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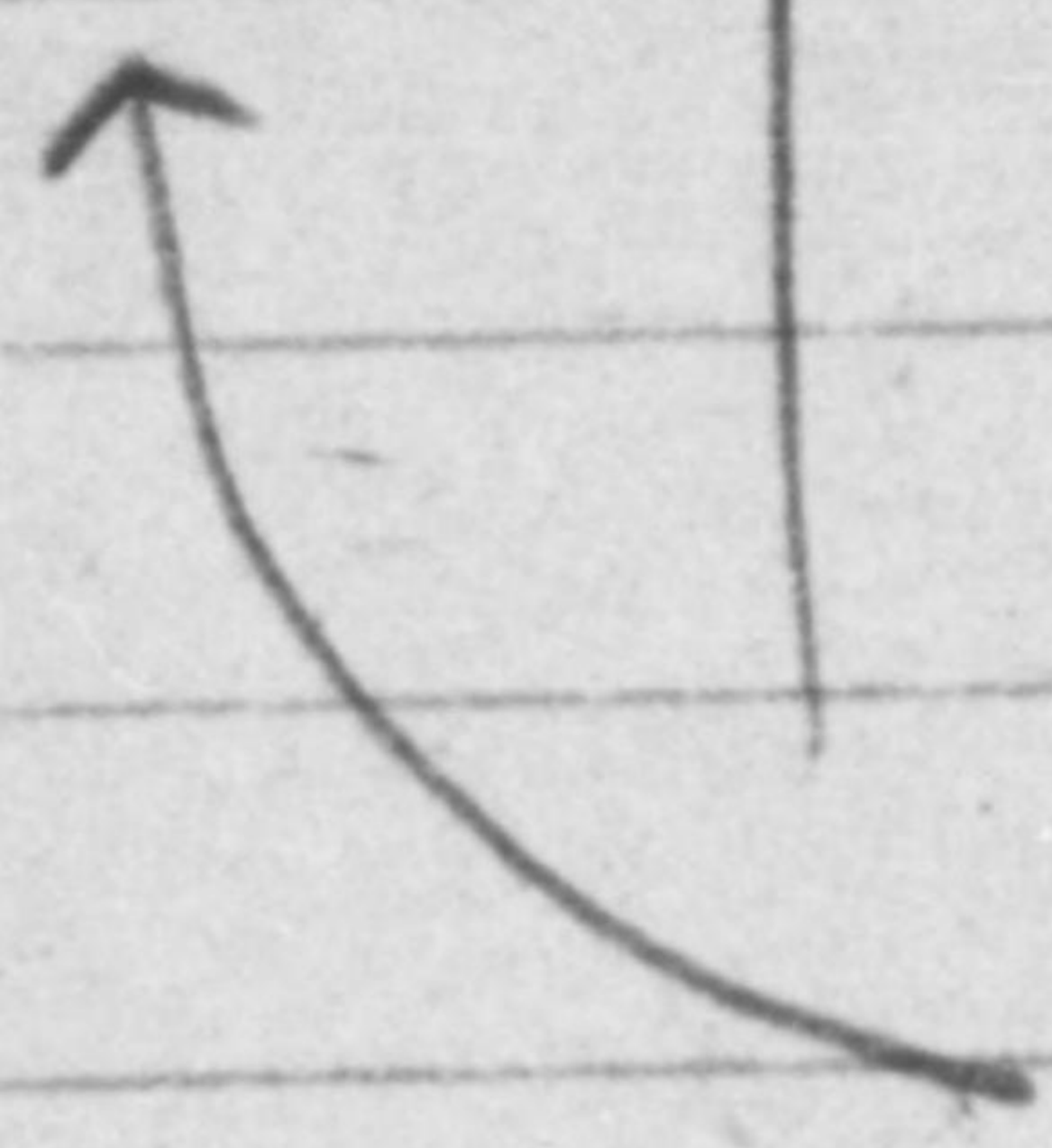

