The Inited States and the Cherokess.—A treaty was concluded between the United States and a delegation of Cherokees on the 14th of March, at Washington, by which they, in consequence of the arithmora: quarting of land which they are to receive beyond the Mississippi, and also of the sum of four millions five hundred thousand dollars, ends all sheir right and title to all the lands owned, claimed and possessed by them, including the lands reserved by them for a school fund, east of the Mississippi river. The additional quantity of land referred to above is seven millions of acres.

The Treaty is to take effect when ratified by a majority of the Cherokees, and by the President by and with the sivice and consent of the Senate of the U. S.
