Consideration of the measure had been delayed from time to time and when it was shally laken up if furnished concerning for taken up it turnished opportunity for a vigorous protest from several of the aldermen who have been opposed to it from the start. After considerable discussion the clause limiting the hours for the sale of liquor to 11 p. m., each day, was abandoned, but that dealing with the sale of intoxicating liquor in restaurants was allowed to stand. with the sale of intoxicating liquor in restaurants was allowed to stand. As the by-law stands at present saloons are still to close at midnight on each day of the week except Saturday and on that night at 11 p. m. From July 14th restaurants, as far as the sale of liquor is concerned, must conform to the laws governing saloons. Thus from the date mentioned there will be no liquor sold in restaurants will be no liquor sold in restaurants on Sundays, and on all week days save Saturday no liquor will be sold after midnight.

When discussion opened last night Victoria were not such as made any amended liquor by-law necessary. The council should not continue to pass by-laws which could not be enforced. He moved that the by-law be given the six months holst. This was not seconded.



Sequel to Blasting Accident on Fort Street is Arbitrated Before Judge Lampman

That blasting contractors have been mown, when leaving unfinished jobs, through dissension with employers, to place charges in plugged holes for the especial beneat of their successors, was hinted at during the hearing of the case of Williams vs. Colbert Phimbing & Heating Company, under the Workmen's Compensation Act, before Judge Lampman to-day.

ing day.

The principal witness for the defenor was W. Ridgway Wilson, architect for the new building. In the course of his testimony he expressed the opinion that decased had not properly covered the blast before firing, and had sought the most exposed spot in the vicinity.

A question arose as to whether the blest, which is alleged to have killed deceased, was fired from a hole left by a former contractor, the evidence on this point not being very clear. Mr. Wilson stated that he had heard Wilson stated that he had heard Wilson stated that he was "scared" of old holes, as contractors sometimes left charges in them and plugged them with fron, making blasting danserous for the men succeeding them. Witness added that the contractor who had charge of the work before deceased had assured him that Wilsiams had, nothing to fear, as he had not left any old charges in the reck.

ANTI-TRUST LAW UPHELD.

Washington, D. C., May 3. The Superme court of the U. S. yesterday upheld the constitutionality of the Tennesse anti-trust law in a decision sustaining the action of the Tennesse courts against the Standard Oil Company of Kentucky.

The decision against the Standard has been stubbornly fought through the state courts, and the final decision of the Tennessee Supreme court was







SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST LAND REGU.

NORTHWEST LAND REGULATIONS.

Any persor, who is the sole head of a family, or any male oversts years old, may hongstead a quarter section of available. Dominion land in Manitoba. Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the lominion Landa Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency. on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

This is rather a rare fern on Vancouver Island, it having been found only on Texada Island up to this time. The specimen exhibited was found at Saanich Arm. It is an evergreen fern, the fronds remaining green throughout the winter and until the next set have grown. The secretary also told of the uses of the camass, the blue flower which is so common at this time of year. Formerly the Indians gathered the bulbous roots in large quantities and cured them by placing them in a large hole in the sand in which a fire had been previously lighted. The hot sand had the effect of preserving them. They are a very nutritous food, much enjoyed by the Indians.

Citizen of Republic Declares Conditions Worse Than in the Congo Free State

Washington, D. C., May 2.—A letter written to the United States consul at Managua, Nicaragua, by Narcise Arellane, a citizen of Nicaragua, detailing incidents of creelities in the republic.

Under date of April 10th from Man-agua, a subsequent note to the Amer-lean consul, at Managua from Afel-lane states that the author had re-ceived reliable information of 17 cases, in which men have been hung up, by their thumbs. He gives the names of 17 victims and the name of one man who was shot and two who were

lashed.

Another document detailing those alleged fructites and mentioning specific instances of insuits to women by officials, slieging in one case that a woman was shot because she resisted a government officer who tried to kissier, has been submitted to the state department by Senor Castrillo.