1. 1. Reference checknote from the Deputy Chief of Staff, FEC, subject as above, dated 7 May 1949, and paragraph 3 of G-3 check-note reply thereto, dated 9 May 1949.
2. The result of a survey of currently existing controls and requirements exercised by G-3 over internal Japanese Government administration is submitted herewith.
3. Though there are currently effective a limited number of SCAPINS which set aside bombing and target ranges exclusively for training purposes, the bulk of controls and directives to the Japanese Government over which G-3 exercises staff responsibility are primarily on the subject of repatriation. No revision or elimination of these controls are believed desirable or recommended until the repatriation program is completed.

 2. No further G-3 action on basic subject is currently indicated, however, a continuing review of existing reports and controls (of primary interest to G-3) will be maintained, and action to relax or eliminate these controls will be taken when appropriate.

1. Reference is made to instructions issued at the conference conducted by the Chief of Staff on 9 May 1949 concerning the relaxation of controls exercised over the Japanese Government. As a result of instructions issued at that conference, each section of GHQ, SCAP, has submitted a report in 7 sections containing recommendations for continuing, relaxing, or eliminating specific controls and requirements.
 2. Section Chiefs will take immediate action to implement their recommendations to eliminate current reports, controls and requirements. Determination of whether action papers involved should be submitted to the Chief of Staff is left to the discretion of the section chief.
 3. In general, there should be no wholesale rescission or revocation of SCAPINs or SCAPIN's-A. If it is desired to discontinue certain reports, controls or requirements established by a SCAPIN or SCAPIN-A, the action should take the form of a SCAPIN or SCAPIN-A directing that requirements of certain specified directives need no longer be complied with, effective on a specified date.
 4. A report will be submitted to this office upon completion of the project prescribed in paragraph 2, above.

1. Attention is directed to checknote from the Chief of Staff to each SCAP staff section subject: Relaxation of Controls, 8 September 1949, which requires a report by 15 January 1950 of the reports, controls and requirements eliminated or scaled down during the period 8 September 1949 to 31 December 1949 and those still remaining in effect.

2. Report of the controls, requirements, and reports eliminated or scaled down during the period 8 September 1949 to 31 December 1949 will be submitted by 19 January 1950 rather than 15 January 1950. This report may be submitted in any form (single copy) desired by the section, but must be in such form that will permit ready comparison with the reports submitted in May 1949. As a suggestion, the retained copy of the report previously submitted may be resubmitted with indications of eliminations and relaxations accomplished.

3. 1. The Relaxation of Controls Committee, appointed by Checknote from DC/S SCAP to staff sections of GHQ, SCAP, 17 June 1949, subject, "Relaxation of Controls", has completed its interviews with representatives of sections concerned.

2. At the meetings of the Committee with representatives of the various sections agreement was reached to eliminate or scale down a number of reports, controls and requirements. Section chiefs will insure that these eliminations and relaxations are effected and that the reports, controls, and requirements involved are not re-established.

3. Section chiefs are reminded that relaxation of controls is a continuing program. As the Japanese Government and its agencies demonstrate capacity for assuming responsibility for additional functions now performed, or closely supervised by this headquarters, those functions must be returned to it. Section chiefs are responsible for initiating such action within their respective spheres of interest.

4. A report will be required from each section by 15 January 1950 indicating the reports, controls, and requirements eliminated or scaled down during the period from date of this checknote to 31 December 1949 and those still remaining in effect. Those referred to in paragraph 2, above, will not be included.

SUBJECT: Review of Publications

1. Attached as Inclosure 1 is AG C/N which forwards for semi-annual review and/or revision a list of circulars and staff memoranda originated by the ACoFS G-3. The furnished list also includes similar publications produced by Special Staff Sections in which G-3 has primary staff interest.

2. Since review of pertinent circulars and staff memoranda is a continuing G-3 responsibility, copies of such publications and comments of appropriate Division Chiefs in connection thereto have been summarized and integrated herein in order to facilitate accomplishment of future periodic reviews.

