This two plane section flew direct Maramag and then followed the road to Dalawangan. The targets were the ravines west and south-west of the town. All bombs were dropped on these ravines, which were supposed to be personnel areas. Both planes strafed the target on the bomb runs and again afterward. Growth and vegetation in the ravines made damage evaluation impossible. However, coverage of the bomb bursts was good.
