RACING UP THE NILE TO MEET ROOSEVELT

Nephew of Victorian Steered Newspapermen to a "Beat" on Colleague

At the time of Colonel Roosevelt's emergence from the depths of the African jungle the American newspapers devoted considerable space to reports from their "special correspondents" on the Nile. Telling of a spectacular race up that mighty river to meet the intrepid Nimrod. Although the public received the impression that each correspondent had a separate steamer, which gradually outdistanced its rivals and placed its enterprising passenger first in the camp of the Roosevelt, only four correspondents actually made the trip from Khartoum and three of these were on a little steamer piloted by the nephew of a well-known Victorian.

John Mortimer, of Courtenay street, who left yesterday on a visit to his old home at Aberdeen, Scotland, after an absence of forty-five years, recently received a letter telling the inside facts of the great race. Ahead of the lesser newspaper fry a quartette of pencil-pushers fouled themselves at Khartoum when Roosevelt was reported some hundreds of miles up the river. Although the ex-president had solemnly warned the press of America before entering the jungle that he would have nothing to say about politics, when he first returned to civilization, each correspondent cherished the hope that the colonel would select him as the special instrument to convey his opinions of Taft, Ballinger, Pinchot and the Grand Old Party to the waiting nation.

At Khartoum their ardor was somewhat dampened by lack of transportation facilities, which eventually induced the four to agree on a joint excursion. John Flett, nephew of Mr. Mortimer, offered to find a steamer for the party and to pilot it up the river. Mr. Flett has spent years on the Nile and the Suez canal as engineer and pilot, and his services were at once engaged. The steamer was to leave in the morning and three of the correspondents went to bed early. The remaining member of the quartette, in an excess of professional zeal, played them false and managed to charter another steamer for his exclusive use. When the others awoke he had a start of seven hours. Flett was impromptu to "beat him to it" and, under forced draught his ugly little steamer gave a good imitation of a Mississippi stern-wheeler of the old days "with a nigger on the safty-valve."

The Nile is a wide river and Roosevelt's exact location was problematical. Flett soon found that his steamer would never draw level in the three-hundred-mile trip and decided to make an experiment. Running straight off a native village, he learned the approximate location of the camp and steered for it. Meanwhile the lone reporter was tearing up river miles past the camp. Flett arrived first and at once became a hero in the sight of his passengers. They believed he had passed the camp steamer in the night and insisted on introducing him to Roosevelt, lauding his skill and presenting him with various tokens of regard.

Roosevelt, shaking the young Scotchman's hand, congratulated him warmly and said, "Scotland has sent the United States some of its greatest men."

THE HERCULES BRAKE

Can Be Braked But Not Broken

Strange as it may seem, the bicycle has been improved more since than during the days of the boom. Within the past few years the number of bicycles in daily use has been steadily increasing. In spite of the "fad fatigue," people recognize the merits of the wheel. They saw that as a time saver and health producer, it was unequalled as a mode of travel.

Manufacturers soon felt this change of front, and set themselves to give an impetus to it. Their aim was to make the bicycle as comfortable as it was reliable. Cushion frames, cushion handle bars, coaster brakes, and neat mud guards were designed and attached, adding greatly to its attractiveness.

Another improvement has been added this past year, the Hercules coaster brake, simple, neat and strong. In appearance resembling an ordinary hub, it weighs but 25 ounces, being one-half pound lighter than any other brake on the market, and is so simple that a child can put it together. Its extreme simplicity combined with its great strength brought it at once to public notice and favor.

Improvements such as this have made the bicycle steadily increase in public favor, and while a return to the popularity of the boom days is unlikely and undesired, have served to bring back the bicycle to the position it deserves in public use.

"GOLDEN RULE" FAILS.

Finds Soft Words of No Avail When Dealing With Hoodlums at Cleveland.

Cleveland, O., May 3.—Patrolman Cottrill, who had been reading about the "golden rule" in handling disorderly persons, attempted to put the theory into practice here. His humor was knocked off and a hole kicked through it; he was knocked down and beaten almost to death with his own mace, and a riot was precipitated. Hereafter, if he recovers, this particular patrolman will go after hoodlums with a club and cut out the "golden rule" business.

He had been sent to disperse a gang of young ruffians who made a practice of loitering upon a particular corner "rushing the car" and insulting all women who passed, assaulting those who objected to their villainy. Patrolman Cottrill approached and mildly requested them to go home, using his softest and most persuasive tones, accompanied by an ingratiating smile. Instead, they fell upon him and a riot call had to be turned in.

OBITUARY RECORD

By the death of Thomas John Partridge at the family residence, 1709 Quadra street, last night, Victoria loses one of her oldest residents. The late Mr. Partridge arrived in this city with his family in the year 1852, in the sailing ship Sillistria, which brought some 300 persons from the Old Land to this province, making the passage round the Horn.

