Why Not Grow the Finest Vegetables?

Eat Full-of-Vitamines Vegetables for Better Health

N ADDITION to the well-known body-building and repairing substances contained in the foods we eat, modern investigators in matters relating to diet have found new substances now known as Vitamines. This work has been commended by Mr. Herbert Hoover as "The most important discovery of modern times."

We have conclusive proof that these substances, which have been named "Fat-soluble A.," "Water-soluble B.," and "Water-soluble C.," are of great importance in the maintenance of health, and to a large extent are essential to the preservation of life itself.

(Two other Vitamines are under investigation.)

Value of Vitamines

It is known that Vitamine "A" promotes growth, especially in children, and its absence causes sore eyes and blindness, and a stunting of growth.

The absence of Vitamine "B" in the diet brings on various

digestive troubles, neuritis, and anemia.

The absence of Vitamine "C" promotes nervous disorders, irritability, lack of energy, and in extreme cases is the cause of scurvy. "Fat-soluble A." is found most abundantly in milk and its products, eggs and cod-liver oil, but the accompanying table indicates that vegetables also contain this substance in considerable quantities.

Vegetables Teem With Vitamines

The water-soluble vitamines are found in abundance in the leafy vegetables and it is most desirable to use these in the raw or uncooked state as far as possible. Cabbage in the form of cold-slaw is a very appetizing dish and contains the three vitamines in generous

Raw tomatoes are also an important food material in this respect, and are the subject of a deservedly increasing popularity among all classes of people. An important point to consider is the fact that when tomatoes are cooked their natural acid prevents the destruction of vitamine C, which is often the result when other vegetables are cooked. Consequently, canned tomatoes are a valuable source of this vitamine in seasons when fresh vegetables are not readily obtained.

More attention should be given also to those garden crops which lend themselves to storage in their natural condition—such as the root-crops, onions, cabbages, etc., on account of their vitamine content, as well as a source of inexpensive food material for winter use.

Our forefathers gave a large amount of attention to the garden crops as well as natural "greens" such as watercress, dandelions and docks, mainly through experience which indicated their value as adjuncts to the regular diet. We now know that a large factor in the use of spring greens was the need for the vitamines which corrected various disorders brought on by a limited and deficient diet.

Every gardener should find renewed interest in his work when considered in the light of these modern discoveries, and every consumer of garden products (which includes nearly all the peoples of the earth) should take an interest in vitamines because of their importance in the maintenance of health and bodily vigor.

The most common and destructive enemy of beans is the weevil. The eggs of this pest are deposited in the growing pods in the field, the beetles emerging the following spring. Often several are contained in a single seed.

No satisfactory field treatment is known, the most effective remedy being the treatment of the seed after harvest, with bi-sulphide of carbon.

The New Hampshire Exp. Station advises the following plan: "Use an ordinary coal oil barrel, which will hold close to five bushels of beans. This quantity can be treated with three ounces of bi-sulphide of carbon, which may be poured on the beans.

"Care must be taken to close the top tightly; the exposure should be for 48 hours. The bi-sulphide should be of the best quality because this will vaporize without any residue.

"The vapor of this substance is very inflam-mable and the work should be done at a distance from other buildings and no light of any kind be brought near."

The seed should be sown at the same time as radishes, lettuce, onions, peas—as early as possible in the spring, in rows from fifteen to twenty inches apart, and seed should be covered about an inch deep. The Mangel succeeds best in deep loamy soil which The Mangel succeeds best in deep loamy soil which the roots can easily penetrate, but do fairly well in any good garden soil which will raise corn and potatoes. The seed should be sown early in the spring in rows twenty-four to thirty inches apart, drilling the seed one inch apart in the row, covering to the depth of one inch. When well up, gradually thin out until the plants stand I foot apart in the row. One ounce will sow 100 feet of row. 5 or 6 lbs. are required to the acre.

Mangels can be cheaply grown and under favorable conditions should yield twenty or thirty tons of roots to the acre.

One scientific Ohio farmer in discussing Mangels says: "Feed each cow a peck of spicy mangels with a handful of cotton seed meal sprinkled over them, twice a day, and see the milk flow. Of course, this is not a complete ration in itself but is a great tonic and appetizer. No danger of having too many mangels, as poultry, sheep, and hogs, as well as cows, do well on them."

Mangels should be harvested before the roots are frosted, and are better taken up when the ground is a little wet, so some dirt will stick to them, then place in cellar or cave. If they start to wilt cover them with enough dirt to keep moist and they will keep in good condition all winter.

As soon as the desired thickness is reached, remove from the fire and seal in cans or bottles to prevent moulding. 



ounce of seed will sow a row 150 feet long, and they should not be allowed to stand too close in the row, but should be thinned to about six inches apart. This insures turnips of good size and the quality is better than if grown too close.

Stark Lawn Grass Seed Makes Velvety Lawns

BEAUTIFUL lawns are admired by every-one, and nothing adds so much to the appearance of a place as a velvety, well kept sward. In making a lawn, it is well to bear in mind that you are creating something that will last for years and nothing in its construction should be slighted.

How to Make a Lawn

The first step in lawn making is the grading, aiming to have the finished lawn as nearly level as the location will permit. If much grading is to be done, the top soil should at first be removed to one side, then finish the grading, returning the top soil when completed, so as to have a rich seed bed on which to sow the seed.

The next step is to thoroughly harrow the soil, breaking up all lumps and raking off any stones and litter that may be near the surface. If the ground is not naturally rich, it is well at this time to rake in a generous

amount of some good commercial fertilizer. Bone meal is especially good. Stable manure is to be avoided, be-

cause of the weed seeds it is apt to contain.

In seeding, sow broadcast, scattering the seed evenly over the ground at the rate of one pound to 400 square feet or 100 pounds to the acre. The seed should be raked in lightly after which it is advisable to give the ground a thorough rolling. Early spring and fall are the mostfavorable seasons of the year in which to start a lawn.

Hot, dry weather is injurious to lawns, making them look brown and dead, and often kills out the sod. It is advisable during dry weather to frequently sprinkle the lawn, choosing early morning or late afternoon as the

time for doing it.

Where lawns are cut regularly, it is not necessary to rake off the short cuttings, as they will work down among the roots, forming a beneficial mulch. Where a heavy growth is cut, it is advisable to rake off the cutting as too much is liable to smother out the sod.

Old lawns are greatly benefited if in the spring they are raked off and given a seeding of our Evergreen Mixture at the rate of one pound to every 1,000 square


