TO: CG, Eighth Army, APO 343

1. Subject matter included in basic communication and indorsements thereto was discussed in a telephone conversation between Captain Lockie of your Headquarters and Major Schmidt of this Headquarters on approximately 21 Feb 46.

2. Following that discussion this Headquarters directed the 107th Military Government Company to make an investigation of the situation.

3. Your 5th Indorsement above and the 3rd Indorsement from the 107th Military Government Company replying to the request for investigation arrived in this Headquarters at approximately the same time. The results of the investigation have already been transmitted to your Headquarters by telephone conversation between Major Schmidt this Headquarters and Captain Lockie your Headquarters. For your official records the report made by the investigating Military Government Company is quoted below:

TO: CO, 107th Mil Govt Hq & Hq Co, APO 660 (Osaka)

1. The Nagoya Imperial University has never taken possession of any part of the arsenal.

2. Permission was granted by the Home Ministry, in December 1945, to the University for use of the property; however, before the end of December 1945 the University decided upon location.

3. No use has been made of the Machinery by the University. The machinery is under the control of the tactical forces; however, an inventory is retained in this Headquarters and a check was made by the Industrial Officer.

4. The representative of the Home Ministry was advised of Par 5 of the basic communication and will advise the University; however, it is his contention that the University has no desire to use the arsenal or its facilities.

4. Selection of the Nagoya Imperial University as custodial agent is authorized provided investigation indicates that such an arrangement is desirable.

SUBJECT: Authorization for Transportation

TO : Mr. Eiji Wajima, Director of the Japanese Liaison Office,  
Nagoya.

1. Request that Japanese representatives of the Japanese Communications Bureau, Mr. Atsumi in Aichi Prefecture, Mr. Suzuki in Gifu Prefecture and Mr. Usami in Shizuoka Prefecture, be granted authority to make use of such Japanese transportation as is available in the above-mentioned prefectures for the purpose of transporting captured Japanese Army Signal Equipment to the central location point, Nagoya.

2. This equipment, when assembled, will be sorted out and salvaged with a view to rendering it non-military in nature, and will then be turned over to the Home Ministry for use as civilian and commercial communications equipment.

3. Request that this authorization be granted as quickly as possible so that equipment now in the field may be brought in for salvage before unprotected storage and bad weather can render it unserviceable.