3. Review of eight (8) circulars and seventeen (17) staff memoranda (including six directives not listed by AG) reveal that G-3 action is required to rescind or amend six (6) of the publications. Necessary action is being initiated, or contemplated in the near future, to accomplish changes as required.

4. Comments pertinent to publications charged to the Chiefs, Opns Division (plus Plans) and Training Division are attached as Inclosures 2 and 3 respectively.

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PUBLICATIONS CHARGED TO OPERATIONS DIVISION

1. GHQ SCAP Cir 6, 9 Mar 49, "International Air Traffic in Japan" (TAB A) - establishes standard exist and entry procedures to be followed by all aircraft cleared into or out of Japan.

RECOMMENDATION: Current procedures governing international air traffic in Japan are consistent with provisions of subject circular; therefore, no revision is currently indicated.

2. GHQ SCAP & FEC Staff Memo 76, 7 Sep 47, "Procedures for Insuring Enforcement of Directives to Japanese Government" (TAB B) - clarifies procedures for insuring the enforcement of directives issued by SCAP to the Japanese Government (JG). The memorandum specifically charges staff sections with responsibility for continuing staff action to insure enforcement of those directives which have been initiated in compliance with instructions contained in general orders and staff memos and includes instructions which permit Staff Sections to determine the degree of surveillance and control required.

Para 4 of Staff Memo 76 charges "commanders of the occupation forces with the general responsibility for surveillance of Japanese compliance with directives of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.....". The mission, in part, of Civil Affairs as stated in para 2a, Annex 4, to Occupation Instructions No. 5 (O.I. 5) dtd 1 April 50 is as follows: "Exercise surveillance over Japanese compliance with directives of SCAP". It is believed that the concept for responsibility of "surveillance" as reflected in the foregoing directives is in dissonance; major Occupation Force Commanders have been relieved substantially of surveillance activities since publication of Staff Memo 76 in 1947 and, on the other hand, Civil Affairs has been charged with additional responsibility in this connection.

Although the terms "military government" and "Military Government Section of the Eighth Army" are presently contained in subject instructions in lieu of "civil affairs" and "Civil Affairs Section, GHQ, SCAP" respectively, AG (Lt Col O'Byrne) states revision of this directive is neither required nor warranted because of such terminology.

RECOMMENDATION: It is deemed necessary that Staff Memo 76 be re-appraised with the view of rescinding all or portions thereof or amending the directive so as to insure conformity with current SCAP policies and directives allied to surveillance responsibility.

3. GHQ SCAP & FEC Staff Memo 3, 8 Jan 49, "Disaster Reports" (TAB C) - provides for the establishment within GHQ of a Standing Operating Procedure (including a Disaster Operations Center) for the receipt and processing of information pertaining to major disasters and unusual occurrences.

RECOMMENDATION: Action to rescind Staff Memo 3 has been initiated.

4. GHQ SCAP & FEC Staff Memo 18, 26 Apr 49 and Staff Memo 18 (Amendment 1), 4 Oct 49, "Dissemination of Tidal Wave Warning" (TAB D) - establishes procedures for dissemination and processing of incoming tidal wave warnings.

RECOMMENDATION: Provisions of the foregoing memoranda conform to current operational procedures in connection with tidal wave warnings; therefore, no revision is presently contemplated.

5. GHQ SCAP & FEC Staff Memo 28, 16 Jul 49, "Instructions Concerning Changes 7 to OI 5" (TAB E) - announces amendment of Occupation Instructions No. 5 (O.I. 5), GHQ, SCAP, 1 Jan 48 by Changes 7. O.I. 5, 1 Jan 48, as amended, was superseded by O.I. 5 dtd 1 Oct 49. The latter O.I. was subsequently superseded by O.I. 5 dtd 1 Apr 50.