Shortly after his arrival here Mr. Partridge entered into the employ of the Hudson's Bay Company. He, however, severed his connection with that firm several years later to enter the services of the city. For 23 years he served in the capacity of water collector, but was forced to retire 12 years ago, owing to old age.

Deceased was born in Wollerton, Eng., and had reached the ripe age of 83 years. In the older days Mr. Partridge promoted sports and was considered a good all-round athlete himself. He indulged in cricket and was looked upon as an authority on the game. He also travelled with the Victoria cricket team to points in Washington and Oregon. Mr. Partridge also took a keen interest in agriculture.

The late Mr. Partridge was well known in this city and was highly respected. He was a member of many societies and orders. At one time he was president of the Pioneers' Society and at the time of his death was a member of it. He was an honorary member of the I.O.O.F., having been connected with that body for 40 years.

He is survived by three daughters, Mrs. E. H. Hiscoks, Fisguard street; Mrs. W. G. Cameron, Government street and Miss Minnie Partridge, who resided with her father; and three sons, Francis, employed at the provincial government printing office; William, of this city, and George, in South Africa. Nine grandchildren and two great grandchildren also survive him.

The funeral has been arranged to take place on Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock from the family residence and at 3:30 o'clock at St. John's church. Rev. A. J. Stanley Ard will officiate. Interment will be made in Ross Bay cemetery.

There passed away last night at the Royal Jubilee hospital, William Level, after a lingering illness. Deceased was born at Nafferton Grange, near Hull, Yorkshire, was 82 years of age. For the past eight years he had been residing at Cedar Hill, coming to this province from Manitoba.

He came to this province from the Old Country in the year 1850, accompanied by his wife and son. The late Mr. Level, after his arrival, started for the Turtle Mountain district in Manitoba, and was one of the earliest settlers there. After many years of hard work in that district he decided to retire and left his large farm in Manitoba to his son. Ever since his arrival here he has lived at Cedar Hill, where he made many friends. He was a faithful worker in the church there, being a member of the diocesan synod.

A wife, who lives at Cedar Hill, one son, Charles Edward, of Boissevain, Man., and two grandchildren in New Zealand, survive him. The funeral arrangements have not yet been made, but will be announced later.

At the Royal Jubilee hospital on Sunday last the death occurred of Henry Shaw, at the age of 37 years. He was born in Denmark and was an able seaman. Nothing is known of him locally. The funeral arrangements have not yet been made.

The funeral of the late Richard Jenkins, who died at his residence, 1255 Vining street, on Sunday last, took place this afternoon from the family residence, where services were conducted by Rev. A. E. Roberts. Interment was made in Ross Bay cemetery.

The corporation men who have been clearing away the debris in the front of the hotel will devote their energies to finding the bodies of Holmes and Buller in another part of the wreck.

"Women shouldn't
have the suffrage
because they age
so much more rap-
idly than men that
at forty-five they
are too decrepit
mentally to be ca-
pable of voting," is
the latest anti-suff-
rage argument.
As an anti-suff-
rage argument, I
don't think it's
worth trying to
disprove.

As a reminder that one class of wo-
men at forty-five are older than men
of the same age, and much older than
they need to be, it is an all too true
statement.
I mean, just look around among the
women you know and tell me if the
business and professional women of
your acquaintance—the nurse, the sten-
ographer, the school marm, the music
teacher, the bookkeeper—no matter how
hard they may have to work, aren't
younger at forty-five and fifty and
fifty-five than the woman who has been
twenty or thirty years married.
Now, I am not going to ask you to
draw the conclusion that it would be
better for women to remain in the in-
dustrial world after marriage.
I think that is a very many-sided
question, and one upon which the social
conditions of the future will have a
big bearing.
I am not one of those radicals who
say: "Every woman should have a voca-
tion."

But I do think every woman should
have a vocation—an absorbing interest
outside her home.
A great specialist said recently that
a majority of the cases of nervous pro-
stration and insanity among women are
due simply and solely to the deadly
monotony of household routine.
It is not that the women have worked
too hard, he says, half so much as that
their work has been too monotonous.
No woman ought to allow herself to
be without some very definite interest
outside her home—music, writing, some
line of study, some branch of settle-
ment work, some definite and absorbing
responsibility of church work, or
work in some big cause.
It does not matter so much what the
interest is, so that it be something suf-
ficiently absorbing to keep her mind
thoroughly occupied while she is doing
the dishes and beds and the dusting,
and the million and one little routine
things that do not need her entire at-
tention.
It seems to me that it is an active
mind more than anything else that
keeps people young.

