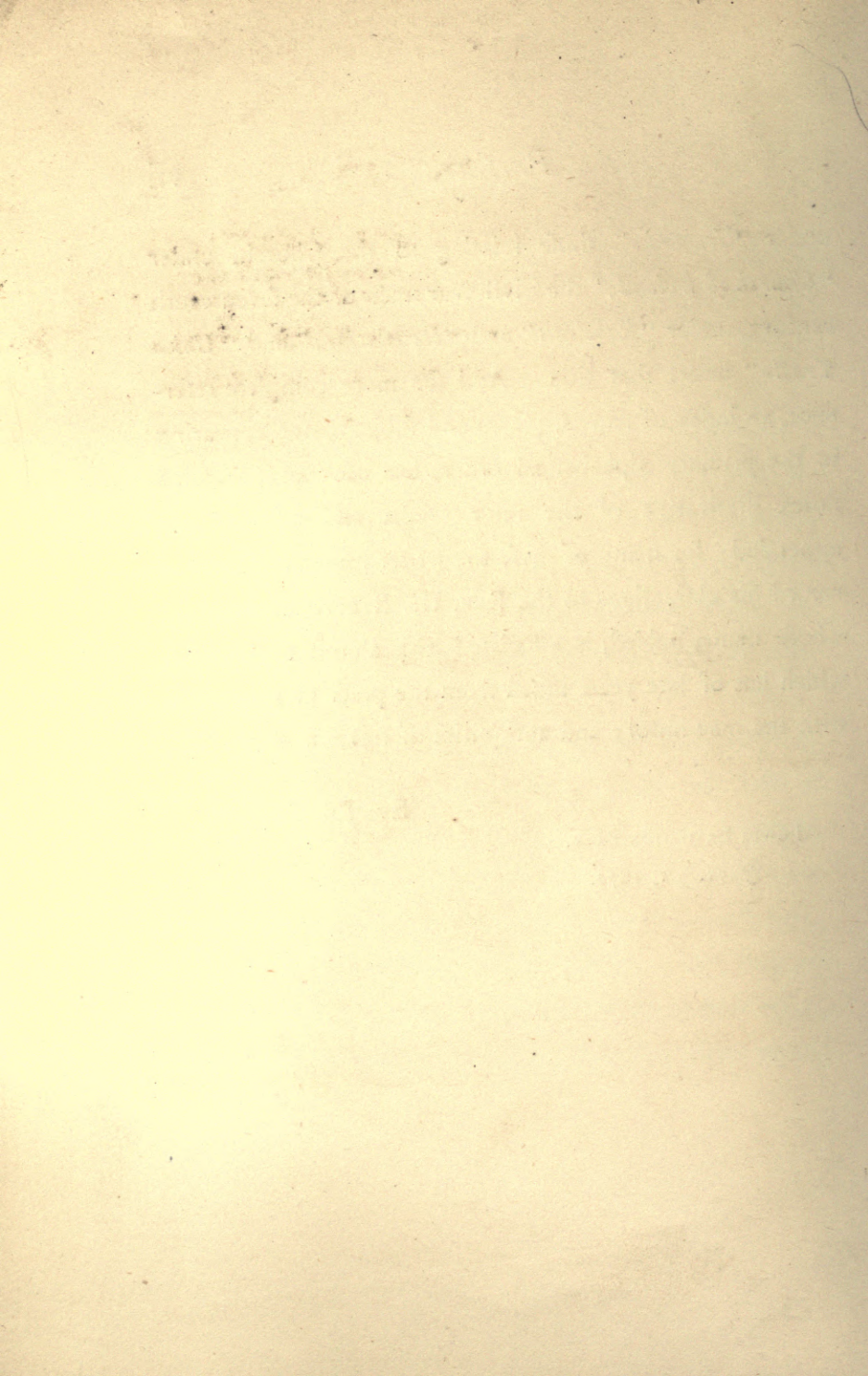
All those who have had any experience in cataloguing books will, I am sure, agree that it is no easy task to do so with precision, and will, therefore, make allowance for the writer, if he has not always succeeded. He has endeavoured simply to use the alphabetical order, arranging the library under the names of the authors, where they are attainable, as well as under the subjects to which they relate, anonymous works have, however, generally been placed

under "*Ireland*;" those relating to the Church, under "*Church of Ireland*;" the Civil War tracts of the seventeenth century, under "*Rebellion*" and "*Revolution*;" and "*Union Tracts*" under that title. And for more complete reference, an index of names, places and subjects, not appearing in the primary alphabetical order, has been added; some notes illustrative of the rarer books and editions are appended; for many of these the writer must not forget to record his obligations to the Rev. Dr. Reeves, of Armagh, whose name, indeed, is associated with almost every work which has of late years issued from the press in connection with the *true* history and antiquities of Ireland.

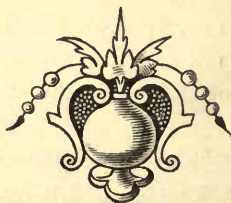

His father, Dr. John Barton, was a fellow and Vice-Provost of Trinity College, Dublin, and had the distinction of being tutor to Dr. Thomas Wilson, Bishop of Sodor and Man. He was violently expelled from his residence in the college, on account of his Protestant principles, by the adherents of King James II. The son was a Scholar of Trin. Coll., *Dubl.*, in 1724; graduated B. A. in 1726; and M. A. in 1731.

This vol. was published by subscription, and the names of those subscribers who took copies of the "Analogy" have a special mark. There were two impressions, one on printing paper, at 9s. 9d., and the other on writing paper, at 13s. half bound.