Staff Memo 28 was promulgated for the primary purpose of calling to the attention of affected GHQ, SCAP Staff Sections the changing policy of the Occupation in connection with relaxation of controls of JG activities. It is considered that this policy is presently so well established and understood that no specific directive other than the current O.I. 5 is required to insure its implementation. Only supervision through periodic administrative review of existing missions is needed, similar to the semi-annual review of SCAPINs now being accomplished.

RECOMMENDATION:

- a. That subject memorandum be rescinded.
- b. That Comptroller be charged with responsibility for compiling a list of missions and, as a management function, be charged with developing a system of periodic review of missions (assigned by this hqs and by major commanders) to achieve the re-appraisal contained in para 3b of basic.

6. GHQ SCAP & FEC Staff Memo 29, 16 Jul 49, "Use of Troops in Civil Disorders" (TAB F) - establishes policies in connection with the employment of troops in civil disorders.

The basic concept of employment of troops in civil disorders as visualized in subject memo remains unchanged; however, para 1 of Staff Memo 29 cites references contained in O.I. 5 (as amended) dtd 1 Jan 48, which has been superseded by O.I. 5 dtd 1 April 50.

RECOMMENDATION: Amend para 1, Staff Memo 29 so as to delete reference to superseded directives. (Action to accomplish recommended revision is being submitted under separate cover).

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Publications Charged to Operations Division (Cont'd)

7. GHQ SCAP & FEC Staff Memo 32, 20 Jul 49, "Establishment of the Joint Committee" (TAB G) - establishes and assigns functions to, and directs organization of the Joint Committee, GHQ, FEC.

RECOMMENDATION: Paragraph 2c of subject memorandum, "The Chief of Staff....." should read, "The Vice Commander....."; however, in view of current AG policy pertaining to amendments in connection with usage of such terminology, it is recommended that subject directive remain in its present form.

8. GHQ SCAP & FEC Staff Memo 52, 8 Dec 49, "Communications to PHILCOM (AF)" (TAB H) - rescinds Staff Memo 31 of 20 Jul 49 and directs that all communications addressed to CG PHILCOM (AF) will include CG FEAF as in information addressee.

RECOMMENDATION: Since the existent command relationship of CG PHILCOM (AF) and CG FEAF remains unchanged, it is recommended that Staff Memo 52 remain in effect.

9. GHQ FEC Cir 60, 24 Dec 49, "Organization of General Headquarters, Far East Command and Major Commands" and GHQ SCAP Cir 1, 28 Jan 50, "Organization of General Headquarters Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers" (TAB I).

RECOMMENDATION: In view of the fact that the several present changes required in the aforementioned publications are minor in nature and since established CofS policy pertaining to revisions of SCAP and FEC organization circulars required that changes be of sufficient significance to merit publication of new editions, no action on subject circulars is currently required.

10. GHQ SCAP & FEC Staff Memo 10, 8 Mar 49, "Repatriation" (TAB J) - allocated to the ACofS G-1, G-3 and G-4 primary staff responsibilities for the supervision of repatriation. G-3 is charged with responsibility for the mass repatriation of Japanese nationals from Soviet and Soviet controlled areas, China, and Manchuria and for the return of Korean illegal entrants to South Korea.

RECOMMENDATION: Informal exploratory discussions pertaining to repatriation responsibilities have been carried on with G-1 representatives; however, since SCAP has received no official communication in regards to the termination of repatriation from Soviet areas and inasmuch as the return of Korean illegal entrants will continue in the foreseeable future, immediate action to revise Staff Memo 10 is not deemed feasible.

11. GHQ SCAP & FEC Staff Memo 20, 12 May 49, "Addressing Communications to Military Governor of the Ryukyu Islands" (TAB K) - directs that

1. a. Rescission. Staff Memorandum 67, General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers and Far East Command, 25 August 1947.

