In its full vigor in late summer is advantageous, while if cut when buds first open they open up for a number of days to full bloom in the vase. In this latitude by planting at intervals up until June, they produce flowers until the late October frosts. They are no more difficult to grow than the common vegetables, and can be wintered over as well as potatoes.

We welcome any one who will come to our place in the time of bloom to enjoy the beauty of the fields, and assure you that one visit will make you a glad fancier from the start. It is unnecessary for us to dwell further upon their beauty, but if you will make us a visit while our fields are aglow, you will realize more than tongue or pen is able to describe.

In comparing prices bear in mind I pay delivery charges to your postoffice or express on all orders at prices quoted, and also that price is not all that counts in a purchase; quality, reliability, and prompt and efficient service weighs heavily in the scale.

If sold out of size of bulb ordered and a size smaller be used, extra bulbs will be added to insure full value.

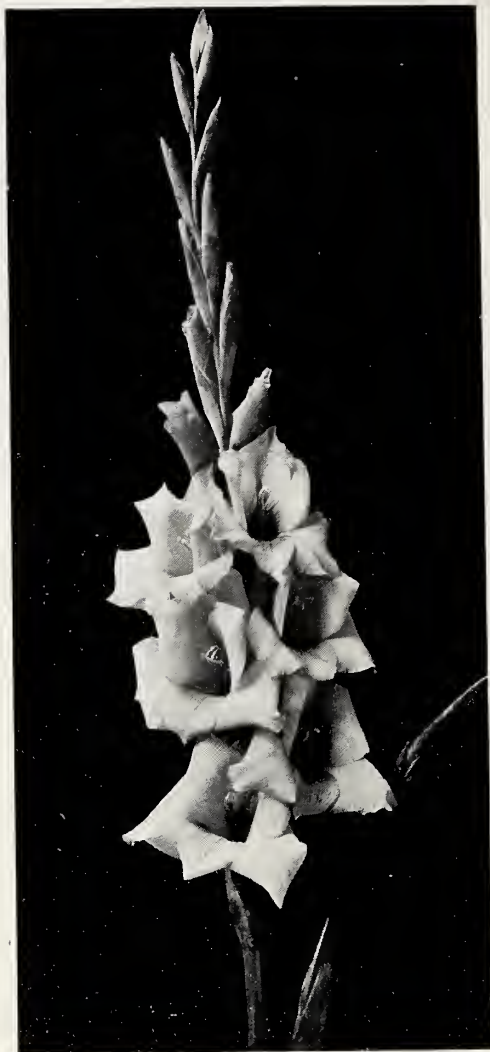
No substitution of varieties unless so advised by the purchaser.

Culture and Care of Gladioli

Gladioli will do well in any good garden soil. Like other plants, the better the soil and culture, the better will be the results. Plant in April or May owing to the latitude: or a safe rule is when the ground is in good condition to work and warm enough to induce growth.

Be sure to select an open sunny location, for they delight in full sunshine. Also avoid planting near the walls of a building or where roots of trees or shrubs absorb the moisture and fertility; this is sometimes far beyond the limits of their branches.

If for hand cultivation plant rows fifteen to eighteen inches apart and for horse culture from two and one half to three feet apart and place the corms from four to six inches apart in rows, covering them from three to four inches deep. Cultivate frequently.
