

We repack all bulbs on arrival from Japan from the heavy clay into sawdust, sort out every decayed bulb, and guarantee the arrival of bulbs in **sound condition**, delays or accidents to carriers excepted. Prices given below are f. o. b. San Francisco. If desired we will, on application, give you **net prices delivered**; or, you can calculate for yourself.

We will also import, for any one willing to risk it, bulbs direct from Japan. Prices are about 40 per cent. less f. o. b. Yokohama, and bulbs will be shipped right through to destination. All freight, custom and transfer charges are payable by consignee, and **any and all responsibility** on our part **ceases with delivery of goods on board** steamer at Yokohama. This offer applies only to orders of at least 1,000 bulbs. Bulbs shipped from Japan are packed in clay, weighing double the weight of bulbs repacked in sawdust.

THIS newly discovered fodder plant is sure to win favor wherever introduced. It is a native of the Island of Sachaline, a desolate region, and, true to its native land, it thrives on either gravelly and dry, or wet soil, and can endure the severest drought. It bears changes of temperature unharmed, and grows with amazing rapidity. Tilling of the ground is unnecessary. The greatest value of the plant consists in its being most excellent cattle food, principally for horses, who devour the young shoots and leaves with avidity. The best plan is to mow the young shoots off when about 5 feet high, and they are still tender, and to give them either as green fodder, or they may with advantage be dried in the usual way. In France, where extensive trials have been made with this plant, it has been ascertained that even in the first year it yields two or three crops, in the following year three or four may be obtained, and that the weight of a green crop may be safely estimated as from 100 to 200 tons per English acre. The chemical analyses has further shown that *Polygonum sachalinense* is extremely nutritious, exceeding in this quality even trefoil. The contents of protein in the dry substance have meanwhile been found by Professor Soxhlet to be 18.97 per cent.

Cultural Directions.

The seed may be sown in the beginning of March in a hot-frame, one-fourth an ounce on a square yard, covered barely half an inch with light soil, which is pressed down slightly, and must be kept moist and without air and sun until the plants appear. These must be gradually hardened off and accustomed to air and light, and not be neglected with watering. Sowings may also be made with advantage in November and December, in rows and covered with half an inch of soil. Soon after the surface of the ground is warmed by the April sun the young plants will make their appearance, and must only be guarded against night frosts, against which they are very sensitive. By the end of May the young plants are strong enough for planting, which is done at a distance of about 18 inches. Seed may also be sown in spring and summer into the open ground, but care must then be taken to guard it with a thin covering of clean moss against the hot rays of the sun. Transplanting of P. sachalinense may be done at any time in summer, if damp and dull weather is chosen. The plants are carefully lifted and transplanted without bending the roots upward in planting, the soil well pressed down, and well watered in dry weather. The plantation has to be kept clean from weeds at first. In the first year the plants may be cut only once, and it must be done when the stalks are still tender. In the following year they are cut when the stalks are about three feet high, as they are then juicy and greedily eaten by the cattle, and as in this way three good crops in a season may be secured.