2. Primary staff responsibility for the supervision of repatriation is established as follows:

a. The Assistant Chief of Staff, G-3, for mass repatriation from Soviet and Soviet-controlled areas, and China (including Manchuria) (and for the return to Korea (South of 38° North Latitude) of Korean illegal entrants apprehended in Japan.)

b. The Assistant Chief of Staff, G-1, for repatriation of individuals and groups of stragglers.

c. The Assistant Chief of Staff, G-4, for transportation used in repatriation, other than that under the control of other nations or other commands.

3. Memorandum to the Japanese Government, AG 370.05 (7 May 46)GC, SCAPIN 927, subject, "Repatriation," 7 May 1946, as amended, is the directive to the Japanese Government governing the mass repatriation of Japanese nationals from Soviet and Soviet-controlled areas and from China (including Manchuria). The provisions of this directive also apply to the repatriation of all individuals, including displaced persons in Japan formerly domiciled in China, Formosa, Korea, and the Ryukyus, in all cases not covered by other specific directives to the Japanese Government from the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.



ESTABLISHMENT OF THE JOINT COMMITTEE

1. In furtherance of the continuing purpose of this Unified Command to integrate to the maximum practicable degree the assigned Army, Navy, and Air Force components into a cohesive team, there is hereby established The Joint Committee, General Headquarters, Far East Command. Hereinafter, and henceforth in all intracommand communications this Committee shall be referred to by the short title The Joint Committee.

2. The primary functions of The Joint Committee are to:

a. Assist the Chief of Staff, Far East Command, in the coordination of interservice matters.

b. Facilitate the dissemination of approved command policy as it pertains to Army, Navy, and Air Force current operations, and to expedite the formulation and review of plans for the joint emergency employment of forces available or prospectively available to the Commander-in-Chief, Far East.

3. The Joint Committee will consist of the Chief of Staff, Far East Command, who is designated as Chairman; Army, Navy, and Air Force members; and such ex-officio members as may be designated.

a. The Deputy Chief of Staff, Far East Command, is designated as the Deputy Chairman and Army member of The Joint Committee.

b. The Chief of Staff, United States Naval Forces, Far East, is designated as the Navy member of The Joint Committee.

c. The Chief of Staff, Far East Air Forces, is designated as the Air Force member of The Joint Committee.

4. The formation and functions of this Joint Committee in no way alter or is the Committee a substitute for the frequent coordinating conferences held by the Commander-in-Chief, Far East, with the commanders of the major component services of the command.

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5. The Joint Committee will meet on the first Monday in each month and on such additional occasions as may be announced by the Chairman. The Chairman will announce the time and place of meetings. The Joint Committee will establish its internal organization and rules of procedure.

In keeping with the SCAP policy as enunciated in checknote directive from the Chief of Staff, subject, "Occupation Policy Toward the Japanese Government and People," dated 6 May 1949, G-3 has maintained a continuing review of existing controls and reports exercised over and required from Japanese Government agencies for which G-3 has primary staff responsibility.

2. All controls and/or reports from the Japanese Government of primary interest to G-3 were reported as in a "continuing" status in the report to the DC/S, SCAP on 23 May 1949. In a conference on 11 July 1949 with the special committee appointed by the Chief of Staff to review these reports, the G-3 recommendations contained in subject report were accepted by the committee as submitted on 23 May 1949.

3. The principal controls and directives to the Japanese Government over which G-3 exercises staff responsibility are primarily on the subject of Japanese repatriation. No elimination or substantial revision of these controls (except as noted in paragraph 4 below) are believed desirable or recommended until SCAP relations with the Soviets on this subject are more satisfactorily resolved. There are currently in effect a limited number of SCAPINs which set aside bombing and target ranges as well as maneuver areas which are used for training purposes. So long as these areas are required by Occupation forces to maintain acceptable standards of training proficiency, these SCAPINs should not be eliminated or relaxed.