A man is as old as he feels and a
woman as old as she looks, they say,
but it seems to me that they are both
as young as they think.
And the women who are too closely
shut up in the routine of a home get
old so much more rapidly than their
counterparts in the world outside be-
cause they don't have enough to think about
and their minds get sluggish.
Of course, a woman's duty to her
home is first, but I think she will acquit
herself of that duty better if she also
performs some duty for the individual
self and to the world outside.

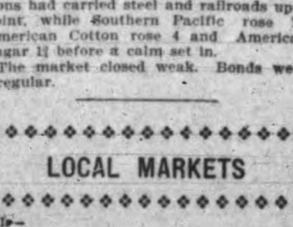

The government bureau is busier now than it has ever been since its inception. Not only are there regular inquiries from all quarters, but so many people apply personally. The result is that the immigrants who intend to settle in the province can obtain authentic information at first hand, and the country gets contented settlers.

A short time ago two men applied at the office and piled the officials with questions. They reached Vancouver there to be induced to return and buy a place on Salt Spring Island. They have since written to the bureau of information thanking them for the "HIGH TRUST" given in getting them what they wanted, and saying that they were perfectly satisfied with the property they had bought. Perhaps the most interesting point to the story is the fact that the men escaped the several hundred Victoria real estate brokers only to be brought back by a Vancouver man and sold property in the Victoria district.

Some of the people who go in are looking for land, but others are going to open up in business at Fort George or some other point along the route of the Grand Trunk Pacific. INJURED IN MINE.

Ladysmith, May 2.—John Cloke was the victim of an accident at the mine Thursday, as a result of which he now lies in the Chemainus hospital. It appears that Mr. Cloke was bringing a second car loaded with the pig coming out of the mine, when he was struck by a runaway car. He was thrown down and ran down ten or twelve yards, hoping to reach some loaded cars. Before he was able to get on the loaded car, one of his legs was badly fractured above the knee and he also sustained several severe bruises. The injured man was at once brought down from the mine and taken to Chemainus hospital. Mr. Cloke is about 60 years of age.

ASSOCIATED BOARDS OF TRADE.

Fernie, May 2.—The Associated Boards of Trade for Southeast Kootenay held a meeting in the city hall and much business of importance was discussed. Several resolutions were presented by the delegates present and in the evening the visiting members were entertained to a banquet at which were present also members of the Mountain Lumbermen's Association who were holding a meeting in town. The banquet was a most successful one. Among those who responded to the toasts were Judge Wilson, Superintendent Brownlee of the C. P. R., W. R. Ross, Peter Lund, W. Haldane of the C. P. R., Secretary Beaton of the Nelson board of trade, and others.

ASSESSMENT UP HALF MILLION

SOUTH SAANICH IN PROSPEROUS CONDITION

Not One Cent of Debt—Councillor Stewart Resigns, as He is Leaving for North

The assessment roll of South Saanich municipality has increased this year over half a million dollars. Such was the report made by Assessors Snelling and Carmichael at Saturday night's council meeting.
Saanich district has now an assessment roll bordering on five million dollars, and not one cent of debt, a condition that should be very gratifying to the ratepayers. The ratepayers are keeping in close touch with the business done, every meeting this year having found the halt taxed to its full seating capacity.
The Cadboro Bay road dispute reports were closed by the surveyor's report and plans, but the Cordova Bay road trouble was more complicated and was referred to the solicitor for advice.
D. H. Ker was present and gave the reasons why he thought the council should accept the plan submitted of his sub-division on Craigflower and Tillicum roads. It was his intention to provide two public landings at the road ends, to limit the boat houses to two or three by the club system and place building restrictions of from \$1,500 to \$2,500 on the lots, also to give \$4,000 worth of waterfront property for road widening purposes. These advantages, he contended, should be an incentive to the council to modify their demands for 66 feet wide streets and lots of an area equal to 60 x 120 feet.
The council thought otherwise, however, and will abide by their former decision.

TO MARK BOUNDARY
LINE IN THE NORTH

Canadian Party Under J. D. Craig
Will Leave on Princess May
for Skagway

Vancouver, May 2.—J. D. Craig, of the department of the interior, Ottawa, who is at present in Vancouver, has organized a survey party to co-operate with a party from the United States for the purpose of marking the boundary line between Alaska and Canada, north of the Yukon, the treaty line being the 141st meridian. Mr. Craig will have as his assistant A. D. Stewart, who will have charge of a sub-party. Fred Lambert will have charge of another party that will work in the vicinity of Mount St. Elias.

The United States party will be under the control of Thomas Riggs, jr., who has been, in past years, working in co-operation with Mr. Craig. The Canadian outfit will go north on May 4th on the Princess Royal, where as Skagway it will join forces with the United States surveyors. They will then proceed down the Yukon river to a point about 120 miles below Dawson. Supplies will be transported inland by a pack train of 100 horses.
The treaty line runs along the 141st meridian from a base at Mount St. Elias to the Arctic ocean. The parties expect to get as far north as the Porcupine river, and if they succeed in doing this, there will only remain a gap of 150 miles to complete the survey to the Arctic ocean.

