Portsmouth. Oct. 12.—The steamer Medina, which has been chartered to transport the King and Queen and coronation durbar at Delhi, has been put into commission here as a navy vessel protem. Rear-Admiral Sir Colin Keppel took command and will also be executive officer of the es-cort, which is to consist of the first-class cruisers Cochrane, Argyil, De-tense and Natal.

The durbar, or coronation of King George as Emperor of India will take place on December 12th. and will be the most lavish and expensive ceremony of its kind in the world's history.