4. The Hakodate Repatriation Center, maintained for purposes of receiving repatriates from Karafuto, has been closed per SCAPIN 6998-A as an economy measure effective 1 January 1950. Any subsequent requirement for the services provided by this installation can be handled in the future by the center at Maizuru.

1. The Relaxation of Controls Committee, appointed by Checknote from DC/S SCAP to staff sections of GHQ, SCAP, 17 June 1949, subject, "Relaxation of Controls", has completed its interviews with representatives of sections concerned.

SUBJECT: Relaxation of Controls

1. BASIC ACTION: Checknote from DC/S, SCAP to G-3, dated 4 Jan 50, subject, "Relaxation of Controls," which requires a report of controls over the JG remaining in effect on 31 Dec 49.

2. REFERENCE: C/N from the Chief of Staff to G-3, subject, "Relaxation of Controls," dated 8 Sep 49 (Incl 1).

3. DISCUSSION:

a. In keeping with the SCAP policy as enunciated in checknote directive from the Chief of Staff, subject, "Occupation Policy Toward the Japanese Government and People," dated 6 May 1949, G-3 has maintained a continuing review of existing controls and reports exercised over and required from Japanese Government agencies for which G-3 has primary staff responsibility.

b. All controls and/or reports from the Japanese Government of primary interest to G-3 were reported as in a "continuing" status in the report to the DC/S, SCAP on 23 May 49. In a conference on 11 Jul 49 with the special committee appointed by the CofS to review these reports, the G-3 recommendations contained in subject report were accepted by the committee as submitted on 23 May 49.

c. Actually the number of exclusive SCAP functions which are charged to G-3 are relatively very limited. The principal controls and directives to the JG over which G-3 exercises staff responsibility are primarily on the subject of Japanese repatriation. No elimination or substantial revision of these controls (except as noted below) are believed desirable until SCAP relations with the Soviets on this subject are more satisfactorily resolved.

d. There are currently in effect a limited number of SCAPINs which set aside bombing and target ranges as well as maneuver areas which are used for training purposes. Generally, these areas not restricted or closed to the Japanese except during the period of actual bombing and target practices. So long as these areas are required by the Occupation forces to maintain acceptable standards of training proficiency, these SCAPINs should not be eliminated or relaxed.

e. The Hakodate Repatriation Center, maintained for purposes of receiving repatriates from Karafuto, has been closed per SCAPIN 6998-A as an economy measure effective 1 Jan 50. Any subsequent requirement for the services provided by this installation can be handled in the future by the center at Maizuru.

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4. INDICATED ACTION: That a checknote explaining the above be forwarded to the DC/S, SCAP accompanied by a report listing existing controls and reports exercised over and required from JG agencies by G-3.
5. RECOMMENDED ACTION: As indicated in para 4 above.
6. CLASSIFICATION: "Restricted" to conform with basic action.
7. COORDINATION: G-3 Training (Lt Col Warren).
8. RECOMMENDATION: Approval and dispatch of the attached checknote with report enclosure to the DC/S, SCAP.
9. COMPLETION: This completes G-3 action on basic.

1. Reference is made to instructions issued at the conference conducted by the Chief of Staff on 9 May 1949 concerning the relaxation of controls exercised over the Japanese Government. As a result of instructions issued at that conference, each section of GHQ, SCAP, has submitted a report in 7 sections containing recommendations for continuing, relaxing, or eliminating specific controls and requirements.
2. Section Chiefs will take immediate action to implement their recommendations to eliminate current reports, controls and requirements. Determination of whether action papers involved should be submitted to the Chief of Staff is left to the discretion of the section chief.
3. In general, there should be no wholesale rescission or revocation of SCAPIN's or SCAPIN's-A. If it is desired to discontinue certain reports, controls or requirements established by a SCAPIN or SCAPIN-A, the action should taken the form of a SCAPIN or SCAPIN-A directing that requirements of certain specified directives need no longer be complied with, effective on a specified date.
4. A report will be submitted to this office upon completion of the project prescribed in paragraph 2, above.