FERNIE ASSESSMENT.

Fernie, May 2.—As an evidence of the growth of the city, it may be mentioned that the assessment roll is \$157,900 more this year than last. Six important money-by-laws have already been passed by the municipal council.
Experts estimate that the Hawaiian quarries, which supply almost the entire world's demand for lithographic stones, are good for two more centuries.

Deschamps sawmill, planing mill and yard at China creek, near Roseland, on Tuesday evening. The sawmill and planer were under one roof, and the fire started on the roof of the planer, the entire plant being destroyed, together with 1,900,000 feet of dry lumber in the yards, ready for shipment. The loss is \$25,000, the insurance carried amounting to \$8,000. J. S. Deschamps, sole proprietor of the business, will build a temporary mill at once in a new location near the site of the plant that was burned, and he started men to work clearing the debris from the original site.

WILL BUILD NEW PARSONAGE.

New Westminster, May 2.—The reports read at the annual meeting of the congregation of Queen's Avenue Methodist church, showed the different departments of the church to be in a flourishing condition.
Some time ago a committee was formed to have charge of the work of the erection of a new parsonage. The plans have been prepared and were adopted. The new parsonage will be erected on the corner lot 220x110 to the church and will cost approximately \$6,000. The work of construction will be commenced shortly.

The report of the choir was most satisfactory and particular praise was given the organist, H. D. Mackness. Mr. Pearson, who presented the report, has been leader of the Queen's Avenue Methodist church choir for the past thirty years, and it is due largely to his untiring efforts that the choir has reached its present high stage of success.

WILL INVESTIGATE CHATHAM ISLAND

Natural History Society Decides to Make Excursion Next Saturday

The regular meeting of the Natural History Society was held last evening in their rooms, A. W. McCurdy presiding. The examination of specimens and the arranging of excursions took a good deal of the time. It was definitely decided to spend Saturday afternoon next on Chatham Island to investigate the flora, fauna and geological formation of that place. Arrangements are being made for a launch to take the members and their friends across and to fetch them back later. Any members or friends who have not already signified their intention of joining the party should do so by sending their names to the secretary within the next day or two.

In regard to specimens, J. A. Anderson exhibited a specimen of large fern Woodwardia radicans, which measured 2 ft. 3 in. in length and 1 ft. 11 in. across at its widest point. This is rather a rare fern on Vancouver Island, it having been found only on Texada Island up to this time. The specimen exhibited was found at Sannich Arm. It is an evergreen fern, the fronds remaining green throughout the winter and until the next set have grown.

The secretary also told of the uses of the camass, the blue flower which is so common at this time of year. Formerly the Indians gathered the bulbous roots in large quantities and cured them by placing them in a large hole in the sand in which a fire had been previously lighted. The hot sand had the effect of preserving them. They are a very nutritious food, much enjoyed by the Indians.

Mr. Blaikie exhibited specimens of weevil injurious to strawberries.

Mrs. Tiley brought a specimen of the coral rooted orchid, one of the parasitic members of the orchid family.

Some infusorial earth was shown by C. C. Pemberton, which he had obtained from Linden avenue, where the sewers were being dug. This also contained a large number of small shells and proved a most interesting exhibit.

The matter of the park flowers received its periodical consideration. Mr. Wallace explained that the lilacs which the society had sown some years ago had bloomed this year for the first time, but that they had practically all been picked. This meant that they could not increase. The opinion was expressed that no picking of flowers should be allowed in the park, and that it was the duty of the mayor and council to see that the regulation in this respect was enforced. A strong committee was formed to advise the council to lay their views before that body.

A number of interesting discussions took place before adjournment.

NICARAGUANS BEATEN AND SUSPENDED BY THUMBS

Citizen of Republic Declares Conditions Worse Than in the Congo Free State

Washington, D. C., May 2.—A letter written to the United States consul at Managua, Nicaragua, by Narcise Arrellane, a citizen of Nicaragua, detailing incidents of cruelties in the republic, has been forwarded here to Senor Castillo, representative of the Estrada force in Washington. In his letter Mr. Arrellane says: "I think it best you should know these people are at their work again. They are torturing men and even boys at Mandalino and at Granada, whipping them, suspending them from the thumbs with cords, all this to wrench out confessions from them as to who carried provisions to Calixto Talavoras guerrillas beyond Mandalino."

"I will cite as an example the case of Octavio Marenco, a young man owning a ranch a few miles from Mandalino, who was dealt 200 lashes with sticks at midnight on April 8th at the jail at Granada. He is now at the penitentiary in this town (Managua) and as it is a matter of common knowledge you must have heard the story from another source.
